## After 34 Years-- Business Has Ownership Change

New owners and operators of Gib's Cleaners, which has been located at the corner of Seventh and Main since February 14, 1949, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Coleman of Farwell, assumed management Monday, July 12.

Gib Boatman, who opened the shop more than 34 years ago with his mother, the late Bessie Boatman as co-owner, assisted the Colemans Monday and Tuesday. Then on Wednesday he took off so that he and

his wife, the former Dot McMillan, could celebrate their 41st wedding anniversary.

Boatman, a native of Oklahoma, moved to a farm in the Hub Community with his parents, the late A.H. and Bessie Boatman, a brother, Clifford, and two sisters, Lillian and Esther, from Duncan, Oklahoma in February of 1928.

After attending Friona school in the "old red brick building," several

years, he dropped out before graduating.

From October of 1940 to December of 1945 he served in the U.S. Army Field Artillery Observation and was first stationed at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. His last assignment was in Okinawa.

Following his discharge he wanted to farm land he owned south of Hub, but farming equipment was unavailable at the time, so he began looking for work.

While he had been in the service, Dot, a licensed beautician, operated Dot's Beauty Shop here and Gib says, "She thought it was time I took over and supported us."

He went on to say, "I promised her that I would and she took me at my word, got out of the shop and hasn't returned."

His first job was at Thrifty Cleaners, which belonged to Bethel Hicks. Soon after going to work there he applied for admission to the National Institute of Dry Cleaning at Silver Springs, Maryland.

He had to wait some time before his application was accepted. Then he and Dot drove to Silver Springs, where they stayed until he completed his course.

Following their return to Friona he and his mother opened the shop. He did the cleaning and she worked the front desk and did the alterations.

A few years later Mrs. Boatman retired and Gib purchased her interest in the shop. Gib remembers that he purchased his first equipment from Bob Clements and moved it down here from Pampa.

Bob and his brother, Roy, who still lives here had been in the cleaning business here earlier.

There have been vast changes in fabrics to be cleaned, equipment to clean them with, prices charged for work and prices paid for supplies.

Customers paid 90 cents for having a man's two piece suit cleaned in 1949 as compared to \$3.50 now. Cleaning solvent, which cost fifteen to eighteen cents per gallon then now costs \$1.50 per gallon.

Gib remembers that Eva Lou Rector was the shop's first customer.

For the past fifteen years or so the firm has been operated by Gib, Donalita Hawkins and Jessie Morales. Gib said, "We just kind of rotate around and each one of us does whatever needs to be done."

Since he has been in business here, Gib has been a member of the Chamber of Commerce and Evening Lions Club. He's also a member of Friona Masonic Lodge and he and Dot attend First Baptist Church.

When asked about retirement plans, he replies, "Really I haven't made any. We will probably continue much the same as before except that I will not be going to the shop."

## City Receives \$2,347 Insurance Dividend

City Manager, Jerry R. Lewis, announced today, that the City of Friona has received a \$2,347.00 dividend from the Texas Municipal League Workers' Compensation Joint Insurance Fund. The dividend represents the city's share of the fund's annual excess contribution return which this year totaled \$3,433,894.00.

