Bids were taken on pumping equipment (26 close coupled vertical turbine pumps with motors) for six different locations, along with bids on furnishing and erecting steel ground storage tanks: 2 Tanks - 1.5 MG each and 2 Tanks -0.625 MG each.

Contractors could bid on the entire project or on one or more of ten separate segments of the project. This was done so that smaller contractors could compete with the larger contractors. Also included on the bid sheets were different makes of transmission lines and pumps and other equipment.

The Directors will meet with the Engineers Thursday, November 4th to review the low bids and hopefully contracts can be signed in the next few days. Construction on the project could start within the next four or five weeks.

The entire project will cost approximately 12 million dollars which is about 2 million less than was originally estimated.





Q: What is the best cleaner to use to wash my car?

Vinterize Lawn and Garden Tools

Now that the 1982 gardening season

has come to a close, you'll want to take time to "winterize" your lawn and garden tools and equipment. Too often in the late fall the gardener will roll up the hose, push the lawn mower into a corner, put the sprayer away and promptly forget about them until spring. However, in order for your lawn and garden equipment to operate smoothly and efficiently come spring. they really need a few minutes of your time now to carry through the winter in

Here are some suggestions aimed to help you winterize your lawn and garden equipment:

Lawn mowers, rototillers, gasoline edgers, etc.: Run the engine until empty. Do not leave gasoline in the tank over winter. Once the engine has cooled, clean the housing thoroughly, scraping off accumulation of mud and grass clippings. Disconnect spark plug wire, then remove and sharpen mower blade. Clean or replace the air filter. Drain oil and tie a reminder tag on the handle to fill with oil in spring. Store in a garage or storage building out of the weather.

Rechargeable electric shears, edgers, etc.: Most of these products suggest they be stored discharged. My personal experience, however, has taught me to recharge them fully and run them several times during the winter. Clean and oil the blades before storing.

Sprinklers, hoses and other watering

Sprinklers have tiny reservoirs and passages that collect water. If allowed to stay out during the winter, the water freezes and can easily break the equipment. Hoses should be drained. rolled and stored inside. The high quality flexible hoses are fairly durable and can remain outside provided you don't step on them or try to move them while they're frozen.

Fertilizer spreaders: Rinse these carefully and thoroughly if you've not already done so. Let dry a few hours. then wipe over with an oily rag to protect metal surfaces. Oil all moving

Spray equipment: Wash thoroughly with detergent and warm water if you failed to do so last time that you sprayed. Put the equipment under pressure to clean out the nozzles. Clean any screen filters. If your compression sprayer fails to hold pressure, you may want to buy a set of new leathers now to

be ready for spring. Hose-on type garden sprayers should not need much attention, though "back-flushing" is advisable to clean out the siphon tube.

Finally, look over your arsenal of pesticides and discard any that are old. containers rusted or torn, or labels not legible.

Late Homestead Filings Section 11.431 of the Texas Property Tax Code allows taxpayers to make application for residence homestead

exemptions after the filing deadline has passed, so long as they don't apply more than a year after the date the homestead taxes were paid or became delinquent (whichever is earlier).

If homestead taxes have already been paid, the collector must refund the tax imposed on the homestead exemption. but only if directed by the chief appraiser. The chief appraiser has sole authority to approve or deny any late filings for homestead exemptions.

**FmHA Interest Rates** The Farmers Home Farm Operating Loan interest rates is reduced to 11.5% on November 1, down from 13.25%. Farm ownership loans are to be reduced from 13% to 11.5%. Limited resource ownership loans will drop from 6.5 to 5.75% while limited-resource operating loans will go from 10.25% to 8.5%. Emergency loans for those who could not get credit elsewhere for the actual losses from disaster will drop from 16.25% to 14.25% rate.

CCC Reports

The Community Credit Corporation reported that as of August 31, 1982, their inventories and commodity loans totaled \$14.8 billion. Loans outstanding totaled \$9.8 billion, and inventories \$5.0 billion. A year earlier, CCC had a total investment of \$7.5 billion, including \$3.7 billion in loans outstanding and inventories of \$3.8 billion.

Toxaphene Use Limited

The EPA has announced it intends to cancel all major uses of the pesticide toxaphene except cattle and sheep spraying or dipping. Toxaphene is used mostly in the southern states on cotton. wheat, beef cattle, soybeans, and peanuts. This decision was made after the National Cancer Institute established toxaphene as a cancer-causing agent in test animals.

# Disabled Veterans Week is November 7-13

Disabled veterans -- those who use a wheelchair or a prosthetic or orthopedic device - may be entitled to an annual clothing allowance of \$305 from the Veterans Administration.

The clothing allowance normally is paid on August 1st of each year to such veterans with service-connected disabilities to assist them in their normal daily

Congress has recognized that use of such devices can damage a veteran's

clothing. Therefore, it authorized the annual payment. The special allowance is in addition to the veteran's monthly compensation from the VA for his or her specific disability, or military-retire-
