City's July 4 Celebration Termed Big Success

THE POWERS THAT LIKE to shape our nation have suggested once again that Daylight Savings Time be extended from its present six months' duration, to run eight months a year.

The country attempted to operate on an extended Daylight Savings Time back during the oil crisis of 1973-74, and it just did not work out.

School children were forced to have to catch their buses (in city areas) so early in the morning that it was still dark, creating a safety hazard that previously did not exist. The street lights and bright lights of the large cities, which were supposed to be saved by DST, were having to be turned on early in the morning, instead of early evening.

There are still a lot of people who would argue that ANY Daylight Savings Time is just that many months too much. It more or less is similar to the story about the old Indian who wanted to make his blanket longer. So, he cut off one end of the blanket and sewed it to the other end.

Daylight Time has been nothing but a headache to farmers in many areas. Farmers for the most part operate on Daylight Time every summer anyway--from sunup until sundown. But during the six-month period in which Daylight Savings Time operates, they sometimes find their parts houses or stores which sell farm supplies closed earlier in the day than would be the case without DST.

Daylight Savings Time has caused a shifting of opening hours for shopping centers. Some of the stores in such centers in metropolitan areas don't even open until 10 a.m. under Daylight Time. If a person was really in need of something from one of these places early in the morning, they would just be out of luck.

The drive-in movie business, for one, has practically been ruined by the advent of Daylight Time. Summertime used to be the industry's main season, what with youngsters out of school and so forth.

But few parents want their children going to a movie that doesn't have a chance of starting before 10 p.m. A big promotion by the drive-in movies has always been double features, or two movies for the price of one. Go to a double-bill during DST, and you'll find yourself dragging home at 2 or 3 a.m., which would be approaching milking time if you owned dairy cows.

Daylight Savings Time really hasn't helped anyone to a great extent, except that segment of the population that wants to run and play more often. And, let's face it: even the folks who enjoy life in the fast lane can't possibly take advantage of DST five or six times a week. Maybe we ought to pass a law and just have Daylight Time on Fridays.

A friend of ours says that since labor unions appear to be prime instigators of the movement to extend Daylight Savings Time, he has a suggestion: "Let the unions re-negotiate their contracts, so that their members can go to work at 3 a.m. every day, and leave everyone else alone!"

Just think: those people who like the "run and play" aspect of DST could go to work at 3 a.m., work straight through to 11 a.m., and when they took off for lunch, they would have the rest of the day (and night) for their three-martini lunch, or whatever other project they might have in mind.

Our contact (who, by the way, is opposed to Daylight Savings Time), says it might be cheaper for the labor unions to re-negotiate their contracts, than to have to use millions of dollars to buy off congress, to get the lawmakers to extend Daylight Time.

Judging from participation and attendance, Friona's 1983 Fourth of July celebration was, once again, a huge success.

The Noon Lions Club's barbecue lunch kicked off the festivities, and it was a harbinger of things to come. Around 700 people were served barbecue and all the trimmings, an all-time record for the event.

"We had sold 400 advance tickets to the meal, and there were right at 300 more tickets sold at the door," said B.K. Buske, spokesman for the Lions. Before the last plates were sold, the club had run out of cole slaw, but had plenty of meat, beans and other trimmings.

"Ordinarily we have a lot of the sausage left over, to sell by the pound, but this just was not the case this time," Buske said.

The club did a good job of moving the people through the serving line, and in spite of the record turnout, the 700 holiday diners were served prior to the advertised cutoff time of 1:30 p.m.

Games and activities, both at the Community Center and at other

locations, were well entered and attended.

The fireworks display, conducted for the 14th consecutive year by the Friona Volunteer Firemen, was a good display, and was attended by an estimated 5,000 people.

The only drawback to the 1983 celebration was the windy weather, which hampered outside events throughout the day. The wind caused the volleyball tournament to be moved from an outdoor location to the junior high school gymnasium. Also, the tennis tournament was delayed for several hours Monday afternoon. This tournament played until the midnight hour a couple of nights in order to be concluded.

A couple of contestants drove all the way from Lubbock to enter the horseshoe pitching tournament, a new event on the 1983 schedule, and one of the contestants, Louis Parker, was the winner, edging new Chieftain basketball coach Oscar Bronniman in the finals.

