Don Spring Wins Football Contest

FHS, Steers Renew Series

When the Friona Chieftains visited Farwell Friday, they were renewing one of their oldest rivalries, and one of the oldest in the area.

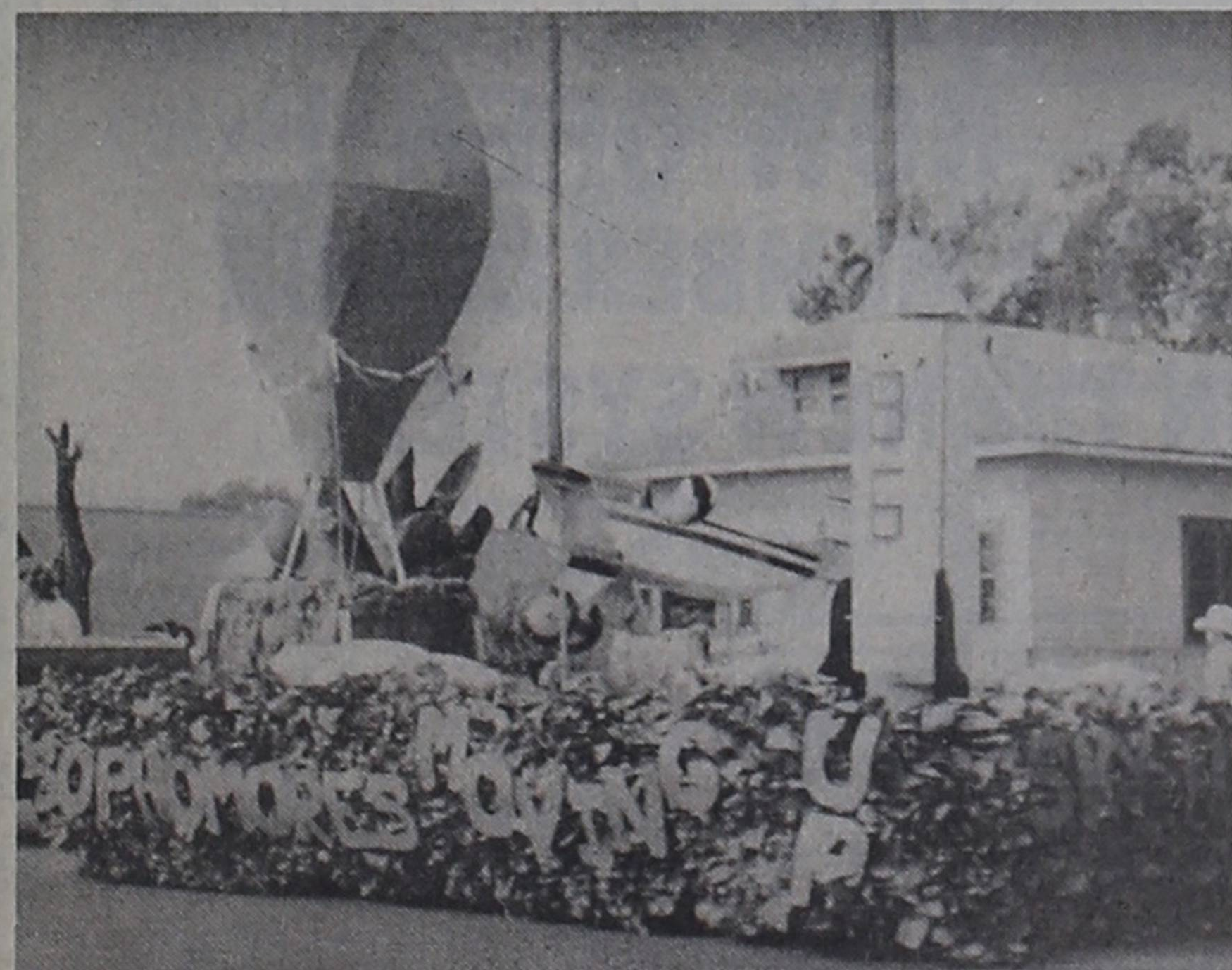
The teams have been meeting in football since 1928, and Friday's game was the 47th renewal of the series. Friona had won ten of the past 11 games between the two county foes, and this gave the Chiefs a 24-21 edge in the all-time mark; and in addition, one game ended in a tie.

