SPEAKING OF WORDS, it is a proven fact that you should say what you mean, and mean what you say. However, in the case of the following excerpts from published news items, it's hard to tell if the writers were paying attention to what they were saying:

*Firemen today received 28 letters thanking them for their efforts which destroyed three houses last Wednesday night.

*A man was shot as he tried to foil an armed raider. Police have not named the man who was shot at his request.

*The scales vanished from a locked office and police are weighing up the possibilities that they have been stolen.

*The doctor said that after the accident the defendant told him he had been to a very good dinner and had a good deal to drink. He was certain that his car had touched nothing.

MOST YEARS, if your team was in the same district with the team which went to the state finals a year earlier and had a good percentage of its material coming back, you wouldn't be overly optimistic about the upcoming season.

Such, however, is not the case with Tommy Moss and his staff in regard to the 1983 Friona Chieftains.

True, the team is in the district once again with Littlefield, and true, the Wildcats should be loaded. But the fact of the matter is: The Chieftains aren't going to be a "slouch" of a team, themselves.

With about half of his starters returning, plus another seven or eight players who saw a lot of playing time last season, Coach Moss is viewing the upcoming season with optimism. And, unlike most coaches, he doesn't mind showing his optimism.

The nice thing about the new playoff system is the fact that there are two playoff spots available in every district. That way, when there are at least two outstanding teams (and in our district's case, maybe three—or more), you're not out of the running when you lose a game.

And, having had a taste of the playoffs for the first time, the returning members of the Chieftains are chomping at the bit to get back to a game situation and prove what they can do.

On the two-team playoff rule, we don't mean to imply that the Chieftains have conceded first place to Littlefield, just because of their record and reputation—not in the least. In fact, they remember last season, when although hobbled by injuries the Chieftains were still able to hold a lead over the Wildcats for a time.

And this time around, the Chieftains will get to play the Wildcats here at Chieftain Field. It seems like we've been playing Littlefield on their turf for the past ten years, but that's changed for 1983.

So, maybe you could look at things this way, kids: The bad news is that the summer is almost over. The good news is that it will soon be football time.

Grid Workouts Start For Chieftains Monday

Some 70 candidates for the 1983 Friona High School Chieftain football team will begin two-a-day workouts on Monday, August 11, according to head coach Tommy Moss.

The varsity level (sophomore-junior-senior) group will be joined by some 38 freshmen gridders, which will push the number expected to take part in the workouts to 108. Players need to report to the field house at 9 a.m. Monday. Daily workouts will be from 8-10 a.m. and 4-6 p.m.

"Since we only have about 150 boys in high school, this is a pretty good percentage. It's the biggest group of freshmen we've had in awhile, to come out before school starts," Moss said.

Optimism is running high in the Chieftain pre-season camp, after the team gained the playoffs last year for the first time in a generation.

Back from the team which captured the District 2-AAA runner-up position to state finalist Littlefield are 16 lettermen and ten starters.

The Chieftains have returning virtually their entire backfield, including three running backs who gained over 1,600 yards rushing last season. They are Charlie Morgan, the rushing leader on the team last year with 1185 yards; Alfredo Mata, and fullback Reese Fleming.

Fleming gained 257 yards as a junior in 1982, and Mata, seeing only limited action due to injuries to upperclassmen, added 163 yards. He caused Friona fans and coaches to take notice by ripping off 93 yards against the state finalist Littlefield team in just 12 tries.

Other returning offensive starters returning are split ends Johnny McLellan and Eloy Caballero and tight end Kevin Brogren and offensive tackle Tim Kirk.

Defensive starters returning include Charlie Veazey, who played almost every secondary position; linebacker

Reese Fleming and defensive tackle Tim Kirk.

Other returning lettermen include Shayne Woodard, Doug Carthel, Rudy Bermea, Jessie Gonzales, Mitch Reeve, Troy Crutchfield, Bob Behrendsen and Robert Escalante.

"A number of the returning lettermen saw a good deal of action last year, due to injuries, and they will almost be like having returning starters," Moss pointed out.

Veazey saw some action at quarterback, and is the leading candidate heading into pre-season. However, Veazey has Doug Carthel and Rickey Barnett pushing him for the spot.

