Texas got a black eye on national television Tuesday afternoon.

In case you missed it, NBC's 5:30 p.m. news carried a big deal about what some people call over emphasis on football in our schools.

Some game film from Lewisville was used, along with the band, drill team and big crowd.

Then Ross Perot, the industrialist who is heading up a blue ribbon panel on public education in the state, made a statement that really hurt.

He said 600 school districts in the state spend all their local tax money on non-curricular activities.

Let me point out quickly that Perot was only on camera about six or ten seconds. The quote could have been taken out of context.

But if it were in context, I'd like to see his figures. I do not believe it.

Of course, when you get into accounting procedures, you can do a lot of things. I know very little about accounting, but I do know that much.

Perot's statement would imply that all the tax dollars of those 600 districts were total outlay, cash being paid out and nothing coming in. That's like saying a business does nothing but spend money for products, and doesn't have any revenue from sales.

There is no secret that Perot doesn't like extra-curricular activities in the school system. Not much, anyway. Some of it I can go along with, but some I can't.

There is a lot about Perot that I admire. He's shown how the American system works, that one can succeed if he works hard, has some imagination, is willing to take a gamble and depends on private enterprise rather than government handout.

But he was wrong in appearing on the program as it was presented. If nothing else, an outsider, viewing the segment could arrive at the point that football and activities related to football was the only extra-curricular activity in Texas public schools.

Texas schools have an excellent, well-rounded extra-curricular activities program, most of which are covered in the University Interscholastic League activities. Add to those such organizations as the National Honor Society, various service organizations, skill activities, the list goes on and on.

I can only say that Perot was incorrect, misled, quoted out of context, lied or used accounting procedures to make the statement he did.

And Texans lost a degree of pride in our public schools in the eyes of those outside our state.

Chiefs, 'Lopes In District Tussle

The Abernathy Antelopes, Friona's District 2-AAA opponents Friday night, have suffered a lot of adversity since their season started. Coming into the game, the visitors were minus nine players who had been starters sometime this season.

The Antelopes won their first two games, over Petersburg, 33-13, and Olton, 18-0, before dropping a 14-6 game to Hale Center. Not only did the 'Lopes suffer a loss, but in that game, their top runner, Chester Cooper, received a broken arm, and was lost for the season.

Abernathy managed to beat Roosevelt, 35-14, before a six turnover game cost them a win against Lockney, 34-20.

Last week in their district opener, Muleshoe outscored the Antelopes, 35-6. Abernathy will be one of the largest teams Friona will line up against, averaging about 215 pounds per man across the line.

With Cooper out of the lineup, Ross Bradley has become Abernathy's leading rusher, averaging 105 yards per game. The Antelopes alternate quarterbacks Brian Smith and Jamie Mansanales. The latter is a sophomore who also likes to run the ball.

Friday's game was only the 12th ever between the two schools in football, dating back to 1964. In the previous 11 games, Friona held a 7-4 edge, including a 21-0 win at Abernathy last year in the resumption of the series after a six-year lapse.

The Chieftains entered Friday's play as the third-ranked team in the area (Lubbock Avalanche-Journal)

for total offense, averaging 320 yards per game. Runningback Charlie Morgan, with 691 yards, is the sixth top rusher in the area.

From here on, the schedule gets tougher each week. Next Friday the Chiefs visit Dimmitt, hoping to avenge a 14-7 loss to the Bobcats here last season. The last two games of the season, vs Muleshoe and Littlefield, will both be home games.

Chamber Is Electing Directors

Ballots went into the mail this week from the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, which is in the process of electing five members to its board of directors.

Ten names are on the ballot, and five members are to be elected to replace retiring directors.

Those listed on the ballot are Harry Hutchinson of Excel Corp.; Bill Loafman, Parmer County Implement; Dee Willard, farmer; Gaye Tannahill, Friona High School; Lois Norwood, Ethridge-Spring Agency; Joe Mejia, Friona State Bank; Bill Hardin, Tasty Cream and Winner's Choice; Joe Wilhelm, Wilhelm TV; Bob Welch, farmer and Pat Fleming, school board member.

