### Friona Girl Has Champion Steer

THE PARMER COUNTY Junior Livestock Show has once again been concluded, and again in 1984 the show was a big success.

It is quite a chore to produce a show of this nature, which being a countywide venture, requires the work and cooperation of a number of people from the various corners of the county.

But it always comes about, and most times appears to be a well-run, well-organized event.

The steer judge for the 1984 event, Dino Cornay, made the comment that the county showbarn was the nicest facility he had seen for a show on the county level.

Those of us who have watched the county show grow from being staged first from a patio encircled by barracks, then later to a school bus barn, have come to appreciate the showbarn, and the efforts that went into building the facility.

Even though the weather for the 1984 show was nice and warm for the most part, we still had one extremely windy day, and one participant at the show was heard to remark that day "Aren't you glad we still aren't over at the bus barn?!"

Several times in recent years, the showbarn has been the salvation of the show, when large snowstorms have hit on the week of the show. Prior to the showbarn, the show would no doubt have been postponed at least a week in these cases. And when you have your animals at a certain stage, this can sometimes completely ruin your project's chances in the show.

Many folks in recent years have also cheered the leaders who worked and saw to it that the community center-showbarn was built when it was. With today's high costs for construction, along with the depressed farm market, raising money for such a facility today would almost be an impossibility.

Yet, today's leaders are able to come up with a brainstorm. It has been determined that some sort of ventilation, or aeration, is needed in the showbarn, to take care of the animal waste smells.

Show superintendent Terry Copley secured donation of the Grand Champion Goat from Greg Salyer, which was auctioned off during the premium sale. Due to re-selling the animal several times, the auction succeeded in raising around \$1181.25, which should come close to providing the equipment that is needed.

And the final bidder, A.L. Black, donated the animal back to its original owner.

We salute these officials, and supporters of our shows, both on the local and county level.

And most of all, a big cheer for the youngsters who are raising their project animals. Many of them have found in recent years that it is a tough task to show a profit on their projects. This encourages better thrift in buying animals, although the exhibitors and their parents are limited as to how they can cut the corners on rising costs.

Livestock show officials are discussing a plan which would enable a higher percentage of the animals at the county show to make the premium sale.

As it now stands, those exhibitors whose animals don't make the premium sale are virtually assured that they will have a tough time having a profitable project.

A tip of the hat is in order for Bovina High School's ag mechanics class, who helped solve the seating problem at the county show. The class, made up of juniors and seniors, constructed two units of steel bleachers which they took to the showbarn.

The new stands were very attractive as well as practical, and we extend our thanks to the group. Also joining in was a non-class member, Toby Dutton, who helped paint the bleacher seats.

Dana Berend showed her 1257-pound Chianina crossbred steer "Jumper" to the grand championship of the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show last Friday.

Miss Berend added the county title to an impressive list of accomplishments the steer had already won, including the grand champion honors at the Amarillo Livestock Show last fall, and reserve champion honors at Lubbock. Two weeks earlier, "Jumper" had won the laurels in the Friona Jr. Livestock Show.

Reserve champion steer was exhibited by Wendy Tatum, another Friona youngster, whose 1145-pound steer had won the mediumweight class.

Friona entries won each of the four classes in the steer show and qualified for eleven of the twelve auction spots. Other class winners were Kent Cheshier in the jumbo division and Devera Rhodes in the lightweight division.

Carl Hutchins of Farwell won the Grand Champion heifer banner, and Tony Day of Friona had the reserve champion, a Maine-Chianina cross.

Miss Berend's win in the steer show was the 19th time for a Friona youngster to win that title, and fifth in the past six years. It was the seventh time for a crossbred steer to claim the steer title.

In the premium auction sale Saturday afternoon, the top-placing animals went on the auction block.

Miss Berend's steer was purchased by Parmer County Implement Company for \$2.50 per pound. Miss Tatum's reserve champion sold for \$2.00 per pound, bought by Cattle Town Feed Yard.

The grand champion barrow, exhibited by Susan Redwine of Lazbuddie, sold at \$3.00 per pound, and successful bidder was Foster Fertilizer of Lazbuddie.

Beth Johnson's reserve champion barrow also sold for \$3.00 per pound, to Parmer County Implement Co.

Grand champion lamb, owned by Terry Moore of Bovina, sold for \$4.25 per pound, to Friona Industries. Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie had the reserve champion lamb, which sold for \$2.40 per pound to Farmers Co-op Elevator, Muleshoe.

Prices paid by the buyers at the 1984 show appear to be considerably better than those paid in 1983, although the grand totals were not available at the Star's press time this week.

However, a tally of prices paid for the premium animals showed that the average price paid for the steers was \$1.30 per pound, up by more than 30 cents per pound from the 1983 sale.

The barrows sold for an average of \$2.21 per pound, an increase of 29 cents per pound over the \$1.92 figure of the year before. Lambs sold for \$2.88 per pound, a nice gain of 53 cents over the 1983 price.

In addition to the premiums paid for the animals, bidders had an opportunity to buy the Grand Champion Goat, with proceeds going to the showbarn building fund, to provide aeration or ventilation for the building.

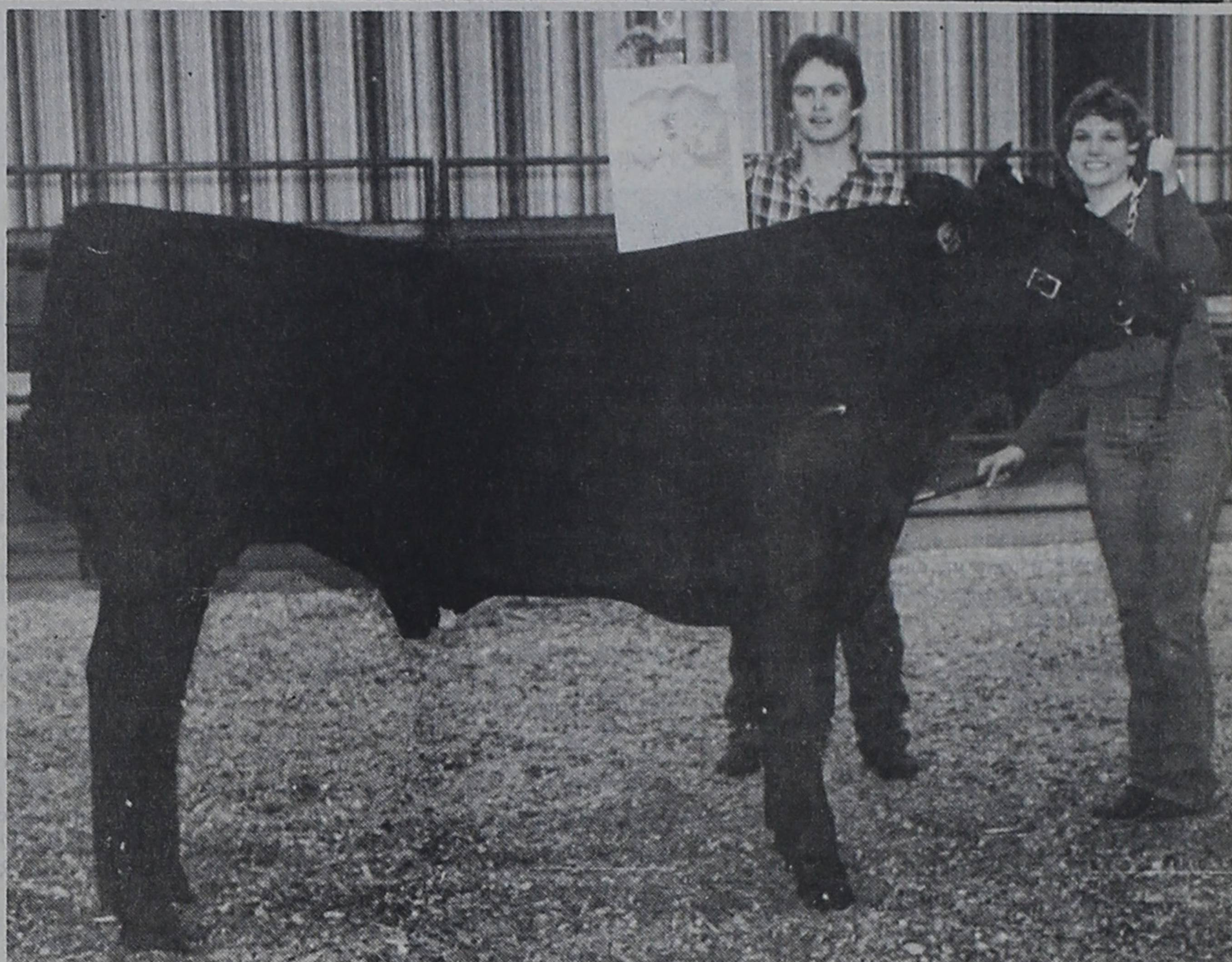
The goat, donated by Greg Salyer, was sold four times for a total of \$1185.25, and the final buyer, A.L. Black, gave the animal back to the young owner. Other buyers in the goat auction were Herring Implement Co., Black Grain and Darrell Mason.