"It's the first time in about three years we can face the opening of the season knowing we should have a quarterback with some experience," Moss said.

Back to the offensive statistics,

returning starter Caballero was the team's leading pass receiver last season, averaging 31.5 yards per catch on four receptions. Two of Caballero's catches went for touchdowns.

The Chieftain mentor said that the attitude of the team members is "tremendous." This is a close-knit group, and they have been all the way through school, Moss pointed out.

The team will host Bovina in a scrimmage game on August 19, and will visit Springlake-Earth for a second scrimmage August 26.

The schedule to be faced by the 1983 Chieftains is once again extremely tough. Last year's district runners-up compiled a 6-5 won-lost record, considered good in light of the teams Friona played. This year's schedule is exactly the same; only the

Five Firemen Attend Firefighting School

Five members of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department attended the Texas Firemen's and Fire Marshall's school at Texas A&M last week. The school was attended by some 2,500 municipal firefighters, instructors and sales representatives, present to sharpen their firefighting skills.

Attending from the Friona Fire Department were Chief Ralph Shirley, Roger Fields, Joe Mann, Steve Jones and Bobby Jordan. Shirley, who has served as an instructor at the school for a number of years, instructed a ladder class at the 1983 school.

Fields took a course in "Fire Prevention II," Mann took "pump maintenance," Jones was enrolled in

"Fire Fighting III" and Jordan's class was "Fire Fighting II."

Those attending called the annual event a "very productive school." By having this number attend the school, Friona residents will be due a three per cent reduction in their "key rate" fire insurance.

The school is designed to encourage training and better fire protection techniques for Texas firefighters.

The firemen had both classroom and field training last week. They attended six hours of instruction a day plus a night class on Monday. They then took a final examination Friday. The examination covered theory from classroom and practical application from field training.

Basic field training includes how to properly hold a fire hose, prevent smoke inhalation and forcibly enter a structure without causing damages. The more advanced classes dealt with electrical and structural fires and the chemicals used to prevent them.

The program is one of the best in the nation with visitors coming from all over the United States and abroad to observe the teaching methods and the efficiency with which the program is run. Volunteer instructors came from all over the nation to teach the newest firefighting techniques. Some of the men stayed in college dorms and about 1,000 stayed in motels.

The Fire Protection Training Division of Texas A&M conducts the firefighting school. It is one of 16 separate training divisions of the Texas Engineering Extension Service.

The fire protection division sponsors three firefighting programs: municipal firefighting, industrial firefighting, and a special program for Spanish speaking firefighters.

School To Begin Here August 22

The 1983-84 school term begins in Friona on Monday, August 22, and some special pre-registration information has been released by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

Students who did not attend school here last year are asked to report to their respective principal's office: high school students, Hal Ratcliff, between August 11 and August 17.

Grades six through eight, to Cecil Maddox at the junior high, between August 15 and 19; and kindergarten through fifth grade, to Freeman Melton at the grade school, August 15-19.

This pre-registration process for new students is to enable them to be on an equal basis with the district's returning students.

Teachers in the school system will have in-service days August 18 and 19, prior to the first day of school.

All high school students are to report on Friday, August 19, for registration. Grades eleven and 12 will register beginning at 9 a.m., and grades nine and ten are to report at 10:30 a.m.

