THOSE OF US who live in the Texas Panhandle may think we have had a wild and woolly winter this season, but from the looks of the news reports this week, our local weather has held only a tinge of discomfort.

The Western coast of the United States, in particular Southern California, has felt the brunt of Mother Nature's wrath for about the third time this week.

I don't know who presented the proposition, but someone ramrodded it through behind women's backs.

"*Wives of the watchees will not be responsible for catheters or I.V.s that become dislodged during the day.

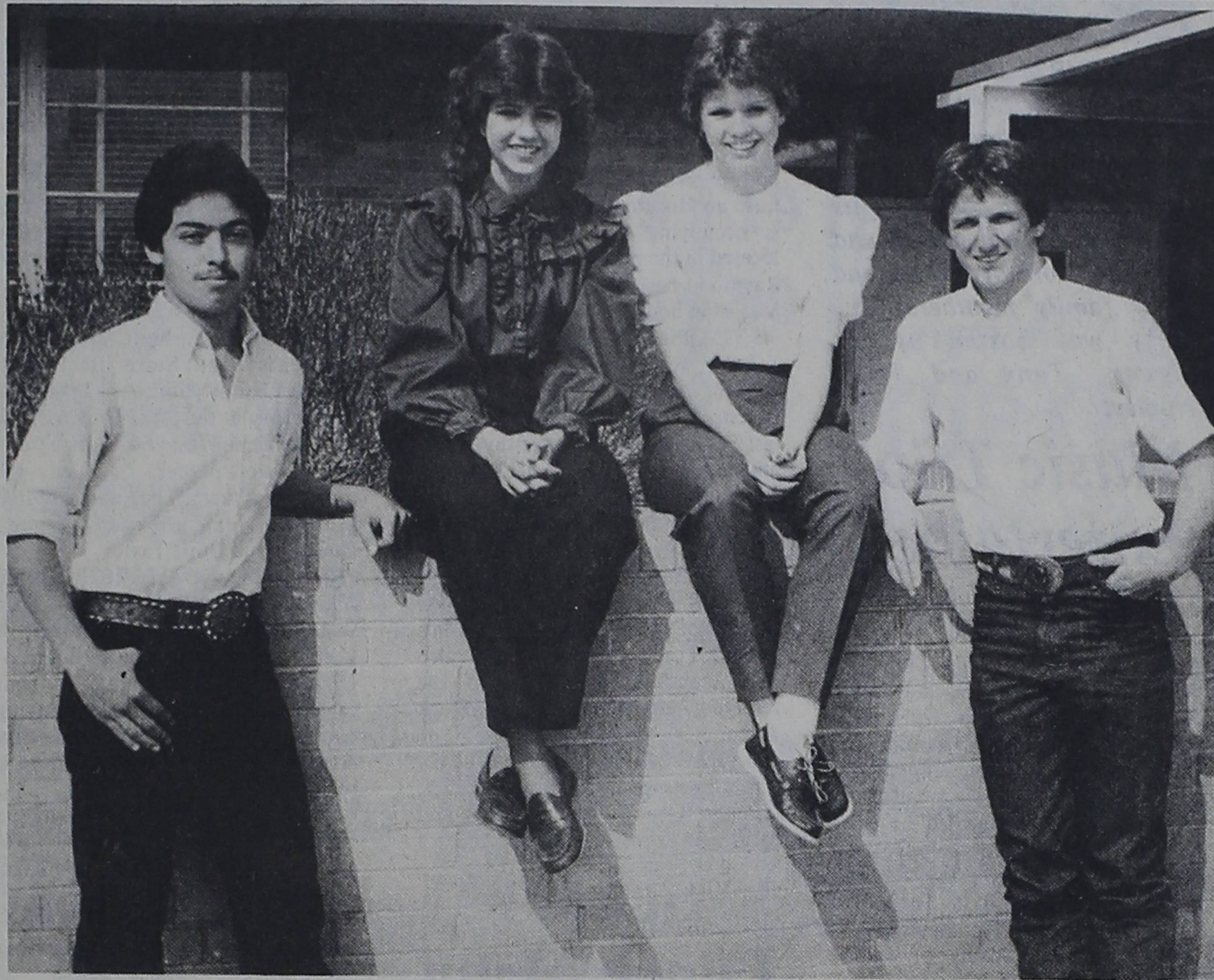
"*If sports are appearing on more than two TV sets in the home, a woman has the right to smash one of them with a tire iron.

