Fund Started To Aid Family

A special fund was established in Friona this week to assist the family of an eight-year-old girl who is being treated for acute leukemia. The victim is Sandra Cruz, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jaime Cruz of Friona.

The child has been undergoing treatments in San Antonio, and at the present time is being treated at a hospital in Kansas City, Missouri.

Upon finishing the current treatments, it will be necessary to take the child on weekly trips to a hospital in Lubbock, and once a month to San Antonio for other medication.

Sandra is a second grade student at Friona Elementary School. The family has lived in Friona for seven years. They have a son who is six, and a younger daughter who is three.

It was pointed out that although the father has some group medical insurance at EXCEL, where he is employed, the family has incurred considerable expenses as the mother has had to travel with the child, and find a place to stay while the youngster is hospitalized. They are needing funds in order to be able to return to Friona from Kansas City.

A trust fund is being established in the name of Sandra Cruz at Friona State Bank. Those wishing to donate may do so at the bank, or they may give their donation to Jo Blackwell at Prairie Acres Nursing Home.

The state senator charges, as we have done in the past, that the caucus system of choosing the state's presidential electors is "a political dinosaur, whose extinction is long overdue."

Edwards argues that the caucus system discriminates against the elderly and handicapped, and

YEAR'S NEWS REVIEW

Crops, New Businesses Highlight Year

An outbreak of 2,4-D damage to the area's cotton crop highlighted the local news as seen in Friona Star headlines. Also a major item was a number of new businesses, and business expansions locally.

JANUARY

The year started off with a flurry of political activity on the local level. Candidates announcing for re-election included tax assessor-collector Hugh Moseley, sheriff Bill Morgan and commissioner Ernest Anthony.

Stephen Hillock of the Oklahoma Lane community announced as a challenger in the sheriff's race, and T.A. Kelley announced as a candidate in the local commissioner's precinct.

Bob Harmon of Portales, N.M., won the county's tailfeather contest, with a winning entry measuring 26-3/8th inches. Runnerup was Terry Jesko of Lazbuddie, whose entry was the winner at Friona.

A flu outbreak toward the end of January caused some concern locally. Friona schools showed an absenteeism of ten per cent on January 26.

Winners in the Friona Jr. Livestock Show were Dana Berend, steer and heifer; Devera Rhodes, lamb, and Beth Johnson, barrow.

FEBRUARY

Susan Redwine captured the grand champion barrow award; Dana Berend exhibited the grand champion steer, and Wendy Tatum entered the reserve champion steer in the 37th annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show February 1-3.

The Friona Squaws closed their season with some close games, but lost out in the district chase. The Squaws had a season record of 12-16. The Chieftains closed with a 9-19 season record. Charlie Veazey tied a single-game scoring record with 36 points against Littlefield, and his 560 points for the season were the third most ever by a Chieftain cager.

MARCH

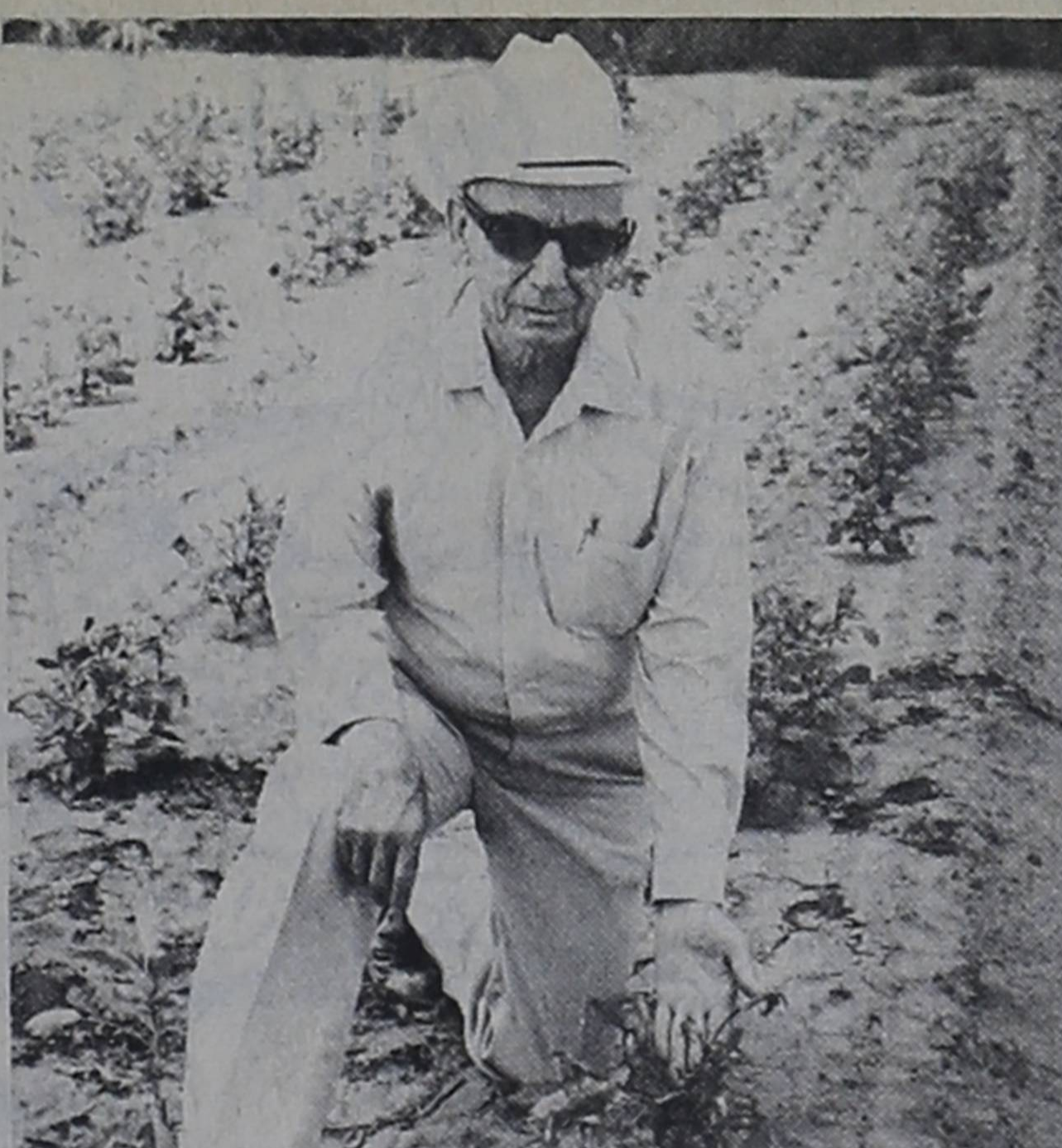
D.L.'s Thriftway held grand opening in its new location on West Highway 60 during the first week in March.

