Chamber Honors Leading Citizens

HOW BIG IS the federal government?

Here are some mind-boggling answers, courtesy of the president's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control, a group established in 1982 to find ways of increasing efficiency and cutting government costs.

The federal government—

*spends more than \$91 million an hour

*employs 2.8 million people

*owns one-third of the U.S. land mass—about 744 million acres—which is an amount equal to all of the states east of the Mississippi River, plus Texas

*occupies 2.6 billion square feet of office space, an amount equal to all the office space in the nation's 10 largest cities, times four

*owns and operates 437,000 vehicles, not counting military vehicles

*has a national deficit of \$195.4 billion, and

*has a national debt standing at \$1.4 trillion

Anyone wishing to cut the size of government has a big target.

Entertainment was provided by Nikki Osborn, who played several selections on the piano, and by "Friends," a group consisting of Geary Brogden, Charles Caudill, John R. Hodges, Sherry Atwell, Libby Procter and Glenda Procter. Eva Miller and Clint Mears accompanied the group.

Installed as new directors for the Chamber were Bill Stovell, Mike Riethmayer, Dianne Tatum, Dave Hutson and B.K. Buske.

Davenport, chief executive officer of Friona Industries, is a director on the National Cattlemen's Association; the Texas Tech Foundation, and the Ranching Heritage Foundation.

Davenport is a member of the Friona Lions, the Friona United Methodist Church, is past director of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Friona Country Club, and is one of the largest contributors and supporters of the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show.

A New Mexico native, Ron joined Friona Industries in 1967. He and his wife, Edwina, are parents of two sons, Winfield, a junior at WTSU, and Wade, a freshman at Texas Tech.

Anne Osborn was cited for her community work which includes Prairie Acres, Meals on Wheels, Friona Public Library, the Hospital Auxiliary, and is a past president of Progressive Study Club.

Mrs. Osborn has served as president of Chieftain Parents, is active in church work at First Baptist Church, and has been a supporter of art in the public school system.

Faye Smith has taught in the local school system for 15 years. She went back to college and

completed her degree after her children were raised, receiving her degree at the same time one of her daughters was getting her college degree.

Faye spent several years teaching remedial reading. She is a native of Hall County, a mother of four daughters and five granddaughters.

Julie Wilshire serves as a state officer in Future Homemakers. She carries a 90 and above average, has served as student director of the one-act play, and is a member of the Gifted and Talented group.

She is a member of the Thespians, is a class officer, and a member of the National Honor Society. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Wilshire.

Brent Hinkle has a long list of accomplishments, including attending the International Science Fair as a sophomore and a junior; he is a member of Gifted and Talented; was named "Most Studious" three years, and has qualified for regional in UIL events three years.

He and his partner have won several debate tournaments. He was written up in a national computer magazine, and is well versed in computers. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hinkle.

Billie Fairchild and Darla Bracken have for a number of years been the only employees at Friona Public Library. They were cited for their ability and willingness to help a library patron search for material, find a book, suggest sources, etc. "The many volunteers have found them easy to work with," said the letter of recommendation.

Board Re-assigns Basketball Coaches

Teacher contracts for the 1985-86 school year were the main item of business at the board of trustees meeting March 11.

Oscar Bronniman, head boys' basketball coach, had tendered his resignation as coach, and asked to be reassigned to a teaching position, which was approved.

Girls' head coach Donald Herbert was relieved of his duties in that line, and also will be offered another position, including

assistant coach in the boys' program and golf coach.

Jackie Morgan was reassigned to the position of high school counselor, to replace Baker Duggins. Duggins had earlier expressed his intention of retiring at the end of the term.

Lucille Lewis, elementary school counselor, submitted her resignation. Mrs. Lewis also intends to retire at the end of the current school year.

Otherwise, the slate of teachers will for the most part be the same as for the current year.

The athletic budget for 1985-86 was approved. The budget was virtually the same as for the past year.