Their current problem, though, was how to stop the Steers' high-powered offense, led by quarterback Alan Eubanks. Farwell entered the game as the top offensive team in the area for class AA teams, averaging 420 yards per game.

Friona, meanwhile, ranks in the top six teams for class AAA with 302 yards per outing. So fans likely saw the ball move considerably, unless the teams called on their best defensive efforts.

Friona was expected to be at near full strength. Mitchell Reeve was questionable with an ankle injury, and runningback Alfredo Mata was nagged with a sprained thumb. Otherwise, the rest of the team was expected to be ready.

Next Friday, the team begins play in tough District 2-AAA by visiting the Tullia Hornets. Going into the last round of non-district action, District 2-AAA teams had the best overall record of any district in the Panhandle area, with 17 wins, only five losses, and two ties.

Don Spring of Bovina was the winner of the fourth week's contest in the Friona Star football contest.

Spring was the only contestant entering the weekly contest to pick as many as 17 games correctly, and won the weekly \$10 prize without a "runoff."

The other contestant correctly picking 16 games was Mary Jo Leonard of Canadian. Her tie-breaker prediction was 23-14, missing by 16 total points.

Once again, the weekly contest contained a tie game, as the Muleshoe-Idalou tilt ended in a scoreless standoff. Every contestant automatically received a "wrong" designation on this game, leaving 21 as the best possible score.

Eight contestants correctly picked 15 games, missing out on one of the cash prizes by just one game. This

group included Michael Chaney of Abilene, Linda Drake, Lee Roy Nuttall, Ron Smiley, Movelda Fortenberry, Dianne Morgan, Isabel Santellana and Mollie Warren.

Smiley's score of 15 pulled him into a five-way tie for the lead in the contest standings with a score of 58. He is joined at the top by Tammy Bush, Bobby Davis, Patches Fleming and Mike Maynard.

Roger Fields and Joe Jackson are tied two points back at 56.

Kevin Beavers, Linda Drake, Movelda Fortenberry and Hal Ratcliff are on the next plateau with scores of 55.

