## Mackenzie Lake Site To Open May 1

TULIA (Special) - Mackenzie Lake in Tule Canyon in Briscoe County will be opened to the public May 1 for fishing, camping, hiking and picnicking, according to Rod Hill of Tulia, member of the Mackenzie Water Authority board and publicity chairman for the opening.

"No boating will be allowed yet," he said, "because the water in the lake is not up to the boat ramp."

The authority will provide some camping facilities and hook-ups for travel trailers. A few tables and canopies for picnicking and toilets will be available. No swimming facilities are provided.

Since the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department started stocking fish in the lake about a year and a half ago, 180,000 fish have been stocked, including trout, black bass, channel and blue catfish and crappie. Some perch, sunfish and black bass are native to Tule Creek.

A fee for entering the grounds of the lake and dam will be charged at the one entrance to the municipal water project. Hill said the fee had not been determined but probably will be \$1 per person. The money will be used for upkeep and future development of the recreational area.

Hill said the water authority board will be extremely busy between now and opening date in order to get everything ready. "People have been wanting to get in for a long time," he stated. "We would like to have more water there, but decided we might as well go ahead and let people fish and

necessary we can re-stock." The water is 42 feet at the dam. Hill adds.

Board members so far have made no definite plans for the opening day, but may have such events as tag fishing.

Lots at the lakeside are not ready for purchase. Carl E. Williams of Hale Center, Hale County surveyor, was hired to survey lots south of the dam, but after the survey, the soil was found to be unsuitable for septic tanks, and therefore for cabins. Hill stated lots would now have to be surveyed north of the dam where the soil is suitable.

Jim Green manager of Mackenzie Lake, and his wife and two children moved the latter part of February into the new home built for him at the facility. The three-bedroom brick residence is connected by a breezeway to a new office for Green and his assistant, Gary Martin of Silverton. The house is located about 300 yards northwest of the gate entrance.

Although the \$2,600,000 project is in a picturesque natural setting is expected some day to be a prime recreation area, it was built primarily to provide municipal water for Floydada, Lockney, Silverton, and Tulia. The dam, following the outline of the canyon, is 10 miles northwest of Silverton and about 30 miles northeast of Tulia.

Ground breaking for the project took place in September 1972 and the dam was completed and accepted by the Mackenzie Water Authority from the contractor, Gilvin-Terrell Construction Co. of Amarillo August 26, 1974.

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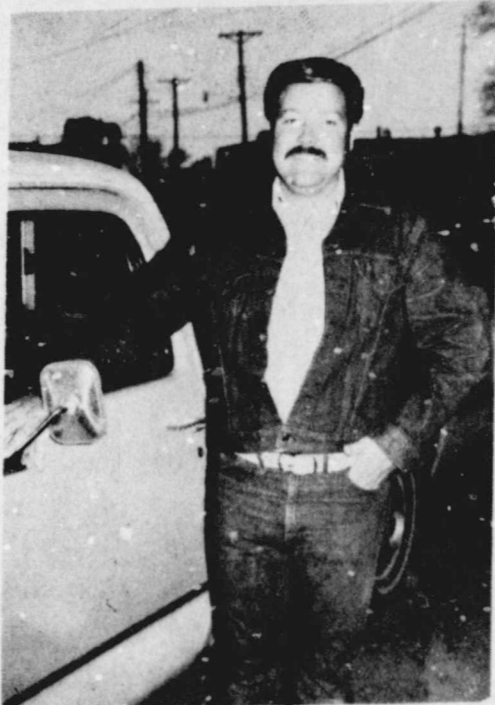

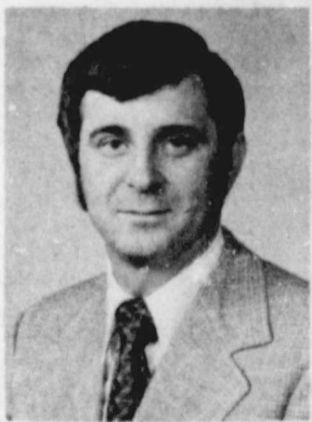

A Home from a series of Heritage Homes, described by members of the Home Furnishings homemaking quarter class in observance of the Bicentennial year.

The estate of Washington Irving is known as Sunnyside. You might remember a few of Irvings sketches such as "Rip Van Winkle" and "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow."

