County Show January 25-28

The Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show gets underway this weekend in Friona, with judging slated for Saturday and Sunday. Weigh-in for barrows was to take place Friday afternoon. Weigh-in and classification of lambs and steers will be held from 7-9 a.m. Saturday.

Judging begins at noon Saturday with the lambs. The barrow show begins at 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

The steer and heifer show will be held on Sunday beginning at 2 p.m.

The auction sale is scheduled for Monday, January 28, beginning at 6 p.m.

Judges for the county show will be Bert Williams of Spearman for the barrows; Chris Miller of Ropesville for lambs; and Ross Caviness of Canyon for steers and heifers.

FHS Class Makes Patriotic Display

The HECE class at Friona High School, which is under the direction of Gayle Murdock, is sponsoring an on-going display in the trophy case area outside the FHS gym, listing local graduates involved in the military.

"Most of the people we have shown on the display are graduates of Friona High School, although in some cases, they may have gone to school here several years but graduated elsewhere," Murdock said.

The display spotlights local servicemen and women who are stationed in Saudi Arabia and anywhere else in the world. They are marked on a map of the area, and they also are listed on file cards at the side of the display, with their names and addresses.

At the present time, there are 43 Friona exes included on the display.

The display also includes pictures and newspaper clippings of articles regarding the servicemen and women. Parents may bring pictures to be included in the display, and are also urged to keep the school informed when there is a change of address for the serviceperson.

Members of the HECE class have sent all of those on the list a picture of the display, as well as addresses of the other military personnel. Class members also have been busy writing notes to the individuals, which will be mailed to them, Murdock said.

At the present time, there are either 13 or 14 FHS exes stationed in Saudi Arabia.

The class has really enjoyed this project, Murdock said.

People attending basketball games or other functions at FHS are urged to look for the display.

Cards Are Issued By Local Library

In a move that travels from the horse and buggy days to the space age, local Library patrons will now have automated Library cards. The cards are being issued to facilitate the use of the on-line circulation portion of the Harrington Library Consortium electronic network of libraries.

Local holdings were entered into the HLC database in 1987 following the installation of a computer terminal access point on a grant from the Texas State Library. A second grant-funded access point was installed in October, 1990. Currently local patron records are being added to the HLC Databases for circulation purposes.

The automated Library card from Friona Public Library will enable the patron to borrow items from other HLC libraries in the

system provided that patron's home library record is in good standing. Being delinquent, owing money, etc., will disqualify a patron from HLC services areawide.

Registration for Library cards began locally December 3 and is presently continuing. "We would like to encourage everyone to come in and register for a Library card and to try out the public access electronic catalog. Identification in the forms of Social Security cards and driver's license are required. We would like to express our gratitude for your patience and cooperation during this transition," said Darla Bracken, local librarian.

Snow Mon. Leaves .5"

About a half-inch of snow covered the ground locally Monday morning, and the "melt" in Friona's official gauge added .5 added .05 inches to the month's above-average moisture total.

Through January 25, the moisture received in Friona has amounted to 1.07 inches, which is well above average for the month of January, and is the most January moisture logged in several years locally.

Cold fronts cooled things down after a Saturday afternoon high of 63 was achieved. Sunday's high was only 29, and Monday the mercury reached only 29 degrees.

Vicki Knight Gives Saudi Impressions

A Friona officer in the U.S. Army, 1SG Vicki Knight, says it sounds to her as though the campaign by the Allied Forces in the Persian Gulf is going well.

Sgt. Knight has been on a 15-day leave from the service to attend the funeral of her father, J.E. Knight. She left two days prior to the beginning of "Operation Desert Storm."

"I had mixed feelings about being gone at the time that the operation was begun," Sgt. Knight said. She has been in Saudi Arabia since last fall.

The Friona career soldier was with some eight or ten other military personnel who flew out of Saudi Arabia for emergency leave prior to the beginning of the attack on Iraq by Allied Forces.

She said she probably would have had trouble getting out of Saudi Arabia if it had been after the attacks began, due to the heightened activity by the Allied planes.

Knight said she thought it was proper that President Bush didn't give Saddam Hussein an extension on the January 15th deadline for getting out of Kuwait.

"I feel as though he was using Kuwait as a stepping stone, and if we hadn't fought him now, we would have later, and I'd rather fight him over there than here," the Friona native said.

Knight said that the morale of the troops in Saudi Arabia had been great. "The only bad part about it had been the waiting, and now that's over."

"I have received a number of nice letters from Friona residents,

and everyone in my unit has also received a lot of correspondence. The support from home has really been great, and we really appreciate it. It means a lot to know that the home folks are thinking about us," Sgt. Knight said.

As to her reaction to protesters to the U.S. involvement in the Persian Gulf who are shown on television, Sgt. Knight said naturally this was very irritating to her personally.

"But that's one of the rights that we're over there fighting for. It's their freedom to protest, and I'm thankful to live in a country where you can go down to the courthouse square and protest if you feel like it. If people did anything like that in Iraq, they would be killed, and probably the protesters' family members as well," she said.

Sgt. Knight said she had

forgotten what a luxury it was to have a nice tub bath, indicating that the troops have to make do with showers, and they aren't always inside a building.

Where she had been quartered was not that well enclosed, and the cold of the Saudi winter was beginning to be about as uncomfortable as the summer's heat, Knight said.

"I have gained a new respect for my folks and the things they endured during the early days in this country," she said.

The Friona native said that Saudi Arabia is an antiquated country, compared to ours. A main thing noticed by Americans is the way that women there are treated as "second class citizens." She said that public buses have a caged-off section at the back of the buses where the women must ride.

