IS IT POSSIBLE that our next national holiday might be Elvis Presley's birthday??

As you know, if you have watched any television, or read any newspapers or magazines at all lately, the past week marked the 50th birthday of the late rock and roll star.

The Elvis "craze," which many people figured might have died out with the entertainer's death, is still alive and well, over seven years after Presley's death.

As a college freshman (sophomore?), at Texas Tech, yours truly and my best pal took our dates to see Elvis perform one weekend at the old Fair Park Coliseum in Lubbock.

Of all the personal appearances I've been able to see in my lifetime, I have to admit that that first Elvis concert failed to leave a lasting impression (maybe my friend and I were more interested in the girls?).

That was probably Presley's first Lubbock appearance, when he was a "good attraction," but nothing like the knock-down, drag-out crowds that he drew in later years, when you could have scalped your ticket for almost as much as a Dallas-Pittsburgh Super Bowl game admission.

Little did we realize at the time that we were watching the beginnings of one of the entertainment industry's legends. Presley, of course, became a top attraction for the recording industry, stage and screen, before his fast-living and drug problems pulled him down.

And we really can't make light of all the attention being paid to the late performer this week by the media, since on our family's first visit to Memphis, Tennessee, one of our first stops was a tour of Graceland, Presley's mansion. Graceland has become one of that city's main tourist attractions.

I suppose Presley's life--and death--are summed up in the old phrase which the British are prone to use: "The King is dead. Long live the King!"

MH/MR Will Open Branch Office Here

After several years' absence, the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center will have an office in Parmer County, thanks to the work of several interested citizens.

Charles Turner, director of the Parmer County Special Education Cooperative, and Gary Smith, pastor of Union Congregational Church, have done some legwork to get an office reopened in Friona.

Such an office is about to become a reality, thanks to the donation of a location by H.K. (Pudge) Kendrick. The office will

be located in the former Friona Glass and Mirror building between Fifth and Sixth Streets on Cleveland.

The City of Friona and Parmer County have agreed to split the cost of utilities. The office will have a full-time employee, who will be an outreach worker trained in crisis-prevention.

In addition, cases can be referred to the main office of the Central Plains MH/MR in Plainview for such things as psychiatric in-patient treatment; day treatment; the new life group

home, the Allen Recovery Center, substance abuse center and vocational center for the mentally retarded.

"We are very happy to be reopening an office in Parmer County, and feel there is a need for MH/MR services. We are glad to be back where we can deliver the services. We really appreciate the help of those who have laid the groundwork to get the office open," says Rick VanHersch of Central Plains.

The spokesman said that the office would deliver a number of different services. A psychotherapist will come to Friona at least once a week for personal, family and possibly group therapy work.

The office will also work closely with the early childhood program through the public schools, working with children up to age three who are developmentally disabled.

Parmer County had a local office beginning in 1971, when space was donated and shared by the Friona Chamber of Commerce. The office later moved to Sixth Street, where the Texas Department of Human Resources is now located, and operated until 1978.

But in 1978, the Central Plains MH/MR lost the Federal Staffing Grant, which cost the operation about \$400,000 per year from its budget.

The facility went to each of the nine member counties served by Central Plains, and asked for funds to help pay salaries of the outreach workers, plus some travel expenses.

Each of the other eight counties served by Central Plains MH/MR elected to share in the salary expenses, but Parmer County elected to let the local office close.

"In the counties where we operate local offices, we see at least a hundred per cent more patients as a result of these offices than we would if there were no office, such as Parmer County has not had in recent years," VanHersch said.

The original trustee from Parmer County on the board of directors for Central Plains was Baker Duggins. He was replaced on the board in 1980 by Turner.

Further details regarding the opening of the new Parmer County office will be forthcoming in the near future.

Commissioners In Routine Business

At the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners' Court on December 20, a motion was passed to advertise for a motor grader to be used for Precinct 4. Bids are to be opened at the court's January 14 meeting.

Motion was passed to pay the November foster child care bill in the amount of \$546. This money will be reimbursed the county from the state.

Approval was given to pay Bailey County Judge Gordon Green's travel expenses for October, November and December in the amount of \$87.55.