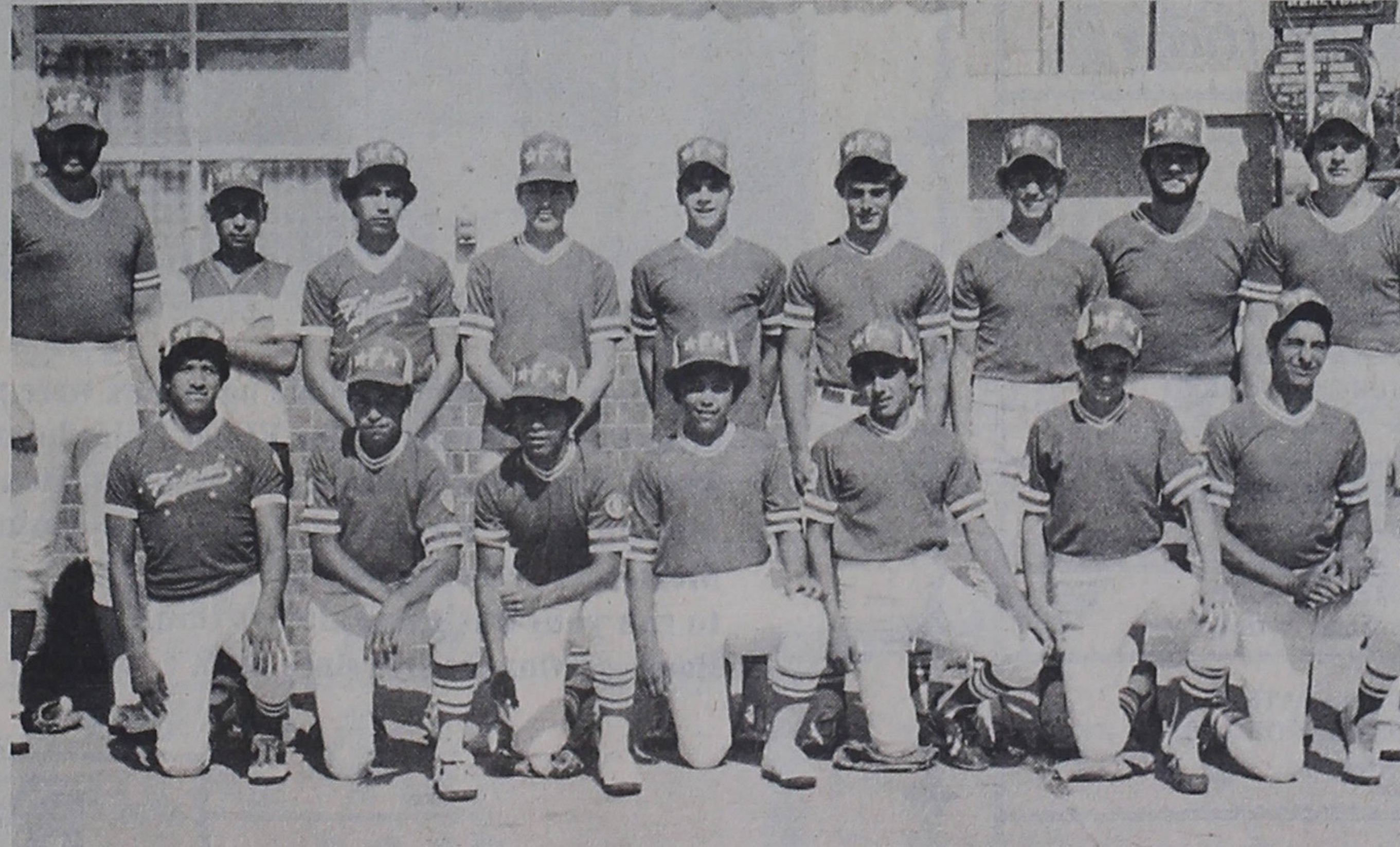
According to Lewis, the city is one of only 409 Texas cities to receive a dividend check. He attributes this to the city's employee accident prevention efforts as well as the overall financial and operating success of the TML Fund.

The fund is a unique legal arrangement wherein 635 participating members collectively provide workers' compensation insurance protection to their combined 88,000 municipal

employees. Marvin Townsend, city manager of Laredo and chairman of the board of trustees, expressed pride in the fact that the TML Fund cities enjoy a better loss ratio than all Texas commercial policy holders combined.

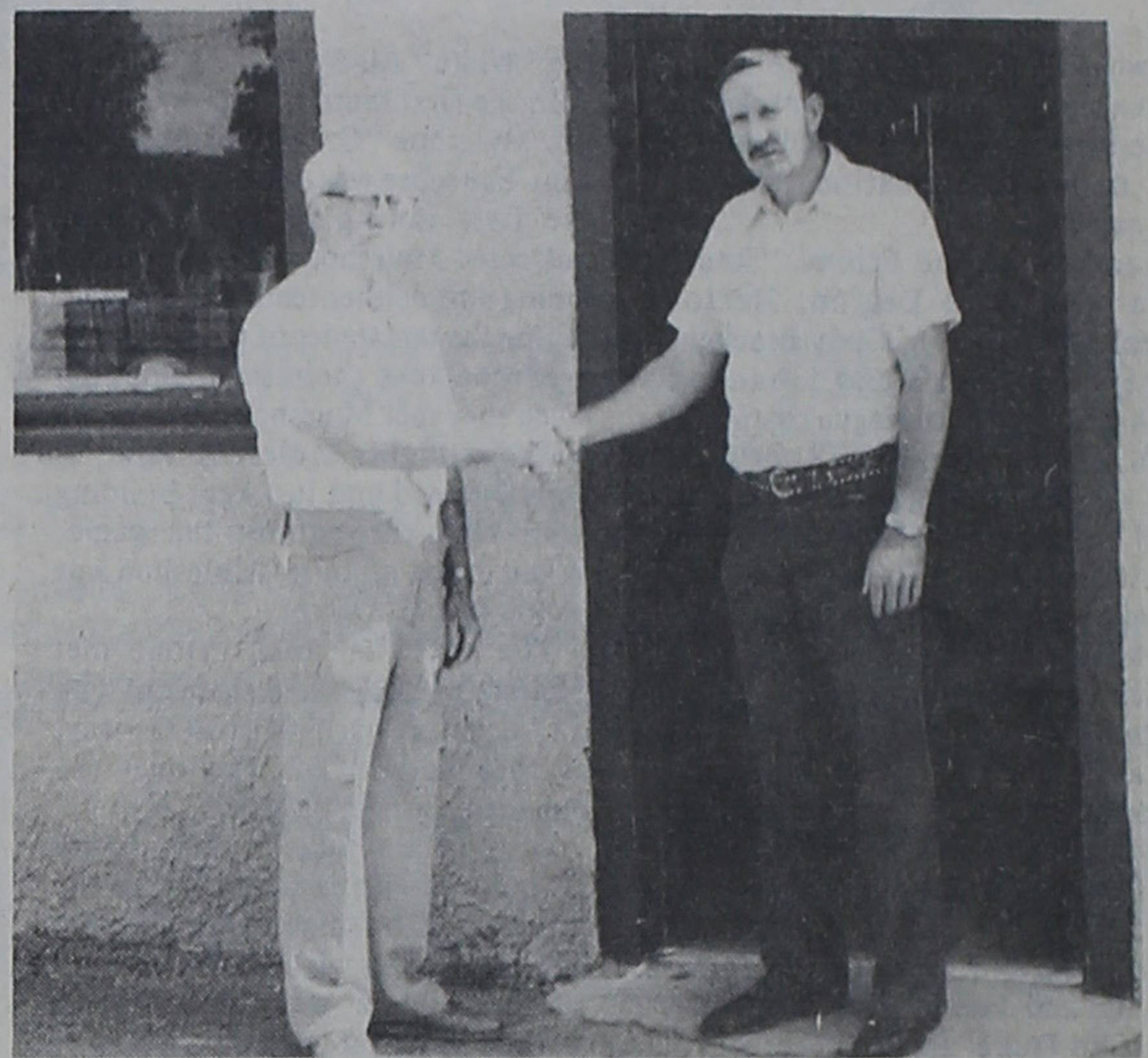
"The dividend check received by the City of Friona is clear documentation of the success experienced by the city and the other 635 TML Fund members," Lewis added.