The U.S. government had to get special permission for the women in the military to drive on their highways.

Also, the Arab nations deal a lot more harshly with their criminals, and it was evident that there was considerably less crime over there. Otherwise, their cities are somewhat modern, but it was strange, Knight said, to see the Saudis herding camels in four-wheel drive vehicles.

Sgt. Knight is in the aviation brigade, and her unit provides support to the ground troops. Her unit had not moved north when she left for the states, but she figures that they have by this time.

As to her apprehension about returning to the Middle East after the hostilities have started, Sgt.

55 YEARS AGO--JAN. 17, 1936

Conway Frost of Friona has been recommended for a varsity football letter at Hardin-Simmons University for the 1935 season, head coach Frank Kimbrough announced. Frost earned his first letter playing at a backfield position.

50 YEARS AGO--JAN. 17, 1941

Work on the row of tourist camp cottages that has been in progress for the past several weeks, for James P. Wilson on the north side of Highway 33-60, has been practically completed.

Gil Stricklin will be the speaker for the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet Saturday, January 17.

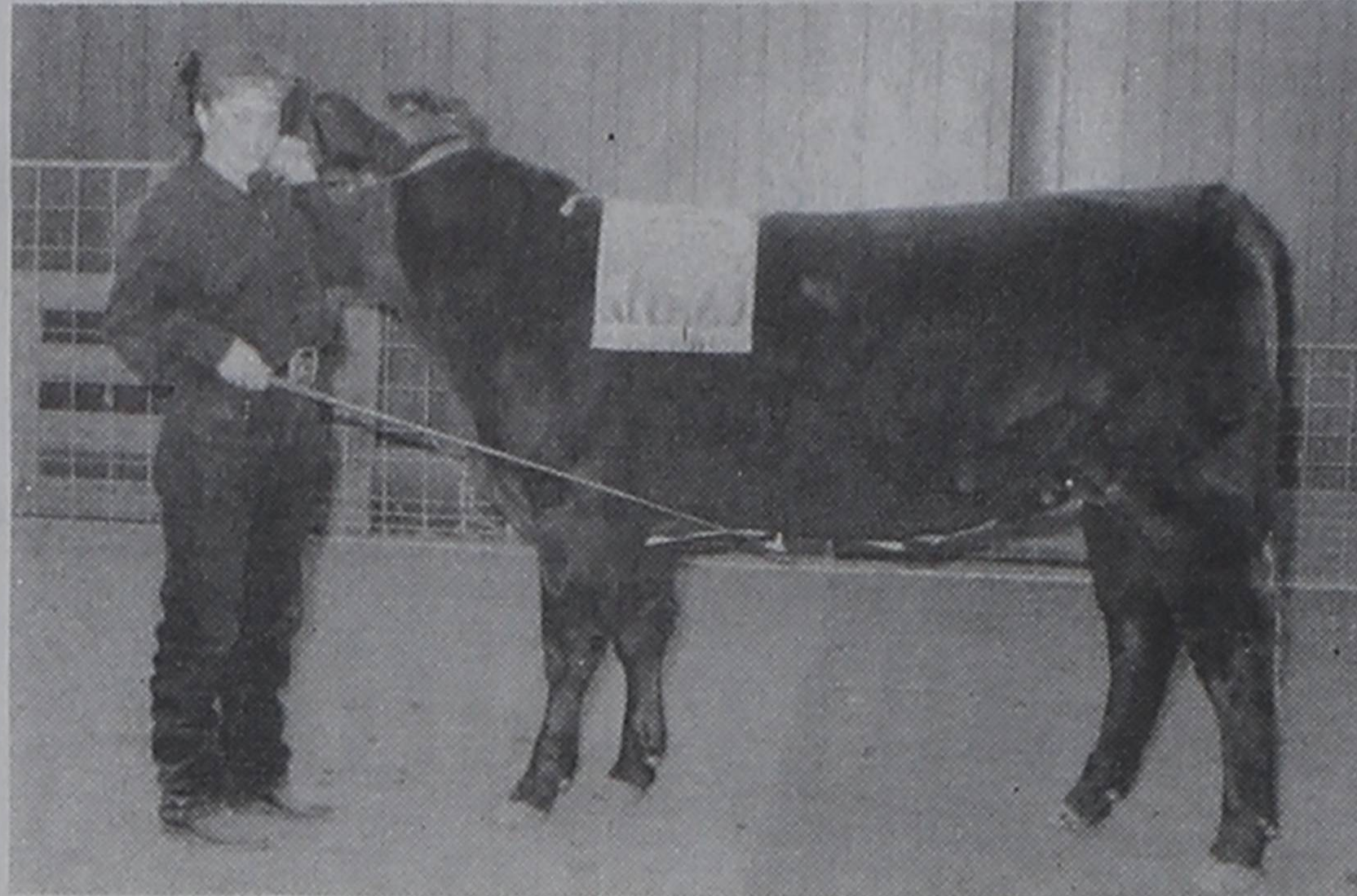

Knight said naturally she was somewhat worried, but "that's where I'm supposed to be, so I need to get back there."

She said that if the U.S. and the Allies waged war like Saddam Hussein does, without regard to human life, there was a possibility that the war might have been considerably shorter. "But I'd rather take longer and be humane about it," she said.

"I'm just anxious to get the job done, get him (Hussein) out of power, and assure that he won't be able to start over in a few years," Sgt. Knight said.

"The United States may have a lot of problems and faults, but I haven't been in a place (in her military career) that has a better system," she concluded.

