Light voter turnout expected

Watergate, mistrust stir apathy

Preliminary forecasts call for uncrowded polling places and a very light turnout of voters in Cochran county as the 1974 general election of November 5 approaches.

The light turnout forecast has been harried by an unusually light absentee vote thus far tabulating only 14 votes, according to County Clerk Bob Vinson's report.

Though this is not a major national election, encompassing all candidates up through President, the highest post being United States Congressman George Mahon, it comes in a time of great turmoil in our nation's politics and in our nation's history.

Both the duly elected President and the duly elected vice-president of the United States in the last national election of 1972 have resigned their offices. The appointed vice-president Gerald Ford has succeeded to the presidency and his vice-president designate, Nelson Rockefeller, if and when confirmed, will comprise the only non-elected presidential team in the history of the United States.

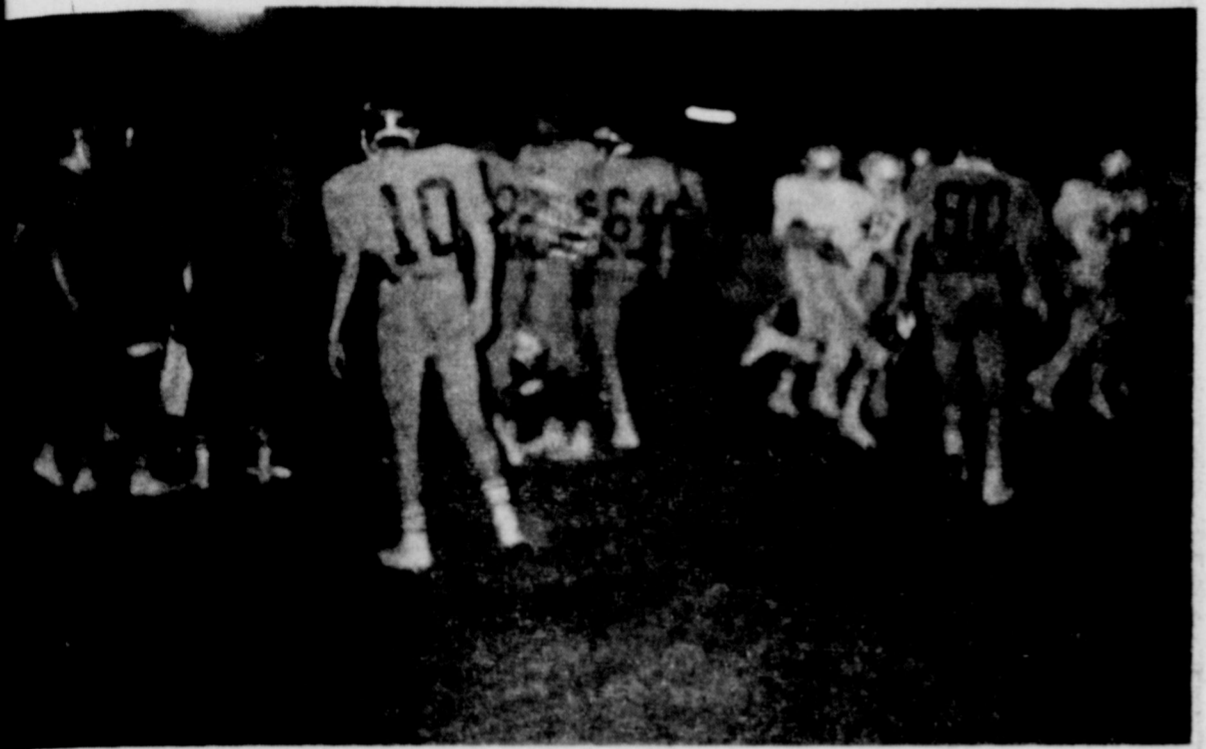
The Watergate scandal has created a great deal of confusion and mistrust in the rank and file voters, which is causing a strong apathy among balloters at the grass roots level, according to some noted political analysts. The consensus appears to be that no matter how light or how heavy the voter turnout is, it will inevitably lead to very heavy gains for the Democratic party over the Republican party.