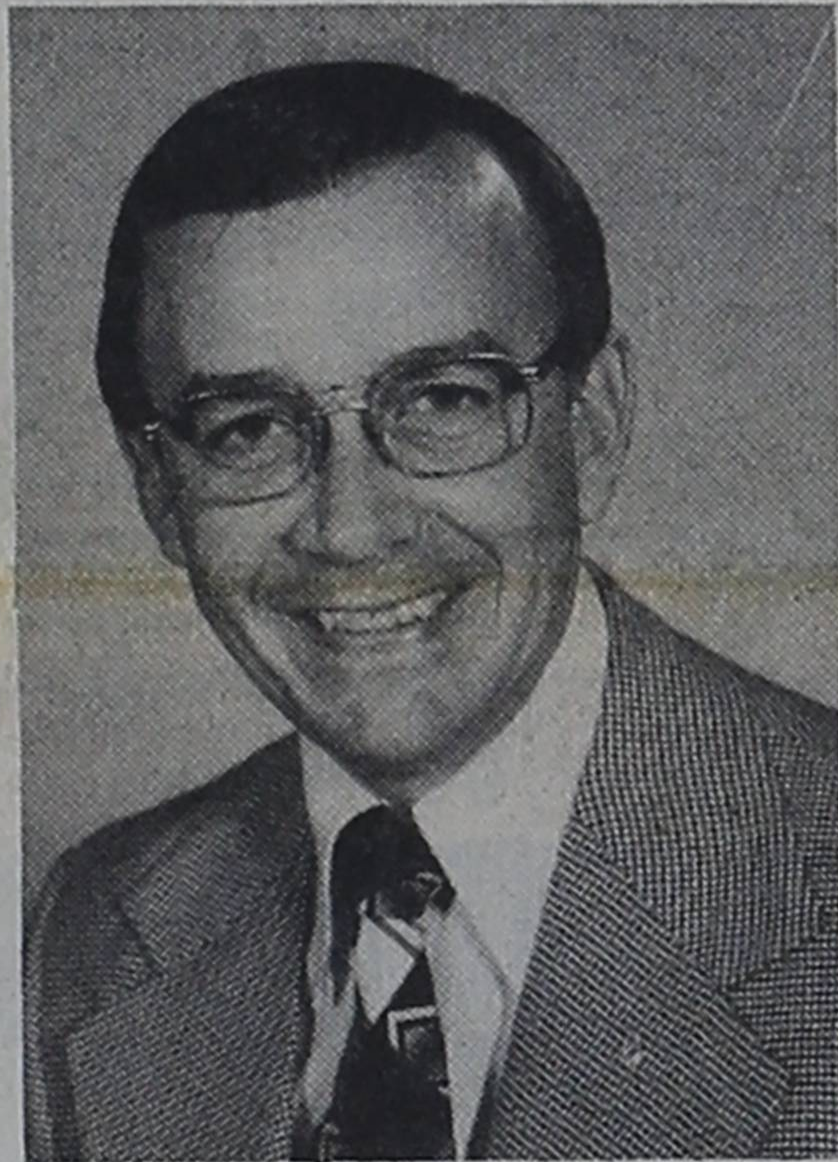
"As I leaned over to turn off a speedboat race in the South Pacific a voice threatened to alter the length of my arms.