Sgt. Knight is a 1976 graduate of Friona High School. Her main duties at present are in record-keeping, although she is trained as a helicopter mechanic and inspector.

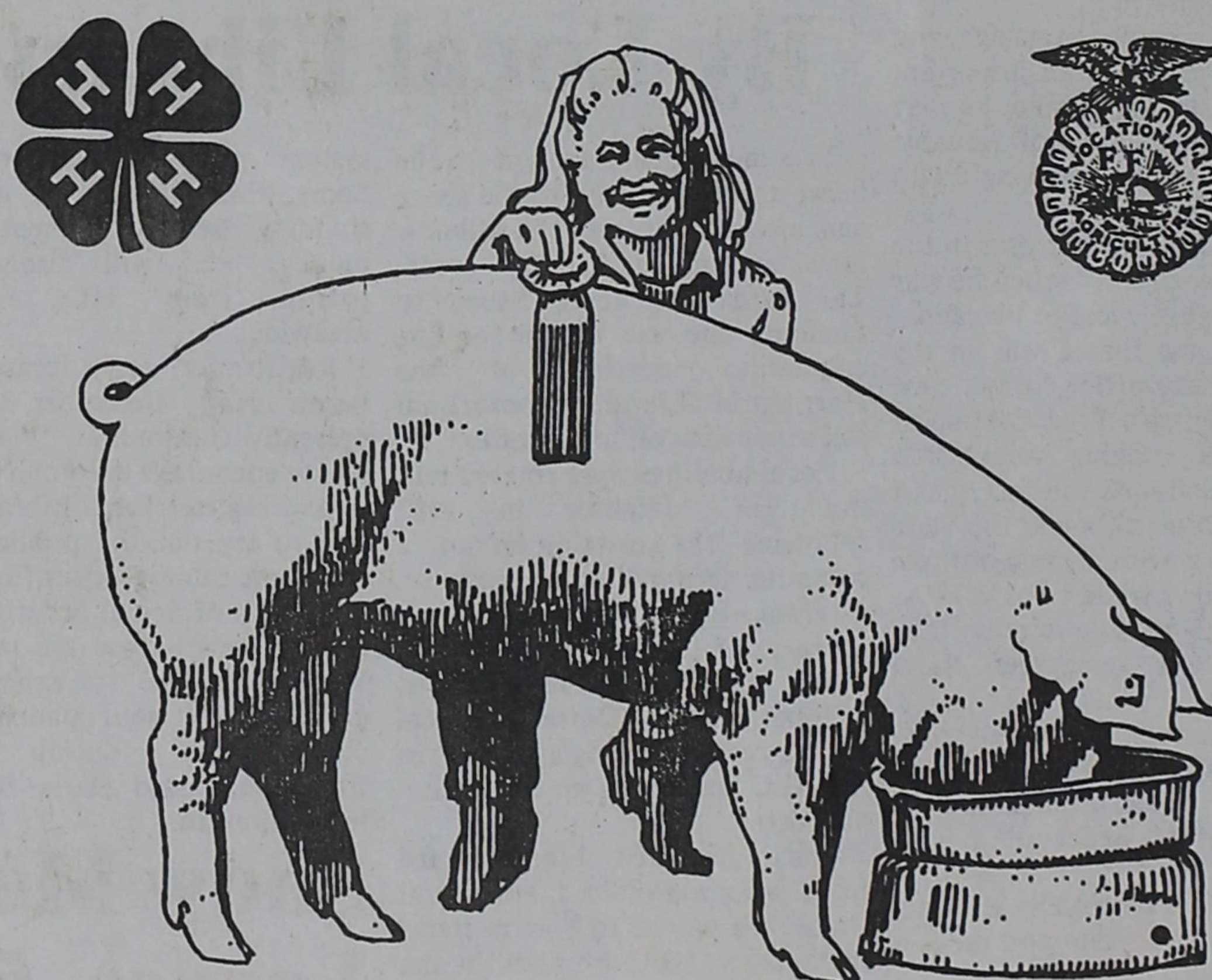

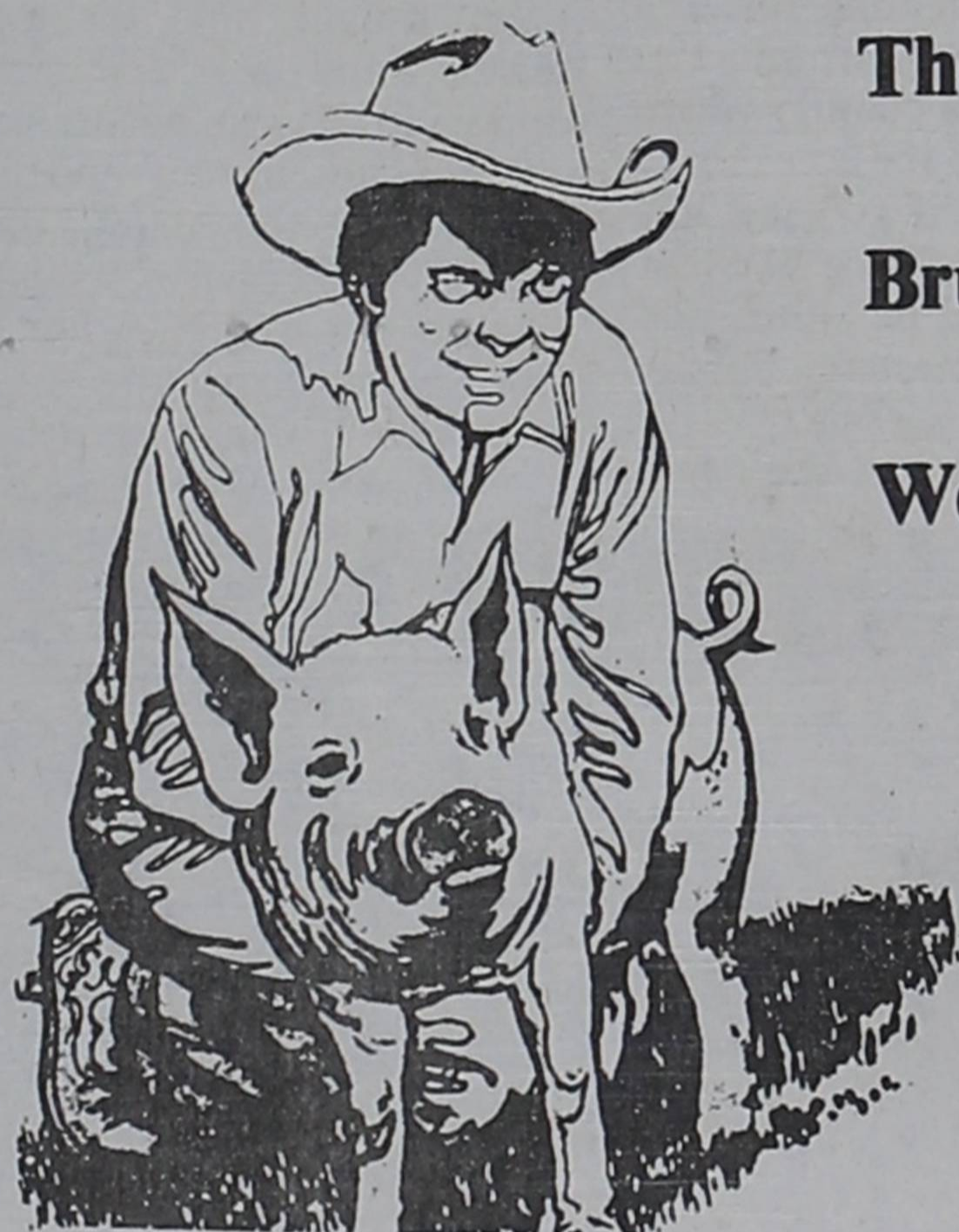

44th Annual Junior Livestock Show Set

The 44th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held January 25-28 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

Judging will be held on Saturday and Sunday, starting with the lamb show on Saturday at noon, and the barrow show at 4 p.m. Saturday.

Steers and heifers will be judged Sunday afternoon beginning at 1 p.m.

The auction sale will be held Monday, January 28 beginning at 6 p.m.

Barrows will be weighed in on Friday, January 25 from 1-5 p.m. Lambs will be weighed in Saturday, January 26, from 7-9 a.m.

Judges for the county show will be Bert Williams of Spearman for the barrow show; Chris Miller of Ropesville for the lamb show, and Ross Caviness of Canyon for steers and heifers.

Exhibitors of grand champion animals in the 1990 show were Cammy Hancock of Friona in the barrow show; Rusty Simmons of Friona in the steer show; Cade Morris of Lazbuddie in the lamb show; and Shannon Cochran of Friona in the heifer show.

Miss Hancock gave her community its 11th win in the barrow show with her 228-pound Yorkshire. It was the first Yorkshire to be tapped for the county barrow title in the 43-year history of the county show.

The win by the Yorkshire broke a streak of seven straight years when Hampshire barrows had won the county title, and 15 years overall. The barrow show is always by far the toughest competition of any of the divisions of the show.

Hampshire breeds hold a wide lead in the overall history of the show with their 15 titles. Duroc barrows have won eight times; crossbreeds have won on seven occasions, Polands have been tapped six times, Chester Whites four, and now Yorkshires, once.

Simmons won the steer title with a 1235-pound Maine Anjou-Chianina crossbred animal, and

stretched the Friona young showmen's lead in that division to 25 titles of the last 43 awarded.

Stock show boosters and buyers are urged to attend the premium auction sale. The animals placing at the top portion of each class will be eligible for the sale.

