## College students face cost bind

### Inflation, fee hikes take toll

Cochran County's college-bound students and their parents are in a bad squeeze this year.

They are caught between a further rise in college fees, a tight money market that makes it difficult to get bank loans at normal rates and a continuation of the inflation that has raised living costs to record levels.

And, for those local families that have two youngsters going to college at the same time, the financial situation is that much more difficult.

A nationwide survey of 2,200 colleges and universities, conducted by the College Entrance Examination Board, shows that nearly all of them have increased their charges for the forthcoming semester.

As a result, it has become 9.4 percent more expensive, on average, than it was last year to go to college and nearly 36 percent more so than in 1970.

The bill that Cochran County families are faced with this year, based upon the number of local students involved, is estimated at \$451,000. This includes tuition, fees, transportation, room and board and miscellaneous expenses.

It takes into account the current cost increases, which are in the neighborhood of \$346 for students living on campus at private four-year colleges, according to the findings, and a somewhat smaller boost, \$158, for those going to public institutions.

## Mrs. Emlea Smith dies at 96

Mrs. Morton J. Smith, long resident of Lubbock and High Plains, (since 1906) died in Cochran Memorial Hospital in Morton, August 12. She was the wife of the late Morton J. Smith, pioneer, rancher, founder of the city of Morton.

Mrs. Smith (Emlea Bruce Smith) was born in Wickenburg County, Oklahoma March 10, 1878. She married to Morton J. Smith in Waco, Texas January 1900.

Mrs. Emlea Smith Junior Club of Morton, which she joined in 1962, was named after her in recognition of her contributions as a pioneer woman of Cochran County.

She is survived by a foster son, Morton J. Smith, Jr.; a daughter, Mrs. J. Smith, of Morton; and two granddaughters, Mrs. Lucille Collins of Pine Bluff, Texas, and Mary Kay Smith of Morton; a great-

granddaughter, Emlea Laverne Collins; and two nieces of Waco, Mrs. Lucille Lawson and Mrs. Mabel Gordon.

Graveside services were held at Oakwood Cemetery Wednesday, August 14 at 4 p.m. at Waco. Arrangements were by Singleton Funeral Home in Morton.

## Hunting, fishing license due renewal

Somewhere in the recesses of your wallet is a crumpled, soiled piece of paper which should bring back memories of crisp fall days.

It's last year's hunting license.

To replace the license which expires the last day of August, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have already mailed one-half of some 2 1/2 million total hunting and fishing licenses for the coming year.

The new licenses will be available Aug. 16 at all TP&WD Enforcement offices and bonded license sales deputies such as major

sporting goods stores.

Fees are the same as last year: \$8.75 for a combination resident hunting and fishing license, \$5.25 for resident hunting, \$4.25 for resident and non-resident fishing and \$37.50 for non-resident hunting license.

This year's fishing license will be valid for one year from the date of purchase.

Three turkey tags are on the new hunting licenses and must be used much the same as are deer tags.

New licenses are printed on a special paper which is resistant to tears and water —

## County given high rating as a market

Based upon its showing during the past year, Cochran County is given a high rating as a market in a nationwide survey of business activity, just released.

The figures show that local residents, armed with better incomes, spent more freely for goods and services than did people in most other communities.

The findings are presented in a copyrighted report, called "Survey of Buying Power," issued by Sales Management, the marketing publication. It details how much was earned and how much was spent in each section of the country.

Stronger consumer buying was the mainstay of the local area's economic strength. It

They also approved a white-winged dove season for Sept. 1-2 and 7-8 limited to Brewster, Cameron, Culberson, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Kinney, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy and Zapata Counties.

Bag limits remain the same as last year on both mourning and white-winged doves.

The set the season on Wilson snipe or jacksnipe for Nov. 16 through Jan 19 and set the teal season for Sept. 14 through Sept. 22.

### Lubbock Man to head feed grain council

Elbert Harp of Lubbock was named chairman of the U.S. Feed Grains Council during the council's annual membership meeting in Stratton Mountain, Vermont this week.

The council was formed in 1960 by the Grain Sorghum Producers Association and other agricultural groups. The USFGC, a non-profit organization, works under contract with the foreign agricultural service of the department of agriculture to increase dollar sales abroad of U.S. Feed Grains.

The Council has developed and is currently implementing marketing programs in 20 countries and has generated more than \$2 billion in direct sales during the past fiscal year.

Harp toured the council's marketing areas in Asia early this year and will travel worldwide later this year as a representative of the council.

Other executive officers of the USFGC are Harold E. Noren of DeKalb, Ill., Alan J. Noble of Wayzata, Minn., and Lyle P. Campbell of Chicago, Ill.

limited sensitivity to day length. In contrast, the silage type sorghum are more sensitive to short days and late plantings tend to result in short, early maturing, fine stemmed plants which limit forage yields.

Greenbugs probably will not be much of a problem in late planted hay crops although fall armyworms and related insects could cause serious damage. Farmers should request planting seed that is tolerant to MDMV.

Although late planting of sorghum is considered a worthwhile soil conservation practice in some circles, keep in mind that sorghum is a relatively high-water-use crop. Also, if these crops set seed during the fall, volunteer sorghums could constitute a major weed problem next year. Farmers are cautioned to harvest these crops prior to the bloom stage and avoid planting these fields to grain sorghum next year. Rotating to cotton where herbicides are incorporated preplant is good insurance against serious volunteer problems.

### Unleaded gasoline supplies in area considered adequate

Reports from refiners indicate the supply of unleaded gasoline in the southwest region of the nation should be adequate during August, it was reported by Delbert M. Fowler of Dallas, regional administrator for the Federal Energy Administration.

