Cotton Yield Will Challenge Record

THE PERSIAN GULF is the focus of attention world-wide, and we had a letter this week from a native of that area, Karim Moshrefi of Friona. Moshrefi is a native of Iran. We're excerpting from his letter as space permits:

"Let's pray that people like Saddam realize that human life is not cheap. I wish somehow that Saddam had been stopped more than a decade ago before he destroyed the lives of one million innocent human beings.

"If Saddam never existed, the people of Iraq would not have to see Baghdad's Martyrs Monument, which symbolizes more than 1/2 million lives lost for nothing.

"Unfortunately, the Gulf crisis might end up being another disaster in the history of mankind. Let's pray that people who live at this particular time in the ugly shadow of war will be lucky enough to stay alive and kiss the face of peace and security.

"Saddam's predictable belligerence, along with his well-documented syndrome of 'malignant narcissism' has been demonstrated by the decade of his overacting ambition, arrogance and illogical approach to the invasion of Iran.

"Unfortunately, the world closed its eyes while people from both sides, especially Iranians, were shredded into pieces. The world observed how Arabs, including Kuwaitis, invested millions of dollars to kill Moslem brothers and sisters, trying to bring the country down.

"Knowing Saddam and his esoteric mind and regime, he is not simply going to leave Kuwait.

"Saddam, with his evil deeds, is a mixture of Adolf Hitler and Genghis Khan. Let's not close our eyes, but open them vividly and pray that we don't see the ugly, bitter scream of war. Let's pray that if we see that a man is in chains on the other side of the world, people on the opposite side will ask for justice, freedom, political and social immunity for his fellow man regardless of color. Let's pray that we never see the evaporation and melting of man.

"For peace to become a reality without bloodshed, there are three possibilities. The first and most idealistic outcome is for Saddam to withdraw his army from Kuwait with the condition that the leader of Kuwait be changed.

"Saddam, as a Moslem, should believe that all who believe in God, especially Moslems, are brothers and sisters. Therefore, Saddam should allow all those who left Kuwait to return to their homes. Let God judge him for all those lives he killed without compassion during the last two invasions.

"For the first option to occur, there are two problems. First, it contradicts with the U.S. policy that Kuwait be free without any conditions. Accepting any conditions might leave the door open for further invasion in the future.

"On the other hand, according to Middle East culture, if Saddam leaves Kuwait, he will lose the respect of his supporters and he will degrade himself. He has tried so hard to become the Alexander the Great of the Middle East, but he has failed.

"In the last bloody war in Iran, he was very naive, and if it was not for the help of several countries, he would not have been victorious. Now he is alone, against all who helped him in the war with Iran. Saddam should realize that he has the lives of thousands of people in his hands.

"The second option is for Saddam to be eliminated from either outside or inside, to stop the killing of people who are involved.

"The third option is to extend the sanctions, to show that lots of effort was involved to preserve life, to prevent the firestorm and melting away of life. If none of these options occur, then war is inevitable.

"War--what an ugly word!"

According to the final survey of gins in Parmer County on Thursday of this week, the number of bales of cotton produced in the county in 1990 came to 79,067.

This would make the 1990 cotton crop second in all-time rank according to bales produced, to the 1981 crop. But the yield per acre for the current crop should challenge the all-time record.

(It should be pointed out that the actual number of bales produced in the county may vary somewhat from the stated figure, but it should be a pretty good "barometer" of the 1990 crop. Final official figures will not be known until later in the year.)

The most bales of cotton ever produced in Parmer County, according to figures supplied by Plains Cotton Growers, was 87,600 bales in 1981.

However, the 1981 total was produced on 83,300 harvested acres of cotton, while the 1990 production came from 48,895 harvestable acres, according to the

Parmer County ASCS office.

Based on the number of bales ginned in the survey, the 1990 crop produced an average of 776.2 pounds of cotton per acre, based on an average net bale weight of 480 pounds. The best yield-per-acre on record in the county is one of 789 pounds by the 1962 crop, when an estimated 79,000 bales were produced on 48,000 acres--very similar to the past crop year.

Most of the gins surveyed indicated that the 1990 crop allowed them to gin the most cotton individually that they had in their previous history in a given year.

"The good cotton will really help the economy, especially since corn didn't make as much as it usually does," said Leo Ruzicka of West Hub Gin.

Farmers have made not only a much better than average yield for their 1990 cotton crop, but also saw market prices well above average, and this was a good combination.

Beet Growers Set Annual Banquet

"Know Your Partner" is the theme for the 1991 Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association Annual Meeting and Banquet to be held January 18-19 in Hereford.

The close "partnership" between Imperial Holly Corp. and regional beet growers helped bring about a record crop of more than one million tons in 1990.

Imperial Holly officials and growers will discuss how the better-than-bumper crop came about and how production can be improved even more during the annual meeting at 9:30 a.m. Friday, January 18 at the Hereford Community Center. They will also celebrate the banner year further at the annual banquet at 7 p.m. Saturday, January 19 at the Bull Barn exposition center.

