NOT HAVING TIME or the inclination to comment on the president's speech this week, or any of the other matters of national interest, I dug into my file marked "column notes" this week and found a battered clipping.

At this late date, I have no idea who sent the piece, and probably if they see it, I've had it so long they may not recognize the article.

It was credited to the Greenfield, Indiana, Reporter, so this will enable Ye editor to quote the Indiana paper, although some of the items sound more than a little bit familiar:

WHY EDITORS TURN GRAY

Being editor of a country newspaper is not the most desirable job in the world--unless you are a glutton for punishment. It is confining beyond what is reasonably accepted these days.

There are constant pressures. That means daily deadlines and everything has to be done in a hurry. As for financial reward, only a few really make it and we seldom advise youth to enter the field unless they are really dedicated and can cope with the inherent perplexities.

THIS DOES NOT mean that the newspaper business is completely unrewarding, because there is certain satisfaction in doing any job well.

Here are few typical examples, not all original, of a number of ways to spoil an editor's day:

"USE THE STORY just as I have written it. The club wants it that way for the scrap book."

"You're invited to our annual dinner tonight (this was the third invitation that week and we wanted a night home). There will be plenty free to eat and drink. Oh, yes, please bring your camera."

"How come it wasn't in the paper? It was--Well, I didn't see it. Will you please go through the back copies and tear it out for me."

"I just stopped by to talk a few minutes, but if you're busy."

"WE VOTED to make you our club publicity chairman."

"I know you have a deadline, but couldn't you just squeeze this little item in?"

"My husband has never been in trouble before so I don't think his name should appear in the paper for drunken driving and hitting that nasty policeman (who was only trying to arrest the man without hurting him). Besides, he only had a couple of beers (the drunkometer showed him nearly dead drunk). And there are the children to think about (he didn't and the facts are he regularly gets drunk in front of them and beats the old lady about every Saturday night)."

"I know it's on a Sunday, but it's our annual reunion and someone ought to cover it."

"I'll try to get my ad in to you before the deadline next time."

"You ran the disaster picture, but you didn't get my first wedding anniversary picture until the day after."

FHS Play Wins Nod In 2-AAA

Friona High School won the District 2-AAA contest play competition for the second year in a row Tuesday at Tulia. It marked the fifth time in six years for the FHS play to be a district winner.

FHS Speech and Drama coach Joy Morton has had eight district-winning UIL contest plays, and Friona plays have been named alternate to regional on three other occasions.

Friona's production of "Madwoman of Chaillot" was tabbed to advance to the area competition on April 9 at Lubbock Cooper. Muleshoe High School's play was also selected to advance.

In taking the district honors, Friona landed "best actress" honors by Patti Hinton, and landed two of its performers on the all-star cast. They were David Small and Cindy Drake. In addition, Sheila Gresham was named honorable mention for the all-star cast.

Muleshoe produced "The Royal Hunt of the Sun," and landed "best actor," one all-star cast member and two honorable mention spots.

Judge for the district event was Dr. J. Richard Waite, head of the theatre department at Eastern New Mexico University.

Dr. Waite liked the visual comedy in Friona's play. He said "You have the play in good shape, but I would like to see a little more energy. Overall, a very good show!"

All six district schools presented plays in the competition. Other plays were as follows: Littlefield--"The Runner Stumbles;" Tulia--"The Lark," (selected as alternate to area); Abernathy--"The Girl In The Mirror" and Dimmitt--"Eternal Life."

Farmers Go For PIK Program In Big Way

Parmer County farmers went for the PIK (Payment In Kind) program in a big way, according to figures released this week by the Parmer County ASCS office.

Figures released Tuesday indicated that 95.5 per cent of the county's farmers responded to the government program and signed up to lay out a total of 117,686 acres of their 1982 crop.

Unofficially, this amounts to 26.7 per cent of the county's cropland for corn, grain sorghum, wheat and cotton.

