## July 15 Is Last Day To Certify '83 Crop

Farmers have only a few days left the Agricultural Stabilization to the Agricultural Stabilization and certification date is July 15, 1983 . Program participants are required o report crops and acreages planted, the uses to be made of these crops and ropland acres to be devoted to onservation uses. "Nonparticipants programs," said Martin L. Chandler, County Executive Director. In addition to history purposes, the acreage reports are also necessary for proven yields.
ASCS will randomly check farms to verify that acreage reports are available for farmers to identify their fields. To be sure of planted acres, armers can request measurement service. For a small fee a farmer can
request that his planted crops be measured prior to reporting acreages. "This is a valuable service not only to producers participating in the acreage eduction and payment-in-kind programs, but to any farmer who desires an accurate acreage
measurement for any reason," said Chandler.
Crop certification is necessary before the farmer can receive price
support and other program benefits.

Yyatt explains indicate that recent water to the High Plains at this time is not economically feasible due to the cost of water importation exceeding $\$ 500$ per acre foot, and, complicating this problem, the water imported would be used to increase production
of agricultural products which are already in surplus supply. Wyatt does not expect the water plan to include identification of any sources of wate for importation to the High Plains nor routes, nor cost data mendation in the plan to the people of the High Plains and West Texa will be that, given the limited water resources available, the only alternative to running short of water,
at least for the immediate future conservation.
Undoubtedly there are many in the area, like the Water District staff, who have ideas and special problem which need to be brought to the