"Never before has the relationship between growers and our processing partner Imperial Holly been as important--or as strong--as it is now," said Bill Cleaver of Wildorado, TSBGA president. "The meeting and banquet will give all of us an opportunity to get to know our 'partners' even better."

Denny Kempner, chairman of the board for Imperial Holly in Sugar Land, will be the banquet keynote speaker. He is expected to address the expansion program at the Hereford Holly plant in which

a \$12 million ion exclusion facility is being built. The facility, expected to be operational for this year's crop, will enable the plant to extract ten per cent more sugar from beets produced in the region.

Dennis Printz, Hereford Holly agricultural manager, will review the exceptional crop, which saw yields average 24.7 tons per acre from more than 40,000 acres.

Noted humorist Robert Gadberry of Wichita, Kansas, will join Kempner as a banquet speaker.

'Perfect' Snowfall Leaves Eight Inches

One of the best snowstorms in a number of years hit the Friona area Wednesday, bringing the first measurable moisture for 1991.

The snow began falling about 3 p.m. Wednesday, and fell until past 10 p.m., falling at about the rate of an inch per hour.

Eight inches of snow was the official measurement in Friona, and the "melt" from the gauge came to .84 inches, which approximates a tenth of an inch of moisture for an inch of snow.

The entire area benefitted from the snow, and it should be a God-send for the wheat crop, which was badly in need of moisture.

Joe Allen at the Sherley-Anderson Rhea elevator said the snow in that area was from eight to nine inches, and he felt as though

the moisture would amount to .8 or .9 inches. "It fell just right, and didn't move around any. The wheat sure was needing some moisture. It had just been existing," Allen said.

The Rhea community spokesman said one farmer had been in who lived 12 miles north of Rhea, and he had received over 10 inches.

Allen said the extreme cold weather earlier had knocked the tops out of some of the wheat plants, but that it should "perk back up" after this.

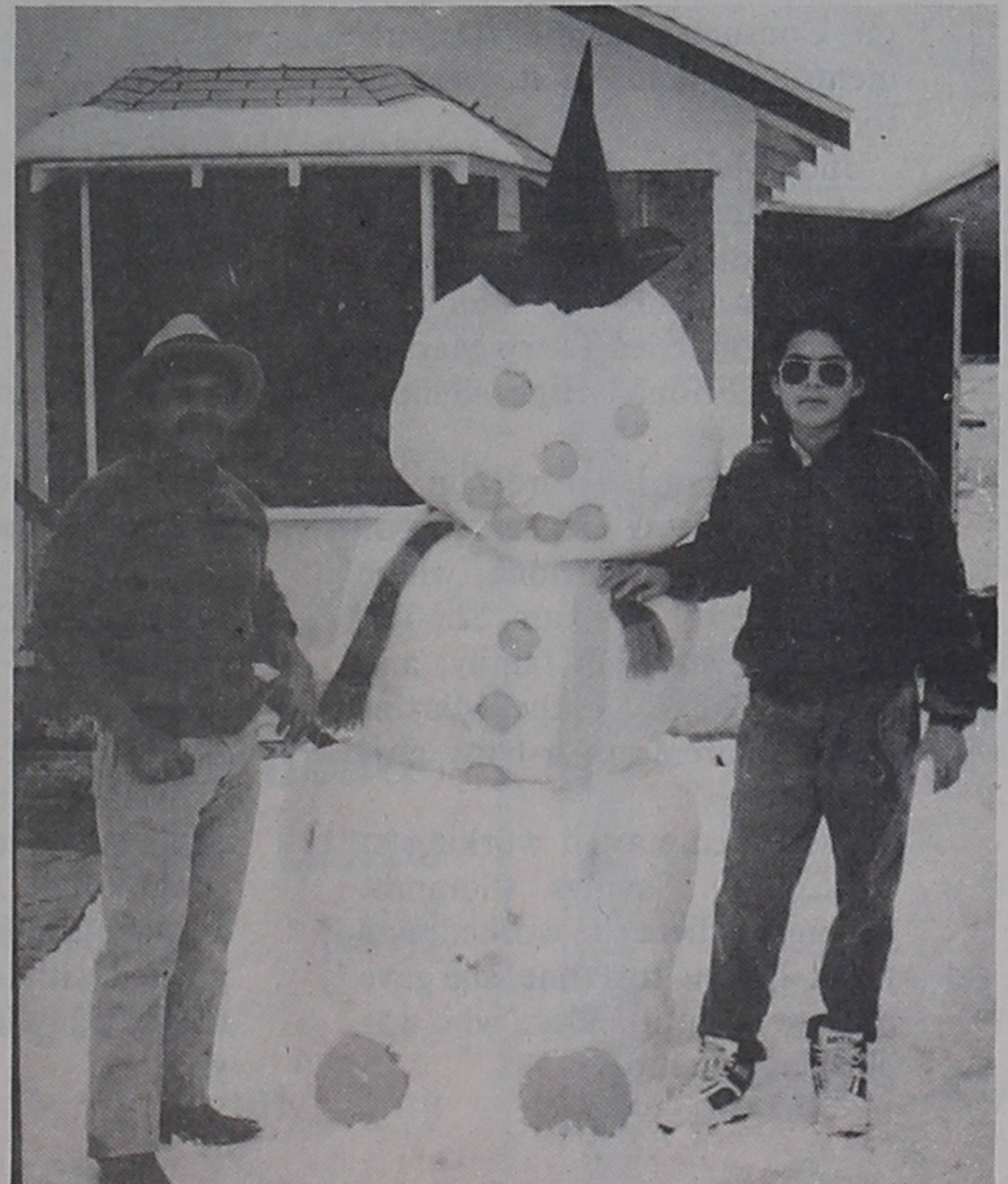
A spokesman in the Lazbuddie community said they received five inches of snow, and the Hub area received six or seven inches.

