

## **C-C Banquet Tickets Now** Available

**AREA RESIDENTS ARE trying to** remember when we last received a snow which fell as nicely, and with virtually no drifting, as the one received Christmas week, and was still much in evidence well into the second week after it fell. There have been other times when the area received as much snow, but most times the snow has drifted, and most of the snow was blown into barrow ditches, or onto turnrows. Although the extreme cold temperatures which have followed up the snowfall have brought folks a glimpse of what it might be like to live in Minnesota during the winter-time, there are a lot of plusses for the snowfall. The timing on the snow was good from at least a couple of angles. First, it will do much for the winter wheat crop, virtually assuring a better than average crop, and will be a boost for farmland in general. Secondly, coming when school was dismissed for the holidays, it saved the schools several "makeup days," as things were virtually shut down for a few days after the big snow. The snowfall came at the start of our annual week off that we take, and this turned out to be an excellent week not to have to go to the office and put out a paper, and just stay home by the fire. However, the clearing trend at the first of this week looked good. Now we can get the moisture melted into the ground, send the kids back to school, and try to get back to business as usual.

Friona Chief of Police Bill Denney said his department was called at 2:20 a.m. Christmas morning and advised that a man in Apartment 6 of the Saratoga Apartments had been shot. There reportedly had been gunshots from a neighboring apartment (number four), and when Camarillo stepped outside his front

Area Gets 10'' **Moist Snowfall** 

The Friona area received a nice snow the day after Christmas with measurements of around ten inches being the average.

Apparently the snowfall was very general in nature. Jim Dixon of the Rhea Community said he received ten inches. The fall to the south and east was somewhat heavier, due mainly to

Friona ambulance was summoned, and took Camarillo to the local hospital, where he was pronounced dead.

Denney said there had apparently been some shots fired from Apartment 4, Sotelo's apartment, prior to Camarillo being shot. Sotelo was arrested for investigation of the shooting, and later was arraigned and charged with involuntary manslaughter.

An autopsy was ordered by Justice of the Peace Frances Euler, to determine the exact cause of death.

Camarillo was said to have been a Mexican National, living here on a special work visa. He was employed at Excel Corporation.

Aside from the general run of fender-benders and drivers getting into the ditches, no bad wrecks were reported in the area during the storm's aftermath, and authorities felt this was a lucky break, due to the after Christmas traffic, which continued in spite of the road conditions.


# Gas Line Break Was Close Call

Friona's Energas Company employees were involved in a situation at Bovina Friday, December 31, which was a serious problem after a break occured in one of the main gas lines into that city.

In fact, had that problem been discovered a few minutes later than it was, and appropriate action not been taken, Friona's gas pressure might have been similarly affected.

The break occurred between the Oklahoma Lane Highway and the Cemetery, just south of town. This

the second snowfall of New Year's Eve and New Year's, which barely grazed the local area, but dumped up to 13 inches in the area around Lubbock.

"I think most people got a good snow, and it was real wet. It will be a big help to the wheat crop," Dixon said.

The snow began in the early morning on December 26, and continued throughout the day and into the night. It was accompanied by very little wind, and for the most part, stayed right where it fell.

Trees and shrubbery made some beautiful winter pictures the day following the snowfall. Fences also made a pretty sight, as the tops were lined by the snowflakes.

The day or two following the snow proved to be a nightmare for travellers, many of whom found themselves in snowbanks off the highways in the area.

Snowplows operated by the Texas Department Highway ran continuously during the week, and by week's end most of the main roads were clear. Hampering the clearing efforts to a large extent were low temperatures which prevented melting and some wind which put some snow back onto the roadway after it had been cleared.



The official snow measurement in Friona was 101/2 inches, with near an inch in moisture content.

was about one-half mile from the main source of gas coming into Bovina, according to Dan Koelzer, Bovina's Energas manager.

As a result of the break, gas pressure to customers in Bovina dropped drastically for a time.

When the pressure was restored, Energas employees had to go door to door and make sure that heaters were still operating, and had not gone out during the pressure drop.

"We found about 30 to 40 places where the stoves had gone off," said Ralph Shirley, Energas manager at Friona. It was explained that pressure in the main line dropped from a normal of 350 pounds to around 198 pounds, and that at the residential source, this pressure dropped from a normal of ten pounds to about two.

Energas employees and officials from Friona, Dimmitt and Hereford converged on Bovina at an early hour Friday morning to help with the emergency.



When the city's gas supply had been restored from an alternate source, Koelzer drove to Parmerton Hill and closed a valve to isolate the Bovina section, and assure that the city of Friona's customers would not also have the same problem.

"Everyone worked together like clockwork to eliminate the problem. I really appreciate the cooperation of the City of Bovina, Tommy Bonds, Andy Garza and Pat Kunselman, for working with us," Koelzer said."

"Also, the people of Bovina understood the problem, and jumped in to help the best they could. We feel very fortunate that there were no disasters. We had some luck involved. I thought the response by the Energas people showed the attitude by the company toward their customers," he added.

In addition to the employees working who were scheduled to have the day off, a couple of men from Hereford came who had been on vacation.

## **Interest Drops**

Interest rates on Land Bank variable rate loans will be reduced to 11.25 per cent on farm loans and to 11.75 per cent on farm-related business and rural residence loans, said Bill Liles, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe.

These rates became effective January 1, 1983.

"The Land Bank's objective it to provide credit to Texas agriculture at the lowest possible cost, consistent with sound business practices," said Thomas H. Benson, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas in Austin.

"For over two years the Bank's average cost of funds consistently has been higher than the loan rate," Benson continued. "However, for the past four months, we have begun to see a decline in bond costs.

"As a result of this decline, we are able to reduce the Bank's loan interest rate," he said. "We hope that the decline in bond interest rates will continue, allowing us to make further reductions in the loan rate."







Wilson died Christmas morning in Deaf Smith General Hospital, after an illness of some months.


He was born November 27, 1906 in Dallas County, and married Fay Singleterry November 28, 1931 in Friona.


Camarillo died early Christmas



Years ago it wasn't unusual to hear someone describe a young woman's cooking ability by saying, "She can't even boil an egg." Even though boiling an egg really doesn't take a lot of skill, nutritionists have discovered a better way of cooking an egg.

It is better, according to the nutritionists to "hard cook" an egg instead of boiling it.

To hard-cook, put eggs in single layer in a saucepan. Add enough tap water to come at least one inch above the eggs. Cover and quickly bring just to boiling. Turn off heat.

If necessary, remove pan from burner to prevent further boiling. Let eggs stand covered in hot water 15-20 minutes, depending upon the size of the eggs.

Immediately run cold water over eggs or put them in ice water until completely cooled. To remove shell, crackle it by tapping gently all over.

They're crisp, cool and refreshing, whether they're served as an extention onto a regular meal, taken to a picnic or prepared for a patio party.

The point total was Friona's best of the season. The teams are entered in the Lazbuddie tournament this