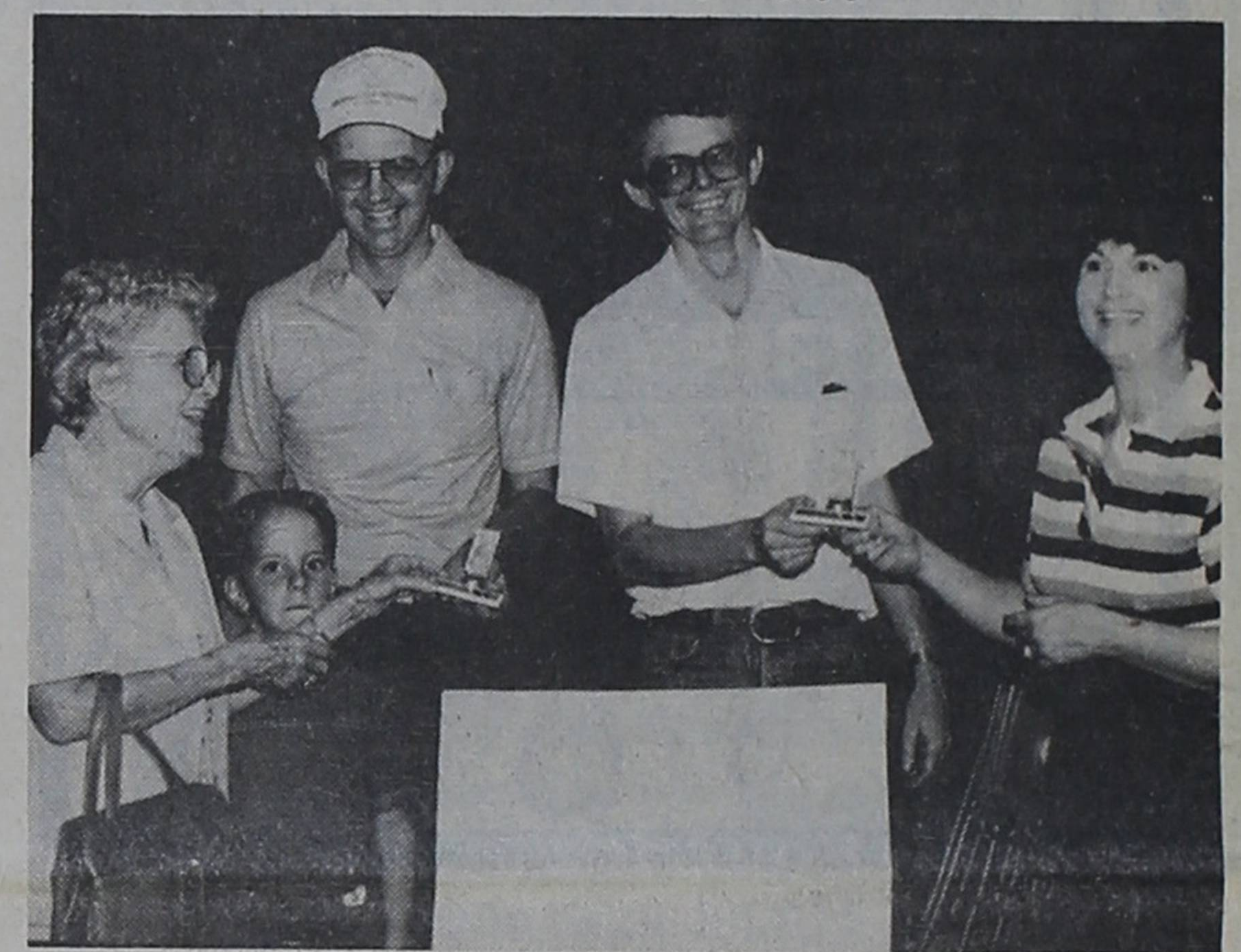

at the first general session of the convention on Wednesday at the San Antonio Convention Center.