The board approved the report from the textbook committee, and made a minor change in the 1985-86 school calendar, making Friday, January 17, 1986 a school day and the last day of the semester. Monday, January 20 will be a teacher's work day.

The regular board meeting date for April was changed from April 8 to April 15 due to the scheduled Easter holidays.

Absentee Voting Underway

Absentee voting for the school and city election begins Monday, March 18.

School and city officials are pointing out that the annual election will be held on Easter weekend (the Saturday before Easter), so voters need to be forewarned.

Ballots can be cast at the City Hall between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., and at the Superintendent's office between the hours of 8 and 4 p.m.

The special voting period runs through April 2.

In other matters regarding the election this week, Jon Mack Roden, who had announced as a candidate for re-election, withdrew his name from the ballot.

The withdrawal of Roden leaves the city's slate of candidates like this: Bill Stephens, Mike Hanes, Cindy Smiley Butman, Donald W. Wilson, Doris Sears, Joe Tongate and Jim Zorns.

Candidates for the school board are Kathryn Goddard, Jerry Cass, Danny Murphree and Jim Atwell.

55 YEARS AGO—MARCH 21, 1930
Mr. Stovell, local manager of the West Texas Gas Company at Hereford, was in town Thursday afternoon and paid the Star office a brief visit. He stated that the company was then unloading three carloads of gas pipes here for use in the Friona mains, and expects that work of laying it will be started within a very short time.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 22, 1940
Earl Prather of Friona showed the grand champion fat pig in the sixth annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show in Friona Saturday of last week. Other winners included: sow and litter—Burl Beene, Friona; bred or open sow—Edwin Foster, Oklahoma Lane; bred gilt—Keith Blackburn, Friona; fat calves—Stacy Queen, Bovina; junior heifer—Charles D. Julian, Lazbuddie.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 16, 1945
Funeral services for E. B. Black, pioneer businessman for the area, were conducted in Hereford Tuesday. Black, 78, was a pioneer of this area, and he is the one for which the Black Community is named.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 17, 1950
Ground-breaking ceremonies for Friona's newest building were held Sunday. Mrs. J.N. Messenger, charter member of the First Baptist Church, turned the first shovel full of dirt to mark the beginning of the construction of

the \$70,000 auditorium of the church. D.H. Meade, Amarillo, and Clyde Hayes also participated. Meade is also a charter member. Hayes is chairman of the board of deacons. Special music was provided. Some 150 persons enjoyed "dinner on the ground."

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 18, 1955
Announcement of several transactions and building plans for Main Street were made in Friona this week. They are:

James Mabry negotiated for two lots across from Piggly Wiggly, and plans to begin construction within two weeks of an ultra-modern office building on the property.

The Carl Maurer property on the corner north of the Marcum-Claborn Funeral Home this week was contracted to Kenneth Williams, who is planning a small retail business, probably of the drive-in eating type establishment.

Wright Williams, owner of the property between Gib's Cleaners and Plains Hardware on the east side of Main Street, yesterday disclosed intention of beginning construction of a 50x100 retail building, to be rented to a department store. No tenant has been announced.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 17, 1960
Hot-shooting Buna killed the hopes of the Friona Squaws for a state basketball championship last Friday in Austin, as the Squaws fell, 66-63 in the finals of the state tournament. Hitting a phenomenal 84 per cent of their shots, the Buna team went into the final quarter leading, 57-40. Ball-hawking by Lawana Houlette and shooting by Jacquelyn Magness turned a 66-51 score into 66-63 within three minutes' time, but the final whistle sounded before the Squaws were able to pull victory out of the bag. The Squaws had downed Bowie, 60-54 in an overtime game to reach the finals.

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 18, 1965
For the third year in a row, the Friona High School Squaws placed two members of their team on the girls' class AA all-state team. The Squaws, seeking to repeat as state

champions, battled to the finals, where they fell to unbeaten Edna, 60-57.

