## Maize Days Schedule Full Of Activities

Numerous events are scheduled for the week of September 17-24, which will kick off with the 27th annual Miss Friona Maize Pageant. On September 20, the Progressive Study Club will host the Little Miss Friona Pageant at 7:30 p.m. in the High School Auditorium. Also on that date, the carnival will arrive and begin operation in the City Park.

Friday, September 23 promises to be a big night for all Friona as the Friona Chieftains go up against the Dalhart Golden Wolves in Friona's Homecoming Game. The game will begin at 8 p.m. following pre-game Homecoming ceremonies.

Saturday, September 24 will begin with the traditional Maize Days Parade at 10 a.m. The parade will proceed down Main Street from Eleventh Street and promises to be a big one, as more than 150 invitations have been sent to prospective entrants.

Following the parade will be the Maize Days barbecue, catered by Savage's Hickory Pit of Hereford. Tickets for the barbecue are available at the Chamber Office or from any Chamber Board member.

The day's activities will also include gymnastics demonstrations, children's pet show, food booths in the Park, a jackpot horseshoe pitching tournament, 4-H Project Show, the Modern Study Club's Country Store, and much, much more.

## Guerra First Winner In Football Contest

A lot of contestants thought they hadn't done too well in the first week of the Friona Star's football contest, including Danny Guerra, who correctly picked 15 of the 22 games.

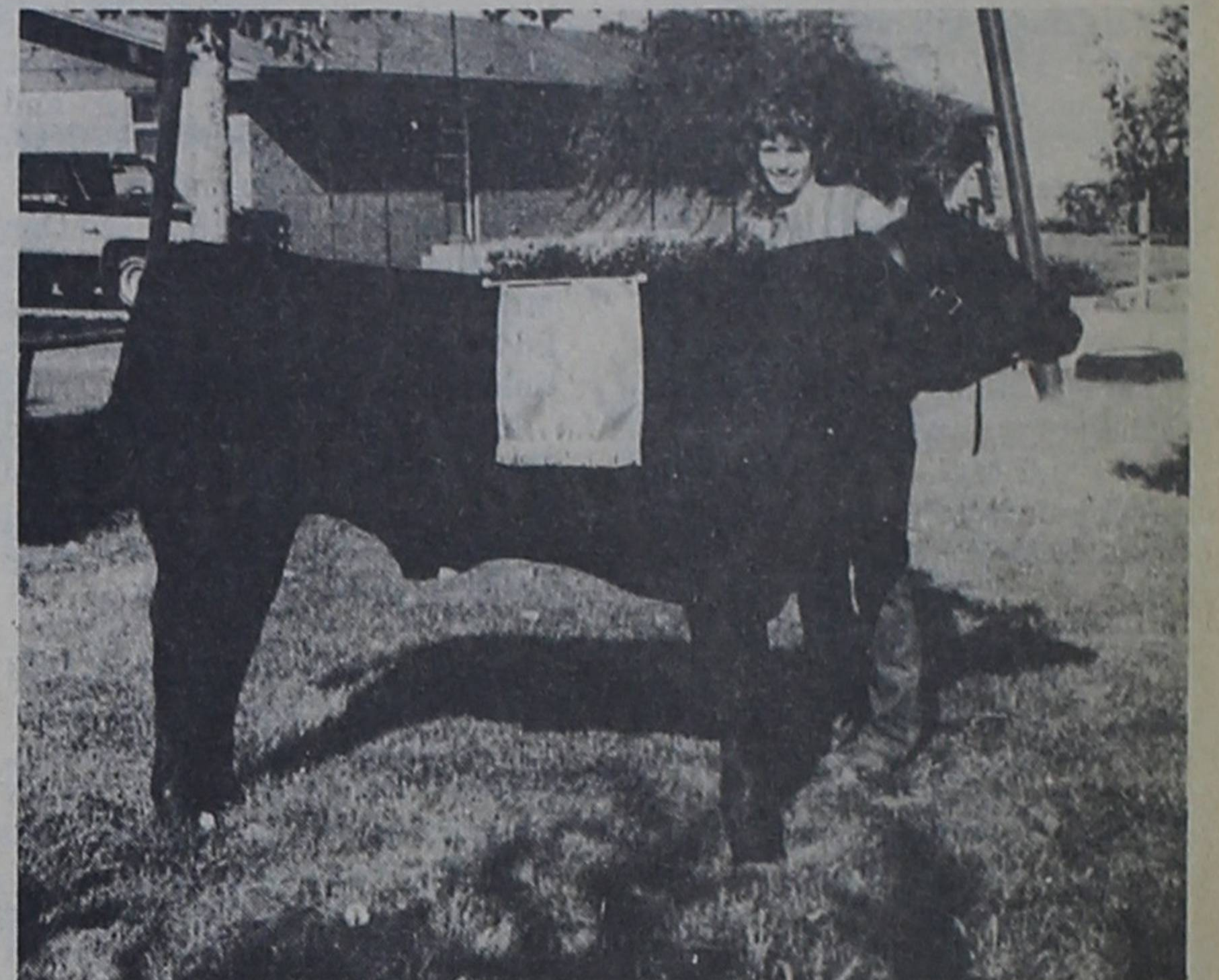
Miss Berend received \$1,000 cash prize for her efforts.

## Goodwin Tabled As City Manager

A new city manager was named at a special meeting of the Friona City Council this week.

Beelle Kent Goodwin, 36, currently serving as administrative assistant in charge of personnel for the City of Sweetwater, is the new city manager.