Only the actual polls results can furnish an answer to this

Controversy rife in Tribe loss

Indian fans are still talking about last Friday's football clash with the Littlefield Wildcats. There is a special discussion concerning a controversial call in the last end of the game which cost Morton the ballgame.

Prior to that, the Indians had put on their best display of the year. The game was nothing short of a cliff hanger and the Morton defense showed signs of growing domination as they held Littlefield in several goal line scoring attempts.

The contest got underway with the Wildcats taking first

possession of the ball and moving steadily to the Indian seven yard line. Morton defense showed its intentions for the game as it held the Wildcats on four scoring thrusts.

The Indians were unable to get a first down with their first possession, and were forced to punt. However, a Littlefield fumble was recovered by Indian Robbie Gattis, but Morton was still unable to advance the ball.

The second quarter of play followed much the same pattern as the first, with both teams almost equal possession of the ball. However, both squads had touchdowns called back during this period.

With 4:35 left in the first half, Littlefield threw a 60 yard pass which was taken into the end zone for an apparent score. However, to the relief of the Indian fans, a holding penalty on the Wildcats called the TD back.

Three minutes later, a snap to halfback Ray Dean Thompson, who connected beautifully with Kenneth Standmire, was brought back from the end zone due to an Indian penalty. The halftime score was 0-0.

The second half of play proved to be even more exciting and controversial in the eyes of

ERA amendment

A meeting of all area women will be held Monday in the County Courtroom of the Courthouse beginning at 8 p.m. Purpose of the meeting is to acquaint the ladies with the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) passed by the U.S. Congress March 22, 1972 and sent to the states for ratification.

The Amendment reads: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any states on the account of sex." But how many understand the hook inside the bait?

When and if 38 states ratify the ERA, it will become the 27th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. At one time, 33 had ratified, including Texas, Nebraska and Tennessee have since rescinded their ratification. The ladies' meeting Monday night is an effort toward rescinding the Texas ratification.

Ways the ratification will effect the female sex will be explained and discussed at the meeting as well as the giving of the addresses of Senators and Congressmen who may be contacted to express opinions for or against the amendment.

A detailed description of the aims and objectives of the National Organization for Women (NOW) will be presented and discussed at the meeting. Many of these aims and objectives are not generally known by the general public and they are bound to be an "eye-opener" for those attending.

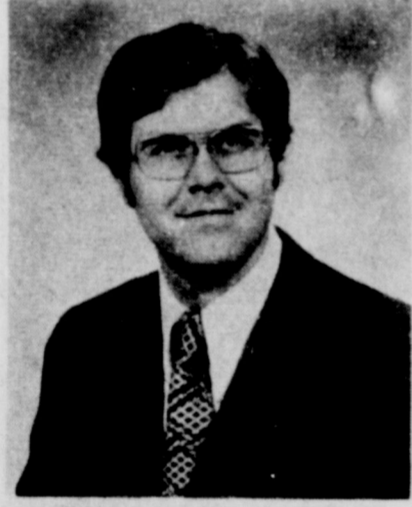
All area women are urged to attend this meeting, which promises to be interesting and revealing.

The county Democratic primary of last May resulted in certain votes being contested as to their validity. The one vote that was disallowed was a vote in which the voter cast his ballot in the proper precinct but in the wrong voting box. To have their

Cotton module storage demonstration scheduled

GSPA recommends sorghum contracting



Area cotton producers will get a chance to review a demonstration of newly developed cotton module storage, transportation and ginning equipment near Lamesa, Thursday, Nov. 7.

The event will be at Cotton King Gin, 5 miles west of Lamesa on Highway 180, according to District Extension Agent Billy C. Gunter, Dawson County Extension Agent LeRoy Colgan, and Gaines County Extension Agent Joe Ed Wise.

Starting at 1:30 p.m., the demonstration will feature all the major developments associated with the cotton module method of harvesting, field storage, transportation, and movement of cotton into the ginning process.

Producers and agribusiness officials will get a close look at the cotton module building process, its transportation by a newly developed module truck to the gin, and feeding of cotton into the ginning process via the new module dispenser unit.

Demonstrations will run at the same time, following a brief session by representatives of the sponsoring groups. These include the Extension offices of Dawson and Gaines counties; Lamesa Chamber of Commerce; Cotton King Gin, Inc.; Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.; and Cotton, Inc.