Nationwide, 78 per cent of the country's corn and grain sorghum farmers signed up, with 39.5 per cent signing for the full 50 per cent diversion; 88 per cent of the cotton farmers signed, with 44 per cent going for the full diversion, and 86.2 per cent of the wheat growers signing up.

For the statistical count, corn and grain sorghum acres were tallied together.

In Parmer County, farmers with an acreage base of 439,341, enrolled 419,881 of these acres, or 95.5 per cent, in the PIK program.

A total of 1,112 farmers enrolled 197,721 acres of corn-grain sorghum land of the 202,106 acre base, or a whopping 97.8 per cent. Farmers indicated they would lay out 58,432 acres of corn-grain sorghum, or 28.9 per cent of the county's base acreage.

Cotton farmers, 764 of them, enrolled 102,669 acres of the county's 105,630 acre base in the PIK

program, tabbing a total of 30,304 acres for layout, or 28.6 per cent of the base.

Wheat farmers (912 in all) enrolled 119,491 acres of the county's 131,605-acre total, and earmarked 28,950 acres for layout, or 21.9 per cent of the total base.

As expected, the wheat crop had the lightest participation, due

probably to better than average start for the 1982 crop.

USDA officials reported Tuesday that more than one-third of the nation's farmland, and almost one-half of Texas' farmland will be idled by the PIK program, in which the government will pay farmers with commodities in return for laying out their land.

Those who have established their eligibility for the cheese are required to sign their name and Social Security numbers.

The cheese distribution will be held subject to weather conditions.

School will be out the entire week, March 28 through April 1, and will resume at the regular time on Monday, April 4.

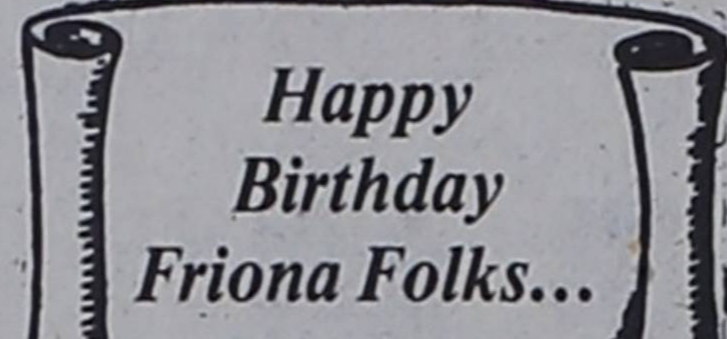

Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1928

J.B. Scott, superintendent of the Texas Utilities Company at Plainview and Fred Oberthier, superintendent of the Hereford plant, were in Bovina Wednesday afternoon and made arrangements with the people of that progressive little city to install a system of electric lights. The system to be installed there will be very similar to the plant and method of operation that is installed here.

45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 8, 1938

F.W. Reeve was re-elected as mayor of Friona in the city election here Tuesday. Reeve received 42 votes, to 34 for J.A. Blackwell. F.L. Spring and Carl C. Maurer were elected as members of the city commission. Votes were 60 for Spring, 45 for Maurer, 25 for T.J. Crawford and 20 for O.F. Lange. Spring and Reeve have each served two terms on the city council.

40 YEARS AGO--APRIL 2, 1943

The War Bond sale drive which was sponsored here last Tuesday by the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary resulted in sale of \$15,000 worth of bonds, it was announced this week.

The big Army bomber plane which made a forced landing in a wheat field about 13 miles southeast of Friona some four weeks ago and which has been guarded while awaiting parts for repair, was pronounced air-worthy again last Saturday, and soared away under its own power.

35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 2, 1948

Maurice Gaede of the Friona 4-H Club, showed the grand champion calf in the Parmer County FFA 4-H Club fat stock show at Farwell on Saturday, March 20. Clyde Hays of the Black 4-H Club showed the grand champion pig, a Hampshire. Hays' pig also placed first in its class at the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show in Lubbock.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 2, 1953

The Friona track and field team took high point honors this week in

the District 19-B track and field meet held on the local track. The win rounded out a year of championships in football, basketball and track for the local athletes.