Cost savings have been a characteristic of the TML Fund since its inception nine years ago. Cities receive an immediate 25 per cent front-end discount from standard commercial premiums each year. Cash dividends follow at year end and reflect overall healthy operating results. Dividends have amounted to more than \$11 million in returns to Texas cities since 1974.

## City Receives Refund On State Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the one per cent city sales tax.

"Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one per cent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

Friona's check amounted to \$4,005.44, which was up from the

same period a year earlier, when the city's check was \$3,797.53.

For the year, however, Friona's sales tax receipts amount to \$50,388.81, down from the \$53,252.10, as of the same date in 1982.

Parmer County's three municipalities received \$6,113.53 for the period, up from \$5,287.60 a year earlier. For the year, the county total receipts are \$75,528.47, compared to \$77,433.52 a year ago.

The July checks were for taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by the end of June.

Friona only scored four runs during the game and Muleshoe crossed the plate 19 times to take the victory and eliminate the Friona "White" team from the tournament.

## Nominees Are Being Sought By GSPA

Grain sorghum farmers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15. Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are Paul Cobb of Plains, Lee Hill of Dalhart, C.C. Reed of Kress and Olan "Jack" Crowl of Morse. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their names placed in nomination for membership on the Board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten others who are eligible to vote. All nominations must be filed by August 15 at the TGSPB office, Box R, Abernathy,

Texas 79311 to allow time for adding their names to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

