Drama Workshop Productions Set

WE WOULD SUPPOSE that given the choice, our extended drought would have to be better than the destructive hurricane which hit our state's coastline this week.

It's always amazing what nature can do, and for the year 1983 Mother Nature continues to exhibit virtually every face she possesses, though most of them have been ugly.

We have often said that we would rather live on the dry, dusty plains of Texas than many other areas. True, we have our occasional tornado scares. However, most times you can be forewarned in the event of a tornado. For some acts of nature, such as an earthquake, there is no such warning.

We were hoping that since the southeastern portion of the state has already suffered extensive (and expensive) damage from the ravages of Hurricane Alicia, that at least the storm might bring some relief to our drought conditions.

However, latest indications are that the low pressure system resulting from the hurricane is moving more in a northward pattern than forecasters at first thought it would, and the cloud system and moisture may not make it to our part of the Texas Panhandle.

One of Friona's ties with Galveston is Gigi Spring, oldest daughter of Dr. Lee and Anne Spring. Gigi has an apartment in Galveston, on the western part of the island (which has no sea wall).

However, Gigi heeded the advance warnings by the forecasters, and by the time the storm hit Galveston early in the morning on Thursday, she was safely at her parents' home in Friona, and following reports of the storm as carried in the media.

Gigi's apartment was a former motel which had been converted into an apartment complex, and as of this writing, she isn't sure if her apartment survived the tremendous force of the hurricane.

SCHOOL BELLS ring out on Monday, heralding the end of the summer at least as far as the youngsters and their parents are concerned.

Although the thermometers may not make a noticeable dip, the kids, parents, teachers and administrators will have to get back into the school groove beginning Monday.

The advent of school also will usher in other fall activities, such as football games, and before you know it, Maize Days time will be here.

Residents are reminded that sign-ups have begun for entrants in both the Maize Queen and Little Miss pageants, at the Chamber of Commerce office.

The deadline for entering these events are really not too far away (September 7), so those interested in entering need to contact the Chamber office right away.

Also, advance ticket sales for various activities are underway. This includes the Maize Queen pageant, whose tickets went on sale this past Thursday, and the Maize Days Barbecue, tickets for which are also available.

Everyone is urged to get their tickets to the various events, and plan now to support Maize Days, which in turn will be supporting your community, its clubs, organizations, and the Chamber of Commerce.

Maize Days is traditionally the single biggest project of the service clubs, who depend upon participation by the public in order to gain revenue for their yearly programs of work.

The evening performance by the high school age young people will be a salute to the music of Irving Berlin, at 8 p.m. at the High School Auditorium. Again the admission price will be \$1.00 per person.

The musical revue will have such popular numbers as "There's No Business Like Show Business," "Easter Parade" and "Top Hat" performed by the entire cast. Also "White Christmas" sung by David Small, "They Say It's Wonderful" by Ronda Ratcliff, "I've Got The Sun In The Mornin'" by Sandy Spring, "Blue Skies" by Chuck Ellis, "Won't You Play A Simple Melody" by Nikki Osborn and Brent Hinkle, "You're Just In Love" by Ricky Barnett and Diane Johnston, and "The Girl That I Marry" by Andy Alexander.

The children's play is an "Outerspace" version of the popular old Snow White story, and promises to be an especially entertaining afternoon for young children.

Two Families To Host Students

Fourteen young people from several foreign countries will converge on Friona this weekend for an area orientation program sponsored by the "Youth For Understanding," an organization of the U.S. State Department.

Barbara Ackers, area coordinator from Lubbock, will conduct the orientation session for the youngsters at the Friona Industries Board Room from 9 to 12 on Saturday morning, August 20.

The young people will be students in high schools in the Western Texas Panhandle area during the 1983-84 school year. They will be staying in homes in several area towns. The youngsters are from Denmark, Spain, Germany, Belgium, France, Japan and the Netherlands.

Two Friona families will be hosts to an exchange student in the Youth for Understanding program during

the year. Ludwig Steinhausel from Hagen, West Germany will be living with the George Frye family. Masayo Okamoto of Osaka, Japan will be living with the Robert Neelley family. Both students will be seniors at Friona High School.

The other area exchange students will travel to Friona on Friday afternoon. They will attend the Friona-Bovina scrimmage football game Friday evening. There will be a dance held in their honor at the High School Cafeteria following the game.

Saturday evening the students will have dinner at the Country Club and will attend the Summer Drama Workshop Production at the High School.

This is the first time that Friona has been selected to host the orientation session for the exchange program. Each of the 14 students will be spending Friday night in the home of a Friona family.

School Begins In Friona On Monday

The 1983-84 school term gets underway in Friona on Monday, August 22, when the regular schedule is observed for all classes. Buses will run their routes. School hours are 8:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

High school students registered Friday, and will meet their regular classes.

Students from kindergarten through the eighth grade will register on Monday.

Kindergarten students and first grades are asked to report to the Primary Building. Grade two is to

report to the north wing of the grade school. Third grade will report to the west door of the grade school.

Fourth grade should report to school through the east door of the Grade School Building, and fifth grade is asked to enter the main south door. Assistance will be provided to help students get to their proper rooms.

In junior high, sixth grade reports to the west wing, while the seventh and eighth grade students will report to the north-south wing of the building. Room lists will be posted in

halls directing students to the proper room.

School patrons are reminded that Texas law requires all students to be immunized for polio, rubella, rubeola and diphtheria. Also, the mumps vaccine is required for all students under nine years of age.

"The school will definitely enforce this law. Parents are urged to have these immunizations prior to enrolling their youngsters," Jarboe said.

Those students receiving letters stating that their ten year booster shot is due before school starts will need to present this certificate from their doctor or clinic on the day of registration.

Lunch prices will be the same as they were last school year: K through fifth grade, \$1.10 per meal; six through eight: \$1.15 per meal; high school, \$1.25 per meal. Breakfast prices are 50 cents for K-8, and 60 cents for high school. The cafeteria will operate its regular schedule on August 22, except for breakfast.

This year for the first time, the school is permitted and required to verify a certain percentage of its free and reduced lunch recipients. Applications for this program will be available on the first day of school.