Based on reports from refiners supplying the five-state region, nearly five percent of the total gasoline available will be unleaded, Fowler said. The five states include Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Under regulations of the Environmental Protection Agency, every retail gasoline outlet which sells more than 200,000 gallons of gasoline per year must market unleaded gasoline. In specified rural areas, stations selling 150,000 gallons per year must stock the unleaded product.

Many stations across the nation have sold unleaded gasoline for years. In fact, Amoco has been selling an unleaded product since 1915.

However, to meet the new EPA regulations, virtually all automobiles manufactured in 1975 must have catalytic converters to reduce air pollution.

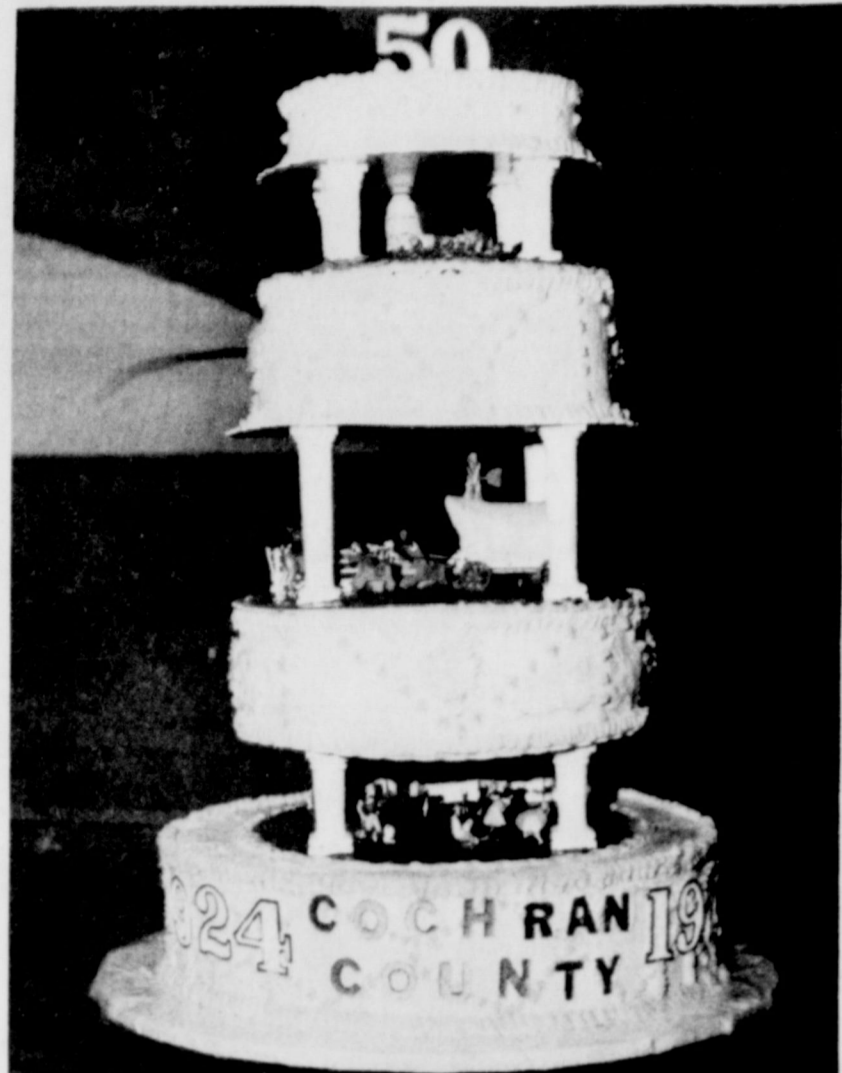
The catalytic converter, which filters exhaust fumes through chemicals to remove air pollutants, requires the use of unleaded gasoline. Otherwise, the converter, which costs about \$150 will be ruined and must be replaced.

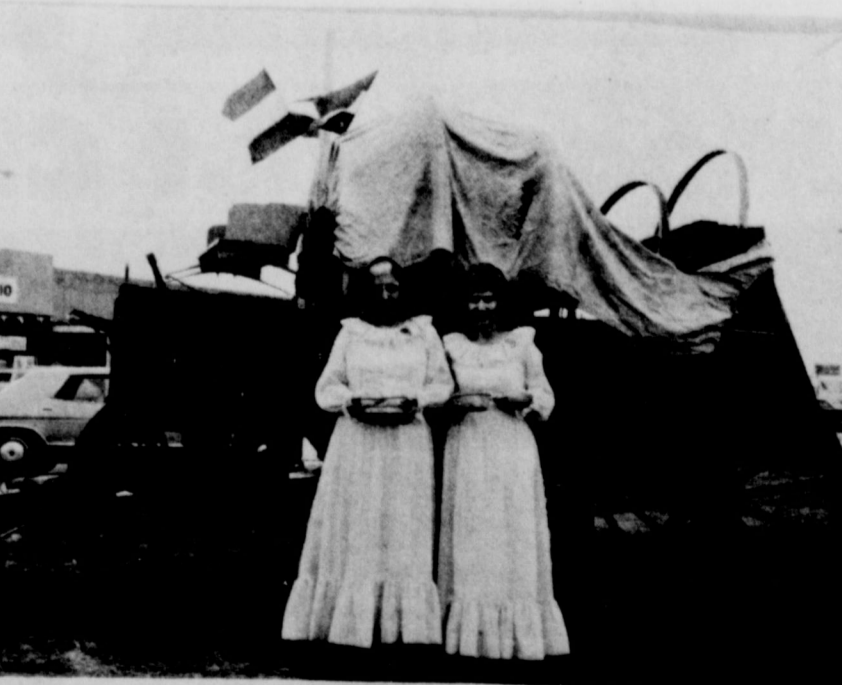
