Ex-Husband Surrenders

Three Murdered In Bailey Co. Shooting

Just before midnight last Friday, while many fans were still talking high school football, Larry Kitchens had a different plan.

The 51-year-old Muleshoe area farmer drove to the residence of Vince Simnacher where a friendly party was in progress. According to reports, Kitchens' ex-wife Rhonda, 48, lived at the residence with Simnacher, 61.

Armed with a rifle, Larry Kitchens entered the residence where he shot and killed Rhonda Kitchens, Vince Simnacher, and one of the guests, Derwin Beauchamp, 43, a Sudan area farmer. There were other guests at the house but no one else was

injured. At press time, no exact motive was given for the shootings.

The residence is located three miles east of Highway 214 on FM 746, seven miles southeast of Muleshoe. Kitchens was arrested early Saturday morning at his home in Bailey County about 10 miles from the murder scene. He is being held without bond in the Lamb County jail, reportedly because the Bailey County jail is overcrowded.

Rhonda Kitchens was born Rhonda Treider in Friona on December 1, 1954. Her parents are Raymond Treider, Jr. and the late Charleta Treider of Muleshoe. She was a graduate of Lazbuddie High School and had lived in the Muleshoe area all her

life. She worked at the Honey Comb Beauty Shop in Muleshoe for 18 years.

Simnacher was a farmer and co-owner of Simnacher Trucking Company in Muleshoe.

Bailey County Sheriff Richard Wills said the investigation will be conducted by Texas Ranger Dusty McCord. Reached at his home over the weekend, District Attorney Johnny Actkinson told the Clovis News Journal, "I don't comment on my cases, and I'm a public official but I am really offended that you would call me at home."

October Is National Cooperative Month

Cooperatives like West Texas Rural Telephone are some 48,000 strong across the country. With the coming of October, they're celebrating National Cooperative Month.

Cooperatives are businesses, but they're unique and different in that respect. More than 120 million Americans are served each day by cooperative businesses that generate more than \$500 billion in annual economic activity, according to Sheldon Petersen, CEO and governor of the National Rural Utilities Finance Corporation.

"Cooperatives are different from other businesses because

of the principles that guide every cooperative, define their unique democratic structure and express their direct accountability to member/owners," said Petersen.

A cooperative business belongs to the people who use it. People organize cooperatives to provide themselves with the goods and services they need. Cooperatives operate for the benefit of their members.

All net earnings left after bills are paid and money is set aside for operations and improvements are returned to the membership. Margins of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative are paid to members as Patronage Capital Credits.

The history of cooperatives dates back as far as 1752 when Benjamin Franklin formed the first successful cooperative in the United States—the Philadelphia Contributionship for the Insurance of Houses from Loss by Fire—the oldest continuing cooperative in the U.S.

Roughly two centuries later, West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative was formed to provide telephone service to rural residents of Deaf Smith, Parmer, and Castro counties.

The members/owners of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative share equally in the control of their cooperative. Members come together each year at the annual membership meeting, review detailed reports, and elect directors from among themselves. The elected directors meet monthly to see to the ongoing operations of the cooperative.

It took 15 correct to get in the "tie-off" for the top prizes. But the easy part was, only three contestants scored 15 correct. Twenty-three players had 14 correct.