Chemical Demo Slated For March 7

Parmer County producers will have an opportunity to complete a training program scheduled for March 7, at 7 p.m. at the Oklahoma Lane Community Center, four miles east of FM 1731 intersection or just west of Bovina Feeders on south side of highway, according to Seth Ralston, County Extension Agent.

The Private Applicator Certification Training Program, one of the optional means of qualifying for certification as a private applicator of restricted-use pesticides and state-limited-use pesticides, includes a discussion of laws, labels, and labeling, pesticide safety, mixing and calibration and pests and pest damage identification.

The program prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented. The program will require approximately three hours.

Home study materials are available from the extension office.

Public Schools Events March 10

For the first time in a number of years, the Friona Independent School District is stressing Texas Public School Week with an organized program and open house, and are encouraging parents to attend.

The open house, or special school visitation night, will be Thursday, March 10, with all school buildings open. Teachers will be in their classrooms.

Parents of kindergarten through fifth grade students are invited to visit their children's rooms between the hours of 7 and 8:30 p.m.

Junior High and high school students' parents are invited to visit between the hours of 7:45 and 9:30 p.m. The hours are being slightly staggered in the event parents have students in more than one section, to help them visit each one if they wish.

"We would like to invite and urge all parents and patrons to visit the schools Thursday night. They are, of course, welcome, and urged to visit the schools at any time they choose, but particularly during our open house," said Friona Superintendent of Schools, Tom Jarboe.

The local schools conducted an open house program during Texas Public Schools Week for a number of years, but have not done so for the past several years.

"The interest had dropped off considerably in former years, so we decided to drop the special emphasis. However, now that it has been a number of years, the interest may have returned," Jarboe said.

Parents of students in high school will have the opportunity of going through a "mock" class schedule such as their children would have during the regular school day.

In conjunction with the Open House, parents will have the opportunity to inspect the Science Fair entries in each of the schools.

The local Science Fair will have been judged on Thursday, and the entries will be left on display so that parents may see the projects.

"I think that the parents who have not seen evidence of this program will be very impressed by the work done by our students on these science projects," Jarboe said. The local Science Fair is under the direction of Friona High School science instructor Rick Tullis, who also is director of the regional Science Fair this year.

Tullis said he was anticipating over 100 entries in the fair in junior high, between 75 and 150 in elementary school, and around 30 in high school.

The science fair display will be held at the cafeteria in high school, and at the junior high gymnasium.

"The younger students are really taking to the Science Fair project. I think it is a great way to whet their interest in the various aspects of science," Tullis said.

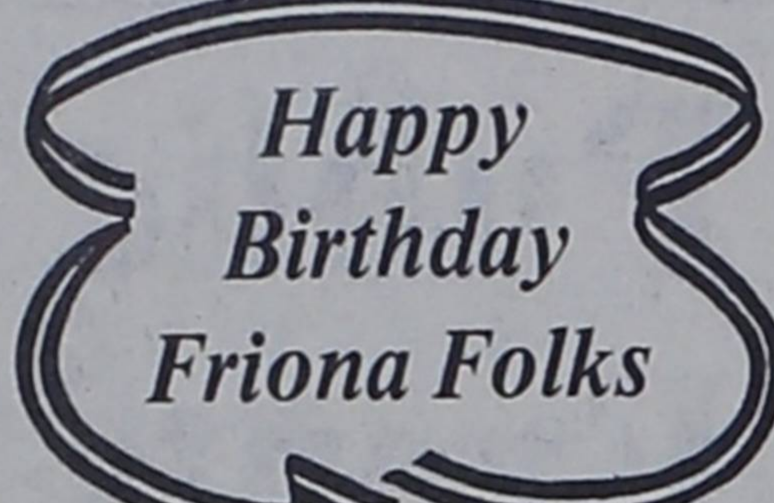

55 YEARS AGO--MARCH 9, 1928

The Lazbuddy school is busy preparing a one and a half hour play which will be given as soon as the new brick building is completed, which will probably be about one more week.

