

### City Keeps Tax Rate, Raises Sewer Rate

Taxes, sewer and sanitation rates and electric power were high on the list of priorities at the Floydada City Council meeting Tuesday night.

The councilmen decided not to raise the property tax rate, keeping the old rate of 53 cents per \$100 valuation.

Sewer and sanitation rates, however, took a noticeable rise for the coming year. The councilmen set the business sanitation rate at \$6.50 a month for four pickups, with additional service at \$1 for each extra pickup.

Business and residential sewer rates also took a decidedly upward turn, averaging more than a 30 percent jump. The business sewer rate went from \$3 a month to \$5, with a \$1 extra charge for each additional restroom in the estab-

The council raised the residential sewer rate from \$3 a month to \$4, with a \$1 charge for each additional bathroom

After consultation with Quinton Colwell, an electrical engineer, the council authorized bids for materials and construction of new electrical lines and a a power substation for the city.

The \$308,000 that has been allocated for the project should be ample to finish the project, Colwell told the council, and there should be no problem, despite rumors, in getting the materials for the construction.

Colwell said the construction would be timed so the power line would be completed at about the same time the new substation comes into service. The length of line necessary, he noted, was a quarter mile less than earlier expected, resulting in a small cost savings that would probably be offset by inflation.

The city could possibly arrange to purchase power from other local electric companies while the line and substation are under construction, Colwell sug-

The council awarded a contract to the Vulcan Sign and Stamping Co., of Foley, Ala., to supply 300 variously sized stop signs and 33 yield signs for city streets. Vulcan turned in a low bid of \$3,869, beating out proposals from companies in Arlington, Hearn, Dallas, Bloomington, Ill. and the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville. The city will pay for the signs with a \$5,000 grant from the state.

In conjunction with the sign purchase, the council authorized city personnel to buy poles to mount the signs. The poles must be paid for by city funds. City manager Bill Feuerbacher noted that some of the old poles could be converted to meet the new specifica-

Adolfo Garcia met with the councilmen to ask that a city ordinance requiring a minimum of 45 days to pass between carnivals be amended to a 30-day period. Garcia said that, with the amended ordinance, more carnivals could be scheduled in the relatively short fair season when the migrant and farm populations are at their greatest.

"We could make more money and provide more work if there was only 30 days between carnivals," Garcia said. Only two carnivals regularly schedule events currently in Floydada.

Bill Feuerbacher suggested that it was perhaps not the scheduling of events that has lowered attendance.

"It's not the time of the carnival, but the times we're living in," he said. "You just don't make as much money on carnivals as you once did."

The council deferred a final decision until the Catholic Church group and the

Lions Club discussed the situation. "I don't think the council would object (to changing the ordinance) if both groups agree," said Mayor Parnell

After inspecting the ordinance in question, city attorney Bill Kincaid informed the council that the members could make special exception without changing the ordinance.

The council also agreed to hire two school crossing guards for the city. One guard will be posted at 8th St. and Houston Ave., serving the Duncan School, and the other guard will be stationed at 2nd St. and Jackson Ave. for students at the Andrews Ward

The pay for the guards was raised from \$2.65 to \$2.90, the new Federal minimum wage

Mayor Powell received authorization to sign a letter of credit for the \$132,000 Department of Housing and Urban

Development housing block grant to rehabilitate substandard dwellings in Floydada.

Once the grant has been awarded, according to city manager Feuerbacher, the city will accept approximately 40 applications for assistance under the rehabilitation grant. Of those applications, 17 will be chosen for aid to update their homes.

The council agreed to pay a one-fifth share, or \$490, toward a new emergency medical service radio system for Floydada and Lockney ambulances and hospitals. The Federal government approved matching funds of \$13,350 for

the project. After conferring with building official Dorr Blasingame, the council approved adoption of the Uniform Building Code for 1979. Some changes were noted in the new code, but none reportedly were

The council also agreed to negotiate with Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for purchases of natural gas for the power-generating station.