Winners of the showmanship awards, presented prior to Saturday's sale, were Vandl Tarter of Lazbuddie for barrows; Tracy Moore of Bovina for sheep; Shannon Cochran of Friona for goats; Carl Hutchins of Farwell for heifers, and Dana Berend of Friona for steers.

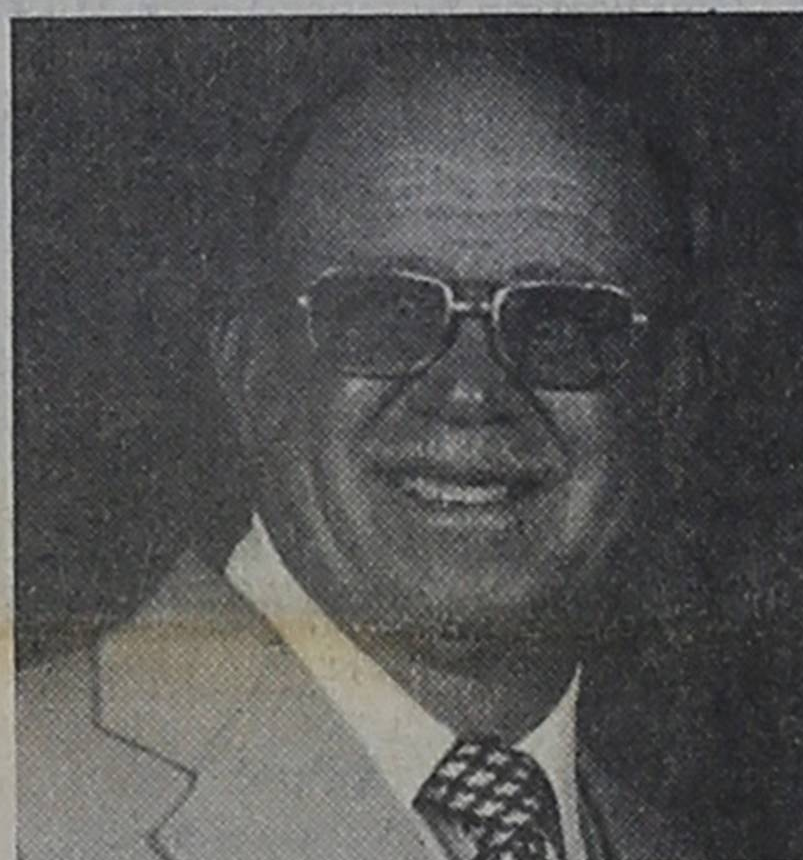

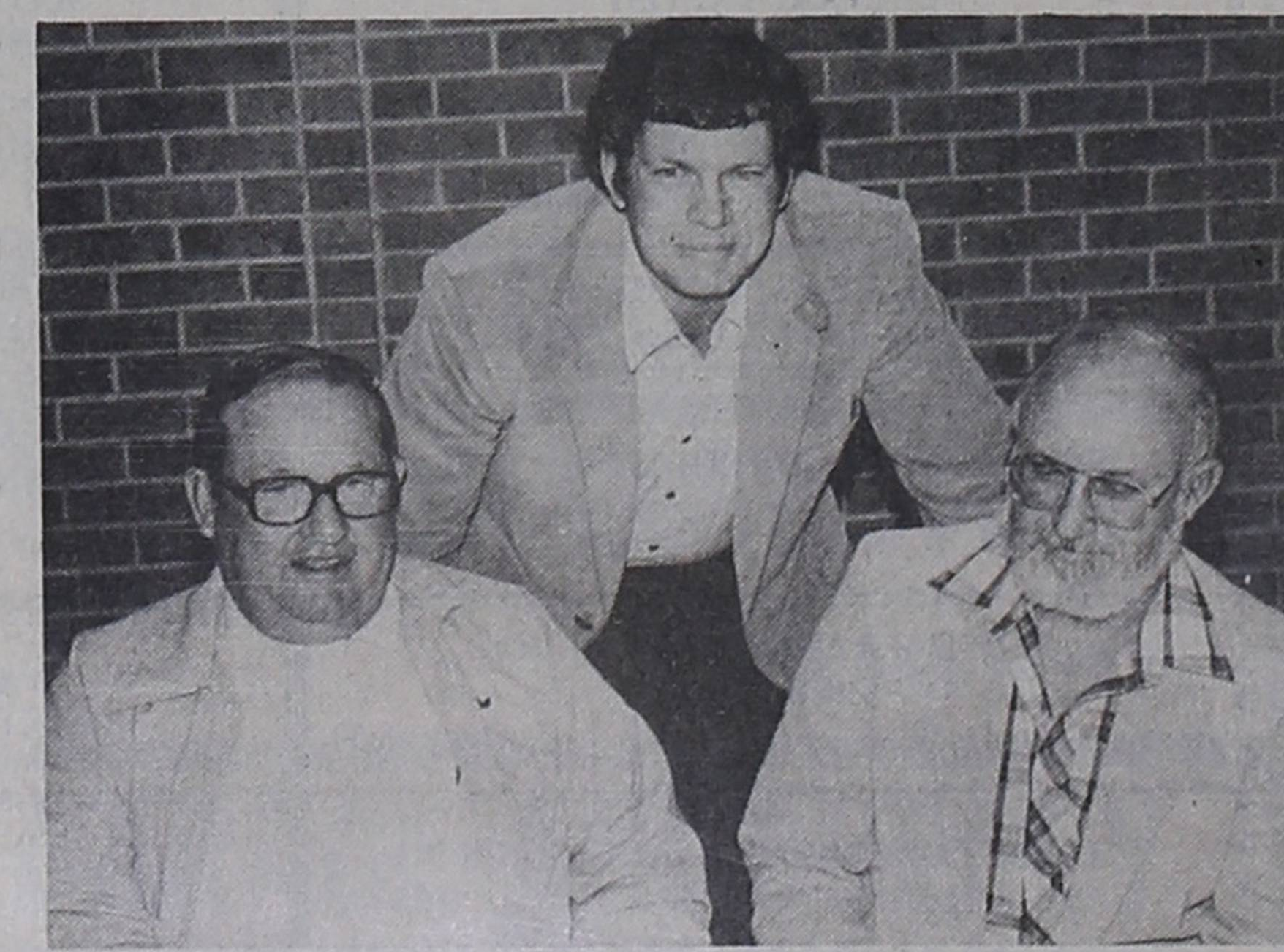

## Williams' Rites Held Wednesday

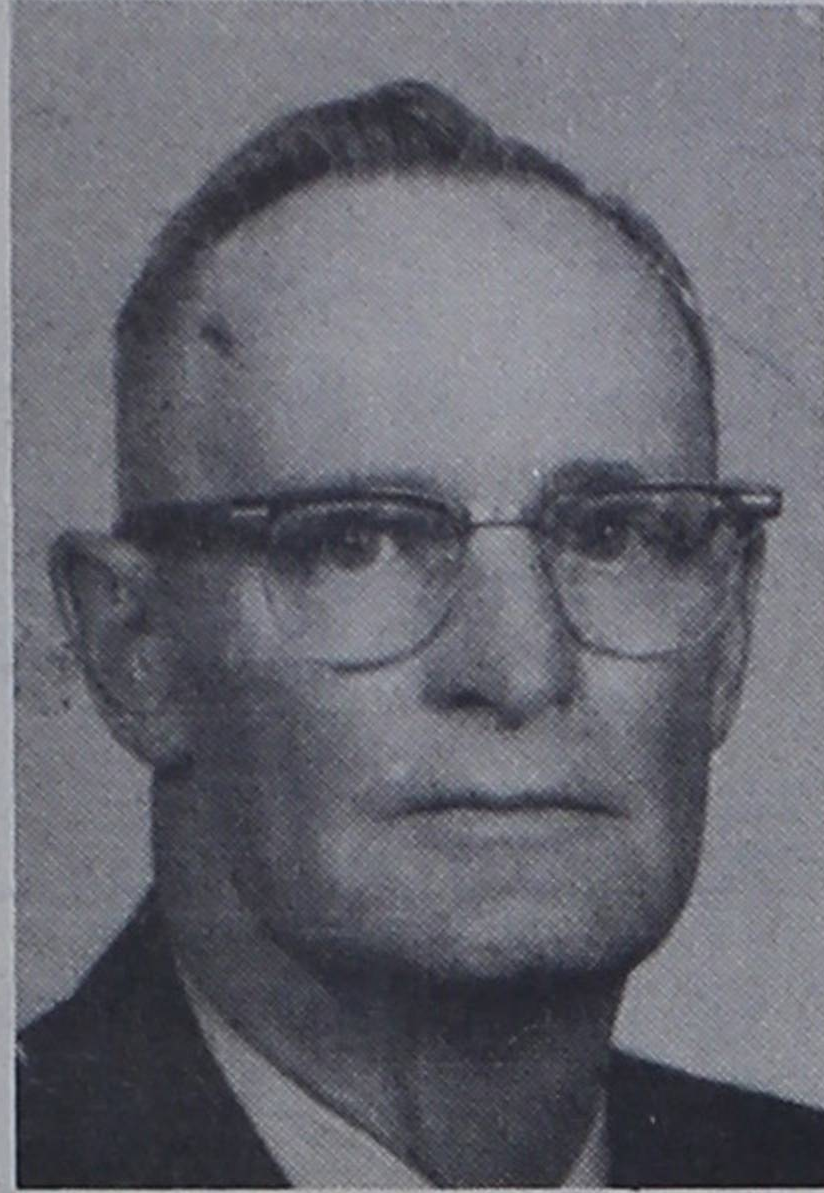

Masonic graveside services were held in the Anton Cemetery. Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona was in charge of arrangements.