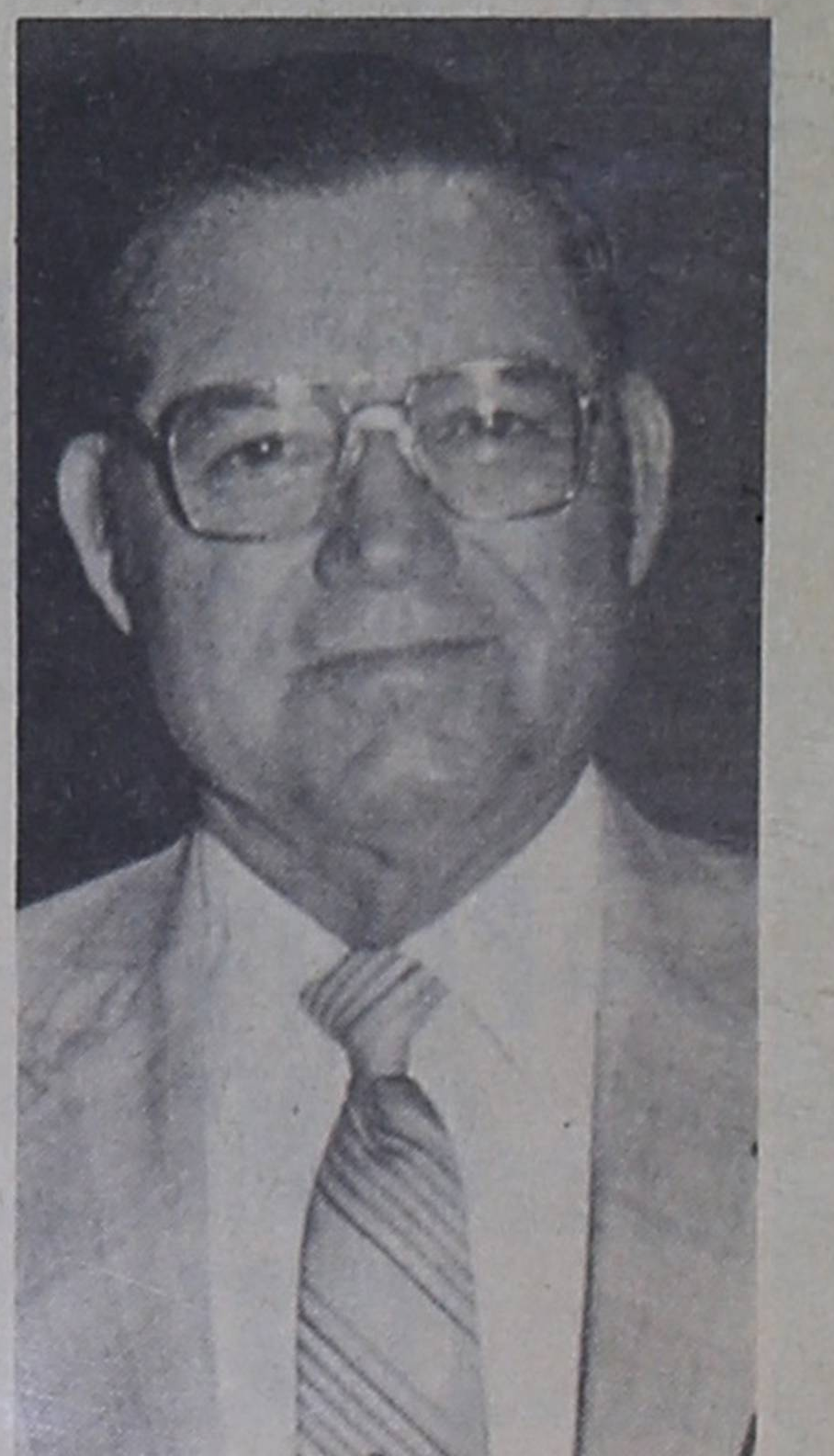
Eldred Brown Named To Head State Group

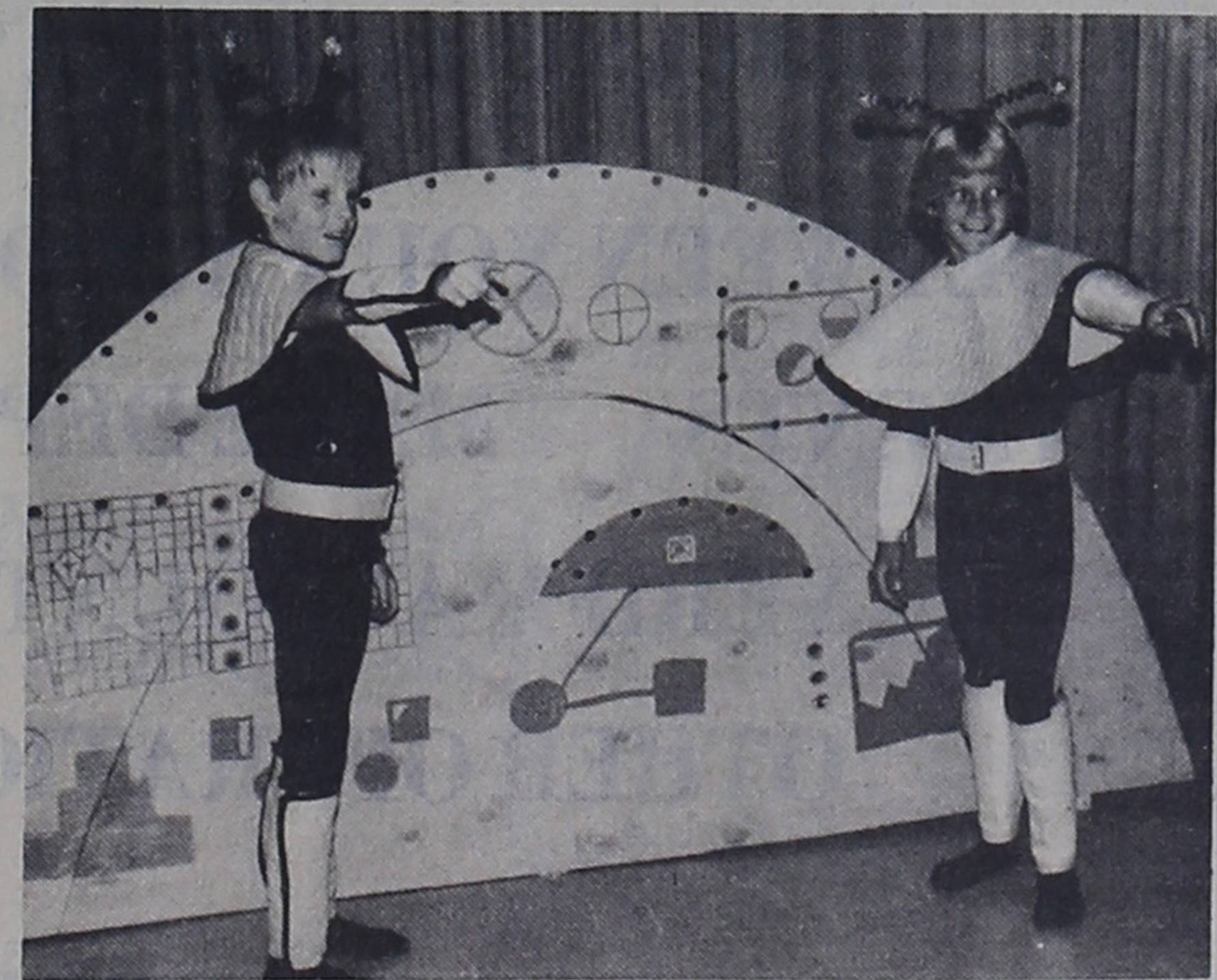

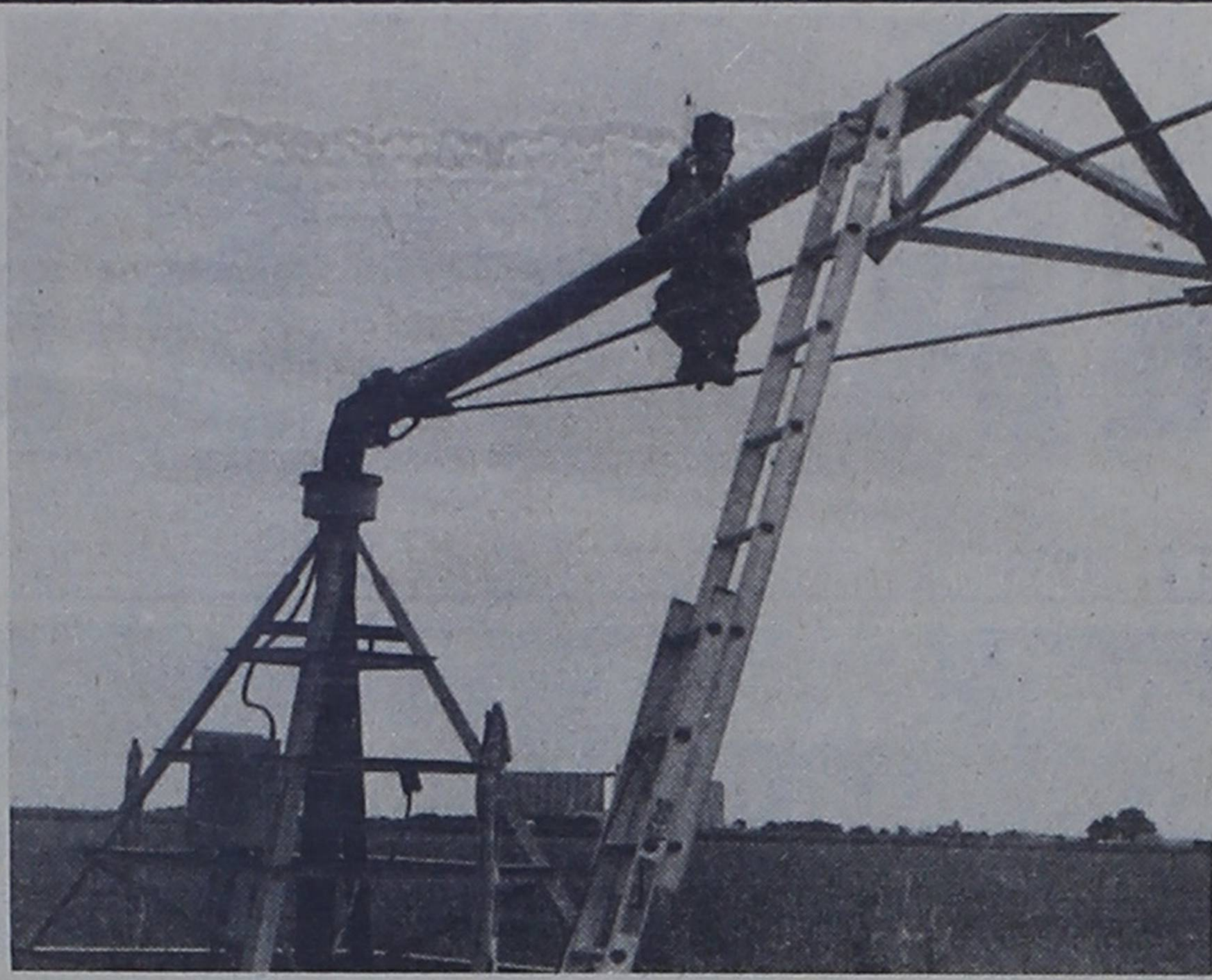
Burial was in Memory Garden Cemetery, Amarillo, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Every drop of pumped water must count for the irrigated farmer to make ends meet today.