Goodwin is a native of Dimmitt, where he received his high school diploma in 1967. He holds a bachelor of science degree from West Texas State University, with a major in journalism and minors in political science and English.

The new city manager is a Baptist, and he and his wife are parents of one son.

He served in the United States Army from 1970-73, being discharged with the rank of Sgt., E-5.

During the time he was attending West Texas State University, Goodwin was employed by the Canyon News as a reporter and photographer.

From July, 1976 to February, 1978, he served as sports editor of the

Sweetwater Reporter, a daily newspaper, and from February of 1978 through September, 1979, served as editor of that newspaper, being responsible for all of the paper's news content and managing the newspaper's editorial staff.

From September, 1979 through January, 1981, Goodwin served as director of public relations for the Rolling Plains Memorial Hospital in Sweetwater, and news director of radio station KXOX, Sweetwater.

He has served in his present capacity with the City of Sweetwater since January 15, 1981. His duties have included director of personnel and maintenance of all employee records, health insurance, retirement and compensation. He is in the process of administering a Community Development block grant, following successful application for the \$800,000 grant.

Goodwin will assume duties in Friona on October 1, and until that time Jerry Lewis will continue in the administrative position.

## Santa Fe Closing Its Depot As Of Mon.

The Railroad Commission of Texas has granted Santa Fe Railway authority to close the agencies at Friona, Hereford, Kings Mill, Panhandle, Bovina, Etter, Stratford, Canadian, Dumas and Pampa and consolidate their functions at Amarillo. Implementation will commence September 12.

Santa Fe has designated Amarillo a regional freight office (RFO), with jurisdiction over all operating and accounting functions for shippers in the affected area. Canadian, Pampa, Dumas and Hereford will remain open as regional yard offices and will continue to handle operating functions. C.D. (Charlie) Gardner has been named manager of the

Amarillo RFO. The Amarillo RFO will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Out-of-town customers will have access to customer service by calling a toll-free number, 1-800-692-1320, for assistance.

"The change is designed to improve service to Santa Fe customers," D.P. Valentine, general manager Western Lines, Amarillo said. The implementation of a system-wide computer system has made the RFO concept feasible.

"Improvement in service will come through the combined use of computers and around the clock toll-free telephone service at the Amarillo office," Valentine explained.