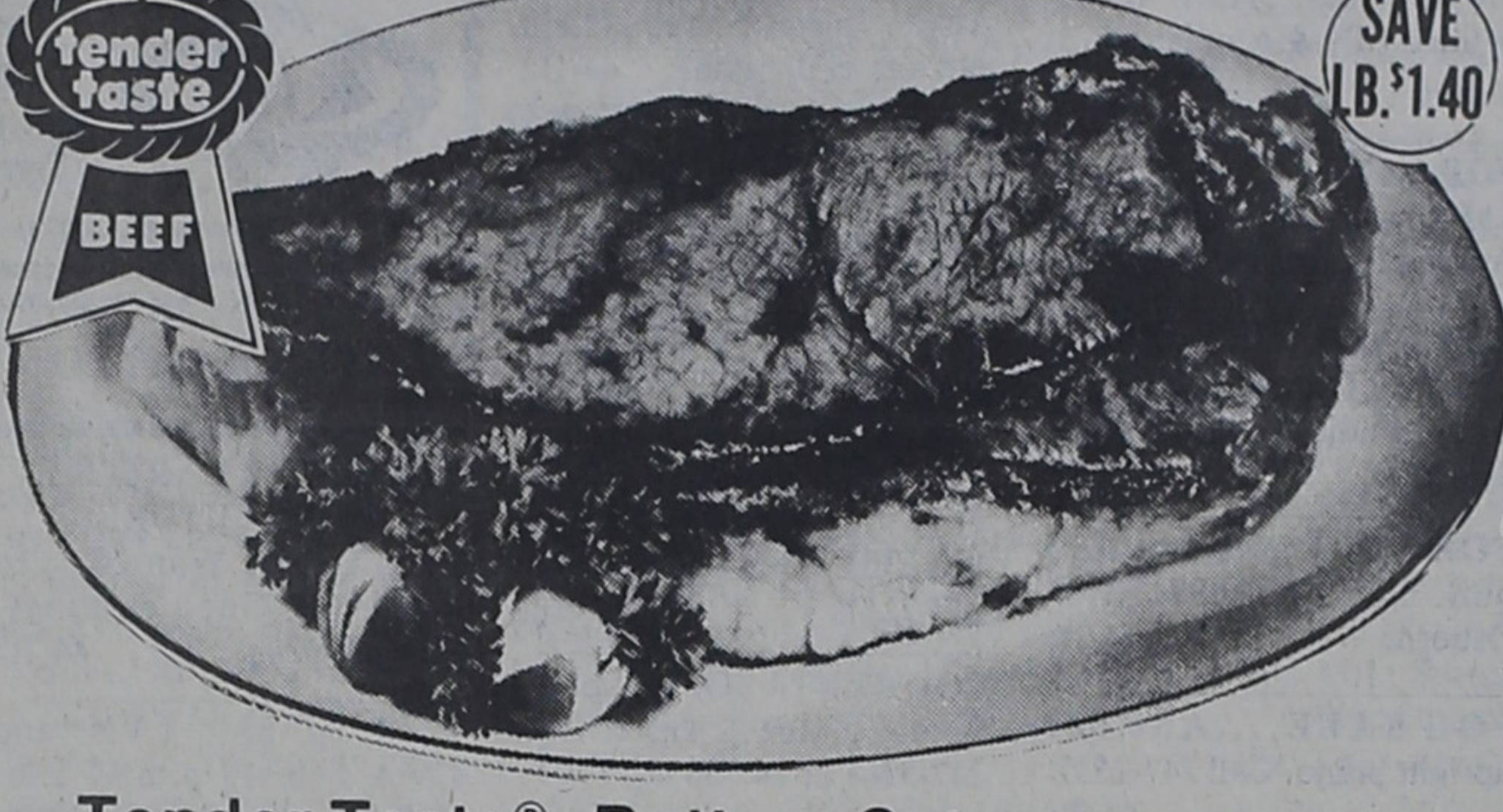
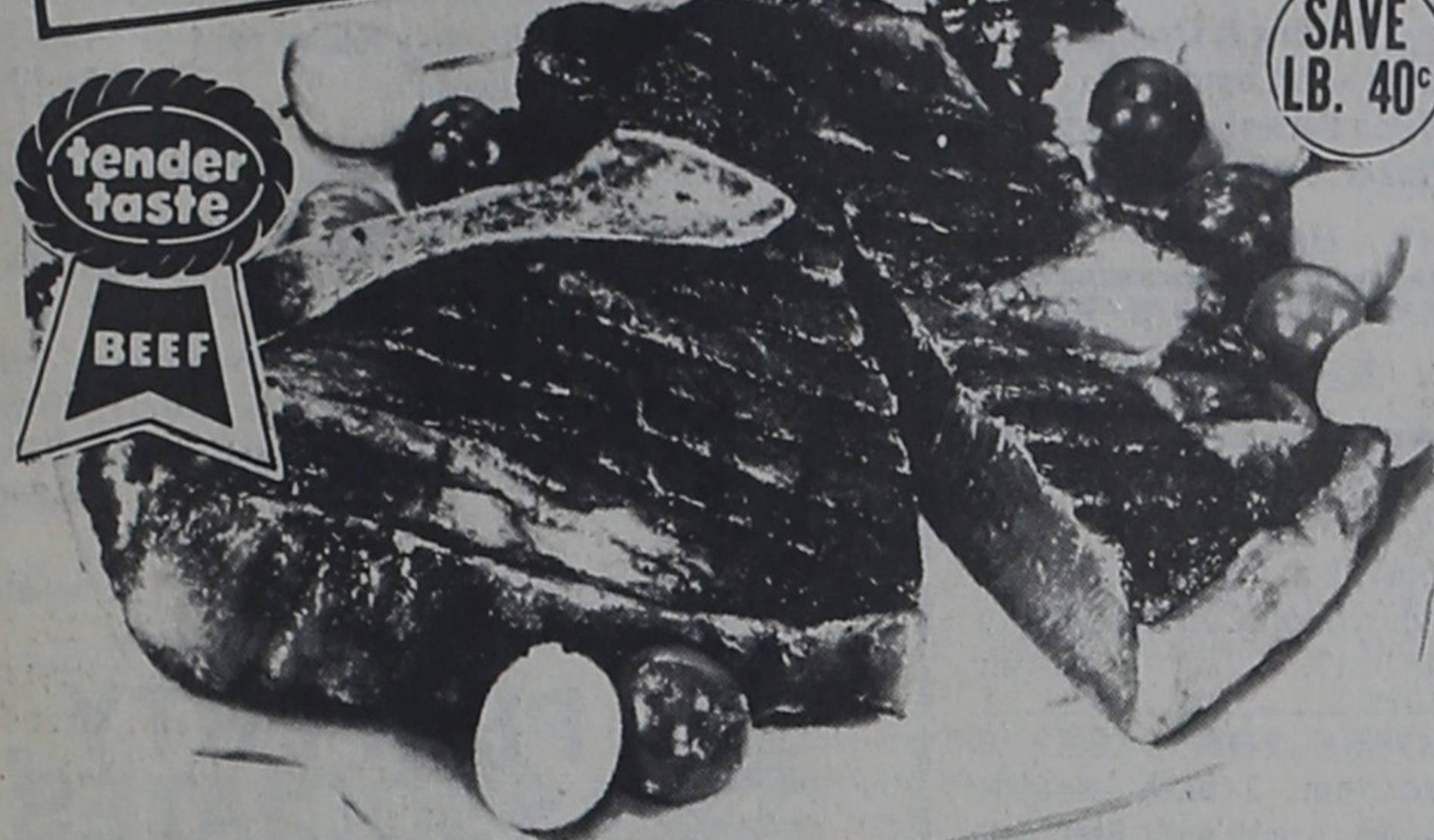
School hours will once again be the same as in the past, 8:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