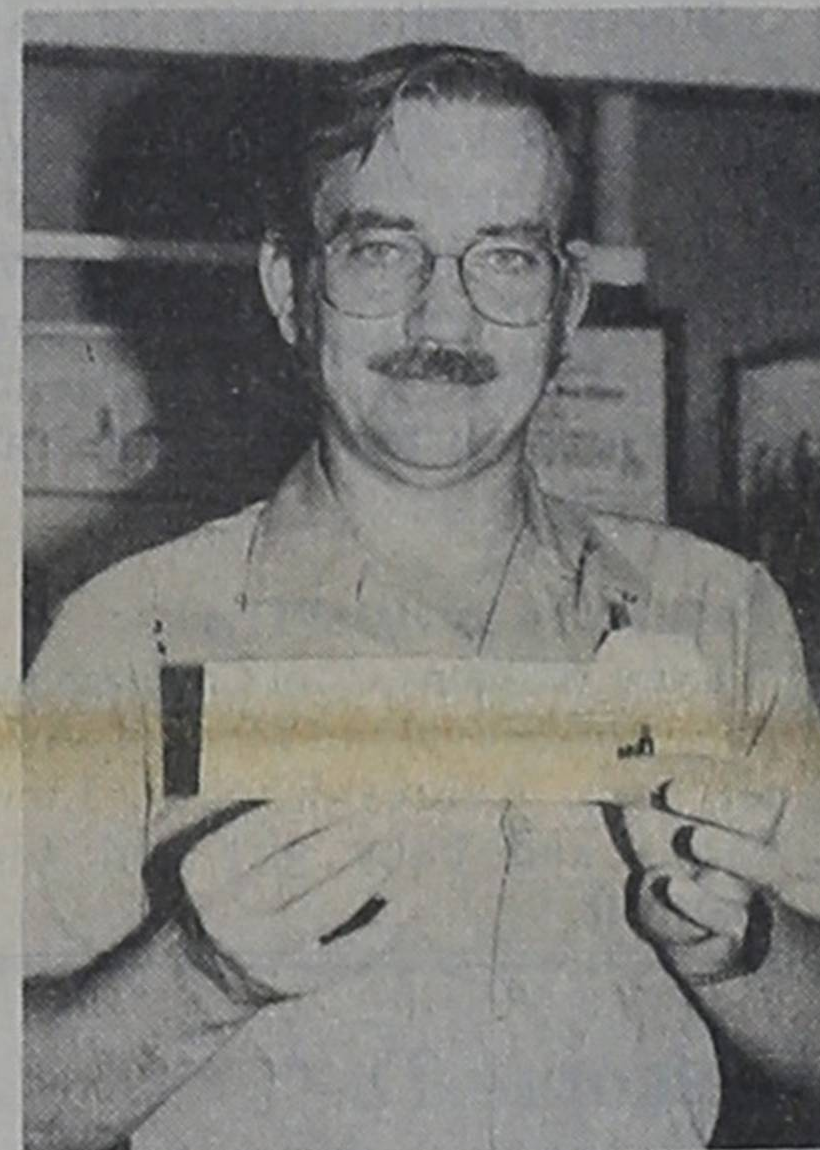

SWCD Sets Election On October 4

An election for a director to serve in Zone Five on the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 4 in Lazbuddie at Foster's Fertilizer announced M.C. Osborn, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 9 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone five of the district takes in all the land in the Lazbuddie School District

Current members of the board of directors of the Parmer County SWCD are M.C. Osborn of Friona, chairman; Raymond Schueler of Rhea, vice-chairman; Phillip Johnson of Hub, secretary-treasurer; Troy Christian of Farwell, member; and Mike Miller of Lazbuddie, member.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