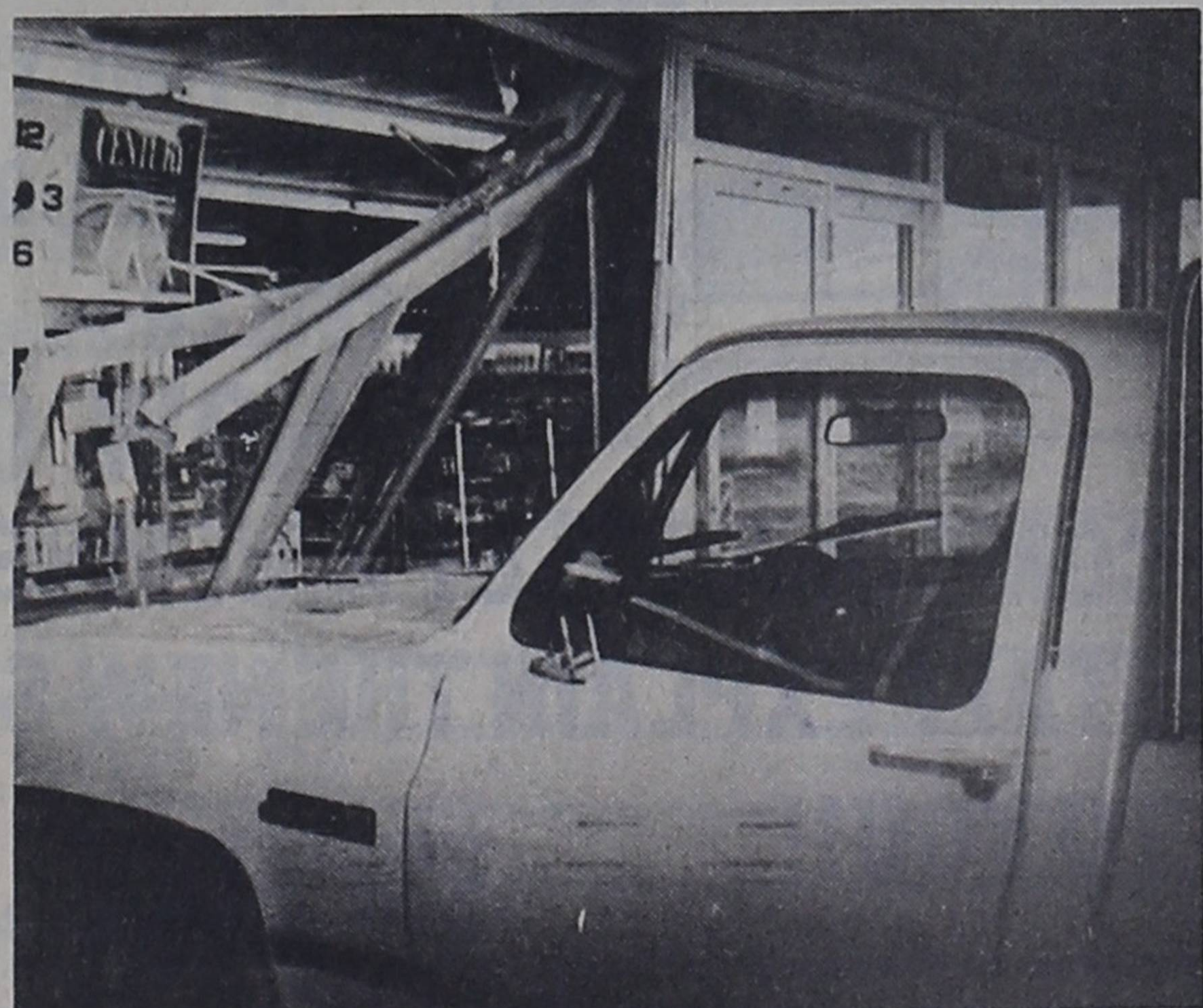

## Riding Club Slates Ropings During MD

To add variety to their Maize Days activities, the Friona Riding Club will sponsor three different ropings, as well as barrel racing on Saturday, September 24. There will be a mixed roping, a century roping, and an invitational jackpot roping.

Barrel racing will start at 7 p.m. at the arena on West Highway 60. The ropings will follow the barrel racing events. Spectators are welcome. There is no admission charge.

In the mixed roping, a team can be composed of a father with son or daughter, a mother with son or daughter, a grandfather with grandson or granddaughter, or a grandmother with grandson or granddaughter. One member of the team must be 18 years or younger. This roping will have an entry fee of \$16 for two head, progressive after one. The mixed roping is an open event.

To enter the century roping, the ages of the two team members must total 100 years or more. The entry fee

is \$16 for two head, progressive after one. The century roping is an open event.

The invitational jackpot roping is for members of the Circle A Association. The entry fee will be \$32 for four head, progressive after one. The Friona Riding Club has added an additional \$200 to go to the team that wins the average.

There will be barrel racing for younger riders as well as on open barrel race. The barrel race for younger riders will be broken into three age groups; nine years old and under; 10 to 14; and 15 to 18. There will be a one dollar entry fee and winners will receive a payback.

Riders of all ages are eligible to enter the open barrel race. The entry fee is \$35 with winners receiving payback.

The Friona Riding Club is giving away a roping saddle during the ropings. Chances can be purchased from any riding club member for one dollar.

# Chieftains Edge R.R. In Opener, 13-6

Eloy Caballero may make several more pass catches this season, but chances are he won't soon forget his first catch of the 1983 season. About 1500 opening-game fans won't, either.

Eloy caught the ball, deflected by a River Road defender, inside the ten yard line, and ran into the end zone. The 40-yard touchdown with just 40 seconds left to play gave Friona a 13-6 win over the Wildcats, and kept the team from having to settle for a tie in their opening game.

The Chieftains had made yardage up and down the field all night long--in fact the team's 411 total yards for the game ranked Friona second in the South Plains area for class AAA schools only to Post.

But the team's inability to get the ball into the end zone left them frustrated, and entering the final quarter, they still trailed River Road, 6-0, in spite of dominating the game.

Runningback Alfredo Mata, who was the game's leading rusher with 136 yards, finally got the team on the scoreboard in the final quarter.

Ricky Barnett's punt had backed River Road up to its ten yard line, and the Chieftains took over on the Wildcat 46 after a good defensive series forced the visitors to punt.

Mata ripped off an 18-yard gain to the River Road 28, after which fullback Reese Fleming bulldozed his

way 15 yards to the 13.

Mata then took the pitchout and skirted left end for the touchdown. The point-kick failed, leaving the score tied, 6-6, with 7:47 left in the game.

River Road came back with a pair of first downs, using up valuable clock time, and after being held on downs, punted the Chieftains back to their own 28 yard line. There was just 3:54 left in the game when Friona took the ball.

On a big third down play from the Friona 31, quarterback Charlie Veazey hit receiver Kevin Brogden for 16 yards and a first down at the Friona 47. That set up the winning series.

Mata circled end for eight yards to the River Road 46, and then two plays later gave the team a first down at the 37 with a nine-yard effort. However, the ground game was using up time, and only 1:08 remained in the game.

One pass attempt fell incomplete, as Veazey barely missed Caballero on a crossing pattern, and then Mata was stopped for a three-yard loss, his only one of the night.

Things looked pretty bleak at this point, as Friona faced third and 13, but worst of all, had only 51 seconds to try to move the ball into the end zone. That set up the play of the game.

Caballero went deep left, and Veazey lofted the ball in his direction. Caballero was well covered, and the pass may have been slightly overthrown. But the Chieftains, who had waited all night long for a break, got one when it counted.

The River Road defender tipped the ball, and it went right to Caballero, who alertly caught it, and then side-stepped the couple of stunned defenders, getting into the end zone for the all-important TD.

Doug Carthel's kick gave Friona a 13-6 lead with 40 seconds left.

River Road, which was virtually shut down in the second half, managed two long pass completions, and moved from their own ten to the Friona 30 before time ran out. Appropriately, Caballero tipped the ball away from the would-be receiver as time ran out, clinching the win.

The first three quarters featured mostly frustration for the Chiefs, who had some good gains but no points to show for their efforts.

Early in the second quarter, a bad Friona punt had given the visitors good field position with a first down at the Friona 24. However, on the first play from scrimmage, a River Road pass was intercepted by--you guessed it--Caballero.

A little later in the quarter, Kevan Wilson raced 55 yards for a touchdown and the visitors, defending champions in District 1-AAA, had a 6-0 lead. The 'Cats were trying for a two-point conversion, but a bad snap foiled their plans.

The score came with 3:26 left in the half, and Friona responded with a 59-yard burst up the middle by Reese Fleming, who almost broke it all the way but was caught from behind at the River Road 20.