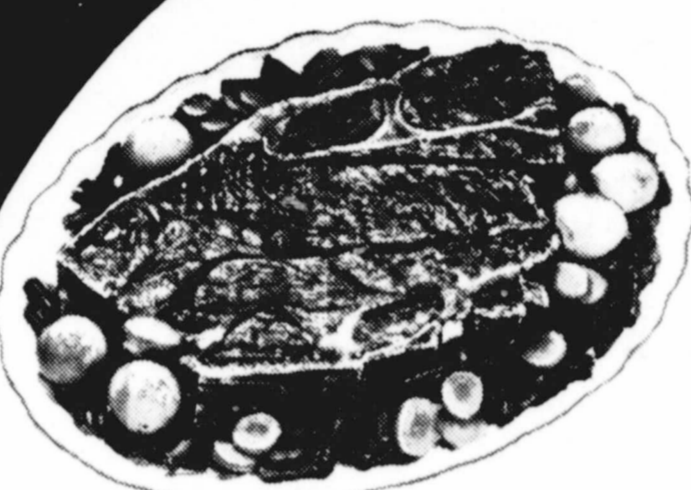

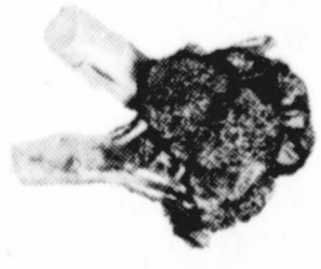

## Area I Young Farmers Meet

The Area I Young Farmer Field Day was held Saturday, March 27 in Spur and was sponsored by the Spur Young Farmers.

Tours were made of the Spur Ranch on cattle breeding and at the Spur Experiment Station which is similar to that at Halfway.

One of the particularly interesting subjects was that of a new breed of dog "Comadore". This is a type of coyote dog and yet very different than the ones most are familiar with. These are large dogs and usually mean and very protective. The dogs are placed in a large pasture and placed where cattle are kept and the dogs are fed, tended to and cared for at its locations. The claims are that where these dogs live and tend are "off limits" to coyotes—in other words, the coyotes smell the dog and won't even cross the pasture but go around it in fear of the dog. Of course, this is in an experimental stage in Spur as well as the state of Montana. This is an governmental program but could prove very practical over the old ways of "coyote hunting".

## Rules Set For Fishing License

LUBBOCK -The purchase of a Texas sportfishing license for \$4.25 opens the tackle box for anglers after bass, crappie, catfish or one of the other 208 species of freshwater fish in our state. Texas has over 29 million acre-feet of conservation water storage in over 160 reservoirs. These reservoirs have over 5,000 acre-feet capacity and are located from the Texas Panhandle to Brownsville.

Most of these acres of freshwater support fish with several lakes furnishing a variety of species including exotic fish such as the northern pike, rainbow trout or walleye.

Reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists indicate a good year for 1976 but before you pack your family and fishing gear into the station wagon and head for the open water, check for that new 1976 Texas fishing license.

This license is required of all persons who fish in the waters of Texas with the exception of those: under 17 years of age; over 65 years of age; fishing in private waters; fishing in county of residence with trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or winding device attached; holding a valid Texas commercial fishing license or holders of a \$.25 exempt fishing license for the blind.

This Texas sportfishing license is valid for one year from the date of issue. You do not have to have expensive fishing gear to go along with that new fishing license. Large fish are caught each year by anglers using a jug line, trotline or throwline. Regulations for this type of fishing along with county regulations are listed in the 1975-76 guide to Texas hunting and sport fishing available at all P&WD offices and most sporting goods stores.

The fringe benefits that go along with angling include setting up a tent and cooking those fish over an open fire in designated areas along our lakes or you can fish in comfort in one of the air conditioned barges or fishing docks in operation on most major lakes.

The crappie spawning season in spring is one of the highlights of the fishing year and anglers reap a harvest of these good eating fish weighing up to two and one-half pounds.

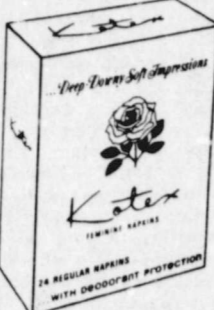
