Indications are that the programs will run into trouble in the legislature.

The committee's reorganization plan to help improve Texas schools and make them more efficient would cause 219 of the state's 254 counties to be one-district counties. The rule of thumb is that all 12grade systems should be either countywide in size or contain at least 2,600 students in average daily attendance.

The governor's committee recommended that the legislature adopt its proposed district maps for further study by special local countywide study committees charged with approving the new pattern or recommending something better to suit their own area needs. The state Board of Education would compile the final reorganization plan by June 1,

Under the report, the committee would slash the number of school districts in Texas from 1,218 to 354. All but 19 of 662 districts which now have less than 500 pupils would be eliminated.

There would be only 35 counties with two or more districts. All of these larger-populated counties would have fewer districts than they now have. One county would lose 16 school districts; several would lose ten or more.

The governor's committee report is quite elaborate, and in many ways hard to understand. Even many school officials have found the report hard to inter-

Postal receipts at Friona's \$8,830.48 over the figure of a record fourth quarter sales of \$21,076.63, and a third quarter total of \$18,154.95. Combined, the last six months of 1968 produced \$39,231.58 in postal receipts.

The former record year had been 1956, when postal receipts totaled \$56,960.92.

Other recent calendar year totals included: 1965 -- \$53,685 -.20; 1964-\$51,523.78; 1953 -\$43,821.31; 1962-\$37,162.71; and 1961-\$34,218.99.

Postmaster Wright Williams said that he was proud of the way the local postal receipts have increased.

The postmaster also said that the city mail delivery, which was begun during the last half of 1958, is working satisfactory, with two mounted routes, "We really needed this serv-

ice in Friona, and had needed it for some time. There are many people who cannot get out every day for their mail, and others who had rather not," Williams said.

The postmaster pointed out that the 1968 receipts put the local office close to the requirements for a first-class office, another plateau which has been the office's goal.

# Pause And Reflect

By Nelson Lewis

Although the menace of air pollution is currently receiving a great deal of publicity, it is not a new problem.

As early as 1740 the chimneys of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, were belching forth such great clouds of soot and smoke as to inspire a young printer named Benjamin Franklin to invent a new type stove.

His stove was designed to radiate heat from all sides and to burn the fuel more completely; thereby killing two birds with one stone - greater comfort and less air pollution.

The Franklin stove was only one of Ben's inventions, but on none of them did he apply for a patent.

True patriot that he was he considered his talent to be public property and it is doubtful that any man ever lived who served his homeland more dutifully than did Franklin.

After only two years of formal education, from age 8 to 10, young Benjamin began to fight the "war on poverty" -- he went

Two years were spent in helping his father in the family's soap and candle shop, then began his training as a printer. Working by day and studying by night he became so well educated that today we remember him not only as a master printer but also as a diplomat, inventor, scientist, philosopher, educator, and public servant.

Tomorrow, Jan. 17, marks the 263rd anniversary of his birth. Let us remember "Poor Richard" Kindly and hold fast to those principles he defended so well.

. . . . . . . . . . The following letter was sent to the Hon. Wayne L. Hays, Congressmen, and was recorded in the Congressional Record. We take the liberty of reprinting it from the "Defender" magazine and of prefacing it with a quote from Benjamin Frank-

"They that can give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety." The letter -

I am not a white racist, but a 40-year old Negro woman who knows what she is talking about, so pay attention.

What is wrong with you in Washington? You keep giving the poor more free handouts, when what they need is a job so they can learn to work and help themselves. Welfare alone has been their ruination. If you give a check or commodities, make them do something in return. If you give education or job training, make them earn it.

There are many things that need doing in this country. Roads need repair. Trees on our city streets need trimming. There is litter on the sidewalks, City buildings need painting. Hospitals and nursing homes can always use a little more help. Women on relief could take some foster children. When the children are in school, they could do other volunteer work.

Do you people really not know that any human who gets something for nothing loses all pride and initiative? You are completing the destruction of the Negro male by all these socalled progressive programs. Many of those collecting welfare are driving around in big cars and have expensive furs. My husband and I, who are taxpayers, can't afford these things. Why aren't people investigated before they are given charity? Don't tell me we cannot find work for them to do. If I cannot get what I want, I scrub floors, and have done so. My mother taught me nothing was beneath me if it was honest.

I am not the only one who feels this way. Many hard-working people, black and white, are getting fed up with this free, free, free policy. We are stick and tired of making sacrifices to support those who are too lazy to stand on their own two feet. We are not going to stand for it forever.

# BEHIND YOUR HEALTH

H. E. Kingman, Jr., D.V.M. Where do you stand in the pecking order? The term, "peck-ing order," which is applied fre-

quently to human situations, has its origin in classical behavioral studies of the social structure of chickens

But chickens have taught man about more than the "pecking order." In fact, experiments with chickens have contributed substantially to our knowledge of how diseases are caused and

how they may be cured. In 1966 Dr. Peyton Rous won a Nobel Prize for his identification of the Rous Sarcoma (a type of cancerous tumor) in the chicken. His experiments per-formed at Rockefeller University in 1911 provided the first laboratory proof of a virus-in-duced tumor. From this discovery flows much of the present research theory on the viral origin of cancer.







"Our concern is this," Holmes said. "The higher the grain support price for EC producers, the higher the levy on imported cereals and the greater the trade impediment. In trade circles, we often state that the Common Market buyers pay for five bushels of corn and receive only three. In reality, this is a true statement because the two bushels out of five that are not received constitute the varjable import levies or the payment made by EEC consumers to maintain internal grain prices at levels nearly double U.S. prices."

Holmes went on to say that much the same story can be told regarding grain pricing policy in other European countries. He added that high guarance prices also act as an incentive to increase internal grain production.

"The agricultural policy that is developing in the Common bility of increased trade and darket isolates the feed grain market from the world, and the extreme high prices are established without recognition of world prices." Holmes said, "It is inconceivable that such unilateral policies can continue without discrimina. tory actions on the part of other trading countries, particularly buyers of European industrial items."





MEASURING A FISH-If you are in doubt about the legal length of a fish and you don't have a ruler (just haul out a cigarette. A standard-size filter-tip cigarette, unsmoked of course, is three and three-eights inches long . . . maybe a little millimeter longer.

BBs FOR BREAM-Here's a trick to use to stir bass and bream into action when the lake surface is dead calm. Just flip some BBs into the water. TADPOLES Most of us step over or around the best live bait we'll

ever run across.

That's the word from the fishing experts at Mercury outboards, who have detected a noticeable gap in the knowl-edge of many fishermen in the subject of tadpoles.

These wriggly, immature frogs can stir up more than the mud in the bottom of a shallow puddle, if given a chance. For, where game fish are concerned, tadpoles rate as a delicacy. And if they happen to be attached to a hook . . . well, then the

fun begins. Should you need help in acquiring a supply of tadpoles, just ask any four-year-old find anyone who appreciates his efforts. Actually, most fisherman tromp through or cruise around the limpid, almost stagnant shallows that are alive

with this prime bait. If you're not quick enough with your hands, borrow the

wife's kitchen strainer. To use as bait, a tadpole is best hooked through both lips, then cast into a likely spot. If a light weight is necessary, attach it on the bottom with the bait on an 18-inch leader off to the side. Usually they should be allowed to swim around with complete freedor