Eric Vaughan Cited For SWCS Honor

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is proud to announce the selection of Eric Vaughan as the 1990 Conservation Farmer of the Year.

Vaughan lives at Lazbuddie and farms near Lariat. Eric started farming in 1977 and has learned much about producing high yields, while protecting the soil and improving his farm.

He protects his soil from erosion by using many conservation methods. First, he practices a crop rotation which utilizes high residue crops, such as corn, wheat and haygrazer.

In conjunction with these high residue crops, he uses chisel plows which disturb the residue very little and leaves most of it on the soil surface.

Preserving the residue has advantages other than erosion protection. The residue on his cropland also helps hold moisture, reduce compaction and puts nutrients back into the soil.

The high residue crops and residue management provide adequate erosion control on all but 160 acres of Vaughan's farm. On this 160 acres, Eric has had more erosion problems due to steep slopes and a large drainage area.

Club Sets 'Follies' Thursday

The Friona Noon Lions Club will present the "Noon Lions Follies" on Thursday, January 17 at 7 p.m. at the Friona High School Auditorium.

The program is designed as a fund-raiser. Admission will be \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Young children will be admitted free.

Featured will be songs, skits and a variety show. "You may see some things here that will never be presented again, so this might be a chance of a lifetime," said Vergil Ichtertz, spokesman for the club.

Proceeds from the program will go to Boys Ranch, Girlstown, and various other charities supported by the Lions Club.

To correct the problems on this part of the farm, Vaughan has built a basin terrace, the first terrace in a system of parallel terraces to be completed in 1991, and a grassed waterway. He has constructed these structures with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

In addition to his soil erosion control efforts, he also manages his water wisely. He has low pressure center pivot irrigation systems on all his irrigated cropland. These pivots have long crop nozzles which allow for very little water to be lost to evaporation. This also allows the water to be applied in a uniform pattern.

Vaughan plants his crops on flat plowed ground under his sprinklers. He then uses a furrow diker in May or June. The furrow diker makes pockets in the soil. These pockets help hold both irrigation and rain water until it can be absorbed.

Due to his conservation efforts, the Parmer County Soil and Water District is proud to have Eric Vaughan as their 1990 Conservation Farmer of the Year.

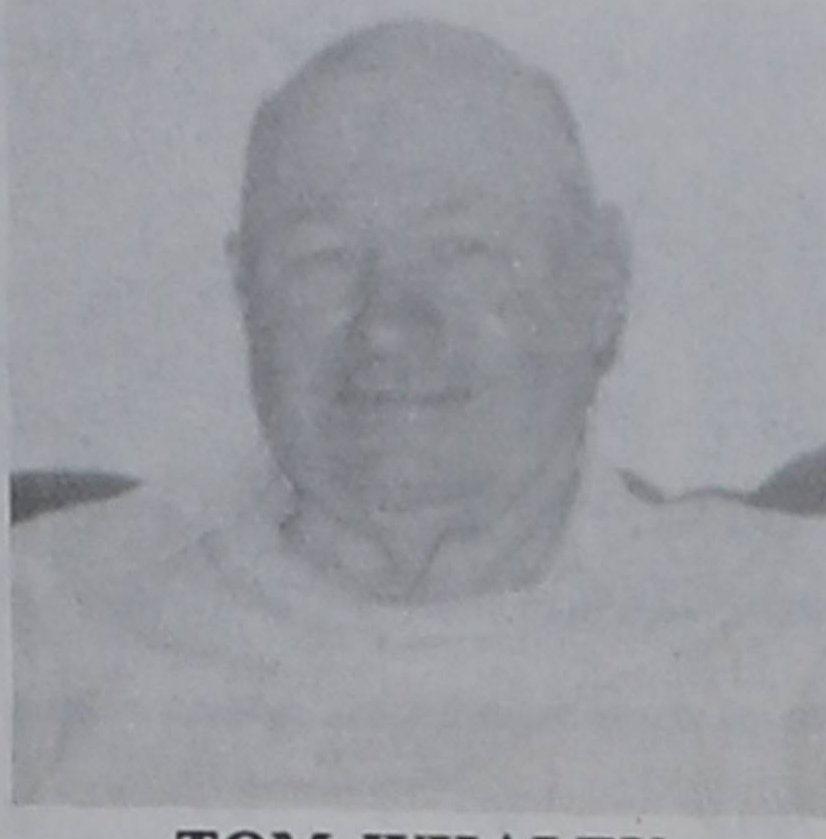
Burial was in the New Tacoma Cemetery.

Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

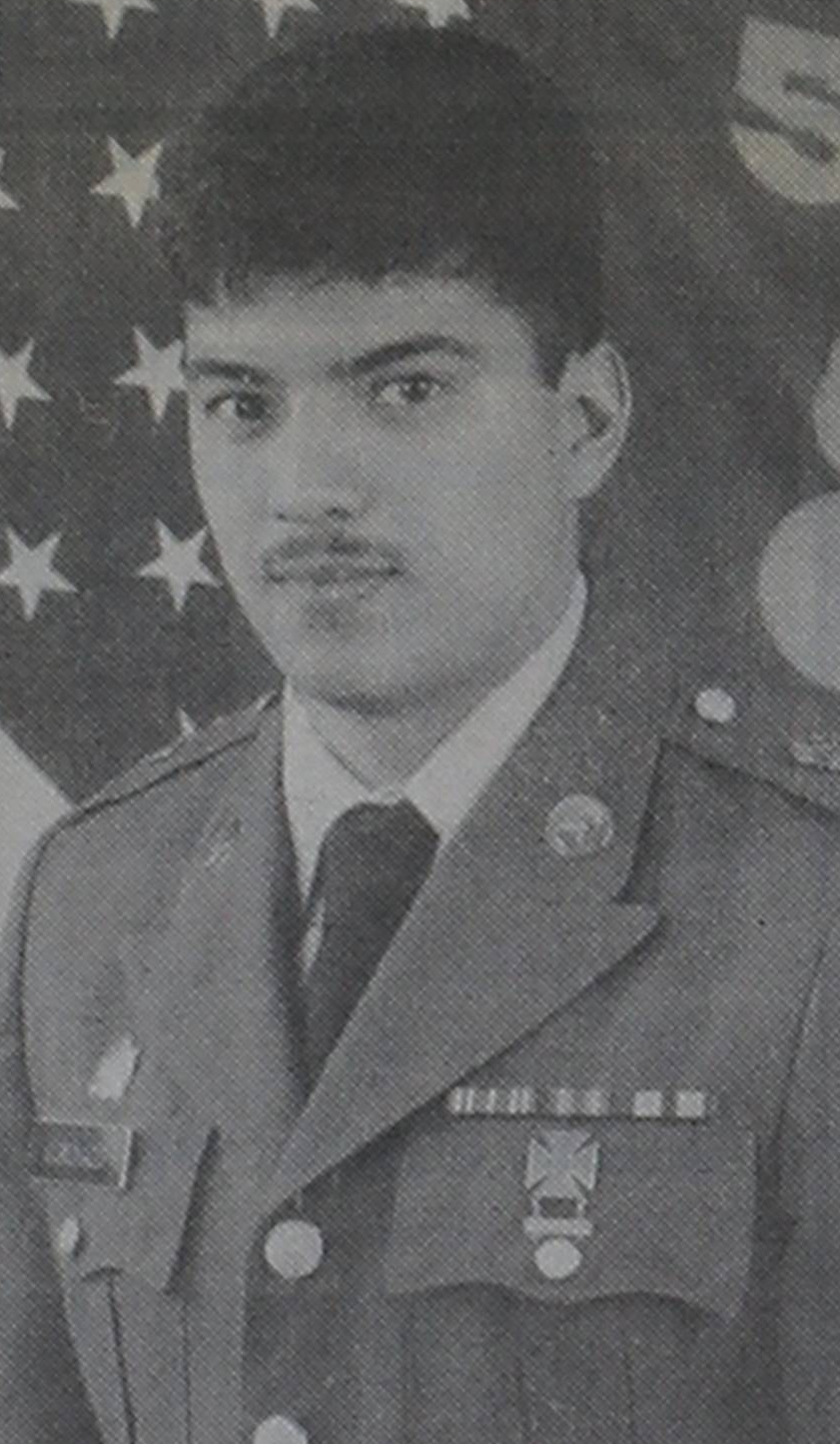

Some Questions To Help Determine The Safety Of Your Money-Market Fund

As money-market funds gain popularity, more of them become available. And as their numbers increase so, too, does their competition for your investment dollar. Until recently the major attraction to money-market funds was yield. Then came the question of safety. Some fund managers could be taking additional risks to increase their yields and attract more investors.

The following interview addresses some questions on the overall safety of money-market funds:

Q: More than 40 percent of money-market fund assets are invested in commercial paper. How does this affect safety?

A: Some funds limit their holdings of commercial paper, concentrating instead on short-term government securities or CDs. Although the yield on these more conservative investments is lower than on commercial paper, their added safety may be just what individual investors are looking for.

Q: How is commercial paper rated?

A: Commercial paper has three basic rating grades from Moody's and Standard & Poor's: A-1 and P-1 (Prime); A-2 and P-2 (Non-Prime); and Not-Rated. If your fund invests in commercial paper and safety over yield is your primary concern, most of the holding should be rated A-1 and P-1.