Ballots must be returned by November 1 in order to count.

Court Awards Pact For Roof Renovation

At the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court October 10, a contract was awarded to Leaway Roofing of Hereford to re-roof the county courthouse, in the amount of \$13,410.

Leaway's bid was the only one received on the project, but after some discussion, was accepted by the court.

Boarding care bills on Parmer County's foster children, in the amount of \$2,073 were approved. The amount will be re-imbursed to the county.

A motion was passed to advertise for bids for the purchase of a motor grader for Precinct 4. Bids are to be opened at 11 a.m. on October 24. Two bids are being asked for: one for a standard purchase and one for a lease-purchase arrangement.

The quarterly report of the county's finances was presented by County Treasurer Benna Felts. The

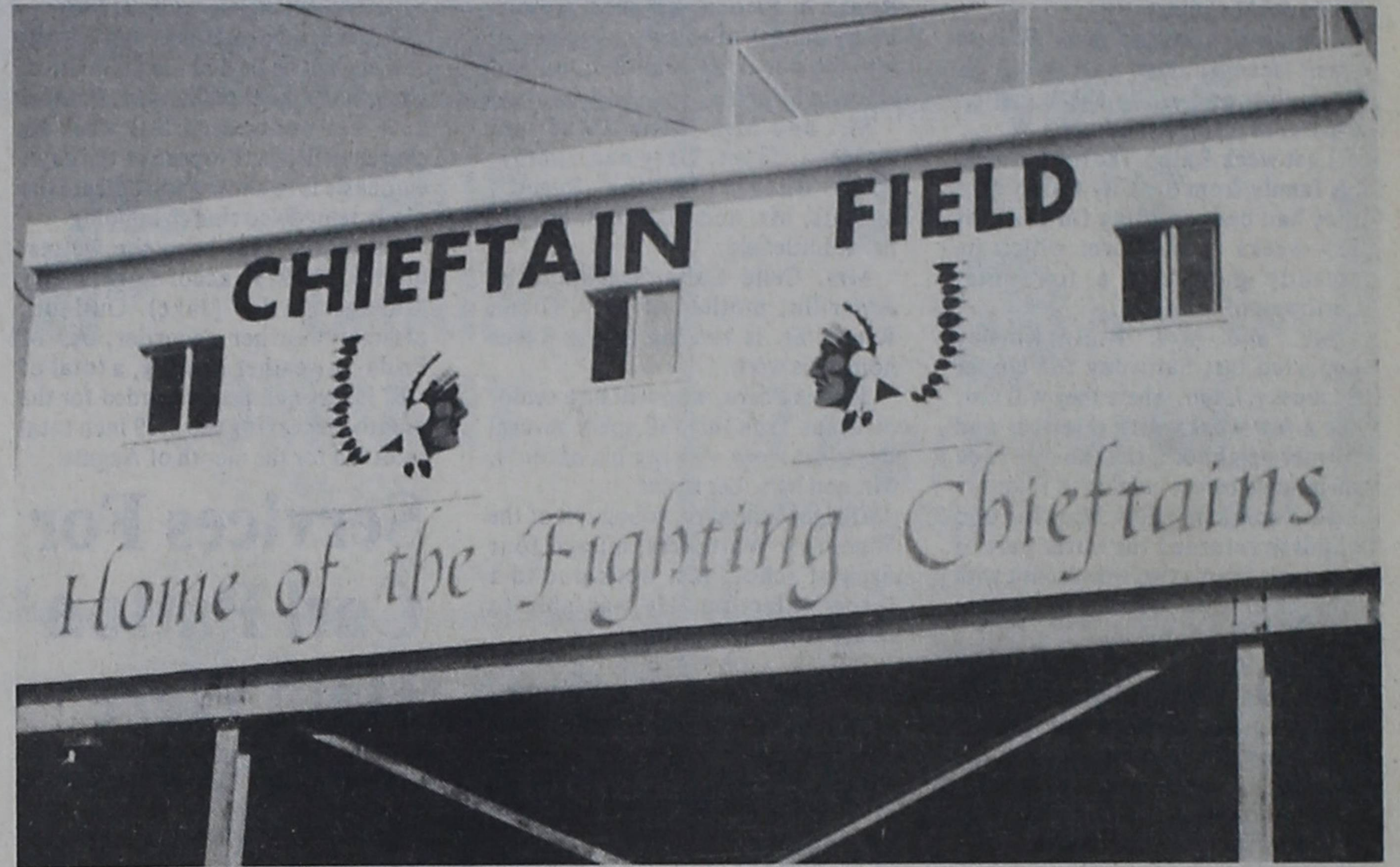
report was approved unanimously, with mention made that it be published in the three newspapers in Parmer County.

