Interstate highway tax expensive to countians

For Cochran County's car owners, how expensive a proposition has the nation's controversial 42,500-mile Interstate Highway System become?

How much are they paying to the Federal government, through gasoline taxes and other automobile taxes, toward the cost of construction?

On the basis of the latest figures, their contribution in the past year came to approximately \$65,000.

This is exclusive of the auto-use taxes collected from them by the local governments.

The average Cochran County driver, traveling 10,000 miles a year and getting 15 miles to the gallon, is paying some \$100 annually into the Highway Trust Fund. Those who cover 15,000 miles pay \$150. Most of it comes from the four-cents-per-gallon tax on gas.

The money collected in the fund finances 90 percent of the road construction costs. The other 10 percent comes from the states.

A battle is now brewing in Congress and elsewhere over the use of this trust fund, which brings in over \$5 billion a year and has a current surplus of about \$3.6 billion.

Should this money continue to be used solely for road building, as it has been since 1956, or should part of it be used for what critics believe to be more immediate needs, such as mass transit?

The powerful group of truckers, automobile manufacturers, bus lines and others, the so-called, "highway lobby," has steadily opposed attempts to divert any of the revenue for airport construction, rail transportation and the like.

However, many groups across the country are now attacking this stand. They contend that highway construction is being over-emphasized at a time when other needs are being neglected.

The Interstate Highway System, begun 16 years ago at an estimated cost of \$41 billion, will cost approximately \$75 billion before it is finished, in 1978.

Because it has six years more to go, Cochran County car owners will be paying an additional \$391,000 into the trust fund before they are through, based upon the 2,170 cars in operation locally.

Arrests, violence wrack city

The Morton drug abuse problem reared its ugly head again this weekend and the resultant violence has continued to reverberate throughout the first three days of this week.

And the end may not yet be in sight.

The turmoil that is wracking the normally quiet Morton community was set off with the arrest of seven youths, all juveniles, for possession and one adult for the sale of Marijuana. The arrests were made in three separate instances and in three separate cities.

It began with the arrest Saturday by Sheriff Hazel Hancock and City Patrolman Ray Cooper of two juveniles in Morton for possession. This was soon followed by the Sunday night arrest by DPS patrolmen Don Kuykendall and R. C. Cheek in Levelland of five Morton youths, also all juveniles, for possession. The climax of the roundup came Monday in Lubbock when state narcotics agents arrested Johnny Collins of Morton for sale of a dangerous drug, Marijuana, to an undercover agent.

The sale by Collins allegedly took place in December, 1971, with the arrest being delayed so as not to expose the undercover agent while he was investigating other pushers in the Lubbock area, county attorney James Walker explained in an interview with the Tribune.

The violence that erupted following the arrests is believed to be between two factions, one of which is thought to be taking revenge on the other for informing to law enforcement agencies on the drug users and pushers. It is believed to have begun with minor skirmishes Monday night and blossomed into full scale gang fights on Tuesday afternoon.

The arrest and fining of at least five youths, all but two of whom are juveniles, resulted from two of these clashes during the afternoon on Tuesday. One clash took place on Morton schools property and the other in the parking lot at Morton Drug Store, according to information released by Hancock and Morton Police Chief Arthur Mason.

Wendell Bickett and David Smith, both 19, were the adults involved in the fight which took place on the school grounds, according to police reports. Both were charged with simple assault by Mason and were further charged for loitering on the school grounds by school officials.

OBJECTIVE IN CLEANUP CAMPAIGN . . .

NEVER HAS AN OBJECTIVE, either in peace or war, been more clearly defined than those, like the one pictured above, which will come under the line of fire during the big Morton Cleanup Week which will kick off here next Monday. A very comprehensive program to clean up the alleys, yards and streets and to rid the city of unsightly vacant lots with their junk cars, junk machinery, junk furniture,

etc. has been planned for the week of March 27 — April 1. The entire resources of the city's streets and utilities departments will be available to remove any type of debris too large for its owner to handle. The city will receive calls for assistance at 266-8850 between now and April 1 to aid in moving debris.

Mayor issues cleanup challenge

Can Morton respond to a direct challenge to its pride?

That is the question that the planners of the big cleanup campaign that will begin here next Monday morning are seeking and answer to.

The Mayor has made a direct challenge to the residents of our city to clean it up and has ordered all the facilities, equipment and personnel at his command to aid them in doing so. How well they respond to the challenge will determine the amount of pride the people take in their community and will indicate, once and for all, whether or not they desire a better, more healthful and nicer appearing place in which to live, campaign planners emphasized.

Plans for this cleanup drive are far more comprehensive and far reaching than any we have had in the past, Jerry Scheaffer, cleanup drive chairman states. If we can't do it with the plans, equipment and personnel we will have on hand, it just can't be done, he said.