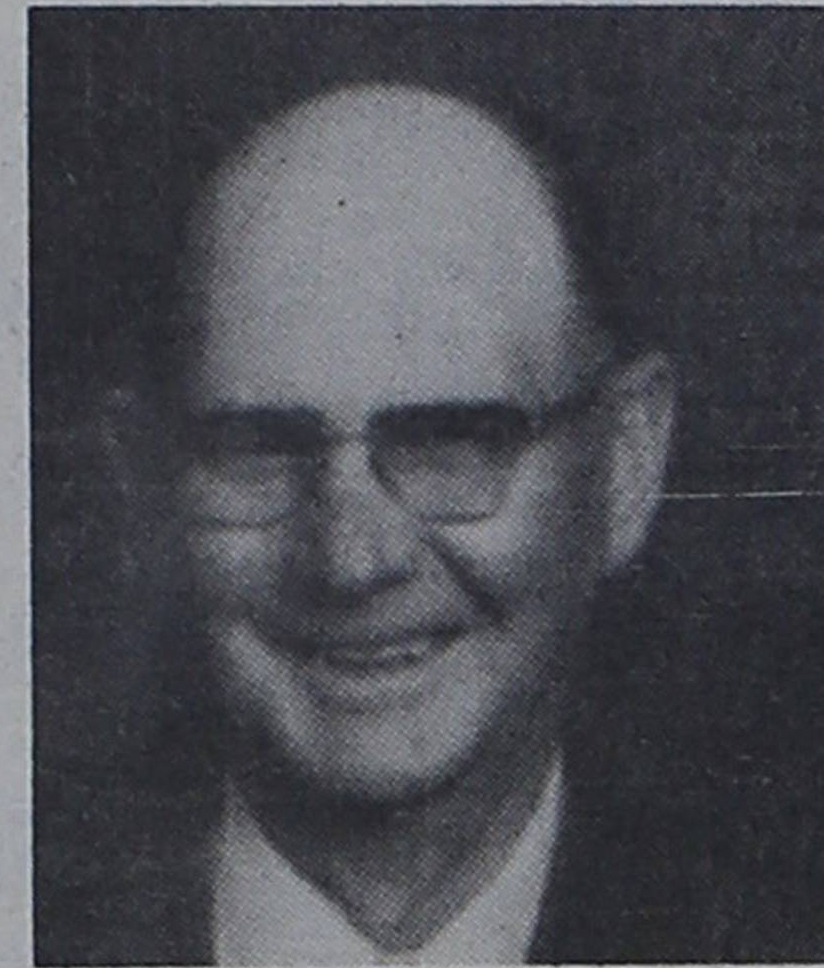



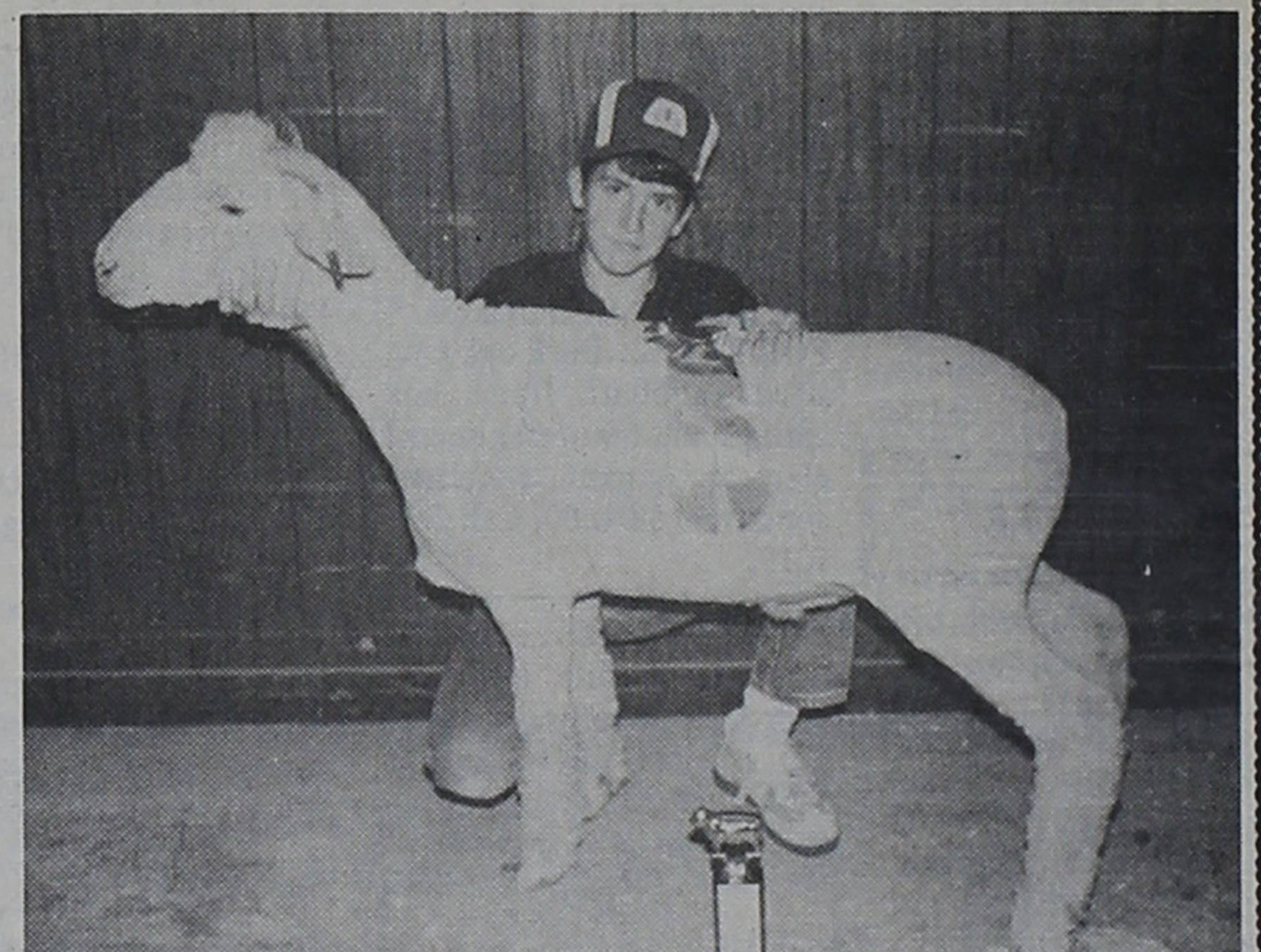

## Veazey Scores 36 Points vs 'Cats

Coach Oscar Bronniman must be wondering what you have to do to win games in District 2-AAA. The Friona Chieftains certainly can't be faulted for lack of effort.

The Chieftains had two close games during the past week which could just as easily have been chalked up in the "win" column. But, they both went down as heart-breaking losses.

At Littlefield Tuesday, the team battled the Wildcats to the hilt before losing, 79-72 in an overtime thriller.

Charlie Veazey equalled a 20-year individual scoring record for boys at Friona High School with a 36-point effort. Veazey connected on 13 of 25 attempts from the field, and ten of ten from the free throw line.

It was Veazey's last two free throws that tied the game at 68-all with 35 seconds left in regulation time. Then, with the Chieftains pressing, travelling was called on Littlefield, giving Friona the ball.

"We had three or four shots at the basket, which could have won it, but they all bounced off, rolled off the rim or something," said Bronniman on Wednesday.

Friona's luck took a turn for the worse in the overtime period. Two Chieftain starters fouled out of the game--Ricky Barnett and Kevin Brogden--and Veazey and John Aguirre finished with four fouls.

The hot-shooting Veazey scored 22 points in the first half, only to see his team trailing, 39-35 at the intermission. Friona pulled to within two points, 49-47 in the third quarter.

In the final period, the Chiefs rallied to take the lead, then saw the scoring lead see-saw back and forth.

Robert Escalante, with ten points, was the only other Chieftain in double-figure scoring.

In his past three games, Veazey has scored 28, 29 and 36 points, a total of 93 against Tulia, Muleshoe and Littlefield, for a "cool" average of 31 points per game. He's averaging over 20 points in district play and 19.6 for the season.

Last Friday, the team hosted Muleshoe, and had similar luck. The Mules pulled away from a 39-all tie entering the fourth quarter to make off with a 54-49 win.

Two or three scoreless spells hurt the Chieftains, who fell behind at the end of the opening quarter, 13-9.

One of those cold spells caused the team to drop behind, 20-11 early in the second quarter, but Veazey ignited a rally that brought the team to within four at the half, 26-22.

Finally, Veazey's long jump shot tied the game for Friona at 28-all early in the third quarter. Muleshoe rallied for a 34-28 lead, but baskets by Charlie Morgan and Veazey cut the margin to 36-33, and Johnny McLellan's lay-in brought Friona back into a tie at 39-all.

But Muleshoe scored the first five plays of the final quarter, as Friona suffered some critical turnovers, and the Mules held on to win by that margin.

Morgan's 12 points backed up Veazey's 28.

