



EVERY YEAR WE are astounded by the number of "famous folks" who pass away, and the past year was no exception.

In Ye Editor's case, he probably identifies with more of these individuals than many of our readers, since he "grew up" watching or hearing about many of them.

Probably the number one favorite of many of us whom we lost in the final year of the 1990s was Joe DiMaggio, the Yankee Clipper, one of nine children of immigrants. I was too young to get in on many of his accomplishments, but my high school buddies and I were probably more impressed with the fact that he married Marilyn Monroe than any of his baseball records. His 56-game hitting streak should stand until the year 2100 at least.

Other sports stars the nation lost in '99 included baseball greats Pee-Wee Reese, 81, who led the Brooklyn Dodgers to seven World Series appearances and Catfish Hunter, who was only 53 and was the first multi-million dollar player; an even younger Walter Payton, at age 45, who is the NFL's all-time leading rusher with 16,726 yards, and never did a tacky dance in the end zone.

Wilt "The Stilt" Chamberlain was another all-star we lost. He is the only player to score 100 points in an NBA game -another eye-popping feat. Golfer Payne Stewart was another who died while in his prime. He was one of his sport's most respected players.

Of all the "public people" the nation lost in 1999, John F. Kennedy, Jr. was probably our most tragic, given his young age, 38, with so many possible triumphs in his future. The first baby to live in the White House since the Grover Cleveland term which started in 1885, he didn't live to run for office or to have a child. He didn't even live as long as his famous father, John F. Kennedy. Movie stars who died in the past year included 1930s actress Sylvia Sidney and George C. Scott, who many considered the best actor of the last half century. Scott, who was 72, won an Oscar for "Patton," but never attended the ceremonies. Victor Mature, an early Hollywood "muscle man," died at age 86. He was best remembered for his role in "Samson and Delilah." Pete Conrad, 69, was our country's third astronaut to walk on the moon. Small in stature at 5-6, he made up for his size in his exuberance. We have all enjoyed the "Christmas Song," otherwise known as "Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire," so you'd think it had been around a hundred years. However, its composer, Mel Torme, died last June at the age of 73. Television fans mourned the loss of Allen Funt. Funt, 84, was the creator of "Candid Camera," which caused more than two generations to laugh. DeForest Kelley, 79, is recognized by "Star Trek" fans as Bones. He was in a lot of other roles, but will always be remembered for this one. Lili St. Cyr (remember her?) was sexy blonde pinup in the 1940s and 50s. She may have inspired another starlet to dye her hair blonde and talk in a breathy whisper, and change her name to Marilyn.


Funeral services for Billy W. Turner, 75, were conducted Monday, January 10 at First Baptist Church, with Rev. Dale Cain officiating.



#### **Helping Hands** Herring Breaks New Ground With Assisted Living Home

At 32, the smiling owner of the recently opened Sunny Vista assisted-living home is accustomed to making de-

cisions, hiring employees and giving directions. Jamie Herring, originally from Friona, has been taking command of situations since she was a 16-year-old high

school sophomore. Though she spent the last two weeks of her sophomore year plus the entire summer and the first two weeks of her junior year in rehabilitation following an accident, she came back to school ready-and apparently able -- to handle any challenge life offers.

Has it been hard for her to adjust to a wheelchair? "Everybody asks me that, and I tell them 'Not really,' because I had a lot of family support and things like that. Of course, that makes all the difference in the world.

"They were telling me, "What are you going to do next?' So, it was finish school and go on." She went on to Texas Tech in 1986 and completed her bachelor's and master's degrees in business with an emphasis on health corp emphasis on health care administration.

She remembers living on campus for four years. "I would take people with me to take my notes for me. Then I moved off campus when I started the master's program.

After getting her MBA, After getting her MBA, she joined a home health agency where she continued to learn. "I had a lot of experience in hiring my attendants, my own em-ployees. I had done that for years."

Now she has embarked on her first business venture--a country-style assisted living home.

It's a home where residents can keep a small pet in their bedroom, and a large animal in their backyard. At least that's the kind of figurative latitude possible to

future residents. Herring keeps her friendly dog, Freckles, at her side now

now. Sunny Vista is the cul-mination of plans that Herring has long held for her own assisted-living business. She had been renting her private house from Weldon and Frances Morgan, who are partice in the home rental active in the home rental sector of the real estate business.

Morgan remembers that he had acquired a large house, and moved it onto a five-acre tract near the intersection of FM 2528 (North Frankford) and FM 1294

"We went over there and looked at it, and found out we could divide it up into eight bedrooms. It suited her, and it suited me."

It was an instant deal. The Morgans then conducted an extensive reno-vation on the home that included a sunroom where residents can look across an open expanse to the northeast.

Herring already has her first resident and a 24-hour staff to handle patients' needs in the home. She operates from the wheelchair and a telephone that has become a kind of command post for the enterprise.