Mata and Charlie Morgan gave Friona a first and goal at the ten. Two downs found Friona at the River Road three, and a score looked like a sure thing. However, the Wildcat defense stiffened, and turned Friona away empty-handed, preserving a 6-0 halftime lead.

Friona took the second half kickoff and drove from their own 25, paced by the running of Fleming, Morgan and Mata, and marched to the River Road six, where they again had first and goal.

Mata made a yard, a pass was incomplete, and then an errant pitchout moved the ball back to the 20. On fourth down, Veazey lofted the ball toward Caballero, who couldn't quite gather the ball in, and Friona was still scoreless.

A great 48-yard punt by River Road backed the Chieftains up to their own eight yard line late in the third quarter. But some good running by Morgan, Fleming and Mata moved the ball upfield. This drive stalled at midfield, forcing a punt. This set the stage for Friona's fourth-quarter rally.

The Chiefs outgained the visitors, 411-232. It would have been even worse had Friona not allowed the last two passes for 65 yards, when the team was in basically a prevent defense.

"We made too many mistakes near the goal-line, but we'll get that corrected. I don't know how Eloy caught the winning touchdown pass, but he did," said Coach Tommy Moss.

Moss credited quarterback Veazey for doing a good job of throwing the ball and reading the defense. "It would have been bad if we had had to settle for a tie. But River Road isn't a bad team," Moss added.