Winners of the Chamber of Commerce's annual awards at the banquet March 13 were Geary Brogden and Kathryn Goddard, man and woman; Helen Fallwell, employee; Mary Bavousett, teacher; Shayne Woodard and Diane Johnston, young people.

Ground was broken on March 15 for Millard Warehouse's cold-storage facility. The warehouse will house 70,000 square feet and will be built at a cost of \$3,000,000.

The Friona school board announced that the school will have a seven-period day in 1984-85, an additional period, and will extend its school day by 25 minutes.

Local residents participated in a "Sesquicentennial Kickoff" day on March 17, posing for pictures with a variety of old-time things, such as stagecoaches and horse-drawn carriages belonging to Bruce Parr.

APRIL

Friona High School students qualified for regional in seven UIL events. Qualifying were Roy Flores, science; Diane Johnston, newswriting; Bill Caudle, debate and editorial writing; Brent Hinkle, debate and calculator applications; Sheila Gresham, poetry interpretation and David Small, persuasive speaking.

The Chieftain band won a First Division rating in both concert and sight-reading competition.

Ray and Nancy Jackson purchased the Parmer House Restaurant from longtime owner Carl McInroe the first week in April.

Four Friona Chieftains qualified for the regional track meet: Daniel Gowens set a school record with a 6-4 high jump; John Aguirre won the 400-meter dash and Eloy Caballero won the 300-meter intermediate hurdles. Charlie Morgan placed second in the long jump and also qualified. The FHS relay teams had some rotten luck, each just missing regional.

Bi-Wize Drug, which moved from the 600 to the 900 block of Main Street earlier in the year, held its grand opening sale beginning April 28.

MAY

Prime International, the nation's largest liver processor and distributor, will lease 25,000 square feet of space in the new Millard Warehouse, it was announced on May 2.

Honor students for the 1984 graduating class were: Kristi Britting, valedictorian; Jo Schueler, salutatorian and Kevin Brogden, historian.

Hometown Hardware held its grand opening at 1002 Main Street the week of May 21. Leroy and Terri Sue Cox are owners.

Jana Renner and Bena Bronniman are the top-ranking students in the eighth grade graduating class for 1984.

Mr. and Mrs. Itsuo Okamoto flew here from Osaka, Japan, to attend graduation exercises. Their daughter, Masayo, was an exchange student the past school year, and took part in the exercises.

JUNE

White's Supermarket, which is now a Jack and Jill store, held its grand opening in the store's newly-expanded location the first full week of June.

David Grimsley was named president of Friona Wheat Growers Cooperative, with A.W. Anthony, Jr. as vice-president, at the annual meeting of the cooperative.

The Friona area received over two inches of rainfall June 16-20, boosting crop prospects. The area has benefitted from good rainfall and conditions so far this growing season.

An application was filed June 29 by a group asking for a charter for a national bank in Friona.

JULY

Friona's July 4th activities were once again well-attended. Highlights included the Noon Lions' annual luncheon, and the annual fireworks display. Funds for the 1984 display were provided by a local volleyball tournament conducted by the Friona Star volleyball team and the Friona 4-H Chapter.

The Friona Star's Bronco division/team was the only unbeaten team in the summer Little League program, finishing with a 12-0 mark. The B-J Bees won the Mustang League with a 10-2 record. The Credit Union team won the Pinto League.

The area's cotton crop, off to its best start in years, sustained massive damage from 2,4-D, it was reported. Texas Department of Agriculture officials came to Friona and stayed several weeks, documenting the damage.

Chief of Police Bill Thieman, who has held his position since May of 1983, resigned effective August 1.

AUGUST

Cotton farmers, meeting in Friona August 2, voted to band together and enter a class action lawsuit, as soon as information is assembled showing what has caused the damage to their cotton. A CBS news team was in Friona the week of August 1, doing a segment which was broadcast nationally on a Sunday afternoon newscast, dealing with the 2,4-D damage to the area's cotton.

One of the best August rains ever witnessed in the Friona area dropped four inches of moisture on the area's cropland. The moisture was expected to benefit all of the area's crops except vegetables, which were being harvested.

In spite of experiencing its first weather-caused delay, construction on Friona's Millard Warehouse facility continues to be on schedule, according to company official John McDaniel.

SEPTEMBER

Funeral services for Glenn E. Reeve, longtime Friona businessman and civic leader, were conducted Saturday, September 8. Reeve, a life-

long resident of Friona, died after an illness of some months. He was 70.

