THE TOPIC OF our last week's column as regards the possible elimination of cooperative and vocational courses in the public schools has been much under discussion lately, especially at the recent Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show.

There seems to be another matter dealing with the education reform bill, dealing with consolidation of schools of under 500 students.

We do not have sufficient information on this matter to make serious comment, except to say that if this is a serious proposition, a number of schools in our area could face the possibility of consolidation, with the additional hardship of bussing students to a larger school.

It appears more and more that the residents of rural areas such as ours are having their way of life threatened by legislation, and it behooves people more than ever to contact their elected officials, all the way up to the governor, to let them know how they stand on the issues.

We plan to have a listing of the elected state officials who represent local residents, along with their mailing addresses, to help our readers who wish to contact these representatives.

THE JUNIOR Livestock Shows are over on the local level for another year, and local students were highly successful in the recent county show.

It seemed to this observer that the premium sale at the county show was much better than last year, with animals going for much better prices in each division.

For the second year, the owner of the Grand Champion Goat in the show (Shannon Cochran in this instance), donated his animal to be auctioned off, with the proceeds going for the upkeep of the showbarn.

The animal was sold and re-sold a total of 17 times. Our tally showed that a total of \$2,840 was raised for this purpose, which is a nice gesture on behalf of the stock show people. The show facility is kept up by the City of Friona, and it, like most governmental agencies, is never overly plush with money to put into such facilities.

Those bidding on the goat, and donating to the upkeep fund included Bovina Feeders, Parmer County Implement Co., Black Grain, Diane and Carrie Tatum, A.L. Black, Herring Implement Co., and Leroy Berend.

Area Slowly Pulling Out Of Deep Freeze

The Friona area has been struggling all week to get out of the Arctic deep-freeze that fastened its grip on the area late last week.

The official low fell to its lowest point of the season on Saturday morning, February 4, when the mercury dipped to four degrees below zero. It was -2 on Sunday, marking three consecutive days below zero.

For a 96-hour period, from about noon last Wednesday, until early Sunday, the temperature

IN JR. LIVESTOCK SHOW

Friona Youngsters Win Four Titles

When Dana Berend showed her 1254-pound Chianina crossbred steer to the grand champion honors in the final event of the 1985 Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show, it allowed Friona exhibitors to make history in the county show.

Never since the show was expanded in 1982 had one community won as many as four county titles in the show. Dana did her part, by exhibiting the grand champion heifer as well, giving her two of the four titles.

Chad Rhodes, 12-year-old Friona 4-H Club youngster, capped a successful day for Friona showmen in the barrow show on Friday by winning the grand champion barrow honors with his Hampshire entry.

It was only the third time in 25 years for a Friona youngster to exhibit the county's barrow champion, and eighth time overall in the show's 38-year history.

Shannon Cochran had kicked off Friona's banner run by winning the second-ever countywide goat show last Thursday night in the show's opening day.

The barrow show was dominated for the second straight year by Friona youngsters, who won four of the seven breed titles. They had won five titles in the 1984 show, but lost in the grand championship drive to Susan Redwine of Lazbuddie.

Breed champion honors were won by Dana Berend in the Duroc division; Daylen Gallman in the Chester White division; Melanie Gallman in the Yorkshire division and by Rhodes in the Hampshire division.

Rhodes' win extended the Hampshire breed's lead in barrow championships in the county show. It was the 11th win by a Hampshire. Durocs are second with eight titles.

Vandi Tarter of Lazbuddie, a former winner (1980) in the show, claimed the reserve champion banner in the barrow show with her 240-pound hog which was named champion in the crossbreed division.

Miss Berend had "book-end" champions on Saturday. She won the county heifer title in the first judging class on Saturday morning, and Shane Mason of Lazbuddie took reserve champion honors.

Miss Berend made it a clean sweep in the steer show, as another of her entries, a 1345-pound red crossbreed was tapped for "reserve champion" honors. Her steers had

been named champion and runnerup in the "exotic cross" division of the show, as the steer judging was divided somewhat differently than in past years.

Zed Stewart of Bovina had the breed champion in the English cross division of the show, and Shane Mason of Lazbuddie had the reserve breed champ.

Other barrow breed champions were shown by Mendy Rhodes of Bovina, a first cousin to Chad Rhodes, in the Polands & Spots division; and by Carl Hutchins of Farwell in the Berkshire division.

Reserve breed champ "spot" barrow was exhibited by Shelley Preston of Friona.

Other class winners in the steer show were Wendy Tatum of Friona in the heavyweight class, Exotic cross, and Tim Lust of Lazbuddie, in the lightweight class of the same division.

Buyers at the 1985 premium auction sale paid higher prices on the average than the animals brought at the 1984 sale.

Miss Berend's grand champion steer was purchased by Parmer County Implement Company, for \$3 per pound.

Rhodes' grand champion barrow was bought by D.L.'s Thriftway for \$3.50 per pound.