In final business, the councilmen rejected a proposal to join the Texas Public Power Association. The TPPA is attempting to form a coherent structure in Texas to represent member communities before the Public Power Commission. The councilmen decided that there was no problem with zones of authority as regards service, so there was no need to join the Association.

### Floydada School Board Votes No Tax Increase For 1979-80

The Floydada School Board voted Tuesday night to adopt the proposed budget and to set the tax rate at \$1.20. The \$1.20 tax rate, set originally in 1977, represents no tax increase for the second year. Administrators and trustees were able to absorb rising costs due to spiraling inflation and lost revenue due to decreased student poulation and homestead exemptions granted by recent legislation. However, they do foresee future tax increases in order to maintain a quality education in the

Floydada school system. Capital improvements approved in the 1979-80 budget include the addition of PE facilities at R.C. Andrews Elementary and renovation of the High

School Cafeteria to include a snack bar. Representatives of Tusha Builders and Hallmark Builders met with the board to discuss their bids and building plans for the proposed R.C. Andrews PE facilities. The contract was awarded to local builder Walter Davis at a bid of \$39,975.

In other business school trustees employed Mrs. Linda Lee Stark and Mrs. Frances Elaine Gee as teachers in the migrant program at Duncan Elementary. Federal and local aides for all campuses were hired.

Behner and Company CPA firm was selected as auditors for the coming school year.

The depository bid from First National Bank of Floydada was discussed and the depository contract was awarded.

the commissioners readjusted their specifications to lower the cost. 'With the jail costs being higher,"

Smith told the group, "the revenue sharing funds will be tight for other projects. There will be no excess, but we'll take suggestions for the remain-

In addition to the jail remodeling, the commissioners alredy approved \$60,000 for heating and air conditioning at the courthouse. The jail and courthouse projects account for more than \$360,000 of the available \$388,272.

'There are things we need more than a place to lock a man up," the judge said, "but the state came in and insisted that we update the jail." He

noted that the improvements would include facilities for juveniles, women and drunks as well as the emergency life-saving equipment.

Representatives from the Floyd County Museum, the Senior Citizens group and the Friends of the Library, among others, were on hand to state their cases and to present their petitions for funding.

The judge praised the civic and community groups for their work and promised to to the best he could to meet as many requests as possible.

Judge Smith defended the commissic ers' decision to allocate the major portion of the revenue sharing funds to the jail and courthouse projects, saying

that it was possibly the last opportunity to get outside financing for the work. The revenue sharing program, he noted, was in danger of being cut off next year. "We've already lost the

lateral road fund," he said. "We don't want to raise taxes, we're trying to hold them down," Judge Smith said, but the projects must be paid for somehow.

The judge will present his recommendations for revenue sharing allocations to the various groups at the special commissioners meeting Aug. 21. The commissioners will also sign the jail construction contract on that date.

In regular business at the Monday meeting, the commissioners approved a motion by Grigsby Milton that the county pay 20 cents a mile to the county Sheriff's Dept. on the understanding that each deputy and sheriff hold their mileage down to less than 2,500 each

Former DPS patrolman Bill Dawson received approval from the commissioners as a special deputy for the Sheriff's Dept. There will be no cost to

the county for Dawson's services. The commissioners transferred \$60,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund to be divided among the precincts. Each

precinct will receive \$16,500, The commissioners also transferred \$20,000 from the General Fund to the Permanent Improvement Fund, and

another \$20,000 from the General Fund to the Officers' Salary Fund.

The court approved a motion by Bob Jarrett to accept H.R. Bundock's \$225,531 bid for general construction of the Floyd County Jail. A time limit of 240 days and a 5 percent bond were stipulated.

