Debt interest bite hits countians

Total interest share amounts to \$416,000

How much of the money that the Federal government collects annually from residents of Cochran County, via the tax route, is needed to meet the interest charges on the national debt?

How much will the local population be forking up during the current year, through their income taxes and through excise and other taxes, as its share of these interest charges?

The answer is—approximately \$416,000. That is their share of the carrying costs alone. It will not reduce by a particle the debt itself, which has now reached the awesome total of a half trillion dollars.

For the nation as a whole, the present cost of carrying this debt is nearly \$30 billion a year, the latest figures show.

Related to the average family in Cochran County, it means that some \$290 of the amount being collected from then annually by the government is to pay the interest on the debt.

The debt ceiling has been raised frequently in recent years, chiefly to cover deficit spending. President Ford has asked Congress to help eliminate such deficits in the future by reducing governmental expenditures.

Since 1960, according to the Treasury Department, the interest on the national debt has soared from \$9.2 billion a year to the present level of \$30 billion.

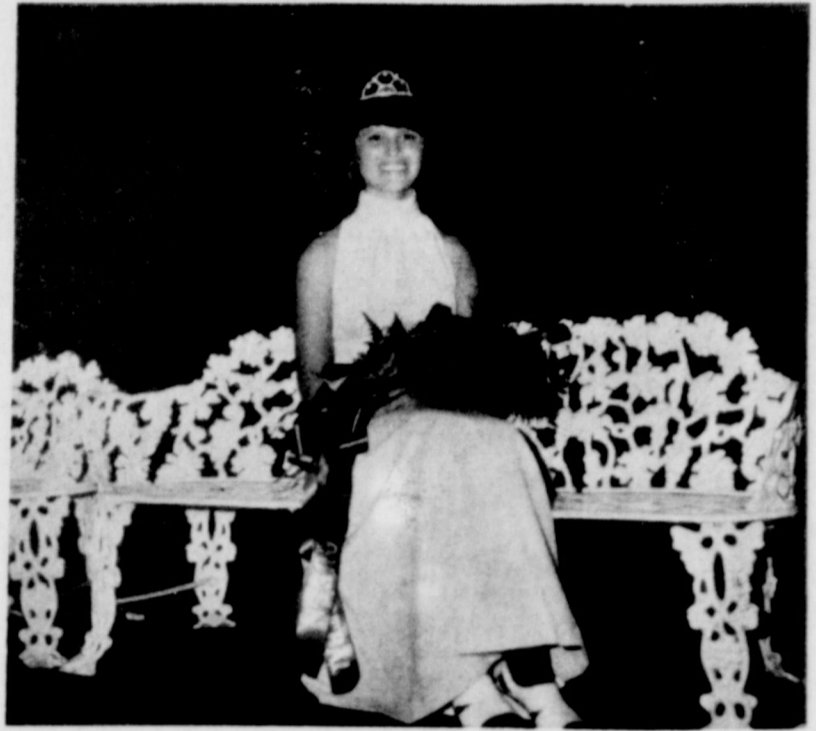
The net effect, for Cochran County families, is that they are paying more than three times as much in carrying charges as they did then.

Just how large these interest costs have become may be realized by comparing them with the outlays for other governmental operations, as detailed in the 1974 budget.

The \$30 billion required for interest this year is three times more, for example, than the government is spending for education and manpower training combined.

It is over four times the amount that is being spent in the field of health care and five times as much as is going into general

Law officers charged with wrongful arrest

Stubborn Mules show heels to Tribe

to their chagrin, the Indians learned just how stubborn a mule can be when they absorbed a 6-16 drubbing from the Muleshoe Mules before

a disappointed homecoming crowd Friday night.

The Mules were not their only problem, however, with their own miscues and lack of offensive punch contributed strongly to their downfall. The almost total lack of those ten yard gains, commonly known as "first downs," accounted strongly toward the Tribe's lack of success on the field, with third down conversions a rarity.

The Indians seem to have the knack of bringing out unique performances in its opponents, and things proved to be no different with the Mules who sacked up ten points in the first quarter without gaining one first down.

The first of these points came on a blocked punt which was grabbed by a Mule in the end zone for a TD. The PAT attempt gave the Mules a seven point lead with 3:45 left in the first quarter of play. An addition to this score, three more points were tallied on an accurate 25-yard field goal for Muleshoe.