Q: To what extent is a money-market fund limited to exposure to any one issuer?

A: Right now the SEC permits money-market funds to concentrate up to 25 percent of their assets in the securities of a single issuer. A new proposal would drop that limit to 5 percent. The more conservative funds, however, voluntarily limit not

invest more than 5 percent in the securities of any issuer with less than three consecutive years of operation.

Q: How does the maturity of a fund's portfolio relate to risk?

A: The longer the maturity, the greater the risk. Although most funds are permitted to hold paper with maturities as long as 120 days, this limit would drop to 75 days under a new SEC proposal. The more conservative funds voluntarily limit maturities to under 50 days.

Q: How do a fund's expenses figure into the yield?

A: The typical money-market fund deducts around .0075 of assets each year to cover the cost of running the fund. This expense ratio goes against the yield of the fund. If a fund boasts a high yield and also has high expenses, the only way it can maintain its competitive yield is by incurring a higher degree of risk.

Q: Other than yield, what else should an investor look for when considering a money-market fund?

A: An above-average yield can mean that the manager is temporarily waiving the management fees or that he is taking additional risk. For example, the fund may be stretching its average maturity beyond 60 to 70 days, which could cause its yield to lag if interest rates suddenly rise. Worse yet, the fund could be buying commercial paper with a lower rating or may simply have a large percentage of commercial paper in the portfolio. You should also check the services and other features the fund offers. For example, one well known money market fund keeps its management expense low by charging for each check written.

Positive answers to these questions may not guarantee total safety from your money market fund, but they are an excellent starting point. Don't assume your money market fund is a mecca of safety. Ask questions and understand the answers.

Squaws Top 'Winds; Chieftains Falter

The Friona High School Squaws won their district opener against Floydada here Tuesday, 50-34, but the Chieftains continued suffering their close-game doledrums, losing to the Whirlwinds, 54-52.

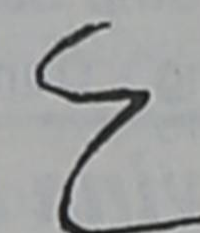

It's A Girl For Couple

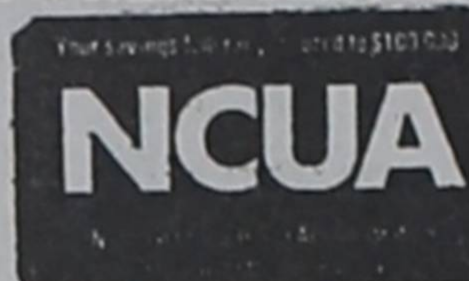
Jerry and Thelma Harrelson of Arlington became parents of a baby girl, Krista Lea, on January 8, 1991 at a hospital in Irving.

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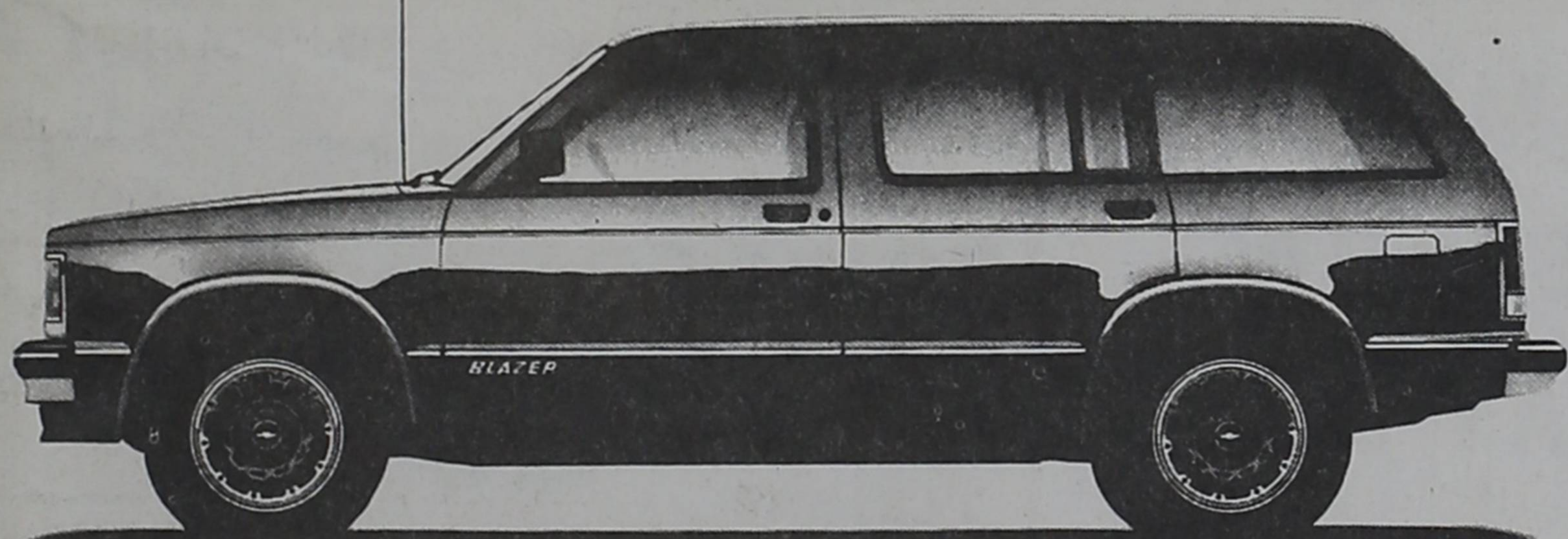

