HAVING JUST EXPERIENCED
the coldest December this writer can
ever recall, we wanted to mention a
few things before we close the books
on December for good.

There was an eight-day period, December 19 through December 26, when the high temperature never made it above the freezing mark. Even oldtimers can't recall a similar period, when the temperature dropped so low and stayed that way for so long.

There were ten days like this in all, and they happened in a 12-day period.

On Saturday, Christmas Eve, the high temperature was a frigid 12 degrees. Christmas Day topped out at 14 degrees. Suffice it to say, a lot of people just stayed in the house during this period.

Another oddity of the recent cold spell was the fact that it covered virtually the nation's entire midsection. Most times, the temperature in the Dallas-Fort Worth area isn't as cold as we have on the High Plains, but it was during this spell.

The destruction of much of the Texas citrus crop also attested as to how far south the deep-freeze weather went.

We can be thankful that we have warm houses and good heating systems. It is our opinion that we'd better be thankful this month, because next month when we get our utility bills for the cold period, we'll all need something to fall back on.

ORDINARILY, our coldest weather on the High Plains comes during January or February--but can it be that this winter the coldest blast came earlier than usual?

Most folks are hoping that this was the case. We'd hate to think that we are yet to have our "really cold" weather.

With the weather warming up nicely this week, it was hard to imagine the difference we had a week or ten days earlier.

In fact, while making a trip on Wednesday, yours truly noticed several flocks of birds (ducks, cranes, etc.), and all of them were headed north.

Whether this meant anything other than the birds were just in flight, we don't pretend to know. But we were hoping that perhaps the birds were of the opinion that the bitter cold we experienced last month won't be repeated in January.

Mind you, I'm not necessarily making this prediction, just quoting a bunch of dumb-looking ducks.

speaking of quoting....Did you see the quote in last week's paper in reference to the fact that one of the new USFL pro football teams, the one located in New Jersey, was interested in Bum Phillips as its head coach?

School will dismiss earlier than usual two days next week, and students will be out completely on Friday, January 13, according to Tom B. Jarboe, superintendent.

On Wednesday and Thursday, January 11-12, school will dismiss an hour earlier than usual, at 2:45. Those days are semester test days in Friona schools. Then Friday will be a holiday for students, and an inservice day for teachers.

Records Broken By Cold Weather

The month of December, 1983, turned out to be one of the coldest Decembers on record in the area, with a number of records broken.

In Friona, there were four nights when the low temperature dropped to below zero. The coldest was Christmas Eve, when the mercury dropped to three degrees below zero. Christmas morning, the temperature was once again two degrees below.

There were eight consecutive days when the temperature failed to climb as high as 32 degrees, from December 19 through the 26th. The streak was broken on December 27, when the mercury zipped all the way up to 60 degrees.

After a couple of days with 60 as a high temperature, the mercury dropped again, with the snowfall of last Wednesday morning, December

On the mornings of the 29th and 30th, the lows once again were two below. High temperatures stayed below freezing once again.

For the month, there were ten days when the temperature failed to get above freezing. A total of seven inches of snow was measured, according to weather recorder Rodney Dunnam, yielding .76 inch of moisture.

Friona Industries Tells Expansion

Friona Industries, Inc. has agreed in principle to the acquisition of Country Queen Foods, Inc., Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Under the agreement, Country Queen Foods, Inc., shareholders would receive 210,000 shares of Friona common stock, which had a Friday closing price of \$11.50 per share on the American Stock Exchange. The company currently has about 2,322,000 shares outstanding and will have approximately 2,532,000 shares outstanding following the acquisition.

The consummation of the merger is subject to various requirements including the approval of both boards of directors and the approval of the shareholders of Country Queen Foods, Inc.

Country Queen Foods, with plants in Grand Rapids, Michigan, Bellview, Florida, and a 50 per cent interest in Country Queen Foods, Ltd., Bramaton, Ontario, Canada, processes egg products such as frozen, chopped, hard cooked and fried eggs and omelettes for the restaurant industry and institutional users. Its products are sold through food distributors. Country Queen Foods, Inc. had sales of \$7,175,000 in 1982, and \$7,184,000 in the first ten months of 1983.

