

Postal Receipts Set All-Time Record

Postal receipts at Friona's U.S. post office set a new all-time record of \$64,687.48 during the calendar year 1968, it was announced by Postmaster Wright Williams.

The 1968 total was a gain of \$8,830.48 over the figure of \$55,857.00 in 1967. Sales in 1968 amounted to a 15.8 per cent increase over the previous year.

In amassing the total, the 1968 postal figures included a record fourth quarter sales of \$21,076.63, and a third quarter total of \$18,154.95. Combined, the last six months of 1968 produced \$39,231.58 in postal receipts.

The former record year had been 1956, when postal receipts totaled \$56,960.92.

Other recent calendar year totals included: 1965--\$53,685.20; 1964--\$51,523.78; 1963--\$43,821.31; 1962--\$37,162.71; and 1961--\$34,218.99.

Postmaster Wright Williams said that he was proud of the way the local postal receipts have increased.

The postmaster also said that the city mail delivery, which was begun during the last half of 1958, is working satisfactorily, with two mounted routes.

"We really needed this service in Friona, and had needed it for some time. There are many people who cannot get out every day for their mail, and others who had rather not," Williams said.

The postmaster pointed out that the 1968 receipts put the local office close to the requirements for a first-class office, another plateau which has been the office's goal.

CATTLE FEEDING

MBP President To Speak At Meeting

Cattle feeding has already become big business in Parmer County over the past few years but "the sky may be the limit."

Cattle feeders, farmers, and others interested in the County's future will want to be sure to attend a beef cattle meeting on Thursday, January 23, at 7:00 p.m. at the Bovina High School Auditorium.

Of special interest will be a discussion on the need for cattle feeding in the 1970's, says Ronny McNutt, Parmer County Agricultural Agent. Presenting the discussion will be Gene Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., Scottsdale, Arizona. The corporation opened the largest beef packing plant in the nation last May at Friona.

"Cattle Futures Trading - A Marketing Tool" will be another topic of discussion which should attract wide interest. Foster Whaley, Gray County Agricultural Agent from Pampa will speak on this subject. Whaley has a vested interest in cattle futures trading and will discuss many of the practical aspects that should benefit local livestock producers.

Grain sorghum producers as well as cattle feeders in the county will receive the latest information on research being done on sorghum preparation for feeding. Dr. Lowell Schake of Lubbock, area livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be on hand to discuss this research.

Rounding out the program will be a talk on "Slaughter Recommendations-Reasons and Prevention" by Dr. R.O. Dull, supervisory veterinarian meat inspector, USDA Consumer and Marketing Service, Hereford. Everyone in the county is encouraged to attend this meeting.

Friona's 1968 Rainfall Lowest In Seven Years

Total rainfall measured in Friona during 1968 was the lowest in the seven years that the city office has been making the official recordings.

A total of only 9.38 inches was measured at the city weather station. The total rainfall for the last two years comes to only 20.55 inches, since 1967 total was 11.17, and previously was the lowest for the seven-year-old weather station.

Only five months during 1968 measured as much as an inch of moisture. Six of the 12 months produced a half-inch or less of moisture.

Biggest month in terms of rainfall was September, when 1.59 inches were received. Driest month was December, which came out at .11 inches.

Recent yearly totals, as compiled by City Manager, Jake Outland, are as follows: 1962; 12.22; 1963; 18.80; 1964; 10.82; 1965; 17.23; 1966; 17.20; 1967, 11.17; 1968, 9.38.

Measurements for the calendar year 1968 were as follows: January 1.37; February .15; March .52; April .50; May 1.25; June .26; July 1.38; August 1.33; September 1.59; October .50; November .42; and December .11.

...from the files of the Friona Star

40 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 18, 1929

Harvest of the biggest row crop in Parmer County history was being completed, with an estimated 3,000 tons of maize heads on the ground at Friona Grain Co., and about 7,000 bushels of corn.

The city commission voted to grade and re-surface with caliche Main Street from Highway 33 to Eighth Street, although it was the consensus of many that more permanent paving program would be money better spent.

G.M. Baker, who farms north of Friona, is reporting good profits from 300 Walte Leghorn pullets he owns.