15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 19, 1970
It was strictly a family affair at the record-breaking sale of the Houston Livestock Show's grand champion barrow Friday afternoon. W.M. (Billy) Mitchell wound up the winner in the hot and heavy bidding—but only after he outbid his wife and son with the world's record price for a hog, \$6,550. Fourteen-year-old Rickie Seaton of Lazbuddie, the champion's seller, couldn't have been happier to see a family fight over who was to spend money.

10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 16, 1975
Grant Teaff, the young coaching genius who guided the Baylor Bears to their first Southwest Conference football title in 50 years and first-ever appearance in the Cotton Bowl, will be the speaker at Friona's All-Sports Banquet.

The Friona City Council discussed two projects with representatives of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night. One was paving at the Community Center, and another was a request by the Steering Committee of the nursing home, asking the city's participation in helping with the financing method.

Dropped Batons Costly To Chiefs

A couple of bad experiences in the two relay races hindered an otherwise good outing for the Friona Chieftains, as they hosted the Friona Relays last Saturday at Chieftain Field.

As a result of the two misfortunes, Friona came away from the relay events, the most prosperous from a scoring standpoint, with nothing to show, and Denver City came from behind to win the meet with 149 points. Friona was second with 120 points. Lubbock Cooper placed third with 95 points.

The Chieftains came out of the field events with 54 points and the lead in the meet.

Friona got double wins from John Aguirre, who copped the long jump and the 400-meter dash; and Ben Neelley, who won the 110-meter high hurdles and the 300-meter intermediate hurdles.

Freshman Daniel Echols was Friona's other gold-medal winner, winning the 200-meter dash with a time of 24.63. The Chieftains' depth was good, as the team came up with five second places and three thirds, plus numerous other places.

Aguirre won the long jump with a 20 foot, one-half inch effort, and teammate Peter Malouf placed third at 19-1. Echols was fifth with an 18-3/4 leap.

Friona got 16 points in the 400-meter dash. Aguirre won it with a time of 52.68, and Paul Trimmell was third at 56.45.

The Chieftains swept the hurdles races. Neelley and Darron Nash placed 1-2 in the high hurdles. Neelley's time was 16.05, and Nash's was 16.15.

Neelley won the intermediate hurdles with a time of 43.71, and Malouf was second at 44.41.

Rod Britting was second in the pole vault, clearing 12 feet, same height as the winner. Shy Burney placed second in the high jump at 5-10, and Lance Gatlin was third with a height of 5-4.

Matt Osborn was second in the discus at 116-9; and Jeff Chaney was fifth at 110-9.

Gatlin picked up a point for the Chieftains by placing seventh in the intermediate hurdles.

Lance Venhaus, Ricky Hutcherson and Tracy Talley placed 6-7-8 for Friona in the 3200-meter run. Leroy Mercado placed seventh in the 800-meter run.

In the 1600-meter relay race, Friona was battling Denver City for the lead when on the third lap, the Olton runner hit Mercado's hand and knocked the baton out of his hand and into the infield. Mercado broke stride, almost stopping, before finishing the lap.

On the final lap, Aguirre made up about a 25-yard deficit to come in first, but both Olton and Friona were disqualified in the race. Mercado had left the track attempting to retrieve the baton.

In the 400-meter relay, a missed handoff also spelled doom for the Chieftains, who were in the running for the lead at the time.

Second place finishes for the team in both relays would have added 32 points to Friona's total, and would have been enough to have won the meet.

"I was pleased with the performances of everyone. If we're going to have that kind of luck in the relays, it's best to get it over with early in the season," said Chieftain track coach Steve Williams.