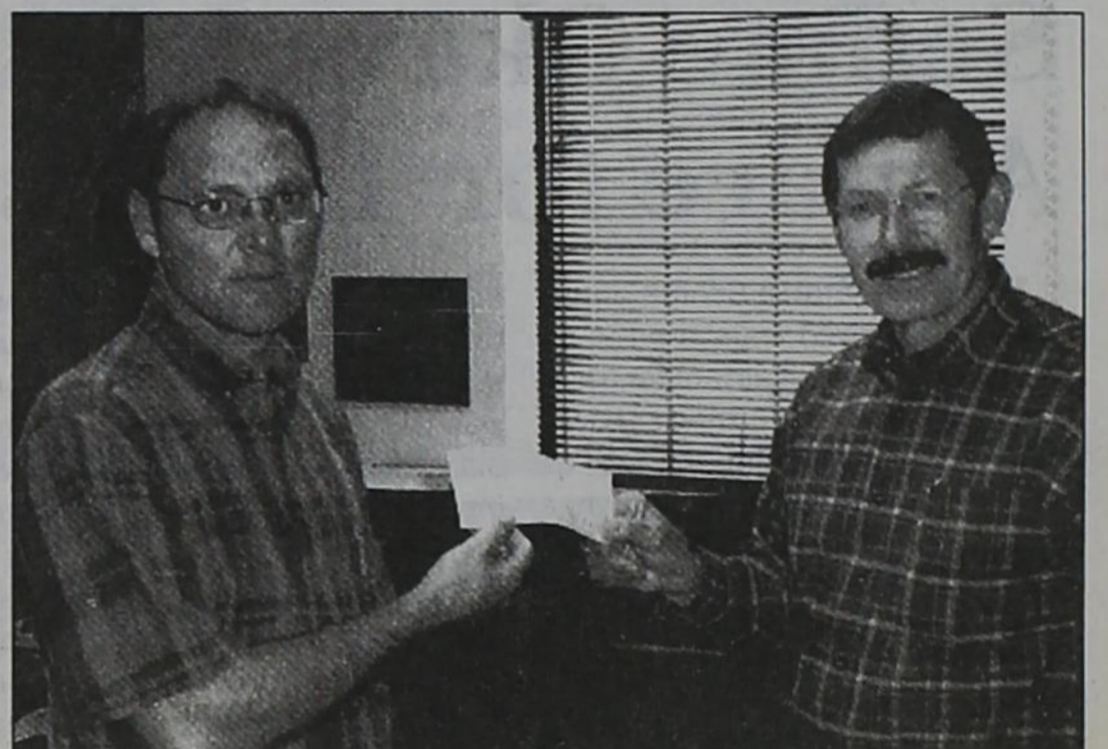

Mustangs Visit For Home District Game

Olton's Mustangs come to Friona Friday for the first home District 5-2A game. Gametime is 7:30 p.m.

Olton is trying to break a 10-year playoff drought, and they got off on the right foot last Friday when they downed Hale Center, 33-0.

"They have some great kids on their skills list. Olton's team isn't real big, but they are aggressive," said Coach Bob Ferguson about Friday's opponent.

Olton's fullback is Mike Villanueva, who led the Mustangs in rushing last season with 800 yards. "He reminds us a lot of Nathan Haile. He's a hard runner," Ferguson said.

Then there is David Phares, who placed fourth in the 100-meter dash in last spring's state meet, and tailback Eric Johnson, who started for the Mustangs a year ago.

Friona, meanwhile, will be attempting to break a four-game losing streak. That's already more losses than last year's Chieftains suffered.

"We need a win in the worst way," Ferguson emphasized.

The Chieftains are still having trouble getting all of their players healthy. Fabian Domingues injured his hand last week and will be playing with a cast on it, and Willy Castillo has been playing with an ankle sprain.

Third-year Olton coach Bryan Allcorn has nine offensive and six defensive starters back from 2002, when his team placed fourth in district at 3-2 and 5-4. Junior QB Dustin Synatschk is one of the returnees. He hit 40 per cent of his passes last season, gaining 587 yards which included five touchdowns.

Olton leads the all-time series, 15-12-1. Friona got past the Mustangs, 24-7 last season at Olton.

Senate Okays R&R Airfare for Troops

The United States Senate unanimously approved legislation to reimburse the cost of airfare for travel by members of the armed services on leave from fighting the war on terror. U.S. Senator John Cornyn, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, applauded the

Senate action, calling it "an important step for the welfare of our troops." The bipartisan legislation was passed as an amendment to S.1689, the *Emergency Supplemental Appropriations for Iraq and Afghanistan Reconstruction* bill.

"While our troops are provided with transportation back to major airports in the U.S. when home on leave, they are often stuck footing the bill from those cities to their own cities and towns," Cornyn said. "This bill is one small way of thanking the brave men and women who sacrifice every day to keep America safe and free."

