## Cattle mutilations stir controversy

**Sober, far-out theories advanced**

Discovery Monday afternoon of what appears to be two more incidents of animal mutilation has Cochran and surrounding county citizens in a state of high puzzlement and rife speculation.

The apparent mutilations dovetail with reports of similar incidents reported in several states of the central and Southwestern ranching states. Two Hereford steers—variously reported in area news media as "heafors" and "a steer and a heafor"—were found near noon Monday in pastureland south and west of Whiteface. One was in a field of 4' to 5' growing wheat and the other was in an adjacent pasture of grain sorghum stubble.

Both carcasses were considerably bloated and both had been mutilated in the area of the lower jaw, navel and genital organs. One steer's navel had been carved, or otherwise taken out, in a near perfect circle, with the flesh underneath left untouched. The lower lips and chin areas of both had been removed and the tongues were missing.

The sightings were reported to Cochran County Sheriff C.G. Richards shortly after noon Monday and he mounted an immediate investigation. The investigation eventually resulted in the arrival at the scene of Cochran county civil defense personnel with Geiger counters to check for radiation, the Hockley County CD team similarly equipped and finally a radiation detection team from Reese Air Force Base, who surveyed the scene thoroughly for signs of radiation.

The two steers had died approximately one quarter of a mile from each other, one in a pasture of grain sorghum stubble and the other in a pasture of growing wheat approximately four to five inches in height. There was no fence between the two pastures, according to Joe Bob Allen, of Whiteface, who is in charge of the herd to which the two belonged. They both had access to either pasture, Allen stated.

The steer in the sorghum stubble was lying according to Sheriff Richards report, in the approximate center of a 30 foot circle of heavily trampled ground, further adding mystery to the situation. It has been theorized by several sources that the other herd cattle had circled the dying and/or dead steer, causing the packing of the soil. Other theories have a helicopter or flying saucer causing the compaction.

Richards further reported that a similar circle was defined around the steer found in the wheat field, and the outer perimeter of the circle showed evidence of discoloration of the wheat causing it to have a scorched appearance. This is advanced by some as giving credence to the "Helicopter" or "Flying Saucer" theories.

The two new sightings follow closely on the heels of similar

## Five file for council seats

## Bula seeking Three Way Consolidation

A school consolidation referendum was conducted in the Independent School District Monday, March 3. Results of the referendum revealed that voters voted consolidation of the Bula School by the margin of 98 to 28. Voters were also asked to indicate where they would like the school to go if it were to be consolidated with another school. Results were counted as follows: 68 for consolidation with Three Way, 20 for Morton, 14 with Sudan, nine for Littlefield and three with

The Bula ISD Board of Trustees met Monday, March 3, p.m. to study the results of the referendum. Since a majority of voters had indicated their preference that Bula School be consolidated with Three Way, the board approved by unanimous vote a petition to the Bailey School Board to consolidate the Bula School with Three Way School District.

Information received from the State Education Agency officials states the Three Way Independent School District will pay for up to \$550,000 in one-time aid payments over the next five years, as a result of the consolidation of the Bula School. It is required that these funds would be used to pay off the bonded indebtedness of the Bula and Three Way Schools.

An interview last Friday, Superintendent James H. Hance reported that there were no serious reasons for submitting a petition for consolidation.

Hance stated that one of the reasons for consideration of

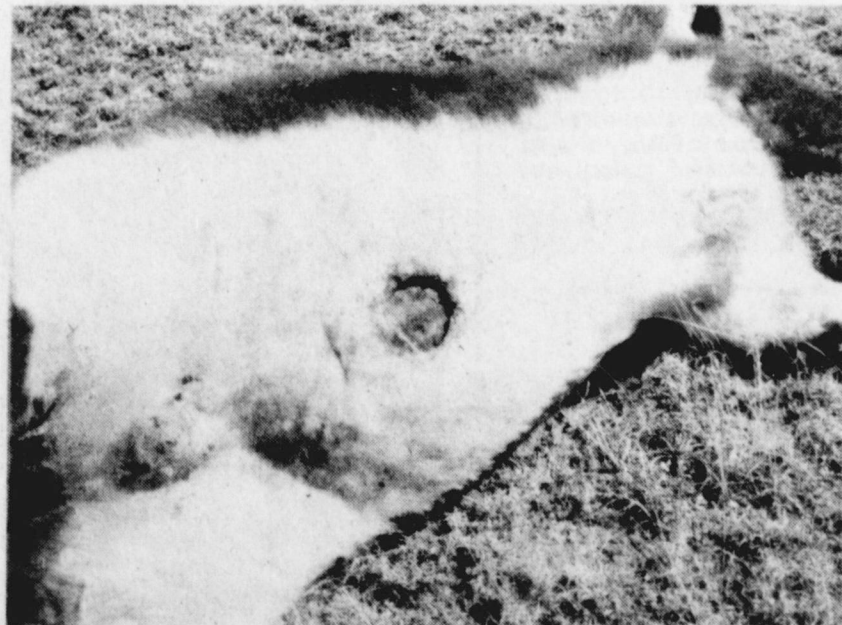

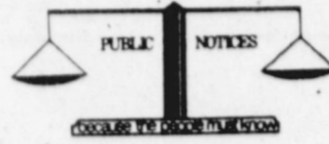

### NOTICE OF INTENT TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated of 5652 East Dayton Avenue, Fresno, California, 93727, who holds License No. 2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in a weather modification operation designed to increase rainfall and decrease hailfall, for and on behalf of Better Weather