Mary Tatum of Black exhibited the grand champion steer in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show last weekend. Truman McKillip of Farwell had the grand champion barrow.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 3, 1958

Members of the Friona Boosters Club announced having reached a goal of \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing a new public address system for the Friona High School football field.

J.W. Baxter, standout on the Friona track team, cleared the bar at 5'8 1/4" in the high jump event of the district track meet Saturday at Farwell. This jump tied the record but seconds later the Chief trackster soared 5'9 1/4" to establish a new one.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1963

A total of 219 persons attended the annual conference of District 8 Parent-Teachers Association in Friona last Thursday.

With no opposition and no organized write-in campaign, Tuesday's city election passed almost unnoticed in some corners. Three new councilmen, J.E. (Ed) Hicks, Glen C. Stevick and Joe Talley were elected with only 55 persons casting ballots.

15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1968

Friona High School debaters swept first place honors in the District 3-AA contests last Saturday at Dimmitt. The girls team of Becky Coffey and Terri Sue Cummings and the winning boys combo, Bobby Thomas and David Reeve are regional qualifiers.

Tyler Vance, staff photographer for the Friona Star, had several pictures winning high awards at the District 6 meeting of the Vocational Clubs of America in Lubbock. Of the seven pictures he entered, Vance received four "excellent" ribbons, one "very good" and two "good."

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1973

The Community Center-Showbarn fund continued to edge slowly upward during the past week. A report Tuesday from Jerry Hinkle indicated that as of that date, the fund total stood at \$44,866.15.

The affect of the "beef boycott" by Eastern housewives has not been apparent at Friona's Missouri Beef Packers' plant. The plant had a "regular" day on Monday, killing over 1400 head of cattle.

5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 2, 1978

A Friona crop duster was killed Sunday afternoon when his plane crashed just south of Friona. Killed was John D. Walter, 56. The plane burned completely. Walter, an employee of Bengier Aero Spraying, hit a power line, causing the crash. Both the cities of Friona and Bovina had electrical power interrupted for 40 minutes following the crash.