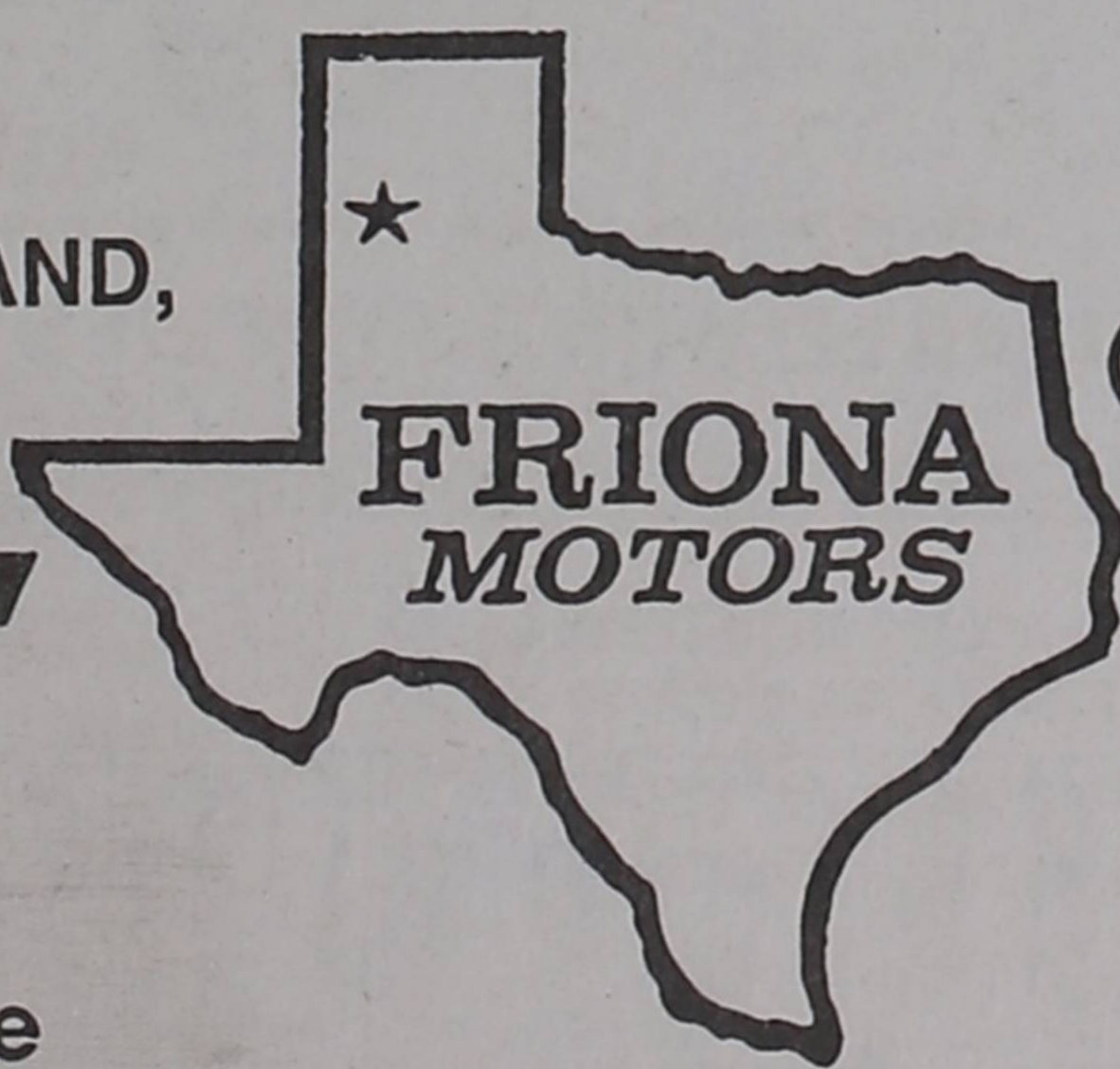


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