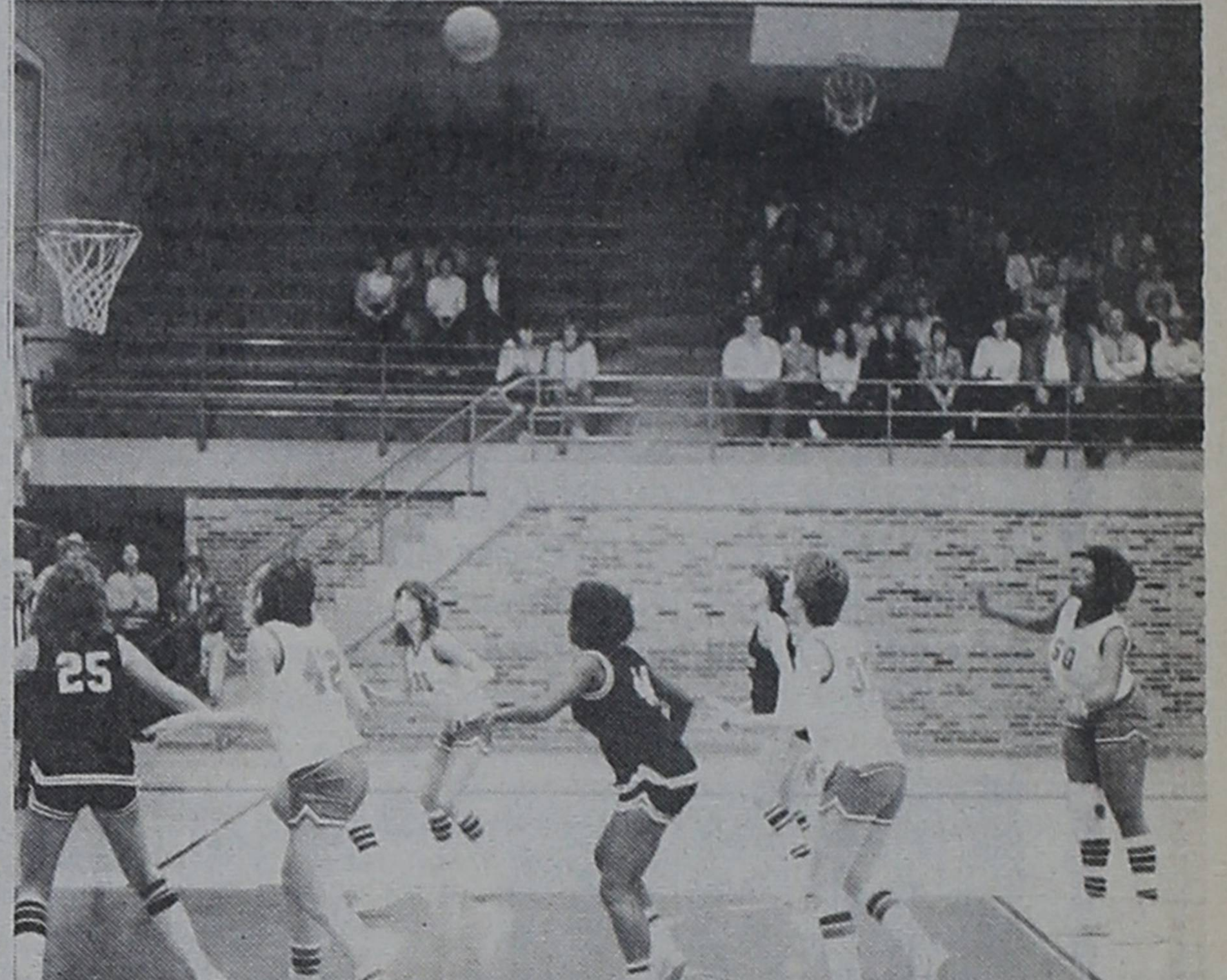

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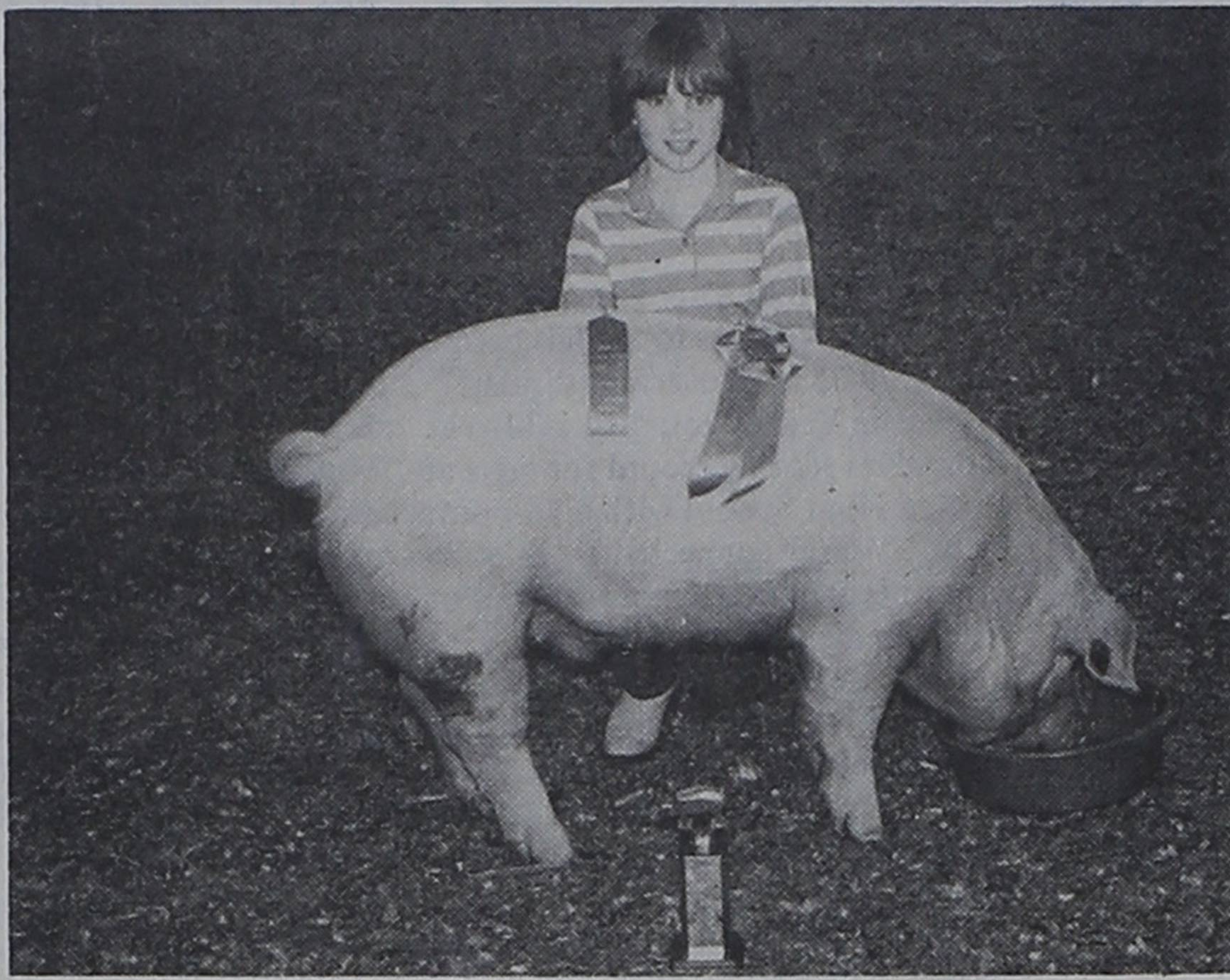
