AT THIS POINT in time, it is difficult to tell whether the national truckers' strike will affect our area, or even if any truckers located in this area are participating in the strike.

Remarks on Monday by wholesalers in Amarillo predicted that our area would be virtually unaffected, especially in regard to fresh fruits and vegetables and groceries of all kinds.

Early in the week, the only thing that appeared to be affecting delivery trucks was the inclement weather, but the trucks were doing their best to make their rounds.

The striking truckers are protesting the increase of federal and state highway use taxes, which will go up by ten times in some cases, along with the proposed five-cent per gallon increase in gasoline taxes and a new tax on tires.

The proposed increases could virtually put a number of truckers out of business, it is argued. However, some leading truckers in this area say they feel the money going into (or lost by) the truckers' strike might be put to better use.

The area leaders say that truckers should call or write their state and national leaders and protest the increased taxes, and that this would be a more effective means of seeking aid, rather than the strike, which has been accompanied by violence in some areas.

Hopefully, the truckers will receive some help from congress in repealing at least a part of the proposed tax increase, which would also affect many farmers in our area who operate trucks, tandems or anything using rubber tires.

WHAT IN THE WORLD is going on, in regard to the weather??? As of Friday of the current week, Friona has recorded over 36 inches of snow this winter.

This may not be a record, but as the old saying goes, "It's a pretty darned good average."

And if the Old Farmer's Almanac turns out to be right, we "Ain't Seen Nuthin' yet!" The almanac says we'll get another 30 inches of snow in February. Skeptics can take note that the snows of this week amount to ten inches on that "goal," so we're well along in that regard.

If we had only known, and had've stocked in snow shovels, we could've been rich--but that's the way it always is--hindsight is better than foresight.

Warm weather fans take heart! It's only 145 days until July. And by then we'll probably be complaining about how hot and dry it is.

Snow Blamed In Three Fatalities

Another winter storm struck the Friona area this week, dumping six to seven inches of snow.

However, the big factor with the snow of Tuesday, February 1 was the fact that a gusty north wind caused drifts of up to several feet in places. This was the worst example of drifting from the snows of this winter, causing the storm to be near blizzard in nature.

A total of seven inches of snow was registered in Friona on Tuesday, February 1, and another three inches had fallen as of 7 a.m. Friday, February 4.

The week's snow had melted down to a moisture content of .69 inch, according to Rodney Dunnam, official weather recorder. Friona's low temperature was 18 degrees Friday morning.

School was dismissed in Friona on Tuesday due to the snow and bad roads and again on Friday. When school was in session, buses were confined to the highway. "As wet as it is getting, it may be some time before the buses can get back on the dirt roads," said Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The storm was blamed for three deaths in Parmer County, and spawned a number of highway accidents.

Killed in an accident late Monday afternoon were Rose Rodriquez, 30, and her two sons, Armando, five, and Rodolfo, nine months old. Raymundo Rodriquez, the driver, was hospitalized with injuries at the

Clovis High Plains Hospital, along with another son, Alvaro, three.

DPS officials said that the Rodriquez family's automobile was travelling west on U.S. Highway 60 when the driver lost control. The vehicle turned sidewise and was hit broadside by an automobile driven by Charles R. Bronaugh, 58, of Muskogee, Oklahoma.

The accident happened near the intersection of U.S. 60 and FM 292 just east of Farwell. Bronaugh sustained a broken nose and facial lacerations. He was kept overnight at the Clovis hospital.

In another weather-related accident, Edwin A. Womack, Jr., of Deming, N.M was slightly injured when his 1979 Freightliner cabover went off the road on U.S. 60 about 4.6 miles northeast of Bovina Monday night, after hitting a slick spot.

She becomes only the seventh Friona youngster to win the Barrow county title in 36 years, and first since 1978 when Joe Reeve's Duroc won the honors.

The win was the ninth since 1948 for a Hampshire breed, giving that breed the lead by one over Durocs, who have been tapped eight times. Crossbred barrows have won seven titles.

25 YEARS AGO--JAN. 30, 1958

20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 31, 1963



Friona Noon Lions sponsor the Cub Scouts and Friona Evening Lions sponsor the Boy Scouts.



Opportunity isn't nearly as rare as the ability to recognize it.






