DON'T LOOK NOW, and hopefully we're not jumping the gun on writing the epitath to the end of the recession, but signs on every hand are pointing toward a more stable economy.

Hopefully, the gradual swing to a more positive economic situation will continue as the weeks and months go

The announcement this past week by Ford Motor Company that its profits for the quarter which ended June 30 were at their highest level since 1979 was another positive factor in the recovery.

Earlier, on Tuesday, General Motors had announced a similar profit statement, a \$1.04 billion profit which surpassed the \$962 million the corporation earned all of last year.

Chrysler Corporation, which survived extinction through an unprecedented government loan and some tight expert management at the top level, had reported a \$310 million profit for the period, its best for any quarter in the company's history.

So far in 1983, American auto manufacturers have made \$2.78 billion in profits, the best figure since the industry earned \$3.34 billion during the first half of 1979.

For the first half of 1983, Ford Motor Company earned \$753 million. This is quite a turn-around from the \$96.6 million in losses the company had sustained by the same date a year

An analyst for the auto industry pointed out that the first quarter of 1979 marked the last "boom" for the industry, and it took 17 quarters for the auto makers to recover and get back to a "peak" position.

The automobile industry is usually a pretty good barometer by which to measure the nation's economy. When people have money, they make the major purchases which they feel they need. But when things are tight, people cut back on major cash outlays, which usually mean several months worth of financing.

The decline of interest rates nationwide has been a major factor in the resurgence of the automotive industry. The more favorable interest situation also has helped the country's sagging construction industry, which has been sadly crippled during the recession, mainly due to the high rates.

The building industry still needs help in the form of guaranteed longterm favorable rates, so that it may continue on the road to recovery.

When he took office in 1981, President Reagan promised to do all within his power to get the nation's economy on the right track, and he warned that it would take some time.

Runaway inflation had been the trend for most of the last four decades, and this takes some time to halt, or at least slow to a pace most people can live with.

The president has done his best to cut the fat out of government spending. But he has learned that when it comes to cutting, the bureaucracy is a tough nut to crack. Special interest groups in virtually every segment of the economy object when their particular government

check is reduced. Discoveries of over-spending (or over-charging) by the military could result in savings of millions of dollars, if the country's leaders can be persuaded to demand a reform in this агеа.

The president has had a lot of critics on his economic plan, but at this point, it appears to be working, if each of us will just give it the chance it needs.

Commission Re-Invests Certificates

County Commissioners voted to pay the county's annual sponsorship donation of \$2,430 to the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center of Plainview at its meeting on July 11. The county is one of nine counties who sponsor the center.

Boarding care bills of \$2,073 for the county's foster children were approved. This amount is reimbursed to the county.

Approval was granted Friona State Bank to substitute \$500,000 in U.S. Treasury Notes maturing May 31, 1985 for \$500,000 Treasury Notes which mature August 31, 1983.

Benna Felts, county treasurer, presented the quarterly report on county finances. Motion was passed approving the statement, with notation that the report be published in the three Parmer County newspapers.

At the suggestion of Mrs. Felts, a motion was approved to reinvest \$100,000 in Farm to Market Road funds in a certificate of deposit to mature in 14 days. Another \$100,000 in Farm to Market funds were reinvested in a C.D. which will mature on August 23, 1983. Also, \$100,000 in General Funds were re-invested in a 14-day certificate, and a like amount was placed in a new C.D. maturing August 23, 1983.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Jim Bishop met with the court to discuss the lease on the radar units used in the county, which lease was about to expire. After discussing details involved, the court voted to renew the lease on the radar units.

Soil conservation work was approved for four county farms, depending upon availability of machinery; such work to be paid for by the farmers involved. The requests approved were on the farms of G.F. Trimble, Larry Scott, Billy Sudderth and the Jerrington farm.

Pool Is Closed By Lightning

Once again the weather has played a role in the operation of Friona's Municipal Swimming Pool.

Lightning struck the pool's recirculating pump Monday evening, causing the pool to have to shut down until the pump could be re-built.

Work on the pump was being done in Hereford, and the pump had been expected to be back by Wednesday, but as of Thursday, had not been completed. The City of Friona says the pool will be re-opened as soon as the pump is installed.

Residents will recall that the local swimming pool, which originally was privately owned, started life as an indoor pool, until a tornado deroofed the facility in 1971. Another wind damaged the dressing facilities and walls later on, which led to a remodeling of the facility prior to its opening last season.

City Manager Jerry R. Lewis, who

has held the position locally since

January of 1982, resigned his post at

a special meeting of the City Council

on Monday.