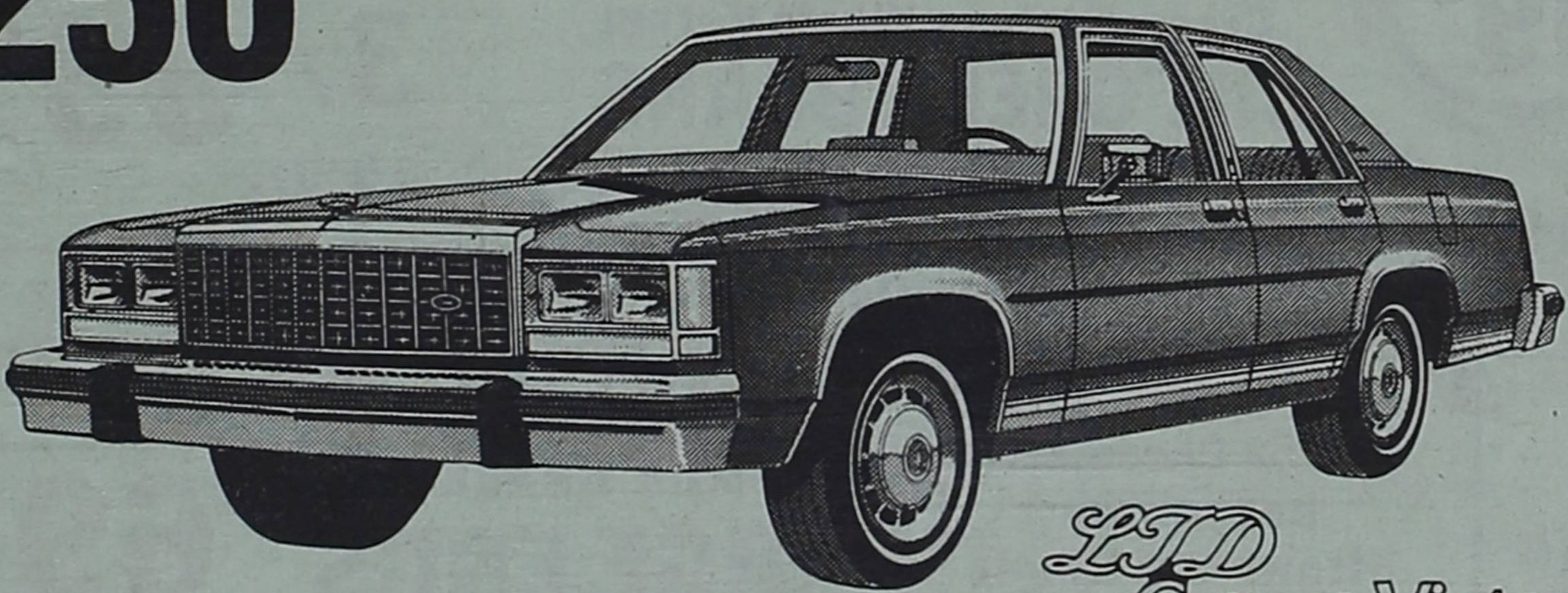

Alisa Perkins placed third in the 1600-meter run with a time of 6:27.6.

Miss Cain placed fourth in the shot put with a mark of 29-7 1/2. She was two and one-half inches out of third place, and nine inches out of second.

Bena Bronniman placed third in the 3200-meter (two mile) run, with a time of 21:10.99.

