



Cash, a veterinarian, had to win a run-off with Amarillo's Paul Stradley to earn his first Amarillo points title last season. Cash and Stradley finished with 570 points each and decided a tie was no way to end the season. They requested, and received, special permission to break the tie. Cash covered the quarter-mile track in 13.57 seconds (102.48 mph) for the title.

Herring, who will turn 19 on April 12, achieved his success in his first year of racing.

Herring's season highlight came



Each session will be beginning basic language programming assuming a person has never sat in front of a microcomputer before.



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

VETERANS OUTREACH

Lorenzo M. Sedeno Is Appointed Representative

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has appointed Lorenzo M. Sedeno as Area Representative for the Veterans Outreach program in the Panhandle region of Texas. Veterans Outreach is an extension of the Veterans Land Program of the General Land Office.

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ge r. Sedeno and four other field representatives will be going out to every county in Texas to establish contact with veterans groups and their representatives. The object of the statewide drive is to acquaint Texas veterans with the benefits of the land loan program and assist them with problems and questions concerning the loan process.

"For all the success this program has had in the past, it has to be upgraded and updated to meet the I'm concerned about each and every veteran in this state, especially Vietnam veterans, and I'm concerned about prompt service. This program is going to run like a business and it will be manned by trained professionals both in the central office and out in the field," said Mauro.

Authorized by the people of Texas in 1946, nearly 80,000 veterans have participated in the Veterans Land Program. The loan program operates at no cost to the taxpayer and actually returns money from proceeds. Long term, low interest loans of up to \$20,000 can be obtained for a minimum of 10 acres.

Lorenzo M. Sedeno is a native Texan from San Angelo who now lives in Lubbock. For three years he was administrative aide to Congressman Kent Hance. In that position he was in charge of Veterans affairs and social programs among his many other responsibilities. Prior to that he was self-employed as a life underwriter for 14 years.

He has been a member of the Lubbock Human Relations Commission, the Legal Aid Society, the Community Service Commission, the Bilingual and Biculture Committee on Mass Communications and several other organizations. Sedeno has held many community service offices, including President of the Pastorial Council of the Diocese of Amarillo, President of Bozeman Elementary School P.T.A. and Vice President of Project Upward Bound.

"I am happy to have a person of Lorenzo's experience representing the Veterans Land Program. His familiarity with veterans needs as well as his background in government and community affairs will make him a great asset to the program,"



Land Bank Loan Rate

Decreases

The Federal Land Bank of Texas announces a decrease in Bank closed loan fees to two per cent on farm loans and four per cent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, effective immediately.

"The loan fee reduction was made possible by the recent decrease in our cost of funds," said Thomas H. Benson, Land Bank president.

This reduction follows the January 1, 1983 variable interest rate reduction to 11.25 per cent (from 11.50 per cent) on farm loans, and to 11.75 per cent (from 12.00 per cent) on rural residence and farm-related business loans. Bank closed loan fees had been four per cent on farm loans and seven per cent on rural residence and farm-related loans.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas makes long-term real estate loans throughout the state through its 55 Federal Land Bank Associations. The Bank has \$2.4 billion in loans outstanding.



Reserve Force Donates Time And Energy

The Friona Reserve Police Officers are a group of men who donate their time to help with local law enforcement.

City ordinance No. 576 establishes the Reserve Officers, and gives them power. Each member of the force is properly schooled and trained, having graduated with 78 hours of classroom training from the Panhandle Regional Law Enforcement Academy.

The academy provides training in (1) Texas Criminal Law; (2) Texas Motor Vehicle Law; (3) ways and means; (4) first aid; (5) firearms training and qualifying; (6) Doppler radar training and certifying.

The city pays for the school enrollment, but the reserve officers pay their own transportation and time invested. Having completed the course, each reserve officer is issued a permanent license as a Law Enforcement Officer by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education. He carries a badge identifying himself and his department, also paid by the officer. The reserve officer is regimented within and is under strict control of the regular police department. He stays current by donating his time on regular duty two times each month; by attending reserve meetings once monthly and by requalifying in firearms every six months. In the calendar year 1982, the officers donated reserve approximately 1200 professional man hours. Current members of the reserve officer force are John Taylor (captain); John Miller (lieutenant); Jimmy Taylor (sergeant); John Blackwell, Donnie Campbell, Roger Fields, Ira Parr, Beaman McDonald and Steve Jones (who has just been hired by the city as a regular police officer). "Please support your regular and reserve police officers. They put their life on the line for you," stated a spokesman for the groups.