To help keep expenses spent on energy low, sprinkler and pumping plant evaluations can be conducted at no charge by the Soil Conservation Service. By evaluating a sprinkler system, the pattern and application efficiency can be determined for the system. If a crop has high and low spots, the pattern efficiency for the system is probably low. Application efficiency compares the amount of water pumped to the amount of water which reaches the ground.

In order to check the efficiency of a sprinkler system, cans are set 30 feet apart along the system. With the PIK program, many times, some of the land under the sprinkler is idle or a wide turnrow is present where the cans can be set next to the crop being irrigated. This allows the evaluation to be done while irrigating the crop.

The evaluation can be done on new and old systems to make sure systems are operating as they were designed. Also, pumping plant evaluation can display the efficiency of the pump and motor.

Farmers should evaluate their systems now and be ready to make necessary changes this winter that are economically feasible. For more information or assistance, contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Friona, or call 247-2220.

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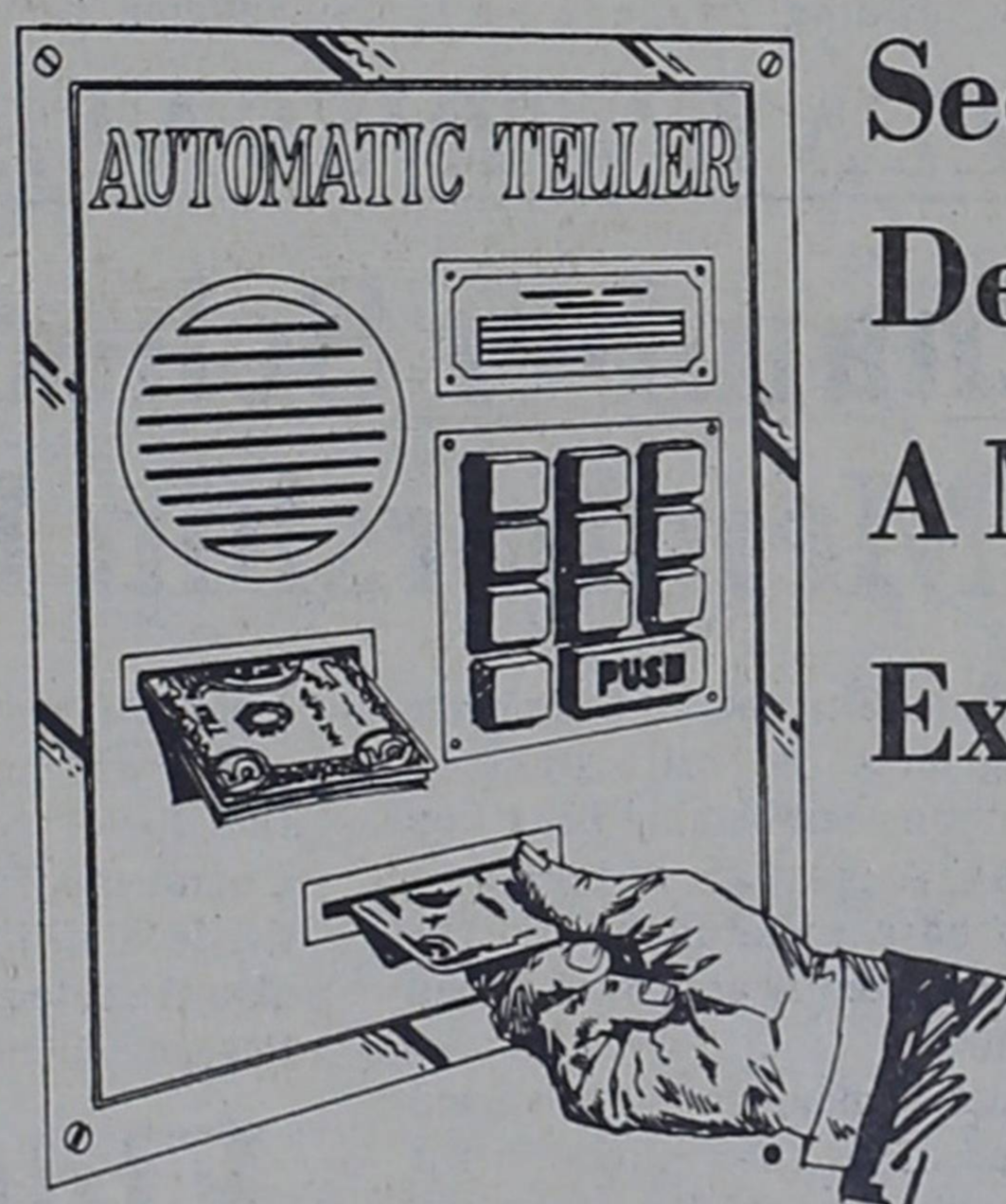
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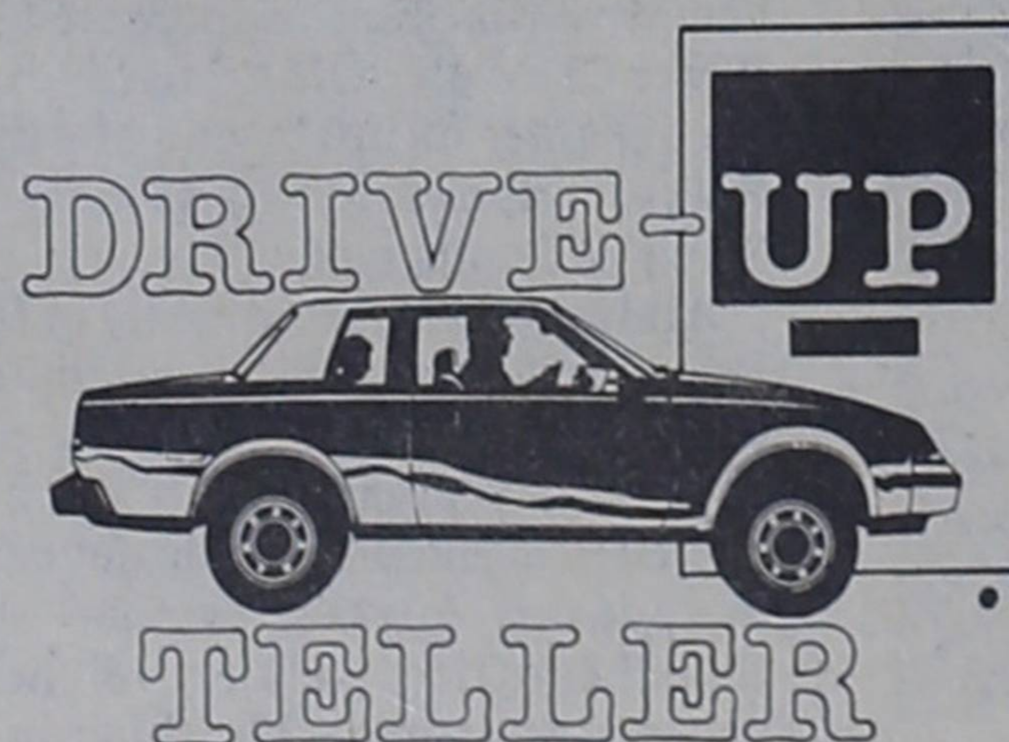