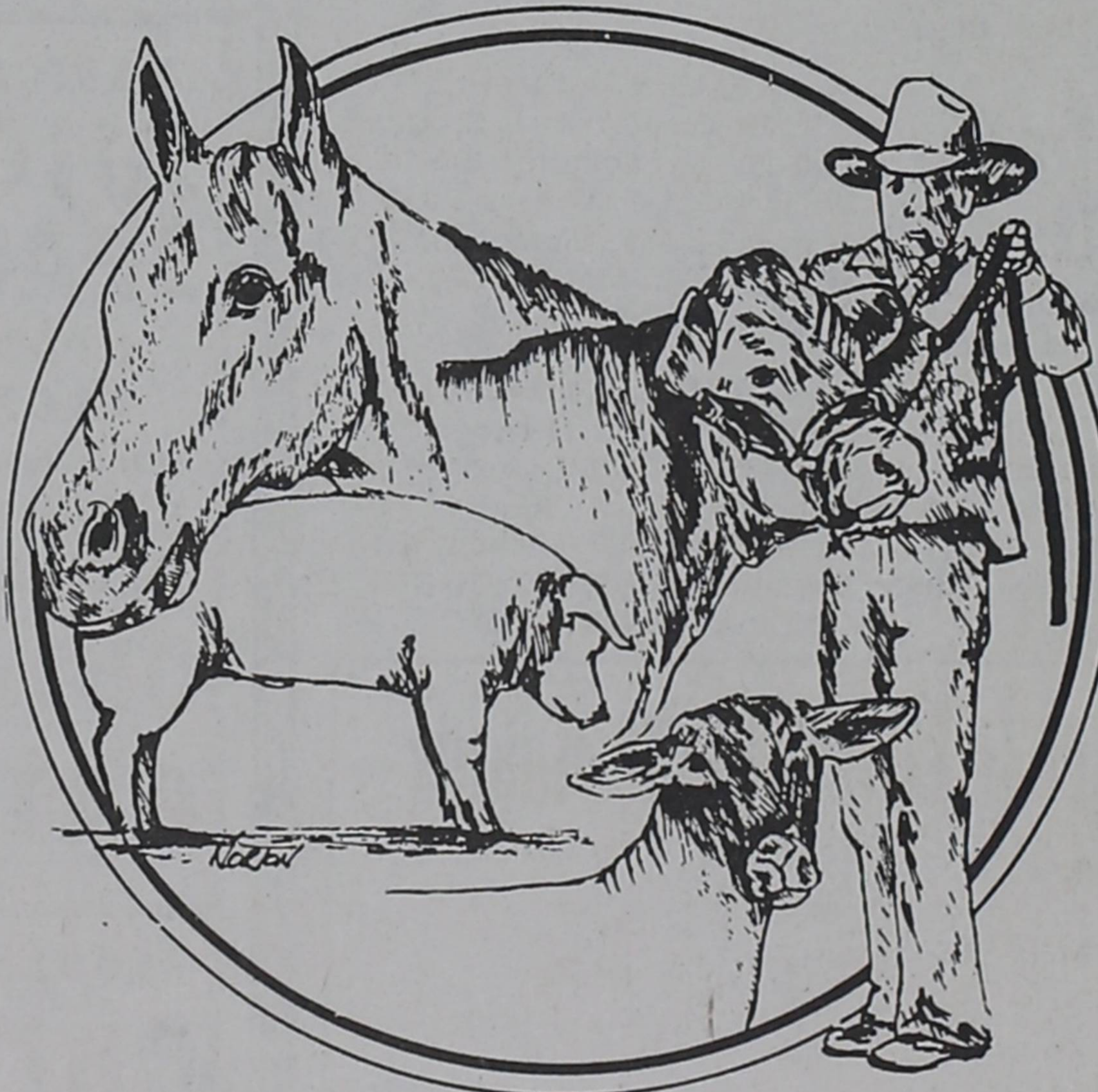
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JV Chiefs Win Two Of Three