Even though this year's soil moisture deficits are similar to last years, conditions are better now because 65 to 70 per cent of the moisture is in the top three feet of the profile where the plants need it. Most of the deficit is in the fourth and fifth

growing season should be good. However, once the plant uses the upper level moisture, there is currently no reserve deep soil moisture to carry it through an

published as a tool to give producers a better picture of soil moisture

reserves over the entire area. It can help them make more informed irrigation decisions and help avoid both over and under irrigating in the spring. It can also give an indication of potential production.

The map's soil moisture deficit readings are a measure of how much water is still needed to wet the soil in the crop root zone to field capacity. The sample indicates general trends over the area, but does not predict exact soil moisture conditions on any given farm. Each landowner needs to check his individual farm soil moisture to determine its water needs.

The survey is a cooperative effort by the Soil Conservation Service and the High Plains Water District with support from the Texas Department of Water Resources.

In evaluating your present soil moisture conditions and estimating how much water your crops will need during the growing season, the probability of rain becomes very

The following is a monthly precipitation probability index for the City of Muleshoe. These derived figures are provided by the Texas Department of Water Resources and are based on 51 years of National Weather Service precipitation data from 1930 to 1980.

The specific data in the table indicates the per cent of time when the corresponding precipitation quantity or larger quantities can be expected to occur during the month indicated. However, these figures were derived without the benefit of information about precipitation during the month prior to that for which the estimate is made. These probabilities may be improved if prior month data were included in the calculations. For example, if Muleshoe recorded a three inch rainfall for July then it is likely that the probability of August recording two inches or more may be better than the indicated per cent due to the





Is there anything more welcome than the postman bringing a package to you? And is there anything more rewarding to occupy your time on a cold winter day than curling up with a good book?

The Friona Public Library and the Texas Panhandle Library System are cooperating to bring you books-bymail, a service free of charge to residents of the top twenty-five counties of Texas. The service, funded through a grant from the Texas State Library, is designed as a supplement to regular library service for people unable to use their libraries on a regular basis.

Throughout the Panhandle, many people who live in nursing homes or are homebound, ill, geographically isolated or otherwise unable to regularly visit their own libraries are taking advantage of books-by-mail.

Catalogs containing lists and descriptions of five hundred paperback books are available in all public libraries in the area. Types of books include mysteries, romances, westerns, adventure stories, how-to books, best sellers and books for children and teens. Books from the catalog are ordered on a special postage-paid card mailed to the Texas Panhandle Library System in Amarillo. Books are sent to users free of charge and return postage is included.





REC Meet Well-Attended

A large crowd which numbered approximately 1200, attended the 45th annual meeting of Deaf Smith REC Saturday, March 5, at the Bull Barn in Hereford.

Capital credit refunds of \$200,000 were returned to members who purchased electricity during 1970. This refund should turn-over and have more than a million dollars effect on buying power in the area economy.

Bill Marquis, attorney for the cooperative, directed the business meeting and reports were given by James Hull, manager; A.W. Anthony, Jr., president; and Jerry Roberts, secretary. An election of two directors was held.

Jerry Roberts, a farmer in the Simms Community and director for six years was reelected from Deaf Smith County for a three year term. A.W. Anthony, Jr., president of the board of directors was reelected to represent Parmer County for another three year term.

There were various drawings for door prizes throughout the meeting which started at 5 p.m. with a free fish and chicken dinner, served by Fins and Hens of Lubbock.

The Hereford Campfire Lodge provided ten girls to refill ice tea glasses and coffee cups before the business meeting.

Highlight of the drawings was an electric barbecue grill and a microwave oven, the latter was won by Donald Vasek of Hereford.

Entertainment was provided by the Tri-State Bluegrass Express, a group from Amarillo that has played together for ten years and appeared on T.V. and radio.

James Hull, manager for the cooperative, addressed the membership in an effort to explain management's philosophy. "Cutbacks have been forced in the following areas: The total number of employees have been reduced 29 percent; outside construction contractors are no longer being used and tree trimming is done by existing crews to save about \$15,000 each year.

"Also inventory has been reduced from two million to five hundred thousand dollars. Just as we feel these cutbacks were necessary, your Cooperative has continued expenditures in the areas of line maintenance and repairs; employee training and schooling and vehicle . maintenance.

"This is evident as we compare the average outage time of the Cooperative to the national average," Hull stated.

He concluded by stating the Cooperative's rates were competitive with areas of the United States that have historically enjoyed the cheapest electric power and that our current . board of directors was very much aware of existing economic problems and these men are working to ensure . a strong cooperative for those it serves.



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