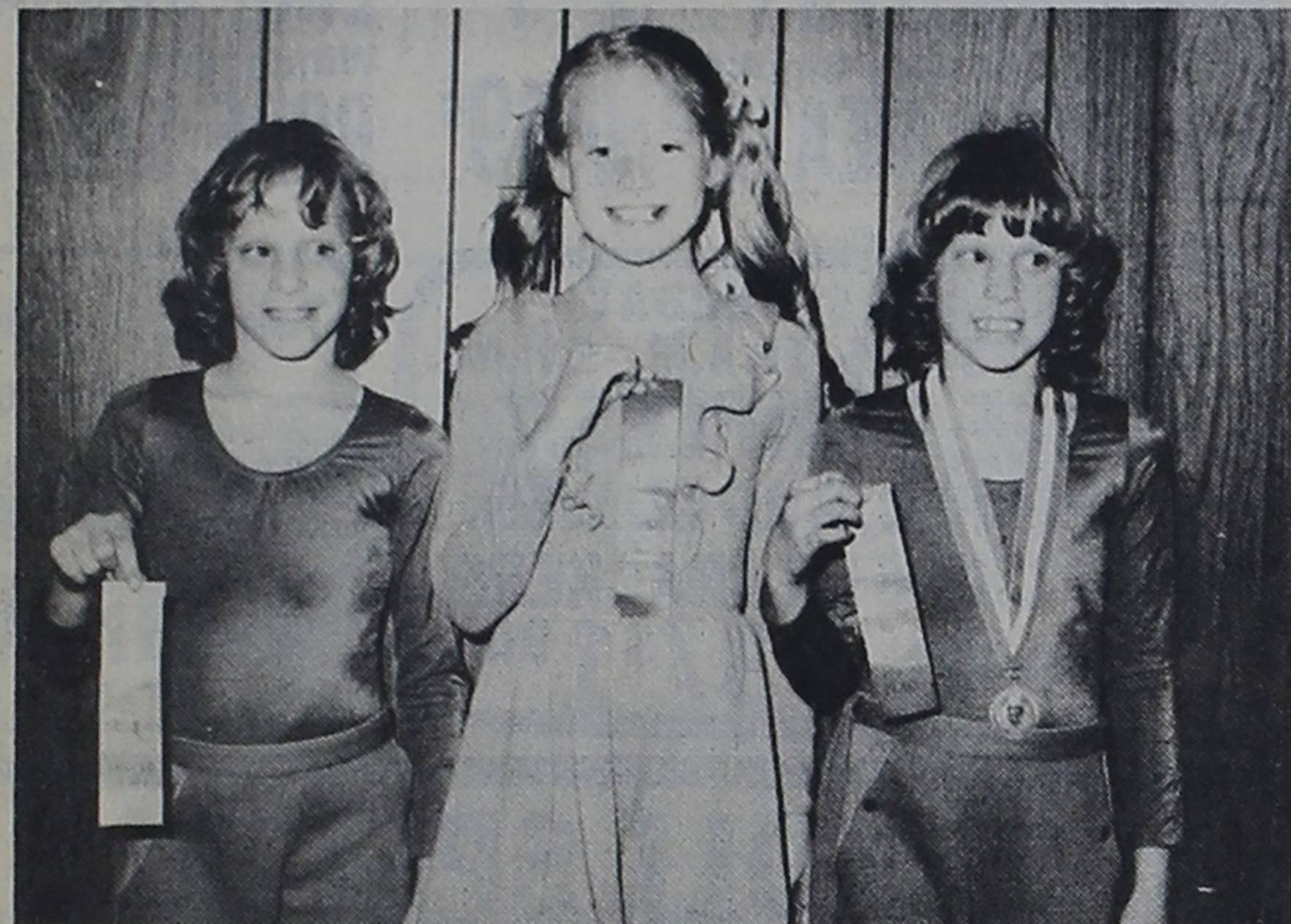

Those attending the banquet enjoyed a meal of barbecued beef and the trimmings. Providing dinner music at the piano was Sarita Ellis.