Troops who have served in Iraq for more than one year are entitled to 15 days of paid leave in the U.S. However, current law only provides for the Pentagon to transport these personnel to Dallas-Fort Worth, Baltimore, Atlanta or Los Angeles. Military personnel must pay all transportation costs to and from those cities to their final destinations.

"While one in ten members of our armed services calls Texas home, they don't all live near a major airport," Cornyn said. "This legislation will make it easier for all of our troops to get home."

Cornyn joined eight Senate colleagues in early July for an Armed Services Committee trip to Iraq and the surrounding region. The delegation met with U.S. and Iraqi officials involved in the reconstruction effort. While there, Cornyn visited with Texas troops and received briefings from coalition forces and humanitarian organizations.

Long Runs and Miscues: Bovina Sails to 26-8 Win

The Bovina Mustangs are 1-0 in District 4-1A after a decisive 26-8 victory over the Hart Longhorns Friday. Parmer County rival Farwell lost to Nazareth for their first defeat of the year. Farwell starts 0-1 in district play.

It was a game of long plays for the Mustangs and a few errors and turnovers by the Longhorns that the Mustangs were able to capitalize on.

District rushing leader Jonathan Chisom broke the game open in the first quarter with a 67-yard touchdown run. Hugo Aguillon's kick was good. Bovina 7-0. In the second quarter Jonathan's cousin Raymond Chisom scored on a 2-yard run. Later in the same quarter Claude Tamez gathered in a Jeff Casas pass for a 65-yard TD play. Both extra point attempts failed. Bovina 19-0 at the half.

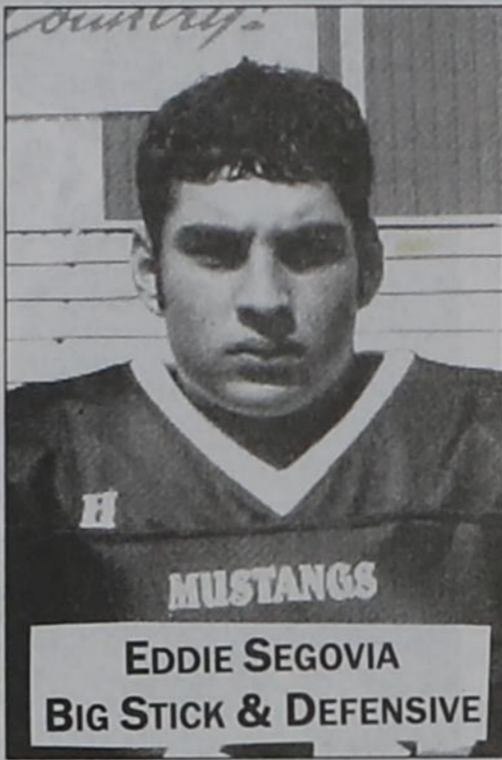
In the third quarter Jonathan Chisom, from the defensive side, scooped up a Longhorn fumble and raced 45 yards for a touchdown. Aguillon added the

point. Mustangs lead 26-0. Hart finally got on the scoreboard in the third quarter when the defense forced the Mustangs into an intentional grounding 2-point safety. Bovina 26-2. A 10-yard touchdown by the Longhorns, and a failed point after, gave Bovina the 26-8 margin. Neither team scored in the fourth quarter.

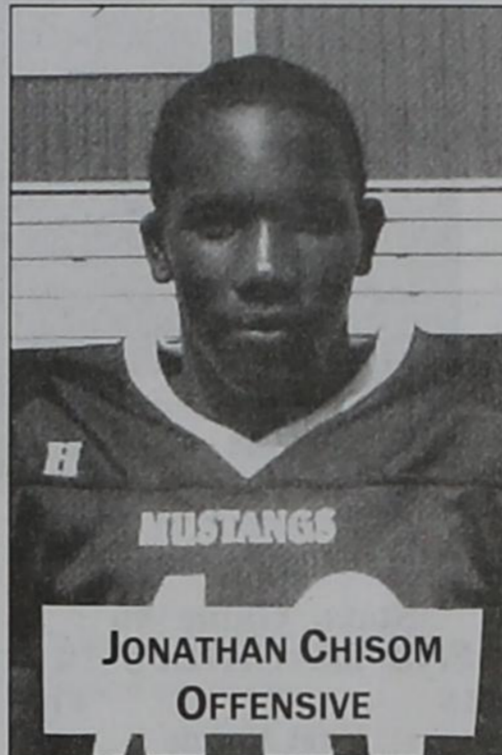
Jonathan Chisom had 17 carries for 171 yards and Casas completed 5 of 8 passes for 103 yards. The Mustangs put together 340 yards of total offense and held Hart to 185. Bovina's defense also picked off three Hart passes and picked up three Hart fumbles.

