Board calls school cost meeting

Possible tax hike looms

The ever-increasing costs of operation of the school system was the main concern for discussion as the MISD Board of Education met in regular session last Monday night.

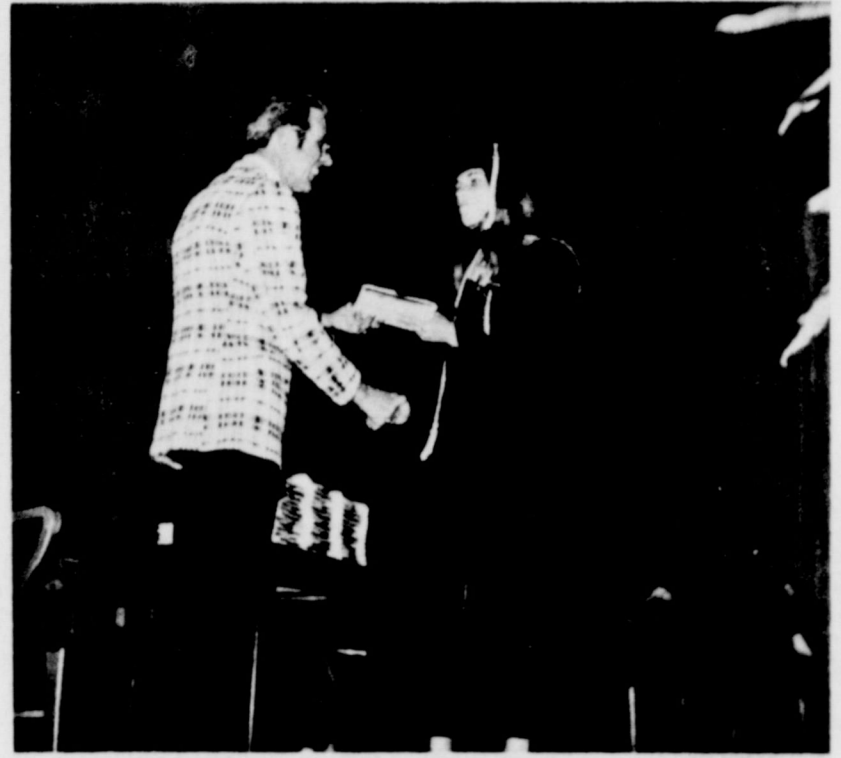
The discussion, which followed a 1974-75 school year cost briefing by schools superintendent Bob E. Travis, resulted in the board calling a public meeting on school cost to be held at 8 p.m. Thursday, June 6, in the school's cafeteria.

The board directed Supt. Travis to prepare a presentation to be given to the public which will outline the reasons for increased operating costs and suggesting possible tax alternatives to meet the needs of the school system in the future.

Both the school board members and Supt. Travis expressed strong hope that all persons interested in the Morton schools—and any who have suggestions for alleviating the cost squeeze—will be present for the meeting.

In other action, the board accepted the resignations from the teaching staff of Alta Mitchell, Wayne Thompson, Patricia Green, Dale Kirk, Tom Rush, Margaret Masten

County highway

contract awarded

Highway construction contracts let in April by the Texas Highway Commission include Lubbock area work.

The work, supervised by District Engineer George C. Wall, Jr., will be in Cochran and Hockley Counties.

A contract was awarded to Boswell and Crafton, Inc. of Lubbock. Low bid was \$317,663.76.

The project, which will require an estimated 140 working days, will be under Highway Department Engineer Glenn Y. Johnson of Lubbock.

The contract is for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 7.1 miles of Farm to Market Road 1585. The project extends from FM Road 1780, 7.0 miles south of Whiteface, eastward to Cochran-Hockley County line and from Cochran-Hockley County line eastward to FM Road 303.

Second Democratic Primary June 1, as the absentee deadline neared late Tuesday afternoon. This may be a portent of things to come as the voters go to the polls Saturday to elect a county commissioner for Precinct Four.

The Precinct Four commissioners race is the only contest in the run-off of the May 4 First Democratic Primary. It pits Jimmy Millar and W. R. Key, who appear to be running neck and neck at the present time. Both have been campaigning hard and the decision may depend entirely on how many of the 400-odd registered voters in the precinct turn out on behalf of their favorite.

Millar garnered the most votes in the May 4 election with a total of 90 to Key's 76. A third candidate, George (Ike) Williams forced a run-off between the two by winning 33

Church organized June 9, 1924 Methodist observing fiftieth anniversary

continued to meet in room of "Bull Camp" school and "Minnie Veal" school, in a tabernacle with other denominations and in the temporary courthouse that had been erected on the square.