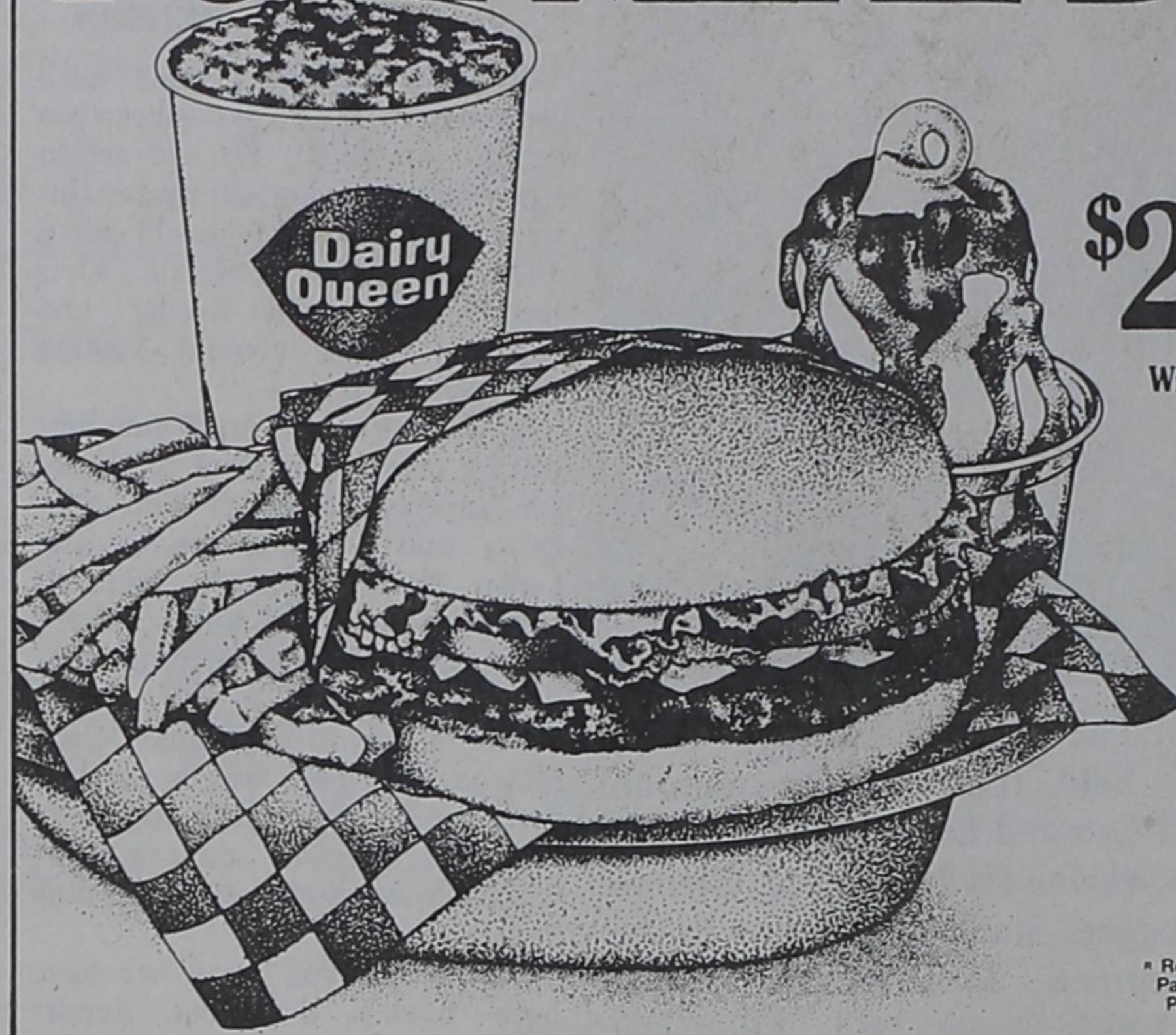

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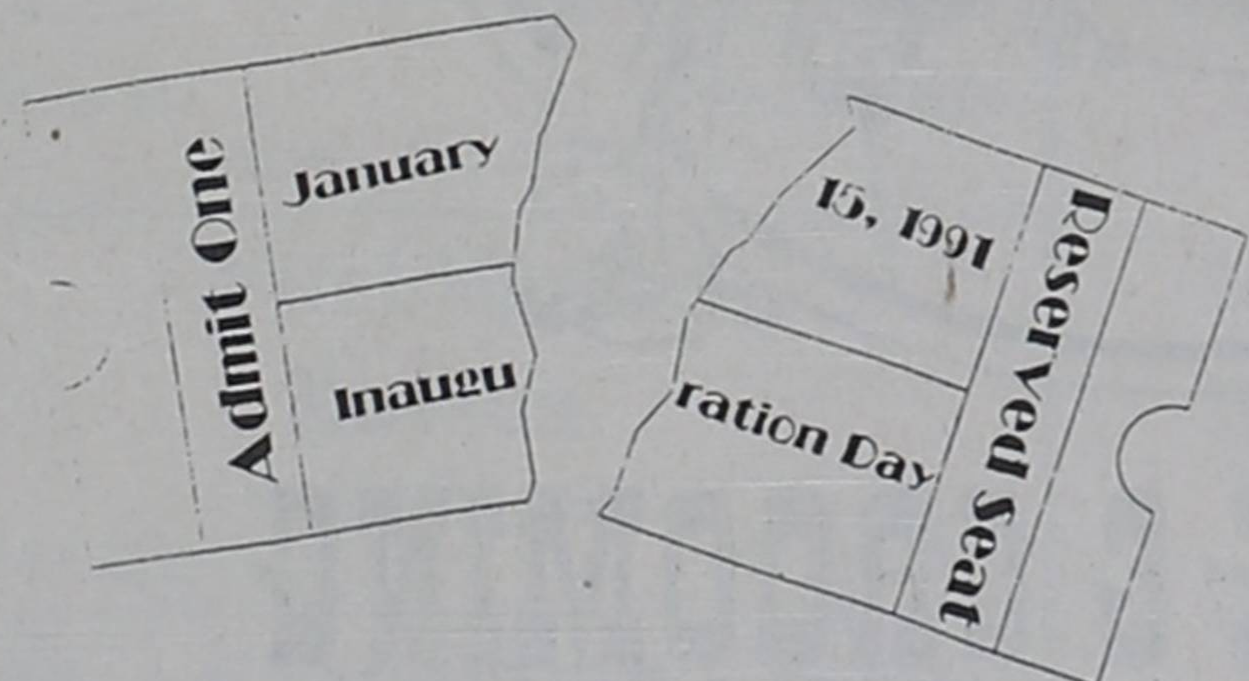
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