Bovina's season record is now 5-2, with district games remaining against Springlake-Earth this week, Nazareth on October 24, open date October 31 and the final and perhaps most important game of the season, Farwell at home on November 7 in a game that could decide a playoff berth.

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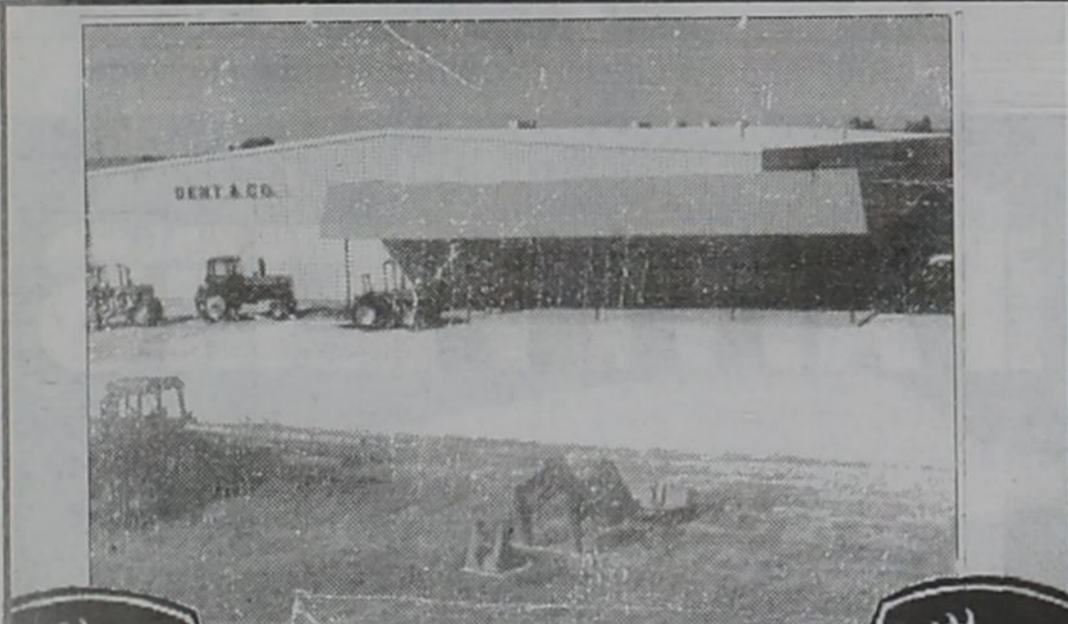

Friona ISD Gets Top Achievement Rating

Friona Independent School District officials announced that the district received a rating of "Superior Achievement" under Texas' new Schools FIRST financial accountability rating system. The "Superior Achievement" rating is the state's highest, demonstrating the quality of Friona ISD's financial management and reporting system.

This is the first year of Schools FIRST (Financial Accountability Rating System of Texas), a financial accountability system for Texas school districts developed by the Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 76th Texas Legislature in 1999. The primary goal of Schools FIRST is to achieve performance in the management of school districts' financial resources, a goal made more significant due to the complexity of accounting associated with Texas school finance system.

"We are very pleased with Friona ISD's Schools FIRST rating," said Friona Superintendent, Jim Parker, "as it shows that our district is making the most of our taxpayer's dollars. This rating shows that Friona schools are accountable not only for student learning, but also for achieving these results cost-effectively and efficiently."

The Schools FIRST accountability rating system assigns one of four financial accountability ratings to Texas school districts, with the highest being "Superior Achievement", followed by "Above-Standard Achievement", "Standard

Achievement" and "Substandard Achievement". Districts with serious data quality problems may receive the additional rating of "Suspended-Data Quality". Districts that receive the "Substandard Achievement" or "Suspended-Data Quality" ratings under Schools FIRST must file a corrective action plan with the Texas Education Agency.