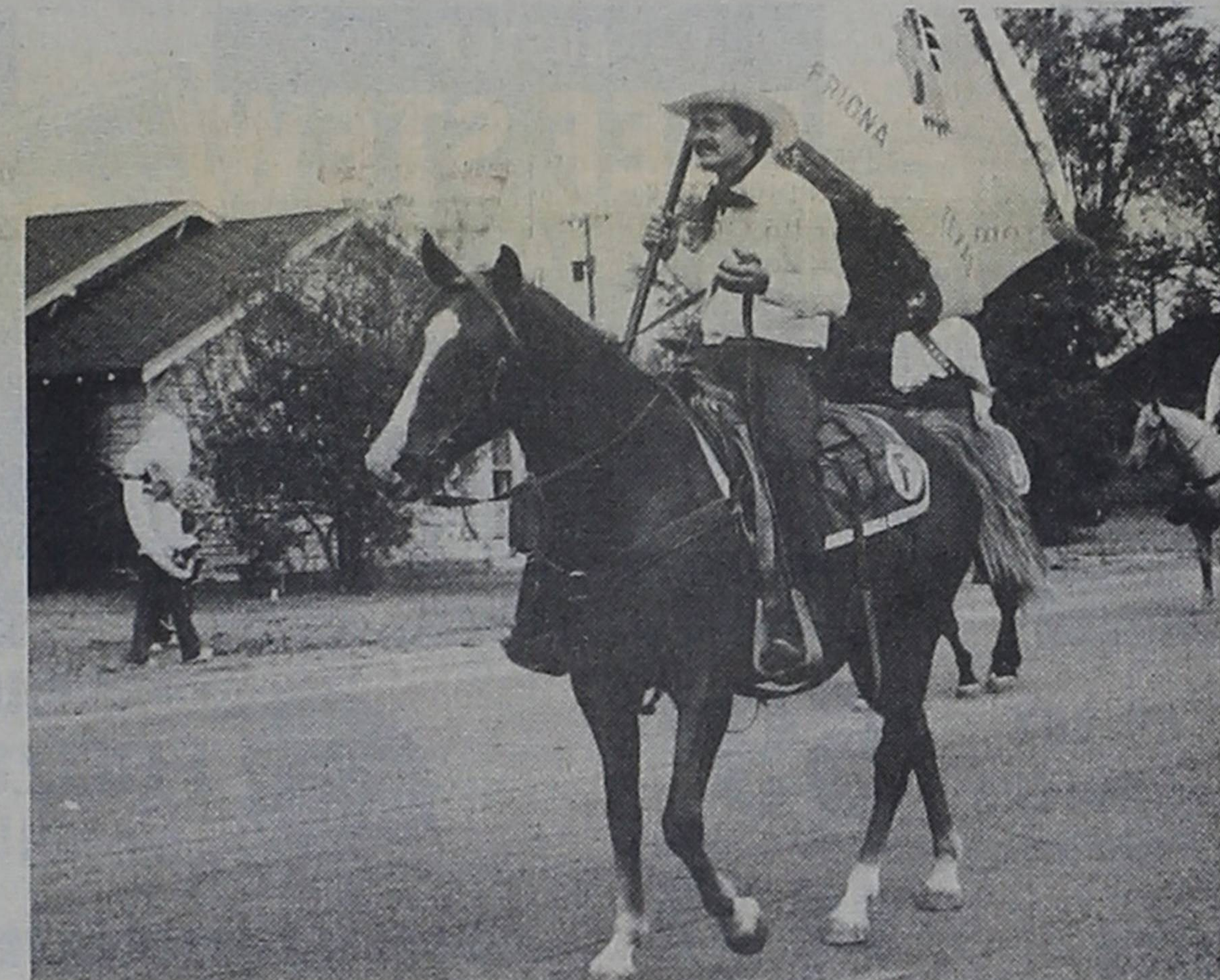
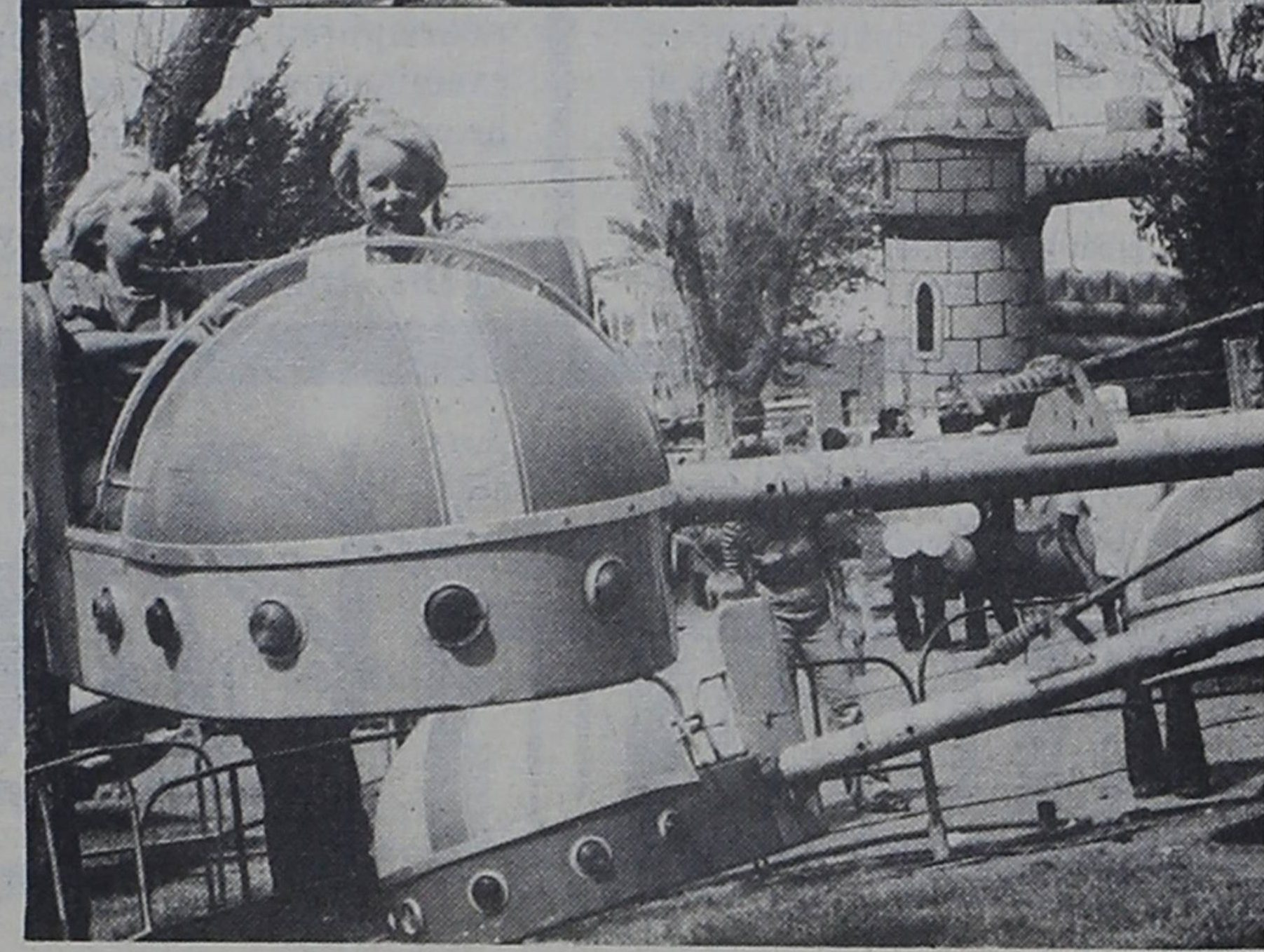