35 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 19, 1934

Reliable reports come from the county seat to the effect that the right-of-way for State Highway 33 or Federal Highway 60 has been assured as far west as one mile west of Friona.

Five-year-old Johnny Jasper, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Jasper of Friona, died from scalding burns suffered when he tumbled into a vat of boiling water, which was being used to scald freshly butchered hogs.

30 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 20, 1939

It was decided that the necessary plans be made to introduce a 12-grade school system in Friona next year, similar to that being introduced in a number of the larger schools of the state.

The Friona girls won a hard-fought game from Farwell here Tuesday, 23-22, to take the lead in Parmer County conference play with three straight victories.

25 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 21, 1944

15 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 16, 1954

10 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 15, 1959

The construction of a new bus barn, to cost \$11,425 on the Staley property now owned by the school district was approved at a meeting of the Friona Independent School District Board of Trustees last week.

Administrative offices for Friona Independent School District will move from their present location in the high school building to the old band hall, located west of the auditorium.

5 YEARS AGO -- JAN. 16, 1964

Friona's Western Auto, now under the ownership of Mr. and Mrs. Ben D. McDonald, will hold grand opening Friday and Saturday.

The Friona Squaws rolled to their 17th straight win of the season here Tuesday, downing the Morton Indian Maidens, 57-32 for their second district win without a loss.

Construction is underway of a new sanctuary for the United Pentecostal Church. Rev. Frank Baber, who headed building programs in six other communities, is architect for the construction, due completion in March.

1 YEAR AGO -- JAN. 18, 1968

Brenda Hawker, Australia, Friona High School's exchange student in 1964-65, will be honored at a reception in the F.G. Phipps home on Sunday.

Pause And Reflect

Although the menace of air pollution is currently receiving a great deal of publicity, it is not a new problem.

As early as 1740 the chimneys of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, were belching forth such great clouds of soot and smoke as to inspire a young printer named Benjamin Franklin to invent a new type stove.

His stove was designed to radiate heat from all sides and to burn the fuel more completely; thereby killing two birds with one stone - greater comfort and less air pollution.

The Franklin stove was only one of Ben's inventions, but on none of them did he apply for a patent.

True patriot that he was he considered his talent to be public property and it is doubtful that any man ever lived who served his homeland more dutifully than did Franklin.

After two years of formal education, from age 8 to 10, young Benjamin began to fight the "war on poverty" -- he went to work!

Two years were spent in helping his father in the family's soap and candle shop, then began his training as a printer.

Working by day and studying by night he became so well educated that today we remember him not only as a master printer but also as a diplomat, inventor, scientist, philosopher, educator, and public servant.

Tomorrow, Jan. 17, marks the 263rd anniversary of his birth. Let us remember "Poor Richard" kindly and hold fast to those principles he defended so well.

The following letter was sent to the Hon. Wayne L. Hays, Congressman, and was recorded in the Congressional Record. We take the liberty of reprinting it from the "Defender" magazine and of prefacing it with a quote from Benjamin Franklin.

"They that can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety."

The letter --

I am not a white racist, but a 40-year old Negro woman who knows what she is talking about, so pay attention.

What is wrong with you in Washington? You keep giving the poor more free handouts, when what they need is a job so they can learn to work and help themselves. Welfare alone has been their ruination. If you give a check or commodities, make them do something in return. If you give education or job training, make them earn it.

There are many things that need doing in this country. Roads need repair. Trees on our city streets need trimming. There is litter on the sidewalks. City buildings need painting. Hospitals and nursing homes can always use a little more help. Women on relief could take some foster children. When the children are in school, they could do other volunteer work.

Do you people really not know that any human who gets something for nothing loses all pride and initiative? You are completing the destruction of the Negro male by all these so-called progressive programs. Many of those collecting welfare are driving around in big cars and have expensive furs. My husband and I, who are taxpayers, can't afford these things. Why aren't people investigated before they are given charity? Don't tell me we cannot find work for them to do. If I cannot get what I want, I scrub floors, and have done so. My mother taught me nothing was beneath me if it was honest.

I am not the only one who feels this way. Many hard-working people, black and white, are getting fed up with this free, free, free policy. We are sick and tired of making sacrifices to support those who are too lazy to stand on their own two feet. We are not going to stand for it forever.