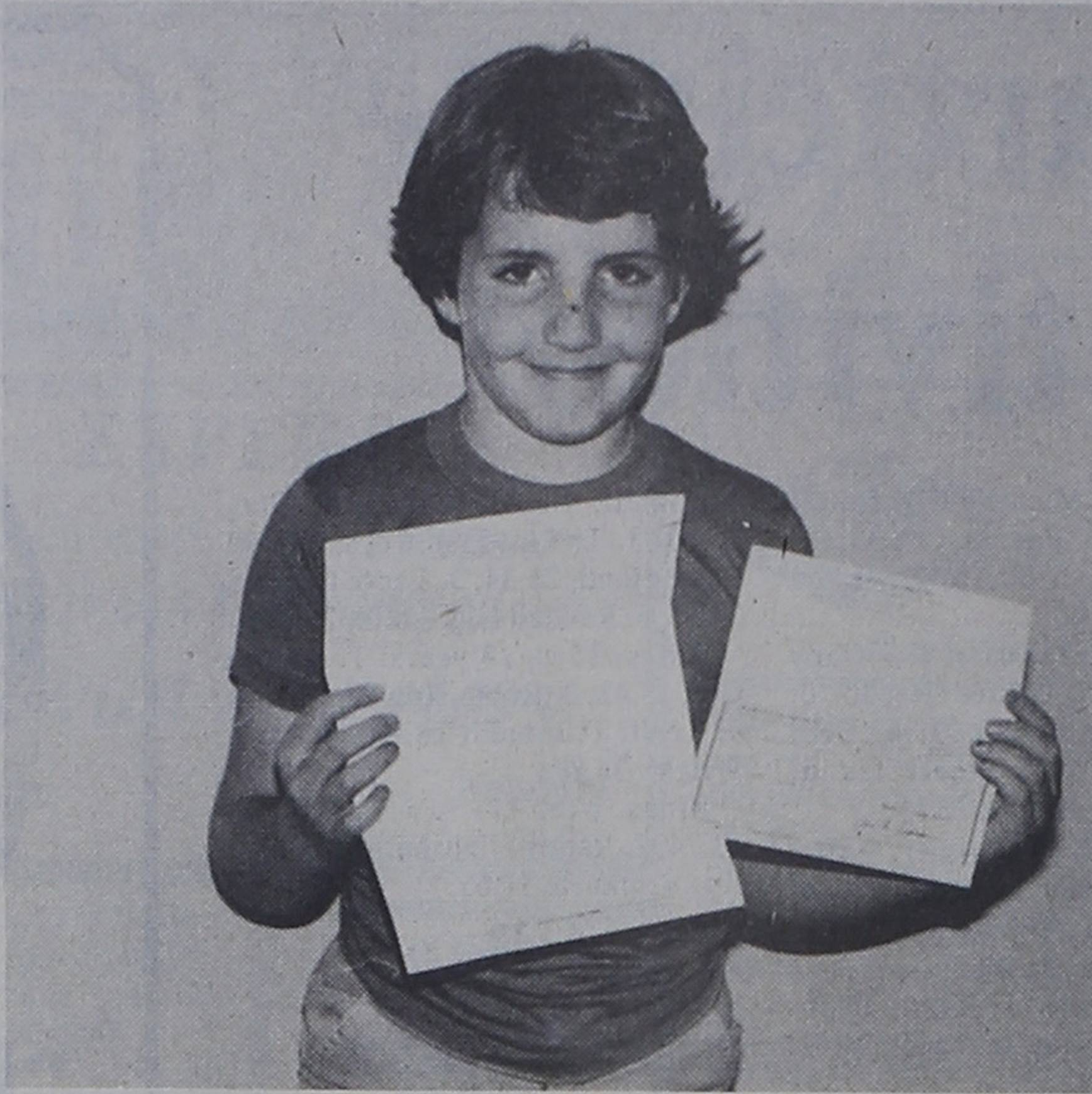

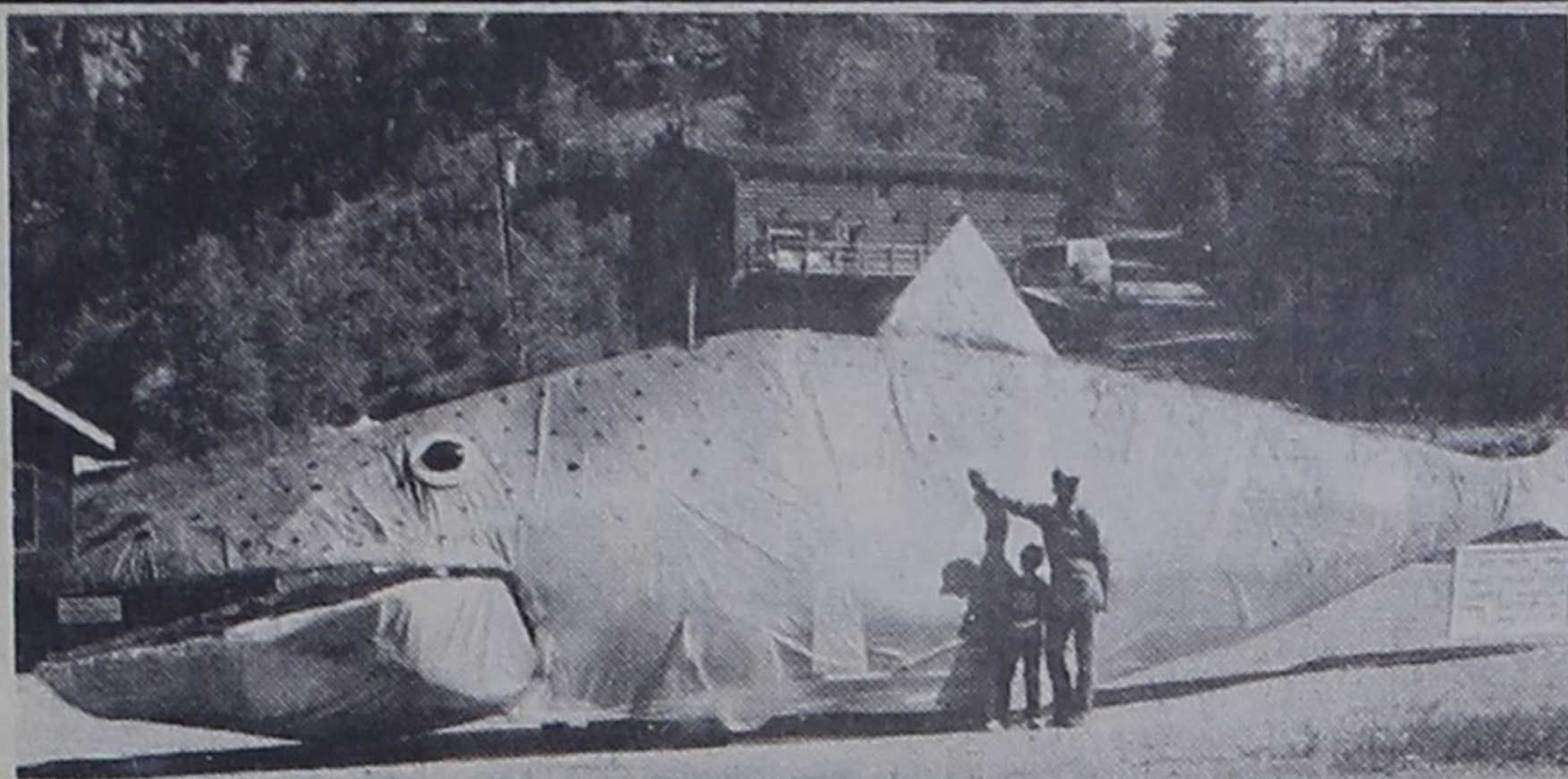

Even though the wind is blowing and the temperature is over 100 degrees, it is great to be back in Friona after an absence of two weeks.

During this time Richard, Frieda and Brandon Dickson and I drove through Northern New Mexico, Cool Colorado, Wonderful Wyoming and Magnificent Montana and enjoyed seeing a lot of beautiful scenery, deer, antelope, butterflies of every description, hummingbirds, chipmunks, numberless wild flowers in bloom, growing crops, rivers, springs, creeks, rock formations and a lot of other interesting things.

The Whitney Art Gallery of Western Art is reported to hold the world's most inclusive collection of western art. One entire wing is dedicated to Charles Russell and the works of Frederic Remington are hanging in an alcove as well as in the main gallery.

The Plains Indian Museum depicts the culture of the first tribes that first lived on the plains from the Mississippi River to the Rocky Mountains. Many of the displays show people, horses, teepees and other things in lifelike form.

The Winchester Museum, which began in 1860 with noted firearms maker, Oliver Winchester, was on display in New Haven, Connecticut for about 100 years before being moved to Cody in 1975. In addition to the display of hundreds of guns from the most primitive to the most ornate engraved modern firearms, there's a slide theatre available for visitors to learn the history and development of firearms.

Somewhere in Colorado we sampled Squid Rings, which I'd never heard of before. We also met up with Kenneth and Lawanda Moore at Taos in Northern New Mexico Sunday evening. They have a summer home near Eagle Nest.