County Queen Foods, Inc. will be merged with a wholly-owned subsidiary of Friona Industries and operated as a wholly owned subsidiary.

"Country Queen Foods, Inc. is a profitable and natural adjunct to our

own food processing and distribution operations," explained Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Friona Industries.

"We are already distributing their products through our Village Meats subsidiary which is the largest supplier to Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants, servicing more than 800 units in 15 states with hamburger meat, produce and dairy products," he said. Friona's meat processing and distribution operations generated sales of \$111 million in the company's most recent fiscal year ended June 30, 1983.

Friona's total revenues for fiscal 1983 were \$240 million with net earnings of \$3.7 million, or \$1.71 per share.

In addition to meat processing and distribution, the Company also has business segments engaged in the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds; the retail marketing of animal health supplies; custom feeding of customer-owned cattle; purchase, fattening and sale of cattle owned by the company, and the operation of grain facilities. It is one of the largest firms of its type in the nation.

For the first fiscal quarter ended September 30, 1983, the Company reported net earnings of \$688,000, or 30 cents per share, on sales of \$66 million.

Friona Industries common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

It is thought that the chair Gee will get will be similar to the one used by Celia Loflin.

Mrs. Wilson said that D.L. Harguess and Mike Hanes, who assisted her with the drive, added

their thanks to the fine people of Friona for making the special Christmas gift possible.

"When the goal was reached, I gave Roger a Christmas card, and signed it 'From the Caring People of Friona'," Mrs. Wilson said.


The baby is the first child for the couple.


5 YEARS AGO--JAN. 7, 1979

Honorary pallbearers were all of his friends.









New law governs licenses

Beginning Jan. 1, 1984 those persons who renew their driver license, qualify for their first license, or apply for a duplicate permit will receive licenses bearing new codes signifying class of license.

Colonel Jim Adams, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the department is starting the conversion to a new classified driver licensing system in accordance with a law passed this past year by the Texas Legislature.

"Licenses issued prior to 1984 will be valid until the expiration dates which appear on them," Adams said. "The new licenses will carry classifications designating the type and weight of vehicles which the holder may operate."

The new license classifications are "A", "B", "C" and "M".

The Class 'C' license permits operation of a single, two-axle vehicles with a gross weight of 24,000 pounds or less excluding motorcycles and mopeds. This designation also allows the towing of a vehicle not exceeding 10,000 pounds gross vehicle weight (GVW) or a farm trailer not exceeding 20,000 pounds GVW.

In addition, the Class "C" designation permits the operation of a bus with a maximum seating capacity of 23 passengers not including the driver.

Standard operator licenses issued under the old law will be converted automatically to Class "C" permits upon renewal or issuance of a duplicate license.

The Class "B" license allows the holder to drive all Class "C" vehicles plus single vehicles with a GVW exceeding 24,000 pounds and buses with a capacity of 24 or more passengers. Motorcycles and mopeds are excluded.

Class "A" permits allow operation of any vehicle or combination of vehicles including those listed for classes "B" and "C". Mopeds and motorcycles are excluded. Commercial and full chauffeur licenses issued under the old statute will be converted automatically to Class "A" permits upon renewal or issuance of a duplicate license.

The Class "M" designation allows the holder to operate motorcycles, motor-driven cycles and mopeds.

The road test must be taken with a vehicle which meets the specific requirements of the license class for which the person is applying.

"All classes of licenses including renewals will be valid for four years," Adams said. "The fee for obtaining or renewing all license classes will be \$10. An examination fee of five dollars will be charged for those drivers seeking a higher license classification or a motorcycle endorsement for their

Drivers who have no moving violation convictions over a four-year period and who also have no physical limitations are eligible to renew their licenses by mail.

To qualify for mail-in renewal, a driver must first receive a DPS form in the mail.

This application should be mailed back to the department within one week after it is received.

When the license is renewed, the driver will be sent a validation card which must be carried with the old license. A vision test and new photograph will not be required for mail-in renewals.

Drivers who receive mail-in renewals.

Drivers who receive mail-in renewal forms may also visit a driver license office and renew their licenses according to the standard procedure which will require them to be photographed.

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