Tracy Moore of Bovina, who exhibited the grand champion

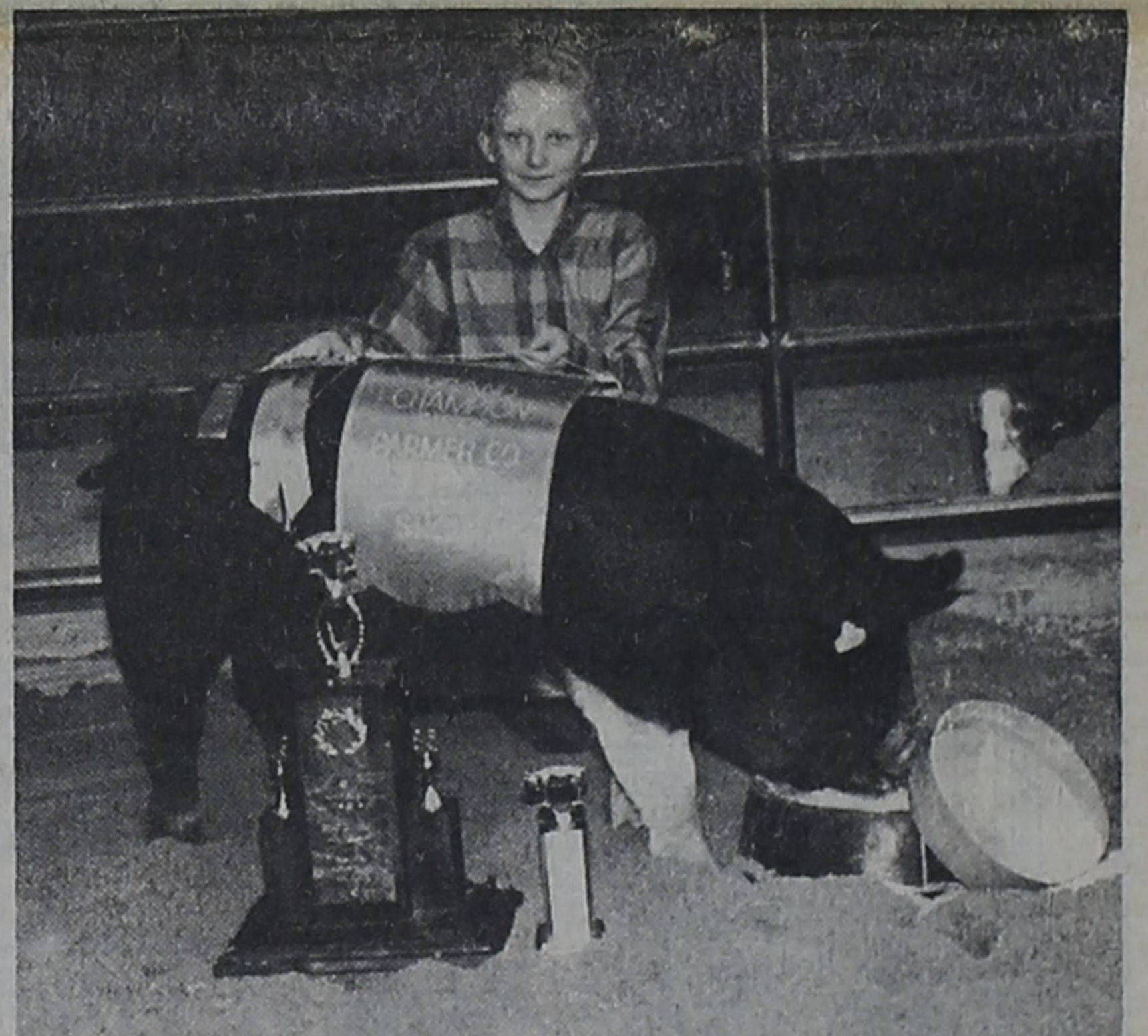
lamb on the show's opening day, sold her animal at auction to Friona Industries, at a high bid of \$4 per pound.

For the first time, showmanship competition was initiated, with certain entrants selected to participate in a showmanship class. Both junior and senior showmen were selected.

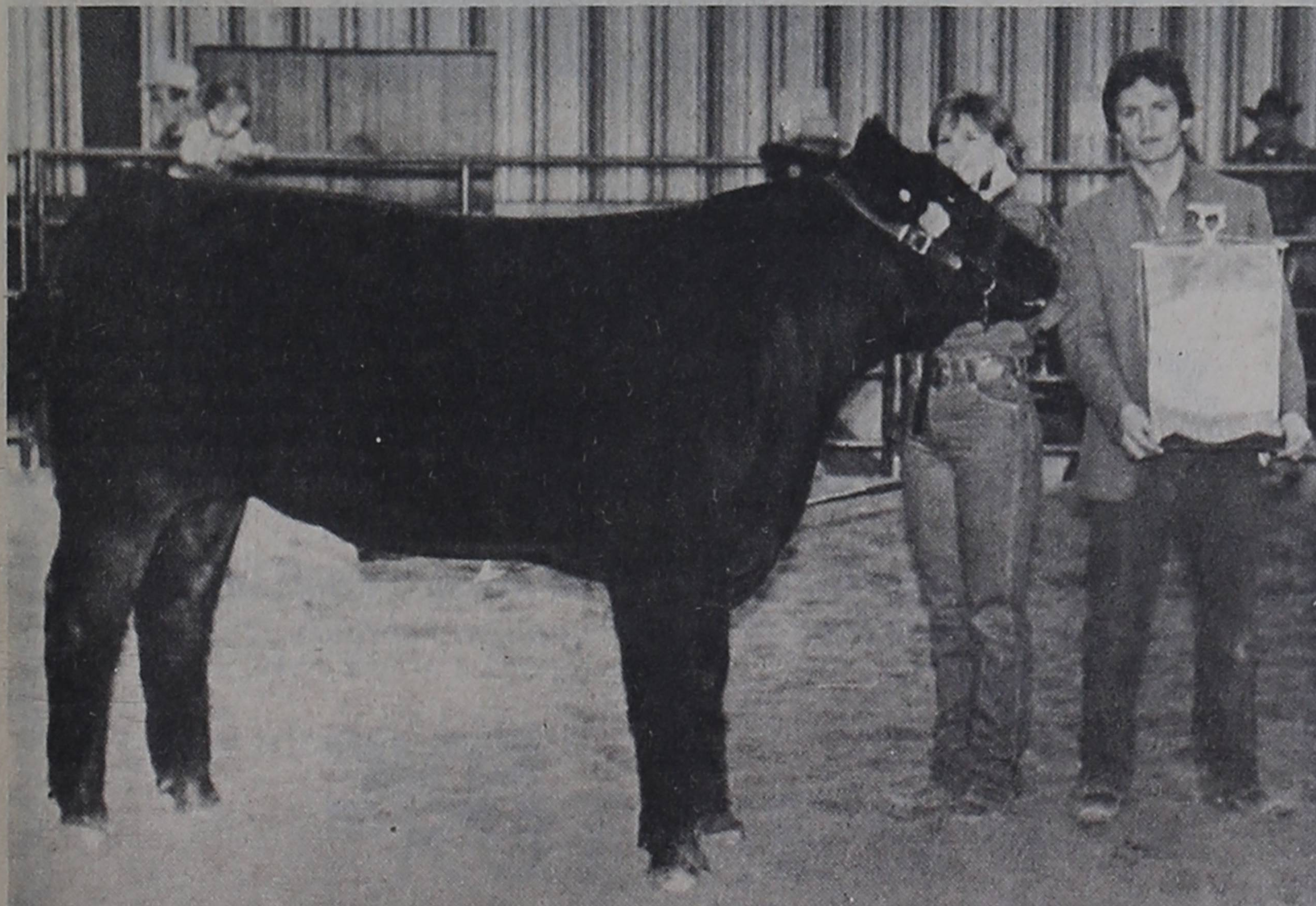
Showmanship honors were won by juniors: Kassie Weatherley, Friona, steers; Sheldon Mason, Lazbuddie, heifers; Dustee Gee, Friona, barrows; Joanna Clayton, Bovina, lambs and goats; seniors: Dana Berend, Friona, steers and heifers; Misti Boozer, Bovina, barrows; Michael Elam, Friona, lambs; and Kevin Owen, Farwell, goats.

Another highlight of the auction sale was the "tournament auction" of the Grand Champion Goat, with the animal being sold 17 different times, raising \$2840 to be used for the showbarn maintenance fund (see further comments and details in the "Star Lites" column).