LIBRARY CORNER

By DARLA BRACKEN

"I go into my library, and all history rolls before me. I breathe the morning air of the world while the scent of Eden's roses yet lingered in it...I see the pyramids building; I hear the shouts of the armies of Alexander...I sit as in a theater--the stage is time, the play is the play of the world." Alexander Smith

"Dreamthorp: Books & Gardens" "Library" comes from the Latin word liber which means book. Down through some 6,000 years of existence the purpose of libraries, i.e. 'collections of books,' has been to communicate and educate the masses through both pictorial and written forms of communication. These have been on a wide variety of materials including: bone, clay, metal, wax, wood, papyrus, silk, leather, parchment, paper, film, plastic and magnetic tape.

The oldest library in the United States is Harvard University Library founded in 1638 just 31 years after the establishment of Jamestown, the first permanent settlement in the United States. A Massachusetts clergyman, John Harvard, donated money and 400 books for the library which was promptly named in his honor so valuable was the gift considered.

The first successful method to make books available to the general public was called 'subscription libraries.' Members paid their dues and the money raised was used to buy books which the members were then allowed to borrow free of charge. Benjamin Franklin founded the first subscription library in America in Philadelphia in 1731. Comparative dates include: the establishment of Library of Congress in 1802; first public libraries, as we know them, in the early 1830's; and the Smithsonian Institution in 1846. Libraries have certainly come a long way--not only in methods of operation and quantities of materials, but also in the types of services offered. Enjoy making use of your library!