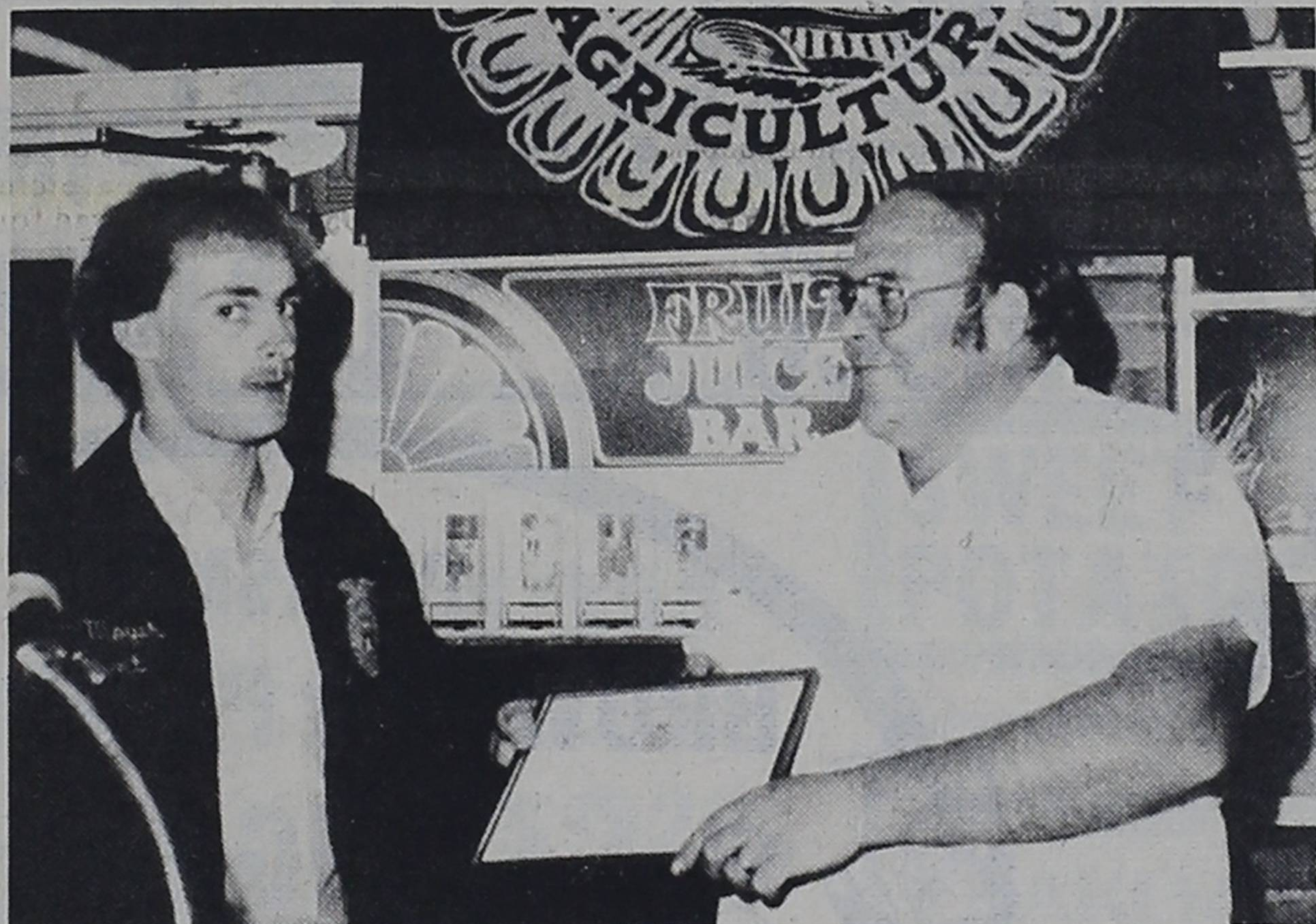
Elementary Kids Win

A rummage sale to raise funds for the Good Samaritan Home is being planned for this spring as the 1983 project.