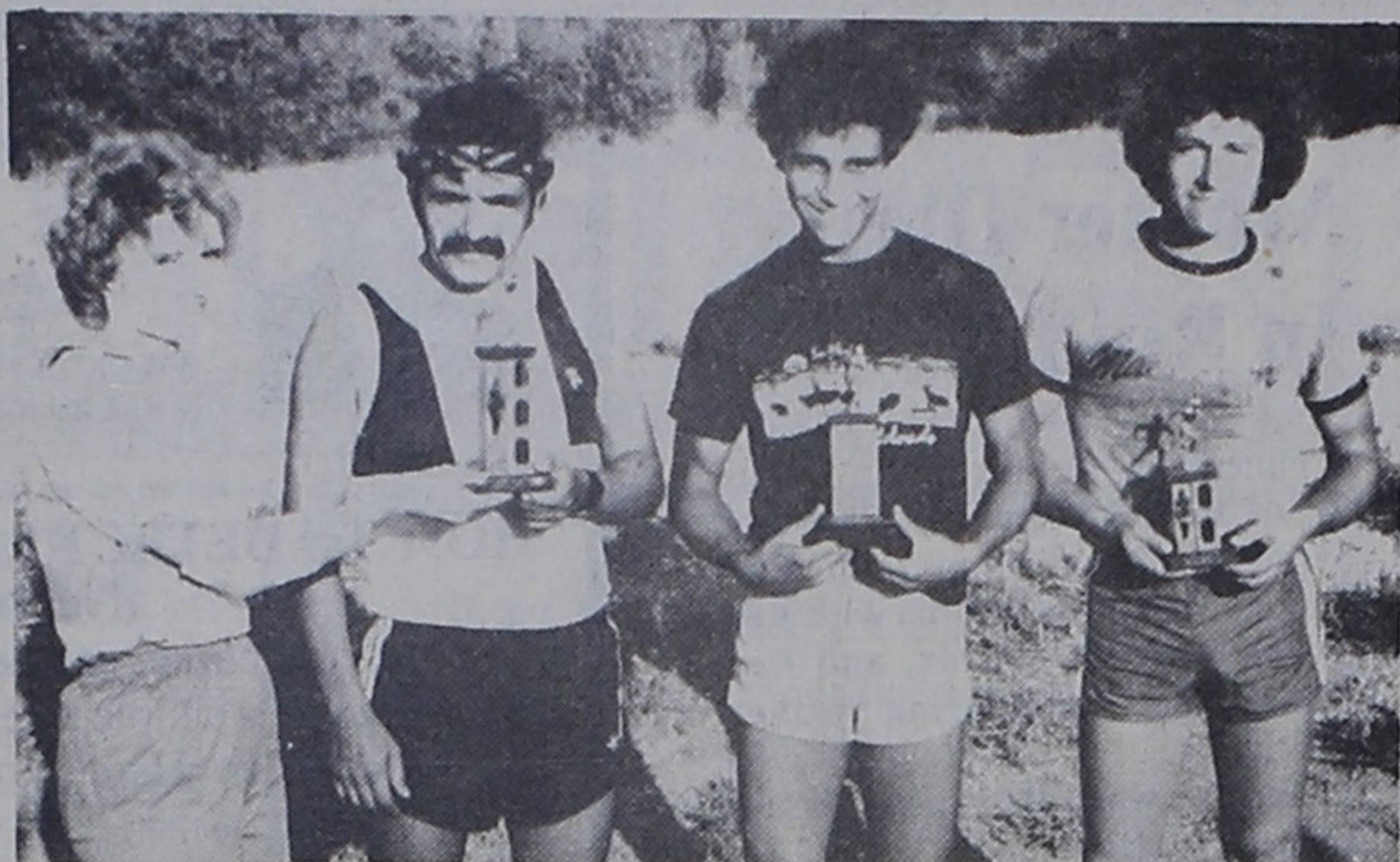