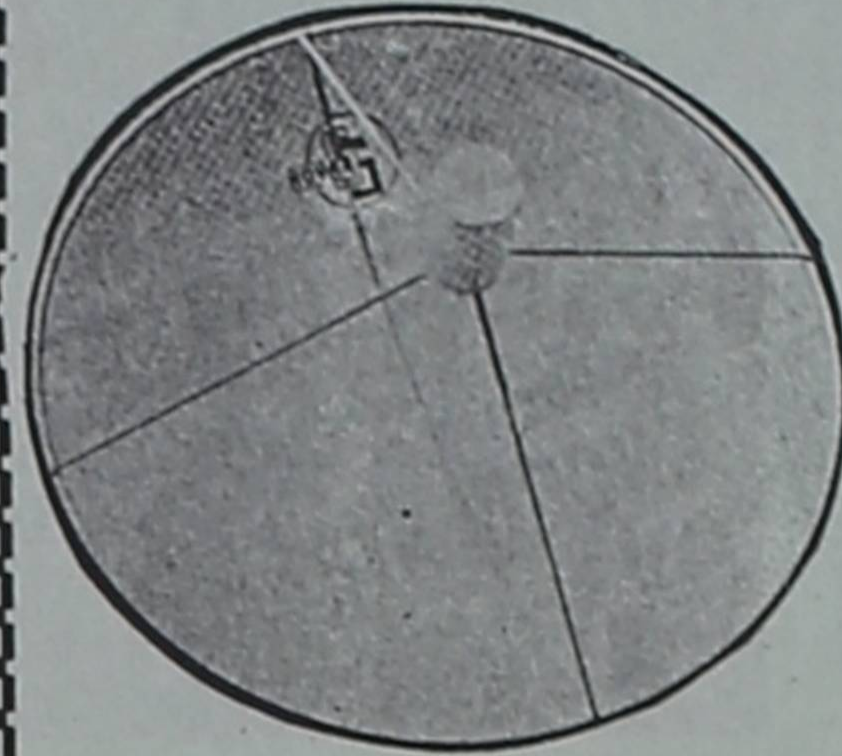

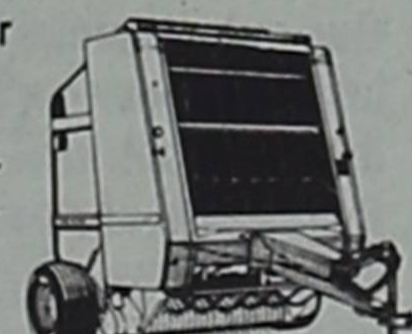

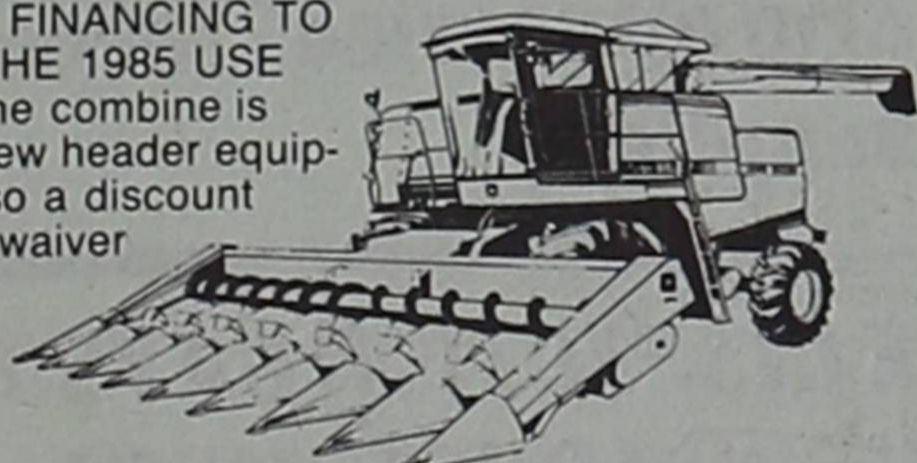

Around The House

Is this going to be another year of 'burning the midnight oil' because you can't find the records you need to complete your tax return? Then maybe it's time to change.

Better organized records can mean tax savings. Sometimes important deductions are simply overlooked in the mass of disorganized financial material.

Good records also make it possible to back up your claims in case you're audited by the Internal Revenue Service and can make the task of completing tax forms much easier.

There's no set rule for how to organize financial records. Some people just dump all financial records into a box or grocery sack throughout the year. Then they sort the material in January or February. But the sorting can be time consuming and frustrating. Most tax advisors recommend organizing throughout the year. That way you don't have a huge task on your hands around income tax time.