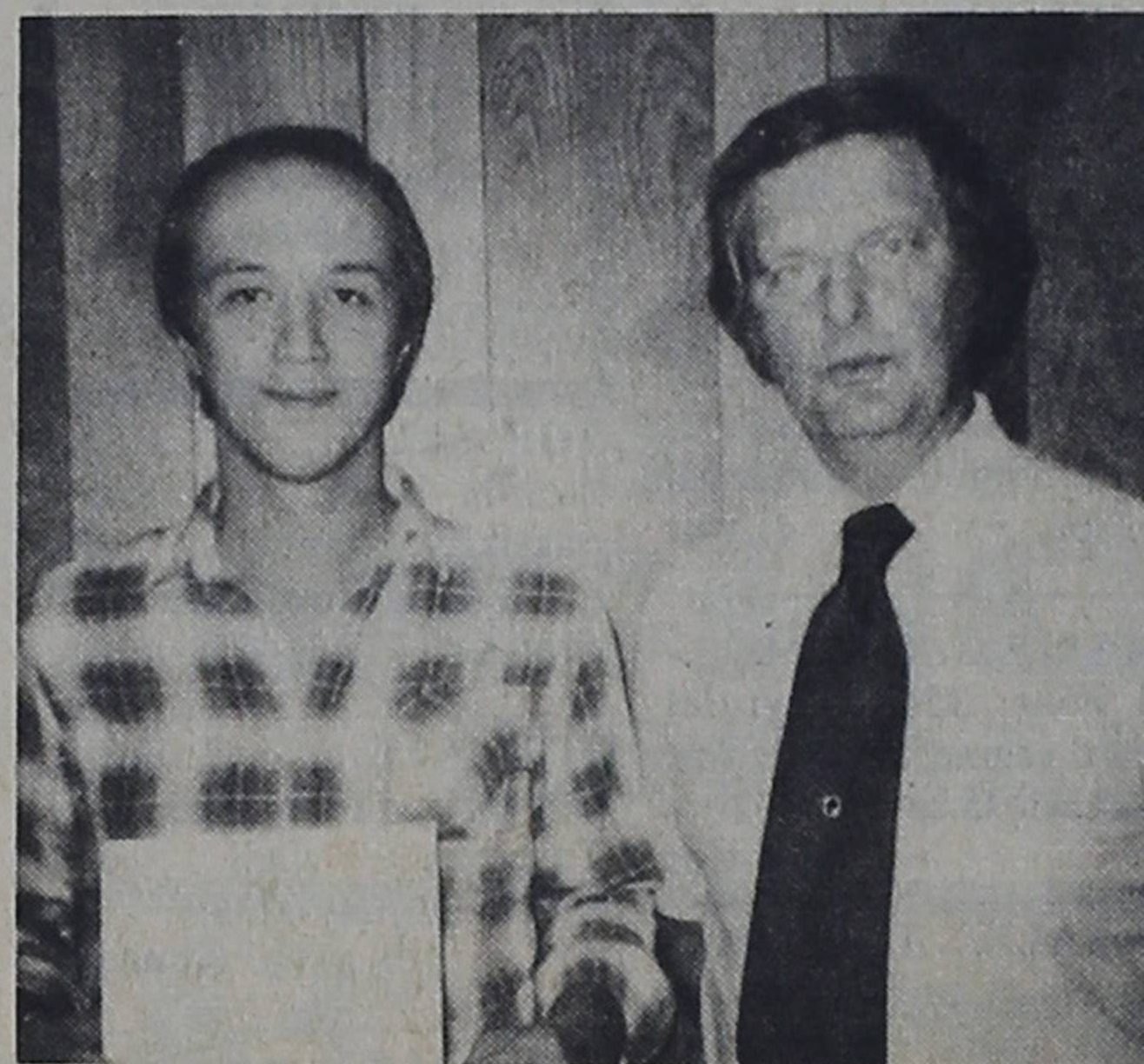

Claude Akins Promotes Soil, Water Conservation

To promote the conservation of soil, water and related renewable natural resources in Parmer County, McFarland Osborn, chairman of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, announced this week the support and assistance of internationally known actor, Claude Akins.

"Akins, who speaks for soil and water conservation in a series of broadcast public service messages, is particularly recognized for his portrayal of gypsy trucker Sonny Pruitt in NBC-TV's 'Movin' On' and for his title role in NBC-TV's adventure-comedy 'Sheriff Lobo,'" said Osborn.

Akins also guest starred in numerous TV series such as Police Story, Medical Story, Mannix, McCloud, Cannon, The Streets of San Francisco, Fantasy Island and B.J. and the Bear. He also appeared in films such as From Here to Eternity, The Caine Mutiny, Skyjacked, The Devil's Brigade, Inherit the Wind, The Great Bank Robbery and Timber Tramps.

Akins whose interest in soil and water conservation was nurtured at an early age said, "My feeling for the land comes from my father, who all his life had a love for the soil. He had a small piece of land outside Bedford, Indiana and I watched him take care of it as if it were a very important partner. Through his example, I learned that proper treatment of the land is the only way it will really serve us as it's supposed to."

In commenting on current ecological and environmental concerns and how soil and water conservation fits into the overall picture Akins said, "With the problem of an increasing world population and the taking of farm areas for urban development and other uses, I think agricultural producers are constantly facing the problem of trying to produce more and more for less and less on a limited resource."

"Though we have made great advances in conservation efforts in the last several decades, other issues have emerged to cause soil and water conservation to be given a backseat in state and national priorities. These resources should be considered equally along with the other problems we have in our ecology," added Akins.

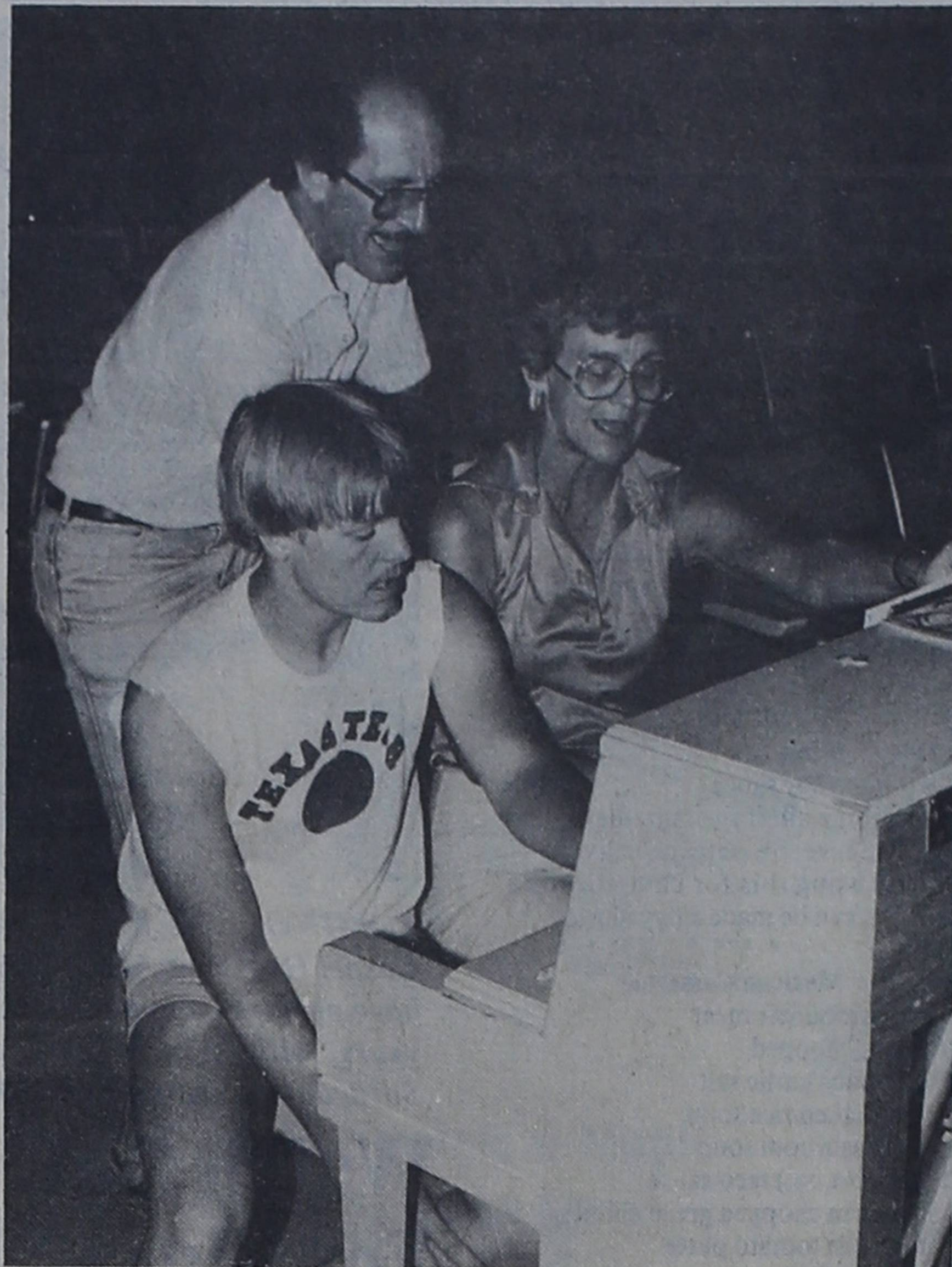
From a personal viewpoint Akins said, "When I was in the Army and in India, I saw the effects of bad land use and the starvation that follows. The people in the area I visited knew the land was subject to flooding every year and yet they did nothing to protect it. Brazil is another example. While there, I remember how farmers would farm out their land and then move to another plot rather than restoring what they had."