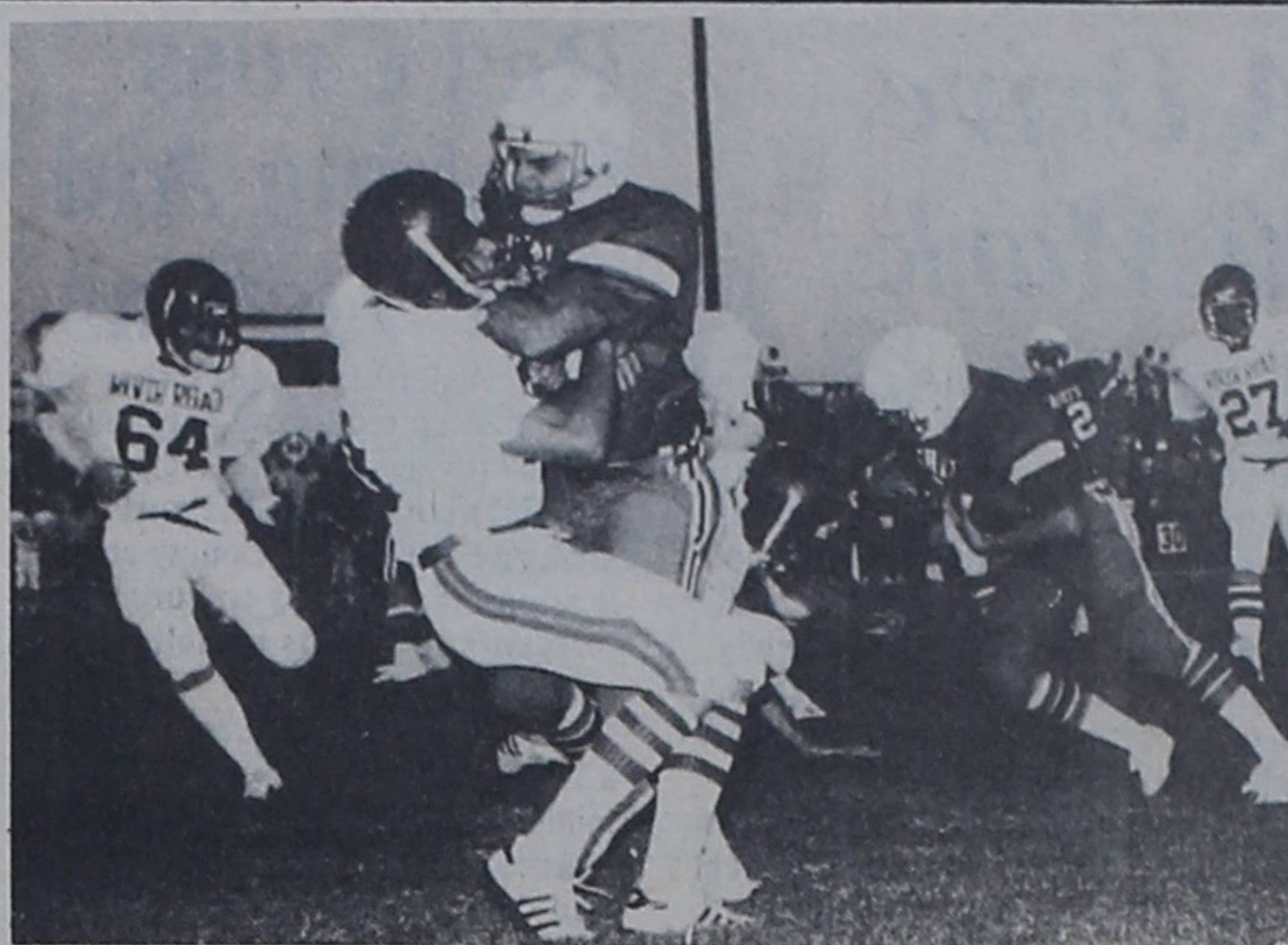

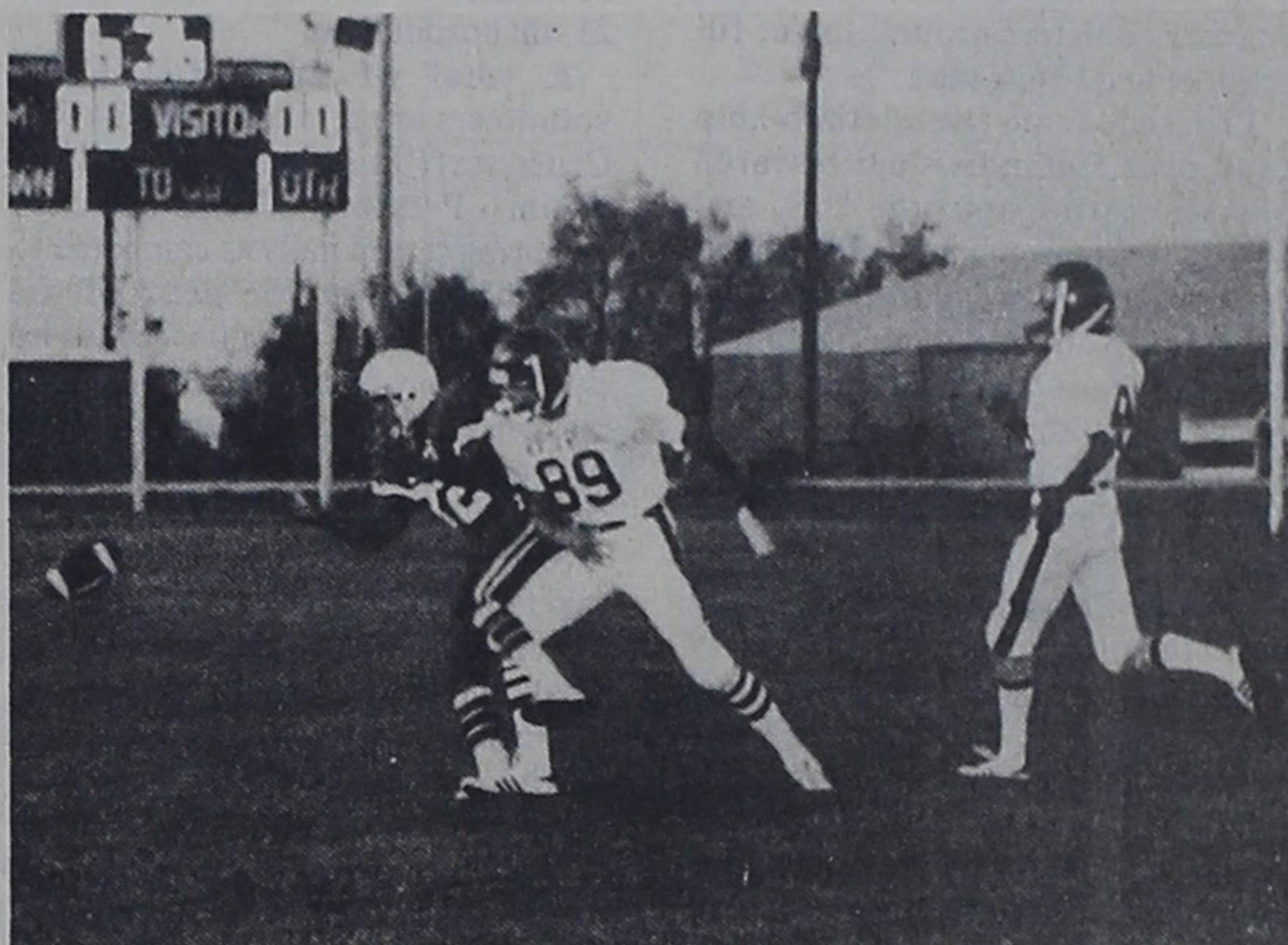

## Red Cross Seeking Aid For Victims

The American Red Cross has launched an emergency appeal for funds to assist the victims of Hurricane Alicia, in the gulf coast area, and the Parmer County chapter is appealing directly to our county residents for funds to help in this emergency.

Due to the size of the relief efforts, a Texas Disaster Campaign goal of \$2 million has been established.

According to reports received from Red Cross disaster headquarters in Houston, damage is extensive with 12,524 dwellings affected. Red Cross has had as many as 109 shelters opened since the hurricane hit the coast, and 22,650 persons have been given temporary shelter. Latest Red Cross survey figures place the number of dead at 17 with 3904 injured and 23 still hospitalized.

A total of 2800 Red Cross volunteers are serving with 194 Red Cross staff to supply the needs of victims. Presently 37,000 meals are still being served daily as compared to 201,733 daily at the peak of the emergency. Over 62,500 victims and emergency workers have received mass care from Red Cross in the form of food, shelter, clothing and medical care.

Steve Bavousett, chapter chairman, said that all contributions will be used to help our fellow Texans who are in need, due to this hurricane. He urges all Parmer County residents to come to the aid of the many desperate families there.

