Council OK's sharp gas rate hike

Approximately
40% higher

The third and final reading of City Ordinance 2-74, which sets new and substantially higher rates for city gas consumption was approved by the Morton city council Monday night.

The new rates, which will up the cost to the consumer by approximately 40 percent, appears to be considered long overdue by the council members and the Mayor, judging from the easy sailing the ordinance had through the council machinery.

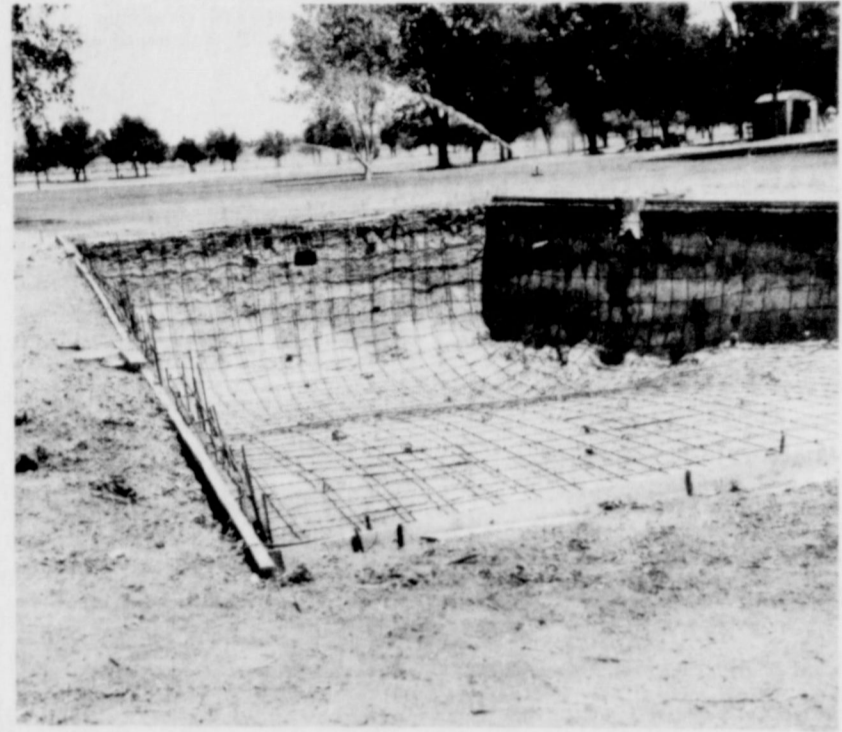
The new rates will take effect with the July 15 reading of meters and will first show up on the consumers' bills in August.

Thus the August bill would show a sharp increase over the July bill, if these were not two mid-summer months when most consumers are using only this minimum amount that is chargeable. The best indication for the consumer is to wait and compare his 1973 and 1974 mid-winter bills.

First reading of the ordinance was read and approved on June 10, the second reading on June 24 and the third and final reading was approved Monday, July 8.

New gas rates as compared to the present rates are as

Area girl fulfills ambition to record

Terri Sue Newman, a native of Levelland, has nurtured a dream since she was four years old. That dream was to write and sing songs. She has written some songs, and has been singing since she was four, now she has cut her first record.

On January 18, 1974, Terri Sue signed a contract with Cinnamon Records. She made several trips to Nashville, before the initial song for her first recording was decided upon. It is a slow country tune entitled "One", written by Jerry Foster and Bill Rice. The flip side of the record is a fast, peppy little number written by Charles Addington, entitled "Teaching The Teacher". Addington is the band director at Whitharral High School.

The twenty year old Terri Sue, is five feet, four inches tall, has red hair and green eyes, and a low, soulful voice. Terri Sue's personal manager, Don Caldwell of Lubbock, said "The way I hear Terri Sue is like a female Charlie Rich, because she's soulful. She is an extremely soulful singer." He went on to say, "When she sings a song, she means what she says. She thinks about the song she is singing and puts it across the way it was intended to be sung. She can get into the meaning and the feeling of the words. She's an artist."

Terri Sue said of her first recording, "It's a start. I'm not satisfied with just this record. I feel that I could have done a better job of singing it."

Farm deadline

July 15, 1974 is the final date for filing an intention to participate in the 1974 cotton, feed grain and wheat programs, John Hall, ASCS County Executive Director announced this week.

If you fail to file an intention to participate you will be ineligible for any payments which may be due under the disaster or target price provision of the programs, as well as ineligible for loan.