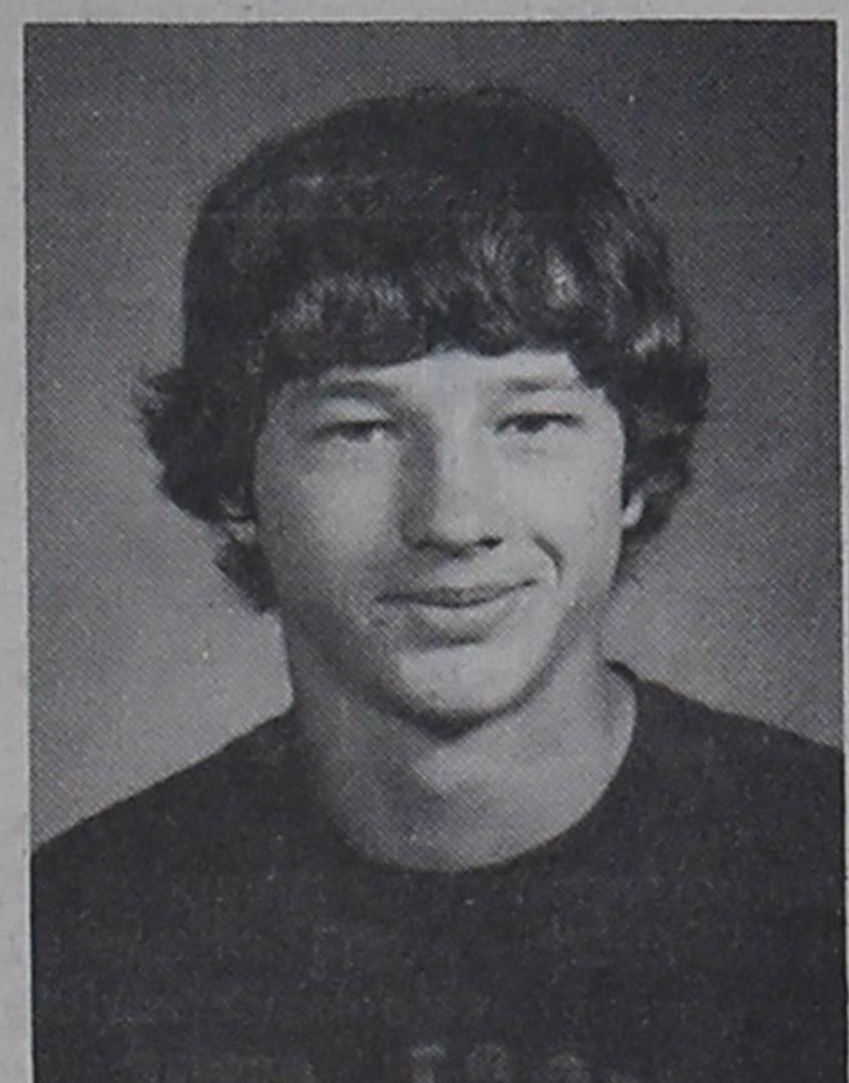

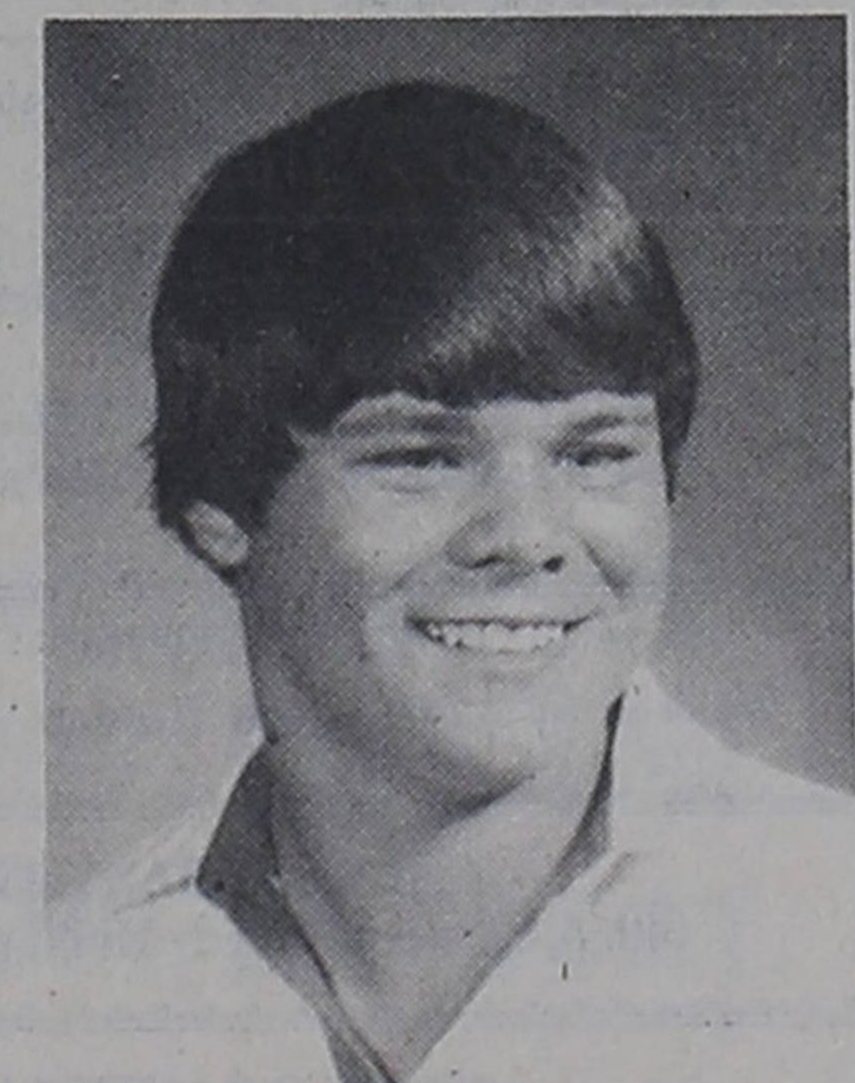
Chamber Board Meets Wed.

Riding Club Hosts Play Night

The Friona Riding Club will again sponsor a series of Play Nights for area riders beginning on Friday, July 15 at 8 p.m. The Play Nights will be held at the arena on West Highway 60.

The events will be pole bending, barrel racing, stake race, flag race and ring race.

Riders will compete for ribbons and points in three age groups: nine and under; 10-14; and 15-18. There will be no entry fees for riders in these three age groups.

Points and ribbons will be given each Play Night to the riders placing

through sixth place in each event. At the close of the final Play Night on Friday, August 19, the points will be tabulated and belt buckles will be awarded to the riders having the most points in each event in each age group. Fifteen belt buckles will be given away.

A senior division has been added this year for riders over 18. Riders in this age group will pay \$1.50 to enter all five events. This will help defray the cost of the ribbons given to the younger riders. Those participating in the senior age group will not receive ribbons or belt buckles but points will be kept.

The point system is set up as follows: first place receives six points; second place receives five points; third, four points; fourth, three points; fifth, two points; and sixth, one point.

