FRIONA BUSINESSES were hit this week by a very questionable type of promotion. Luckily for all concerned, the City of Friona and the promoters agreed to back away from the deal, and all of the money which had been collected was to be refunded.

Undoubtedly, all of those people concerned learned a very valuable lesson this week. First, you need to know something about the people who are trying to sell you something.

We have always felt that as long as you limit purchases and/or donations to local individuals, then you're on safe ground. If a dispute arises, then at least the person is going to still be located down the street. You can make the necessary adjustment, and everything will be all right.

Under the program which was started in town this week, the promoters could have left town with hundreds, even thousands of dollars, and the local sponsors would have received only about \$350, which was their guarantee.

Local residents and businesses should also realize that if a fund drive is a real, bona-fide drive, it usually will have received considerable publicity in the pages of the Friona Star before it is launched.

The fact that the salespeople came in practically unannounced, and used high-pressure sales tactics should have been a warning signal, and in fact it was to a number of people.

It has always been a mystery to this writer that while we have in the Friona Star a legitimate advertising medium, yet sometimes our space goes begging. But a stranger, even using the telephone, can convince folks to pay \$300 for a very small space, which at best would have been seen by only a small group of people.

Of course, the big thing was that they were using a manufactured need, and appeared to be doing a humanitarian service.

Be careful, folks. Chances are if you haven't heard of a particular project, or the person trying to sell you on it, then it could be a "scam."

THIS BEING AN odd year (by the calendar), it is the year that the University Interscholastic League (UIL) will re-draw and possibly reshape the district boundaries for UIL competition.

School officials and coaches always hold their breath until the new alignments are announced, and hope for the best.

There has been some talk this year of re-vamping the enrollment set-up, in order to increase the number of 4A teams in the state. Currently, whereas there are 32 districts in 2A, 3A and 5A, there are only 16 districts in the 4A classification.

What the UIL might do, is attempt to make a more or less equal number of teams in each classification. The extra teams for 4A would have to come down from 5A, and up from 3A, with a lot of other schools being shifted one way or the other.

Besides there being a smaller number of schools in 4A, there are more schools in class A than any other division, and while some of the larger schools in this division could be moved into class 2A, a big majority of these are small schools, and would be unable to compete on a larger level.

We get accustomed to having certain schools and teams in our districts, but sometimes when the realignment procedures are completed, some of the old rivals are lost, perhaps due to enrollment changes.

This was the case the last time around, when Olton dropped from a 3A school down into class 2A, and Vega went from class 2A into A.

With enrollment figures continuing to change for almost every school, and with the possibility of restructuring the entire setup, there's no telling how it will affect the local school and its district alignment. But everyone will know within the next week or so. Until then, we just have to hope for the best.

Questionable Ad Deal Terminated

An outside sales campaign caused so much of a stir among business leaders because of the way the campaign was geared, that by mutual agreement, the project was cancelled and the promoters were asked to leave town.

At the same time, they agreed to refund the checks which had been collected from local merchants.

A number of business people filed objections with the city manager, with the Chamber of Commerce, and to the Friona Star, after facts concerning the campaign came to light.

The promoters had secured a contract through the local Emergency Medical Service, signed by a city employee, to solicit funds for the local EMS. However, it came out that the sales group was to have kept 80 per cent of the funds collected, with the EMS getting the other 20 per cent, or a minimum of \$350.00.

The out-of-town promoters were selling advertising for a program they told businessmen they would print and distribute at a Christmas program to have been presented locally. They offered a full page in the program for \$300, which would entitle the merchant to 150 tickets, which would have been distributed "among needy children."

Besides objecting to the 20-80 money split, local merchants objected to the questionable tactics used by the soliciters. One merchant said that he was virtually intimidated, and the caller implied that if he had to be picked up by the local ambulance, there was no guarantee that he would live until it reached the hospital.

Young Man Is Stabbed

A young Friona man was seriously injured in a stabbing incident early Sunday morning on the Friona Wheat Growers parking lot, 400 block of Main Street.

Friona Police Department would not release the names of the parties involved, nor comment further on the incident.

"The matter is still under investigation, and has been referred to the District Attorney. I cannot comment further since it might prejudice the investigation," said Friona Police Chief Bill Thieman.

(Note: Friona put a brand new ambulance into service this summer. The vehicle is well-equipped and more than adequate to make emergency calls.)

The solicitors also were saying things like "This is the local E.M.S.," and "We are with the local fire department." One caller stated "We are calling from the Chamber of Commerce..."

"The Chamber of Commerce certainly did not approve of the tactics being used, and we began to poll our members and advise them of this, as well as the 20-80 split," said Chamber manager Bunny Murphree.

"We prefer to organize our own fund drive whenever one is needed, and we can promise 100 per cent of each dollar being used locally," said Fire Chief Ralph Shirley.

"We don't need anyone coming in from out of town and making this type of drive. Frionans have proven in the past that they can conduct a fund drive very quickly and efficiently when one is needed," said another spokesman.

Beelee Goodwin, city manager, said he sort of 'inherited' the situation, but after complaints snowballed, the promoters were confronted, and after a discussion, it was agreed that they would drop the campaign, and refund the money that had been collected.