At the court's previous meeting, approval was given to pay four hospital bills on indigent citizens to Parmer County Community Hospital. The bills were in the amounts of \$762.75; \$77.68; \$2,402.95 and \$1,040.70.

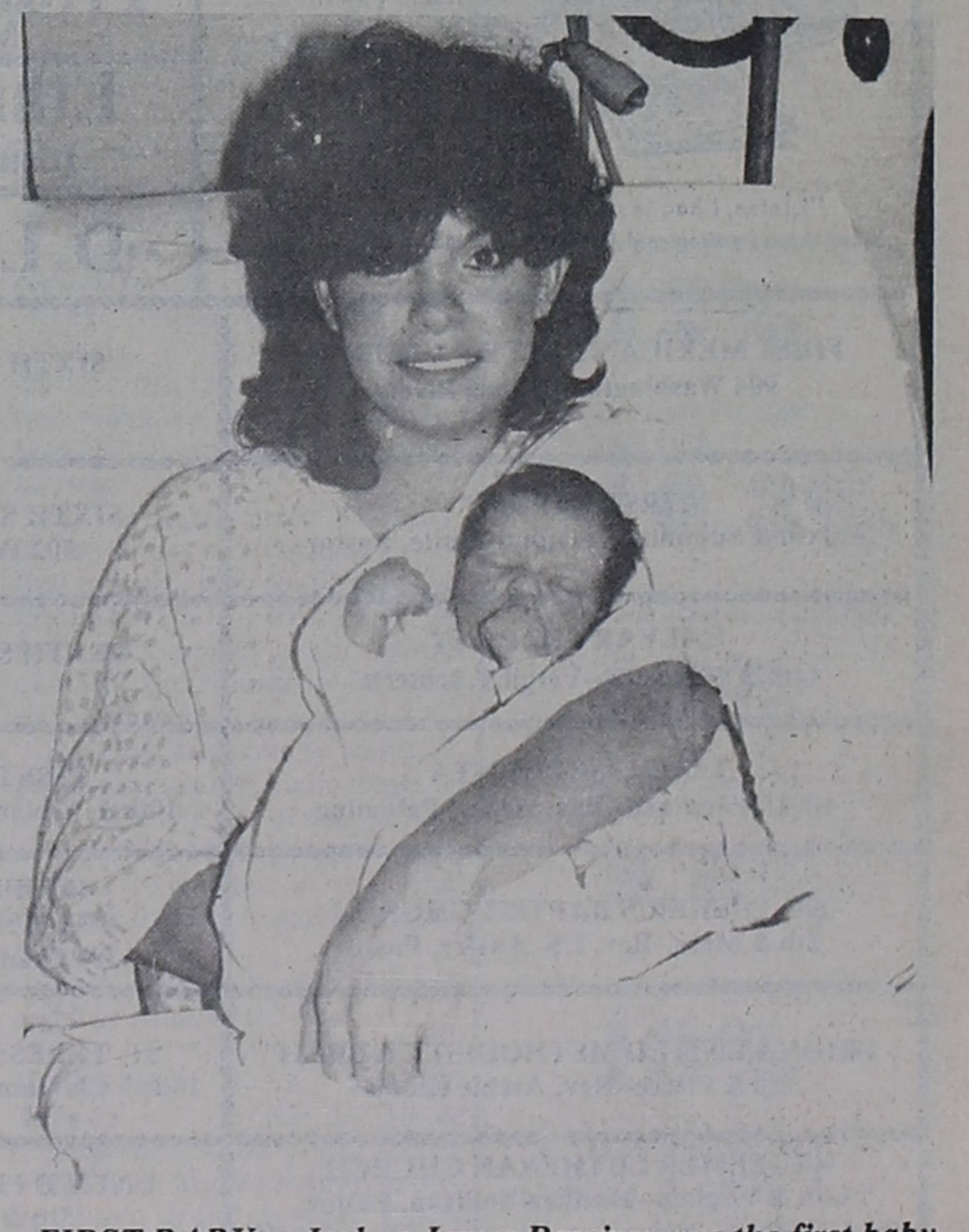

50 YEARS AGO--JAN. 18, 1935

At the regular meeting of the county commissioners court Monday, the matter of guaranteeing the right-of-way across the county on the north side of the Santa Fe Railroad for Federal Highway 60, or State Highway 33, was approved, by a vote of 2-1.