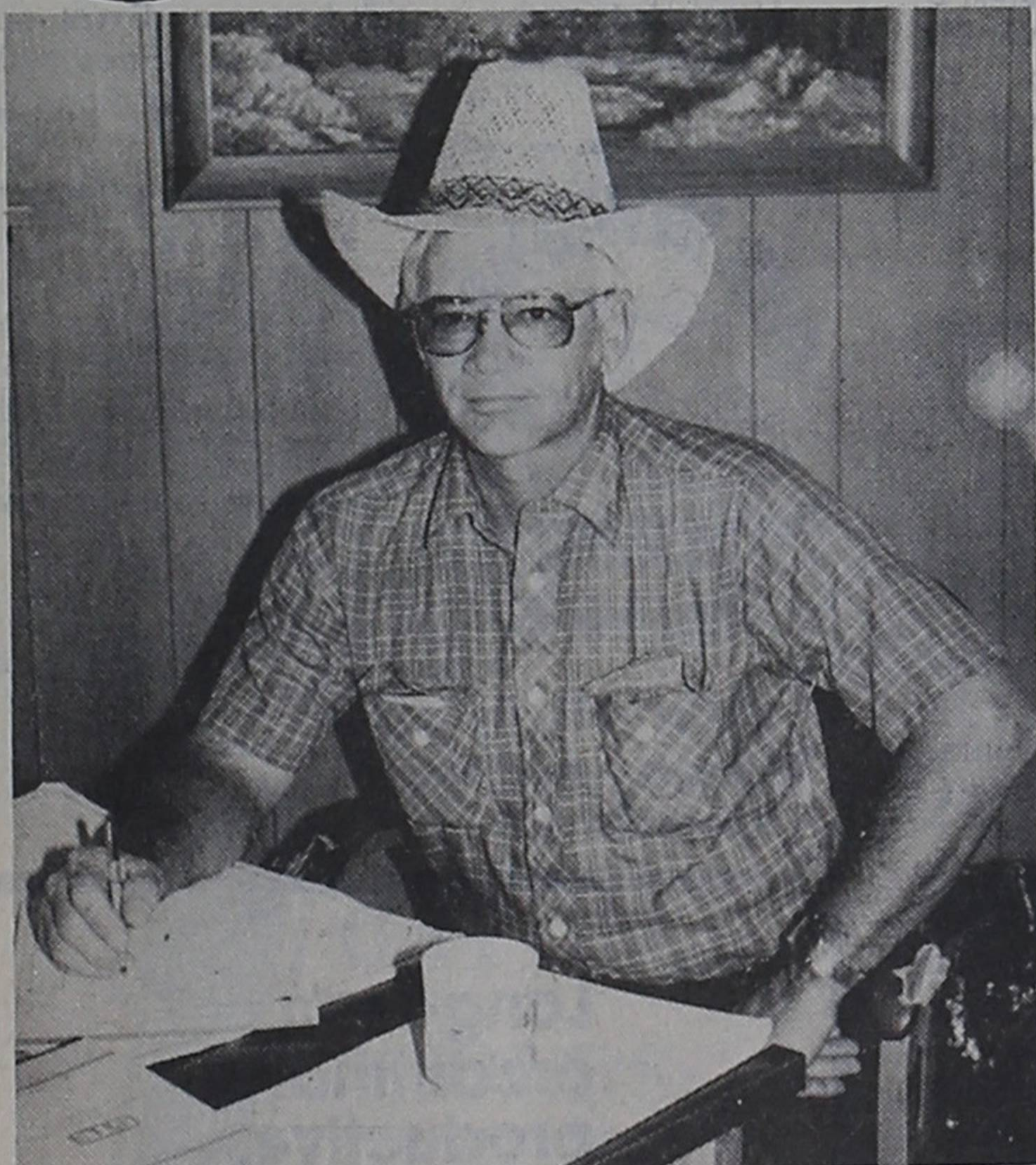
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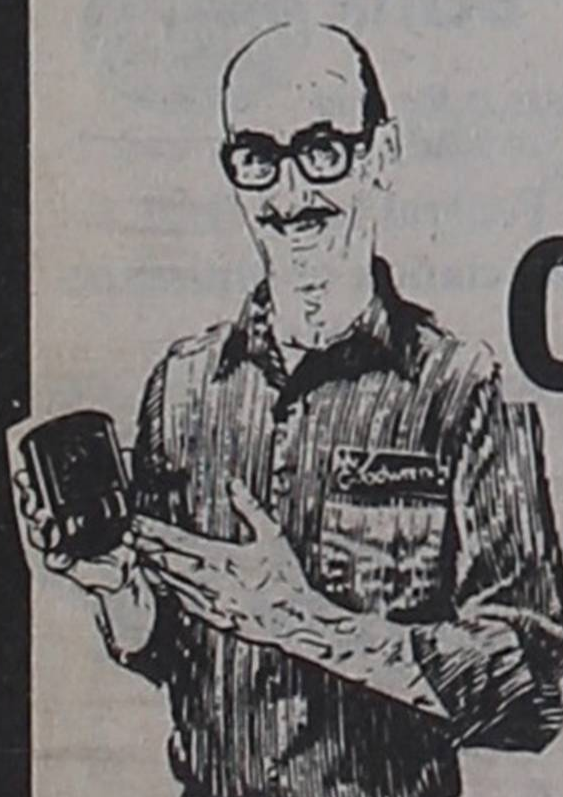


