To make the statement that the Bidle is rude in style is nothing more than a hedge. It is known that the Bible contains some of the best literatureof the world. It is also among the oldest of literature. Looking into the contents of the Bible, we find some of the most beautiful literature from the beginning unil the present time. There's no language that can compare t he wrds spoken by Christ in his discourse on the moun tain -Mathew 5, 6, 7). Concerning ths discourse we find the people saying, "Neve did man so speak." The language of the Apostle Paul was veey good. In his sermon on Mars Hill there is an outline of approach that far surpasses any modern speech of the day. The writings of Luke are of the most educated man of his day (Col. 4:14). Even back in the old Covenant we find some very beautiful language by King David and Solomon. No better thoughts and ideas can be found than the ones expressed by these two writ-

The Bible does not claim to be a book of literature, but where it consists of literature it cannot be exceled. This, statement is proved by the fact that the best schools and universities of the twentieth century use the literature of the Bible as a pattern One is not dealing fairly by trying to do away with the Bible by attacking the literature. That is not the issue. If the Bible claimed to be a book of literature, one might be using fair means to attack it from that standpoint, but it does not claim such. The Bible is not a book of language but it reveals the Divine Will of God unto man in a language that cannot be equaled.

The statement is also made that the Bible is not only rude in language, but that it is rude in the kind of characters that it attracts or influences. This is very poor argument against the Bible. From the beginning until the present time the Bible has attracted and influenced the highest ranking of the day. It is a proven fact that the Apostle Paul was a highly educated man of his day (Acts 22:3; Gal. 1:13-15). Some others of high moral standing were the rich young ruler (Mk. 10); Luke the Physician (Col. 4:14). and King Agrippa (Acts 26). Look about you today. Who is the best of the community? Is it the drunkard or others of his class? Is it the man who denied the Bible to be the Word of God? No; it is the one who accepts the Bible and walks with God and his Son, The Lord Jesus Christ. The Bible does not claim to be a book of literature, but where it consists of literature it cannot be exceled. That is not the issue. If the Bible claimed to be a book of literature, one might be using fair means to attack it from that standpoint, but it does not claim such. Is it the drunkard or others of his class? Is it the man who denied the Bible to be the Word of God? No; it is the one who accepts the .Bible and walks with God and his Son, The Lord Jesus Christ.