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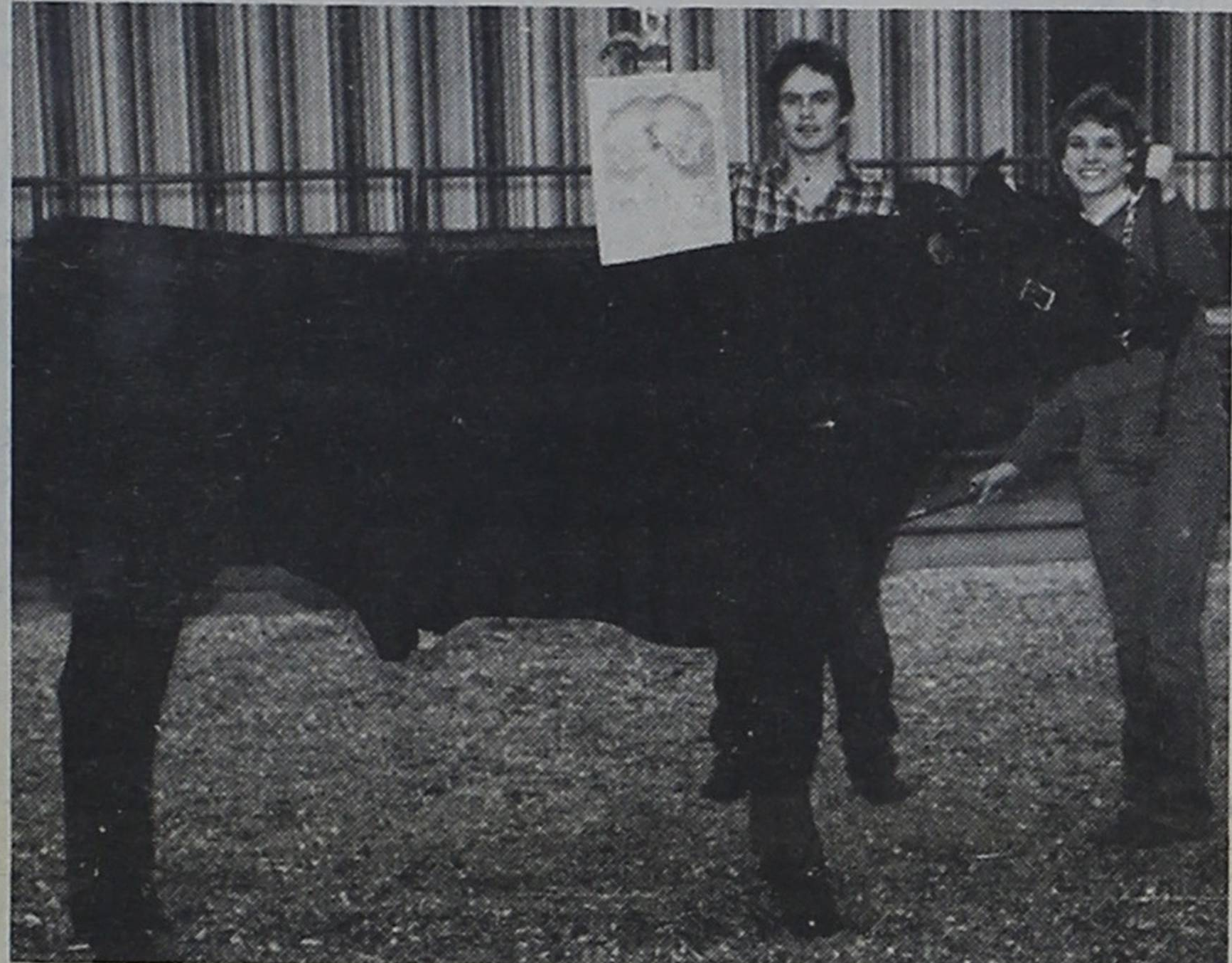