You will also lose 20 percent of your allotments.

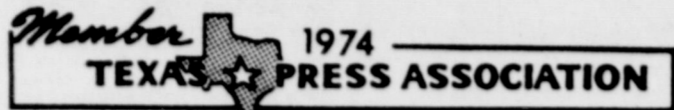

Students Hail Unprecedented Dialogue With President Luis Echeverria

MEXICO CITY—(Special)—President Luis Echeverria, in a 12-hour meeting with National Polytechnic Institute students, announced new programs designed to develop domestic technology and bring the benefits of Mexico's economic progress to the rural population.

The unprecedented dialogue with the students marks a milestone in President Echeverria's policy of facilitating participation and decision-making roles to the nation's youth in confronting the administration's number one priority: raising the living standard of the rural population and achieving a more balanced distribution of national wealth.

The President proposed setting up a monetary fund to establish cooperatives for developing technology to produce low cost articles. These cooperatives will be managed by professors and students.

"It is feasible to create a monetary fund to sponsor specific work projects and research as well as centers of productive activity where discussions can be held to decide what is needed, what human resources are available and to conduct market surveys," the President said.

These cooperatives will coordinate their research with such governmental agencies as Petroleos Mexicanos (the government-operated petroleum industry) and the Federal Electricity Commission to determine what can be produced in Mexico and thereby reduce dependency on foreign imports.

Another program of great significance is the setting up of inter-disciplinary social service brigades which will start working in July to take technology to the least developed rural sectors. These sectors often possess natural resources but limited means for development.

Describing the function of

these brigades, which will operate much in the manner as medical interns in the health field, the President said: "This will be a practical application of transfer of technology—a factor for development and not of personal gain."

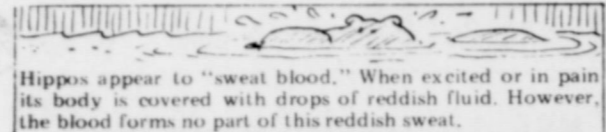
It was also agreed the government should establish a Higher School of Tourism for the training of specialized personnel and to unify schools already operating in this field.

The President noted that tourism has been increasing at the rate of 11% annually and with Mexico's great scenic beauty and archeological treasures, the field has a tremendous potential for expansion.

"These factors make it necessary to provide better training for people at all levels of the tourism industry," he asserted.

Education has received high priority in the administration of President Echeverria and federal budget appropriations in this area exceed armed forces outlays by more than 300%. The Chief Executive indicated this policy will be continued.

"Despite pressures of population explosion, we are not going to improvise in this field. Rather we are going to train teachers properly for this vital function," he stated.