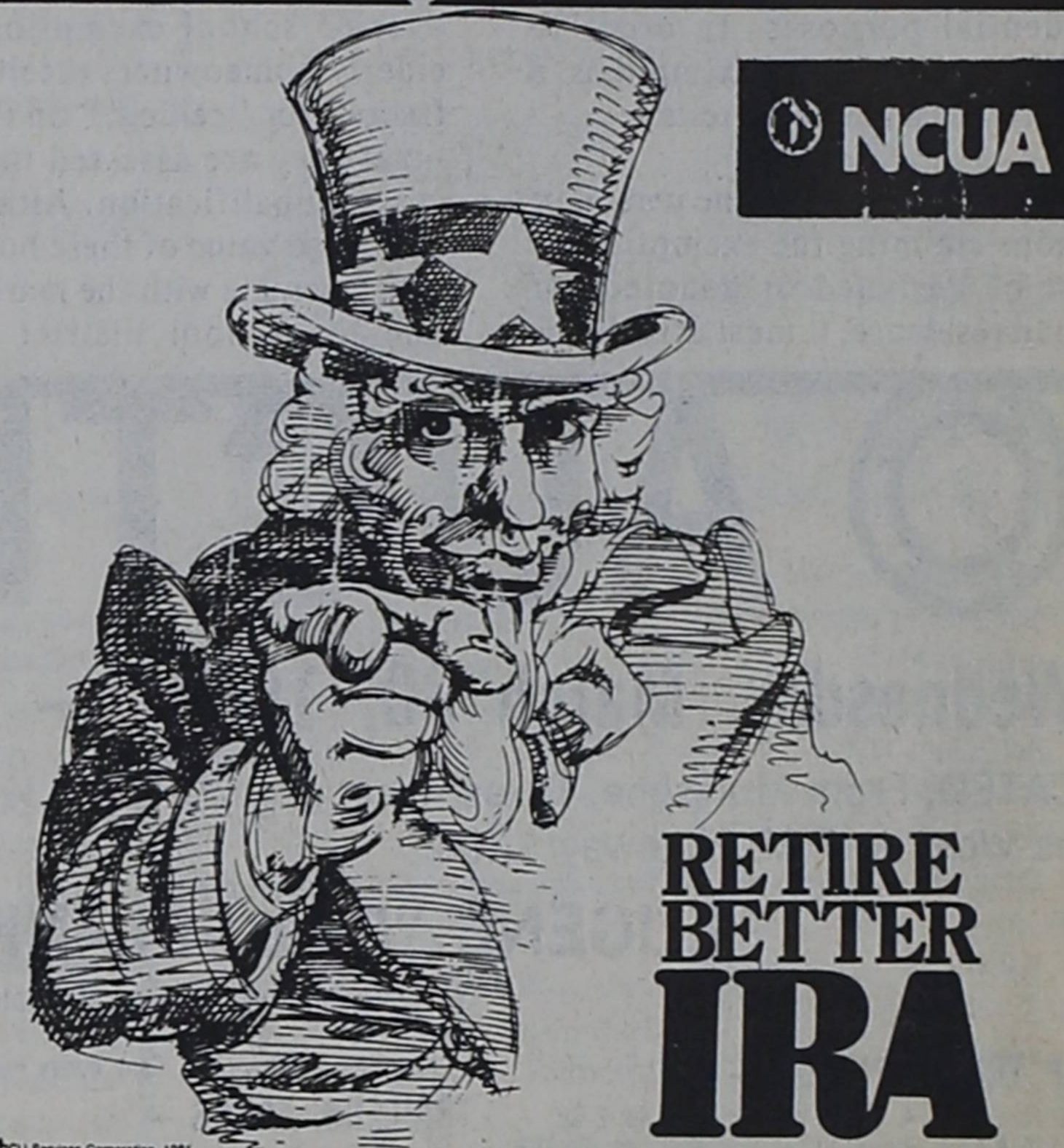

WHAT ARE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains exemptions.

A homestead exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of your residence homestead. Various types of homestead exemptions are available in Texas and, if you qualify, they can reduce your total property tax bill. Read on for details.

What Exemptions Are Available?

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are disabled or over 65.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly.

Cities and other taxing districts may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All local taxing units offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property. Additionally, many taxing units offer a local option, percentage homestead exemption to resident homeowners.

How Do I Apply?

Applications for the disabled veterans' exemption must be filed annually with the county appraisal district office.

For other exemptions, if you received a residence homestead exemption on your present homestead in 1982, it will not be necessary for you to make a new application for 1983 in this appraisal district.

If you were 65 or disabled on January 1 and have not previously

filed for the over-65 or disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application this year.

Or, if you have never received a homestead exemption on your present home, an original application should be filed in 1983.

Applications should be made to the county appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available from the appraisal office.

Is There a Deadline?

For 1983, applications should be filed on or before May 2. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in certain instances, you can fully protect your rights by applying before the May 2 rendition deadline.

