## As old ends, new begins: More of same in store?

As the year 1974 winds down to its not unwelcome end, Cochran countians are probably reflecting ack upon those twelve months ith mixed emotions. Of all the electives that might be used to describe this tumultuous year, certainly "normal", "comfortable" or "uneventful" could not possibly be included

mong them.
One thing is certain — the comentous events occurring on be national and international cene has assured it of a very rominent place in the history of ar Republic.

Some of those events, most of which either directly or indirectly effected the lives of Cochran countians, — most of them adversely — included the following:

Watergate, which finally climaxed with the resignation of an American President for the first time in history and elevated an appointed Vice-President to the Number One post, also setting a precedent. The second precedent took place in late December when an also appointed Vice-President was sworn in, making this the first time in

nistory that the two top government offices have been occupied by officers with no mandate from the people.

An oil embargo was imposed by the Arab countries as a result of their war with Israel, and the price was increased to the point where the Western World was thrown into near economic chaos.

A nation-wide 55 mile per hour speed limit was imposed as an energy saving measure, making it especially difficult for Texans with their long travel distances.

Inflation continued to spiral upward and was continuing the trend as the year came to a close.

A steady rise in unemployment and business recession brought on by the inflation was becoming accute by year's end.

A stick-out plus on the national scene was the late December report by the Defense Department that not one single American life had been lost during the year in the still-smoldering Vietnam war.

On the local level, Cochran

On the local level, Cochran county, "Texas' Last Frontier", celebrated its fiftieth anniversary with a year-long observance, after being founded on May 7, 1924.

The local economy was

affected both by the scarcity and over-abundance of rainfall. Going into 1974 after a dry autumn in 1973, area farmlands endured seven months of drough, immediately followed by more than 20 inches of moisture during August, September and October.

After a record-breaking year of cotton production in 1972 and 1973, county farmers faced both reduced production and reduced prices for the 1974 crop. Some were caught up.

Plus factors for the coming year were the underground reserve of moisture depsoited by the heavy rains during the autumn, the proved productivity of county farms and farmers in the face of the worldwide need for more food, and the adaptibility of local producers in meeting the changing needs of agriculture.

The challenges, rewares andor setbacks of the year 1975 for Cochran countians still lies cloaked in the mystery of the future, but if the past is any yardstick for foretelling the future, they will meet its hardships and trials head-on as they have in the past and make the beginning year of their second half century a foundation of

### Armed robber shoots local woman

Mrs. Loma Richards, of 105 NW 4th Street, was shot by an armed man in an attempted robbery at her home late Sunday

According to a sheriff's report, Mrs. Richards had just arrived home from the Tic Toc Restaurant which she owns and perates, when an unidentified assailant opened her car door and demanded her money — the report presumed it was the day's restaurant receipts that she was

carrying in two money bags. As she reached for the bags to hand them to him, her assailant fired one shot from a small calibre pistol and fled, leaving the money

behind.

According to the sheriff's report and that of a close relative, the bullet shattered her metal watch band, passed through her left wrist and dug a furrow across her abdomen. A large number of metal fragments from the watch band were reportedly

forced deep into the wrist wound.

Mrs. Richards was rushed by her husband to Cochran Memorial Hospital where she was reported in good condition Wednesday afternoon. It was at first thought that surgery would be performed to remove the metal fragments, but a relative reported to the Tribune Wednesday that the operation would probably not be necessary.

A check with the sheriff's office late Tuesday indicated that the identity of the assailant, who was wearing a ski mask at the time of the attempted robbery, was still unknown and that no new leads had been received.

The case remains under intensive investigation, the sheriff stated.

## Farm labor legislative target

Enactment of Farm labor legislation that would give union officials control over American food production is a real danger in 1975, the chairman of the Farm Labor Research Committee warned in a statement released

this week.

"The election sweep by union-backed candidates paves the way for enactment of one-sided farm labor legislation in the new 94th Congress unless an aroused public lifts its voice against the potential trampling of individual agricultural employee, grower and consumer rights," said W.B. Camp, a California grower and Chairman of the FLRC.

"Legislation to extend the National Labor Relations Act or an even more repressive regime to agriculture could be quickly reported out by the uniondominated majorities on the House and Senate Labor Committees."

Camp said he had learned that officials in the U.S. Department of Labor have drafted a bill which basically would bring agricultural workers under the 40-year-old NLRA, and have discussed it with officials of the Department of Agriculture.

Such legislation has been proposed as an 'instant remedy' to the violence and coercion that has occurred in the jurisdictional battle between Teamsters President Frank Fitzsimmons and United Farm Workers President Cesar Chavez, Camp said.

"Unfortunately," Camp said,
"some misinformed or

misguided agricultural associations have embraced the NLRA extension as the lesser of two evils. They ignore the history of continuing labor strife in non-agricultural industry during the past four decades.

"Extension of the NLRA to agriculture would effectively subordinate individual rights to the rights of the union organization, If union officials are now armed by federal law with special monopolistic privileges in the agricultural area, they will be able to undermine the productivity and destroy the economic health, and abuse the rights of agricultural employees, employers and consumers of agricultural

products to the same extent as in See LABOR Page 9



## Telephone tax levy reduced

General Telephone customers paid an estimated \$1.8 million less in Federal Excise Taxes on telephone bills during 1974 because of a 1 per cent reduction in the tax.

By the end of 1974, General will have collected an estimated \$15 million under the eight per cent tax levy, which will drop another l per cent on January 1, 1975.

The decrease on January 1, 1975 is the third step of a 10-year reduction schedule in which there will be successive lper cent rate reductions on the first of each year, completely expiring in December, 1981.

The tax elimination was enacted as part of the Excise, Estate and Gift Tax Adjustment Act of 1970.

The excise tax on phone bills

was first imposed by Congress during World War I as a "temporary" measure. Although repealed briefly after the war, the tax was reinstituted during the Depression and has continued ever since at varying rates as high as 15 per cent on local service and 25 per cent on long distance calls. From 1954 until



industry generally.

"In the present state of inflation and world food shortages, the nation simply cannot afford to extend to the food-producing sector of its economy a system of labor law which would benefit only union officials intent on increasing their own monopoly power, Camp declared.

The FLRC Chairman called on farm workers, farmers and consumers to "join together to thwart this power drive, and to protect their rights from the coercive tactics of union officials.

He said that the Farm Labor Research Committee will step up its educational campaign among members of Congress, farm organizations, the news media, and the general public to insure that farm labor policy guarantees the rights of employees, employers and consumers.

The Farm Labor Research Committee is a non-profit, nonpartisan organization with the single purpose of researching and analyzing farm labormanagement relations, paying particular attention to proposed legislation in the field. The FLRC disseminates its findings as a public service to the agricultural community, the public and Congress, to help develop a sound farm labor policy which will benefit farm workers, farmers and consumers.

for wear and they suspect, other stimulants, the officers said.


