Although the two participants, Bernard Epton and Harold Washington publicly attempted to deny that the campaign had race as its central issue, the fact remained that in truth, this was the main issue for most voters.

For a number of years, Chicago has been called "the most segregated large city in the nation," and race differences have created more than a few problems.

The election was termed by some observers as a "no win" situation. "If Washington tries to show that controlling city hall means something, the white ethnics will throw him out. If he doesn't, his own black constituency will be even angrier," was one comment.

A lot of racist statements were made during the election, not necessarily by the candidates, but another political observer said "the people who are so worried about having a black mayor will wake up the next day and see that the sky didn't fall."

But Washington, as mayor of one of the country's major cities, has his hands full. Having won a close, bitter race, he immediately has the task of proving to the 48 per cent of the voters who voted for Epton that he can be "their mayor," and attempt to draw the city back together.

The election of Washington has spurred interest by the blacks in having a presidential candidate in 1984.

# City Receives Sales Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock today sent checks totaling \$33.7 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities who levy the one-per cent city sales tax.

Friona's check amounted to \$4,275.91, which was up considerable from the same period a year earlier, when the city's check was \$3,315.48. For the year, however, Friona's sales tax receipts amount to \$25,333.73, down 20 per cent from the \$31,975.24 as of the same date in 1982.

receipts are \$38,731.55, compared to \$44,786.92 a year ago.

"Statewide, these checks are down more than 3 per cent from last year," Bullock said. "This follows the downward trend we're seeing in state sales tax receipts. For the first time in 21 years, we've seen a drop in the number of sales tax dollars collected from year to year. We've found the oil and gas industry pays about 30 per cent of our state sales tax, either directly or indirectly, and the hardest

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District will join the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 8-15, according to an announcement by Troy Christian. The theme of this year's celebration is "Living Waters." The National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"If our water management practices in the past have been adequate, we may ignore the rising population, the increased industrialization, and expanded irrigation, all of which require more water from our reservoirs," cites NACD in the 16-page Soil Stewardship Week booklet. "One of our more compelling social and economic needs is for a full appreciation of the true value of our abundant supply of water. It is time to think seriously about conservation, pollution, priority usage and our dependence upon it."

Informative material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme is distributed each year through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, churches, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the observance.

"If we are to make certain that supplies will be adequate for present and future needs, we are obligated to abide by the universal laws and to help, rather than hinder, the process by which the constant supply of water is recycled and repurified," according to NACD.

hit areas of our state are where the local economy leans heaviest on oil and gas."

Bullock said studies in his office show as much as 40 per cent of local sales tax receipts in Houston come from oil and gas companies or their employees. "This would explain why Houston's local sales tax receipts are running 11 per cent behind last year," Bullock said. Houston received the biggest check in the state--for \$6.6 million.

Other cities that depend heavily on oil and gas, or on trade with Mexico, continue pulling down statewide collection totals. Midland and Odessa receipts are running 27 per cent behind last year and El Paso is now more than 15 per cent behind 1982 totals.

Bullock also sent April rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$6.9 million, compared with \$8 million last April. The San Antonio MTA got \$1.1 million compared with \$914,000 last April.

# Wayland Professors **Complete Programs**

**Two Wayland Baptist University** professors will complete sabbatical programs this summer which they began a year ago.

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
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# **On The Farm** In Parmer Co.

#### **By SETH RALSTON** "Check Soil Temperatures Before Planting"

In many cases the early bird does get the worm. But when it comes to spring planting, farmers may want to use a little restraint and take a look at soil temperatures before cranking up their planters. One of the keys to getting

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spring crops off to a good start is to heed soil temperatures, cautions Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Soil temperatures have been shown to have an important effect on how well seed germinate. Planting in

and the soil has warmed to a temperature favorable to the intended crop.

Farmers also need to keep atuned to weather forecasts prior to planting. A sudden change in weather conditions following planting can be detrimental to the crop, particularly a cool, wet spell that can lower soil temperatures drastically.

Just when is it safe to plant what crop?

Average minimum temperatures (at the four-inch depth) for planting are as follows: corn, 50 degrees; sorghum, 55 degrees; cotton, 65 degrees; and soybeans, 70 degrees.

Hardy vegetables such as onions, cabbage and

soil temperatures are still marginal, farmers need to pay particular attention to

using high quality seed, fungicides and other seed protectants, and adjusting seeding rates, notes Ralston.

> How do farmers keep abreast of changing soil temperatures?

Ralston points out that daily readings are taken at various locations throughout Texas in cooperation with the Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and individual cooperators.

As temperatures are collected, they are included in daily agricultural advisories issued by the Agricultural

President Reagan has declared the week of April 24 as National Consumers Week. In his declaration, President Reagan states that we must "fully recognize the crucial role consumers play

in our economy." Most of us know what

government, agriculture, industry, and labor contribute to the economy. But we don't often recognize how we as individual consumers contribute to the economic health of the nation.

So the theme of this year's National Consumers Week is "Consumers Supply Demand." As consumers, we comparisons to safety information. Consider how many stores, businesses and

services in our country would close if it was not for the demand of the consumers who live here.

But it is not enough to simply recognize that consumers are important. We need to work at being more effective consumers to make our economy function at its best.

In the kick-off ceremony for National Consumers Week, Louis V. Gerstner, Chairman-Elect of the Joint Council on Economic Education, said there is a "strong need to improve the economic literacy of the American consumer as the are important to the country's economic environ-

appliances, or understand a warranty, can appreciate Mr. Gerstner's comments. Although consumers now have greater choices in making purchase decisions, the increased amount of consumer information that goes with those choices can

be confusing.

According to Virginia Knaur, Director of the U.S. Office of Consumer Affairs, the answer to this problem is consumer education which will "help us to function as competent, creative consumers."

potatoes can be planted once soil temperatures range between 45 and 50 degrees while warm-season vegetables such as tomatoes, melons, beans and peppers need soil that has warmed into the 60's.


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
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
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# Squaw Golf **Team Places** In Regional