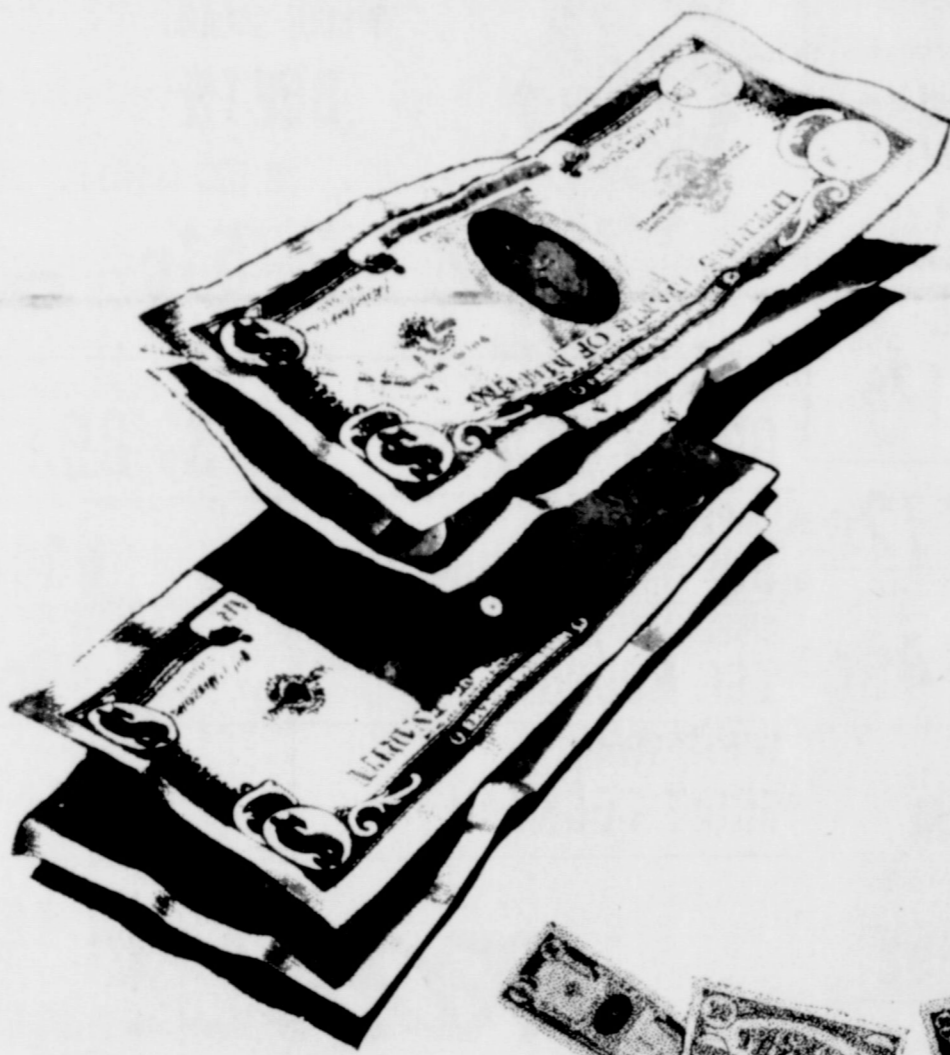

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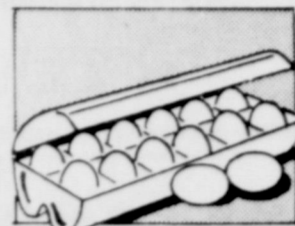

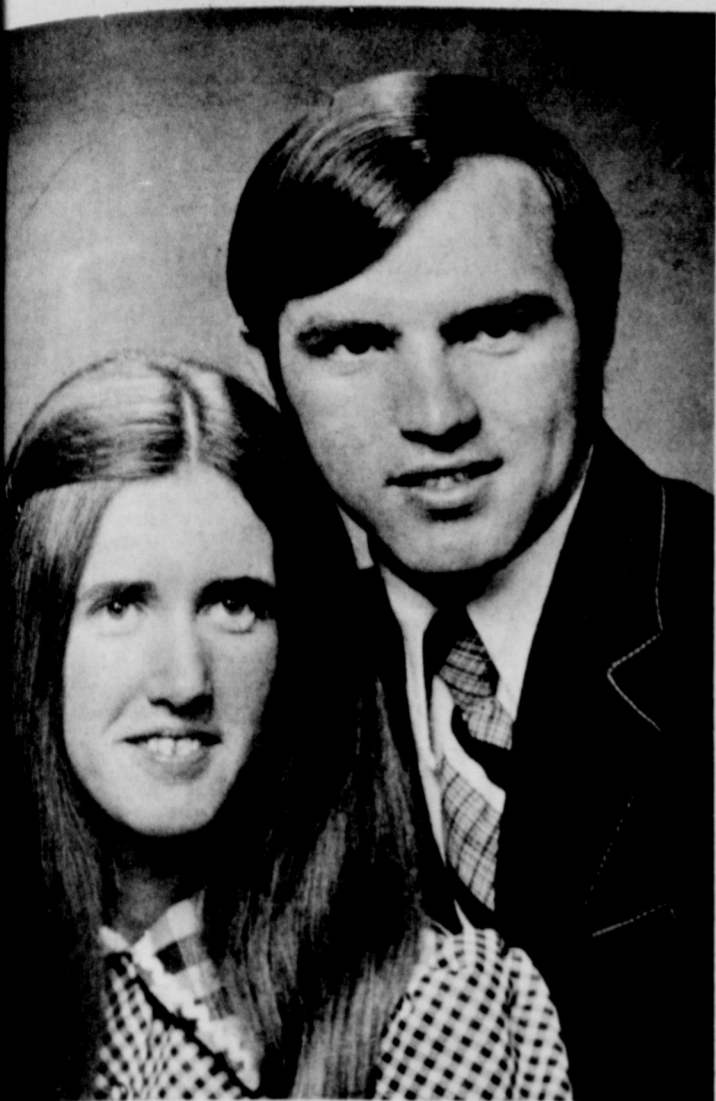