Seventeen Rural Wrecks Investigated In Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 17 accidents on rural highways in Parmer County during the month of December, according to Sergeant W.E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 11 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$11,015.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1968 shows a total of 129 crashes resulting in five persons killed, 77 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$87,491.00.

The final date of the 1969 motor vehicle inspection period for all motor vehicles registered in Texas is drawing near. The Sergeant stated, "Since the beginning of the inspection period, September 1, 1968, only about one and one-half million vehicles have been inspected and approximately five million more remain to be inspected."

Texas law requires inspection of brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, steering, wheels and rims, and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

The inspection fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost of repairs and adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.

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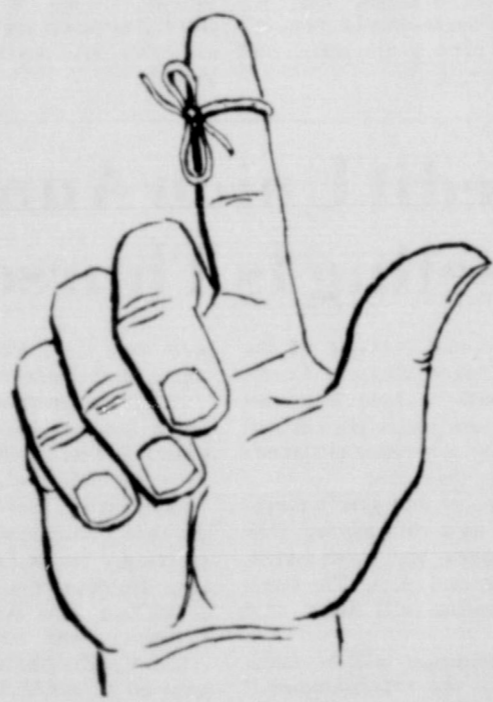

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Monthly Census To Get Information On TV Sets

A sample of residents in this area will be asked about the television sets in their households as part of a nationwide survey the week of January 20, Director Francis H. Wilmer of the Bureau of the Census Regional Office in Denver announces.

The questions are aimed at determining the proportion of households in the U.S. with television sets, the proportion with color sets, and the proportion with sets which can receive UHF. Answers to these questions help government and business in decisions affecting the establishment of new broadcasting facilities.

The survey is taken annually. Last year's figures showed that approximately 94 per cent of the households in the United States had at least one television set. Approximately 19 per cent of the households had a color set and 42 per cent were equipped for UHF reception.

The TV questions supplement the Bureau's regular monthly employment survey which provides data to the U. S. Department of Labor for updating national employment figures.

The identity of households in the survey is confidential, and the information obtained will be used for statistical purposes only.

Arrange A Home Gallery

Turn hallways into a highlight of your home with clever arrangements of framed pictures. Too often hall space is neglected when it comes to decorating, and the hall is relegated to the role of utilitarian passageway.

Artfully arranged, framed pictures and appropriate lighting can make the darkest corner an important part of the home, according to the Picture and Frame Institute. Because space to view pictures in a hall is usually limited, the Institute suggests a variety of medium and small-size pictures. Large pictures cannot be enjoyed as fully in any but the largest hall.

Framed pictures might be interspersed with shallow shelves mounted on the wall for the display of small scale items. The wall

area above a bench, table, or chest is ideal for a small grouping of pictures. A long hall lends itself perfectly to a line of pictures hung at eye level along the full length of the area.

Additional lighting is frequently necessary in a hall, and it can be approached either of two ways. For a dramatic effect, light each picture individually from above. For even overall lighting, increase ceiling fixtures to approximate room lighting.

Arrange pictures on the floor first to determine spacing and grouping. The task of hanging them is simplified by planning the grouping beforehand. Your results will produce compliments and comments from your own family as well as guests.