Momentum carried the Mules to another score in the second period of play. A 30 yard pass added 6 for the Mules to run the score to 16-0.

This period of play also saw the Indians get their first and only score of the game. With 9 seconds remaining in the first half, the Indians were in a first down and goal situation following a pass interference call on the Mules. Sam Johnson plunged a yard for the Indian score. The PAT was no good and the halftime score was 16-6.

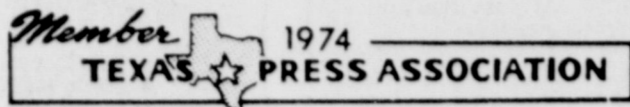

Mittens for Pickpocket

Not long ago a man found guilty of picking pockets was granted probation on the condition that he wear mittens whenever he went out in public during the following five years.

This order suggests the wide range of possibilities that may occur to a sentencing judge when he allows a convicted person to go free on probation. The idea, of course, is to keep the culprit from getting into trouble again.

As a matter of law, the judge has considerable leeway in setting conditions. Besides the usual requirements, such as avoiding association with criminals and keeping in touch with a probation officer, special limitations have also been held lawful.

- Examples:
- 1) that a bookie should not have a telephone in his home;
 - 2) that an assaulter should not go near a certain woman; and
 - 3) that a labor "goon" should not be eligible for union office.