Sunny Vista functions un-der a Type A license, and has a capacity for eight to 10 residents. Four of the rooms are private, and the others are semi-private.

There is a common living room and kitchen area, and everything has been built to ADA specifications.

"We made it totally acces-sible," Herring said. "That wasn't hard because of the way they laid the foundation-it was flat and smooth. And Weldon went ahead and built a sidewalk out to my house,

a sidewalk out to my house, which is real handy." She added, "I kind of knew what we had to have to make the state happy, and we went by and visited with them before we even started so we would know exactly how big the rooms needed to how big the rooms needed to be and things like that."

Herring can relate to people who need assistance in their daily lives.

"I've had people taking care of me for many years, and I feel like these other people deserve to have good care, too. So, I look for people (staff) who will take good care of them. I know exactly what they are going through.

Morgan said he would provide a garden area for future residents and plans to build fenced-in areas for

animals. Herring explained, "A lot of the elderly who have an animal, that's all they have, and they don't want to get rid of it. We don't mind them bringing it--we all like

The City Council of the City of Friona met Monday, January 12, 2000 in the council chambers at city hall. Mayor Monroe called the meeting to order. Members present were Aldermen Osborn, Taylor, Gurley and Neill. Alderman Atwell was absent. The invocation was given by Mayor Monroe.

The council considered the purchase of a generator for the north well field. It was noted that there was a backup system at the 6th Street plant for emergency power until the booster pump was changed and now the City has no back-up in case of a power failure.

A generator can be purchased in Tennessee which will run two wells and a booster at the north plant for a cost of \$17,000. It was also noted that there will be some additional installation charges

Alderman Taylor moved to purchase the generator on an emergency basis because of the immediate need. Osborn seconded and the motion passed unanimously.



# Windbreaks Suggested

## **For Area Homesteads**

windbreaks determine where the production land ends and the homestead or "yard" begins. For Parmer County landowners such windbreaks establish more than a living boundary they also provide protection for the residence.

Seedlings to create wind-breaks, produced by the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery in Lubbock, are now available for order through your local Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Evergreens are sold in boxes of 30, bare-root hardwoods in bundles of 100 and a wildlife packet contains 100 trees. Trees are shipped in the spring, but stock is limited and landowners are encouraged to order trees as soon as possible.

Farmstead windbreaks, when planted 100 feet from a homestead or ranch head-quarter, block hot, dry summer winds and in the winter, cold and possibly snow-driven gusts.

'As a result, windbreaks increase a residence's heating and cooling efficiency," says Brian Scott, Texas Forest Service staff forester in Amarillo.

On a farm or ranch, homestead a homestead, and act as a sound barrier to highway or farm road traffic.

> To ensure maximum performance, a four-row farmstead windbreak is recommended: an

outside shrub row, providing low density protection; two interior evergreen rows, supplying year round security; and an inside tall deciduous row, extending the zone of protection.

Each tree row within a homestead windbreak plays a unique and yet concerted role in the life and effectiveness of the break.

The deciduous tree row, which produces a tall barrier quicker than the evergreen, provides earlier protection and also extends the maxi-mum zone of protection on the lee side. And for landowners desiring wildlife, the shrubs produce fruit, cover and browse habitat.

In regions where heavy snow fall is a threat a north-side shrub row planted 40 feet from the main windbreak will prevent snow buildup against the house and along the entry-way leading up to the home

The table at left provides the natural recharge/irrigation recirculation calculations for each of the 21 counties in the Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Region. The weighted average for the region is 3.43 inches of natural recharge/irrigation recirculation.

Nativ and Riggio (1990), using Tritium as a tracer, calculated the natural recharge rate to be from 0.5 to 3.24 inches per year in the Southern High Plains of Texas.

During the 1985 to 1995 study period, the average annual precipitation recorded at most of the National Weather Service stations in the region indicated above precipitation average amounts.

The evaluation is not intended to suggest that additional studies or evaluations of natural recharge in the region should not be made, but rather to point out that during periods of average precipitation, it appears that a significant amount of natural recharge occurs, for which we are very thankful.

The amount of natural recharge that occurred during 1998, a drought of record year, was likely near zero. In contrast, 1999 provided precipitation amounts of more than six inches above the long-term average in a portion of the area, with two to four inches above average for the entire region. Depth-to-water measurements made in observation wells in January and February 2000 will likely indicate rises in water levels in a large number of the wells, as compared to measurements in January and February 1999. Some of the rises will likely be a result of the filling of the cones of depression around measured wells as a result of below average pumpage in 1999. Some of the rises will probably be a result of natural recharge. Only time will tell.

The difference between the net change in storage and average water use between 1985-1995 would have to be natural recharge/irrigation recirculation. The volume is listed in this column.