One simple form of record-keeping is to review your canceled checks every month and mark in red those that are tax-deductible. If you itemize deductions, you can take a step further by filing canceled checks, receipts and statements into folders that correspond to the deduction categories on Schedule A, such as medical expenses, interest expense and charitable deductions. Some very well organized people add up their tax information every month so it never becomes unmanageable.

Even if you don't have the time or patience for an elaborate system, almost any method of separating out tax-related, financial records will help at income tax time. To help you record your income and expenses for tax purposes or to recognize spending patterns, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service publishes the "Financial Record Book." Crime Watch Meeting Is Set April 1

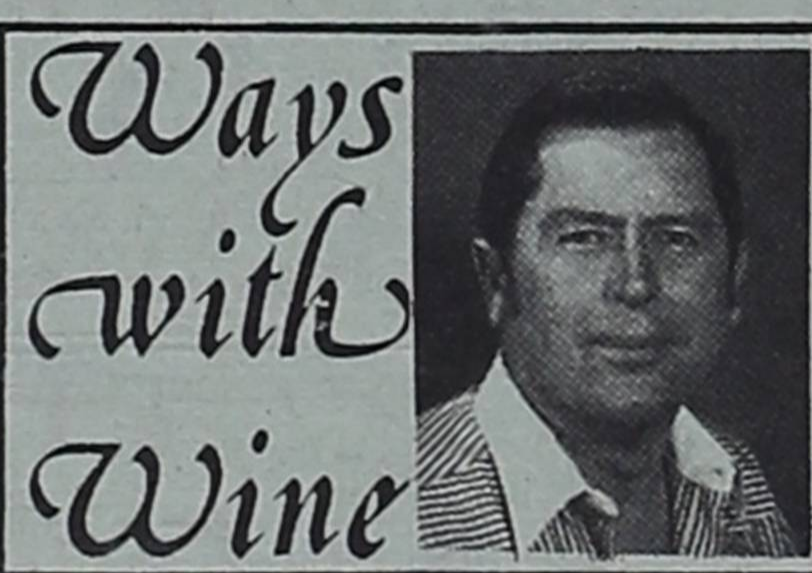
The Friona Police Department is sponsoring a community-wide meeting, for the purpose of organizing a neighborhood crime watch program, on Monday, April 1.

