

Dear editor;


As though the energy shortage wasn't enough of a problem, we now have a shortage of confidence, we've been told.



Texas House Bill 1060, which passed during the last session of the legislature, provides guidelines for appraising agricultural land. The bill includes a provision for deduction, as a fixed expense, the depletion of underground water used in agricultural operations. The bill also stipulates how the cost associated with underground water depletion of irrigated lands should be calculated.

The High Plains Water District has been providing the necessary figures to support Federal Cost-In-Water Income Tax Depletion claims as a service to the District's area landowners since 1965.

# **Clements Signs Legislation For Ogallala Import Authority**

Gov. Bill Clements signed the master district legislation last month for creating the Ogallala Import Authority. The will become law Aug. 2/.

That does not mean that the Import Authority will come into existence that day, since a prerequisite for its formation was that water be contracturally available

Under provisions of the law, an import authority can be created with approval of the voters once an adequate source of water is available for import. The authority would cover all those counties overlying the Ogallala Aquifer except Crosby, Dickens, Borden and

Garza counties. The affected region comprises more than 40 counties in Texas, including Floyd.

Additional counties could seek annexation into the authority and may be admitted upon approval of the authority and the voters of the county seeking annexation.

After the authority is created, it becomes the contracting agency for imported water and controls the equitable distribution to various users within the area.

The authority is expected to assure a high degree of local control over importation.

# West Texas Chamber Opposes Windfall Profits Taxes

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce in a position statement issued July 30 went on record as strongly opposing the assessment of a so-called windfall profits tax on domestically produced oil.

County Judge Billy Whitaker may have touched off an investigation by the Department of Public Safety Intelligence Division which could spread state wide

The letter said a new government would assume control of the judicial machinery of the nation and revolutionary courts would be formed.

The letter was from the Provisional Government of Texas and addressed to all sheriffs and county judges found with in the "Territory of the Provisional Government of Texas." It was signed by Dr. William R. Pabst, who claimed to be "Attorney General."

It implied that the "new" government would set up revolutionary courts which will issue severe punishment to officials who violate rights of the people.

After reading the letter Whitaker called Matador Tribune Publisher, Leon Watson, who also read it. Watson then called the office of Texas Attorney General Mark White.

While speaking with Charles Campbell of the Crime Prevention Division of the Attorney General's office about the strange contents of the letter, Watson was told to contact Captain Dudley Thomas, DPS Intelligence in Austin. Thomas told Watson that the DPS had never heard of the Provisional Government of Texas, the same answer Watson had heard from the Attorney

General's office. Thomas instructed Watson to forward the orginal copy of the letter to him, so with Judge Witaker's permission, Watson mailed the letter to the DPS in Austin.

"I wasn't aware that this Mr. Pabst had been elected Attorney General," Campbell told Watson. "If the letter was sent to all county judges and sheriffs, I'm surprised we haven't been receiving a lot of calls on it."

Judge Whitaker said the letter maybe a prank but should warrent an investigation





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

# **Delight Them With Dips**

It's smart to have something ready to serve at a moment's notice with youngsters at home and vacationing guests and relatives apt to drop in almost any time. That something could be a delightfully seasoned dip or two ready in the refrigerator. They need only be pulled

out and set on a tray with an assortment of chilled fresh fruits of the season, raw vegetables, crackers or chips

Lighter dips rather than heavy ones are the ideal snack for warm weather eating. Both of the dips given here have a dairy sour cream base. That gives them a tangy, sparkling taste as well as the creaminess for a good dipping consistency, without having to wait for a warm-up to room temperature.

It's easy to season dairy sour cream with lemon juice, then add several complementary spices such as curry, mustard, ginger and garlic salt. That's all there is in the East Indian Dip except for a bit of salt

create sec-For a dip that has a little to divide more substance, use a favorite shellfish such as shrimp, the from a can, rinsing and en the best draining it on paper towels. Cut-up shrimp and chili

Gray marketplace We don't fear competition. We've always been ready and eager to pit our products, technologies, and support systems against others. However, we're facing competition of a different kind: competition resulting from policies of some foreign governments. Through carefully planned merger programs, lavish tax and financing incentives, protective national purchasing policies...and sometimes even through direct government ownership, political considerations have replaced economic ones to a

large degree. This represents a major shift in the traditional freemarket relationship between business and the state. It also means a major change in the rules of the game of international competition. The government-con

trolled British Steel Corporation is generally seen as a very old and inefficient producer. Yet, in 1977 it was actually underselling the very new and very efficient Japanese steel companies on the West Coast of the U.S. During 1977, British Steel lost over \$800 million. The decision to sell steel at such low prices seems political rather than commercial-probably to keep employment levels up in the United Kingdom.