Raymond and Opal Jones have both moved their houses in from the farm and located them in town. Opal is occupying his house which is located in the northeast part of town. Raymond has been living in the E.B. McLellan house for several months.

45 YEARS AGO--MARCH 11, 1938

It is generally agreed that the fourth annual Parmer County Livestock Show, which was held here last Saturday, was the best by far of any that have yet been held. Grand champion prizes were awarded to Albert Cannon, Friona, best sow; Marston Mars, of Lazbuddie, best barrow. In the beef department, young Mars again came in for the honors of grand champion on his Hereford calf, while Jack Julian, also of Lazbuddie, was awarded the reserve championship on his Black Angus calf.

40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 5, 1943

A four-motored army bomber, enroute from Dallas to Clovis and carrying a crew of nine men, made a

forced landing about sun-up Wednesday morning in a wheat field belonging to Russell O'Brian, 13 miles southeast of Friona. The plane had stopped in Lubbock, but developed engine trouble. Six of the men bailed out near Lazbuddie, and were picked up soon after landing.

35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 5, 1948

The Friona Squaws basketball team defeated McLean, 30-15 in the finals of the Girls District Basketball tournament at White Deer last Saturday night to walk away with the district championship. The Squaws will enter the State Basketball Tournament at Hillsboro, Texas, for another try at the State Crown. They were runnersup last year. Four Friona girls won places on the all-tournament team. They were Mildred Mingus, Jean Horner, Wanda Robason and Doris Taylor.

30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 5, 1953

Granville McFarland has been voted by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Board of Directors as president of that organization for 1953. D.C. Herring continues as vice-president, and Arthur Drake was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 6, 1958

Education--Major Industry In Friona

Education is a multi-million dollar business in Friona, according to figures supplied to the Star this week for Public School Week by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The Friona Independent School District is operating on a total budget of \$3,492,499 for the 1982-83 school year.

It costs roughly \$20,000 per day of instruction to operate the Friona school system. Looking at it in a different manner, it costs about \$2717 per student per year, using the current school enrollment figure of 1,285 students.

The economic impact of the school system on the community can be seen in the fact that the annual payroll for the professional, para-professional and auxiliary staff members amounts to approximately \$185,000 per month.

There are a total of 96 professional employees, including certified teachers, administrators and counselors. There are 28 para-professional employees (aids, secretaries, library aides, bookkeepers, etc.). There are 29 auxiliary employees, who work in food, transportation and custodial positions.

This makes a total of 153 full-time employees for the local school system, which ranks the school second only to Excel Corporation in terms of payroll numbers.

Transportation costs the school system about \$105,000 annually, not including salaries. Jarboe pointed out that whereas a 66-passenger bus could be purchased in 1970 for \$6,665, the same bus today runs in the neighborhood of \$23,000.

The school runs seven bus routes daily, transporting around 260 students to and from school. The buses run approximately 570 miles per day. Friona was the first school in the state of Texas to instigate a regular school bus program.

The cost of operating the school plant each year--for custodial service, utilities, maintenance supplies and capital outlay items, etc., comes to about \$340,000.

Instructional costs--including supplies, travel expenses, etc., amounts to about an additional \$158,000 yearly.

The "general fixed assets" for the school properties are set at \$4,498,681, but Jarboe points out that this figure is derived at adding the costs of the buildings, etc., as they were built, and are far from what the replacement costs would be for buildings and supplies.

This gives the taxpayer an idea of what his annual school taxes are used for--and what a really big business the school is.

GROWTH CHARTED

An idea as to how the Friona school system has grown can be seen in a comparison of enrollment figures.

Enrollment in the Friona school system was 483 students in 1949. By 1962 this had grown to 1180, and at the present time the enrollment stands at roughly 1285 students.

The number of professional employees and other employees has also grown accordingly. In 1949, there were only 23 teachers in the entire school system.

Additions have also been seen at various times to the school plant. The most recent addition was a new junior high school cafeteria, new classrooms, and some remodeling at the junior high school, at a cost of around \$1.4 million.

