

Perspectives

It seems that the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is at it again. Up in South Dakota, a nativity scene has been erected in the capitol rotunda. They did the same thing last year and the ACLU sued the state government on the basis of violation of church and state separation. They are considering the same action again this year.

Eventually some idiot in the ACLU is going to discover that giving people time off for holidays like Easter and Christmas is recognizing the religious nature of those holidays and is therefore a violation of church-state separation and government employees all over the nation will find themselves having to work holidays.

Church-state separation was never intended to completely isolate the state from all things religious. Indeed in this countty, the amendment never really envissioned the protection of any other religion than Christianity, or at the very least, Deism. Certainly, the amendment was intended only to keep the government from declaring any one denomination or religion to be the official one of the realm. It is time for the ACLU to get off the back of religion, especially Christianity.

On another note, the media reported that one draft of the Catholics Bishops pastoral letter on nuclear armaments asserted that our nuclear arms build up

threatened the sovereignty of God. I find it hard to believe they would make such a statement, but if they did the Bishops need to go back to their theology books. We may argue the morality of the weaponry in term of its costs, radiation storage and leakage dangers, possible use against civilians, etc, but there is no question that God is in charge and that man may not destroy His creation without His permission or intervention.

Finally, an announcer on one of the football games reported that church attendance in the Houston area was up appreciably during the football strike. I've not heard how things are since the end of the strike, but I think I can guess. As one fellow I heard recently said, "Everybody must choose their own god.

'WINTERIZE' YOUR SKIN Winter is a difficult time of the year for many types of skin, with chief

enemies being cold, wind and the drop in relative humidity. Most heating systems also rob the air

of moisture and may cause the skin to crack, become rough or red, scale and develop lines.

Here are some ways to protect yourself--before the bad weather ar-

A moist skin is healthy skin. Use a moisturizer--not to add water or oil to the skin--but to prevent the skin's own water content from escaping.

If you wear an oily, protective makeup base in the winter, a toner can help get your face completely clean. A toner, usually an alcohol-based lotion, should be applied with a cotton pad after cleaning the face. This treatment should be followed with a moisturizer while the skin is damp--unless your skin is so oily that you don't need moisturizer. Astringents--toners with more alcohol--may be used after cleaning the face but may irritate the skin. People with dry skin should avoid products containing alcohol.

Three areas of the face require different amounts of moisturizer. Around the eyes there are few oil glands

and the skin is driest. Pat moisturizer on gently before applying foundation. The cheeks and neck require a lighter moisturizer. The area around the nose and forehead is usually oily and may need little or no moisturizer. Women with extremely oily skin should select and use moisturizers carefully, because they can cause oily skin to break out.

Moisturizers are available in lotions and creams. Lotions have a higher water content and contain less oil. In dry climates, the water in the lotion evaporates rapidly, so one may need a cream for longer protection.

Finally, don't forget to protect lips by using lip conditioner and lipstick or gloss. Winterize your skin indoors and out this season.

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Christmas Greenery

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Keep Holiday Plants Healthy

by Benny Butler

Here's hoping you're among the happy group whose Christmas decor is graced by a beautiful flowering plant. Let's take a look at several of the more popular Christmas flowers and how you'll want to care for them to prolong their beauty.

Poinsettias outrank all other Christmas plants combined in popularity. They are well adapted to indoor temperatures so long as they're out of hot or cold drafts. Put them near a bright window and aim at keeping the soil evenly moist, not wet or dry.

Poinsettias used to be pretty sensitive to changes from a greenhouse environment to that of a home, with leaf and flower drop being a common problem. But now, with newer varieties, you can just about plan on poinsettias on Valentines's Day if you care to keep them around that long.

You can cut the plant back after flowering and set it outside for the summer, but you'll have a real chore bringing it into flower again next Christmas. That's simply a job better left to the professionals.

Kalanchoes should be kept in a sunny window. This plant flowers when the days are short, consequently they are difficult to reflower in the home if carried over from another year. Lights used in the home provide long days and

the plants fail to set flower buds. They do make excellent foliage plants once the flowers are faded, however. Just remove the flower stalk and use as a

Christmas cactus isn't a typical cactus. It requires as much water as any other houseplant, though it should not be overwatered. This is one plant that can be kept over to bloom again next Christmas. Keep it in a sunny window until danger of frost is past, then place it in a shady spot out of doors during the summer. Bring indoors before frost can damage it. Place in a cool room at night. Night temperatures must be below 75°. or it will not bloom.

Cyclamen, or shooting stars, are old favorites. Their large showy flowers are red, pink, salmon or white and really do resemble falling stars. Unfortunately though, the flowers fade and fall pretty fast at 72°, so cyclamen has a pretty short flowering period in the home. If you have the opportunity, keep the plant at 55° whenever possible. Again avoid hot drafts and overwatering.