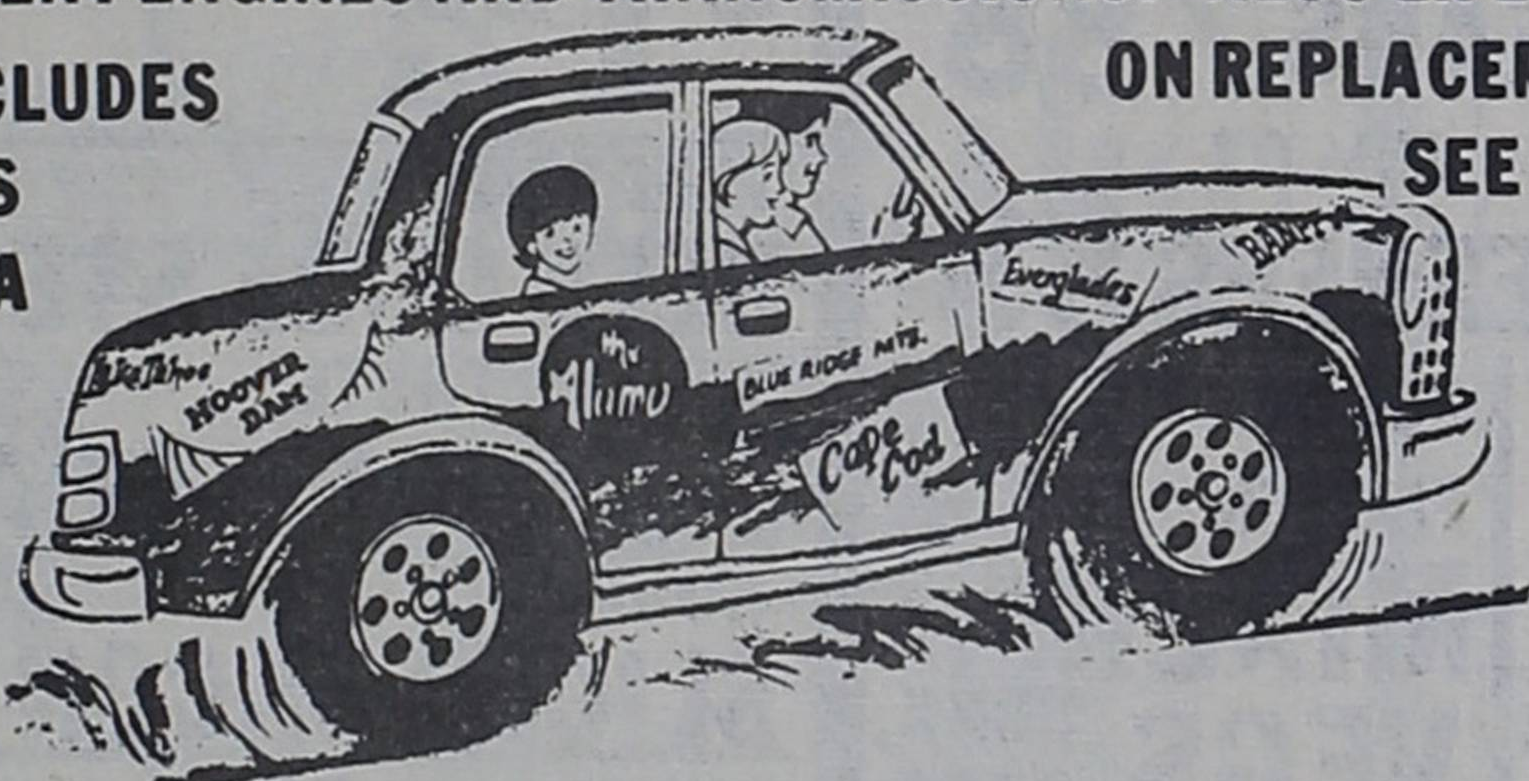

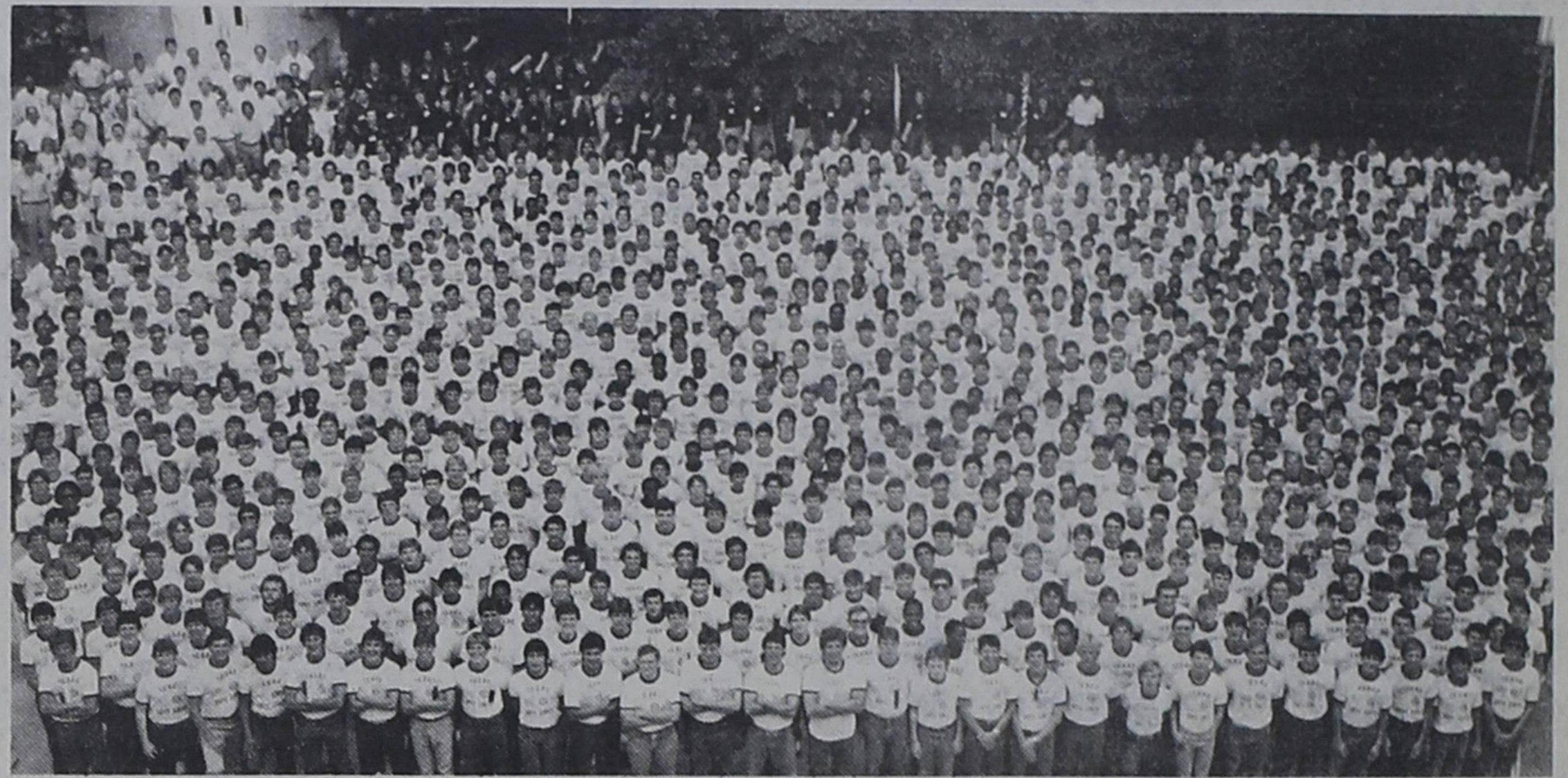
Justice was administered by their own law enforcement agencies and courts.