Prior to the recent expansion, the last big building program was the building of the high school, completed in 1965-66 at a cost of \$1.25 million.

In 1957, a building program had been completed which consisted of most of the present elementary school and

gym. The primary school building, which houses kindergarten through second grade, was built in 1954.

The Junior High building, which was originally built to house the high school students, was used for the first time in 1951-52, after a fire destroyed the old high school plant.

It continued as the high school building until January of 1966.

The junior high gym was built in the spring of 1950, being the oldest building on the campus. However, it came in for a portion of the recent remodeling program.

Administrators Log 106 Years In Field

The observation of Public Schools Week allows us the chance to salute several members of the school administration and teaching staff for their service locally.

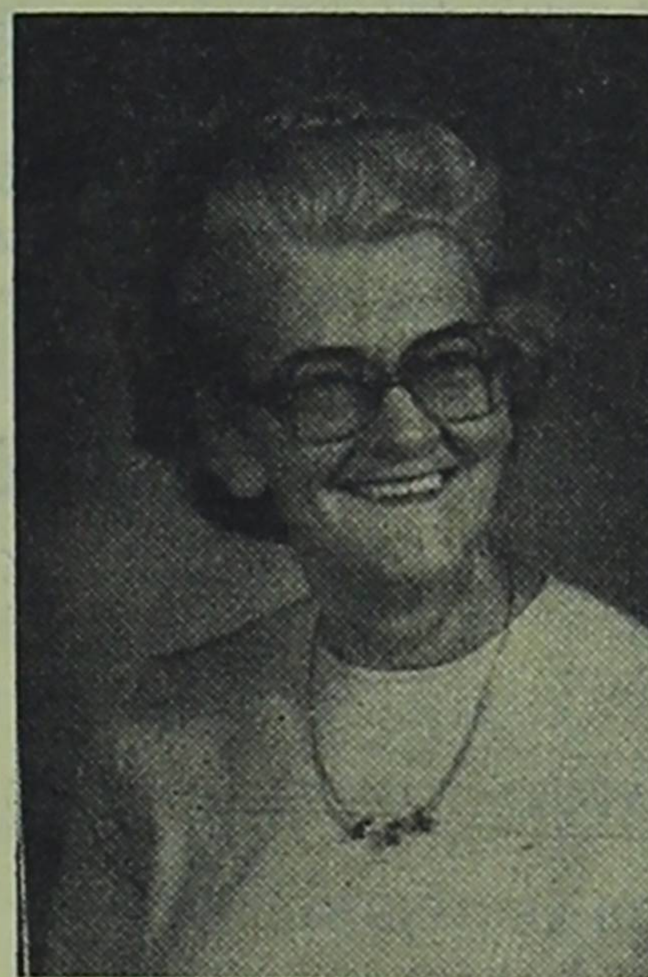
Superintendent Tom Jarboe is in his 32nd year in the education field, all at Friona. Junior high principal Cecil Maddox is in his 22nd year in the field, 17 at Friona. Elementary principal Freeman Melton has logged 33 years, seven at Friona, and Hal Ratcliff, high school principal, has 19 years experience, three at Friona.

When he retired following the 1973-74 school term, former superintendent Alton Farr had spent 15 years in the local system, and 38 in all. Raymond Cook retired following the 1980 school year, after 30 years in the school business locally. J.T. Gee, longtime elementary principal and agriculture instructor, had 27 years of service locally.

"I feel that Friona is very fortunate in that a number of extremely qualified teachers have remained in the local school system for a number of years. As an administrator, I especially appreciate that," Jarboe said.

An increase in state fees is an increase in state taxes.