The Friona Chieftain football team was off to a fast start, with wins over River Road, 21-14, Boys Ranch, 26-0, and Bovina, 53-7. They then scored a great come-from-behind win over Muleshoe in their district opener, 21-20, to stand at 4-0 for their September games.

Nikki Osborn was crowned as "Miss Friona" at the 28th annual Queen's pageant September 15. Leslee Upton was first runnerup and Sonia Lafuente was second runnerup.

A group of concerned citizens met with highway officials late in the month to see what can be done to get the widening of Highway 60 off "dead center."

OCTOBER

A reception was hosted by Ethridge-Spring agency on October 12 noting the 50th anniversary of the local insurance agency.

Milli Dixon was crowned as Homecoming Queen on October 5. The Chiefs had to rally for a 22-22 tie against Morton to preserve their unbeaten record.

The Friona Woman's Club held a tea to mark the organization's 75th anniversary of service to the community on October 21.

The Chieftains trimmed Floydada, 35-7, but lost in their showdown against Idalou, 18-0.

Bryan Johnston, a Friona native, has joined the Richard Collard law firm.

A second-quarter field goal was all the scoring, as the Dimmitt Bobcats borrowed a page from the past and upset the favored Chieftains, 3-0 on October 25.

NOVEMBER

Friona voters gave President Reagan an even bigger margin than he received nationwide on November 6, when 85.5 per cent of the voters in precinct 2-1, the county's largest precinct, cast their ballots for Reagan-Bush.

Millard Warehouse opened for business on Monday, November 12, and received their first load of products that day.

Eclectic Ideas, owned by Roxanne Hurst and Carmen Rape, held its grand opening. The store is located on Main in the former Allen's Jewelry building.

Congressman-elect Larry Combest paid a visit to Friona on November 16, in a post-election victory and get-acquainted tour.

DECEMBER

Modern Study Club, in conjunction with the Friona Star, sponsored "Project Christmas Card" in Friona for the 29th consecutive year. Proceeds go to Parmer County Community Hospital.

Tommy Moss became the first-ever Friona head football coach to claim the title in the Friona Star's annual football contest, taking a three-point win over his nearest competitor, Kent Patterson.

The annual tree-lighting ceremony was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce on December 3.

A 54-year-old Friona man, Carl Brewer, was critically injured December 12 in an accident at Elgin.

55 YEARS AGO--JAN. 10, 1930

In Tuesday's issue of the Daily Journal of Clovis, announcement was made that the company which has the franchise for distribution of gas in Clovis will soon receive gas from the West Texas Gas Co., and that a line will be rushed from its terminus at Hereford to supply gas to Friona, Bovina, Texico, Farwell, Clovis and Portales. This seemed the logical thing to do in the first place, but it took a lot of bickering to get the job accomplished.

50 YEARS AGO--JAN. 4, 1935

J.C. Wilkison of this place, better known as "Wilks" has been busy the past week or more receiving the congratulations of his Friona friends and neighbors on his appointment to the position of office deputy under the new sheriff, Earl Booth.

45 YEARS AGO--JAN. 5, 1940

The Friona alumni and old-timers enjoyed their third annual homecoming banquet this year. The banquet was served by the ladies of the Congregational Church. Because of unfavorable weather, only about half of the usual number expected arrived. The address of welcome was given by Rev. C. Carl Dollar.

Weddings reported in the Star included Frank Truitt and Carmaleet Tims, and Floyd Brookfield-Loretta Griffith.

40 YEARS AGO--JAN. 5, 1945

The opening of the Welch Auto Supply Store here on Tuesday has added a progressive step to the business enterprise of Friona. The store is owned, and will be operated by Nelson Welch, and his brother-in-law, Ralph Miller. The new business brings to Friona a much-needed enterprise of this nature, there having been none that made a specialty of this line of goods.

35 YEARS AGO--JAN. 6, 1950

Dr. H.H. Cooke, who has been head physician and surgeon at Parmer County Community Hospital at Friona, has resigned his position with the hospital and he and Mrs. Cooke and their small daughter departed for California Sunday morning.

20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 7, 1965

Construction in Friona during the calendar year 1964 set a new all-time record for the third straight year, and this time, the mark will be hard to topple. Aided by the figure for the new Friona High School, building was begun in Friona for 1964 for an estimated value of \$1,978,040.