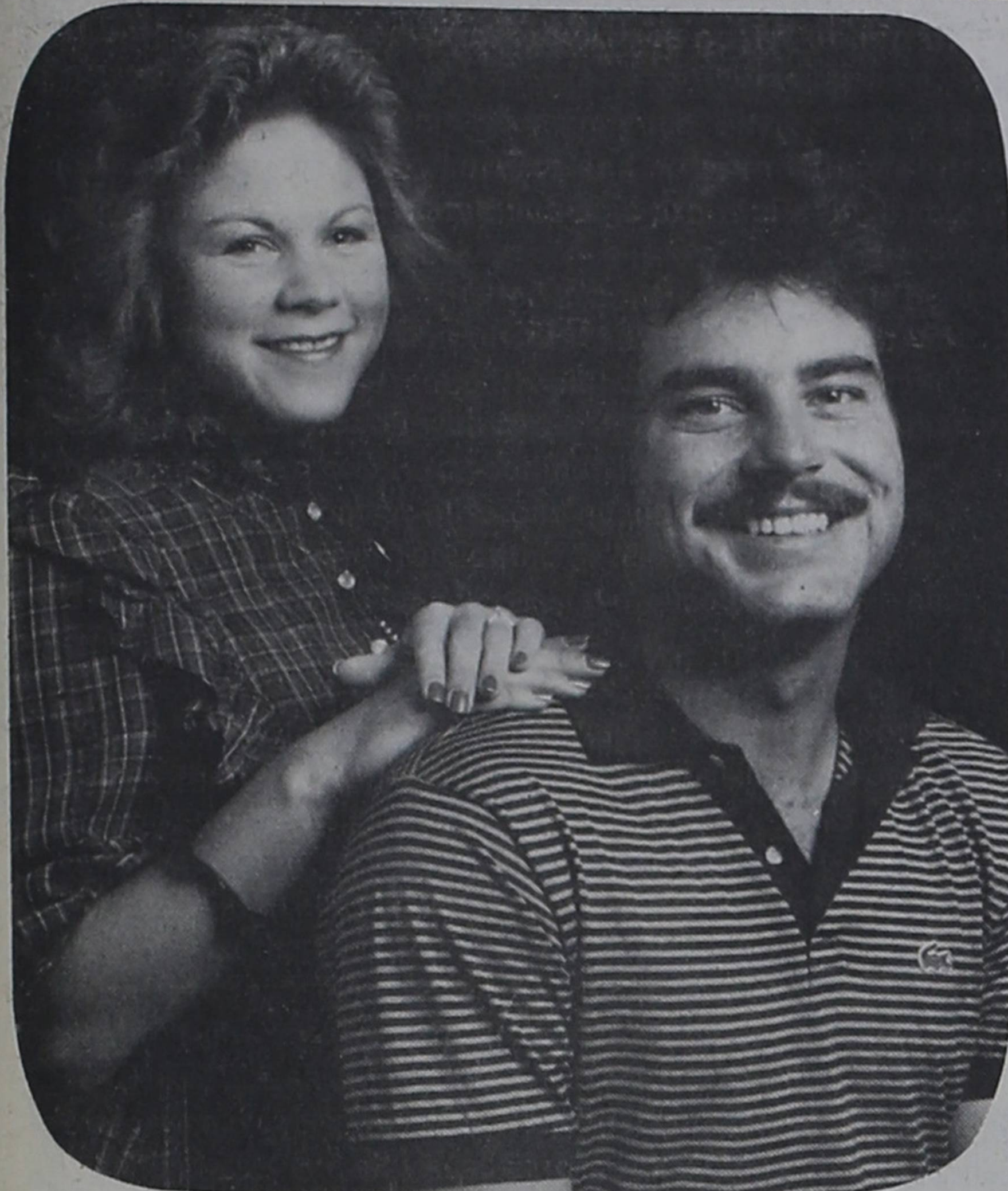