"Look at what happened in this country prior to and during the dust bowl era of the '30's. Soil conservation was mostly ignored until the land suddenly got blown away. At that point it was too late, so when we

see signs of soil and water erosion the time to do something about it is when we first discover it and not wait until it's too late. The point I'm trying to make is that soil and water conservation is an ongoing thing and requires total public interest and support," concluded Akins.

Commenting on Akins' interest in assisting Texas SWCDs with a conservation public awareness message Osborn said, "We appreciate Claude's involvement in our local and state conservation efforts. He is saying what we have been talking about all along. And that is the conservation of soil, plant and animal resources does not mean hoarding these things for future use, but using them efficiently and in such a way that they will last and become more productive."

"If our district office is to serve Parmer County and the surrounding area effectively, we need good two-way communication in our community. And that's what Claude is emphasizing in these public service programs. We need to know local concerns and we need understanding of and local support of our long range goals and objectives to accomplish soil and water conservation in our community," said Osborn.

SS Program Makes Change

Legislation passed by Congress in April of this year to ensure the stability of the Social Security system will have its first effect on beneficiaries this July. The cost-of-living adjustment beneficiaries expected to receive with their July checks will be delayed until January of 1984. The new law also provides that the cost-of-living raise will be made in January instead of July in all future years.

The amount of the cost-of-living adjustment for 1983 will not be affected by the delay in payment. Beneficiaries will receive a 3.5 per cent raise based on the Consumer Price Index, the most commonly used measure of inflation. The increase is modest in comparison to increases of the past few years because of the fact that inflation has declined. Even so, delaying the effective date of the raise will save the Social Security billions of dollars.

As another cost-saving measure, the method by which the automatic cost-of-living adjustment is figured may be changed in future years, depending on how much money is in the trust fund. Should Social Security reserves fall dangerously low, the cost-of-living raise will be based on the yearly increase in wages rather than on the Consumer Price Index. This would reduce the amount of the raise, but the new law would also allow beneficiaries to recover any loss once the trust fund became healthy again.

