

Civil Judicial Council report for 1973, statewide the 254 district, domestic relations and special juvenile courts experienced a 6 per cent increase in filings during 1973 - to 296,548 cases from 280,971 in 1972. Twenty-six per cent of these were criminal cases.

These state courts disposed of 49 per cent of the total cases filed in 1973 or carried over from 1972. The defendant entered a guilty plea in 47 per cent of the criminal cases disposed of. In the cases disposed of by a jury verdict, 80 per cent of the defendants were found guilty and 20 per cent acquitted.