Another result of the 'new rules" has been the emergence of state-backed corporations able to achieve virtual monopoly powers. With the direct help of the Government of Japan, producers like Matsushita and Hitachi developed an awesome production scale. Then the Japanese began to make direct acquisitions of American television manufacturers, which no American company in the business could have done on antitrust grounds. And achieving manufacturing capabilities in America allowed the Japanese to thwart import quotas because they were now resident domestic manufacturers.

If we're going to be able to compete effectively at all against state-backed foreign firms, our government must recognize how the new realities have distorted the freemarket rules by which we are required to play.







# Hunter And Trapper Area News

Hunters and trappers receiving notices from Texas Parks and Wildlife to renew their hunting and trapping license will be finding a card enclosed in with their renewal notice warning about the danger of rabies.

Caprock Trapper's Assn. would like to remind everyone that rabies in wild animals is twice as high this year in Texas as it has been in past years. The danger to trappers and those coming in contact with wild animals or handling furs and hides of wild animals are in much more danger of being expesed to wild animals carrying rabies than anyone else.

CRTA got in touch with Texas Dept. of Health in Dickens to get information about the rabies vacine now available. Caprock is working in conjunction with the Dept. of Health to set up a series of clinics to vacinate anyone interested in receiving these rabies shots. It is necessary to receive three to four of the shots at one week intervals to be effective.

Although the Texas Dept. of Health can give the shots it is required that a doctor be present. The health dept. is in the process of contacting the state doctor about coming to Dickens for the clinics as soon as they confirm that

he is available CRTA will get with them and the doctor to set up the dates for the clinics. The only charge will be for the vacine.

CRTA encourages all its 150 members to consider taking these shots and to contact The Texas Dept. of Health in Dickens 623-5565 on myself - Preston Mynatt, Roaring Springs 348-2581. We need to know about those who are interested so the health dept. will have an idea of how much vacine to have available at the clinic. They can't keep it on hand and so will need to send for the amount they expect to need. Rabies hasn't been near as

bad in the areas around Dickens County or Lubbock County as is reported in other areas. This is due to the amount of quality trappers in these areas.

# For Food

# **Stamp Offices**

The Department of Agriculture has proposed minimum standards for hours and locations of food stamp offices in order to provide better service to applicants and participants, according to Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman.

One set of standards is proposed for offices that certify applicants for food stamps, and a different set is proposed for offices that issue food stamps. According to Foreman, the department anticipates that most cities and counties will be able to comply with minimal changes in their current operations.

The regulations call for offices certifying applicants for food stamps to be open a minimum of either 30 hours per month or 35 hours per week, depending on the number of participants in the area. In areas with very small caseloads, agencies may use out-of-office certification procedures such as a traveling caseworker.

participants. In addition, the department proposes that counties and cities provide both certification and issuance services within 30 miles of all, or nearly all, households receiving food stamps. The exceptions could be granted in areas where people routinely travel farther to shop for food.

Beyond the minimum standards for hours and locations, the department would allow state agencies flexibility in applying the standards to local circumstances. The regulations permit local agencies to determine service needs, and require public participation in the development of local service plans every four years.

The department's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) published regulations implementing the Food Stamp Act of 1977 in the July 13 Federal Register.

Comments on the proposed regulations must be received by September 13 and should be sent to: Alberta C. Frost, acting deputy administrator for family nutrition programs, Food and Nutrition Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington DC 20250.

Worried about how to get more mileage out of your car? Here are some simple tips that can help you increase your gas mileage up to 25 percent.

KEEP IT CLEAN - a dirty, clogged air cleaner can rob you of precious gas. Engines use 14 to 15 times more air than gas by weight. A dirty, clogged air filter causes engines to burn more gas. Check the air filter by holding it up to a light. If you can't see light through it, replace it . . . Regular oil filter replacement and properly inflated tires can also contribute significantly.

## THE DON'TS OF DRIVING:

Don't drive with your foot on the brake. It's surprising how many people do this unconsciously. It makes your engine work much harder.

Don't gun your engine when starting, jackrabbit starts at intersections eat up gas.


Don't drive faster than the speed limit, cars get 21 percent more gas mileage at 55 than cars going at 70. That's two extra gallons in every ten.

Don't idle that engine, cars waste about a quart of gas for every 15 minutes of idling.

Car roof racks loaded with baggage cause severe wind resistance, which costs up to 17 percent more gas usage. If the rack is necessary, pack your items in a wedge shape, putting the smaller ones up front and the larger ones in the back.

When driving at high speeds, keep your windows up if weather permits. Windows that are rolled down cause aerodynamic drag and a decreased gas mileage. In fact, on long trips lowered windows may cause as much loss as a car air conditioner. For short trips and everyday driving, though, air conditioners are a significant drag on mileage.

Electrical accessories that you normally wouldn't think about also consume gas indirectly. Radios, lighters, hi beam lights and rear window defrosters all activate your alternator to recharge the battery - which in turn makes your engine work harder.