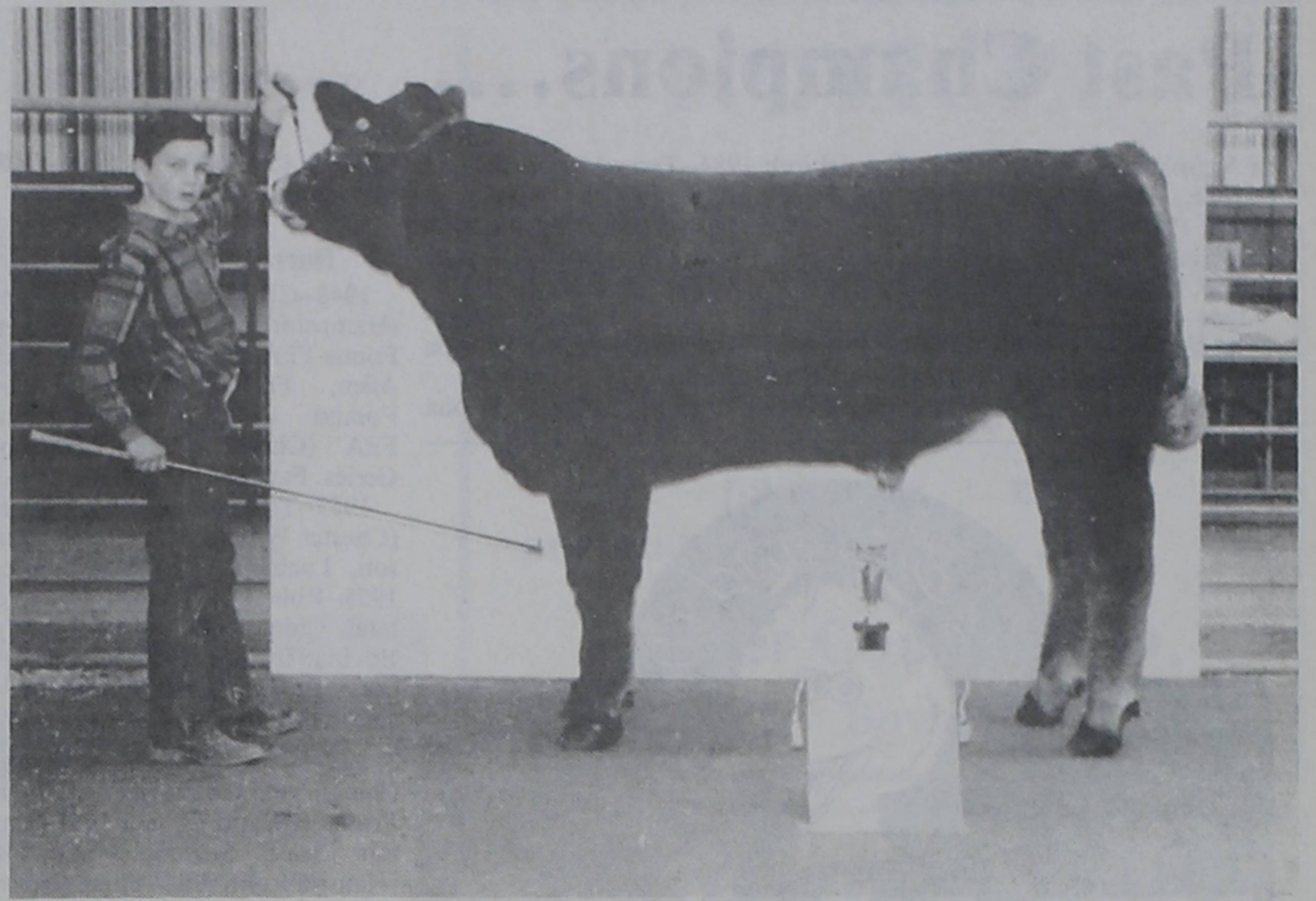

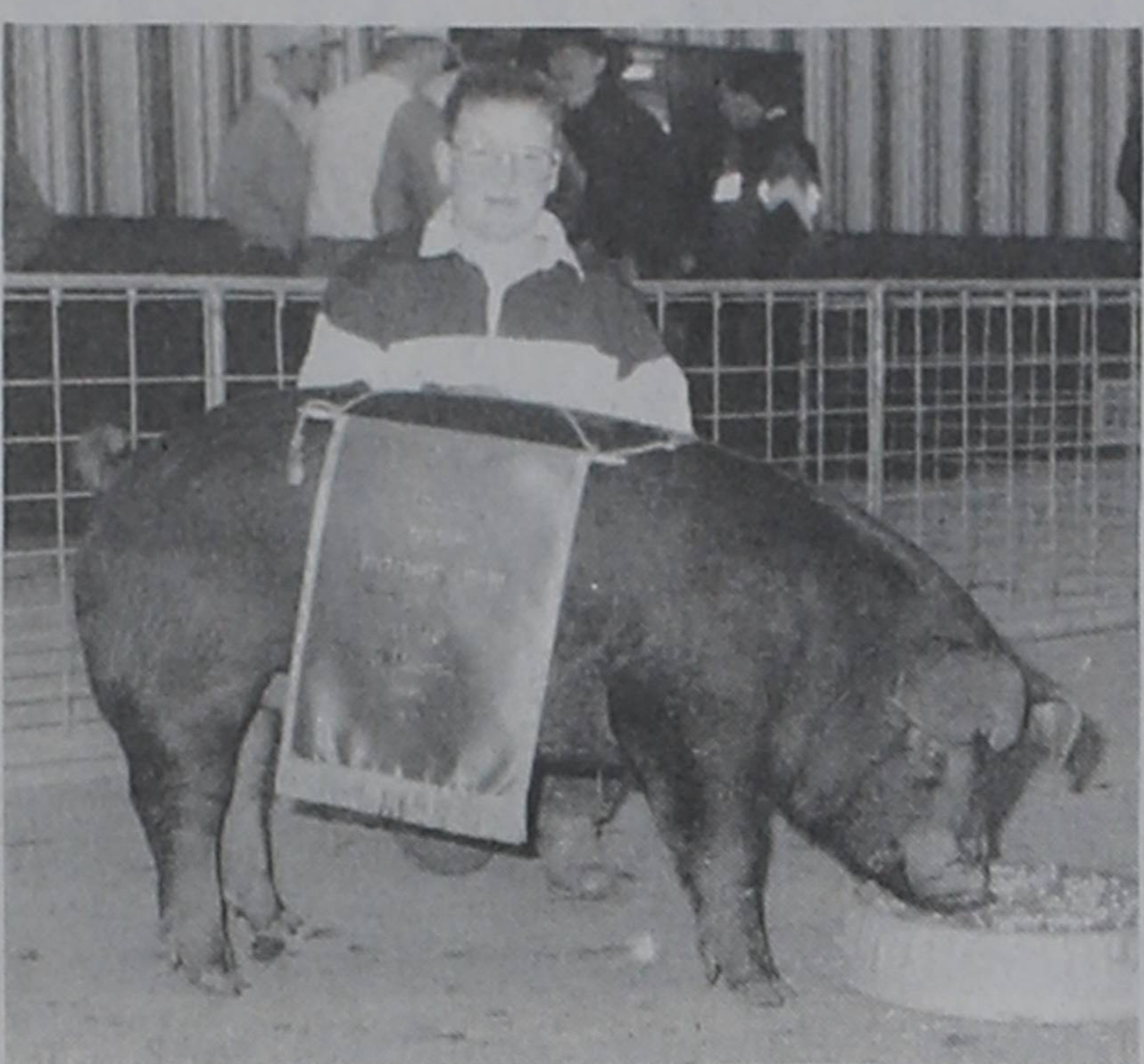

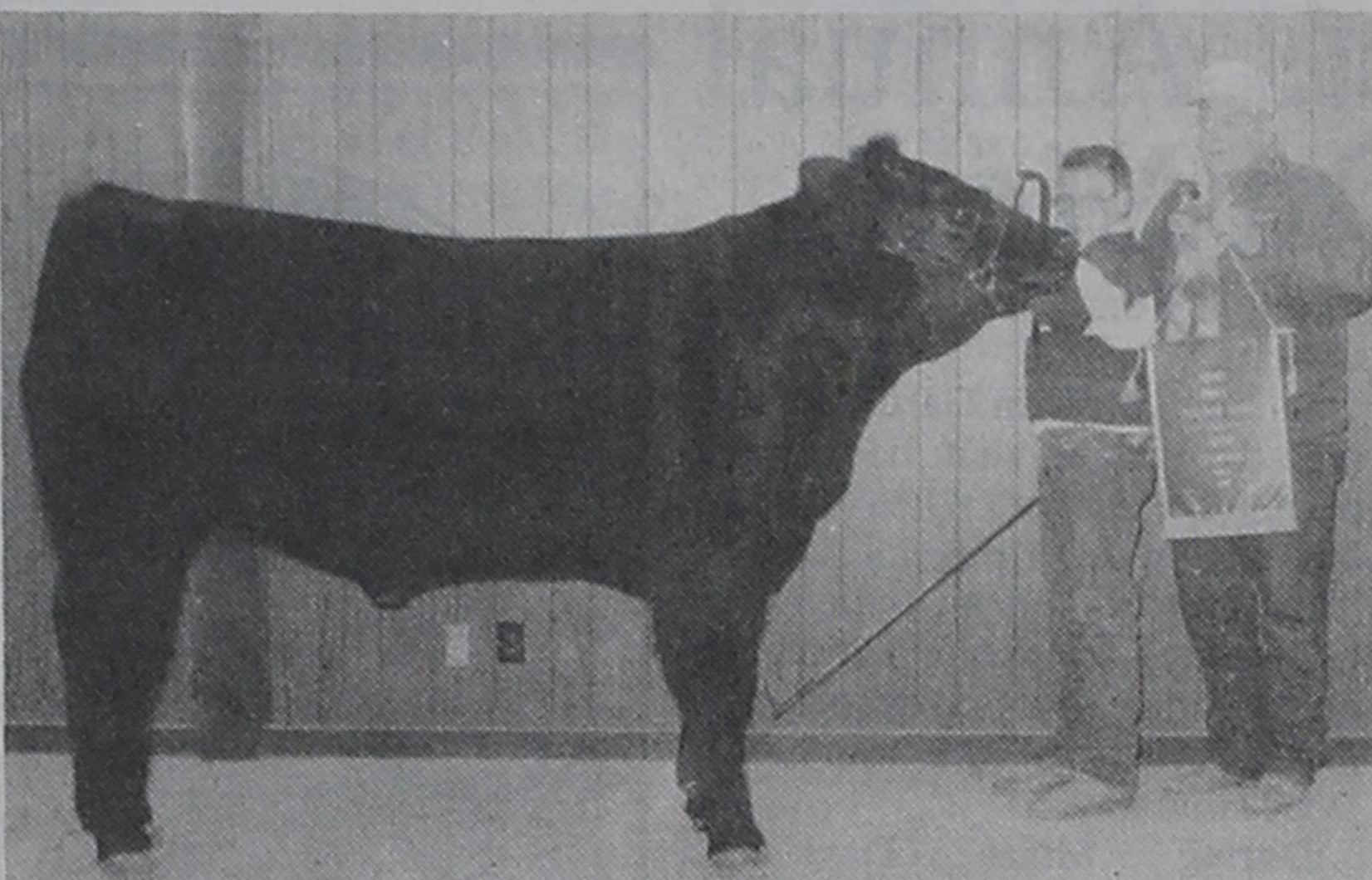

Plan Reasonable Results Based On Proven Experience

These were net gains after all expenses, including a 5.75 percent sales charge, were deducted. Of course, this was a period of generally rising stock prices, and there were no guarantees that the fund's performance would continue.

These figures illustrate that it is

never too late to start investing. Even if you start an investment program in your 60s you can still build a substantial nest egg.

Often it is not until later in life that there is enough extra income to begin a regular investing program. If you face this dilemma, don't despair. Budget a reasonable amount each month and have the mutual fund of your choice run some hypothetical illustrations to show how much your monthly investment could grow to at various rates of return after certain periods of time.

It is simple and should cost you nothing. The only requirement is that your fund must have been in business at least the length of time you want your illustration to cover.

By using past performance figures of a mutual fund you can't guarantee future results but you can get a reasonable guide in terms of what to expect. Plan reasonable results based on proven experience. Unrealistic expectations can be a disappointment.