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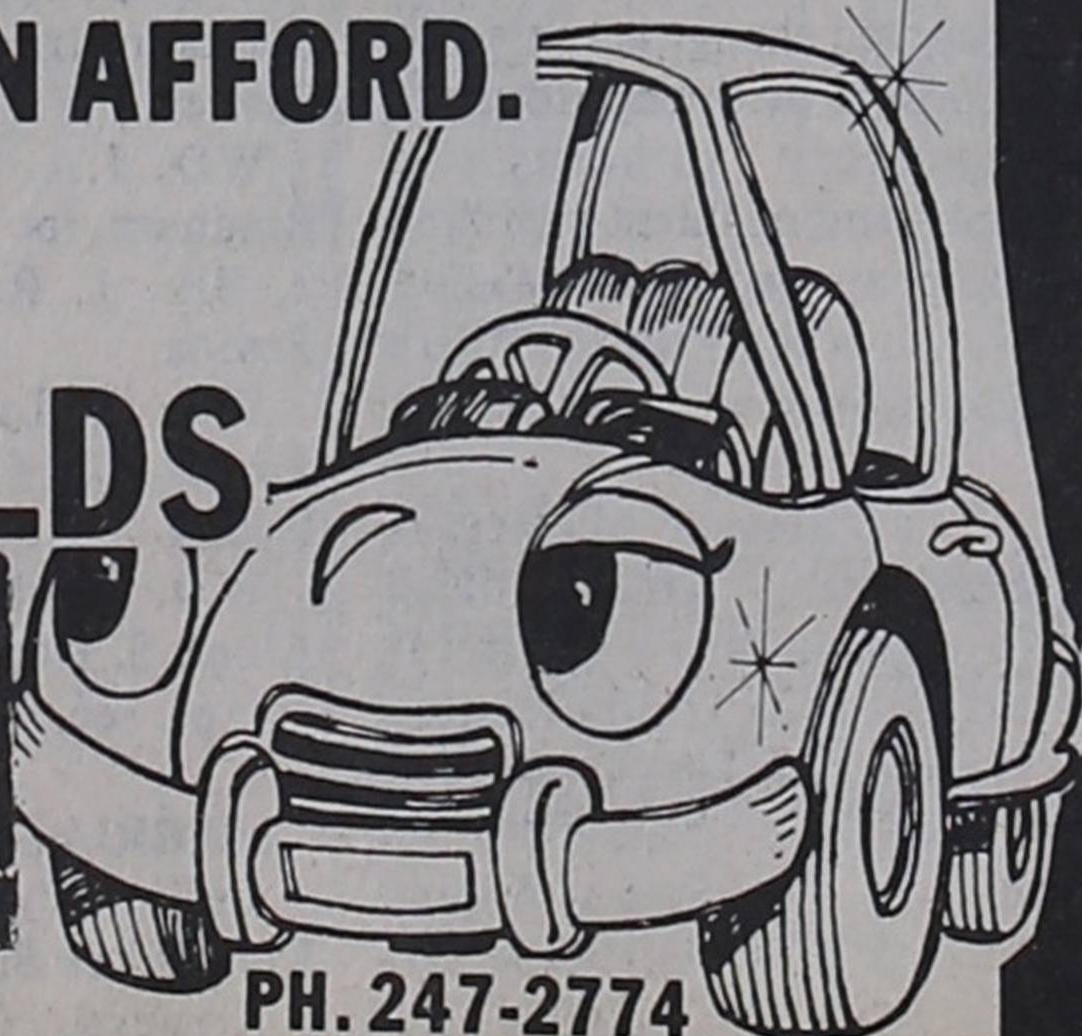

What You Should Know About Marijuana

Many young people want the facts about marijuana these days. Here are answers to some of your questions:

Q. What is marijuana?
A. Marijuana is a powerful mind-altering drug. It comes from a plant called *Cannabis sativa*, which grows in many parts of the world. A marijuana cigarette is made from dried parts of the plant.

Q. Can marijuana interfere with school work?
A. Yes, it can make learning more difficult and interfere with thinking and memory.

Q. Can smoking marijuana affect the way I grow?
A. Yes it can, experts say. If you smoke marijuana regularly as a young person, it can interfere with normal development and growth. It affects young people differently than adults because you're still growing physically and mentally.

Q. What happens if you smoke pot and drive? Is that safe?

A. No. Thinking and timing are delayed, and your perception is impaired when you smoke marijuana and that can make driving very dangerous. These effects last at least 4-6 hours after smoking one cigarette.

Q. How long does marijuana stay in the body?

A. Special tests have shown that marijuana's ingredients stay in the body up to a month after you smoke, says the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

Q. What are some of the other health risks?

A. Inhaling any kind of smoke into the lungs over a long period of time is dangerous. Marijuana smoke also has more cancer-causing ingredients than tobacco smoke, studies have found.

Q. How about mixing marijuana with other drugs?

A. Taking marijuana with other drugs is very dangerous. The combined effects are greater than the effects of one drug taken by itself.

Hancock of Terry County; Stephanie Weaver of Scurry County; J. Brett Foster of Swisher County.