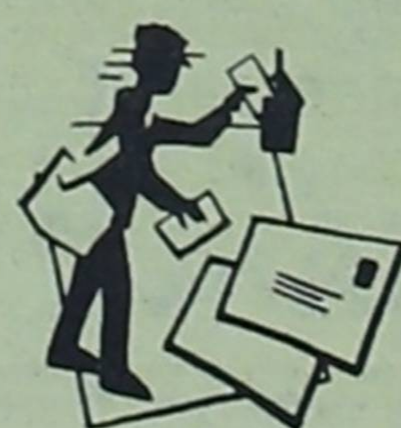
Both increases have the same result: more money for the government and less money for the taxpayer.

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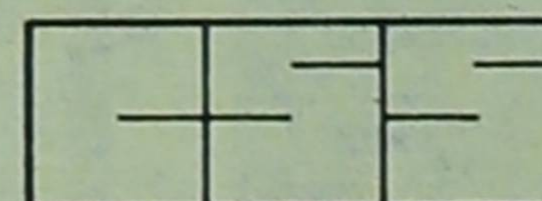

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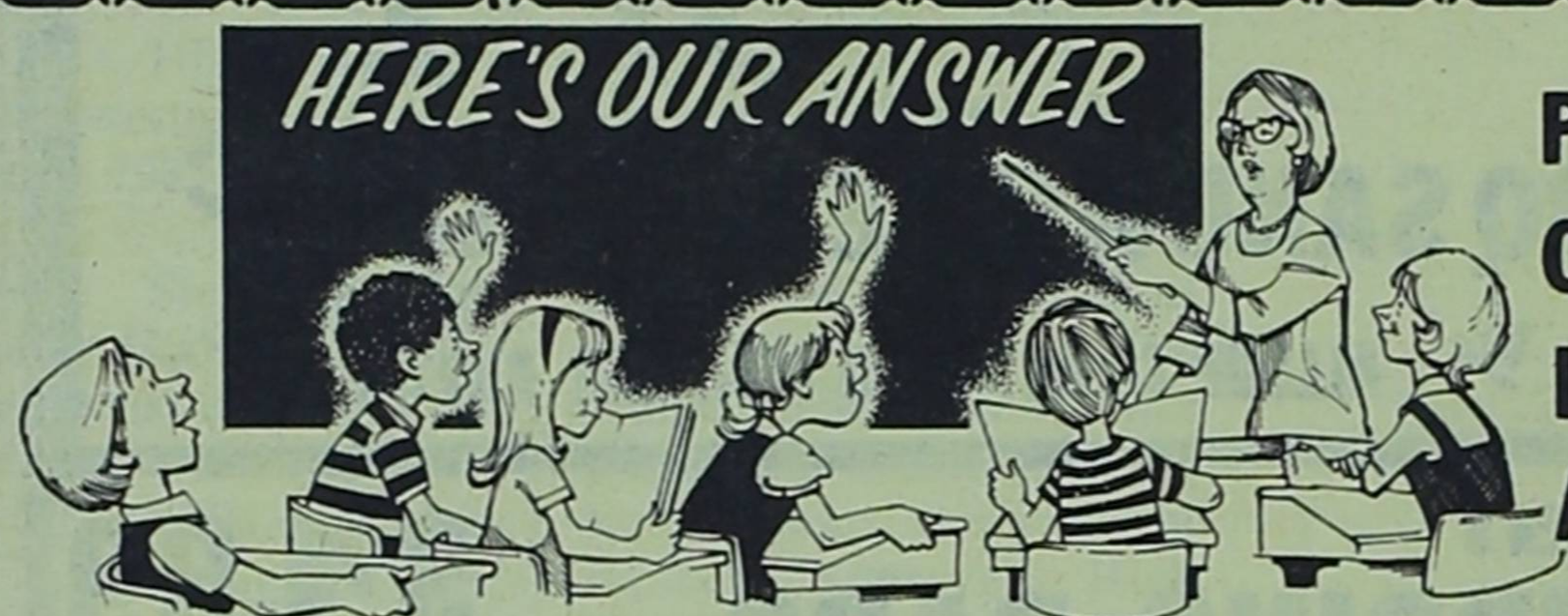