At the request of County Clerk Bonnie Warren, a motion was passed to set special absentee voting days for the November 8 election at Friona for October 19, 26 and 27, at the Friona Credit Union.

County Extension agents Seth Ralston and Laura Jacobs reported that work is going well in their areas.

At 5 p.m., a public hearing was convened for discussion of the proposed budget for 1984.

Bernard Gowens of Brown, Graham and Co., Sheriff Bill Morgan and Deputy Jerry Atchley were the only members of the public at the hearing. After an item by item discussion, a motion was passed to approve the budget, which includes a five per cent increase in salaries for county employees.

Local donations made to Cerebral Palsy through the United Fund Drive are retained in Friona and its immediate area for the needs of those qualifying for aid.

Credit Union Open House

The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union will be celebrating International Credit Union Week (October 16-22) along with 20,000 credit unions in the United States, according to Barbara Maynard, manager.

Credit Union Week is a time set aside to honor the pioneers of the credit union movement, credit union volunteers and employees, and the 47 million members.

"Credit unions are unique--they are not in business to make profits but rather to provide personal service to members," according to Barbara Maynard.

Credit union growth and strength in the financial world can be attributed to their basic philosophies of democratic control, non-profit orientation, and personal service.

Credit unions are owned and democratically controlled by those who borrow and save there. Members elect members to serve on the board of directors.

As not-for-profit thrift institutions, credit unions are in business only for the benefit of their members.

The credit union idea grew out of the need to provide savings and loan services for members, but many credit unions have also expanded services to include individual retirement accounts, direct deposit, payroll deduction, and automated transfer of funds to name a few.

The Credit Union invites all of their member and the public to come by and have coffee and donuts to help them celebrate Credit Union Day on October 20, 1983.

Wave Of Upsets Takes Toll On Contestants

"I picked three upsets in the pro football games, and those were the only three (of the eight pro games) I got right," said Jack Clark, a veteran of the Friona Star's football contest.

Probably, Clark's experience could be repeated a number of times by contestants entering the sixth week of the football guessing-game.

Most weeks, a score of 14 is a good average score, but this time around, that was the winning score, and only two contestants managed that good a score.

Patches Fleming, a freshman at Friona High School, was the week's winner, and another FHS student, Wade Davenport, took second place. They were the only contestants managing a score of 14.

Fleming won the weekly prize of \$10 on the basis of the tie-breaker score. His guess was 20-6, missing by 13 points. This guess barely edged out Davenport, whose tie-breaker entry was 21-6, off by 14 points. Davenport wins \$6.00 cash.

Eugene Ellis took the weekly third prize. He was one of only four contestants correctly picking 13 games. Ellis won the other weekly prize on his tie-breaker entry, which was Friona 14, Tulia 7, only eight points away from the actual score.

Other contestants correctly picking 13 games were Jimmy Walker, Patti Field of Dalhart and Lance Gatlin of Corpus Christi.

Once again, a tie game was included on the lineup, when the Clovis-Lawton contest ended in a 7-7 deadlock. This made five weeks in a row for a tie game on the slate.

There is no use in listing the games the winners missed, since all

contestants missed so many games. Most contestants did fairly well on the high school games, down through the Texas-Oklahoma contest. But from number nine on down, the games were a hodge-podge of upsets, judging by the way contestants were picking them.