Almost 5,000 (4,823) items have been circulated during the months of June and July to 1,808 patrons with 83 new readers registered. 224 children have attended the weekly film programs for the summer

reading club in seven sessions.

New at the library: we have purchased subscriptions to Friona Star and Amarillo Daily News (Sunday and weekly) beginning August 1. All newspapers will be 'in library use only'; we will keep back issues of the Star but the Amarillo papers will be discarded after one week.

Also a reminder of the ongoing art show with several of our local young people exhibiting. They are: Kenda Atwell, J'mai Cash, Katherine Cortese, Daylen Gallman, Edward Garcia, Ricky Marquez, Alisa Perkins, Yolanda Renteria, Kenneth Smith and Shannel Woodard. We do invite young people to share their art work with us if they wish to do so.

Also available at the library on a rotation packet basis are: *Large print books*-30 books, fiction and non-fiction and *Spanish language book packet*-20 books-adult, junior and children-rotated every four months; *16mm film packet*-3 films-rotated once a month-usually primary, junior and adult; *cassette tapes*-60 tapes-different types of music, junior books, children's books-rotated every 6 months; and *filmstrips*-8-children's-rotated every 4 months.

1. *Color Me Beautiful* by Carol Jackson is an exciting, new book on how to choose colors in make-up and dress which best compliment your personal coloring type. The authors identify these four basic types as



summer, winter, autumn and spring.

2. *Where The Sidewalk Ends* by Shel Silverstein is a collection of zany, contemporary poetry for juniors and definitely a book that will make you laugh.

3. *Masquerade* by Kit Williams for those of you who love an intriguing puzzle is a highly unusual, yet fascinating book with all types of both visual and written clues. The author says that it can be solved as easily by both a ten year old and a college professor.

4. *College Survival Kit* by Irv Brechner is just that a timely, helpful little book jammed with ideas on how to survive all aspects of college life.

5. *Keeping The Faith* by Jimmy Carter tells of both the exhilaration and solitude he experienced while serving as President of the United States.

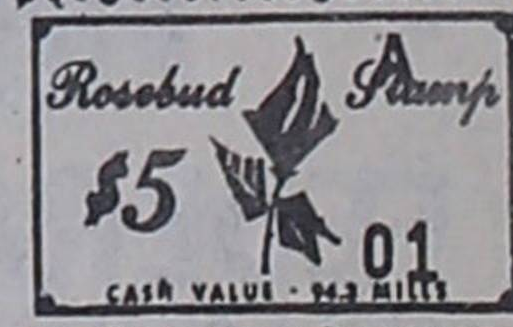

The 1983-84 budget was discussed and approved.