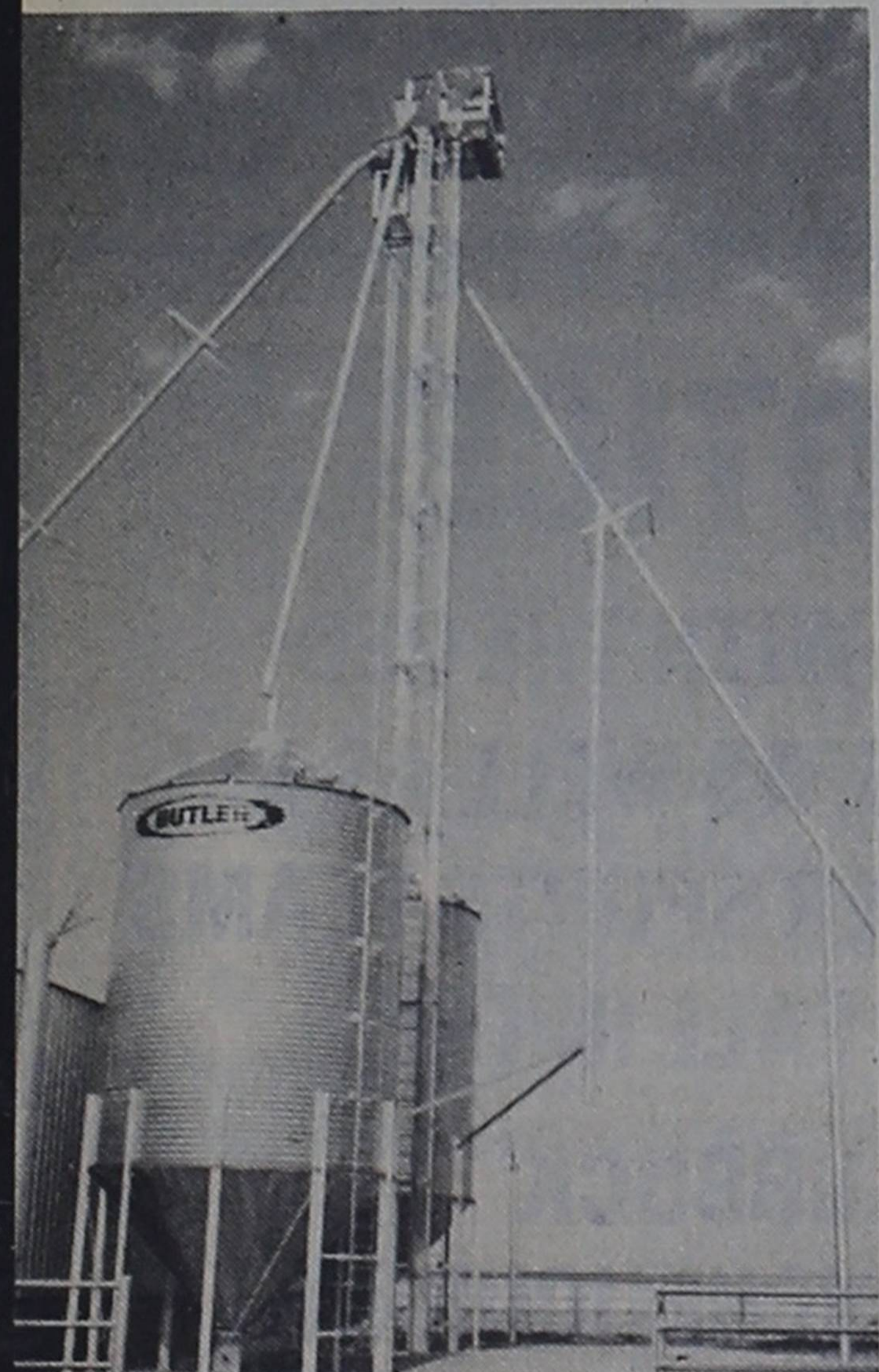

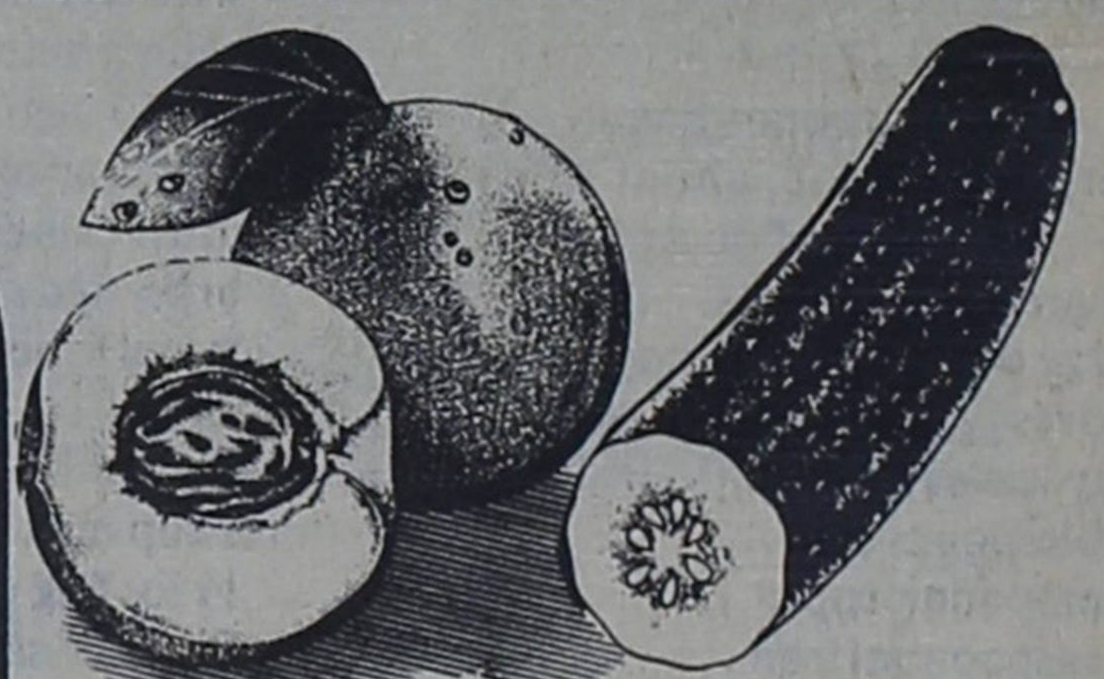

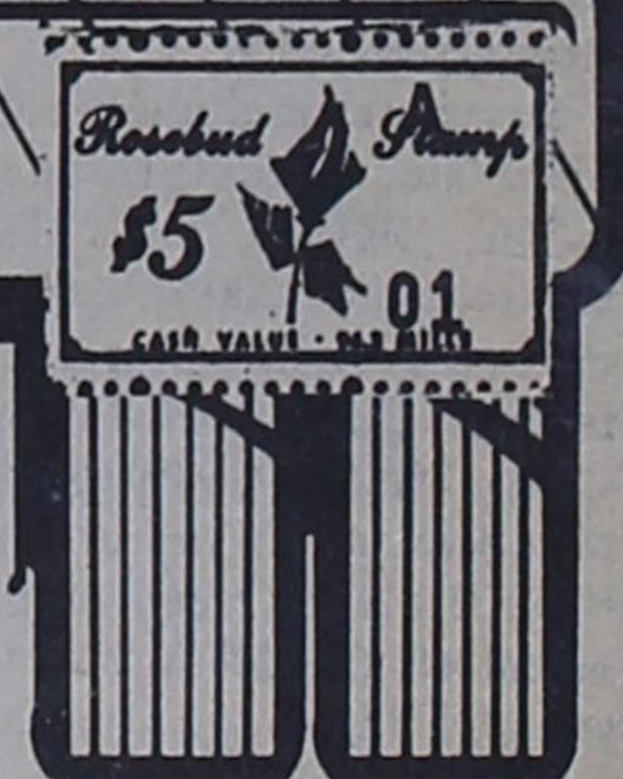

Happy Homemaker

By JUNE FLOYD

This week's recipes are from *Friends and Family Cookbook*, which was recently published by Lunell McFarland Horton and contains favorite recipes of many of Friona's good cooks.

The book is divided into nine different sections—appetizers and beverages; breads and muffins; soups; salads, salad dressings and sauces; main dishes; vegetables; cakes, ice cream and desserts; pies and cookies and candies.

Every recipe in the book sounds delicious, so trying to decide which ones to use is quite a task. However, if space permits, we will have one from each section.

Banana Balls

6 bananas
2 tablespoons powdered sugar
1 carton sour cream
1 carton whipping cream
Angel Flake Coconut
Lemon juice

Whip cream and add sour cream. Cut bananas into 1/2 to 1 inch pieces and dip in lemon juice. Roll them in whipped cream mixture and then in coconut. Freeze. To serve, use toothpicks to pick them up.

Anadama Bread

2 cups cold milk
1/2 cup yellow corn meal
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 cup light molasses
3 tablespoons shortening
1 teaspoon sugar
1/4 cup lukewarm water
1 package yeast
4 1/2 cups all purpose flour

Combine milk, corn meal and salt in saucepan, heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Reduce to low heat and stir for five minutes more. Remove from heat. Add molasses and shortening and blend. Cool to lukewarm. Stir sugar into water. Add yeast and let stand for ten minutes. Stir yeast mixture to blend and add cooled corn meal mixture; stir well. Add gradually, the flour and mix thoroughly. Turn onto lightly floured board and knead lightly for ten minutes. Place dough in greased bowl. Turn once to coat. Cover and let rise one hour. Turn dough out again and divide in half. Round up and let rest ten minutes. Shape into loaves and place in greased pans. Grease tops and let rise 1 1/2 hours. Bake in hot 400 degree oven for 45-50 minutes. Remove from pans. Cool. Makes two loaves.

This recipe is a favorite of one of Friona's busiest men who cooks to relax and will be recognized by a lot of people who have had the pleasure of eating it.

Garbonzo Soup

1 large ham bone, about 2 lbs. with meat on it
3 quarts water
2 large onions, finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
2 bay leaves
2 tablespoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon saffron
4 peeled medium potatoes, cut in eighths
2 one pound cans garbonzo beans
2 chorizos, sliced

Cover ham bone with water and cook with the onions, minced garlic and bay leaves for two hours. Add salt, pepper and saffron. Add potatoes and cook for 30 minutes. Add garbonzos and sliced chorizos.

1 can chicken rice soup
1 can mushroom soup
2 cans (4 1/2 oz.) taco sauce
1 small can chopped green chilies
1 small can tomato paste
8 corn tortillas
Grated cheese

Cook hamburger meat and chopped onion until onion is clear. Mix all other ingredients in cooked hamburger. Break 4 tortillas into bottom of 9x14 inch pan. Pour half the mixture over broken tortillas. Break 4 tortillas over hamburger mixture in pan and add remaining hamburger. Add grated cheese on top. Cook 35 minutes in 350 degree oven or until hot and bubbly.

7 Can Casserole

2 cans French sliced green beans, drained
1 can (1 lb.) bean sprouts, drained
1 can mushroom soup
1 can (4 oz.) mushrooms
1 can (6 oz.) water chestnuts
1 can (3 1/2 oz.) French onions
Mix mushroom soup and mushrooms, including liquid. Add beans, bean sprouts and water chestnuts (sliced). Bake in a shallow casserole dish at 350 degrees until bubbly hot. Add onion and bake a few minutes longer or until onions are crisp.

Buttermilk Cake

1 cup Crisco
1 cup buttermilk
2 cups flour
4 eggs
1 teaspoon lemon extract
2 cups sugar
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon orange extract
Mix shortening and sugar. Add eggs one at a time. Add soda to buttermilk. Add liquid alternately with dry ingredients, beginning and ending with flour. Add extracts. Bake at 350 degrees in greased and floured bundt or tube pan for 45-60 minutes—until done to the touch and slightly browned. Let cool in pan about 5 minutes before turning out.

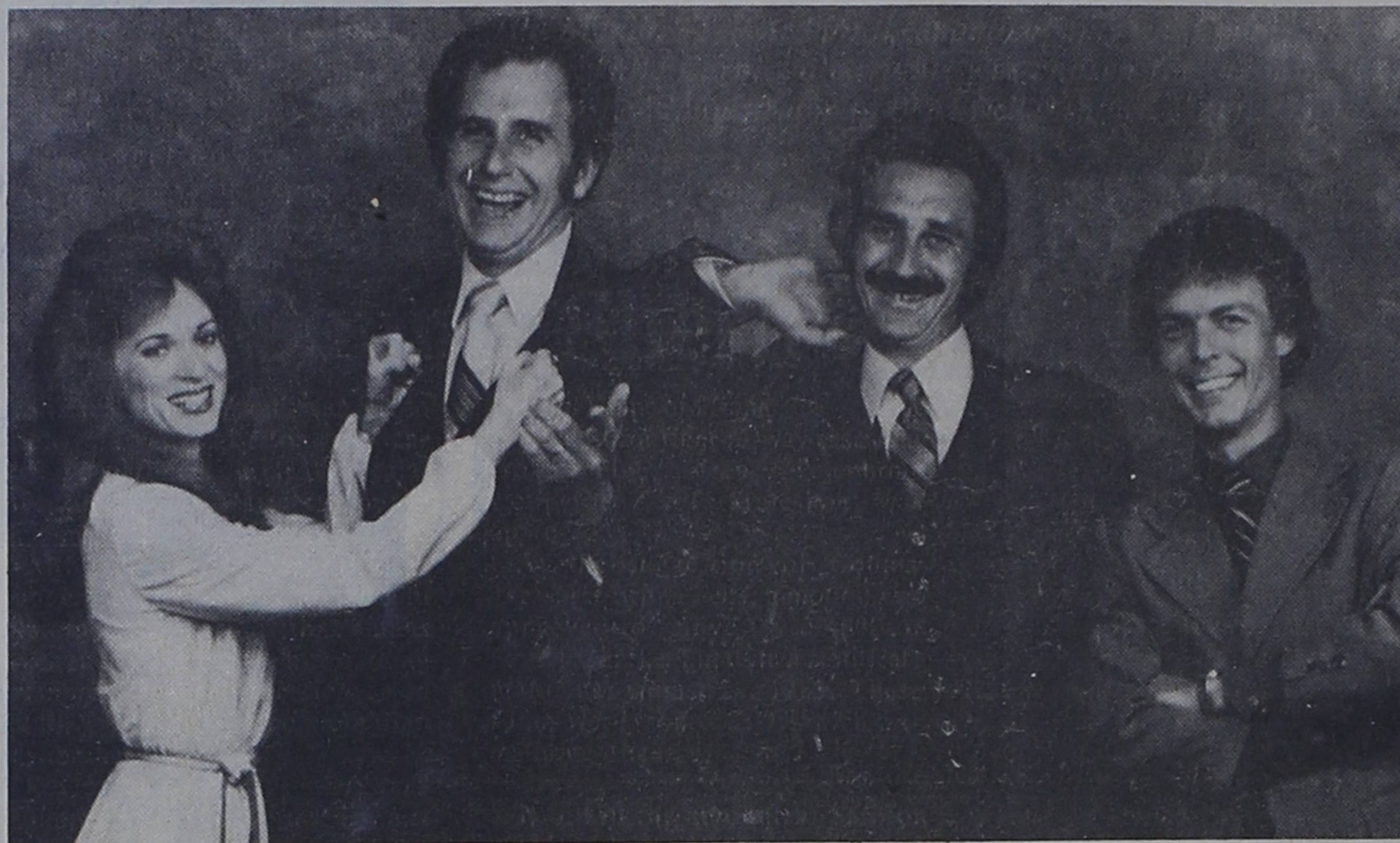
Pretty Pie

1 cup milk
1/2 lb. bag or 32 marshmallows
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup heavy cream
2 (1 oz.) squares unsweetened chocolate, grated
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
1 baked 9 inch pastry shell
Heat milk slowly and add marshmallows. Heat until melted, stirring constantly. Chill until partially congealed, stirring every now and then. Add cream which you have whipped, nuts and grated chocolate. Chill. Garnish with dollops of whipped cream and curls of chocolate.