Chiefs Topple Dalhart In Homecoming Win

Down through the years, Dalhart football teams have been noted for their tough defensive play.

Last Friday at Chieftain Field before a huge Homecoming crowd, the Friona Chieftains gave the Dalhart Wolves a good lesson in defense, thrilling the home crowd in a 21-0 win.

The Chieftain defense intercepted two Dalhart passes, recovered three fumbles, and held the Wolves to minus two yards during the opening half, while staking themselves to a 14-0 lead. During the game, Friona's swarming defense, paced by first-time starter Daniel Govens, accounted for 48 yards in losses.

Early in the fourth period, with the Chieftains still clinging to its 14-0 lead, but the visitors threatening to score, a big defensive play by John Aguirre not only stopped the Dalhart threat, but paved the way to an eventual clinching Friona touchdown.

The two teams traded fumbles in the early part of the game. Eloy Caballero claimed a Dalhart fumble at the Wolves' 19 yard line on the third play from scrimmage. However, two plays later Friona returned the favor.

However, Reese Fleming gave the Homecoming crowd something to cheer about by sprinting 30 yards for a touchdown the next time Friona had the ball. Doug Carthel's kick gave Friona the lead, just 4:26 into the opening quarter.

Late in the quarter, a Ricky Barnett punt backed the Wolves up to their own 15, and got them in a hole from which they could not recover.

Getting the ball back, Charlie Morgan gave the team a pair of first downs to the 28. Alfredo Mata ran for another first down to the Dalhart 14.

But a penalty against the Chiefs stalled the drive, and Dalhart took over.

Friona claimed its second fumble recovery at this point, getting the ball back at the Dalhart 21.

Morgan and Mata gave Friona a first and goal at the Dalhart nine. Three plays gained to the Dalhart two, when it seemed the traditional Wolf defense might hold Friona out.

Court Talks About Roof Situation

Parmer County Commissioners discussed the needed repairs to the roof of the court house at their regular meeting Monday, September 26.

Louis Lea of Leaway Roofing Co., Hereford, met with the court, to assist them in making a decision as to the type of roof job needed by the structure.

At the suggestion of Benna Felts, county treasurer, a motion was passed to reinvest \$100,000 of a \$150,000 certificate of deposit from the county's "General Fund," which matured September 30, the new C.D. to mature October 31, 1983.

Also, it was voted to combine \$100,000 from a Right-of-way Fund C.D., which matured September 30 with \$67,000 in the R-O-W checking account to make a \$167,000 certificate, to mature October 31, 1983.

These new certificates will earn the county some additional income before they are used for their budgeted expenses.

In other business, a motion was passed to pay the county's dues to the National Association of Counties, in the amount of \$230.00.

Bernard Gowens of Brown, Graham and Company of Friona, presented the annual audit report on the county finances for the year 1982. A motion was passed to approve the report and the bill of \$5,400.00.

After a discussion of items which needed to be added to the county's budget for 1984, it was voted to set the county's tax rate at \$.309 per \$100 valuation, which is the same tax rate as for 1983.

A county resident appeared before the court, seeking aid on medical bills which they were unable to pay. After some discussion, it was agreed to pay \$155.50 toward the expenses.

A motion was passed approving soil conservation work whenever county equipment is not needed for road work, such work to be reimbursed to the county. Work was approved for the farms of Thomas Rhodes, Floyd Dameron, Buttons Howard and Don Geries.

But on fourth down, Morgan slipped into the end zone for the vital TD. Carthel's kick made the score Friona 14-0 with 5:19 left in the half.

Friona took the second half kickoff and drove from their own 28 to the Dalhart 41 sparked by Morgan's running, before a bad pitchout cost the team on a third and three situation.

The Wolves came up with a 19-yard pass play, its longest gain to that point, then were forced to punt. Later, Michael Thompson got loose on a 44-yard jaunt up the sidelines to the Friona 36. Another pass play gained to the Friona 13, and the Wolves were threatening to make the game close.

However, two passes fell incomplete (each one almost intercepted) before Aguirre stepped in front of a Dalhart receiver at the goal-line, picked off the pass and sprinted up the west sidelines 56 yards to the Dalhart 44.

Friona punted, and once again, disaster struck the visitors. A pitchout went wild, and Friona claimed it at the Dalhart one. Morgan raced in from here, and the kick made the score 21-0. Just a few minutes earlier, the Wolves had been threatening to make the score 14-7, so this just about broke their backs.