**TOP CHESTER....**Terri Loafman exhibited the champion Chester White in the 1984 barrow show last Thursday at the Community Center-Showbarn.



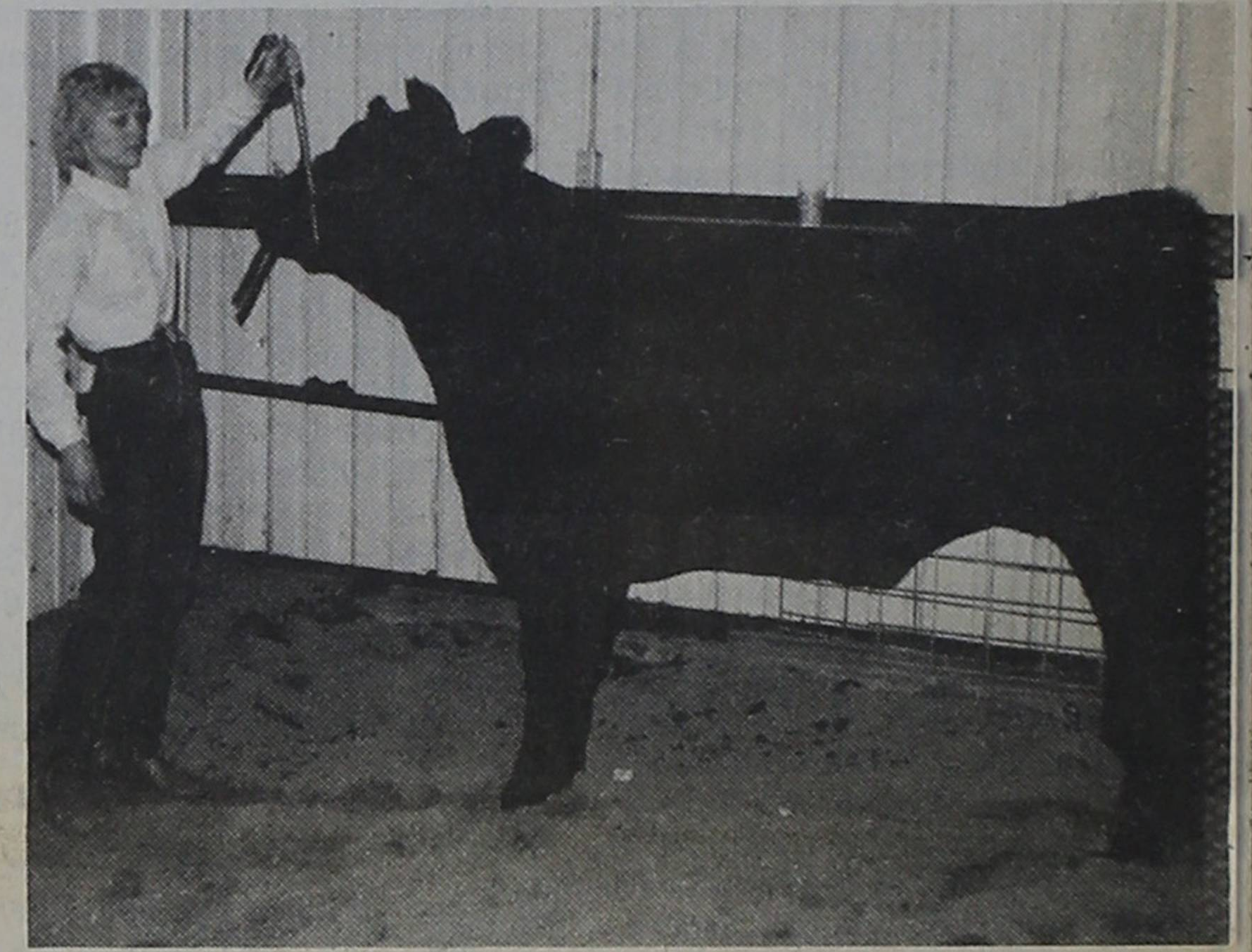

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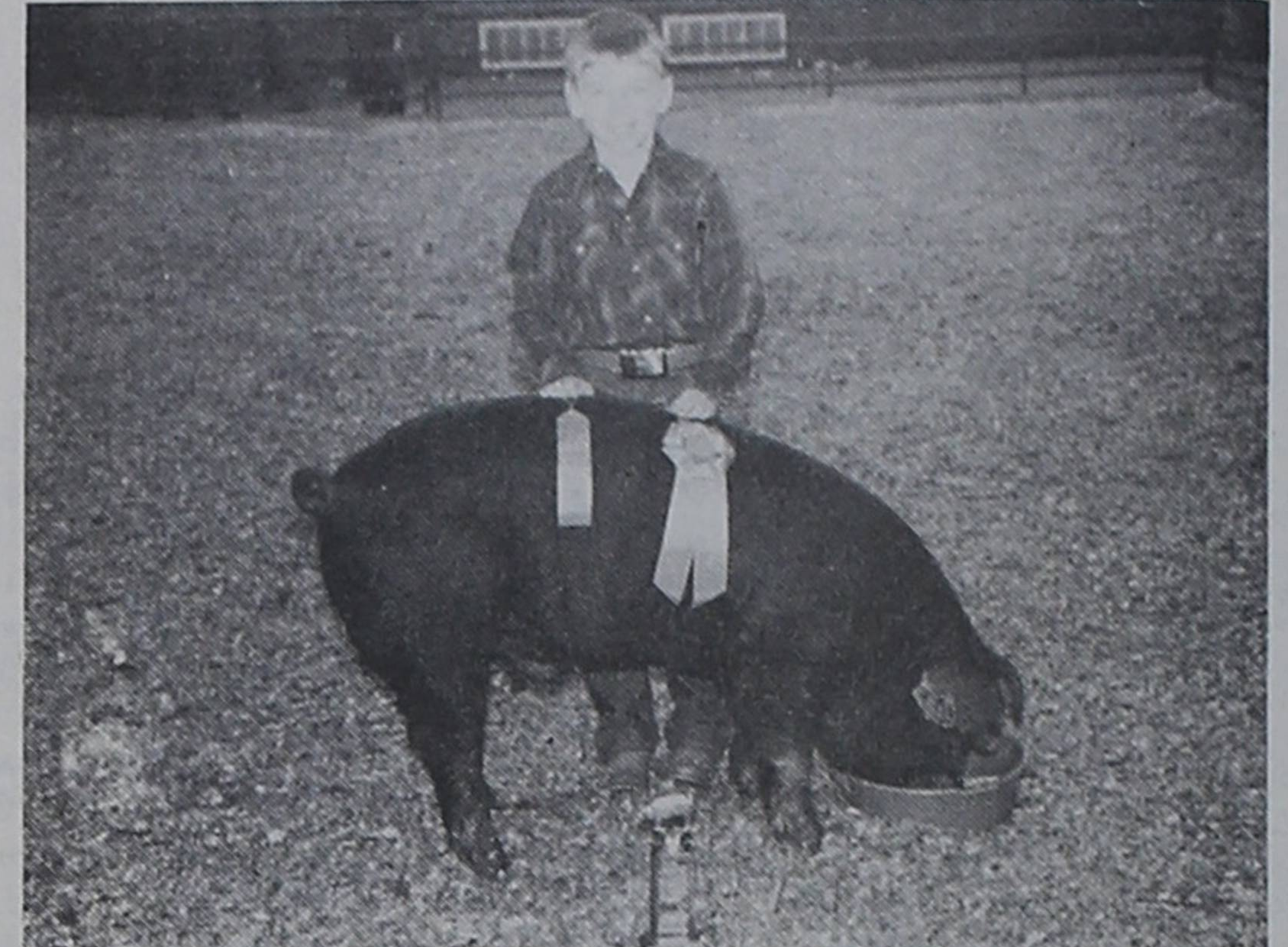