15 YEARS AGO--JAN. 8, 1970

Earl Graham has purchased the Parmer House Restaurant from Mr. and Mrs. Sam Lindley and Christine Shirley, it was announced this week. 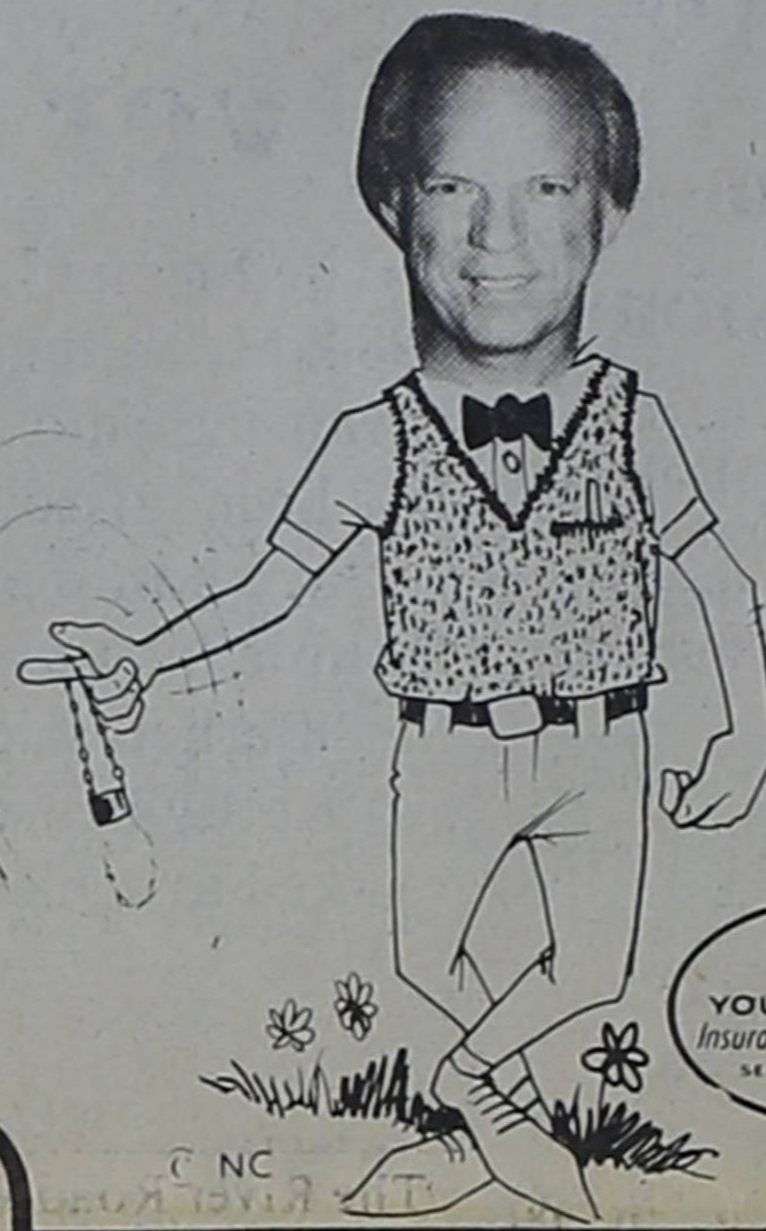

Squaws Top DHS For Win

The Friona Squaws came up with a great fourth quarter to post a 54-46 win over the Dimmitt Bobbies, to square their district record at 1-1 after a pair of games. The game was played here December 21.

In action during the holiday break, the team downed River Road, 45-41 on December 28, and this past Monday scored a 54-37 win over Adrian, to run their season record to nine wins against six losses.

The district tussle with Dimmitt was a close one. Teresa Wilcox scored a pair of baskets to pace the Squaws to a 12-10 lead after a quarter.

Miss Wilcox, Kelly Wied and Kerry Cain each scored six points in the second quarter, as the Squaws held onto a 26-20 lead at halftime.

Nikki Osborn scored a basket, and Miss Cain followed, to open the third quarter and give Friona a ten-point lead at 30-20. But Dimmitt rallied to pull within a basket, 33-31, with 35 seconds left in the quarter.

Miss Cain sank a pair of free throws with nine seconds left to hike Friona's lead back to four, 35-31.

The Squaws' free throw shooting won the game. Miss Cain, who hit 13 of 14 for the game, sank six big free throws in the fourth quarter.

JV Girls Have 8-5 Record

The Friona High School junior varsity Squaws won one game, and lost one in action while school was having their Christmas break.

The 1-1 split left the team with an 8-5 won-lost record for the season.

On December 21, the Squaws lost to the Dimmitt junior varsity, 35-24, but bounced back a week later to down the River Road girls, 41-24.

Friona had held close in their battle with the Dimmitt Bobbies' JV. The score was tied, 4-all after a slow first quarter, and Dimmitt held a 15-13 lead at the half. It was just 24-19, Dimmitt, entering the final quarter.

Layne Osborn scored 13 points to lead the team in scoring.

Against River Road, the team pulled away from a 6-6 score at the end of the first quarter to a 19-10 halftime lead. It was 29-12 after three quarters, as everyone got to see action.

Miss Osborn scored 14 points, and Glenda Ellis added 12 for Friona.

But Dimmitt gave the Squaws a run for it. The Bobbies' Washington scored three baskets, her last one pulling Dimmitt to within two points at 42-40 with 4:12 left in the game.

The teams then traded a pair of baskets, and scoring fell off, with Friona still ahead by just one shot, 46-44, with 2:09 left in the game.

But here came the Squaws, with good results. Mika Maddox first sank a long shot, for a 48-44 lead, and Kelly Wied's long jumper gave Friona a 51-44 lead with 1:01 left to play.

The Squaws made 24 of 35 shots from the line. Miss Cain was the leading scorer with 17 points, 13 of them from the free throw line.

River Road jumped out to a 14-6 lead over the Squaws on December 28, and held a 22-15 lead at the half.

But Friona began to click in the second half. Kerry Cain scored three baskets and two of two at the free throw line as the Squaws pulled to within two points, 29-27, after three quarters.

Miss Wilcox sank two baskets and four free throws as Friona tied the game at 39-all and forced an overtime. Miss Cain scored a basket and a pair of free throws, and Miss Wied added a basket as the Squaws pulled out the 45-41 overtime win.

Miss Cain again was the scoring leader with 17 points.

When the Squaws met Adrian in the second game of the season, they came away with just a three-point win, 55-52. Monday, they improved that somewhat with a 17-point win.

Kelly Wied led a balanced scoring attack with 16 points. Ronda Ratcliff added nine. All ten of the team's players got in on the scoring. Friona was again hot from the foul line, sinking 16 of 26 shots, 61 per cent.

Chiefs Lose Three Basketball Games

The Friona Chieftains dropped three games during the period of December 21-31. They lost to Dimmitt in their second district outing on December 21, 77-39.

Then on Friday, December 28, the team fell to River Road, 89-47, and on Monday, December 31, they fell to Adrian, 78-40.