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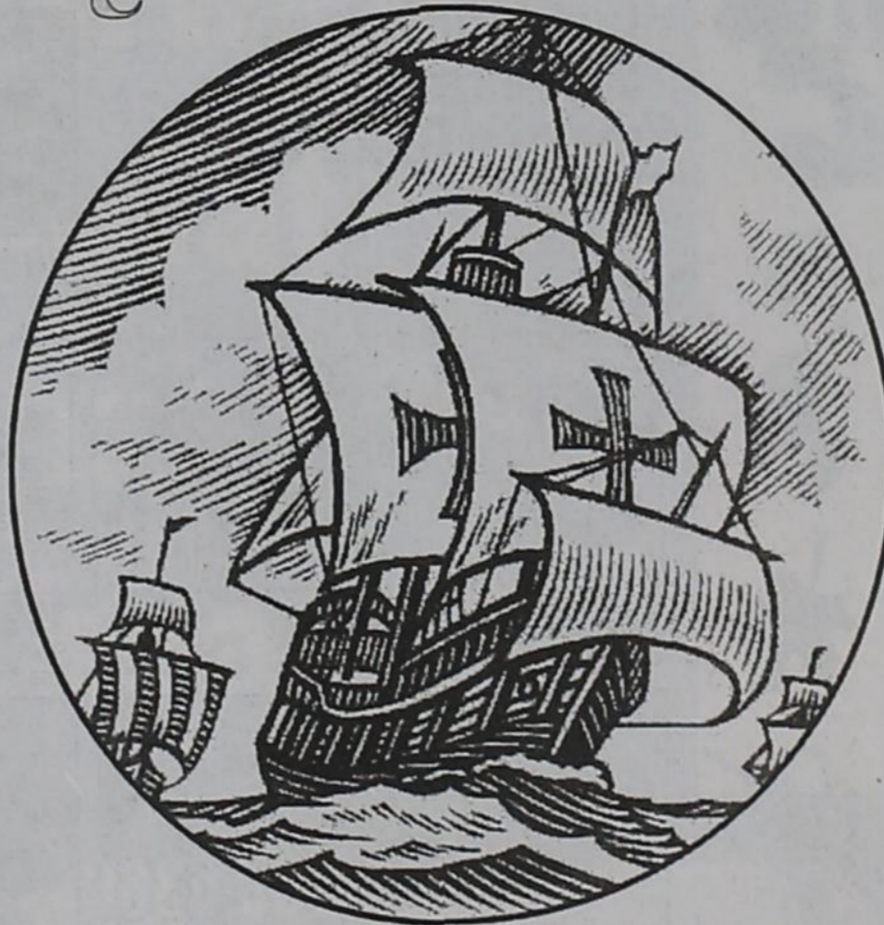

A Free Can of Air

It was a \$2 can of air. The sign said after a \$2 rebate, the can of air would be free. I almost fell for it.

Not that I needed the can of air. You know the kind you buy that has the straw you stick on the nozzle and blow dust off your computer or other electronic gadgets.

One time Carol Ellis took a can of air and stuck the straw into the slot of her computer hard drive to blow out the dust. The little straw came off and disappeared into the computer innards. She took it to a computer store in Amarillo to retrieve it.

I have to admit it was pretty tempting to take Office Max up on the free air rebate offer. Then I wondered: why couldn't they just give me the can of free air without making me pay for it first, then sending off to get my \$2 back.

There must be a reason for rebates but I can't figure out what it is. Computer makers are notorious these days for hawking their latest, greatest, models. You have seen the ads: A 2500FX Inspiron with free flat panel display and a giga-universe full of ram and bytes for only \$499 (after rebates).

On the \$2 can of air, there was only room for one rebate. Computers and other humongous electronic plasma TV/DVD gadgets come with instant rebates, manufacturers rebates, and mail-in rebates. For example, to get a \$1,099 computer for

\$499, you have to pay \$799 to \$899 up front (after the instant rebate), then jump through a bunch of paperwork hoops to get your other "rebates."