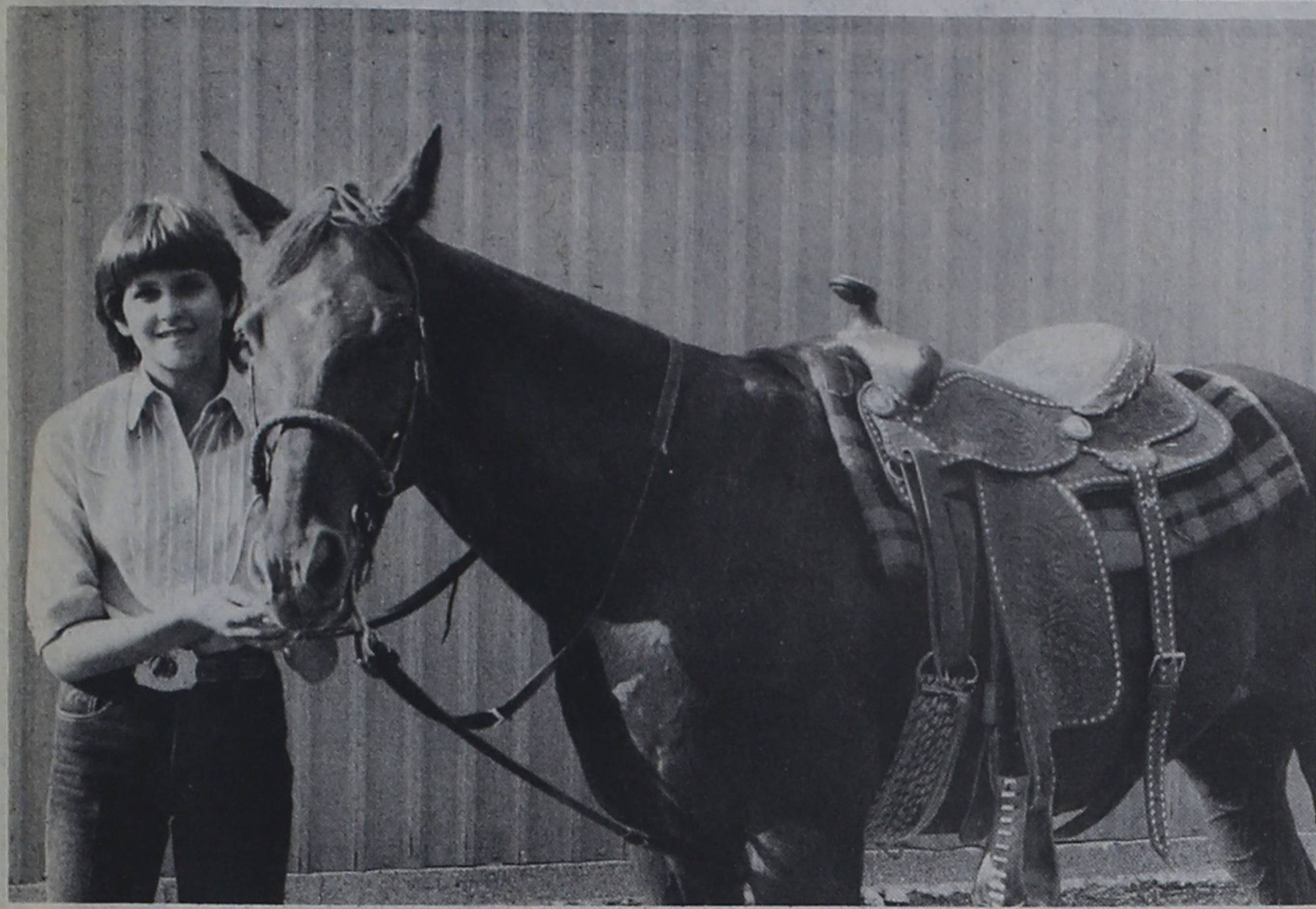

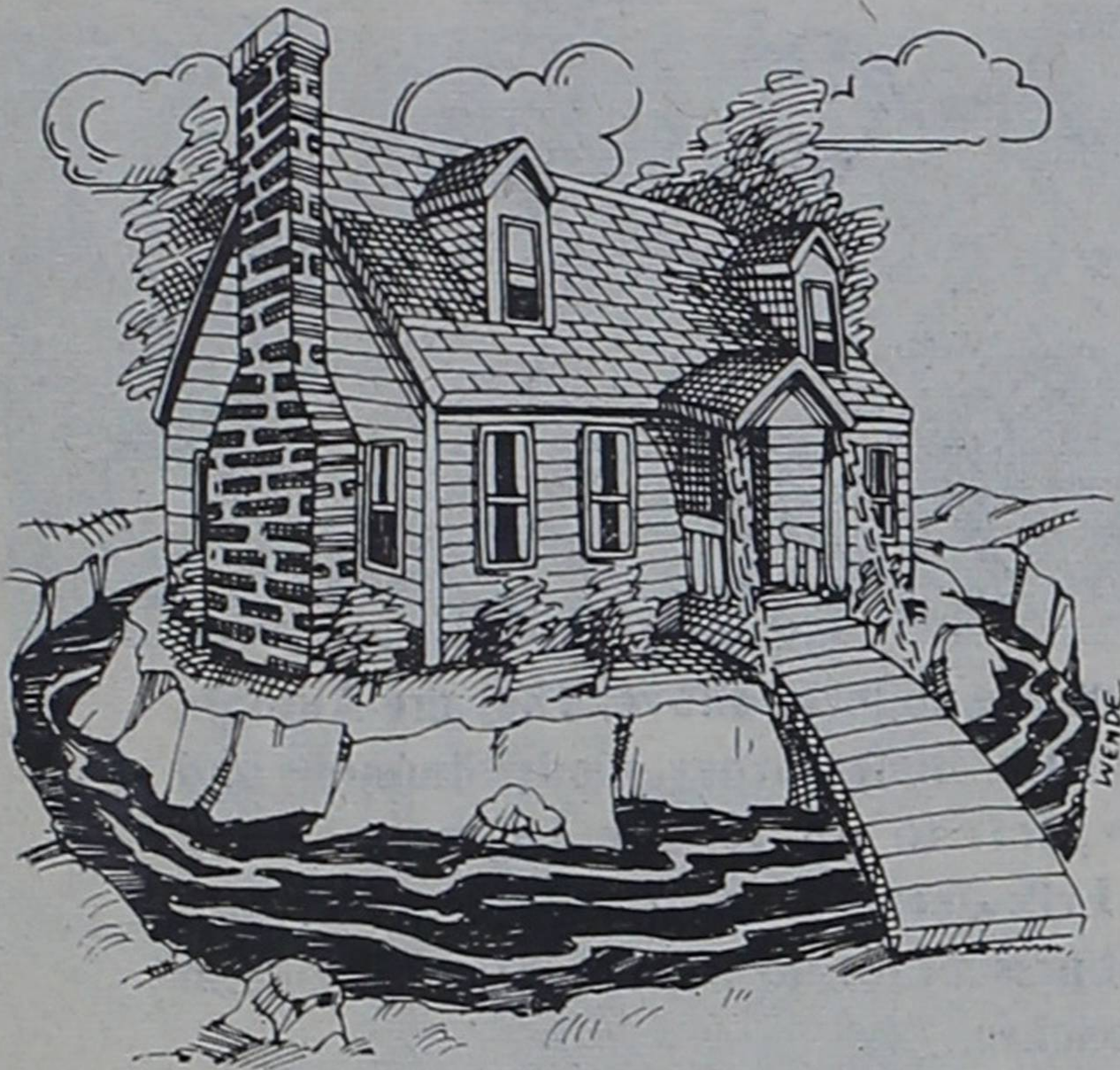

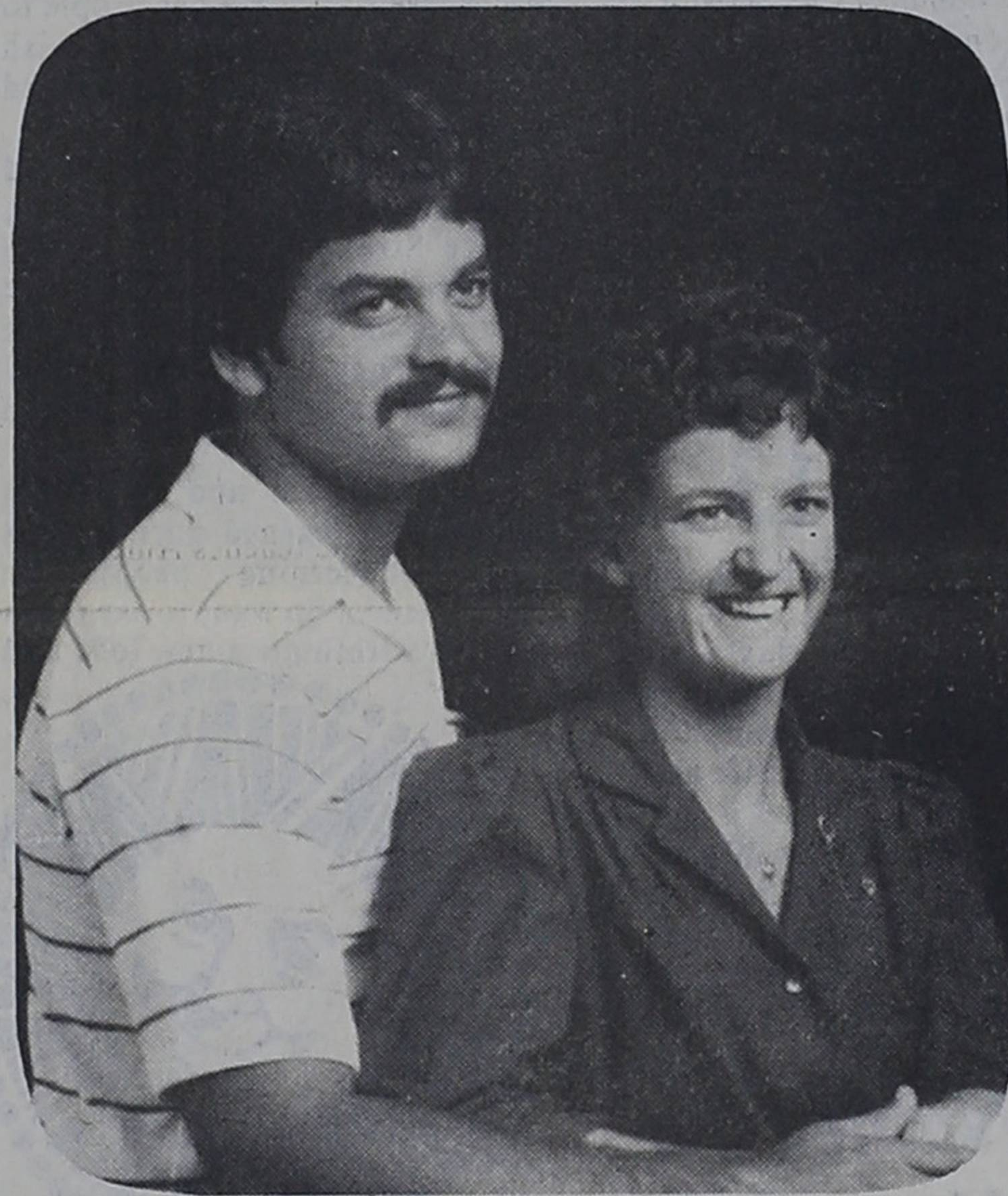

Jo Schueler Attends '83 Bluebonnet Girls State

A band of 567 nervous girls from all over the state arrived in Seguin, Texas June 24 to face the challenge of the 1983 Bluebonnet Girls State. None of us knew what was ahead. We stood in disbelief as counselors told us this was to be an experience of a lifetime and that we'd shed tears as we left. How could all of these strangers become some of my closest friends? How could government and citizenship training be fun or exciting? I discovered the answers before I knew it.

I was in City "C"—the crafty, creeping caterpillars, the House of Representatives, and in the Federalist party. Immediately we were plunged into the pressures, policies, and fast pace of political life. There were many offices to run for and so much to do. There were actually three levels of activities—state, county and city. We began with city. We elected a strong mayor-council form of government. I ran for the city Chief of Police, but wasn't elected. Well, I decided to push myself a step further and run for County Justice of the Peace. No good luck again. At first I did feel pretty discouraged, but friends were always there to pick you up and cheer you on again! All of us who lost an election formed a goose egg hall of fame with all our campaign posters hung upside down. No one was considered a loser.

Later, I was appointed to the Fire and Police Committee. City activities were always fun. As police, we put up traffic signs and put tape down the middle of the halls. Everyone had to walk on the right side of the hall. We