Also accepted was a \$54,630 bid from the Willo Products Co. for detention equipment. A 45-day time limit and 5 percent bond were stipulated on that

In final action, a motion by Judge Smith to establish a Child Welfare Board and put \$300 a year into the Child Welfare Board Fund died for lack of a





Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON\* D.C. - America's future depends on the education of its citizens. The educational system of our Country plays a key role in preserving and improving both our public and private instutions. The promotion of quality education is essential if this Nation is going to improve its competitive position around the world. Also the freedom of thought is the cornerstone of American democracy and it can only be protected by quality

But we must take into consideration that we are a Nation of great diversity comprising people of many varied backgrounds and lifestyles. We cannot promulgate uniform rules for the whole Country that will efficiently allocate resources for our society. Thus I believe the local control of education is essential to sustain our culture and way of life. The needs of the students in West Texas are much different from those who live in New York City or Anchorage, Alaska. We must leave decision making authority without local school boards, school administrators, and teachers. These are the people who know the problems and can find the answers.

I am very interested in protecting the relationship between the home, the school, and the local community. This connection has proven a great asset to the family and to society. To increase federal control over our schools would endanger this delicate relationship. One of the proposals we are dealing with in this Congress (the creation of a Department of Education) could cause a major reduction in local educational policymaking in the guise of administrative reorganization. This is a signal by the Federal Government of their intention to exercise an ever-expanding and deepening role in educational decision-making. If the department is established, we are faced with the natural inclination of the bureaucracy to widen its sphere of influence. Decisions will be made in Washington at the expense of local diversity. The power of the bureaucracy will extend further and further until the Department of Education will become the Nation's super school board.

I believe we need better work in education emphasizing the local control of schools and traditional instruction. I also am of the conviction that we must have a positive, supportive approach that takes into consideration both the intellectual and emotional development of our children. A major effort should be made to improve our vocational training programs to prepare people for productive employment. Vocational education can reduce the number of youths who enter the labor market unskilled and enable them to compete for productive employment. An ining would also contribute to the vitality of the economy and reduce the size of government expenditures for remedial

It is my belief that the goal of our educational system should be to insure that everyone be trained to have a marketable skill, be it academic or vocational - white collar or blue collar. We must teach our children the dignity of useful employment and above all we should recognize the role education plays in perpetuating our diversified culture. By allowing teachers and school administrators to make the day-to-day decisions, we will assure that the needs of the local community will be recognized and we will extend our way of life from one generation to

### Greg Jones Keys In Greenbelt Bowl Game Saturday

CHILDRESS - The game's big play was turned in by a guard Saturday night

We're not talking about basketball. Floydada's Greg Jones sprinted 36 yards on a trick guard-around play with the score that was decisive as the West emerged with a 17-6 victory over the East in the 30th Annual Greenbelt Bowl Football Game Saturday night here at Fair Park Stadium.

The West's victory, before 3,000 fans, was its second in succession following a four-game East winning streak which ended here a year ago. The East still leads the overall series, Jones' run with 1:31 remaining in the

third quarter helped the West build a 10-0 cushion after carrying a precarious, 3-0 lead into the lockerroom at the half. The play itself had the look of a

rags-to-riches success story. The West was facing fourth-and-32 at the East 36 after driving from its 20 to the East's 10, but being pushed back by a penalty and a 12-yard quarterback sack.

Starting signal-caller Scott Lancaster of Brownwood approached the line, appeared to take the snap from center on fourth down and optioned right. The Brownwood all-stater was creamed by a host of East defenders at the line, but he never had the pigskin.

Instead, Jones, lined up at right guard, took it from the center and the 5-11, 185-pounder raced toward the endzone untouched until a potential tackler managed to get a hand on him at the 5-yard line. Lancaster converted the extra point,

the first of two conversion kicks to go with his 25-yard field goal which had come with 1:39 to go in the first half, to complete the West's deciding score. The West added a 10-play, 33-yard

touchdown drive on its next series, with Lancaster going the final yard with 7:11 left in the game. Valley's Darrell Dowd capped a