Dimmitt jumped out to a 16-6 lead in the first quarter; outscored the Chieftains, 30-18 to take a 46-24 halftime lead, and coasted for the win.

Darrell Auburg scored 12 points and Shy Burney 11 for the Chieftains in the losing cause.

The River Road Wildcats came out with a well-oiled offense, which produced 50 points in the first half, which ended with the visitors holding a 50-19 lead.

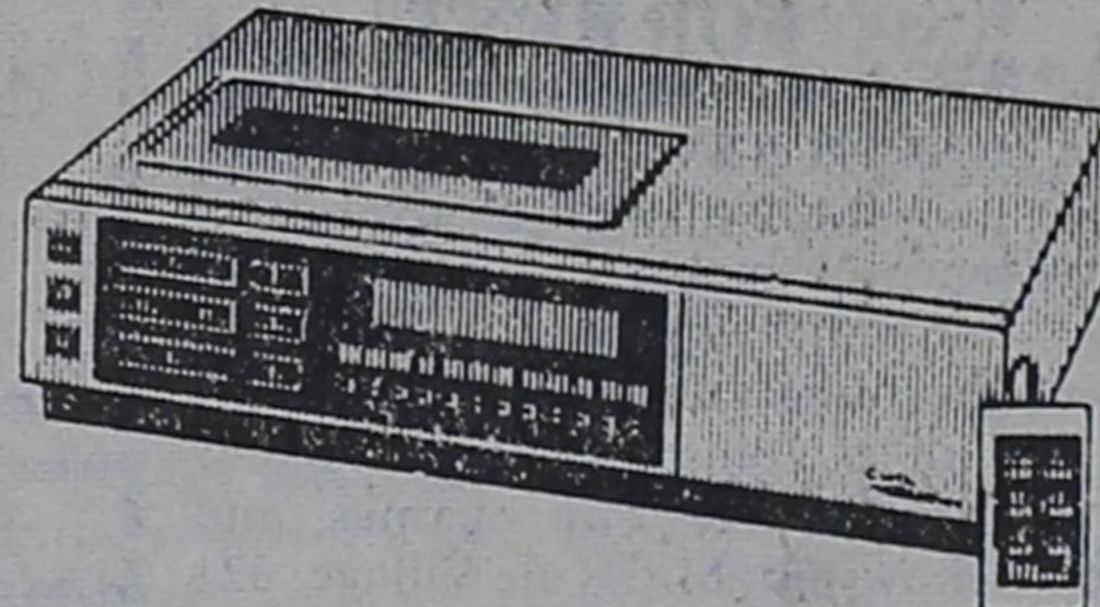

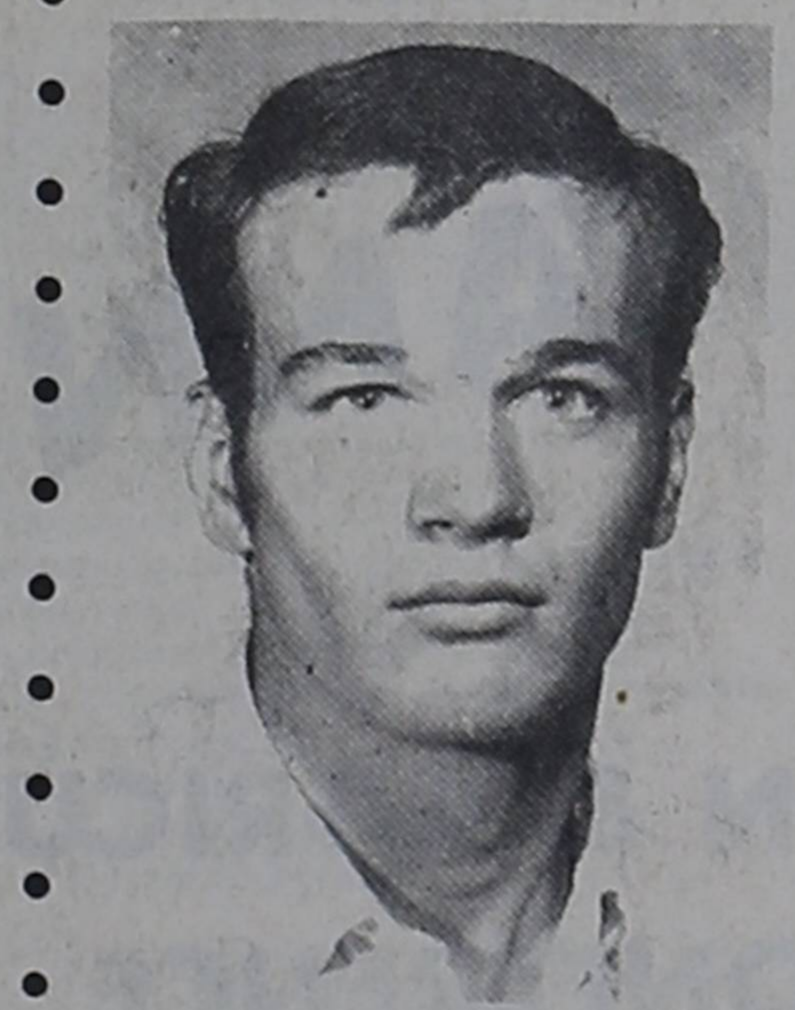

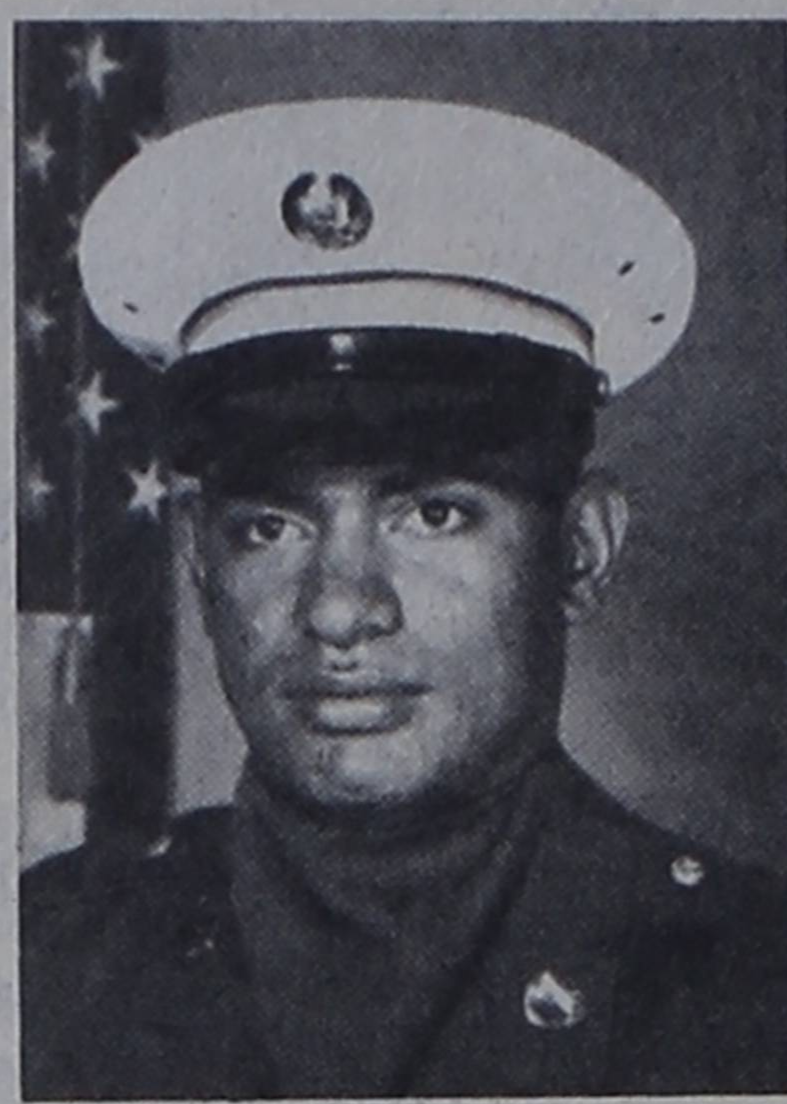

parents who have to find someone to watch over their children while they attend a meeting.

The Duncanville senator says that only about 13 per cent of those who voted in the 1984 primary returned for the precinct caucuses. This isn't exactly majority rule.

We have been attending Democratic party caucuses and conventions as long as we have been voting, and it has always been our experience that few of the voters bother with these meetings. They want to cast their vote and then go back home. So, why not put the presidential candidates on the primary ballots, along with all the others??