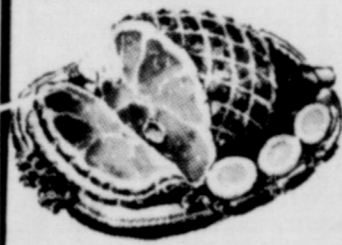


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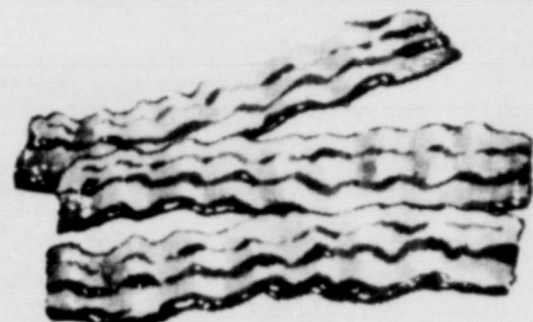

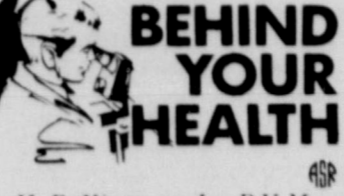

BEHIND YOUR HEALTH H. E. Kingman, Jr., D.V.M.

Where do you stand in the pecking order? The term, "pecking order," which is applied frequently to human situations, has its origin in classical behavioral studies of the social structure of chickens. But chickens have taught man about more than the "pecking order." In fact, experiments with chickens have contributed substantially to our knowledge of how diseases are caused and how they may be cured. In 1966 Dr. Peyton Rous won a Nobel Prize for his identification of the Rous Sarcoma (a type of cancerous tumor) in the chicken. His experiments performed at Rockefeller University in 1911 provided the first laboratory proof of a virus-induced tumor. From this discovery flows much of the present research theory on the viral origin of cancer. Spontaneous leukemia in chickens, another form of cancer which accounts for major losses to the poultry industry, is also under intense study by scientists. This research has led to the discovery that some infected birds do not develop the disease but still transmit it to succeeding generations. Many scientists believe this latent form of leukemia, now confirmed in studies of rats and mice, has important implications for study of the disease in humans. Perhaps the most significant contribution of the chicken to research lies in use of the chick embryo as a research aid. The fertilized egg is a unique, germ free medium into which disease-causing agents can be injected. Scientists then study or control the growth of these pathogens in the body of the embryo. Life-saving vaccines, including those against rabies and encephalitis, have been refined through use of this technique. 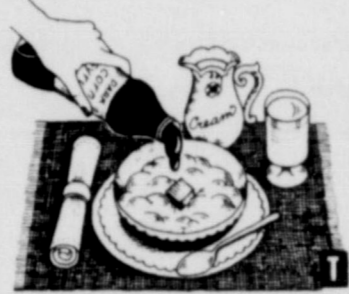

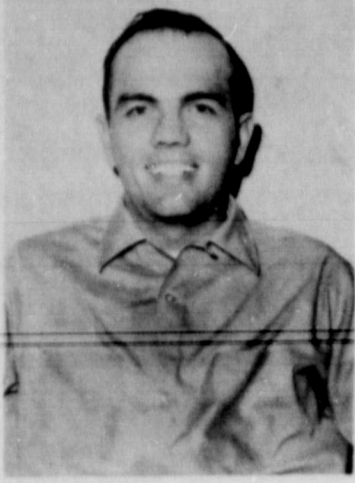

Grain Council Sending Specialists To Europe

The U.S. Feed Grains Council is sending a five-man team of grain specialists to Europe in January to discuss European agricultural policies that are being developed and to share with the European buyer and users the latest information on U.S. corn and grain sorghum. The team departed January 7 with stops scheduled for England, Germany, Netherlands, Belgium, Italy, Spain and Portugal. They will participate in meetings with grain shippers, importers, feed manufacturers and other users of feed ingredients. The trip will last approximately three weeks.

Team members include: Herman T. Holmes, President of the U.S. Feed Grains Council who is associated with the P-A-G Division of W.R. Grace & Company, Monroe, Iowa; Clayton W. Johnson, Council Secretary and Manager of Mid-States Terminals, Inc., Toledo, Ohio; D.G. "Bill" Nelson, Council Director and Executive Vice President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, Amarillo, Texas; Samuel H. Sabin, Immediate Past-President of the Council and Vice President of Continental Grain Company, Washington, D.C.; and John A. Browning, Chairman of the Board of Appeals and Review, Grain Inspection Branch, USDA, Beltsville, Maryland. Also accompanying the group in Europe will be Allen W. Golberg, European Director for the Council. Clarence Palmby, Executive Vice President of the Council, was a member of the team originally. However, after Palmby's appointment as Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, Sabin was named to replace him on the team.