45 YEARS AGO--JAN. 19, 1940

40 YEARS AGO--JAN. 19, 1945

Timeley Shooting Paces Squaws' Win

The Friona Squaws scored some timely baskets in the second half to come from behind and claim a 42-36 win over the Floydada Whirlettes here Tuesday night in a District 2-AAA contest.

The win evened the team's district record at 2-2, and ran their season won-lost record to 10-7.

The first half of the game was slow-moving and low-scoring. Terri Wilcox scored a pair of baskets to pace the Squaws to a 10-9 lead at the end of the first quarter.

But the team's scoring really went on the skids in the second quarter, when Friona managed only five points. Luckily, the Squaws' defense held Floydada to eight, and the Whirlettes had a 17-15 lead at the halftime break.

With the score tied at 19-all in the third quarter, Kelly Wied stole the ball, and drove for a lay-up to give the Squaws a 21-19 lead with 3:41 left in the quarter. This was significant, because the team never trailed after this point.

Floydada's Marissa Jones did give the Whirlettes a tie at 21-all with a short jump shot, but Shannon Atwell grabbed a rebound and scored for a 23-21 Friona lead at the 2:54 mark. Nikki Osborn's jump shot, and Miss Wied's short two-pointer hiked Friona's margin to 27-21, and the Squaws had taken control of the tempo.

Floydada got the last basket of the quarter for a 27-23 score at the

buzzer. Miss Wied's basket, and a jumper by Kerry Cain gave Friona a 31-24 lead with six minutes left in the game.

Ronda Ratcliff scored on a rebound shot, was fouled, and completed the three-point play for a 34-26 Friona lead, and Miss Wilcox' long set shot gave Friona its longest lead at 36-26, with 3:39 left in the game.

But Floydada refused to give up. The Whirlettes, who have an 11-7 season mark themselves, rode the shooting of Miss Jones to score eight unanswered points, and pulled to within a basket at 36-34 in just 1:19 of clock time. Their 34th point came with 2:20 left in the game.

But Miss Ratcliff sank a timely basket, and Miss Wied connected from the side for a 40-34 Friona lead with 1:00 left on the clock. Miss Wied wasn't satisfied with "sitting" on the lead, canning another long-range basket with 19 seconds left for Friona's final points. She captured game scoring honors for the Squaws with 12 points, the only player in double figures. Miss Wilcox had eight.

In a game at Tulia last Friday night, the team lost its second district game (both losses have come on the road), by a score of 58-31.

"They threw a full-court, man-to-man press at us, and we just couldn't adjust," said Squaw coach Don Herbert.

Tulia used the full-court tactics to bolt to a 22-5 lead in the first quarter, and had things their way from there on.

The 31 points were the fewest by the Squaws in a game this year, as no one got to the double-figure category. Kerry Cain was the team leader with nine points.

Chiefs Push 'Winds In District Game

The Floydada Whirlwinds breezed into Friona Tuesday night with a 14-1 season record, and probably figured they wouldn't have to work up a sweat playing the Friona Chieftains, whose record was exactly the opposite, 1-14.

But before the game was over, the Whirlwinds must have wondered if they had been reading the records right--because it took all the talent they could muster to come out on top of the Chieftains, 73-65, and remain in the thick of the district leadership.

The Chiefs, who have rebuilt their team twice this season, seemed not to be overly impressed with season records, as they went out and held the lead in the game for much of the first half, before the dumbfounded Whirlwinds finally managed to get the lead.

"The boys really appreciated the crowd's reaction, especially the standing ovation at halftime (when Floydada had only a 40-37 lead)," said Coach Oscar Bronniman.

"They had a chance to quit several times, when things took a bad turn, but they hung in and stayed right with them up to the end," Bronniman said Wednesday, still very proud of his team's effort. "We had a great workout Wednesday," the Chieftain coach said.