68-yard, 10-play East scoring drive with a 3-yard dash 3:08 before the final gun. But, that was too little, too late. Jones' dash had seen to that. "It's called a 'right guard around,"

said Jones, named the contest's outstanding offensive lineman. "We ran it twice this week in practice.' "It was the key to the game,"

explained happy Howard Payne University mentor Harold Mayo, coach of the West all-stars. "And, it worked beautifully.' Mayo said Jones was the logical

choice to run the play, because he was the fastest guard (about 4.7 or 4.8 for 40 yards) in the West camp. "We've worked it off and on for four

years (at HPU)," said Mayo. "And, we scored on it three years ago against Texas A&I. The center fumbles the ball. and pulls it up against his stomach. He has to make sure he let's it go. "The guard lets them (the offensive



If the license holder is successful at bagging one or more of these species, the date and month of the kill on the correct tag must be marked out in ink or cut out and the tags attached securely to the carcass prior to transporting or moving the carcass. The place and county of harvest must be filled in at this time.

There are spaces on the back of the hunting license for affixing a whitewinged dove, archery, or federal migratory game bird/conservation stamp. The white-winged dove stamp and archery stamp can be purchased at license vendors. The federal migratory game bird stamp is available at U.S. Post offices for \$7.50 each.

A resident hunting license is required of every Texas citizen hunting outside of the county of residence between the ages of 17 through 65 years old. Persons hunting on land where they reside or persons hunting deer and turkey in their county of residence must have an exempt hunting license available for \$1.25. Certain disabled veterans may hunt deer or turkey while in possession

of a valid exempt hunting license. A legal citizen of Texas is any person except an alien who has been a bona fide resident of Texas for more than six (6) months immediately preceding application for a license. Members of the Armed Forces with proof of assignment on active duty at any federal installation within the state for a period of more than 30 days may purchase a resident hunting license.

A special archery stamp for \$3.25 will be required of all persons who hunt wild deer, turkey, and javelina during any open archery season in which only long bows and arrows are used. This archery stamp will be required in addition to the regular hunting license for both nonresident and resident hunters.

The effect of additional off-farm income on an individual's tax liability situation should also be considered in income management. Such income may affect one's social security tax liability and future social security A related concern is whe-

ther or not the off-farm income will enable one to "income average," says Lovell. Unless off-farm income offsets a poor yield or commodity price situation, income averaging may be necessary. On the other hand, a taxpayer may not qualify for income averaging if there is no off-farm income. Regardless, a taxpayer should compare this year's developing income situation against last year's in managing one's income tax liability.





later assistant Chamber of Commerce Manager from 1968 thru 1974.





### Oilmen say 'fourbles' top 'thribbles' every time

CHRISTMAS TREE. Saint Nick wouldn't recognize this variety. It is the assembly of fittings and valves that caps a completed well. It controls the flow of oil from the well to storage tanks or pipelines.

FIREFLOODING.

Although it sounds like a contradiction in terms, it refers to another way to increase production of heavy oil. Oil deep underground is ignited and fed large amounts of air. This heats and thins nearby oil and provides pressure to move it to producing wells.

LIGHT ENDS. Not what weight watchers hope to achieve after dieting. They are the more voiatile products of petroleum refining, such as gasoline, propane and butane.

HOT FOOTING. The application of heat to the lower extremities . . . of a well. Involves installing a heater at the bottom of an input well to thin heavy crude oil and increase its flow to nearby producing wells.



CRUDE. An individual who is crude is often said to be unrefined. In the oil industry, crude refers to oil that is unrefined. It is oil just as it comes out of the well.

JOINT. It is not a funny cigarette. It is a section or length of steel pipe or casing from 20 to 30 feet long. Joints are added one at a time to drive the rotating drill bit into the earth. The string of pipe is pulled up out of the hole in

Farm Management --

Income Tax

Managing farm and ranch income properly is vital to managing one's income tax

Dr. Ashley Lovell, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, emphasizes wise management of all types of income during the current tax year.

Often livestock sales can cause problems in income management, says Lovell.

In 1977 and 1978, many Texas cattlemen were forced to sell excessive numbers of breeding livestock because of the drought. Normally, any gain realized would be recognized for income tax purposes. However, due to forced sales caused by the drought, if replacements are purchased within two years of the year of forced sale, producers can defer paying tax on the gain.