Chief JVs Edged Out By 'Faces

The Chieftain Junior Varsity played a good game against the Hereford Sophomore team last Thursday at Hereford.

Friona jumped out ahead and led the game, 14-0 at halftime, but the Hereford team rallied for a 21-14 win. The Hereford team had been champions of their class 5A district as freshmen.

Brad Moyer carried the ball 21 times for 125 yards. He scored both Friona touchdowns. He scored from 21 yards out in the first period, and then ran for the two-point conversion and Friona led, 8-0. The drive used less than three minutes in the opening period.

Wendell Woodruff ran 29 yards to the Hereford one to set up Friona's second score. Moyer again went over, for a 14-0 Friona lead.

But Hereford got tough in the second half and shut Friona down, while scoring three times. The hosts intercepted a Friona screen pass and ran it down to the five-yard line to set up the winning TD.

The loss left the Chieftain JV with a 1-1-1 season record. Woodruff gained 73 yards in seven plays. Jeff Brown completed two of five passes for Friona.

Coach Mike Speck said Hereford had a huge team, and was proud of his team's play.

Friona had the ball at the Dalhart 34 with reserves taking over, and tried a 51-yard field goal (by Robert Escalante), but the kick fell short.

The win snapped a four-game winning streak by Dalhart over Friona, stretching back to 1977. It's only the seventh win for the Chieftains in the series, which dates back to 1941.

Friona gained a measure of revenge for the 22-7 loss at Dalhart last year, in which game a couple of starters were hurt, and one, Mike Neill, was sidelined for the remainder of the season.