Even in small voting precincts such as we have in Parmer County, election officials have to really work to get enough people

together at the appointed hour to conduct the business that is to be done, and name the delegates to the county convention. I would expect that the 13 per cent figure quoted for the state would be higher than Parmer County's average participation in party conventions.

Edwards says he is hopeful that the Texas Democratic Party will take the lead in changing the caucus system, and he plans to "hold off" on pushing for passage of his bill to see what the party does.

Well, the party hasn't opted for many changes in the past 25 years, and if Sen. Edwards is serious about his obligation as committee chairman, we would urge him to go ahead with his bill, or it will be presidential election time again, and Texas will still be in the "dinosaur age."

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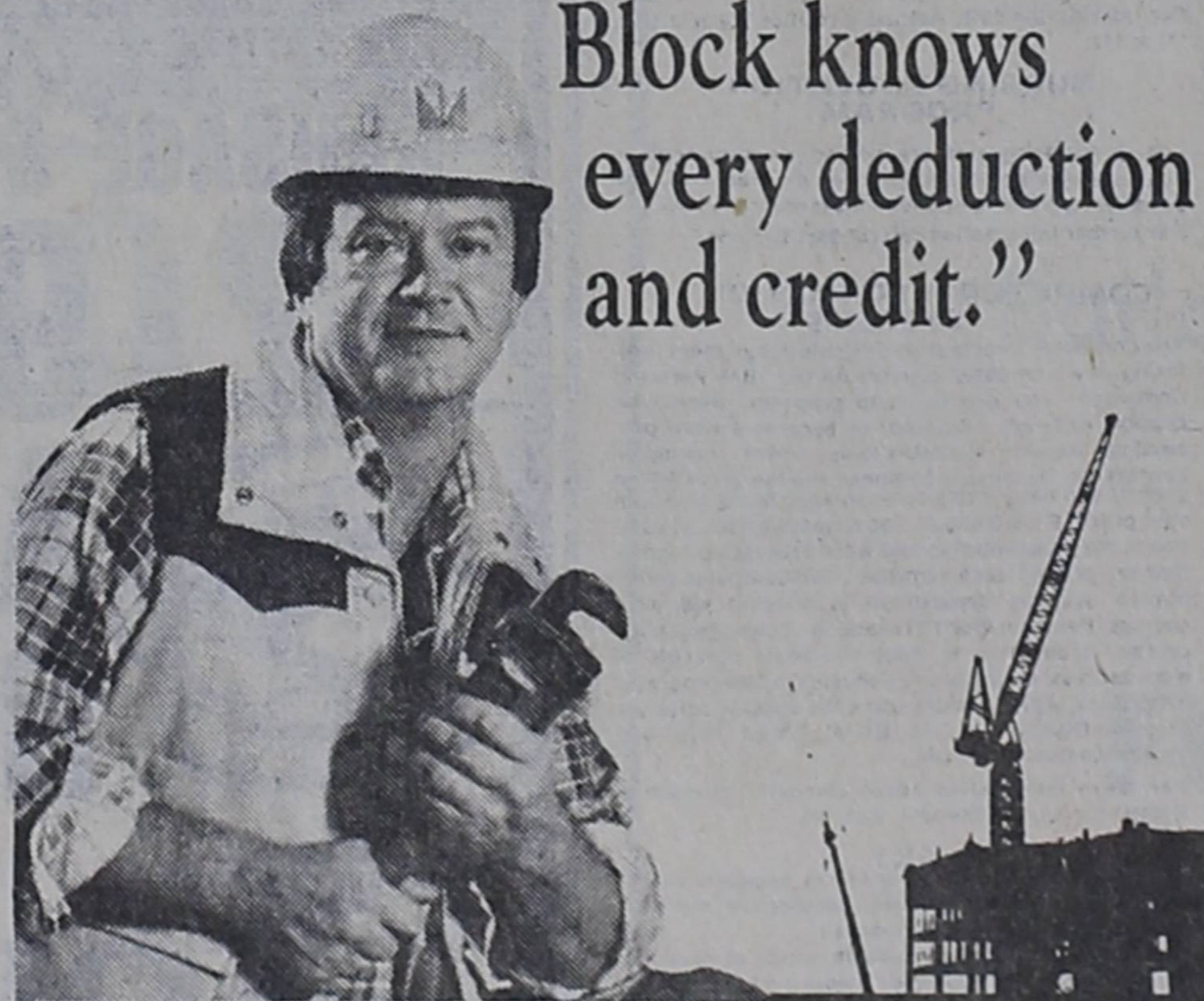