Apricot Finger Roll

2 cups flour
1/2 pint sour cream
1 (16 oz.) jar apricot jam
1 cup shredded coconut
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup butter
Cut butter into flour with pastry blender. Add sour cream to make dough and chill. Mix apricot jam, coconut and nuts. Roll 1/2 of the dough into 12x18 rectangle. Spread with 1/2 of the jam mixture. Roll up and pinch ends. Bake 40-45 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool and slice. Repeat with second half of the dough and apricot mixture. Cut cookies into size you desire.

Some of the suggestions near the back of *Friends and Family Cookbook* are:
Turn cottage cheese upside down in the refrigerator to prolong freshness.
Thaw frozen fish in milk for a more freshly caught flavor.
Raisins should be heated slightly before adding to batter to better distribute raisins.
If whipping cream won't whip, add 4 drops lemon juice to cream and try again.

Friona Industries, Inc. reported net earnings of \$3.7 million, or \$1.71 per share, on sales of \$240 million for its fiscal year ended June 30, 1983.

Net earnings were 8 per cent higher on a 17 per cent sales increase when compared with the prior fiscal year's net earnings of \$3.4 million, or \$1.57 per share, on sales of \$205 million.

Increased operating profits were achieved by all of the Company's major business segments, with the exception of meat processing and distribution.

"More company-owned cattle marketed, higher average feedyard occupancy, which benefitted both sales and profits for the commercial feeds, animal health supplies, custom feeding and grain segments, and a substantial reduction in interest expense were the primary reasons for the improved financial performance," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

Fourth quarter net earnings of \$1 million, or 45 cents per share, on sales of \$58 million compared with net earnings of \$1.7 million, or 80 cents per share, on sales of \$57 million in the prior year's fourth quarter.

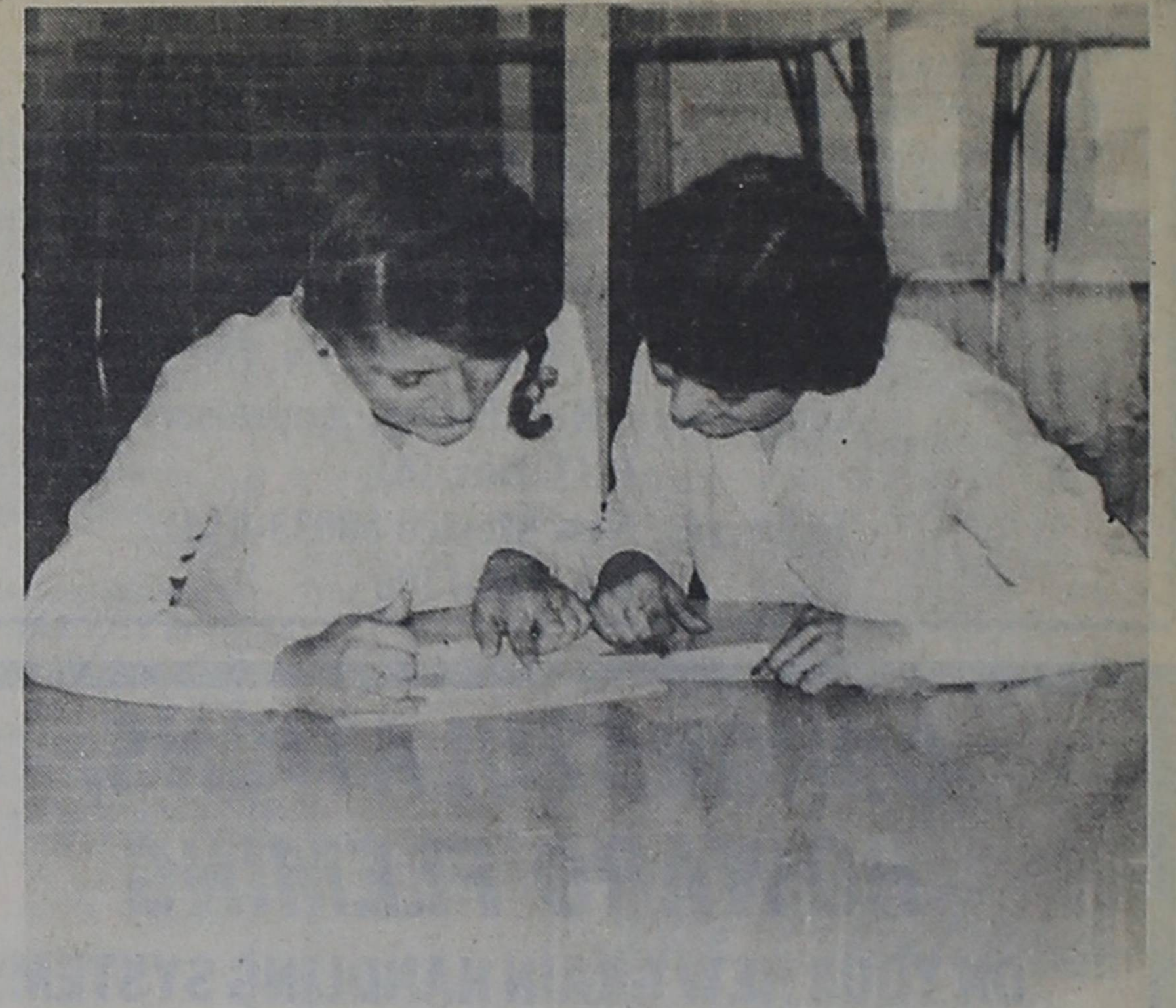
"Profitability in the fourth quarter of this year was somewhat below that of the same quarter of fiscal 1982, but was still very satisfactory," said Davenport. "The fourth quarter of last year was one of the best the company ever experienced."

Higher operating expenses continued to restrict operating profits for meat processing and distribution. Fewer company-owned cattle were marketed on a quarter-to-quarter comparison and at lower profit margins. Tonnage sold by the commercial feeds segment was also below that of the fourth quarter of fiscal 1982.

"The company continues to show a strong balance sheet which is the result of consistently good earnings, plus an equity offering in March of 1983 and the sale of long-term notes in April 1983," said Davenport.

"With the recovery of the general economy progressing, the outlook for future earnings is good."