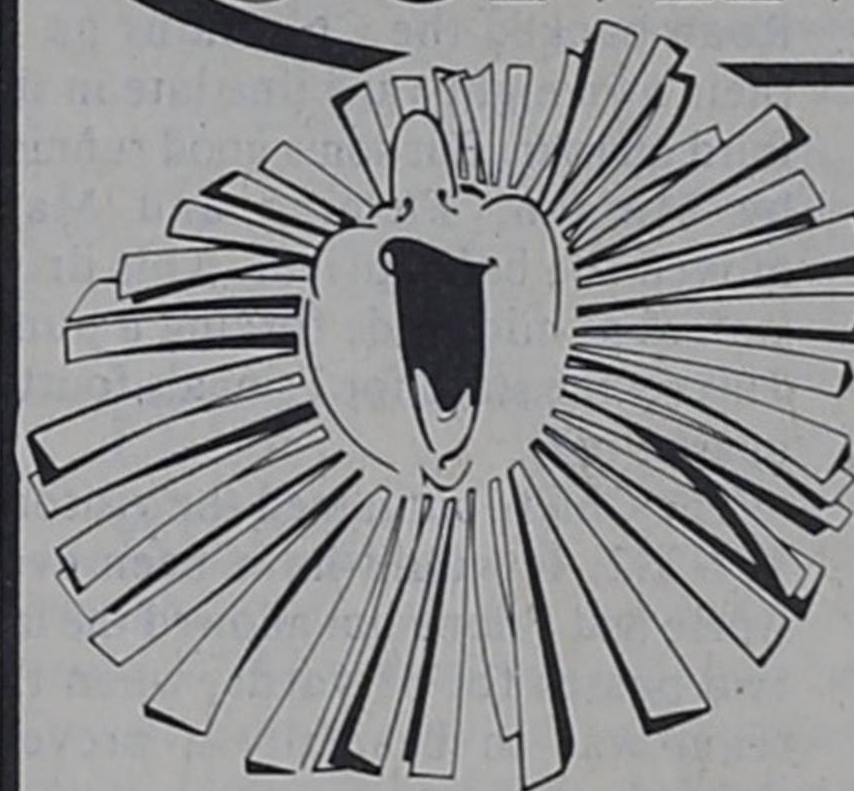

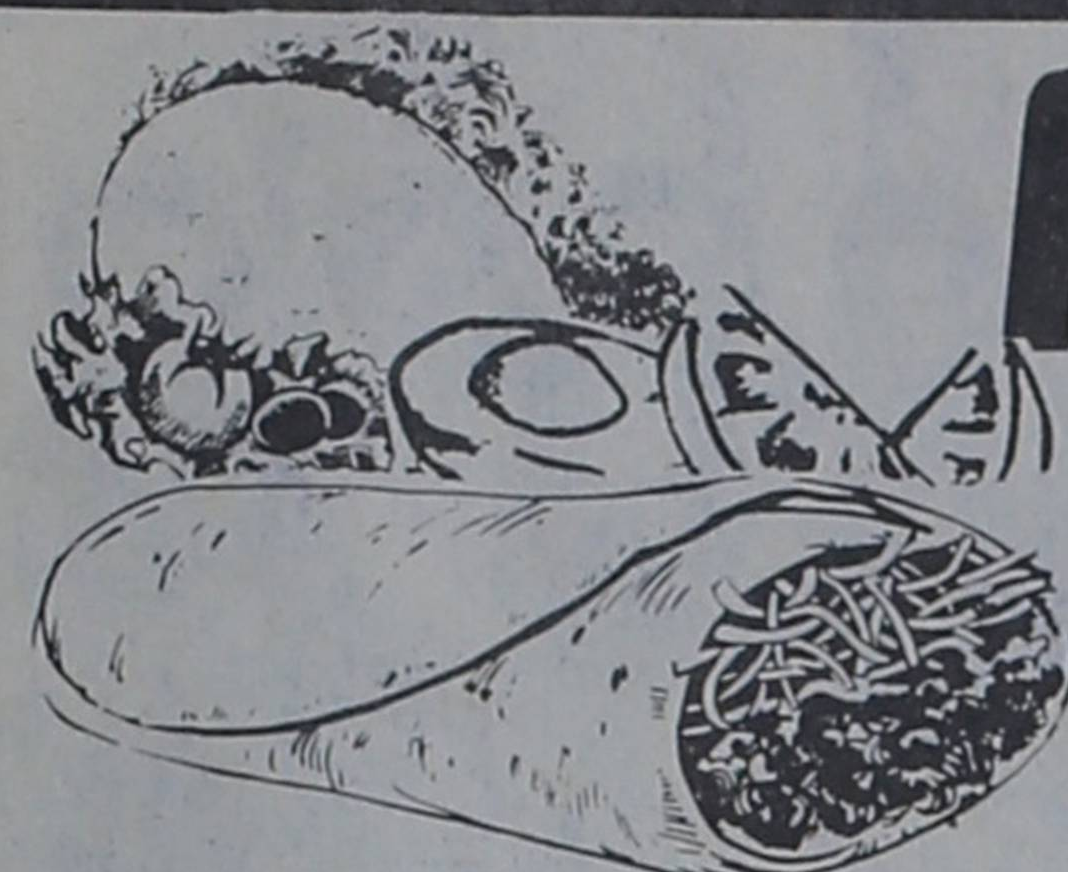

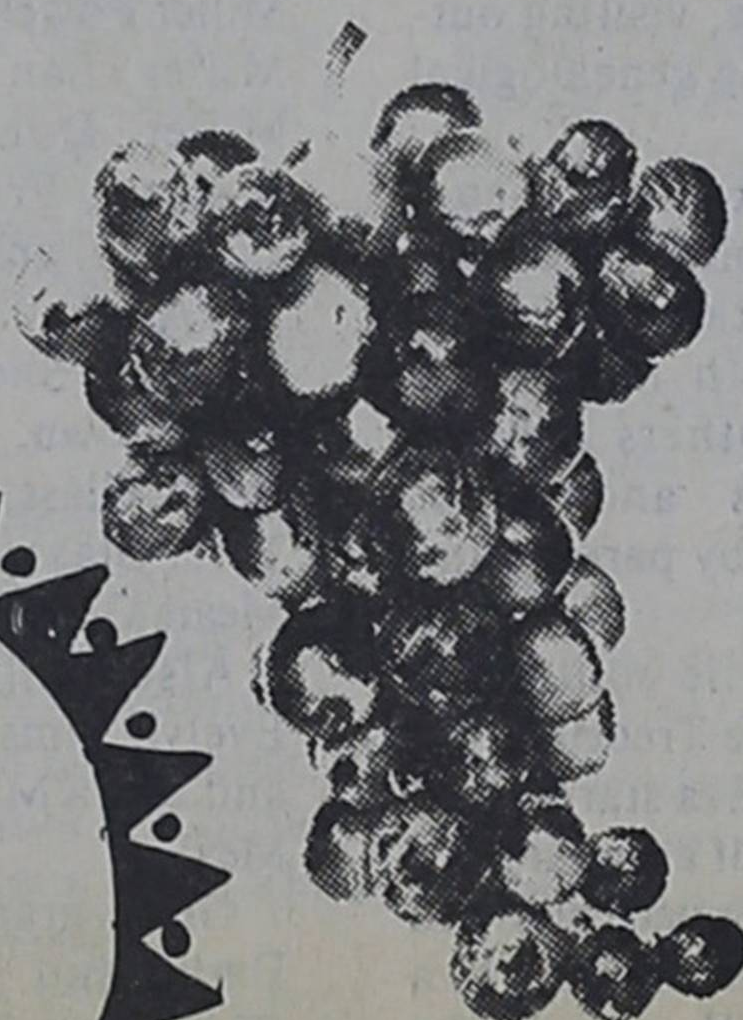

# Roy, Eva Miller Feted As "Star" Grandparents

Grandparents Day has a twenty-five fold meaning for two of Friona's proudest grandparents, Roy and Eva Miller, who live on a farm northwest of town. That is, if you let them count six great-grandchildren, who are very dear to them.

Even though they haven't always lived near some of the grandchildren, they've managed to store up a lot of memories of first teeth, first steps, first words, music and voice lessons, recital dresses, grade school, high school and college graduations, first jobs, weddings and tight budgets.

Most Miller family projects are done on a wholesale basis and have been for many years. When their seven children were younger, the whole family worked together to provide food, shelter, companionship

and support. Then, when the children began to marry and grandchildren began to appear on the scene, the circle widened to include them and their needs and interests.

Roy, the oldest of the children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. J.F. Miller, was born at Duke, Oklahoma and grew up at Bradley, Oklahoma. After his graduation from Bradley High School, he attended Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Oklahoma. At OSU he majored in dairy husbandry and was in ROTC.

He and Eva were married at Ninekah, Oklahoma, March 8, 1930. She was the oldest of a family of four. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. L.W. Roysden. Her dad was a mail carrier and a Baptist preacher.

She has one sister, Eileen Miller, and one brother, Joe Roysden, who

