AT FIRST, WE THOUGHT that the fact that outspoken anti-communist representative MacDonald was aboard the Korean 007 airliner which was shot down by the Russians had to be a matter of coincidence. You just don't expect that an enemy, no matter how athestic, would shoot down an airliner carrying 269 people just to get rid of one anti-communist. But at least one letter-writer to the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe begs to differ. We quote herewith excerpts from a letter by Bradley Upton of Solano, New Mexico: "The fact that they had to kill 268 others to get him meant nothing to a murdering bunch of thugs that have murdered 144 million people all over the world. It probably didn't bother their conscience one bit. "Rep. MacDonald was chairman of the ultra conservative, pro-American, anti-communist John Birch Society. Getting the head man out of the most anti-communist group in the world may have looked like a good idea to them. Hopefully, the idea will blow up in their faces." Did the Russians shoot down the airliner just to get one individual, who dared to oppose them and all they stood for? It's hard for Americans, raised in a God-fearing atmosphere, to accept such a premise, but if you consider the communist angle, where the "ends" supposedly justify the "means," then we suppose this might not be such a far-out charge. The world may never know all of the facts surrounding the mysterious downing of the Korean airliner. In fact, it might be shocking to a large number of people if they did know the details. But the fact remains that it's a tragic affair anytime a group of peaceful citizens, including women and children, are killed, for no worse a crime than the airliner getting off course and over the Russians' air space.

# Elizabeth McLellan Is Week's Football Champ

Three contestants weathered the storm of upsets to claim the cash prizes in the third week of the Friona Star's annual fall football contest.

Elizabeth McLellan, Tammy Bush and Bobby Davis were the top three placers in the weekly event, although a fourth contestant joined them in the running for a cash prize, Johnny McLellan. All four contestants correctly picked 16 of the 22 contest games.

The tie-breaker score, pitting Friona against Shallowater, was used to determine the top places.

Mrs. McLellan missed the score by 20 points, picking the Chieftains to win, 14-7. Miss Bush took second with her score prediction of 20-12, missing by 21 points, and Davis placed third, 24 points away, with his prediction of 21-10. Johnny McLellan missed out on a cash prize, but was close to the others. He picked Friona to win, 21-8, missing the actual score by 26 points. In the group of college games, the game listed as TCU at Kansas was an error, since TCU played Kansas State, and was counted correct on every contestant's entry blank. Conversely, the Arizona State-UCLA game ended in a tie, so this game was counted wrong on every entry, since it is possible (although highly risky) for a contestant to pick a



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



The Chieftains were penalized twelve times for 106 yards, and it would have been 135 yards, except that once the team received a major penalty on its own one-yard line, and you can't get blood out of a turnip. Another time, Shallowater refused the penalty.

A win would have given the Chiefs a 3-0 mark for the first time in nine years.





Dues to the Panhandle County Judge's and Commissioners Association, \$40,00, were approved for payment.



# **Emergency Fund, Red Cross On UW List**

(Editor's note: A part of the money collected each year by the United Way campaign stays in an account kept locally, to assist in the event of an emergency. Another beneficiary is the Red Cross.)

The Emergency Fund of Friona was put in the United Way budget several years ago, and has been in the budget every year since. This money was set aside to be used in case of a big emergency such as a tornado or other type of weather or other severe damage. It could be used to supply food or medical service during the emergency.

The Parmer County Chapter of the American Red Cross is based in Friona. The entire support from the Friona area of the county comes from the United Way campaign. Local chapter officers are Steve Bavousett, chairman; Lois Norwood, treasurer; and Marlene Drake, service to military families. The local chapter's primary ongoing activity is service to military families. Many contacts are made for service men and women and their families in time of need--usually in times of illness or death of some

family member.

The local chapter has also helped many children obtain eyeglasses, or other needed medical and dental help when no other source of funds was available. Funds for a needed trip to a doctor for elderly adults have also been provided when no other help was available.

Friona, and Parmer County, have been very fortunate that no disaster, such as tornado, has occurred; but should such happen, the local chapter would be on the job to help, along with the national organization.

One-half of the funds received remain with the local chapter, and the other one-half goes to the American National Red Cross to be used for disaster relief--such as the hurricane

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."





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
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On August 27, the Area Young Homemakers of Texas held their Area I Annual Convention and banquet in Plainview at Wayland Baptist University.


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