You have to be careful that you even qualify for the rebate. In some cases you have to be upgrading a system to get the money. You might have to send in the boxtop off of Software 2.0 to qualify for the 3.0 rebate. If you loaded a friend's Software 2.0 to begin with.....well, you see the problem.

I suspect many humans get halfway through the rebate paperwork and throw up their hands in frustration. I'm sure that is why they make it agonizing and complicated, so you will give up and they won't have to pay it. It is a game of percentages. We offered it, you didn't send for it, our good luck.

I bought Photoshop Elements 2.0 at Best Buy in September. The smiley, friendly cashier printed a register receipt almost 3-feet long. It was my rebate receipt and rebate form, he said. I didn't even realize I was eligible for a rebate.

To get the rebate, here is what I had to send: the original UPC label from the flap of the box, the name and serial number of my licensed version of Adobe Photoshop Elements 1.0, or the name and serial number of the licensed version of one of the digital imaging software products listed on the coupon (what coupon?) or a photocopy of the CD or manual cover stating the

name of the product, the completed original rebate request coupon (what coupon?), and a copy of the purchase receipt.

All that stuff in an envelope and mailed to California. "You should receive your rebate within 8 weeks."

Unless, as it says in the terms and conditions, lost, late, misdirected, torn, mutilated, incomplete, invalid, damaged, postage due, or illegible requests will not be accepted. Any questions, or to check on the status of your rebate request, call the Best Buy Rebate Center at our toll-free number.

I forgot to mention the amount of the rebate was \$30. You guessed it. I didn't send it in. Not that I couldn't use 30 bucks but rebate stress got the best of me. Childhood memories came flooding back. I remember stuffing a cereal boxtop and an order form into an envelope once to get a free Dick Tracy secret code ring. I don't think I ever received that ring and was pretty sure I would somehow screw up the software rebate request.

Rebates are a trick and a gimmick to get your attention and seduce you into buying something you don't need

because it is such a good deal. I'm too smart to fall for it.

But I have to admit, I'm still thinking about taking them up on that free can of air.

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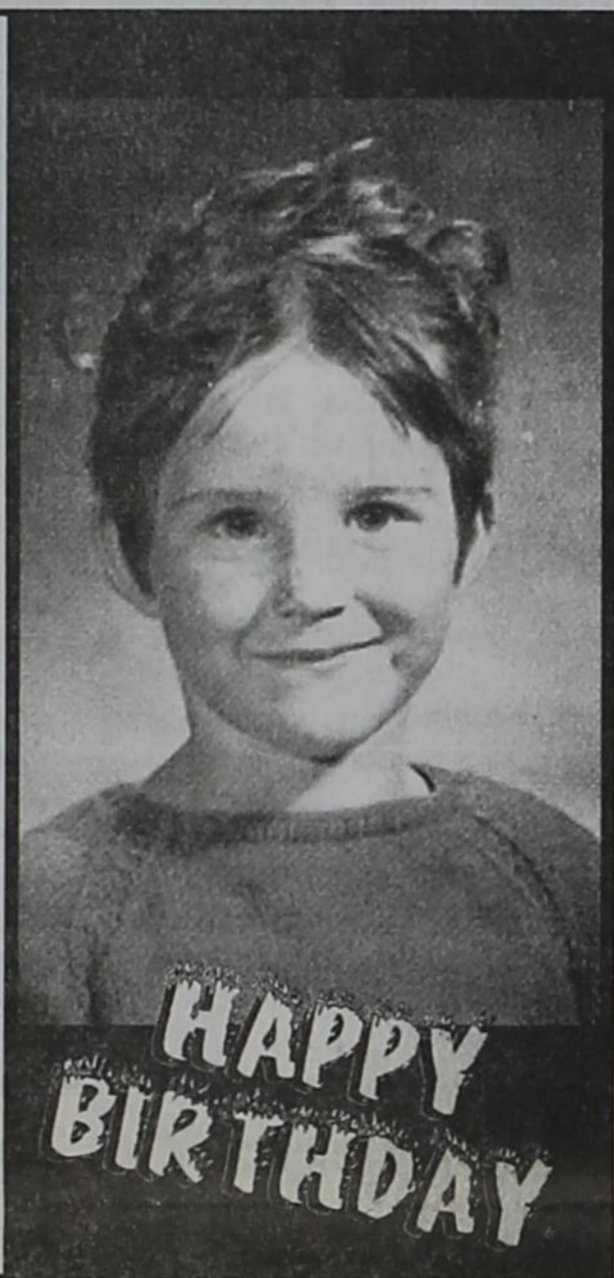