Jacksboro has a population of around 5,540, and is the hub of four major highways comparable to Highway 60, plus is the county seat, Lewis said.

"It has been enjoyable, working with the city, and the citizens of Friona. It was a tough decision," Lewis said this week.

Lewis gave his resignation effective August 31, but pointed out that this date is flexible. "I gave the council my word that I would stay until a replacement is found, and will work for a smooth transition," Lewis said.

The city also is in the process of working on its annual budget for 1983-84.

Lewis said he would do all within his power to see the completion of projects initiated during his tenure as city manager, especially the Reeve Lake beautification project.

In recent weeks, playground equipment has been installed in the

Reeve Lake park, and provisions have been made for improved parking in the area. A lot of dirt work has been done in the lake area, and more needs to be done, Lewis says.

"We need to dig the lake bottom out more, and possibly add chemicals which would cause the lake to hold runoff water better than it presently is," he said.

Lewis said he was offered the job at Jacksboro about a month ago, when the city's mayor and one councilman flew here to interview him and look at the town. Later, he went to Jacksboro and met with the remainder of the council.

The North Texas city is in the process of changing its form of government from the "strong mayor" type to a mayor-council form, and Lewis will be the first city manager in the city's history. Previously, the mayor handled all of the city's administrative duties.

"I have had a super city council to work with in Friona, and appreciate each one of them very much. Friona is fortunate to have this group working in their behalf," Lewis said.

The city council has placed notices of the job opening for city manager in various trade publications, such as the Texas City Managers' Magazine, the International City Managers' Newsletter, and has also placed ads in newspapers in several metropolitan

FOR TECH SCHOOL

\$100,000 Launches Center Drive

The first step toward launching a brain study center at Texas Tech Medical School was taken today when Malouf Abraham, independent oil and gas producer and real estate developer from Canadian, presented a check for \$100,155.14 to the Texas Tech Medical Foundation.

The brain study center will be a multiple-campus research and treatment center for neurological disorders.


The donation, presented at the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center at Amarillo, marks the beginning of a major fund drive to complete the center, expected to be one of the finest in the country.

Tech president Lauro Cavazos, MD, accepted the donation, made in honor of Elmer Tarbox, former Texas State Legislator and one-time Texas Tech football star.

The brain study center will include the Texas Tech Medical School centers at Amarillo, Lubbock, and El Paso.

Abraham attended Texas Tech in the early 1930s and served two terms in the State Legislature in the 1960s. He was selected by the Texas Tech Ex-Students Association as the 1981 Distinguished Alumnus.

Tarbox, in whose honor the gift was made, also is a former Tech student and served in the Texas House of Representatives with Abraham. He is a victim of Parkinson's disease, a neurological disorder that affects the motor system.

During his years at Tech, Tarbox was a football star, completing his football career in 1939 playing in an All-Star Game against the Green Bay

Packers. Despite his health problem, which began near the end of his service with the Flying Tigers in World War II, Tarbox served five terms in the State Legislature. It was in Austin that

Tarbox and Abraham became friends. Together they spearheaded the drive which resulted in creation by the State Legislature in 1971 of the Tarbox Parkinson's Disease Institute. The institute provides funds for a free clinic at the Lubbock campus of the medical school for victims of Parkinson's disease.

The brain study center will be a three-campus, computer-connected network of basic scientists and clinical researchers working together to advance research in the neurosciences and to improve the quality of care for persons throughout West Texas who suffer from brain disorders.

Recent surveys indicate the center can expect as many as 7,500 patient visits annually from the 107 counties in West Texas.

Medical specialists and basic scientists interested in the brain will share findings and experiences from all three Tech medical centers so that physicians will have immediately available all the latest scientific and computer techniques to diagnose and treat their patients. At the same time, neuroscientists will gain valuable first-hand experience with the ravages composition of the composition of brain disease.



Around The House In Parmer County

By LAURA JACOBS

The garden world is taking to containers--plastic, stone, clay--found or made, because they're the practical answer to a great variety of today's garden landscape

Petunias in the bird bath, marigolds in old copper wash tubs, salvia in the motorcycle side car, impatiens, and coleus in hanging baskets, for variety, delphiniums for dash, pansies for polish and verbenas for verve.

Consider the special places where containers fit: balconies, patios, decks, rooftops, on doorsteps, at street side or poolside.

Flower containers can be as simple as a mass planting of a single flower such as the colorful petunia.