The State Property Tax Board has a pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, to help you understand your local property taxes. Get a free copy at the appraisal district office or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

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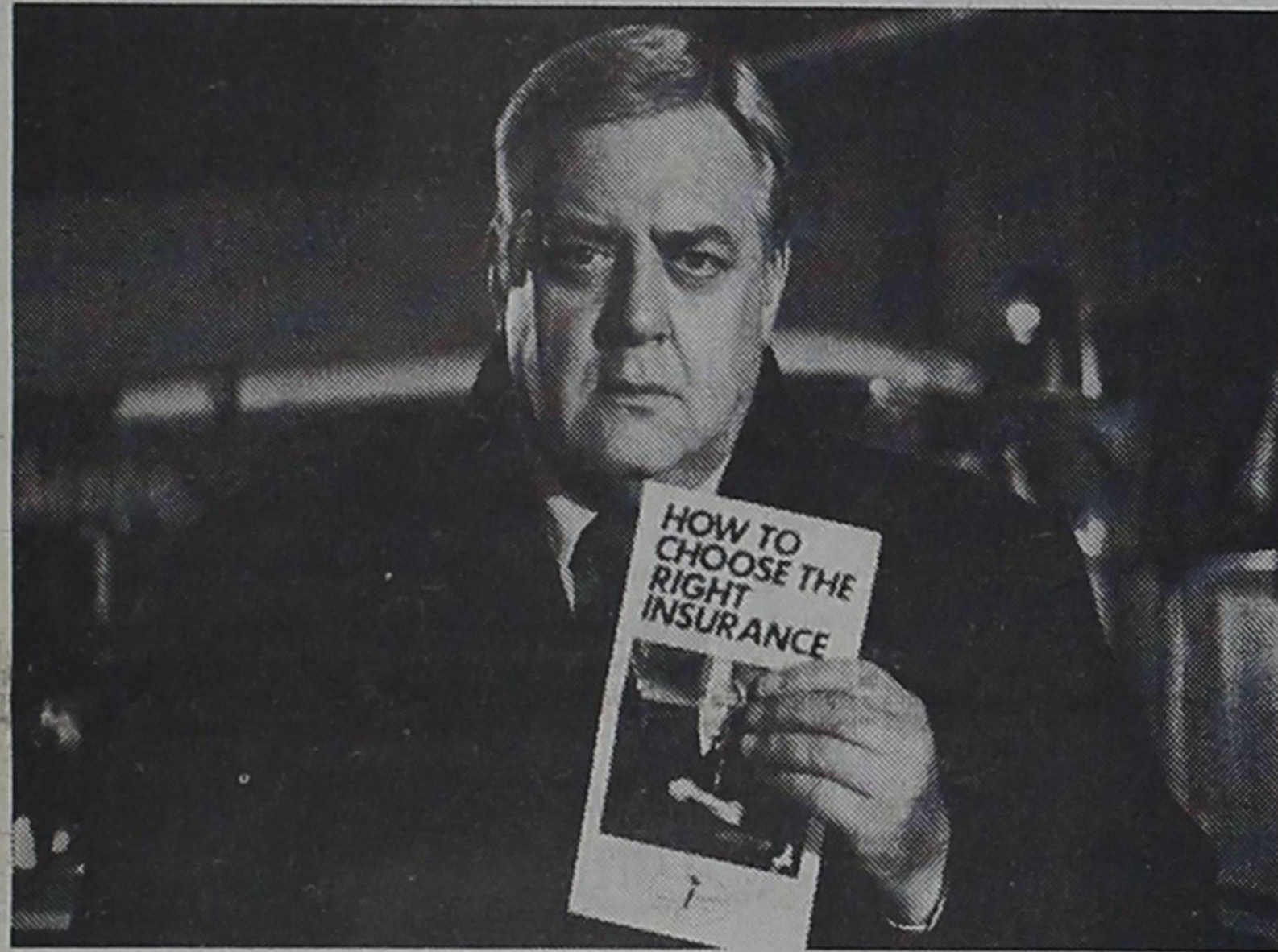