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Neugebauer Reports From Washington

I can't emphasize enough the importance of a good education. As only the second generation Neugebauer to attend college and with my wife Dana being a former teacher I find this hits especially close to home.

Do you know how you will pay for your child's college education? If you don't, you're not alone. Each year, thousands of high school students and their families face that same issue. While it may seem the school of your choice is not affordable, the good news is that it can be. If you start out early and have the right information, financial aid resources are available to students and their families.

I will soon join experts from the Sallie Mae Fund for a "Paying for College" workshop in Lubbock. I am excited because this program will provide a full discussion on college accessibility and affordability. It is important that we make it easier for West Texas students to continue their education. There will be an explanation of the admissions process, grants and scholarships, government-sponsored loans, financial aid forms and terms, and how to find free admissions and financial aid information.

You may be asking what I am doing in Washington to make it easier for students of the 19th District to go to college. One answer is that I am cosponsoring the Expanding Opportunities in Higher Education Act (H.R.3039). This is the latest in a series of efforts to provide dramatic new support for Minority Serving Institutions and other programs that help needy and non-traditional students realize the dream of a college education. This bill seeks to bolster America's Minority Serving Institutions and break down barriers that currently prevent needy and non-traditional students from pursuing the dream of a high education.

While there will be clear benefits for Hispanic Serving Institutions, it is important to note that these funds are not limited to Hispanic students. Colleges and universities qualify for funds under Title V by requiring that at least 25% of full-time student enrollment is Hispanic. Therefore an increase in funding would be beneficial to schools in West Texas as a whole.

The Expanding Opportunities in High Education Act will remove artificial barriers to access and promote choice with higher education. The revisions included in this bill are exemplary. I believe that they show a new found recognition for the vital role proprietary education plays in meeting the education and training needs of our nation and assisting students in the pursuit of their postsecondary educational goals.

Another important aspect of education, vocational education, has continually provided a bright future for people in this constantly changing world that is demanding increasingly complex

skills from its workforce. I will always support a wide range of policies, programs, and activities to help young people and adults obtain the knowledge and skills they need to prepare for postsecondary education, successful careers and productive lives.

I am also cosponsoring two vocational education bills: H.R.2763, the Public-Private Partnership Act, which would establish a tax credit for companies that donate equipment and other resources for vocational training; and, H.R.2762, the Excellence in Vocational Educational Act, creates a new competitive grant program where schools can seek out federal funding to match private sector contributions for vocational education projects.

I voted for, and the House of Representatives passed, the Labor, HHS, and Education Appropriation Bill on July 10, 2003. This measure substantially increased education funding levels for FY04 by \$2.3 billion. Both chambers of Congress have been working through the process of reconciling the differences between the House and the Senate-passed versions of the Labor, HHS, and Education Appropriation bill.

I am fully committed to the education of our children and will continue to support legislative measures that I believe gives power back to the schools and parents, strengthens accountability and improves failing schools.

SAFETY GLASSES MADE FOR WEAR AND TEAR

The United States government agency called the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) makes and enforces workplace safety rules and regulations. OSHA requires safety glasses in environments such as factories where eyes are at risk.



Safety glasses consist of a unique frame and lenses. A safety frame is sturdier than most of the typical ones that are worn for daily use. It is very strong and not easily bent or broken. Depending on the specific job, the glasses will or will not have side shields. Safety lenses are usually made of the material called polycarbonate—plastic that is very unlikely to break, even when shot with a bullet!

OSHA safety glass regulations prove to be very helpful in decreasing workplace eye injuries. In fact, individuals who do a lot of shop work at home should also consider wearing this eyewear. It is just as possible to injure one's eyes in a household accident as it is at work.