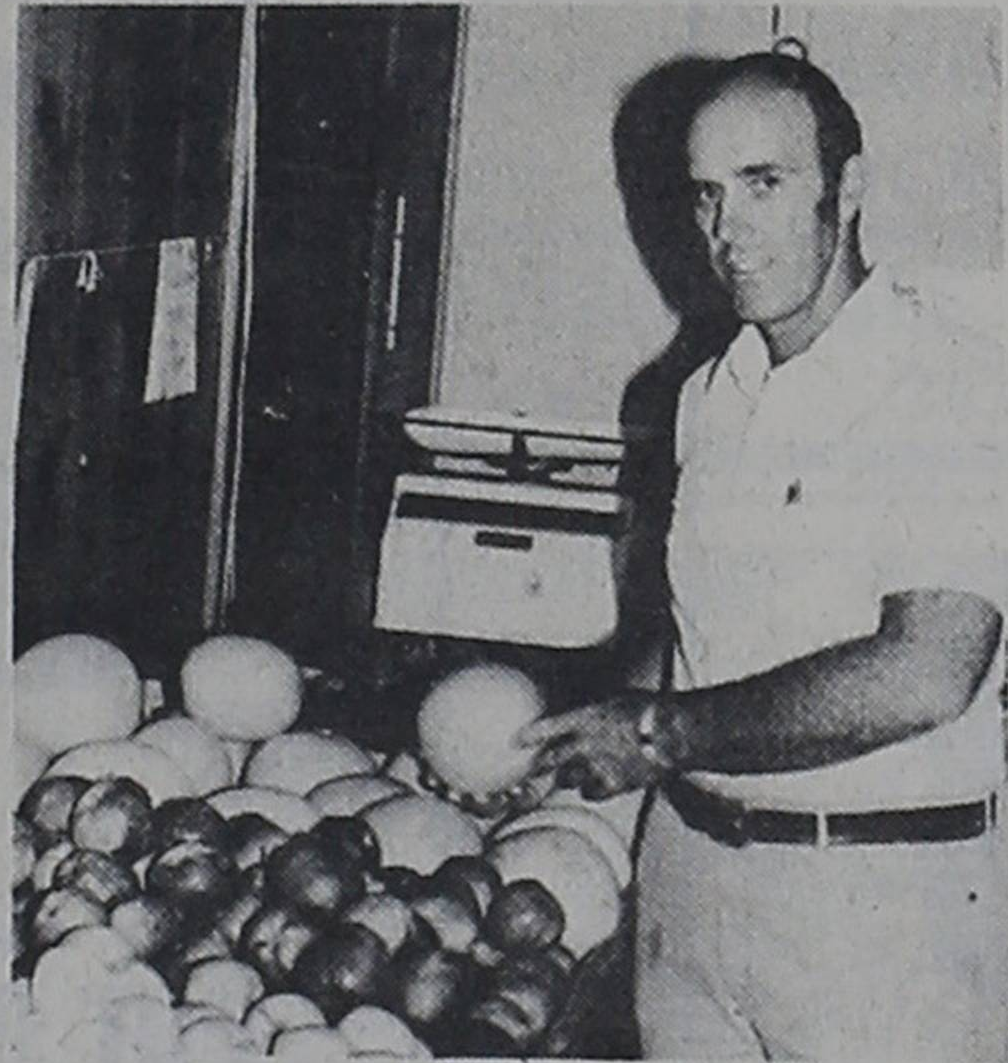

"Color Me Beautiful" will be presented as the program for the October Brown Bag Seminar at West Texas State University.

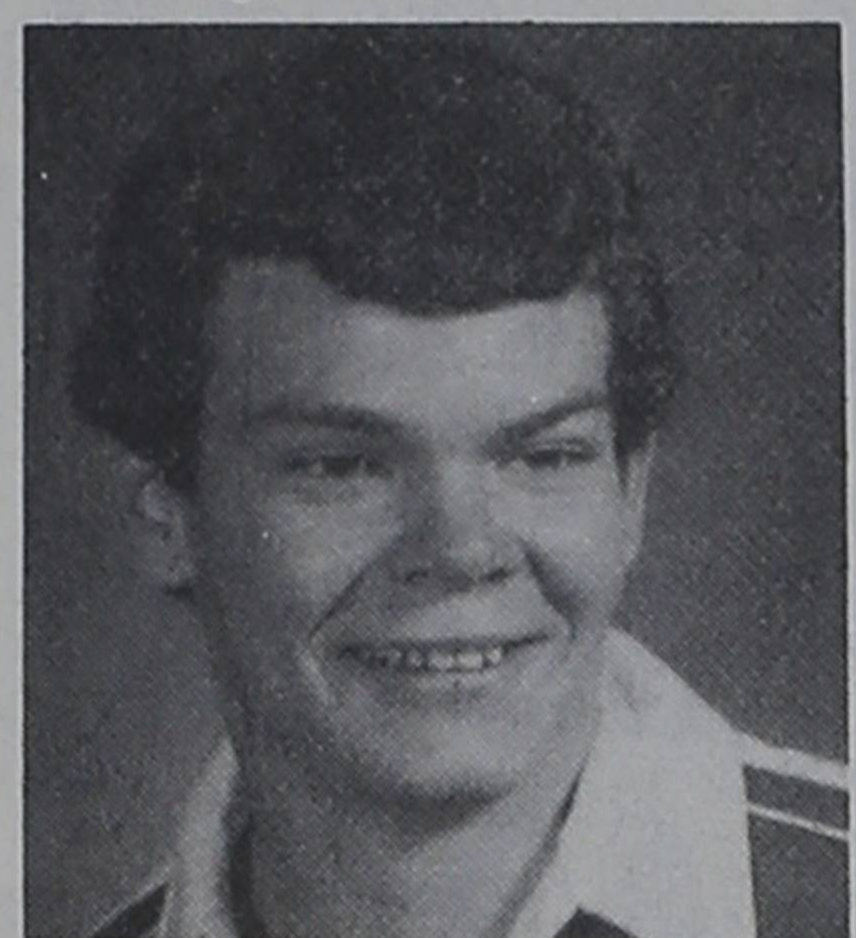

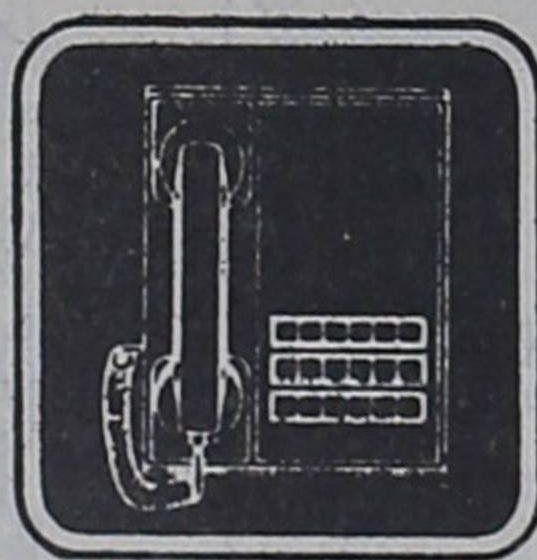


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