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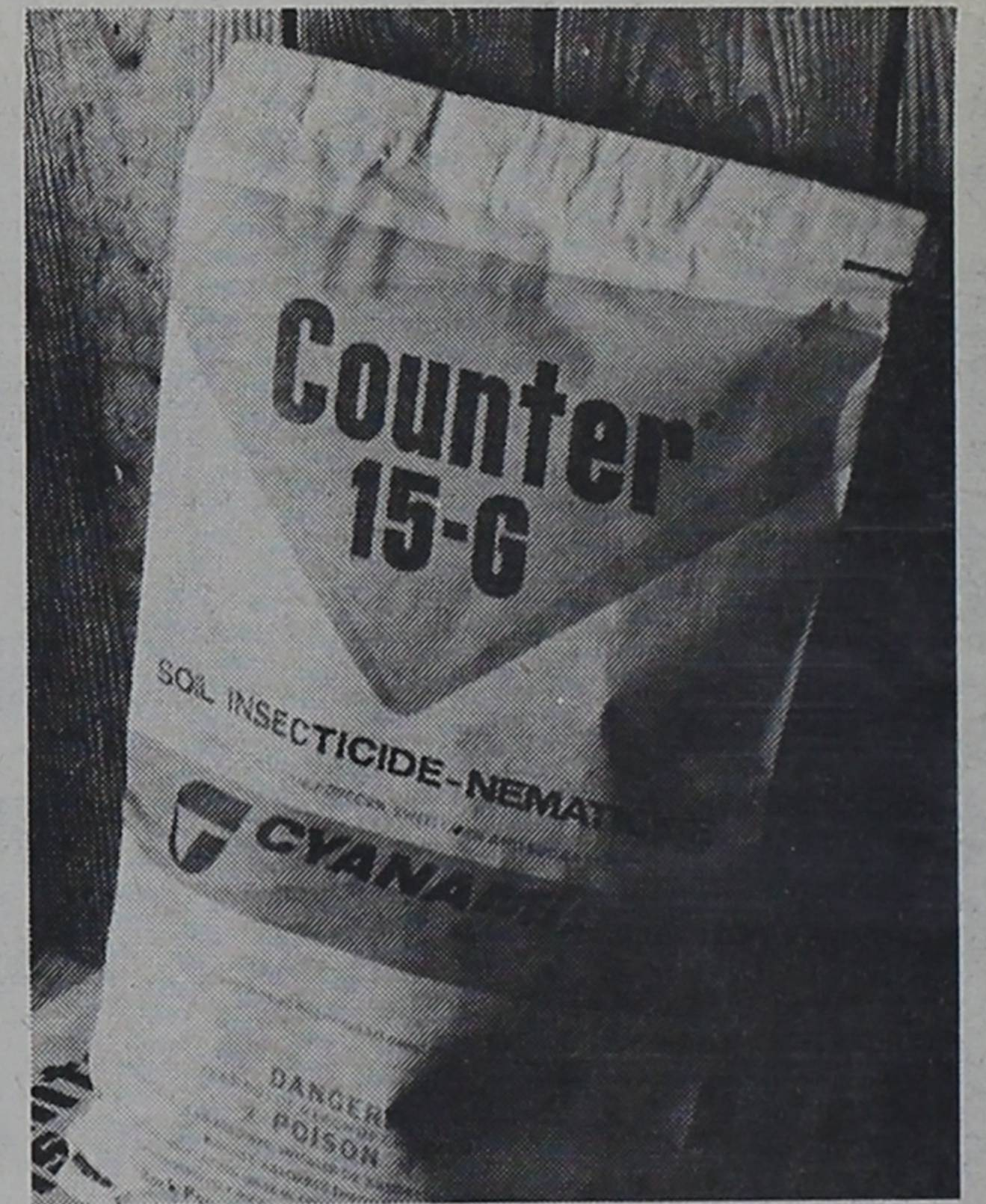
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Two Frionans Make TCU Honor List