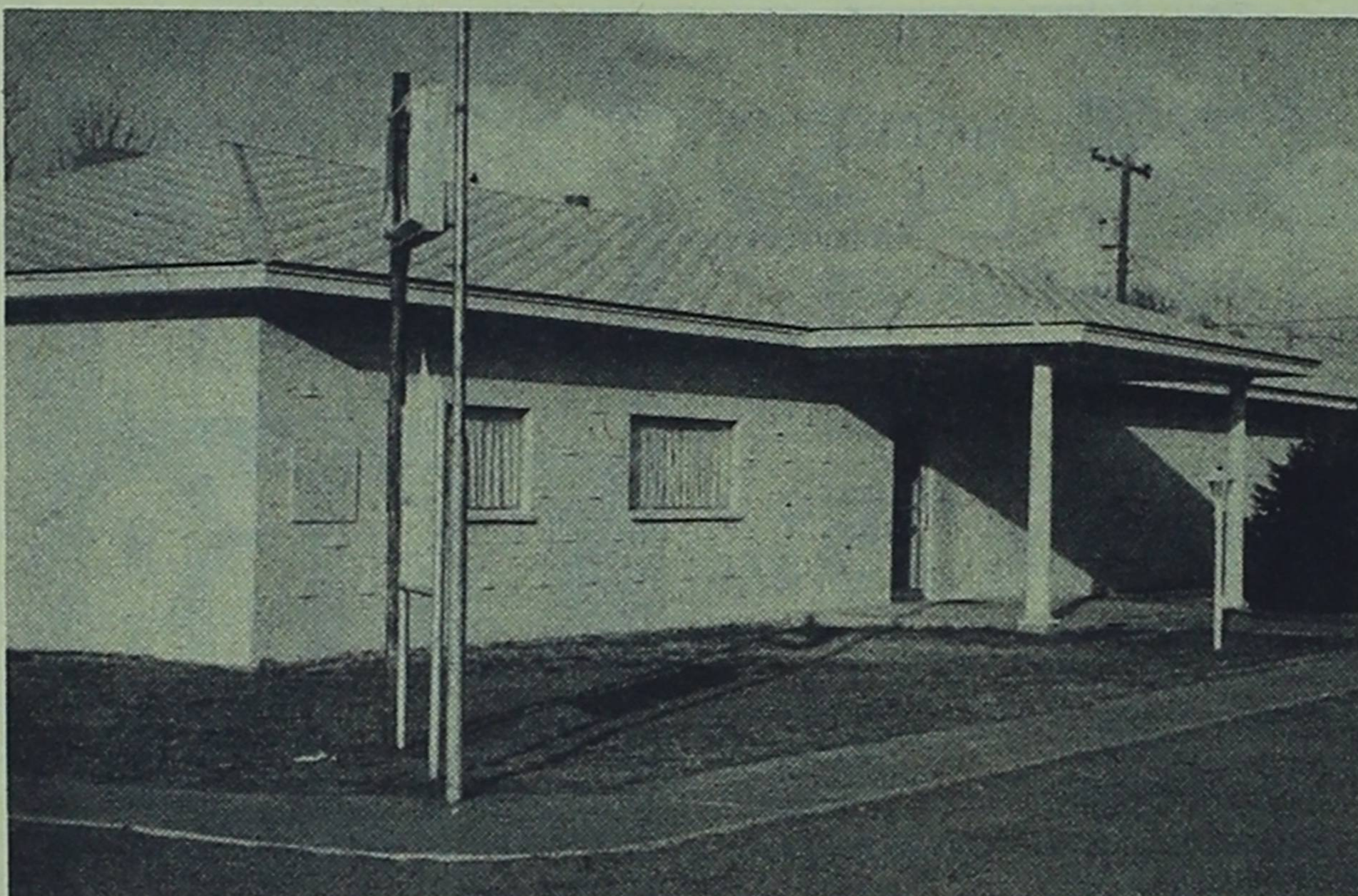