In the race for grand prize, Fleming hiked his lead with his score of 14. He now has a score of 87, which is three better than Bobby Davis. Davis had a 12 for the week, and holds down second place with a score of 84.

Tammy Bush is third at 82. Kevin Beavers and Steve Williams are at 81. Jerry Hinkle, Tom Johnson, Leroy Nuttall, Ron Smiley, Don Spring, Alfred Beavers and Wade Davenport are next with scores of 80.

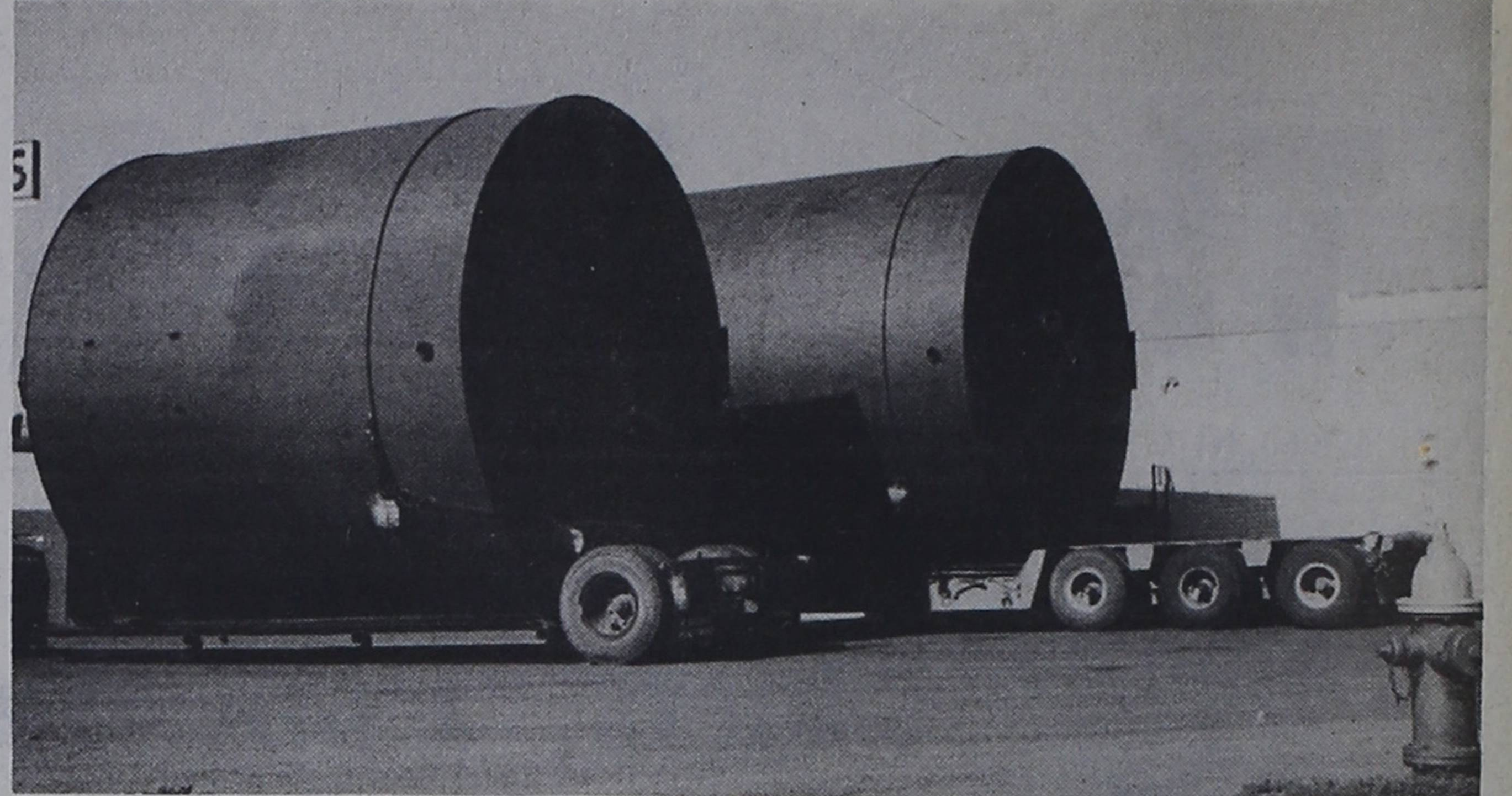

And in the end, a goal-line stand, plus another sparkling fourth down play in the fourth quarter stood out as gems as the team won its fifth game of the season against a single loss.