Incorporated, Littlefield, Texas, and will conduct such a program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated, shall include portions of the counties of Deaf Smith, Randall, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Cochran, Hockley, and Lubbock.  
2. The target area, within which rainfall augmentation and hailfall suppression is intended to occur, can be described as follows:

The boundary of the target area shall be a line beginning at a point of origin at Littlefield, Lamb County, Texas and running northwest along Highway 84 to its intersection with Road 37 near Amherst; thence due west on Road 37 to its intersection with Road 303; thence due north on Road 303 to Sudan; thence northwesterly along Highway 84 to its intersection with the western boundary of Lamb County; thence due north through Lazbuddie to Highway 86; thence easterly on Highway 86 to the western boundary of Castro County; thence due north along the western boundary of Castro County to the southern boundary of Deaf Smith County; thence due east along the southern boundary of Deaf Smith County and Randall County to a point approximately four miles west of Happy in Swisher County; thence due south along Road 1424 through Edmonson to its intersection with Highway 87 near Hale Center; thence southerly along Highway 87 to Abernathy; thence westerly along the southern boundary of Hale County to the southeast corner of Lamb County; thence four miles south along the eastern boundary of Hockley County; thence due west to Road 168 south of Anton; thence northwest to a point three miles east of Highway 385; thence north to a point on Highway 84; thence northwest along Highway 84 to the point of origin at Littlefield.

3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of approximately 2,200 square miles, include a 5 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the aerial application of silver iodide or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

5. The program may be operational at various times throughout the period from 23 April 1975 through 30 October 1975.

He said that, contrary to information received on previous mutilations where there was supposedly removal of the sexual organs, that this was not true with these two animals. He had cut into both of them and determined that those organs were still in place.

In an interview Wednesday morning with Dr. Bob Lawdermilk, DVM, in Morton, he stated that in order to determine the cause of death in an animal of that size it is necessary to make an autopsy within 8-10 hours. After that the tissues begin to decompose and little or no information can be gained. He further stated that there is no way anyone can look at such an animal and determine whether or not it has any blood in it (it has been stated from several sources that the two steers in question had no blood in them). Dr. Lawdermilk stated that the animal would have to be opened up and the heart and artery system inspected to see if blood were present. After only a short time the blood begins to clot and if there is no open wound the animal will not bleed, he said.

It was learned by the Tribune late Wednesday that there will probably be an autopsy performed on one or both of these steers, though what can be learned from it at this late date is problematical.

consolidation was enrollment. It seems that the present 67 average daily attendance at Bula School is the lowest in recent history.

Another reason he cited was the class sizes. Grades one, two and 11 have only one student enrolled.

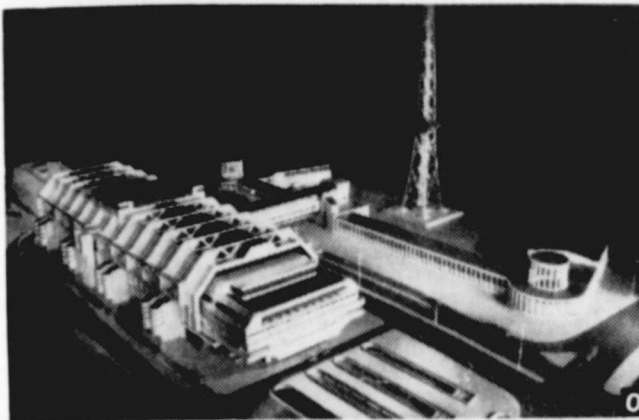
Program limitation is the third reason for considering consolidation. Due to the declining enrollment, it is estimated that there will be only 15 students in High School next year. This would result in the loss of the Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics program and make the athletic programs difficult to maintain.

Increase tax load on the property owners was the fourth reason Sinclair cited. He said that because of the declining enrollment and declining state aid it would be necessary to increase taxes for the 1975-76 school year.

The fifth reason the superintendent stated was the efficient operation of the school would become more difficult as the enrollment declined because the present program is geared to handle twice as many students as they have now which makes it more expensive.

Sinclair said he was hoping for prompt action on the annexion because teacher contracts must be considered prior to April 1 and some teachers may be retained to teach at Threeway. Also, the deadline for student transferring from one school to another is May 1 and textbooks must be requisitioned by April 1. Sinclair stated that there was no need for textbooks at Bula if consolidation takes place and in that event, Threeway's needs must be considered.

### Berlin May Get Vanishing Chairs



Imagine two huge auditoriums, each seating 2,500, separated by a common stage in the middle. Push a button: the flooring and all the seats in one auditorium glide up the wall and into the ceiling, like a rolltop desk, leaving the space open for exhibits. This is one of the innovations in a spectacular new Convention Center proposed for Berlin (West).