The campaign will kick off with a huge parade around the courthouse square and I hope to see every man, woman and child take part in it, Scheaffer stated. "It will be a fun parade with lots of good stuff like street sweepers, garbage trucks, garbage cans, fire trucks, maintainers and, we hope, hundreds and hundreds of men, women and children carrying their rakes, hoes, shovels, brooms, mops, pails or anything else one can think of that is useful in a cleanup campaign. This will give everyone a chance to put on their old clothes and relax along with the other ragamuffins," he said.

The parade was originally planned for 10:30 a.m. but had to be moved up to 3:30 p.m. when it was learned that the schools will hold classes until 2:30 p.m. to make up for the day lost when schools let out for the state basketball tournament. "We must wait for the school kids to take part in the parade," Scheaffer said, "who ever heard of a good parade without kids?"

The organizational plan for the campaign calls for a central command post being established on the courthouse square with two-way radio communications which will keep it in contact with a number of radio equipped vehicles which will patrol the streets and alleys throughout town. These vehicles will spot places that need cleaning or debris that should be hauled away and will relay the information back to the command post which will direct city equipment and personnel to pick it up.

Teams of volunteers will be assigned areas to cover, and when they spot some-

thing that is unsightly in a yard or a lot, they will knock on doors until they find someone who can give them permission to remove it.

Any and all local organizations are being invited to aid in the cleanup as a group and upon request, will be assigned work areas and tasks that need to be accomplished.

"You don't have to wait for the official cleanup week to begin to start getting rid of your eyesores, you can begin today to call the city and tell them what you have that needs removing and they will come and haul it away for you. If it's junk cars, junk furniture or anything else that

is more than you can handle, call the city at 266-8850 and tell them where to come and get it," Scheaffer stated.

That will be the number to call all during the cleanup week for assistance in cleaning up anything that will not fit in your trash can. This includes those tree limbs you may be having trouble with.

"With Easter coming at the end of the cleanup week, what more incentive does one need to join with his neighbor for the beautification and betterment of his home town. It's your home and mine, let's see if we can't celebrate Easter in a much nicer appearing town than we have in the past," Mayor Donnie Simpson urges.

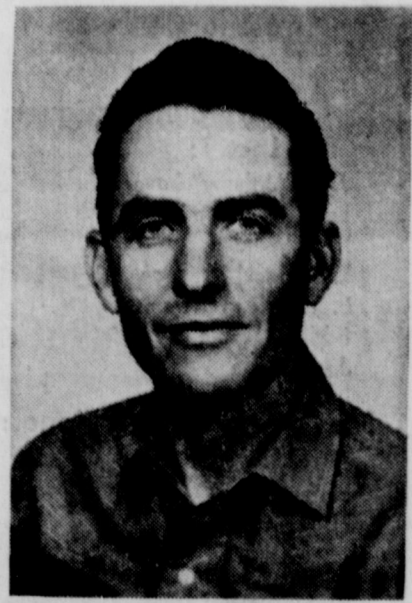
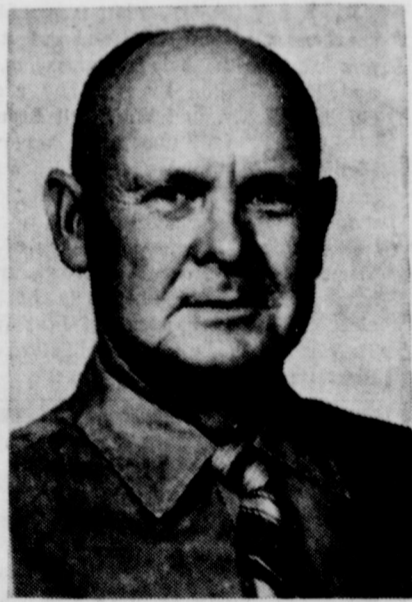

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Coloring hints, recipes given: for it's Easter egg time again

Mom, grab your Easter basket and head for the supermarket!

It's time to color Easter eggs again. "Because white shells dye in clear, bright colors," said Houston consumer marketing specialist Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, "white-shelled eggs are generally in heavy demand just before Easter."

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialist said that the demand sometimes pushes the price of eggs up, while some markets may feature specials in eggs for coloring.

Brown shells don't take color in quite the same way as white shells, but they do give unusual color effects.

"They're often a good buy for special decorating," Mrs. Clyatt said. "They're good for decals, transfers or fine paint brushes."

Mothers often ask whether children should eat dyed cooked eggs. A statement that the color is harmless may be found on the package containing Easter egg dyes.

"These usually are food dyes," Mrs. Clyatt said. "Though the dyed eggs are hard-cooked, it's best to eat them within a day or two."

The specialist said to remember to cook eggs for coloring just as any hard-cooked egg. Put the eggs in cold or lukewarm

water and bring them to a boil. Remove from heat and let them stand for 20 minutes. Cool eggs promptly. (This makes the shells come off easily and prevents dark rings on the yolks.)