Also, the "Cow Patty Bingo" promotion, which was a fundraiser for the Parmer County 4-H Council, involved the Grand Champion steer in a final performance. Jack Patterson had purchased the square on which the show's top steer opted to "do his thing," and won the prize.

55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 14, 1930
Operations tending toward the growth of Friona are manifested in the addition being built to the J.C. Wilkison residence, and also an additional room to one of the R.H. Kinsley houses. Brick layers are also making rapid progress on the new Truitt-Landrum building at the corner of Sixth Street and Euclid Avenue, which will be occupied by the R.B.R. Implement Co. as soon as it is completed.

50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 15, 1935
From J.W. White's column: "Lots of people have expressed surprise in the fact that I am a tobacco 'addict,' since they have never seen me smoking. However, nevertheless, the fact remains that I do. But I have two hang-outs and I have a pipe at each place and there is where I do most of my smoking, for I seldom smoke only when I am by myself or with somebody."

45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 16, 1940
Carl Bender, local breeder of choice registered cattle, living a few miles southwest of Friona, has increased his already fine herd of registered Herefords, by the addition of two more choice cows which he recently purchased.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 16, 1945
A dairy improvement program is being sponsored for the Friona community by the FFA chapter. This program has received interest among the FFA boys, and has received the support of Leo Potishman of Fort Worth, owner of Transit Grain Company of that city and Santa Fe Grain Co. of Friona.

35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 10, 1950
Killed instantly in a car wreck eight and a half miles east of the city of Nowata, Oklahoma, on February 2, were Mr. and Mrs. Harrison G. Beene, ages 61 and 59, of Friona. Two persons in the second car were injured.

30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1955
Schoolman and civic worker, Dillie Kelley, was elected Tuesday evening as President of the Friona

Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for 1955. Kelley, an incoming director of the organization, replaces Dan Ethridge as president. Effective as of yesterday, irrigation well permits for Parmer County will be issued from a Bovina office, due to action taken by the Parmer County Committee of the Hi-Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1960
Railroad officials blamed a "hot box" for the early morning train wreck in downtown Friona last Friday morning about 7:40 a.m. which stacked up loaded boxcars like cordwood at the crossing in Friona. Narrowly escaping damage, the wreck slid cars loaded with potash right up to the edge of the depot.

20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1965
Simultaneous district championships--something of a rarity at Friona High School--have been recorded by the boys and girls basketball teams, giving Friona two teams in the playoffs for the first time in 20 years. The Chiefs had a 17-game winning streak before Dimmitt snapped it in the final district game Tuesday, 48-41. The team is 20-4 for the season. The Squaws are 22-4. Both won district with 9-1 records.

15 YEARS AGO--FEB. 12, 1970
Details surrounding two new subdivisions for Friona were discussed at length at the regular monthly meeting of the Friona City Council Monday. Projects discussed were the annexation of the land on which the 60-unit apartment complex will be built, and a paving technicality on the new Hicks Addition.

10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 9, 1975
Maydie Hall, 59, and Mildred Simms, 64, of Sugar Creek, Missouri, were in satisfactory condition Friday in Parmer County Community Hospital, following a near head-on collision of two automobiles east of Friona Thursday.

Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Sisk of Friona received a letter recently from 1st. Lt. James D. Young of the U.S. Army in Germany, informing them that their son Royce A. Sisk, had earned a promotion. Royce was recently promoted to the rank of Specialist Fourth Class.

5 YEARS AGO--FEB. 10, 1980
Carrie Schueler, a Friona 4-H Club member, exhibited the Grand Champion Steer of the Friona Community Junior Livestock Show last weekend. Miss Schueler's entry was the winner in the lightweight class prior to being tapped for Grand Champion honors.

The Friona area experienced a wild day in the weather department on Thursday, February 7. The day started out with a light rain falling, and ended up with one of those mixtures of rain, sleet, hail and snow that only this area can produce--complete with an electrical storm.

G. Ford To Speak At WTSU

Gerald R. Ford, the thirty-eighth President of the United States, has agreed to speak for the inauguration of Dr. Ed Roach as seventh president of West Texas State University on February 9.

President Ford visited the campus of West Texas State in April of 1976. His return at this time will highlight an already impressive investiture ceremony scheduled to begin at 2 p.m. in Amarillo's Civic Center Auditorium on Saturday, February 9.

"Enthusiasm on campus is running high since the announcement of President Ford's selection," said Lila Vars, director of development and internal chair of the inauguration committee. "The presence of a speaker of such national prominence throws a spotlight on West Texas State University at a most opportune time, when we're celebrating both a proud heritage of 75 years and a new beginning under the leadership of Dr. Roach."

T. Boone Pickens, chairman of the WTSU Board of Regents, said, "I'm very pleased that President Ford is coming to West Texas State. President Ford and I have visited together in the past, and I know he shares the concerns we have for WTSU and for the future of higher education in our nation."