The building itself would be a four-level, 1050-by-260 ft. structure, linked by a passageway to the 100,000 sq. yds. of exhibit area in the 23 interconnecting buildings on the Berlin Fairgrounds under the city's 292-ft. radio tower. Aside from the two major auditoriums mentioned, there would be a 1,000-seat auditorium, 80 conference rooms each accommodating 10 to 380 persons, and a banquet hall for 3,000.

The new facility would enhance Berlin's role as a convention city that already ranks tenth in worldwide popularity: last year it hosted 376 conventions and conferences, plus 24 fairs and exhibitions with participants from 93 nations and 1.3 million visitors.

Meanwhile, Berlin (West) has already scheduled some 600 regional and international meetings for 1975. Most of these will be held in the existing Kongresshalle, itself one of the best convention halls in Europe. Designed by Hugh A. Stubbins of Cambridge, Mass., working with Berlin architects W. Duettmann and F. Mocken, it was donated to Berlin by Philadelphia's Benjamin Franklin Institute in 1958.



### This Is Free Enterprise?

One of the surprising aspects of the current scene is the fact that so many people in high official position talk about the virtues of free enterprise, and then advocate all kinds of measures at the taxpayers' expense when a presumably free enterprise gets into trouble.

The taxpayers have witnessed the Federal government coming to the rescue of ailing railroads, aircraft builders, and other operations. It has also been reported that when a big national retail chain was on the ropes, the Federal Reserve Board loaned on a number of banks to keep it afloat.

Now, as is well known, when a farmer goes broke, or a small business goes broke, it is put on the auction block, and if there is a reason for the existence of that farm or business, somebody comes along and takes it over and often operates it successfully.

It has been long standing dogma of the National Federation of Independent Business that free enterprise is a two way street. Freedom of opportunity does not mean guarantees, as under a free enterprise system there is also freedom to go broke.

It is most difficult to see, under free enterprise, why the taxpayers should bail out, for example, an ailing railroad.

There are only a few reasons why such an enterprise should go broke. One is that it serves no National Federation of Independent Business

no useful purpose. In that case, it should be abandoned.

But if it does serve a useful purpose, then the problem is one of poor management, and this is a problem that the stockholders and investors should have attacked with new management long before the enterprise got into trouble.

But, if there has been a failure to take the proper steps, and the enterprise is in hock up to its neck, then the only logical solution is to put it on the block to the highest bidder.

At a new lower price, it is then possible for the new owner to turn the enterprise around into a profitable operation, whereas merely compounding excessive debt with more debt aggravates the problem.

Of course, investors and lenders lose in this procedure, but on the other hand, if they failed to use caution, they have only themselves to blame and should not expect the taxpayers to take care of them.

There is no substitute for free enterprise, and all independent business people know if they cannot make their operations work, they had better remedy the conditions, or sell out to somebody who can make the enterprise succeed.

One thing independent business people know for sure. There is no way that the taxpayers will be tapped to keep their doors open.

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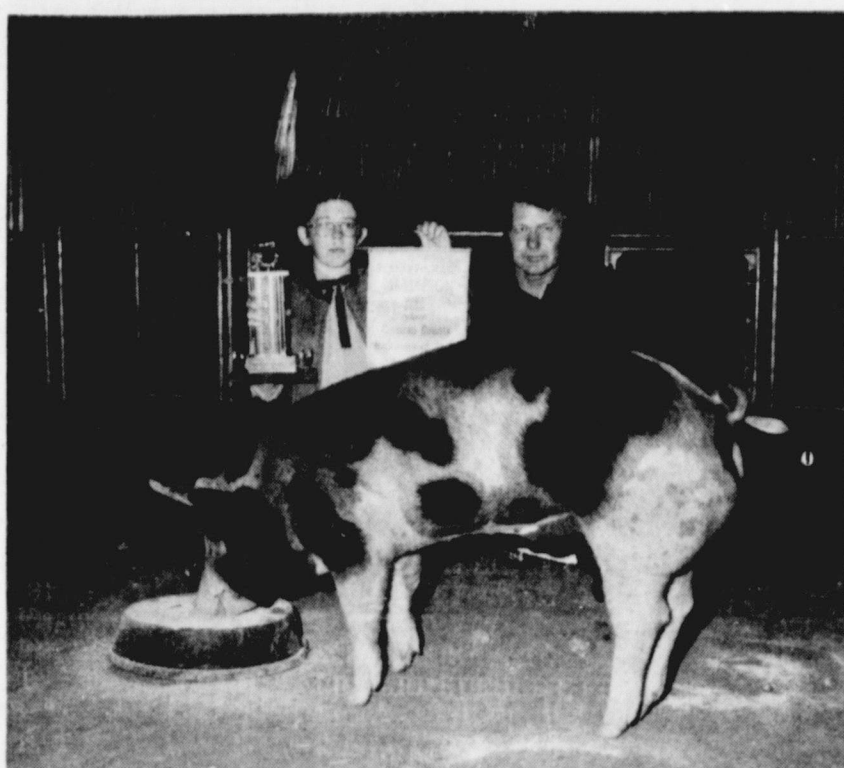