Friona fumbled the ball in its second offensive series, and the defense was tested early, as Tulia took the ball at the Friona 30. However, the Chieftain defenders were equal to the test, and four plays later gave the ball back to the offense and held Tulia to a net loss of three yards for their series.

Late in the first half, Friona had a threat going--its only serious one of the first two quarters, when a Charlie Veazey pass was intercepted at the Tulia 26. That allowed Tulia to hold onto a tie at halftime.

The Chiefs took the second half kickoff and decided to get serious. They marched 70 yards in eleven plays to break the scoreless deadlock and take the lead.

Alfredo Mata raced 20 yards, from the Friona 33 to the Tulia 37 on a third down conversion. A big factor in the drive was a 15-yard penalty against the Hornets for defensive holding, on a third and 12 situation, which moved the ball to the Tulia 22.

Mata again got loose around end for 11 yards, giving Friona a first and goal at the Tulia five.

Two plays found the Chieftains back at the six, but Veazey lofted a pass to Mata in the end zone for the touchdown, and Doug Carthel's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead, as only 3:36 had been used in the third quarter.

The Hornets took the kickoff, and

mounted a drive of their own. Friona helped by roughing the kicker on fourth down in the series. A 45-yard scamper by speedy Tony Powell was the big gainer for Tulia, moving the ball to the Friona seven for first and goal. John Aguirre saved the touchdown by catching Powell from behind.

But this was the third game in a row in which the Chiefs had been challenged with a goal-line stand. And for the third time, the opposition was turned away empty-handed.

For the second time this season, it was a pass interception that turned the tide, on a big fourth down play from the Friona four.

John Aguirre made the defensive play, plucking off the Chad Swinburn pass at about the goal-line and running it out to the Tulia 36. Swinburn tried to loft the ball over Aguirre's head to a waiting receiver, but the Chieftain defender caught the ball and ran it out of danger.

Midway through the fourth quarter, Tulia was again driving. The Hornets faced fourth and one from the Friona 30, but the yard turned out to be harder to make than Tulia thought. The rock-ribbed Chieftain defense stopped the fourth down play short, and the Chiefs took over on offense.

Fired up by the big defensive series, the Chiefs went to work. Reese Fleming ran ten yards on a big third down play to allow Friona to keep the ball.

Fleming again gave Friona a first down to the Hornet 45 with a three-yard run as the clock ticked down to only 3:19 left to play.

Fleming ran for another nine yards to the Tulia 36, and Charlie Morgan duplicated the gain to the Hornet 27 as time was growing short. Morgan was stopped behind the line for a loss back to the 31 on the first down play.

This set the stage for a determined run by Morgan in which he fought off

two or three would-be tacklers, and bounced into the end zone right at the flag.

The score came with just 1:11 left in the game. The PAT kick was first blocked, but after a penalty against Tulia, Friona tried for two but a pass fell incomplete for a 13-0 score.

The Chieftains intercepted three Hornet passes during the course of the game, two by Eloy Caballero and the goal-line stand by Aguirre.

Although held well below their season average of 320 yards offense, Friona's defense also was equal to the task, giving up just 153 total yards.

"We didn't play with much intensity during the first half, but came back in the second half and got the job done," said Chieftain coach Tommy Moss.

Moss praised the Chieftain defense for their fourth shutout of the season and third in a row. "They're really playing well--just a great job overall," the Chieftain coach said.