Or it might be a mixed

bouquet composed of many

flowers, combining the same or similar colors: yellow, lemon yellow, golden yellow, yellow-orange. It could combine pink, rose, mauve and lavender. Or tones of red. Perhaps blues from sky blue, the color of dawn, to the deepest twilight shades. Changing foliage textures is another way to provide variation within the

containers. Combine the fine feathery foliage of Achillea with the strong sturdy foliage of the zinnia. Or you might try marigolds with their finely divided deep green leaves in contrast to their bright yellow or orange blossoms. Flower shape is another

way to vary the container garden. Great daisy-like flowers spring above gerberas. Browallias are covered with star-shaped flowers. Geraniums have large clusters of many small flowers pushing well above the large circular leaves.

The different growth habits of plants modifies the look of container plantings, too. Some plants have masses of blossoms, some are sturdy mounds, some trail, some sprawl, some grow stiffly erect.

Here are some suggestions for container plantings:

*Plant plants closer together than you would in the ground.

*Fertilize with a balanced fertilizer at the manufacturer's recommendation.

*Water frequently --

container plants dry out

more rapidly than those growing in the ground. Overhead containers and hanging baskets will dry out faster than those growing on the ground. *Make sure there is, good drainage in the containers. *Mix plants which bloom

continuously with plants

which bloom in flushes. Salvias tend to bloom in flushes. Marigolds and petunias produce blossoms continuously. *Some flowers don't

bloom well unless they're root bound. Container plantings are ideal for them. *Mix sun-loving plants

together; use shade-loving or shade-tolerant plants together also. You can plant a container

like an artist, picking from a palette of plants for changing forms, colors and When many textures. different plants are combined, their natural growth habits may vary a bit from the normal

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

County Receives Its Share Of 'Drink Tax'

Parmer County paid a total of \$193.60 to the state for mixed drink taxes during the second quarter ending June 30, it was announced this week by State Comptroller Bob Bullock. The tax amounts to ten per cent of sales.

The county's 15 per cent share of the drink taxes amounted to \$29.04 for the quarter.

Harris County led the state with \$11,013,170.49 in tax revenues, and Dallas County paid \$7,281,523.04 in mixed drink taxes during the threemonth period.

Texas cities and counties each receive a 15 per cent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and city-county taxes are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's office.

Bullock said the mixed drink tax brought in a total of \$74 million during the first half of 1983.

Local Man Speaks At Chicago Meeting

Cutability affects everyone from beef producers to consumers. That was the concensus of opinion at the Food Marketing Institute's annual convention in Chicago.

As reported in the July issue of Beef magazine, Friona cattle feeder Bob Bliss told the group, "If we produce--by staying in the feedlot too many days--cattle with some yield grade problems, then we certainly have contributed to lower prices for all cattle.

"As we increase days on feed, we not only increase the cost to producers, but we also increase the probability of greater problems in yield grade," he explains.

According to Beef, Bliss adds that the question facing meat just how important cutability really is to their role in the beef industry.

The article expands on Bliss' statements and reports on the convention's discussions on yield grades and their impact on the marketing chain.

Beef magazine, "The Business Paper of the Cattle Industry," is the largest magazine of its kind serving the beef cattle industry. It is aimed primarily at the industry's key production people.

The City of Friona received delivery this week of its new modular type ambulance. The new ambulance is larger than the old one, which will remain in service, and carries more equipment.

The ambulance has a hospital-type oxygen system, piped to wall outlets on each side of the compartment. It has 12 and 110-volt power sytems, as well as a separate heat and air conditioning system from the-vehicle.

According to Bill Northcutt of Superior Southwest of Dallas, who delivered the new ambulance to the city on Thursday, the unit has a sophisticated electrical system, and is certified, having passed all tests

regarding ambulance specifications. The ambulance has outside storage compartments for rescue equipment.

One of the main features of the new unit is the fact that the body is remountable, and can be transferred to another chassis in the event the ambulance should ever be involved in a wreck.

With a van type ambulance, when there is a wreck, you are apt to lose the entire ambulance.

The body of the ambulance is mounted on a 1983 Ford Chassis, purchased through Friona Ford-Mercury Sales, who will provide

service for the vehicle to the city. The vehicle has a 460-horsepower engine, with dual batteries, and a 165-amp alternator. It has dual fuel

tanks, with 40-gallon capacity. It has dual rear wheels, and special wide-track rear axle, for more stability on the inside.

The body measures 129 inches by 94 inches, and has 61 inches of

interior head room. The unit is equipped with the latest in emergency lights and sirens.

The group toured Austria, Switzerland, Germany and Belgium. They spent six days in Vienna and enjoyed seeing a lot of different things.


One of the oddities they noticed was that in some of the cities there were streets designated as "people streets." No vehicles were allowed on these streets at any time.