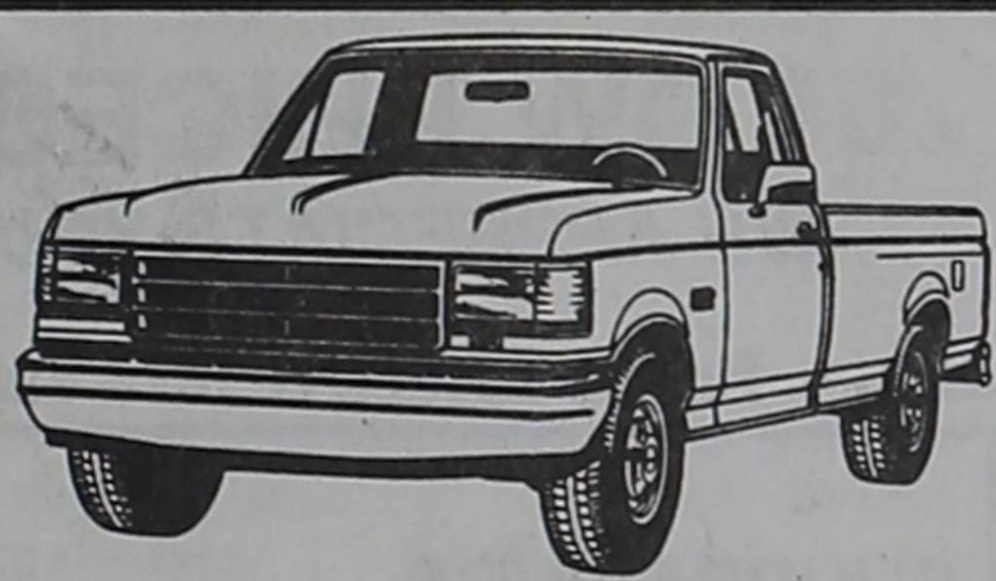

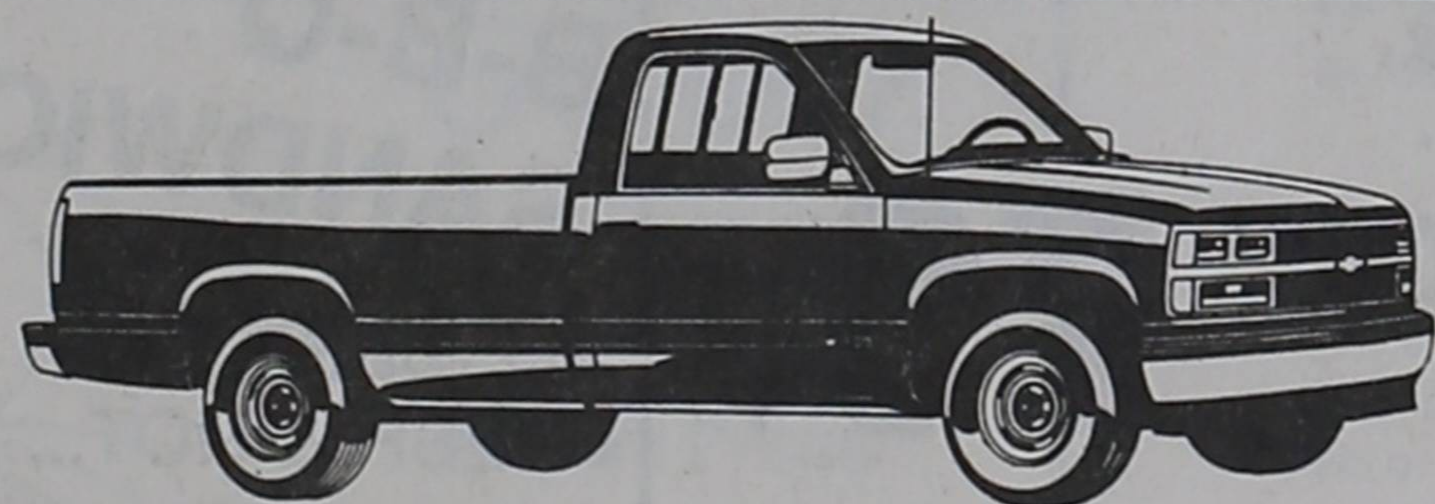

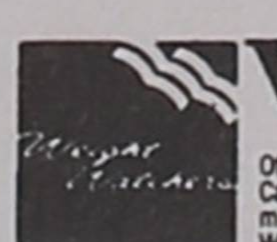

Resident's Rites Are Conducted





State-Ranked DHS Prevails

District-leading Dimmitt teams visited Friona for games this past Tuesday, and fans got an idea why both the Bobbies and Bobcats are ranked high in the statewide polls.

The Bobbies topped the Squaws, 64-36, and the potent Bobcats came on strong in the second half for a 90-63 win over a Friona Chieftain team.

The Squaws are still trying to regroup after losing high-scoring Jenny Procter just ten days earlier to a knee injury.