also had a city challenge. We had constructed a make-believe hospital in our county. It was destroyed by what we thought to be vandals. Later, we were informed a tornado had supposedly struck and we were responsible to take the proper action. And of course, we had to pay taxes. Everything from blue underwear to hairy legs were taxed. Many of our activities may sound silly, but being involved in such actual situations taught me many things. Some of our court cases we held were not serious, but I think I did receive a good taste of being on a jury.

I feel I learned a great deal about legislature. In the House of Representatives and Senate we debated numerous bills. Many of which are common today. Some of them concerned abortion regulation, penalties concerning DWI offenses, and livestock certification for brucellosis diseased cattle. During our debate, I realized how important it is to respect others' opinions, even if I didn't agree. House and Senate were great ways to get up and speak your opinion about an issue.

The highlight of the session was the trip to the State Capitol. Our House and Senate convened in the actual chambers. It sure did give me a feeling of importance sitting at our Representatives' desks and debating the same bills. I realized the tough decisions placed on our politicians. It is so important that we, as good citizens, select the proper people to make these decisions. I just wish everyone would be more concerned when and if they vote.

Many inspiring speakers attended our assemblies. Just to name a few, George Strake, chairman of the Republican party; Ann Richards, state treasurer; and Betty Jones, mayor of Seguin. They brought us many encouraging words and hope for the future.

I could go on and on about everything I learned during Girls State, concerning people or government. I do want to say it has instilled within me a new love and

respect for our country. How great it is! Girls State is a special memory I shall treasure forever. It is a part of me that can never escape. I can't thank the American Legion Auxiliary enough for this opportunity!

The following is a poem written by two special counselors at Girls State. It seems to say everything caught in my throat, yet captured in my heart.

The speeches have been spoken, the ballots have been cast; the memories that were made will forever last.

We sang and we chanted to prove who was greater; Boundaries were formed but it wasn't 'til later.

That we realized the strength of the friendships we made, and took in our hearts moments that will never fade...

Look around you, those faces you never knew and think of your friendships you know will be true.

We shared in your victory and felt your defeat. Not knowing you personally but wanting to meet.

Girls State is special, it's so hard to explain; it's something inside you that will always remain.

It's knowledge, it's learning but even deeper still, it's courage, and spirit; an exercise in free will.

Hold on to your neighbor, believe in her; the friendships you make here will always endure.

Together we've lived, we've laughed, and we've cried, we've shared feelings from deep down inside.

On Friday we'll leave to go our own ways, but we'll always cherish these past ten days.

When you leave Girls State, hold this in your heart: our spirits are one, though we're miles apart.