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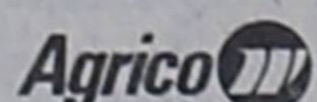
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Church Ceremony Unites Kipi Fleming, Kevin Ward

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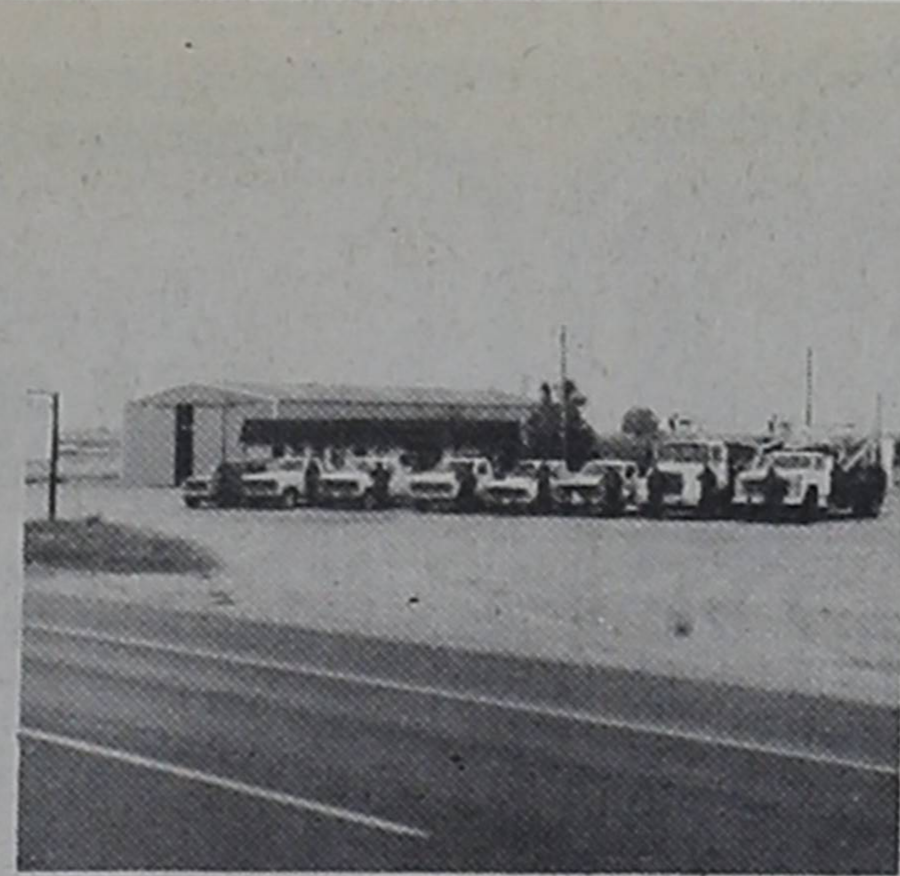