CABERNET SAUVIGNON
Cabernet Sauvignon is the father of red wine grapes. It is the noble grape of the Bordeaux region of France and it produces California's most outstanding red wine. This bitterness is actually an astringency due to the tannin, a substance found in grape skins and wooden casks. 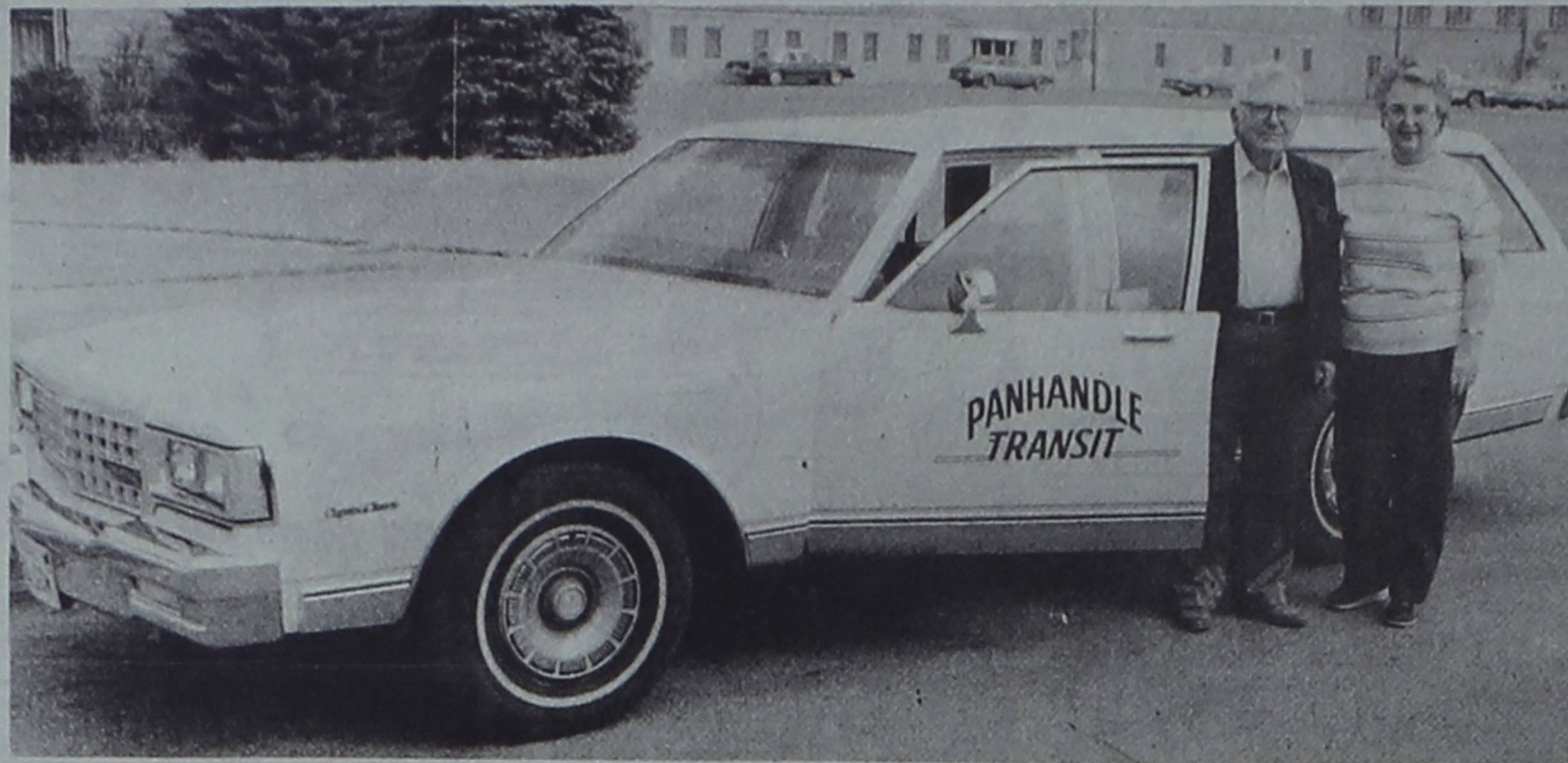
The Friona Senior Citizens held their annual meeting for the election of board members on Tuesday, February 19 at the Friendship House.

Panhandle Transit Now In Operation

Panhandle Transit, a rural transportation program providing door-to-door transportation to the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle, is now in operation, according to Nancy Harvey, Special Projects Director for the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation.

It is being contracted through the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with funding through the Urban Mass Transit Administration, and will operate as a non-profit transit system through T.P.C.A.C.

Routine service will be open to the general public and especially suitable for senior citizens and handicapped persons, and will have flexible schedules in order to meet passenger needs.

Regular service will include trips for medical, shopping or essential business purposes, and to visit senior citizens centers and nutrition sites.

A Panhandle Transit vehicle will pick up and return passengers to their homes.

Various purchase-of-service

contracts will make possible a cost-free service to persons who are eligible for other programs such as: A.F.D.C., Food Stamps, S.S.I., Medic-aide, J.T.P.A., Head Start, housing, butter and cheese.

All other passengers will be charged 50¢ for a one-way, in-town service; and 25¢ per mile, one-way, outside of the city limits.

Drivers have been professionally trained in defensive driving, passenger assistance techniques, first-aid, and C.P.R. Drivers will assist passengers in and out of the vehicle, and with packages and groceries.

Travel scheduling for Castro and Parmer counties must be made 24-hours in advance through Castro County Community Action, Dimmitt. To request further information, or to schedule Panhandle Transit, please call (806) 647-3244.