In each course, the program is the same. The students set up their own state and city governments by running for

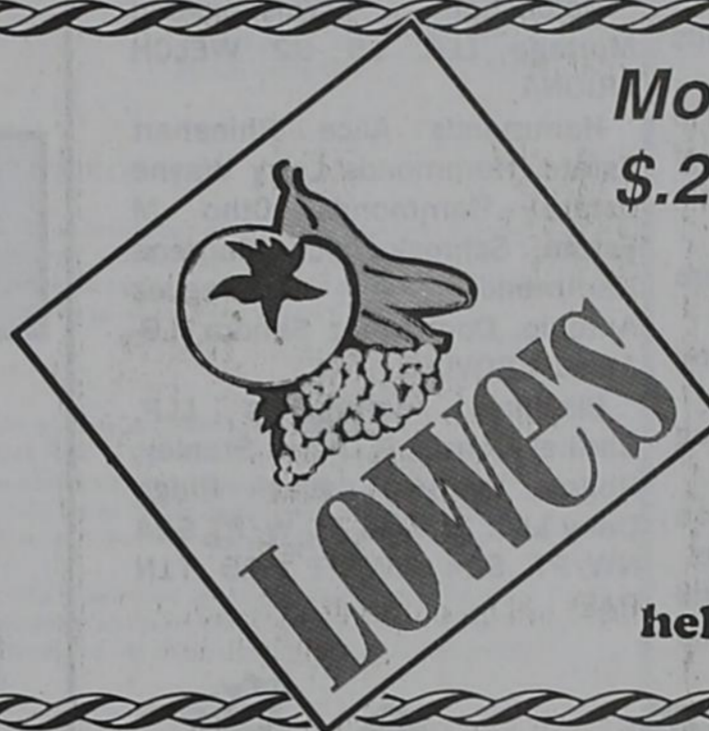
offices and electing all state and city officials. Then for one week, they function under the same rules as the Texas and city governments and learn how they operate.

BITS AND PIECES

All of us at the Police Department would like to take our hats off to all the citizens of Friona that have been complying with the traffic laws. Due to your Police Department being temporarily understaffed, the compliance of minor traffic laws by the citizens of Friona is essential in releasing the officers to expend their efforts on other, more serious crimes.

There is an undercurrent of criminal activity in all cities, and although Friona is not inundated with the same criminal element as larger cities, it is still here.

Some may ask, "What criminal element do we have?" and one answer to that is drugs. In larger cities, 80% of the crimes committed are related to drug activity.

I think Friona's percentage is a little lower than that, but still more than half of the crime locally is related to drug activity.

Illegal drug crime spreads insidiously throughout the community and unless it effects a person directly, most people are unaware it even exists.

While Friona doesn't have the same population density as cities like Lubbock or Amarillo, and enjoys a much lower crime rate, whatever drugs are available in either of those cities are available in Friona.

Do we have drug dealers in Friona? Absolutely!! Do we have drug addicts in Friona? Again, the answer is 'absolutely!'

A \$42,000 investment in cocaine in Columbia will turn into \$2.8 million dollars when retailed here in the U.S. With that kind of return on a person's money, there is no shortage of people willing to finance the illegal drug trade.

Part of the solution of our high crime rate in the United States is to aggressively go after the drug dealers on a local level.

Imagine if you will, a country with an 80% drop in crime! Sounds great, doesn't it?

Realistically we are not going to eliminate all illegal drug activity in our city or our country, but even if we could stop a small percentage of crime it would mean there are less victims, less crime to prosecute, and it would require less money to operate the city and county.

There is some talk going around the liberal circles that if drugs were legal, people wouldn't have to commit crimes to obtain them.

Who is going to pay for and distribute the drugs to the addicts? You guessed it, the government!

I do not want my taxes increased just to support someone's drug habit, and I don't think you do either.

Constant and active drug enforcement will have a positive effect on reducing the crime rate and the number of victims as a result of crime.

While my tenure as your Chief of Police is almost finished, I will still be available to give drug awareness talks through the Friona Police Department.