In Washington, Holmes, who will be the team leader, spelled out the underlying role of the team's visit to Europe at the time.

"The Common Market Commission is preparing proposals for a basic overhaul of the EEC farm policy. The outcome of this overhaul will have a significant bearing upon exports of U.S. feed grains and other agricultural sales."

"The EEC is presently faced with costly farm subsidies and increasing food surpluses," Holmes said, "a situation that has led to \$2-billion a year in price guarantees for inefficient farmers and export subsidies to move surpluses abroad."

"What is more worrisome is that the forces for further price increases in Europe have not been fully satisfied and will continue to push for further upward adjustments again this year."

"Our concern is this," Holmes said. "The higher the grain support price for EEC producers, the higher the levy on imported cereals and the greater the trade impediment. In trade circles, we often state that the Common Market buyers pay for five bushels of corn and receive only three. In reality, this is a true statement because the two bushels out of five that are not received constitute the variable import levies or the payment made by EEC consumers to maintain internal grain prices at levels nearly double U.S. prices."

Holmes went on to say that much the same story can be told regarding grain pricing policy in other European countries. He added that high guarantee prices also act as an incentive to increase internal grain production.

"The agricultural policy that is developing in the Common Market isolates the feed grain market from the world, and the extreme high prices are established without recognition of world prices," Holmes said. "It is inconceivable that such unilateral policies can continue without discriminatory actions on the part of other trading countries, particularly buyers of European industrial items."

Holmes said that one of the points the team will emphasize

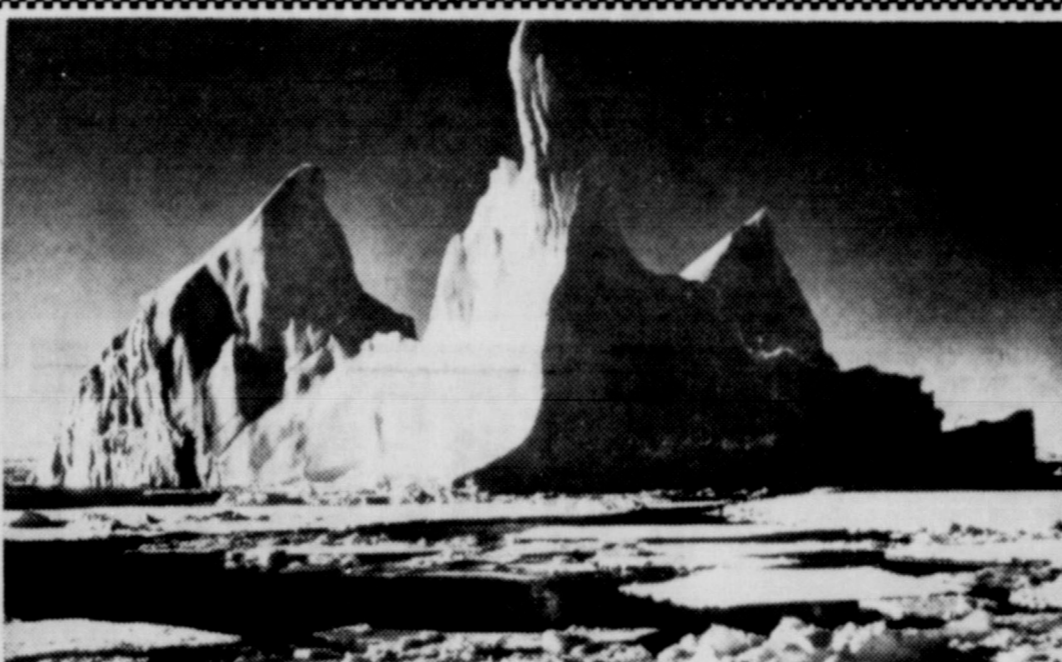

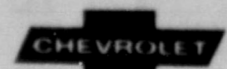