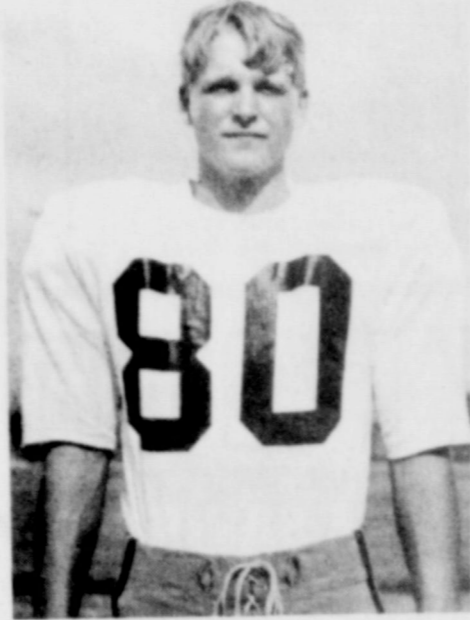

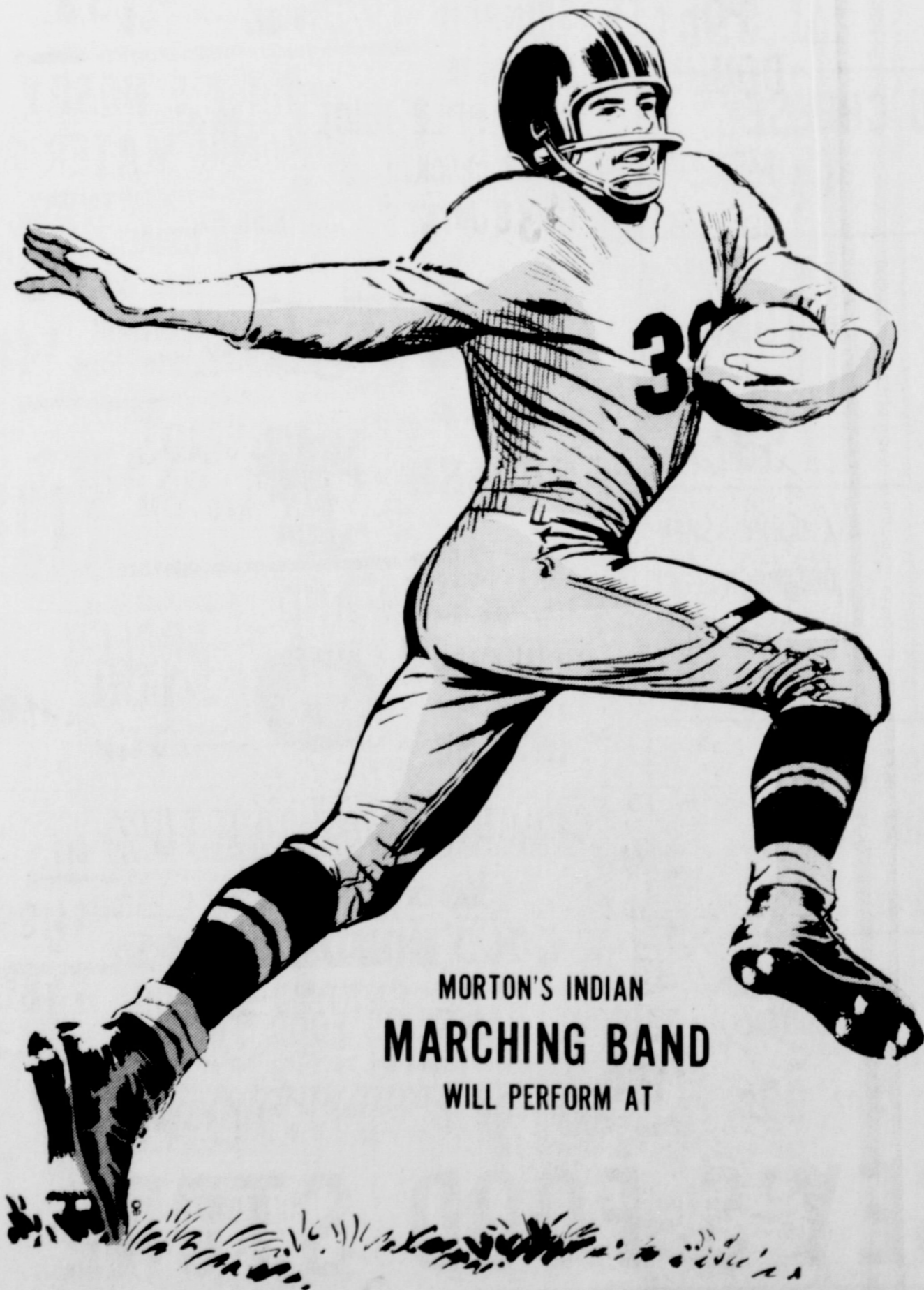

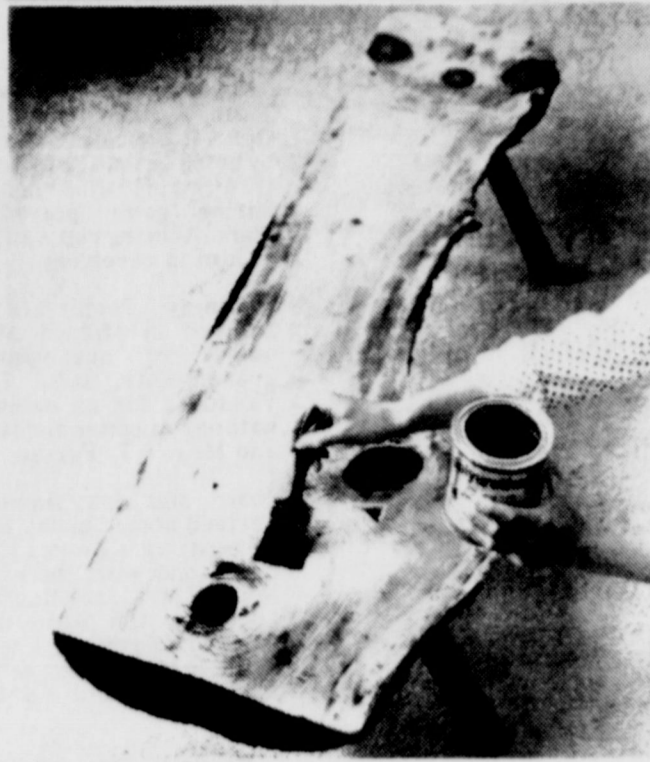

To make a tree table—start with dry wood. Then sand the upper surface for a smooth table top. Finish the sanded surface in a deep lustrous natural wood shade or preserve the wood's own color under a clear protective finish of polyurethane. Polyurethane is also the ideal finish for protecting the barked portions of the table.

For legs, use lengths of banister rail finished to match the color of the bark and insert by drilling 1" to 2" deep holes into the table.