SPS Offers Scholarships

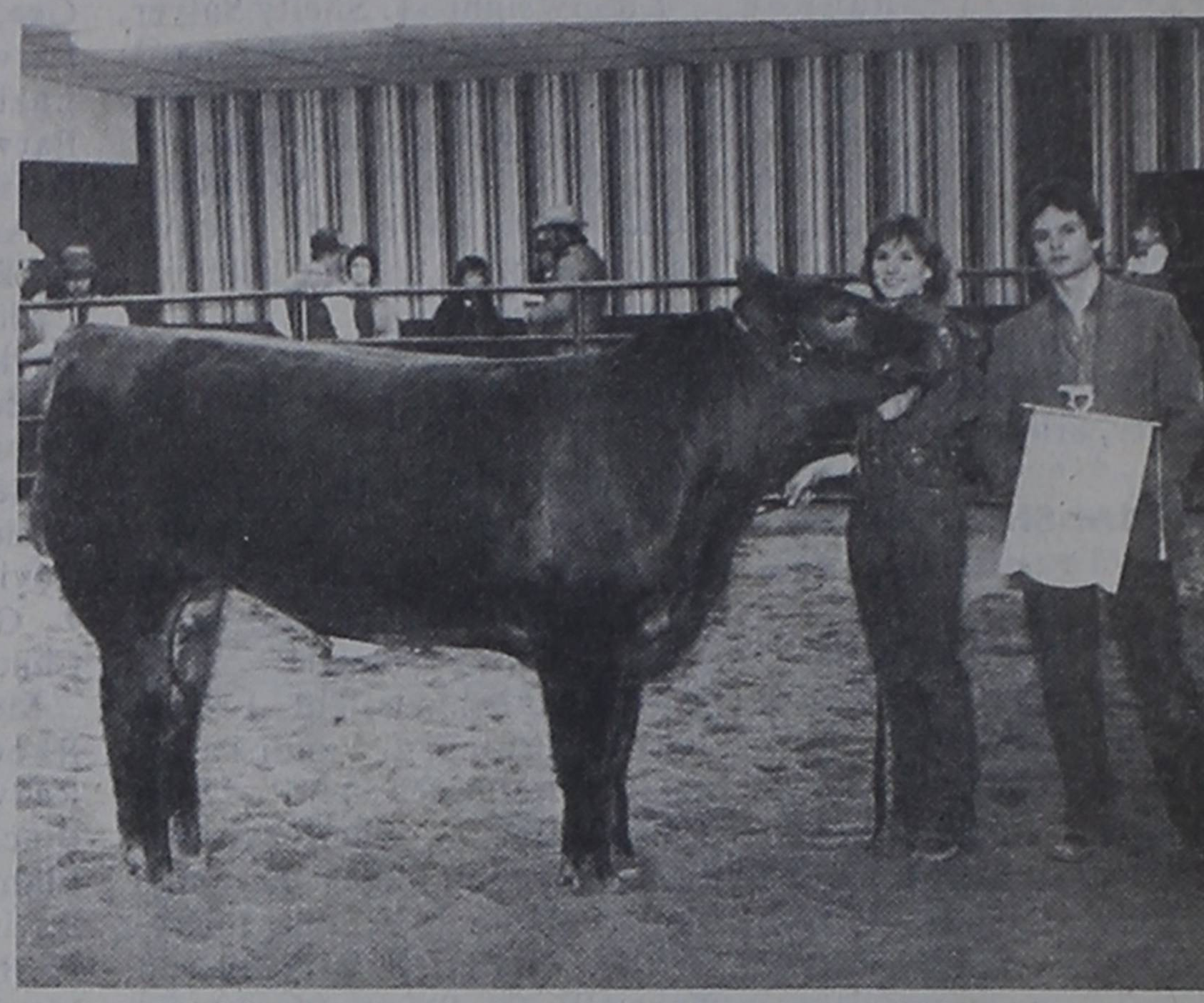

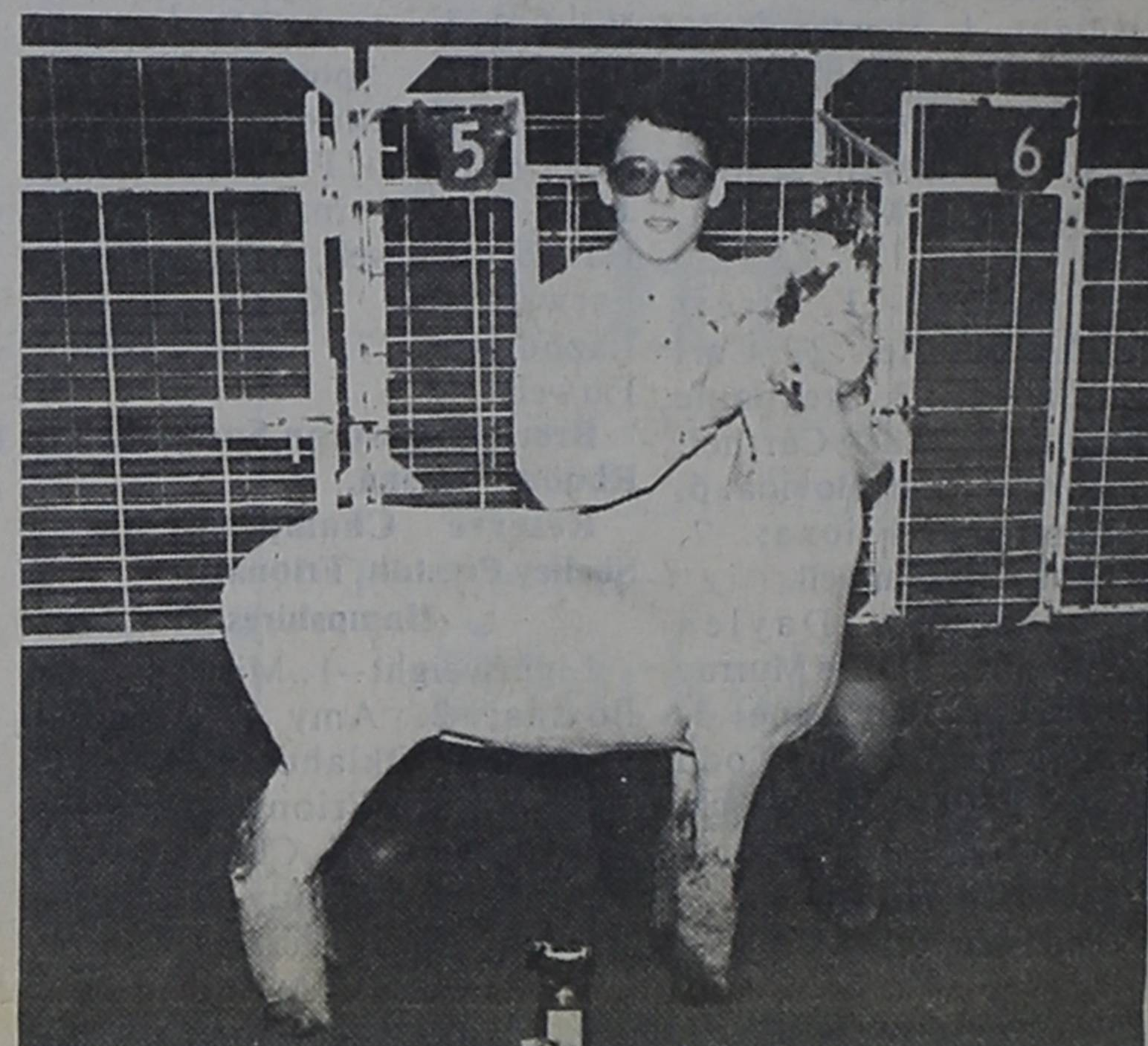

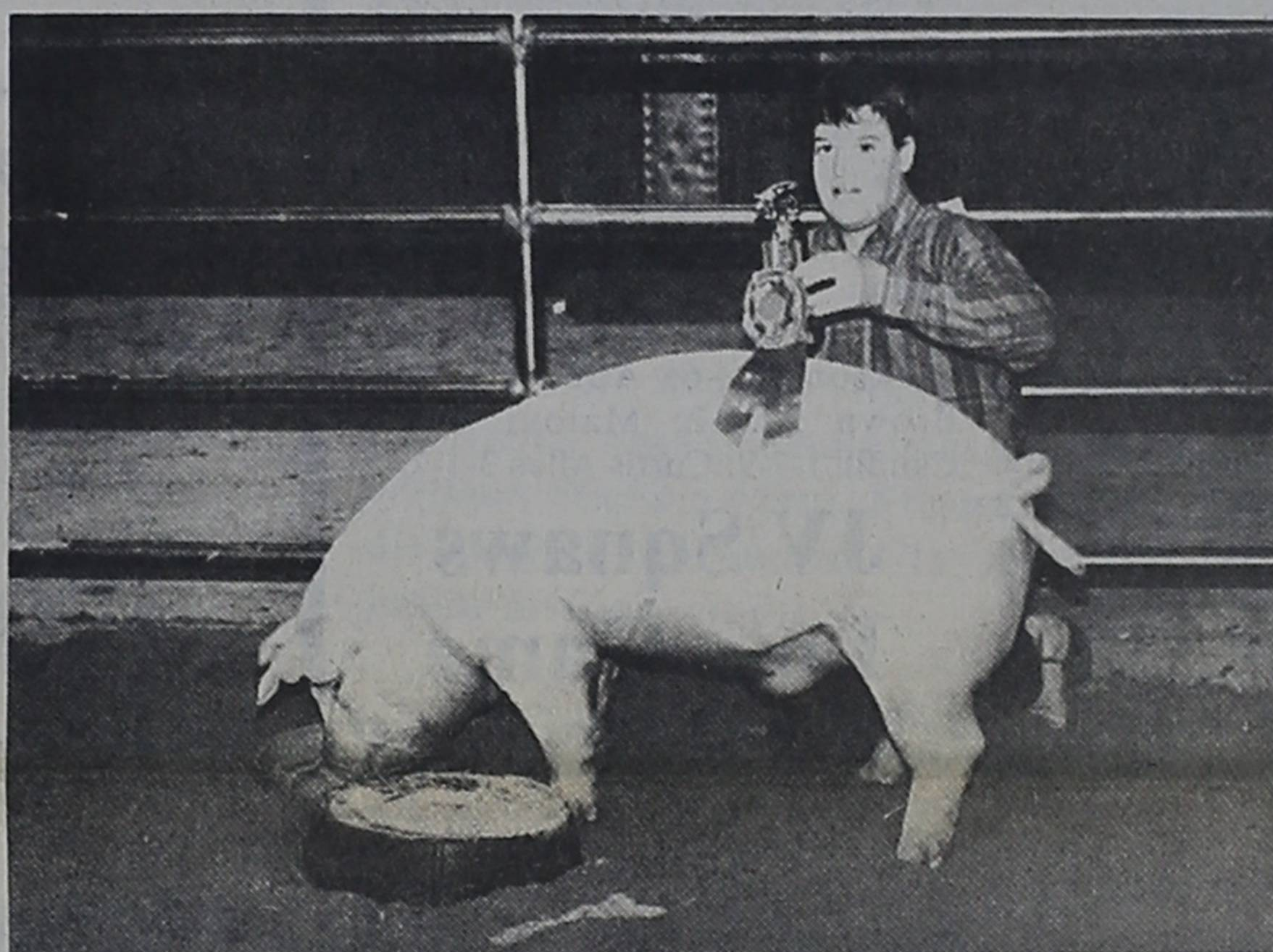

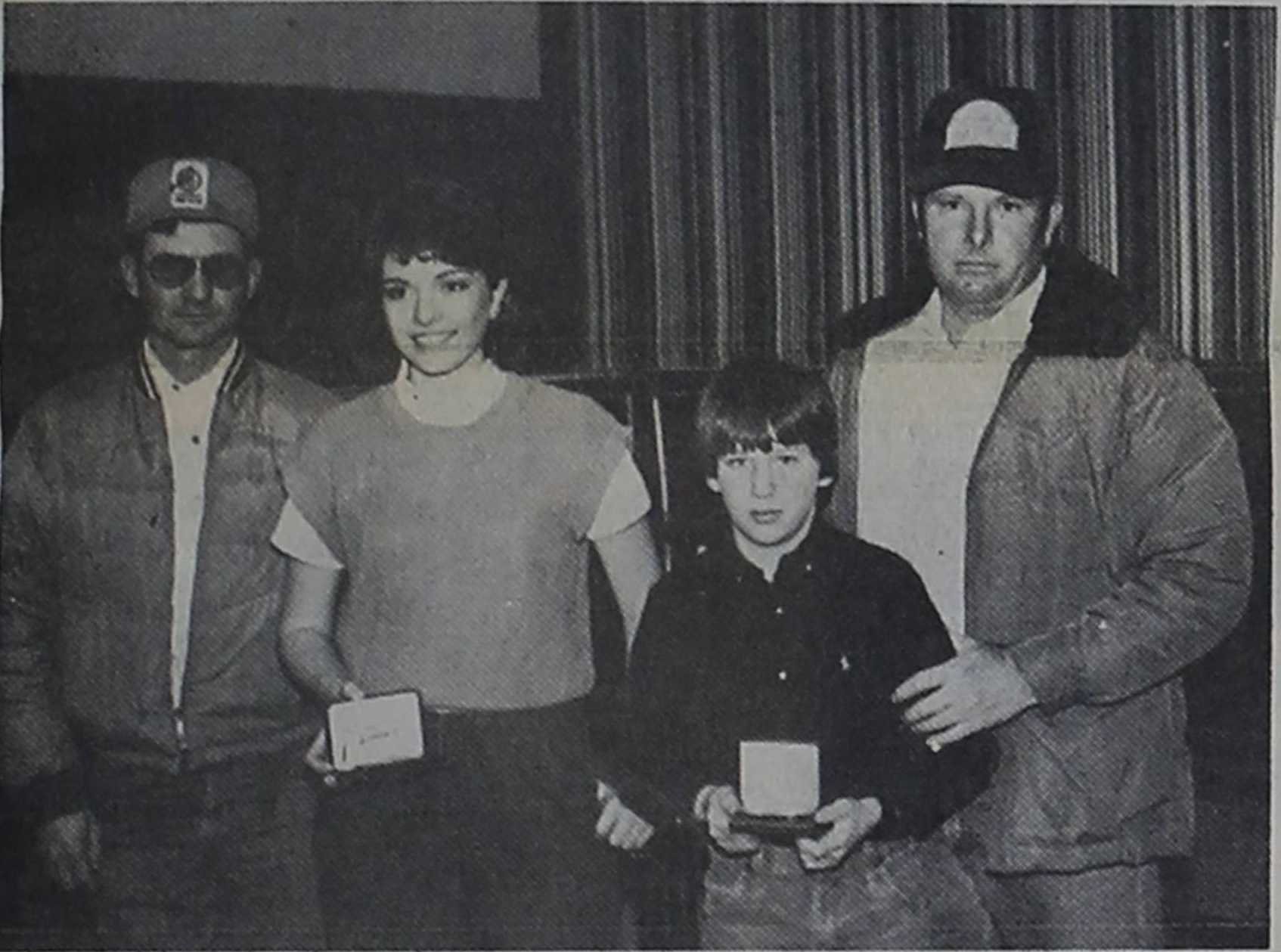

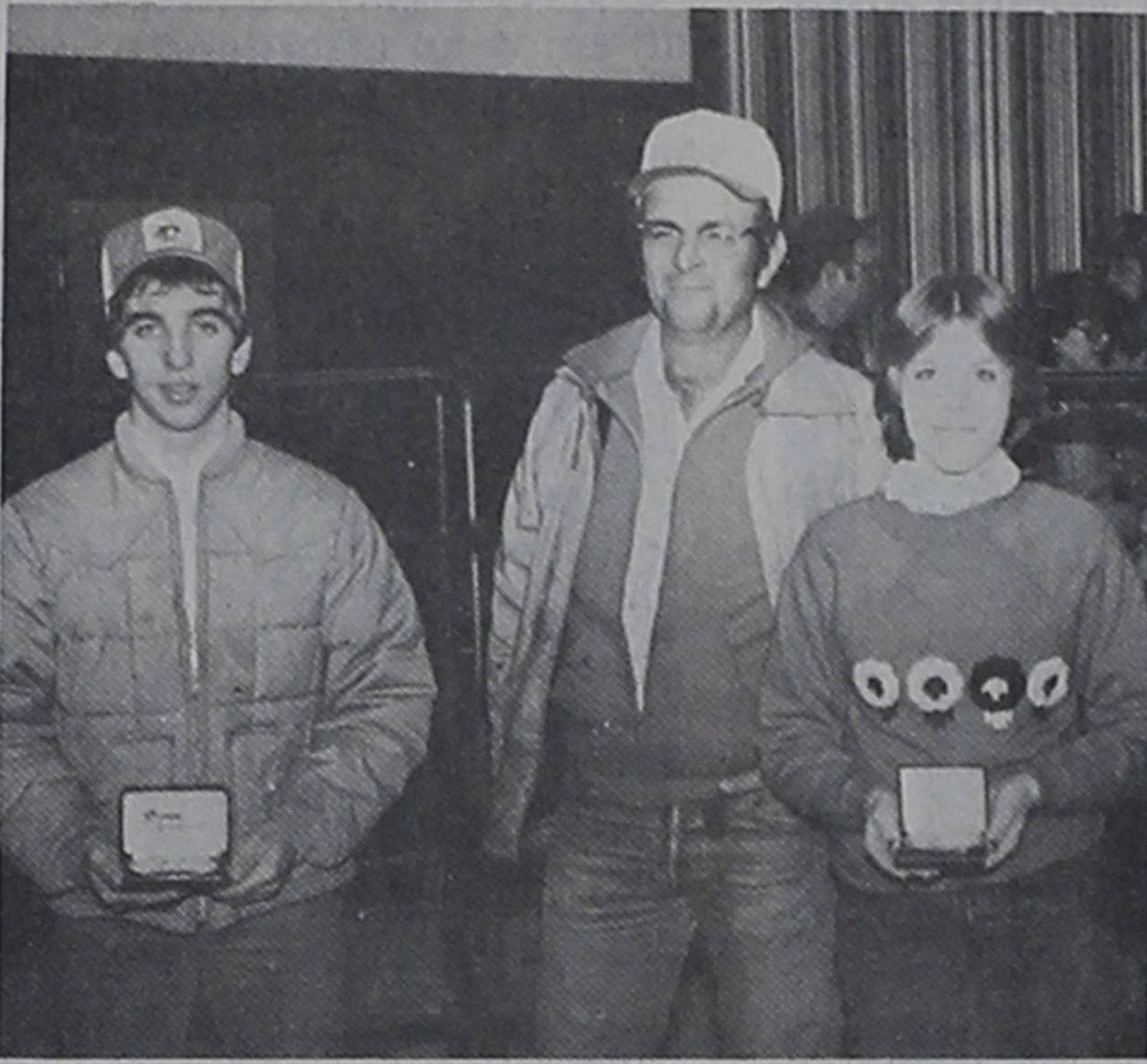
Hair and nail care for the residents is held every Tuesday morning and anyone that would like to come and help with this is invited to. There is always room for more volunteers to help on hair day.

A three row windbreak is normally sufficient to home or building if it has been properly planned. The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is holding a Windbreak Seminar, Wednesday, February 13 at 1:30 p.m. in the Community Room of Friona State Bank.

Bob Fewen of the Texas Forest Service will be on hand to discuss the different species of trees and conditions where they should be used. Speakers from the Soil Conservation Service will discuss planting techniques and applying water by drip irrigation.

Anyone interested in using trees for shelter belts, home landscaping, or Christmas tree production is urged to attend.

T.J. Sanchez and Bret Bronniman each scored ten points to lead the Braves' scoring.