Once the kids have had their fun hiding and finding Easter eggs, you might want to use some of the eggs in these recipes. "Again, remember to use them within a day or two from the time they were boiled," Mrs. Clyatt said.

DIFFERENT EGG SALAD:

1 No. 2 can baked beans, 4 coarsely chopped, hard-cooked eggs, 1/2 cup minced onions, 1 Tablespoon chili sauce, 1 Tablespoon mayonnaise, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1/4 teaspoon salt, Dash of pepper, 3 slices crumbled crisp bacon, 3 Tablespoons snipped parsley.

Drain beans; add eggs and onion. Toss

in combined chili sauce, mayonnaise, mustard, salt and pepper. Serve in salad bowl; sprinkle with bacon and parsley. Makes four servings.

SCALLOPED EGG AND SHRIMP: 1 cup milk, 2 Tablespoons flour, 2 Tablespoons butter, 4 eggs, hard-cooked, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup shrimp, 1/2 bread crumbs.

Make white sauce of butter, flour, and milk. In buttered casserole, alternate thin layers of white sauce, shrimp, sliced eggs and crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) ready to serve, garnish top with bits of eggs.

NEW POVERTY BASE

The Manpower Administration has increased the annual income level for defining poverty. The 1972 poverty guidelines set in the continental U.S. range from \$2,000 for a nonfarm family of one to \$5,900 for a nonfarm family of seven. This represents an average increase of about \$215 per family over previous guidelines.

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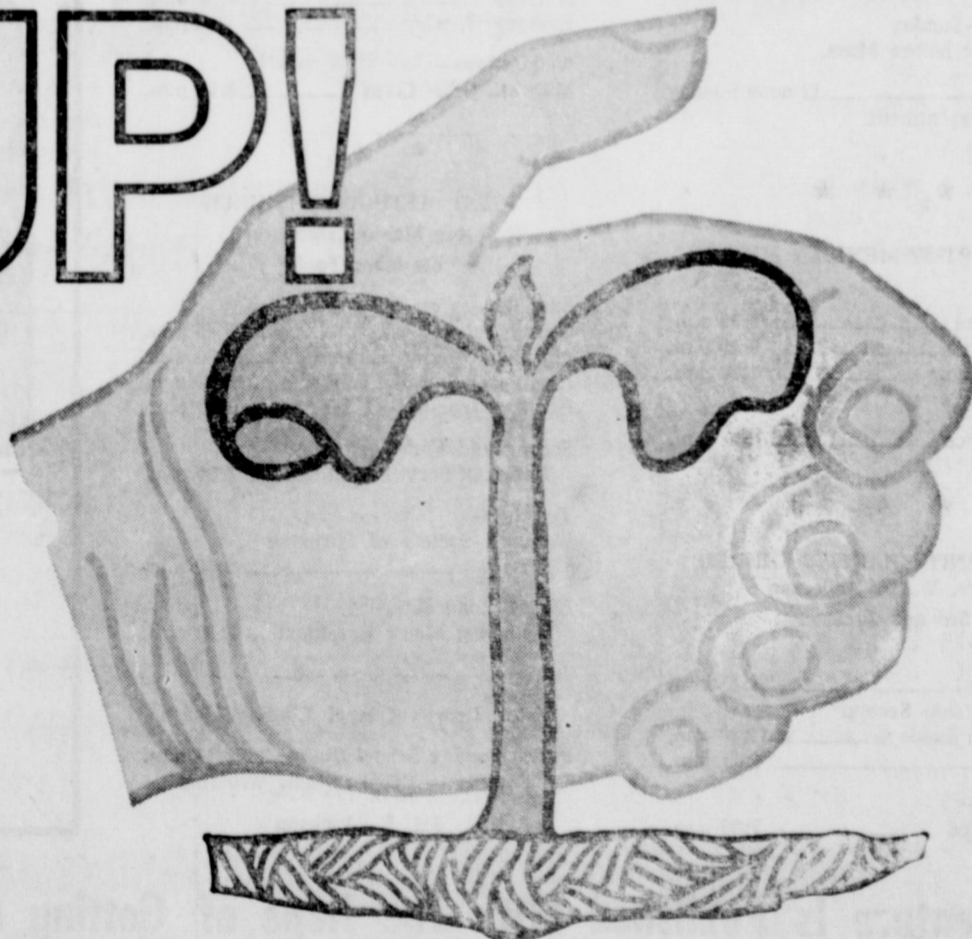

The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of approximately 1,000 square miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation

of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Thomas J. Henderson, Atmospheric Incorporated.

5. The program may be operational at various times throughout the period from 15 April 1972 through 30 October 1972.

6. Any person who feels they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a formal complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 12386, Austin, Texas 78711.

PAY OF JURORS**

Each juror in a district or county court or county court at law is entitled to receive not less than \$4.00 nor more than \$10.00 for each day or fraction of a day that he attends court as a juror.