Friona Industries common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

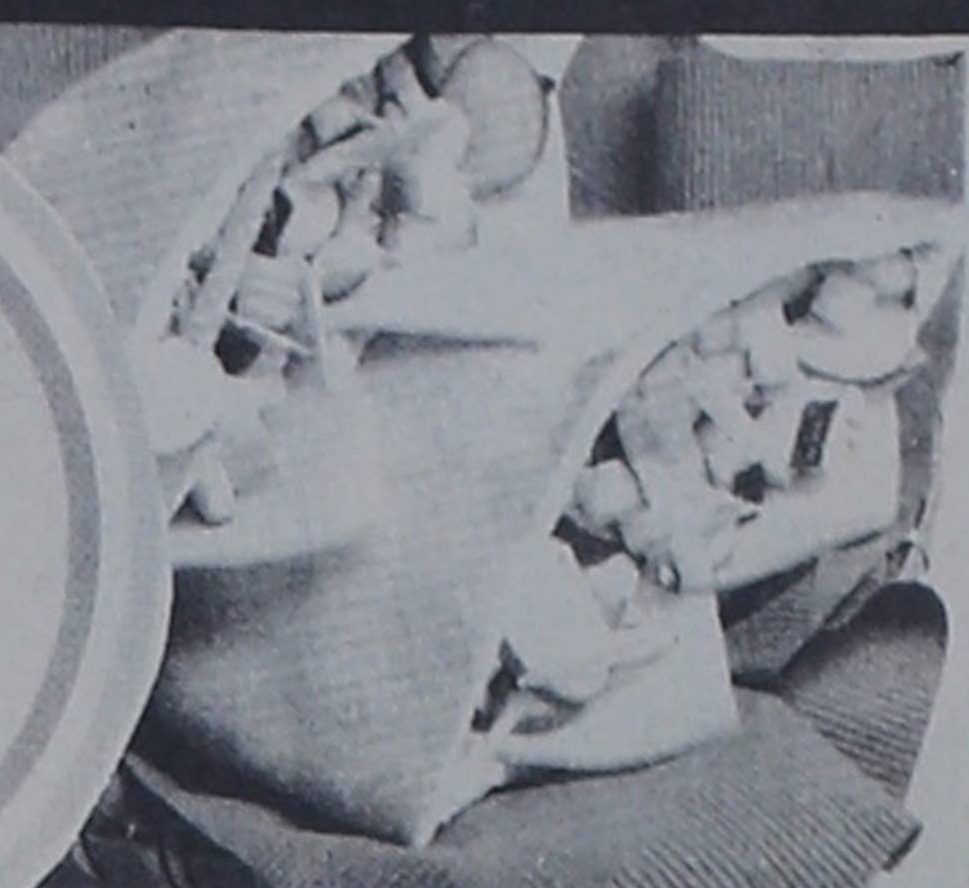

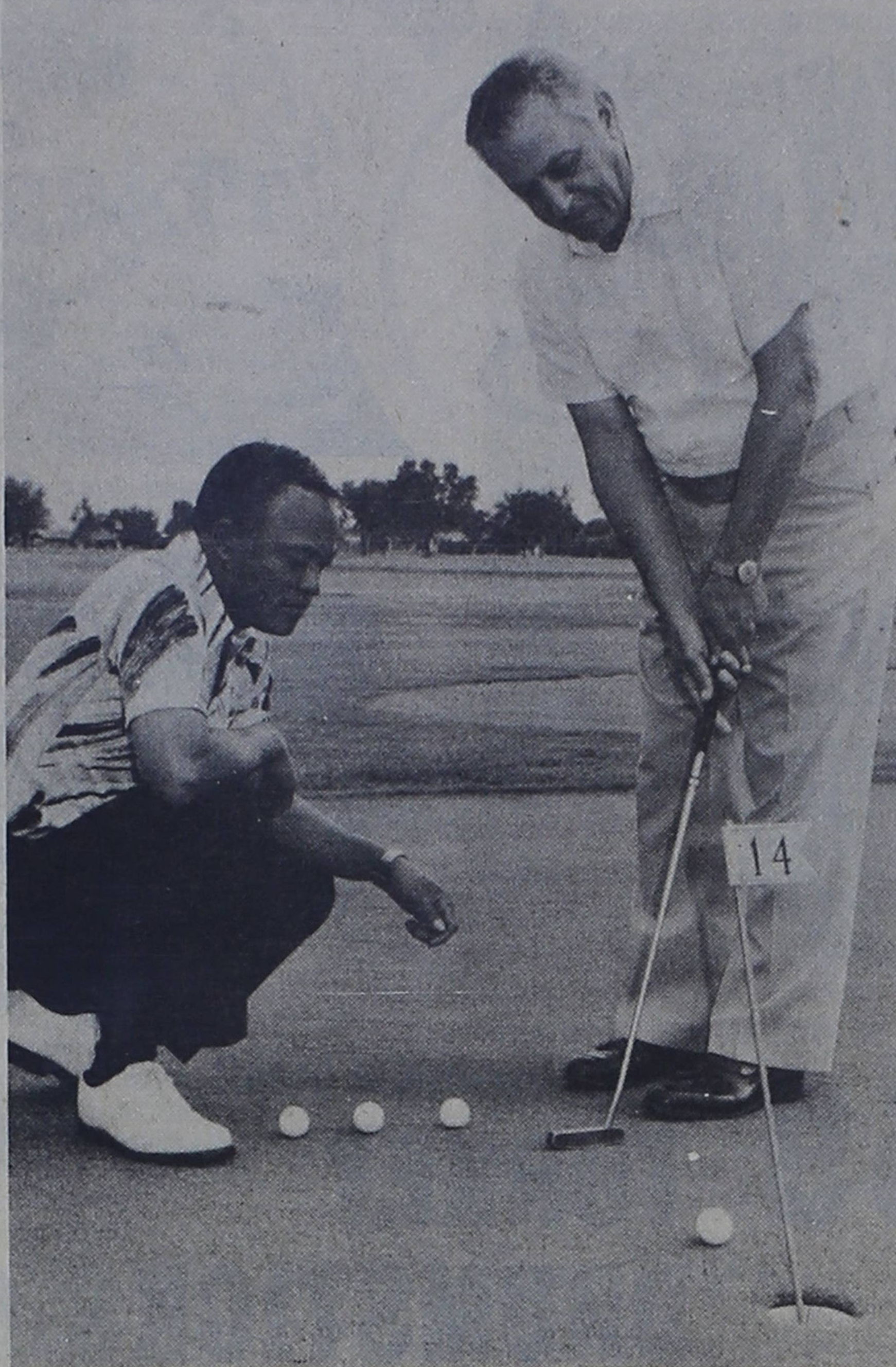

Borers Are Threat To Peach Trees

Many homeowners who have peach trees are concerned about the peach tree borer. "Plan now to spray peach trees to control peach tree borers. Apply Lorsban 4E (chlorpyrifos) at 5 teaspoons per gallon of water," says Seth Ralston, county agent. The Green Light Company also

markets a 12.9 per cent chlorpyrifos for borer control. Thoroughly spray the tree's trunk and avoid contaminating any fruit. One

treatment about mid-August will protect the tree from borers this season, Ralston said.

Take Care Of Food In Summer Weather

Summer is the time for family outings and weekend picnics which are as American as apple pie. However, that apple pie and other foods may spoil the summer fun if they are not properly refrigerated warns Canyon Paramedic Danny White, vice chairman of Panhandle Emergency Medical Services.

One of the most common types of food poisoning is caused by a staphylococcus bacteria which multiply rapidly when certain foods are stored at temperatures which are too warm. All kinds of meats, dairy products, and certain baked goods are especially susceptible. In fact, any foods left in an open container and unrefrigerated should be suspect warns White.

The symptoms usually occur a few hours after eating and consist of vomiting, diarrhea, stomach cramps, and nausea. The person suffering from food poisoning feels like they are going to die. Although death rarely occurs.

White, chairman of the PEMS

education committee says that treatment is based on correcting dehydration which occurs from the vomiting and diarrhea. Relief of the abdominal cramping and diarrhea can be obtained through the use of commercial preparations from the local pharmacy. Usually the symptoms last less than 24 hours.

There are other forms of food plant poisoning which can occur from eating contaminated or poisonous plants. If a child eats one of those plants, White advises that parents immediately call the poison control number at 1-800-692-1331 in Amarillo. They can advise you on the treatment and symptoms of most poisons.

Paramedic White concluded by stating that if you have any doubt about the seriousness or complications of food poisoning call your local physician, emergency medical services number of the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services number 1-800-692-1331.

Public Is Advised Of "Kid Alert"

With the starting of school around the corner, Friona will be experiencing children on their way to and from school in large numbers. Some of them will be walking and others will be riding bicycles.

Chief of Police Bill Thieman advises motorists to be on the alert for children near schools and in the cross walks.

Parents of children just starting school are advised to walk with their children the first few days to familiarize them on the best way to and from school, and to show them where the crossing guards are located.

The biggest challenge to motorists will be to be on the alert for children coming out from behind parked cars or riding bicycles in an unsafe manner. Just before school starts and after school is out for the day will be the most critical times for the drivers.

Another problem, according to Chief Thieman, is the theft of bicycles. In the majority of cases reported this year, people have been able to describe the type, size, color and brand of the bicycle, but sometimes this information is not enough.

The key to a positive identification of a bicycle is a marking that is unique only to that family or individual. Either one of the parents' drivers license numbers or social security numbers should be stamped or engraved on the bicycles frame or inside the pedal crank.

This aids the owner and the police in positively identifying the bicycle and returning it to its rightful owner.

Members of the Friona Police Department and Reserves will be at the Health Fair at the Community Center on Saturday, August 20, to mark and register bicycles for those people who need this service.

In addition, for those parents concerned about the national rash of "child stealing," the members of the Police Department will be available to fingerprint children. All records of the children being fingerprinted will be kept by the parents.

According to Chief Thieman good intended preventive acts such as this can be misinterpreted by overly concerned citizens. So the only solution is for the parents to keep their children's fingerprint cards until any need should arise for their use.