More or less adding insult to injury was the fact that, under the terms of the contract, the city had provided D&D Productions an office from which to do its telephone solicitations.

Area Gets Good Rainfall Amounts

The Friona area received its first general rain of the calendar year this week, when moisture from a tropical storm pushed into the area.

In Friona, the week's measurement came to 2.65 inches. The bulk of that, 1.95 inches, came in a 24-hour period from 7 a.m. Wednesday until 7 a.m. Tuesday.

Practically all of the rainfall received in the local area has been slow-falling, beneficial in nature, with none of the flood-type of rain, which hit Lubbock Wednesday, dumping seven inches of rain and doing extensive damage.

Sunday evening, a shower left .14 inch of rain locally. The same night, a violent storm passed to the south of Parmer County. Cotton fields from Morton through Littlefield to Plainview and Abernathy were severely damaged by hail. Getting bad hail damage on October 16, after suffering through a drought in the summer virtually added insult to injury.

The Rhea community reported from 3½ to four inches, according to a spokesman at Sherley-Anderson's Rhea Elevator.

At Hub, the rainfall came to just over two inches, said a spokesman at Hub Grain Co. This is by far the best general rain of the year, and one of the few times as much as an inch of rain has been received at any one time.

Lopes Surprise Chiefs In 23-7 Dist. Shocker

For a team which supposedly was casting around in an effort to keep its "sinking ship upright," Abernathy sure could have fooled you.

The Antelopes, who entered last Friday's game with a "ho-hum" 3-3 season record, and was fresh off a 38-6 loss to Muleshoe in their district opener, got their problems worked out in a hurry.

They were helped along by sophomore quarterback Jamie Mansanales, given his first opportunity in a starting role. Prior to last week, Mansanales had been alternating with senior Brian Smith, who has probably called his last signal on offense.

Mansanales picked the Chieftain defense apart like no quarterback has done in the past three years. When the dust had settled, the youngster had completed an astounding 11 of 16 passes, including two for touchdowns.

Abernathy won the game, 23-7, seriously damaging Friona's hopes to make the playoffs for a second straight year.

But, while Mansanales and his friends were starring on offense, the mammoth Antelope defenders weren't doing badly themselves.

Abernathy limited the Chieftains, ranked third in the South Plains area prior to the game, averaging 320 yards, to a meager 79 total yards for the night. A check of past game statistics could not reveal the last time a Chieftain team had been held to under 100 yards offense in a game.

Fans were given a foretaste of things to come, when Friona recovered an Abernathy fumble at the Antelope 30 yard line early in the game. Three running plays lost eight yards, and on fourth down, the

Chiefs elected to punt. Mansanales took over at this point. He completed his first three passes of the game, for 19, 17 and 47 yards, the final one being a touchdown to speedy Sammy Galloway for a touchdown. The point kick gave the visitors a 7-0 lead with 4:52 left in the

opening quarter. The Chiefs drove to the Abernathy 49, but for the third time had to punt the ball away.

Friona recovered its second fumble in the contest a little later, and this time the Chieftains took advantage of the break.

Quarterback Charlie Veazey faked to Charlie Morgan, and kept the ball, then raced 23 yards for his first touchdown of the season. Doug Carthel's kick tied the game at 7-all with 5:58 left in the first half.

Eloy Caballero broke Mansanales' magic with an interception in the last minute prior to halftime, and returned the ball to the Friona 45 yard line.

Veazey ran 11 yards into Abernathy territory, but two passes fell incomplete and on fourth down the Chiefs again elected to punt as time expired in the half.

The third quarter was a complete nightmare for the Chiefs, who registered minus nine yards during the period.

Abernathy, meanwhile, used a little break to take the lead for good.

Facing fourth and 21 from the Friona 27, it appeared the Chiefs were about to register another good defensive series. The team even had a good rush on Mansanales as he faded to pass, and almost had the slippery quarterback down for a big loss.

But "closies" only count in horseshoes and hand-grenades. Somehow, the Abernathy star managed to throw the pass. And somehow Randy Houston managed to catch it, and then battled his way into the end zone for the score.

Instead of having the ball back at their own 40, the turn of events saw Abernathy taking a 13-7 lead, and from that point on, the Antelopes seemed to control the game.

Early in the fourth quarter, the 'Lopes drove, sparked by the running of Ross Bradley and a 15-yard penalty against Friona.

Again, the visitors were stalled at the Friona 16, facing fourth down. After calling time to talk it over, the Antelopes went for a field goal and made it. The 32-yard kick gave Abernathy a 16-7 lead with 8:37 left in the game.

It was a very frustrating night for the Chieftains, who entered the game with a 5-1 season mark and 1-0 in league action.

The size of the Antelope players proved to be a factor, as Abernathy's line averaged 200 pounds per man, and wore the Chieftains down throughout the game.

Veazey never went back to pass unless he had one or two of the big defenders draped around his neck.

"I don't know what our problem was. We just never could get going in the game. We didn't play well at all," said Coach Tommy Moss in regard to the game.

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



In 4-H, young people can learn how to make things, grow things, take care of things and repair things in a wide variety of projects.




4-H requires no membership fee or dues. It is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which is a part of Texas A&M University and by local, state and national donors.