now live at Lawton, Oklahoma.

Roy served in the United States Infantry until it was phased out and then in the Transportation Corps during World War II.

In 1945 the couple and their seven children, Roy V., Mary Lou, Ross, Donna, Linda, Janice and Johnny, moved to a farm about ten miles northwest of town. They farmed and operated a dairy, selling their milk wholesale, for about seven years. Then, in early 1953, they moved to their present home. A few years later Johnny drowned.

The other six children all graduated from Friona High School. Ross and his wife, the former Nelda May; and Donna and her husband, Sam Mears, are the only ones who raised their families here. Ross died in 1980. Linda and her husband, Clyde Tims, lived here a few years after their marriage and presently live at Sunray, Texas.

Roy V. and Glenda live in San Marcos and Janice lives at Los Alamos, New Mexico.

Mary Lou and Dale Glass have raised their family at McLean, Texas.

Since Eva's retirement after teaching voice and piano thirty-five years, she and Roy have spent a great deal of time travelling, visiting out-of-town kin and doing genealogical research.

Making scrapbooks has taken a great deal of the couple's time, too. Some of them contain pictures, others are filled with newspaper clippings and still others contain picture post cards and other mementoes collected by parents and grandparents.

One very special file contains a complete history of the Trebelaires, a singing group which Eva started and directed for a quarter of a century.

Both the Millers have been active in civic affairs of the community. Eva was Friona's first "Woman of the