Azaleas should remain attractive 2-4 weeks in your home, particularly if you'll put them in a 55-60 degree spot each night and during the day when you're not around. They just don't prosper at normal home temperatures.

Families of veterans who select a burial site for a deceased veteran in a private cemetery have two options for Veterans Adminstration assistance in marking the grave.

VA will provide, upon request, a headstone or marker free of charge and ship it to the consignee designated on the application. Cost of placing the marker in a private cemetery must be borne by the applicant, however.

A second option is that VA will reimburse part of the cost of a headstone or marker bought privately and placed on the grave of a veteran. The current amount is \$67, the average cost of headstones purchased by VA.

Application for the VA headstone or marker should be addressed to Director. Monument Service (42), Department of Memorial Affairs, Veterans Administration, 810 Vermont Avenue. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20420.

Application for the \$67 reimbursement for a marker other than the VA standard should be filed at the VA Regional Office. Proper routing of the application will expedite service.

Last summer I received a number of calls from homeowners who were quite concerned about their broad-leafed evergreen shrubs turning vellow or whitish. The problem was caused by euonymus scale insects, which are tiny (about 1/16 inch long), scale-looking insects which feed on several different kinds of shrubs. Among these are euonymus, holly, pachysandra, hibiscus, and camellia shrubs.

Damage from euonymus scales is characterized by yellowish or whitish spots on the leaves. Heavy infestations may cause the plant to drop leaves.

Euonymus scales overwinter as adult females. In the spring, the females lay eggs, and the nymphs which hatch (called "crawlers") move to new growth. Several generations may occur each year. As the nymphs mature, they secrete a waxy shell or scale over themselves. Male euonymus scales are white with light brown ridges running lengthwise the scale. Females look like miniature, dark brown oyster shells. Usually, the homeowner does not recognize that a problem is present until the scales are adults.

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It appears then that euonymus scale insects must be controlled during the crawler stage. My suggestion is, if you experienced a problem with scale insects this past summer, be prepared to treat for crawlers this coming spring. 

Soybean usage growing worldwide

only livestock enjoying the benefits of diets containing soybean meal. Now much of the world's 21 million mink and duck population is also being introduced to rations containing soy protein, thanks to export promotion work of the Texas soybean checkoff. As a result, mink and duck farmers are producing faster gaining, more healthy animals at profitable levels.

Efforts to increase the use of soybean meal in rations for non-conventional markets such as mink and ducks are examples of export promotion activities currently underway by the American Soybean Association. These export promotion activities are being funded by farmer investment in the soybean checkoff.

"In these times of depressed commodity prices farmers need to give wholehearted support to sovbean checkoff investment in innovative export promotion programs such as those Texas farmers conducted through the American Sovbean Association," says Jack Witten, a Kress soybean farmer who currently serves as chairman of the Texas Soybean Producers Board (TSPB). Witten recently announced that the TSPB had sent a check for \$6,000 to the American Soybean Development Foundation for use in continuing worldwide export promotion activities to increase use of soybeans and

Witten cited duck feeding demonstrations in Taiwan as typical of the kind of projects where farmers checkoff investment is helping increase soybean use. An ASA survey of the duck industry in Taiwan in 1977 revealed that the country produced nearly 28 million ducks. The majority of duck feeds however, were composed of corn.

Hogs and chickens are no longer the wheat bran, rice hulls and fishmeal. Use of soybean meal was insignificant.

> In 1978, ASA supervised duck feeding trials for farmers and feed formulators. The trials showed that incorporating a higher percent of soybean meal into duck feeds not only improved feed efficiency, but also increased egg production. As a result of the feeding trials and recommendations of ASA technicians, soybean meal usage jumped 128 percent from 27,000 metric tons in 1975 to over 61,500 metric tons of meal in 1980-the equivalent of over 2.5 million bushels of sovbeans.

Use of soybean meal in mink rations showed a similar large increase after an ASA feeding trial in Denmark and Finland - the world's top two producers of mink and fox. Traditionally animal protein, not soy protein has been the main source of protein for nearly 8 million fur bearing animals in the Nordic Countries.

In 1980, the American Soybean Association conducted feeding trials on mink and fox farms in Denmark to demonstrate that addition of a soybean protein concentrate or a soy flour would be beneficial for fur-bearing

The trial was quite successful. Mink fed a ration containing 10 percent of a Danish produced soybean protein concentrate showed normal growth, More significantly, pelt quality showed a "marked imporvement". Fox fed both defatted and full-fat soy flours showed dightly faster growth rates than animals fed only animal protein.