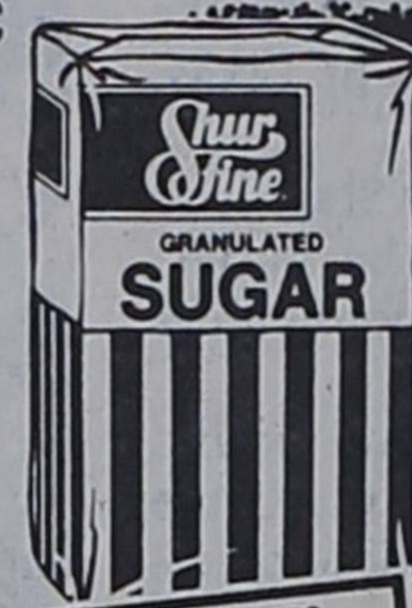

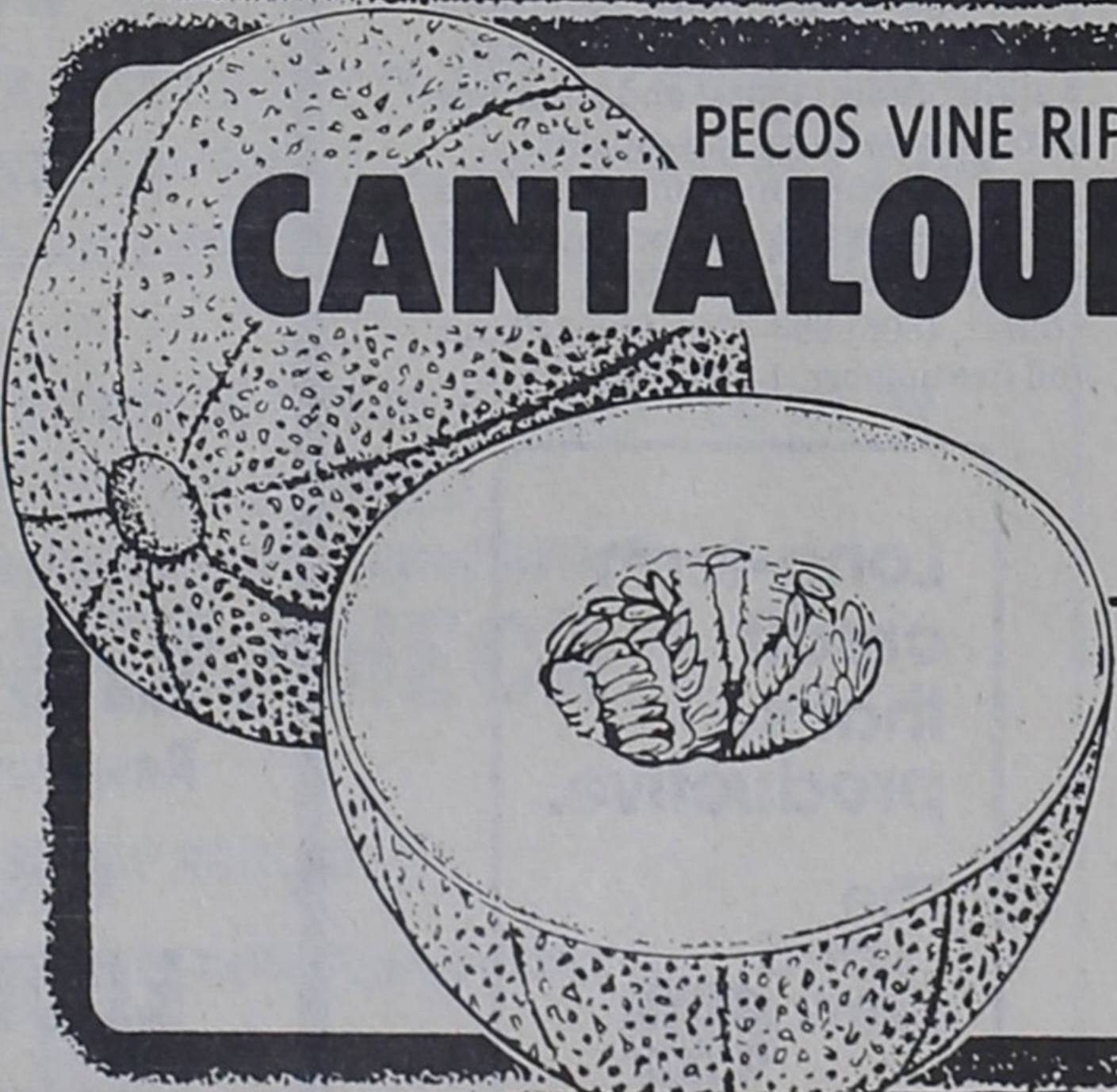