Bronniman started a trio of sophomores and two juniors in the game, and the youngsters came through with flying colors. The sophomores are Shy Burney, Jeff Dickson and Peter Malouf. Burney came on strong for scoring honors with 18 points, and Malouf was given the assignment of guarding Floydada's Jenkins, one of the district's top players. Bronniman thought he did a fine job.

Besides his defensive effort, Malouf came up with eight first-half points, one of his best offensive games as a varsity member. As a team, the Chieftains came up with their season's high score, at a time when many fans figured they might not do so well.

They were doing a good job of working the ball and waiting for the best shot--as evidenced by the fact that the team hit 51 per cent of their shots from the field, 27 of 53.

It was Malouf's jump shot with 1:08 gone in the game that gave Friona a 4-2 lead, and perhaps convinced the team that the game belonged to them as much as to the visitors.

Kevin Trimmell scored a layup and a free throw for a 7-2 Friona lead, and after Floydada cut the lead to 9-6, Trimmell made good on a three-point play with 4:06 left in the quarter, as the Chiefs proved they were serious, taking a 12-6 lead.

Malouf sank both ends of a two-shot opportunity with 3:56 remaining in the quarter, for a 14-8 lead, but Floydada took advantage of some breaks to tie the game at 14-14.

The Chieftains didn't quit here. Darrell Auburg made a free throw; Trimmell canned a layup, and Auburg connected on a medium jump shot inside the 15-second mark, to give Friona the lead at the end of the opening quarter, 19-18.

At this point, the home fans didn't know whether to believe their eyes.

Jr. Teams Lose Two On Monday

The seventh and eighth grade girls each lost games to Floydada in games played here Monday, January 7.

The seventh grade Maidens were defeated, 30-13. Brandy Ray and Jennifer Cass each had four points to pace the scoring.

In the eighth grade game, Floydada had a harder time of it, but won, 28-23. Cindy Preston's 11 points took game honors.

The performance wasn't just "opening quarter luck," either. With Jenkins giving Floydada a 24-23 lead, Malouf came back for a jump shot and a 25-24 Friona margin, and then Guy Wilkins connected for a 27-24 lead.

At this point, the Chiefs had another run of rotten luck, as two or three times down the floor they had shots which should have fallen, that rimmed out. At the same time, the visitors got just the right bounce, and had a couple of easy baskets.

The Whirlwinds charged in front, 35-27 during this time span, and again, the Chiefs could have "packed it in" for the game, but they didn't.

A late-quarter rally was sparked by a pair of free throws by Burney, a long jump shot by Wilkins, and another bullseye by Trimmell, which cut a 40-29 Floydada lead to 40-37, as the buzzer sounded ending the first half.

That's when the fans responded with the standing ovation, which was very much deserved. The Chiefs had done a great job of overcoming a full-court press by the "Winds in the first half, to the point that the visitors finally abandoned the press and fell back.

The scoring slacked off in the third quarter, the teams perhaps tired from a furious first half. Floydada had a 55-49 lead at the end of the quarter.

Then, Burney came up with ten of his points in the final quarter, to keep Friona close, but the Chiefs never could gain the lead in the late going. And Floydada probably thanked their lucky stars on their trip home.

Burney scored 18, Auburg 14 and Trimmell 11 to pace the Chieftain attack.

Bronniman said he felt that the game did a lot for the players' confidence, and was expecting better things during the remainder of the season.

The Chiefs' season had hit a low point at Tulia last Friday, when the Hornets used a run and gun attack to down Friona, 102-52. The Hornets scored 94 points from the

JV Has Bad Luck For Week

The junior varsity Chieftains dropped a pair of district basketball games during the past week.

The team fell to Tulia, 40-27 in a game at Tulia last Friday, and then dropped a 46-39 decision here Tuesday to the Floydada JV boys.

The two losses dropped the team's season record to 10-7.

Cold-shooting second half performances were the difference in both of the recent games. The Chiefs were trailing Tulia, 19-13 at the half, and had been very much in the game, until coming up with a four-point third quarter, that resulted in a 30-17 deficit.

The team outscored the Hornets, 11-10 in the fourth quarter, but the early deficit was too much to overcome. Shane Hand's 14 points led Friona's scoring.
