An article in the April issue o Reader's Digest states, with specific examples, some things we have bee saying off and on for the past 2 years. media (network television, bis magazines and newspapers) are guilty of spotlighting the bad news, at the expense of good news. The title of the article is "he Grong."
Author Ben Wattenberg says tha the following criteria are used to determine news value: (1) Bad news big news; (2) Good news is
(3) Good news is bad news.
(3) Good news is bad news.
Wattenberg points out that many of the "scare" stories turn out NOT to be as bad as they are presented by the media. For example, the Love Canal, N.Y., episode, wher between the years of 1942 to 1953 Several investigations have bee conducted, and after a physicians panel studied the issue, it wa concluded "There has been no
demonstration of acute health effect linked to exposure to hazardous wastes at the Love Canal site." However, due to the big media hipe, the residents of that area practically desserted their homes, an
the federal government has paid out enormous sums of money. Another item was the "mercury in fish scare." It turned out Wattenberg says, that actual mercury levels were no higher than those
found in ancient fish fossils or in 100-year-old pickled fish in the Smithsonian Institution.
Other results of the "scare tactics" include the following: saccharin is not dangerous in quantities consumed by
humans; nitrates are apparently no carcinogenic, so the Food and Drug Administration and the U.S.D.A have decided against a ban; Lake Erie is not dead from eutrophication; and the advent of super-sonic aircraft has
not led to sonic booms yielding insanity nor to an increase in cancer. Author Wattenberg is quick to point out that not all of the "scare" tactics turn out to be false. He lists a number of truly dangerous items asbestos, lead, formaldehyde, environmental arsenic, PBBs, agricultural and industrial dusts, benzene, banned food dyes, carbon etrachloride and PCBs.

Four-Millionth Book Hailed As Milestone

When the $4,000,000$ copy of the s75 page, hardcover book,
"Alcoholics Anonymous," was shipped to the newly-recovered alcoholic in September 1983, little notice was taken of the event. A.A World Services, Inc., publisher of the book, was too busy filling orders
from the more than groups in the U.S. and Canada for other literature: over $1,000,000$ book and $7,000,000$ pamphlets in 1983 . Then, according to Bob P., general manager of A.A. General Service
Office, it was recognized the milestone in distribution of the Bi Book, as it is affectionally known to A.A. members, also had significance as an indicator of the rate of growth of the A.A. Fellowship. "As we are
anonymous," he explained, "and keep no records of individual members, we make no attempt to keep track of the size of ou organization." "However," pointed out, "since the Big Book is its sales indicate that membership is growing sharply."
In contrast to most other books sales of "Alcoholics Anonymous" declining It took 34 years to sell the first million copies; only five years to sell th second million; three-plus years for the third million; and just two year printing in 1939 was for 5,000 copies; that number is now sold every tw days. This is especially remarkable in view of the following facts:

Fellowship numbered fewer than 100 members in 1938; when thes pioneers decided to write down their experiences in recovery from
alcoholism and make them alcoholism and make them available
to a wider audience. The first printing was done on less than a shoe strin and, for the next two years, the book
attracted little attention and few sales. The financial picture was stark only loans from sympathetic friend Then, in March 1941, followin publication of an article on A.A. by Jack Alexander in The Saturday Evening Post, sales finally took off. A second printing was ordered th iceberg as it turned out.
Originally priced at $\$ 3.50$, the Bi Book still retails for only $\$ 5.65$ ( $\$ 4.65$ for A.A. members), in the face o skyrocketing book costs. Copies ma

THE FASCINATING HISTORY OF EYECARE-PART II A shortage of elephants in 1863 resulted in the invention of plastics, later used in eyeglass frames and eventually in lenses, by John and Isaiah
Hyatt. The Hyatts were the winners of a $\$ 10,000.00$ award offered by a Philadelphia billiard ball manufacturer seeking a material to substitute for Ivory. about as people lived longer and turned from farming to industrial and
business occupations. People were better educated...read more...and did much more close work than previously. Two major optical firms were launched in the United States in the early 1900's and they managed to bring down the cost of eyeglasses in this country so that everyone could
afford them. No longer did they need to import expensive eyeglasses afford them. No longer did they need to import expensive eyeglasses at its best in many fields and the eyecare field was no exception. Practical eyewear was acceptable for general wear by men, but
fashionable women never wore spectacles in public. Instead, they used fashionable women never wore spectacles in public. Instead, they used the lorgnette, a pair of glasses with a long handle. By far the most
popular eyeglasses in the latter part of the 19th century were the pincepopular eyeglasses in the latter part of the 19 th century were the pince-
nez, which had no temples and were held on the nose by a spring bridge. Theodore Roosevelt took 12 pairs with him to the Spanish-American war.

Twentieth century improvements in the field of visual science led to the development of today's wide variety of fashionable frames; quality glass vision needs. Don Richards, 36, is a native of West Texas and grew up in the 19th Congressional District. Richards was the first Democrat to announce for the race last fall.