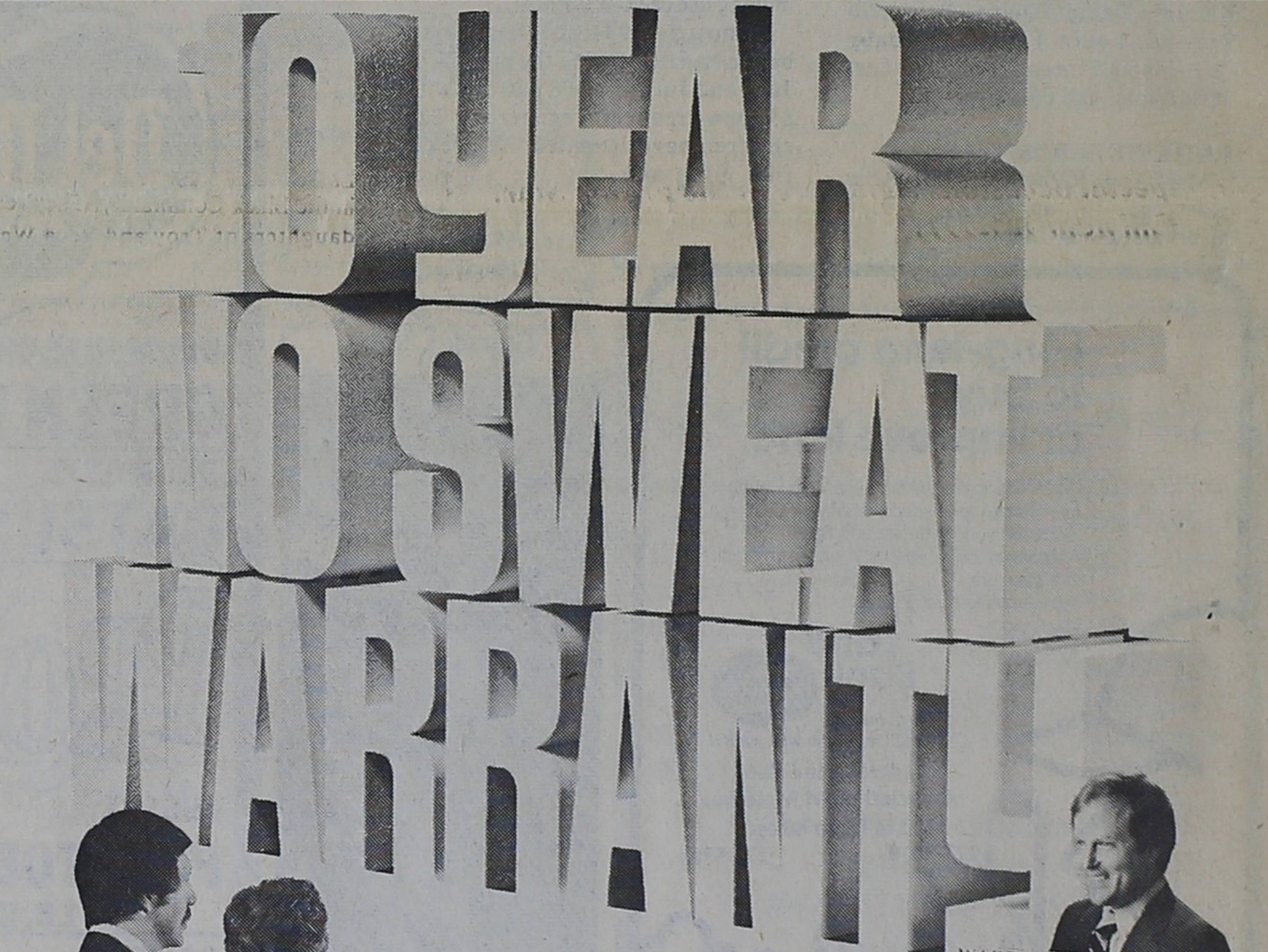
The Country Store and Maize Queen candidate were among the topics discussed.

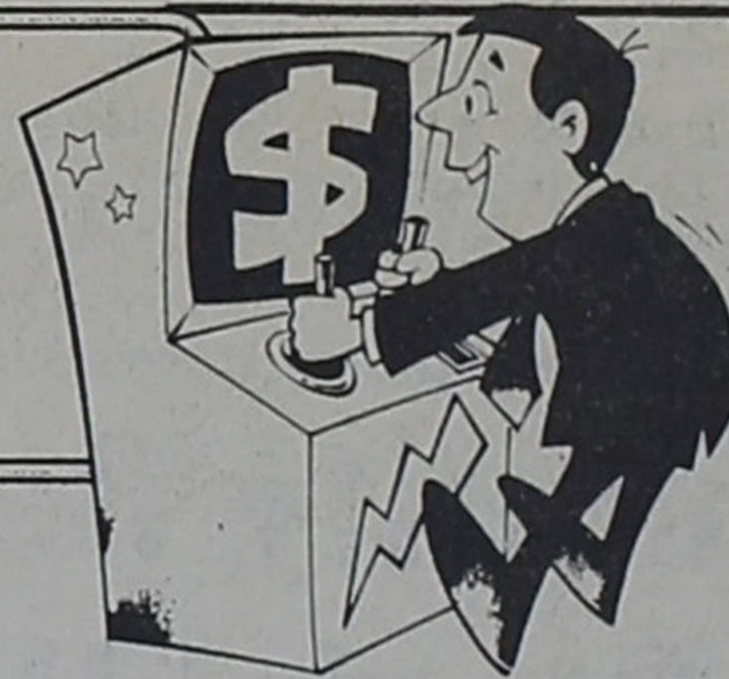