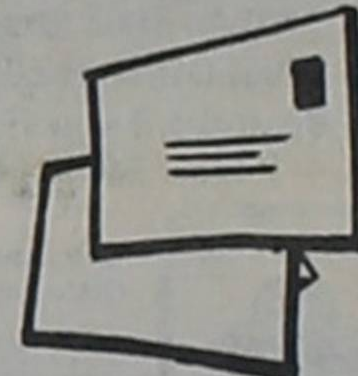



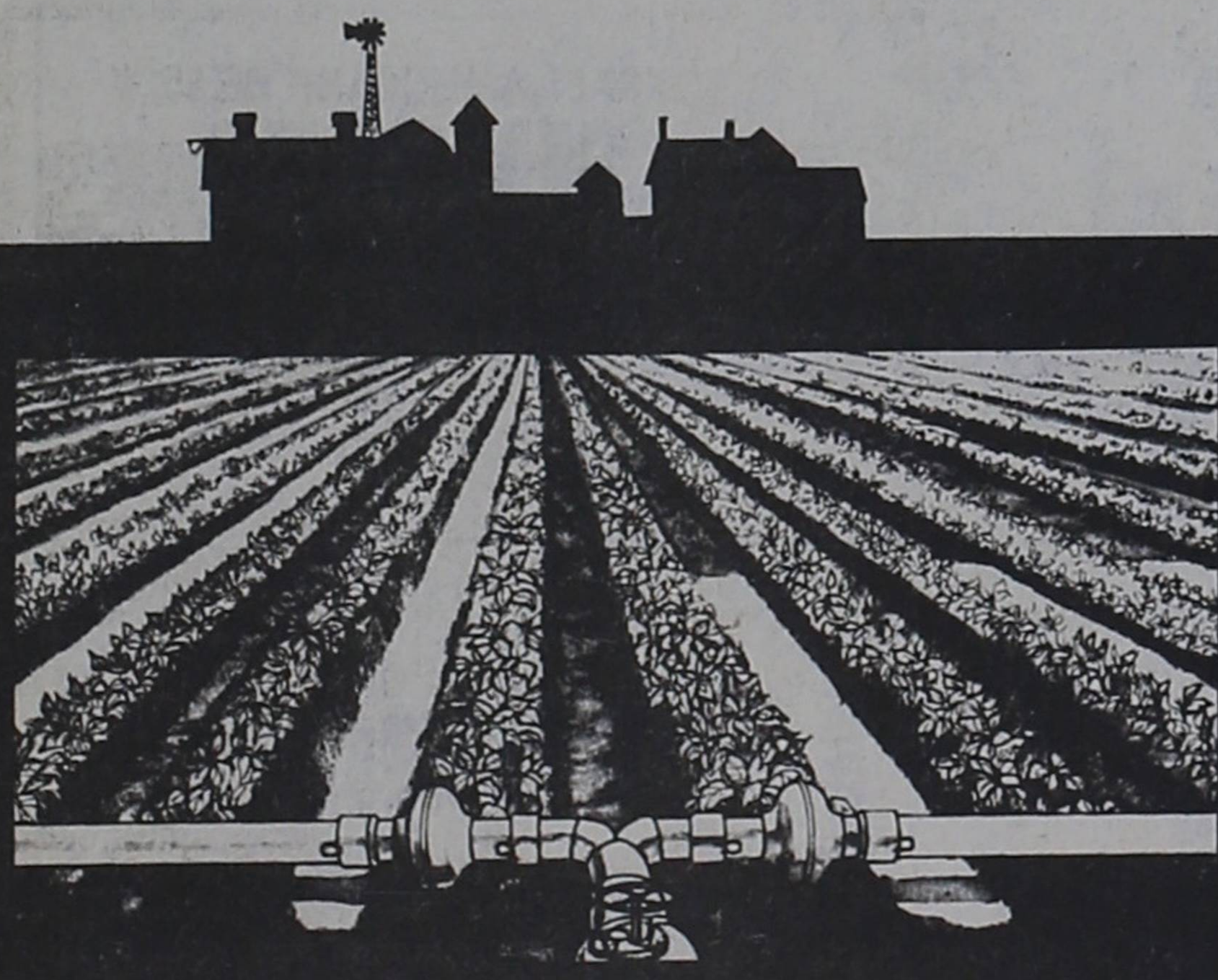
