# Total interest share amounts to \$416,000

How much of the money that the Federal government collects from residents of Cochran County, via the tax route, is needed to meet the interest charges on the national

How much will the local population be forking up during the current year, through their income taxes and through excise and other taxes, as its share of these interest charges?

The answer is-approximately \$416,000. That is their share of the carrying costs alone. It will not reduce by a particle the debt itself, which has now reached the awesome total of a half trillion

For the nation as a whole, the present cost of carrying this debt is nearly \$30 billion a year, the latest figures show.

Related to the average family in Cochran County, it means that some \$290 of the amount being collected from then annually by the government is to pay the interest on the debt.

The debt ceiling has been raised frequently in recent years, chiefly to cover deficit spending. President Ford has asked Congress to help eliminate such deficits in the future by reducing governmental Since 1960, according to the Treasury Department, the

interest on the national debt has soared from \$9.2 billion a year to the present level of \$30 billion. The net effect, for Cochran

County families, is that they are paying more than three times as much in carrying charges as they Just how large these interest

costs have become may be realized by comparing them with the outlays for other governmental operations, as detailed in the 1974 budget. The \$30 billion required for

interest this year is three times more, for example, than the government is spending for education and manpower training combined. It is over four times the amount that is being spent in the field of

health care and five times as much as is going into general See INTEREST Page 7

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

has considerable leeway in setting conditions. Besides the usual requirements, such as avoiding association with criminals and keeping in touch with a probation officer. special limitations have also been held lawful.

- 2) that an assaulter should not go near a certain woman; and
- 3) that a labor "goon" should not be eligible for union

On the other hand, the law is leery of conditions that are 100 freakish (because they are hard to enforce) or too severe (because they are hard to live up to).

Also, there are constitutional limits that must not be transgressed.

In one case, a court granted a man probation on condition that he donate blood to the Red Cross. But this condition was thrown out on appeal because it called for "invading the physical person in an unwarranted manner.





Saw mills have a wide selection of "scrap" pine, maple and oak that costs next to nothing. The outside slices of trees and round cuts-complete with bark-make interesting coffee and novelty tables.

To make a tree table-start with dry wood. Then sand the upper surface for a smooth table top. Finish the sanded surface in a deep lustrous natural wood shade or preserve the wood's own color under a clear protective finish of polyurethane. Polyurethane is also the ideal finish for protecting the barked portions of the table.

For legs, use lengths of banister rail finished to match the color of the bark and insert by drilling 1" to 2" deep below into the table.

# Despite growing urban influence, agriculture basis of U.S. wealth

YOU OFTEN hear it said that Texas has become urbanized, and it is true. The urban influence, especially in politics, is dominant, yet agriculture is the basis of our country's wealth and probably always will be. The large towns have many of the people who used to live on farms and ranches of this State. What is not realized to readily is that they get a large share of their income each year from agricultural products. For example, Neal R. Peirce said in his The Great Plains States of America. published in 1972, that Harris County (Houston) ranks second in Texas in the number of cattle. the region provides nearly 30 percent of the national rice production, and the Port of Houston gets more than half of its annual tonnage from farm products! Most of the exported cotton that is grown in the Lubbock area (another city dominated by agriculture) goes out through the ports of Houston and Galveston. creating thousands of jobs in those communities. The late. great Jesse Jones, one of the developers of Houston, once said that "cotton and cattle kept it (Houston) rich ... same story is true in Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, El Paso, and other big cities. Dallas ranks fourth in the Nation as a cotton market and farm implement center. Even though the big cities have paved over many of the acres in their counties. most such counties still produce crops and livestock. For instance, in 1970, Harris County produced crops and livestock valued at

\$22.497.000. El Paso County \$21.728.000. Bexar County \$21.626.000. Nueces County \$19,149,000.

RAIN HAS perked up pastures over Texas and made it easier to send cattle into the winter months in good condition. Good pastures are possibly affected the number of cattle on feed during August. Texas (rop and Livestock Reporting Service reported that there were 1.760.000 head of cattle and calves on feed September 1. which is 24 percent below a year ago and two percent below the previous month. Texas feeders put 264,000 head into lots in August, which is 28 percent fewer than in August, 1973 and 23 percent fewer than in July 1974.

During August, there were 299,000 head of fat cattle sold. In percent below August, 1973 and eight percent below July.

### The Consumer Alert

by John L. Hill Attorney General

AUSTIN - So you built a better mousetrap, but the world hasn't beaten a path to your door?

At this point, you may find yourself attracted by advertisements for idea or invention promotion and marketing firms. After all, what you really need is an expert to handle such details for you, right?

You could be wrong, in some General's Consumer Protection Division urges caution before paying large fees to firms offering services variously labeled invention or idea promotion. marketing, or development or patent searches and development.

Last summer, our Consumer Protection lawyers testified at a Federal Trade Commissions hearing in Dallas - the first of a series of hearings nationwide to determine if a trade regulation rule is needed to curb fraudulent activity in the idea and invention promotion

Our attorneys described the method of operation found time and again in the invention marketing cases we have investigated or taken to court for violation of the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices-Consumer Protection Act.

Someone with an idea or an invention sees an ad promising patent search and protection; evaluation and feasibility studies to determine produce marketability; engineering and production services; or exclusive contacts manufacturers.

The would-be inventor pays a fee averaging \$1,000 or more and submits his idea or gadget. Virtually all those submitted are judged by the firm to be marketable." "highly

Inventors are assured that their product will be exhibited in fairs and shows and that the market development firm, through its extensive arrangements manufacturers, will locate a distributor.

While some few inventions have been marketed by such firms, our attorneys stress that the overwhelming majority of persons have never received a return that even approaches the amount of money they pay as fees.

revenue sharing. The only way to wipe out this burden would be to pay off the debt of \$495 billion, which is practically impossible and is

seldom suggested.

In addition, inventors with a possibly saleable item could find themselves inadequately protected if they rely on such idea promoters to conduct patent searches or to process

The chief of our Consumer Protection Division and the head of the U.S. Patent Office have issued joint warnings of consumer fraud in the invention development field.

Patent Office officials say that while inventors can even prepare their own patent application, file it with the office, and conduct the prosecution of the application themselves, it is extremely difficult for anyone unacquainted with patent law and the procedures of the Patent Office.

They suggest that persons who are not experts in such matters hire patent attorneys or agents registered to practice before the patent Office. Otherwise, investors may fail to get a patent or may get one that doesn't adequately protect their invention.

Since there are more than 300 subject classes and 90,000 sub-classes of patents, it's obviously a complicated matter for an amateur to determine if an idea already is patented. Investors who wish to do so them selves, however, can conduct a check at the Patent Office Search Room in Virginia, or in one of several special libraries across the country. Or they can hire a qualified person registered to practice before the Patent Office to do it for them. A list of registered attorneys and agents is available from the Government Printing Office.

Persons who have a complaint about an idea or invention marketing firm should contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, their county or district attorney, or their local Better Business Bureau.