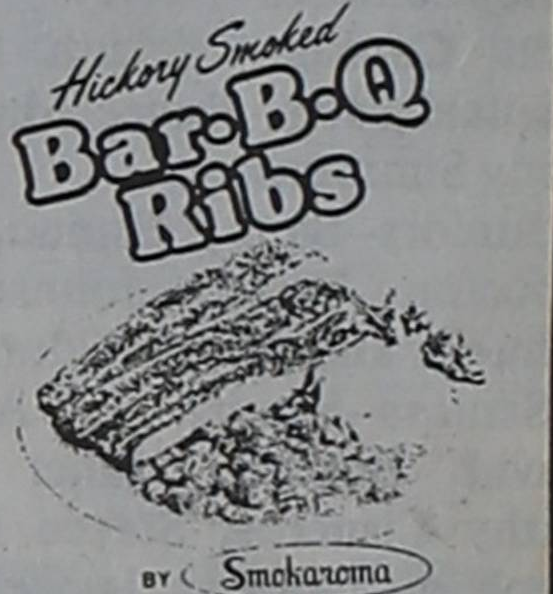
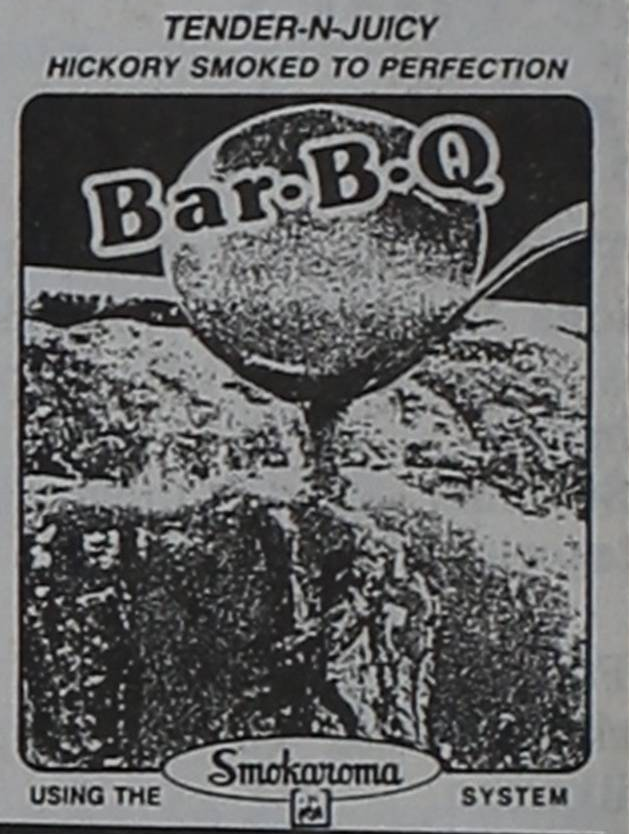

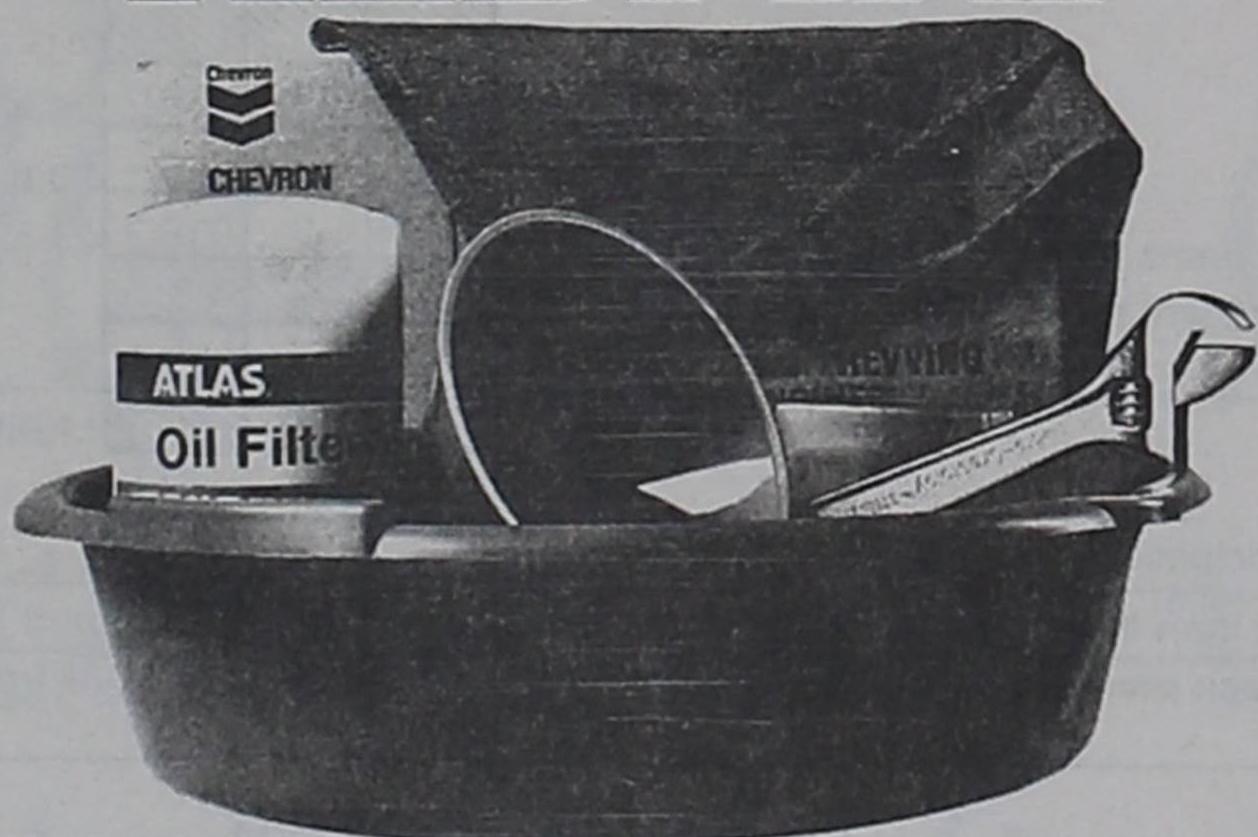