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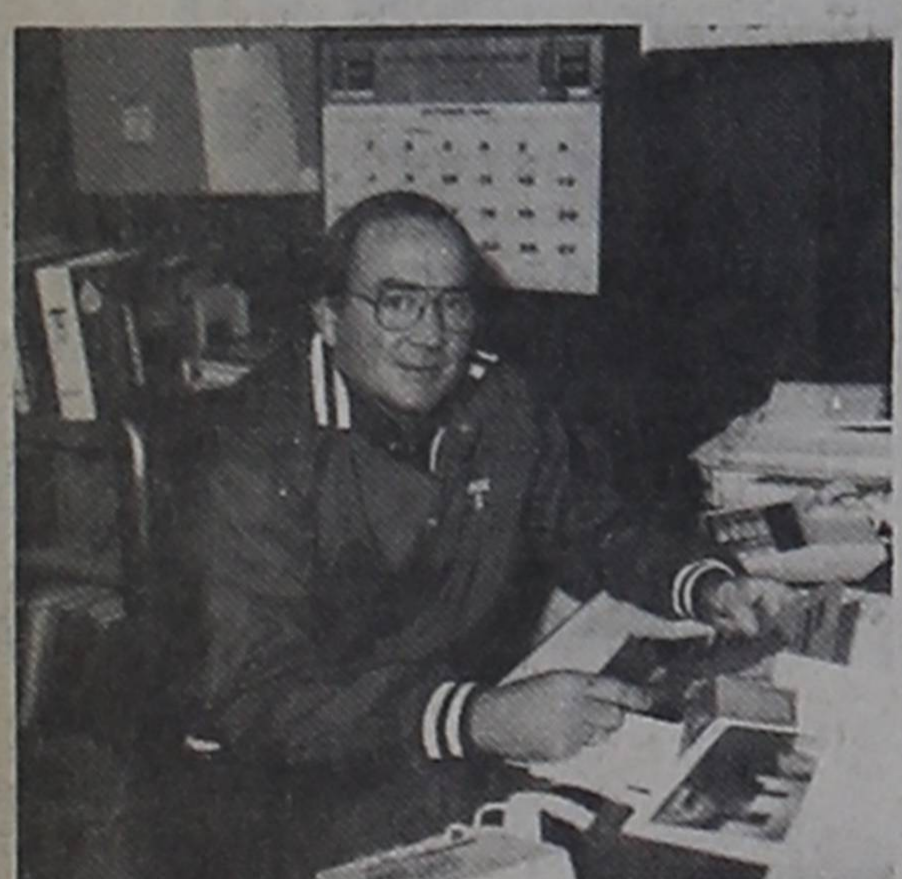
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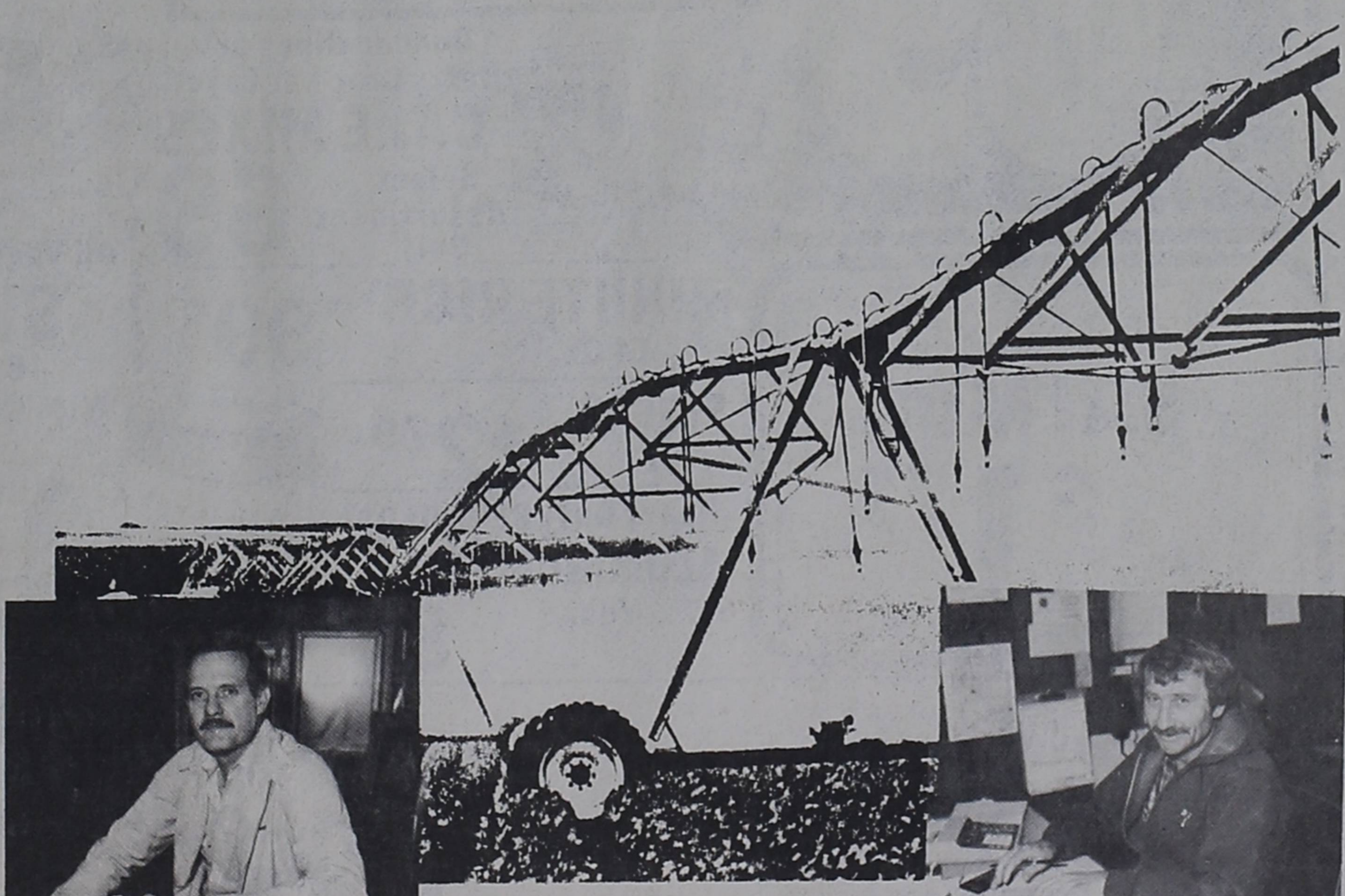
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