In 1928 the First Baptist Church was organized in Morton. That congregation built a small building which they shared with the Methodist people one Sunday each month. As this building had a dirt floor and "toe-sack" curtains it was affectionately referred to by everyone in town as the "Mule Barn."

The First Methodist Church was erected in 1933, but was destroyed by fire ten years later. In 1944, it was replaced with the white brick two-story building which is still in use today.

The celebration will close with a Praise, Thanksgiving and Recognition service at 2:30 p.m. in the sanctuary. Former pastors, charter members and others who have been instrumental in the growth of the church will be a part of this service.

Federal Reserve Board report, installment debt in the United States now totals \$147 billion, which is \$19.2 billion more than it was a year ago.

In Cochran County, based upon the average earning and expenditure picture locally and upon national credit reports, the installment debt locally is estimated at \$1,200 per family.

That is the average, equivalent to about 16 cents of every dollar of income, after taxes. Some families owe much more than this and others owe little or nothing.

For the entire local population, the installment debt outstanding comes to an estimated \$1,757,000.

This takes into account loans for automobile purchases, credit for the purchase of other consumer goods, personal loans and loans for home repair and modernization. Not included are mortgage debt, charge accounts and single payment loans.

With repayments taking \$1 out of every \$6 or so out of the average family's net income, they amount to approximately \$100 per month per Cochran County family.

Nationally, according to the American Bankers Association, the percentage of delinquent loans has been rising. Their latest report shows 2.69 percent of them more than 30 days past due, as compared with 2.53 percent at the same time in 1973.

100 percent oil allocation asked for agriculture

The Southern Legislative Conference, recently meeting in executive session in Atlanta, passed a resolution calling for the allocation priority for lubricating oils to be changed to 100 percent of that needed by agriculture.

The resolution, sponsored by Texas State Rep. Bill Clayton (D-Springlake), and Tennessee State Senator Carl Gainer, was designed to aid two different sectors of the economy currently suffering from shortages of lubricating oils. These two sectors, irrigation wells and pumps for agricultural production, and those companies conducting exploratory work for coal and petroleum supplies, have both been severely hampered by the low priority given them for the allocation of petroleum products, Rep. Clayton reported.

The Southern Legislative Conference, an organization of state legislators from across the southern part of the nation, is just one of several major organizations that have taken stands to change the fuel allocation priority for the lube oil products.

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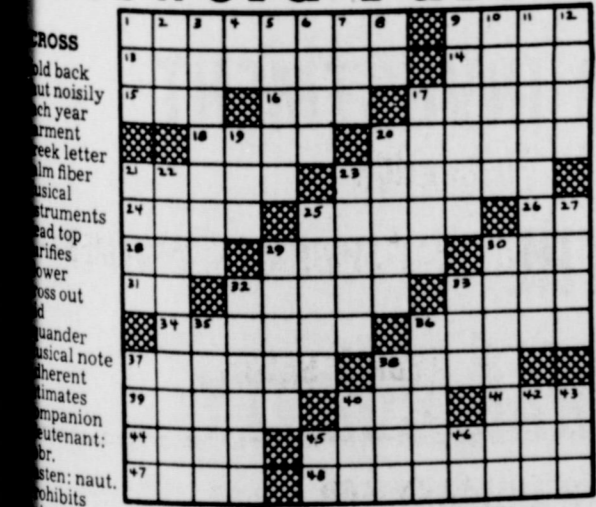

Delegates defeat Judiciary article

The delegates to the Texas Constitutional Convention have spent the past two weeks engaged in what has so far been a fruitless task. After long and heated debates on the important Judiciary Article, which will provide the base for the Texas court system in the new constitution, delegates voted to defeat the article, in effect sending it back to the committee for a new start.

The major sources of dispute on the article, according to Representative Bill Clayton (D-Springlake), were provisions which would have established a system of circuit courts and eliminated the present duties of the county judge, and a provision which would have allowed the state to appeal adverse lower court decisions in certain instances. Representative Clayton reported that it was a coalition between the opponents of these two issues that led to the defeat of the entire article.

One attempt was made to salvage the work done on the article, but after heated debate on a proposed "compromise" substitute for the article, it too went down to defeat. The Committee on the Judiciary

must now try again to work out a document acceptable to a majority of the delegates, according to Clayton.

The Convention has now moved into consideration of the proposed General Provisions Article, which contains more potentially controversial sections than any other article. Included under the General Provisions topics are such subjects as right to work, branch banking, abortion, usury rates, gambling and the environment. Representative Clayton stated that debate on this article should be as long and heated as has been any article thus far in the convention.

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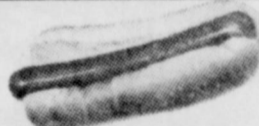