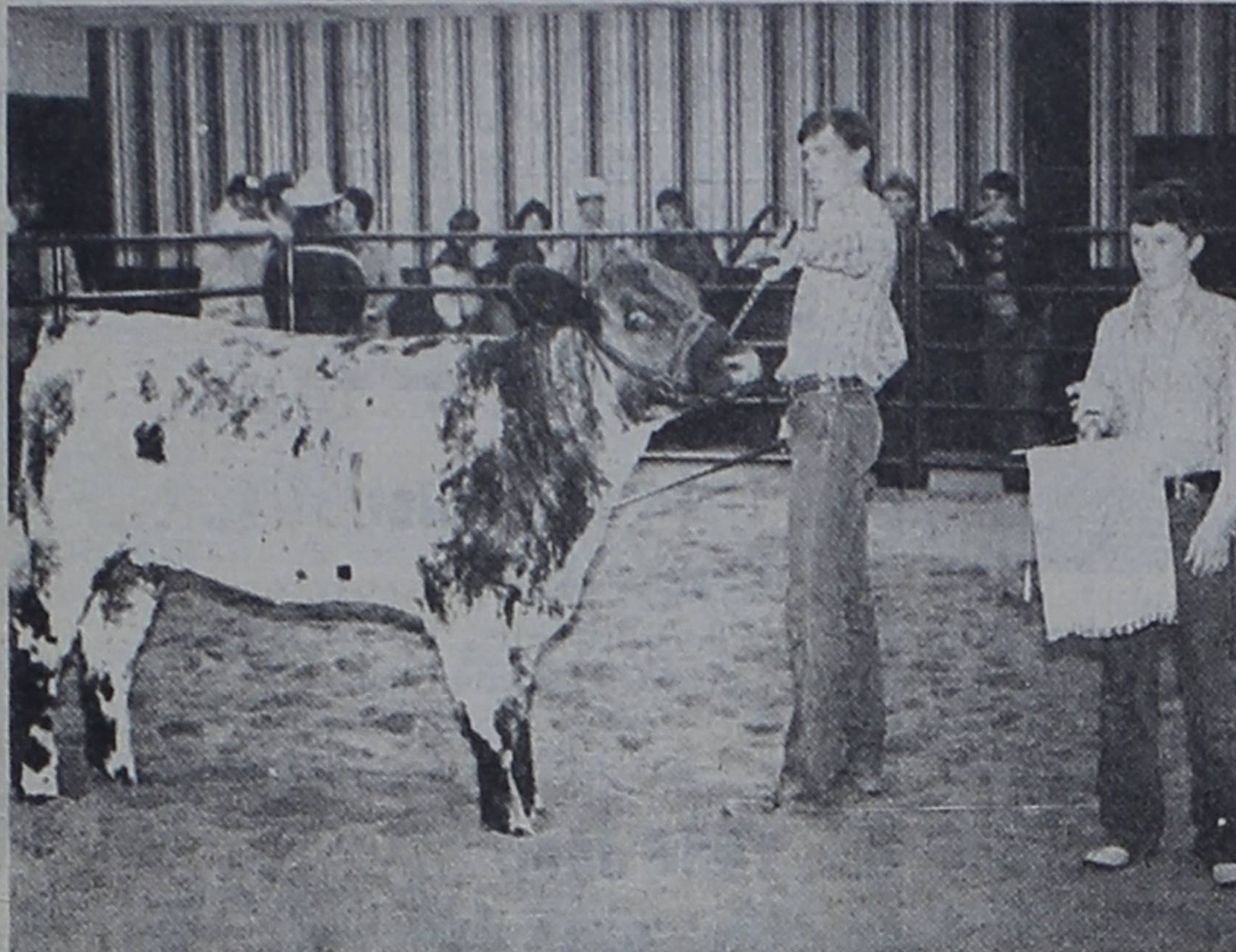

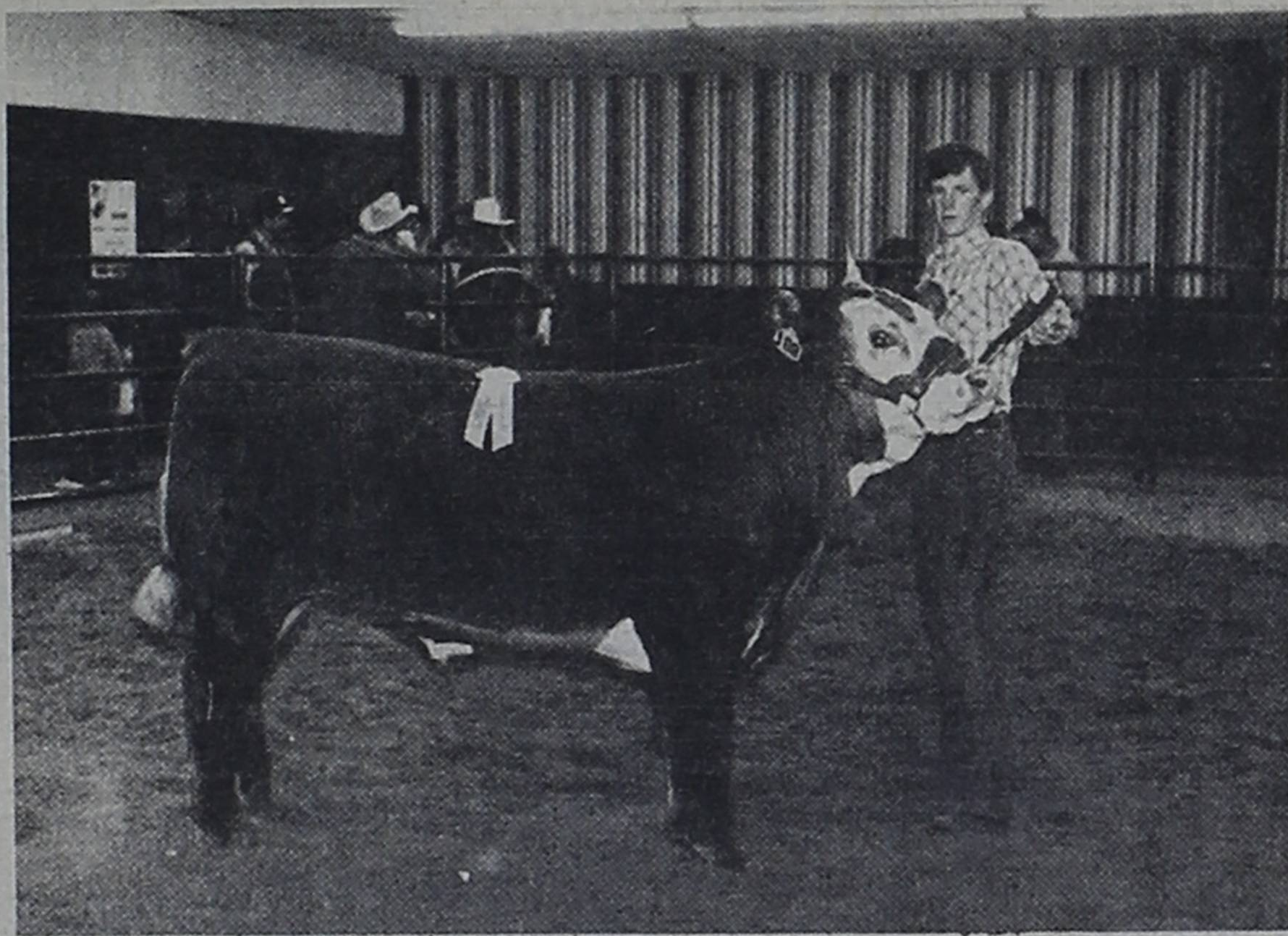

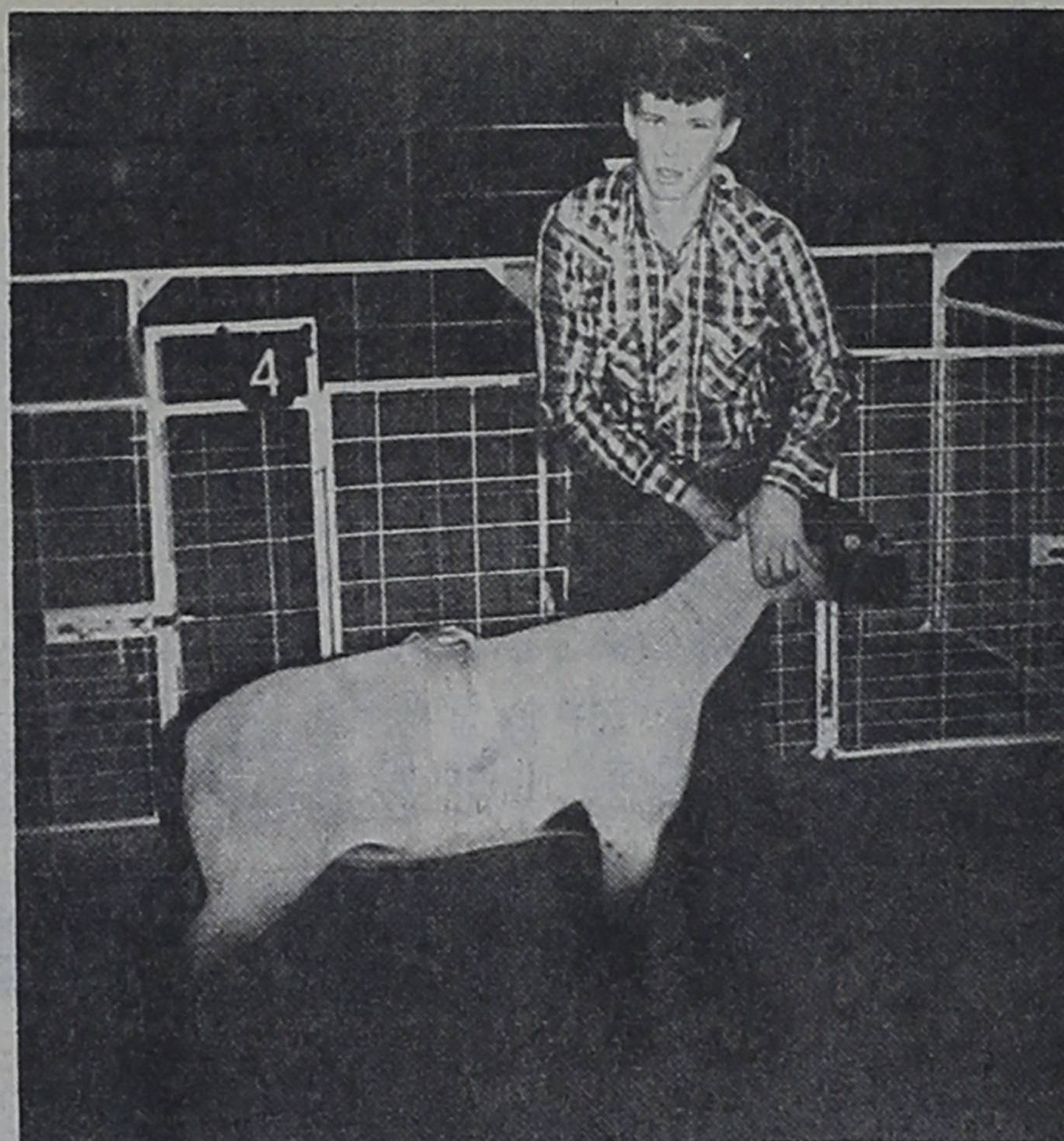

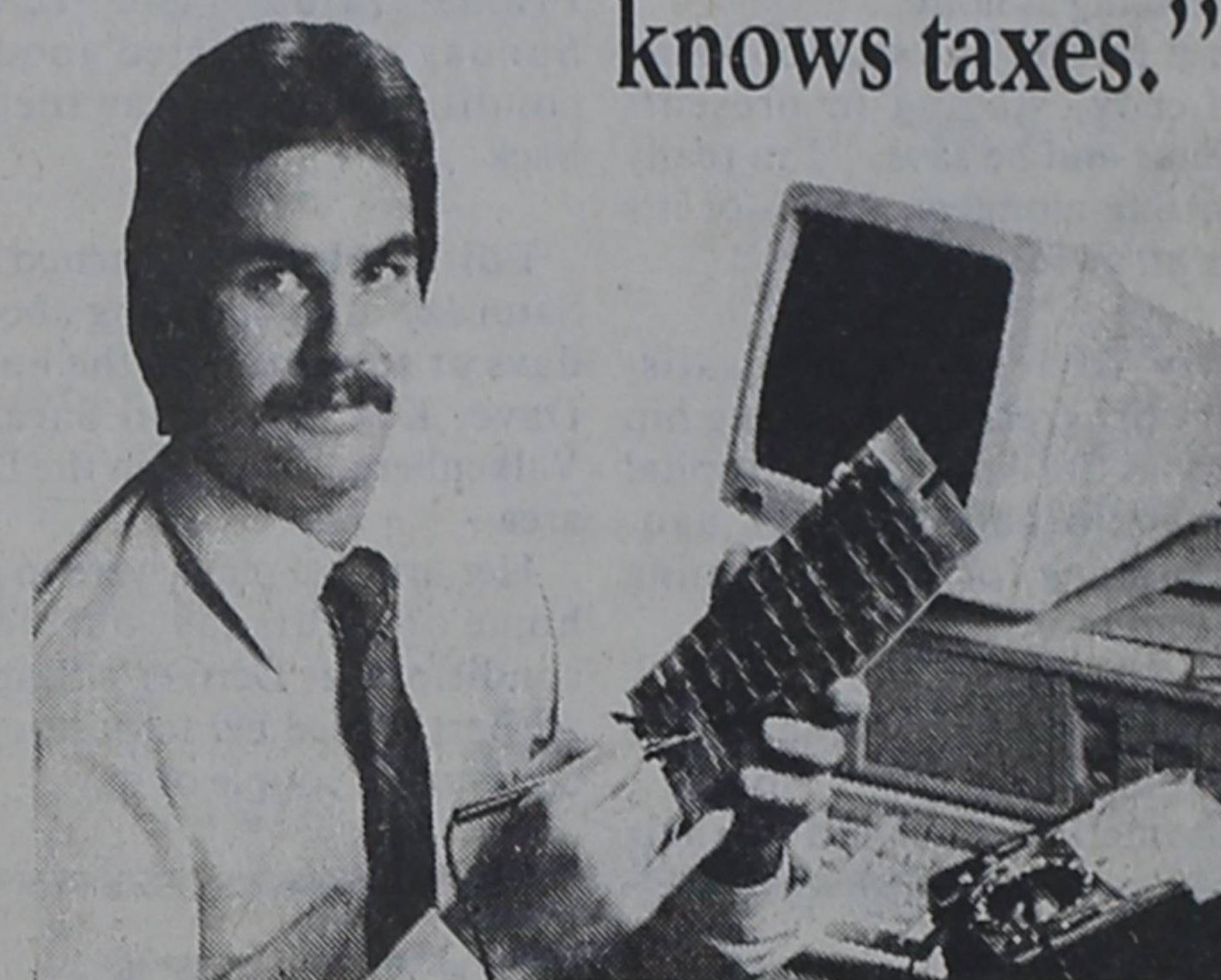
McMurry is a fully accredited four-year liberal arts college in Abilene. Established in 1923, McMurry is owned and operated by the Northwest Texas and New