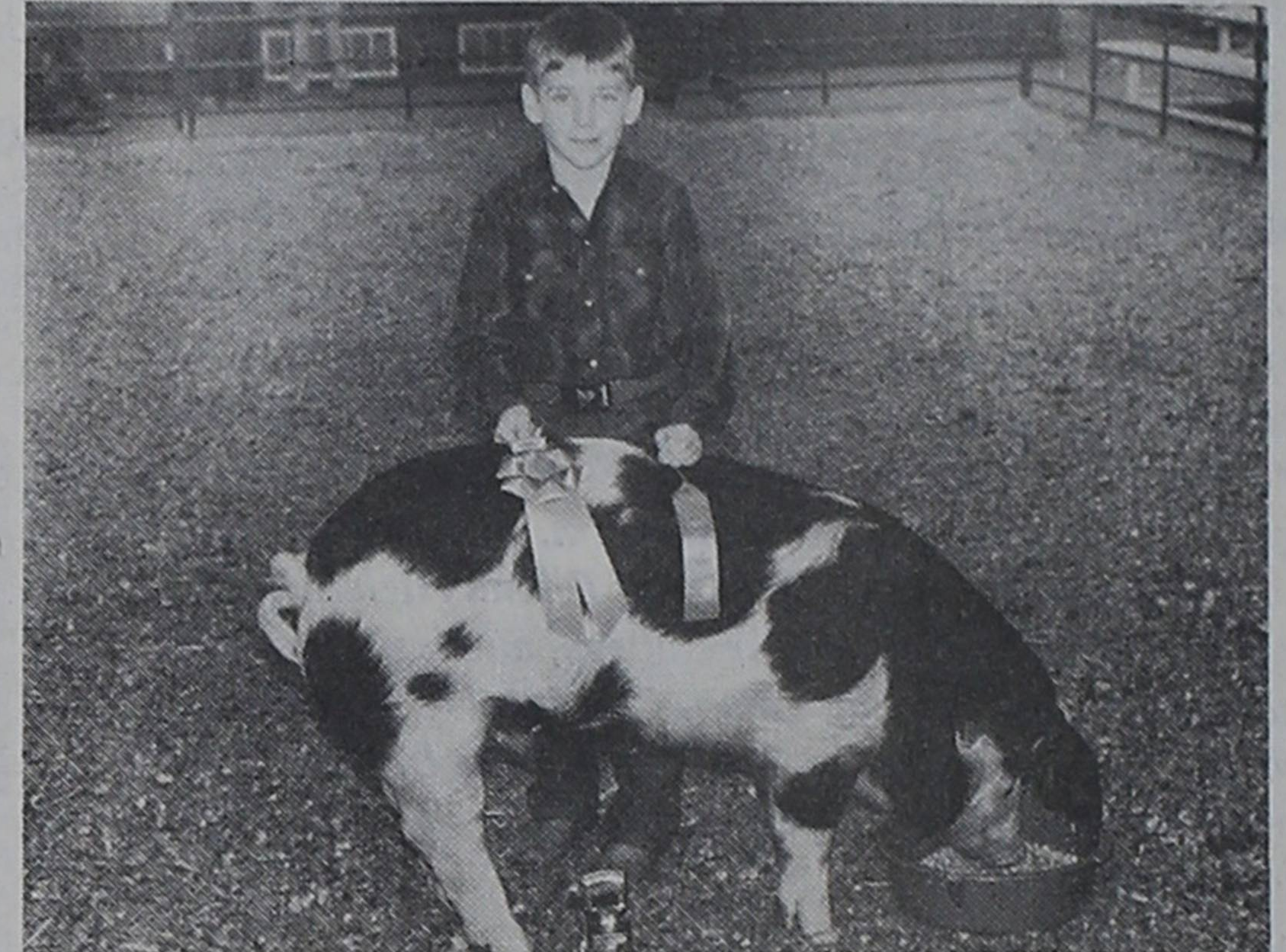

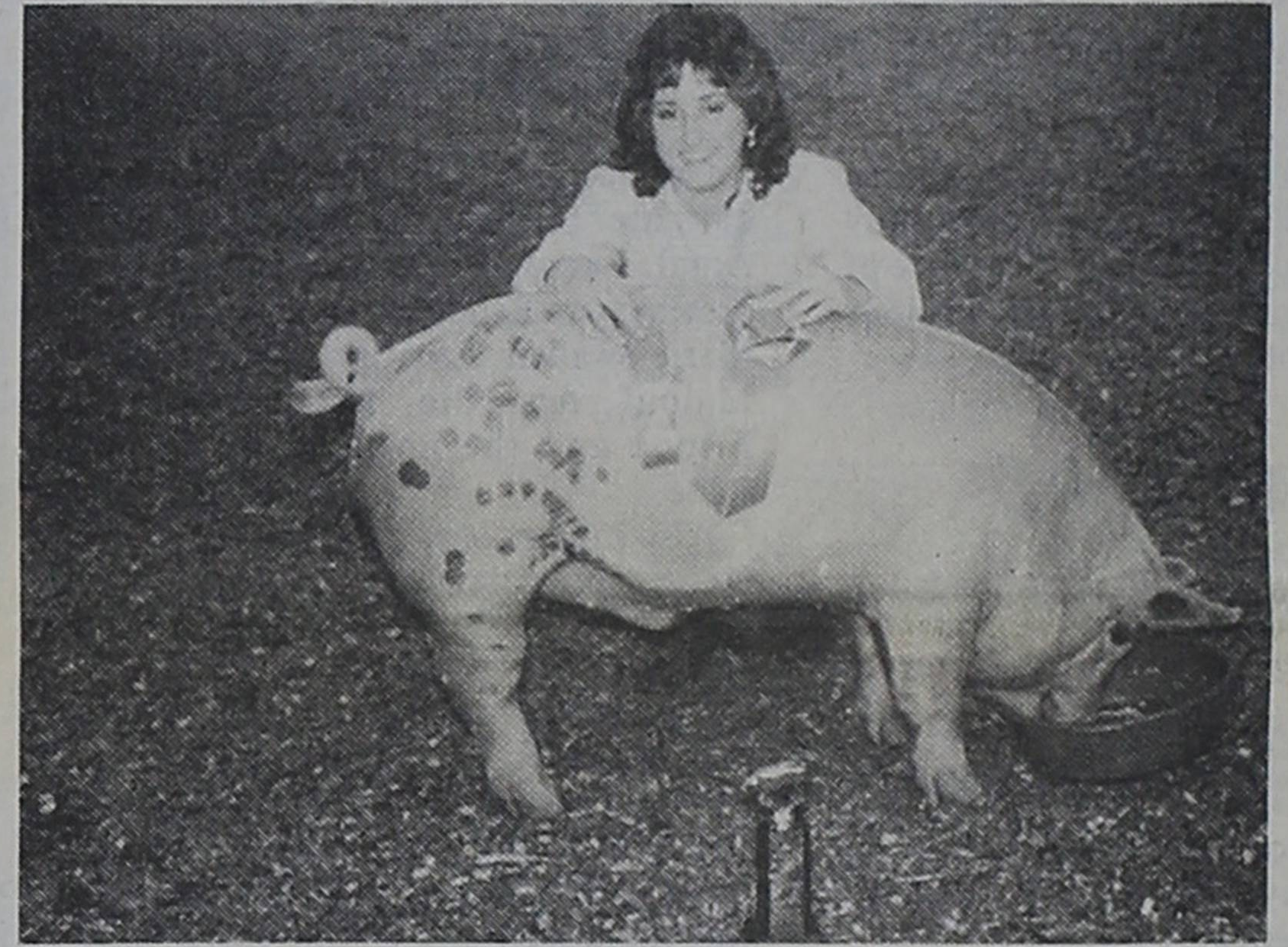

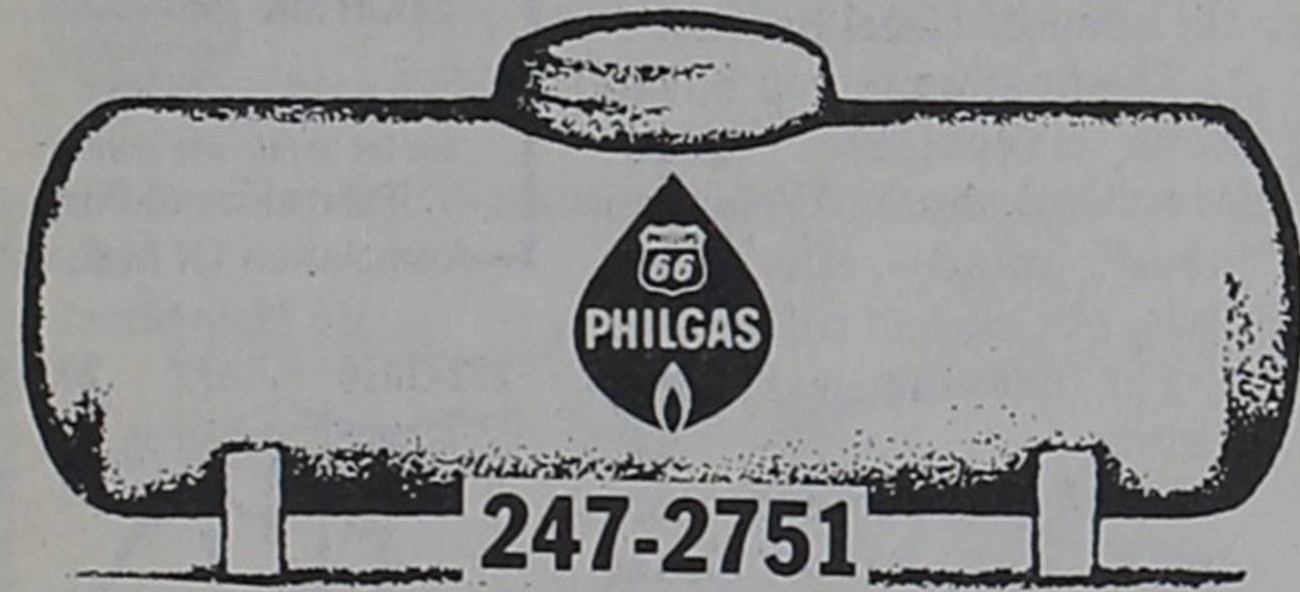

**CROSSBRED CHAMPION....** Melanie Gallman poses with her champion crossbred barrow at the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.

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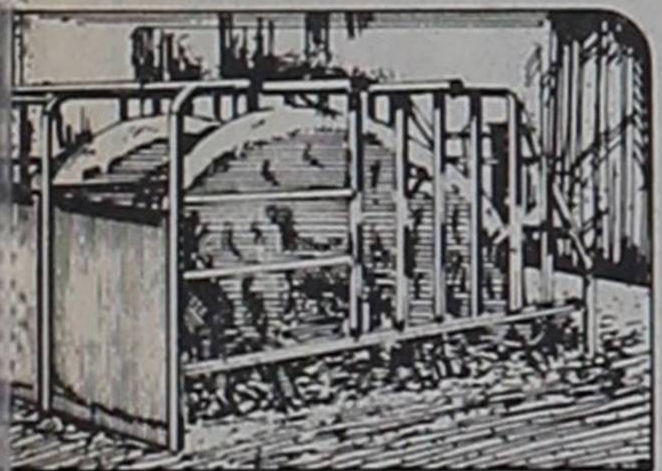