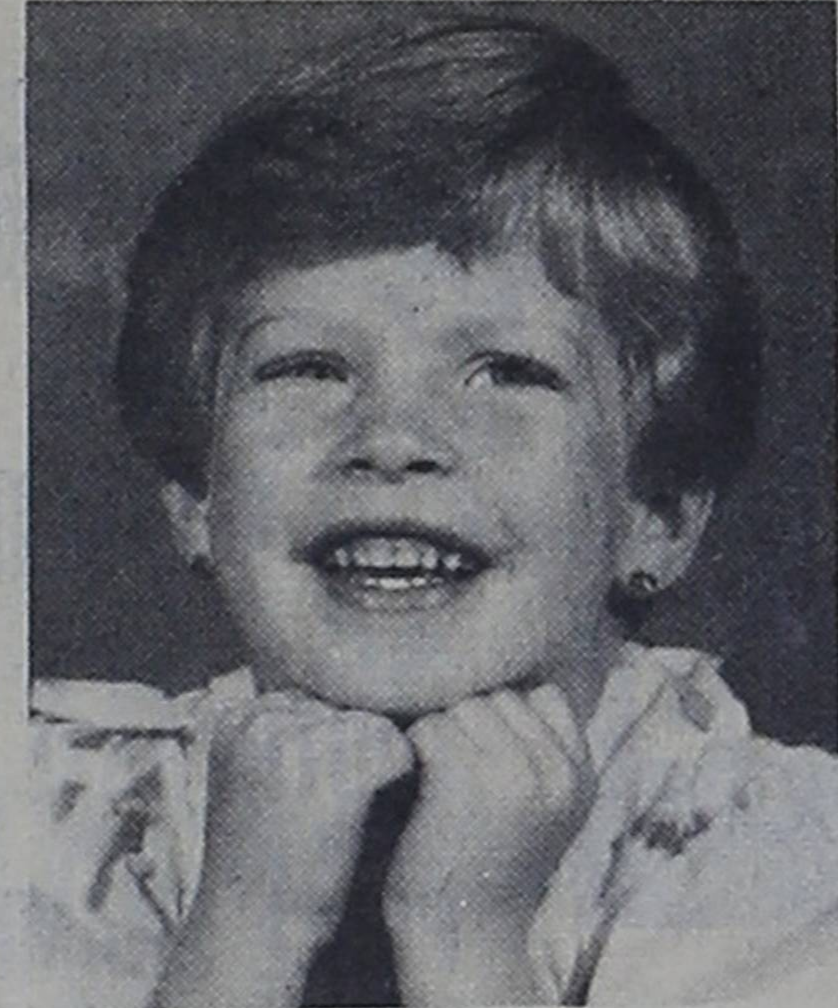

The Friona Rodeo Club is starting its year off with a number of members.

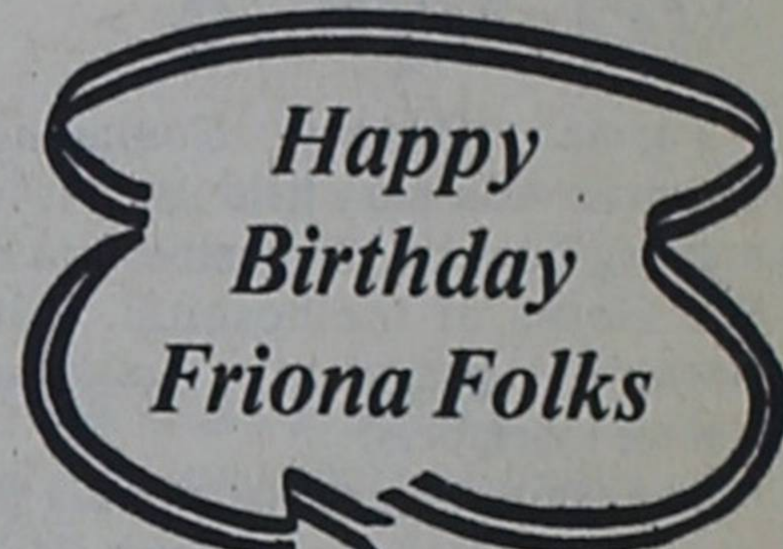

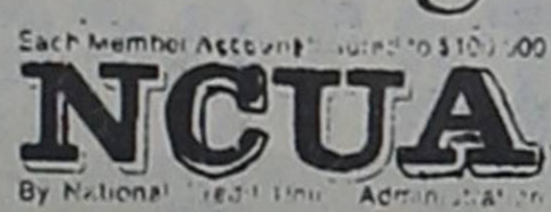



# Jennifer Aufill Takes Tech Red Raider Position

Jennifer A. Aufill of Lubbock has been named the 1983-84 Red Raider for Texas Tech University.

Aufill succeeds Perry Joe Church of Friona as the masked rider astride Happy VI-II. The announcement was made by Student Affairs Vice President Robert H. Ewalt at the annual "Transfer of the Reins" ceremony Wednesday in Jones Stadium.

The 1983-84 Red Raider is a sophomore marketing major who has been riding horses since the age of three.

Aufill received a \$1,000 scholarship presented by Texas Tech Student Foundation Director Julie Haisler. Saddle Tramp President David Phillips presented Church with the Joe Kirk Fulton Award, named for the first masked rider. Church also received a letter jacket from men's assistant athletic director Ron

Damron in recognition of his contributions to the university's athletic endeavors. Judith Henry, assistant to the dean of students, was master of ceremonies when Church officially handed over the rider's cape and the reins to Happy VI-II.

The new Red Raider is the twenty-second person to ride for the university since the tradition was begun in 1954. She is the third woman to be named Red Raider.

Aufill was one of seventeen finalists who vied for the position. Selection was based upon horsemanship and interviews conducted by a committee of university administrators, faculty and students.

In her application, Aufill said, "I am a 'Techsan.' Not only am I a 'Techsan,' I ride horses. What better way to serve my university than with

the one talent I truly have and enjoy!"

Aufill is the daughter of Jack Aufill of Lubbock and Catherine Woody of Hobbs, N.M. She got her equestrian experience early in life and as she grew older she helped her father who owns and operates several horse auctions across the state. She has worked at the auctions both showing and selling horses.

In 1981 she logged more than 11,000 miles as the Region 1 Princess of the American Association of Sheriff Poses and Riding Clubs. She rode in rodeos and parades and spoke at numerous banquets during her reign.

She has competed in amateur rodeos, barrel racing and roping and has shown horses in English equitation, hunter-jumper, cutting and western pleasure. She owns four horses.