Module builder operator instruction and training will be given after the briefings at the same time that demonstrations are being carried out. Guests will be able to choose the demonstration of most interest to them.

The module builder and dispenser unit was developed by Texas A&M University's Department of Agricultural Engineering under the leadership of Lambert Wilkes, associate professor. The work was funded through a research grant from Cotton, Inc., of Raleigh, North Carolina.

Livestock producers and other grain buyers should contact now while supplies are adequate to meet their demand, according to officials of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Elbert Harp, executive director of the national organization headquartered in Lubbock, said, "We do anticipate a very tight grain situation throughout the coming year. But at the same time, there should be no problem securing the amount needed."

The GSPA official recommended that the harvest season would be a good time to contact for grain supplies. He emphasized that contract means "booking" for later delivery and that it is not always necessary to make full payment for the grain at the time the agreement is made.

He also pointed out that grain may be contracted for later

delivery either at prices fixed at the time of the contract agreement or at prices based on the market at the time of delivery.

"We continue to encourage grain sorghum producers to distribute their sales during the year," Harp said. "And it is possible to contract with livestock producers for grain supplies to be delivered throughout the year. This type of orderly marketing benefits both the producer and the buyer."

GSPA officials also urge domestic consumers to take the first opportunity to purchase existing grain since the supply is available to any buyer, foreign or domestic.

Reduced grain supplies were the result of prolonged drought, followed by excessive rains and early frost on the High Plains.

SPEAKING TO THE TEXAS FARM BUREAU in Conroe Governor Dolph Briscoe said, "In my opinion the Farm Bureau concept of representing agriculture is one of America's great achievements. I hope that the high priorities given to agriculture and rural life in the past will be accelerated in the future. You are assured of my continued support for your efforts."

SPC slates senior live saving course

A Senior Life Saving course will start Monday, Nov. 11, at South Plains College. The class will meet from 4 to 6

p.m. Monday through Friday for two weeks in the SPC Natatorium. Fee is \$10 for SPC students and \$15 for all others. W.A. Wise, director of intramurals and associate professor of physical education at SPC, will instruct the course.

Wise said that persons taking the class must be at least 15 years of age or have completed the ninth grade and be able to pass certain swimming requirements.

Swimming requirements include being able to perform a standing front dive, swimming 440 yards continuously, demonstrating ability in using the stroke on the front (hand over hand), a side stroke utilizing a scissor kick, and a stroke done on the back using an inverted scissor or breast stroke kick; diving from the surface to a minimum depth of six feet and swimming 15 feet underwater and treading water one minute with hands beneath the surface for use as auxiliary supports.

An outline of the course requirements will be given each student at the first class meeting. Prospective students should register between now and Nov. 11 in the central office of the Technical Arts Building. Enrollment will be limited and persons will be registered on a first-come first serve basis, Wise said.

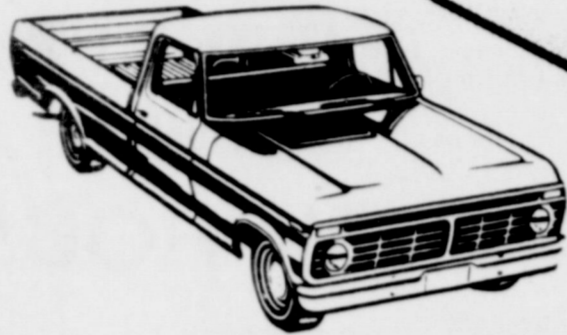

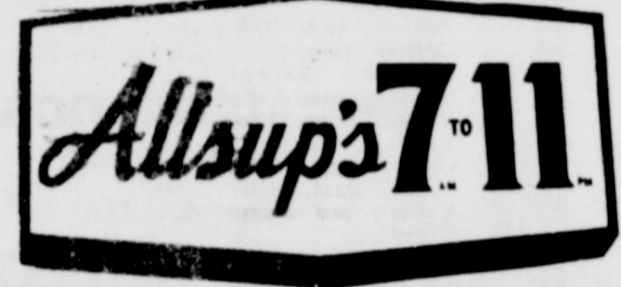
