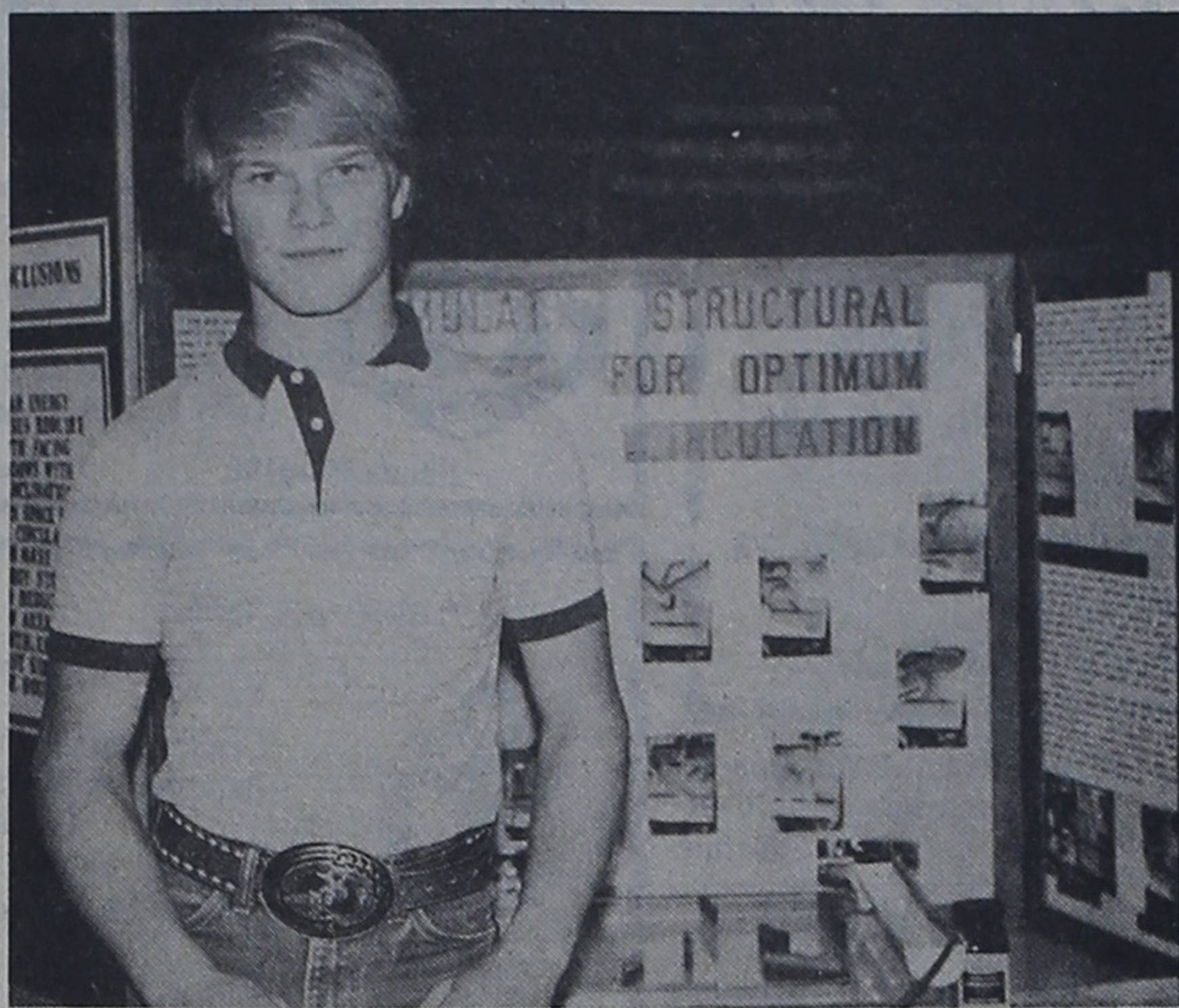

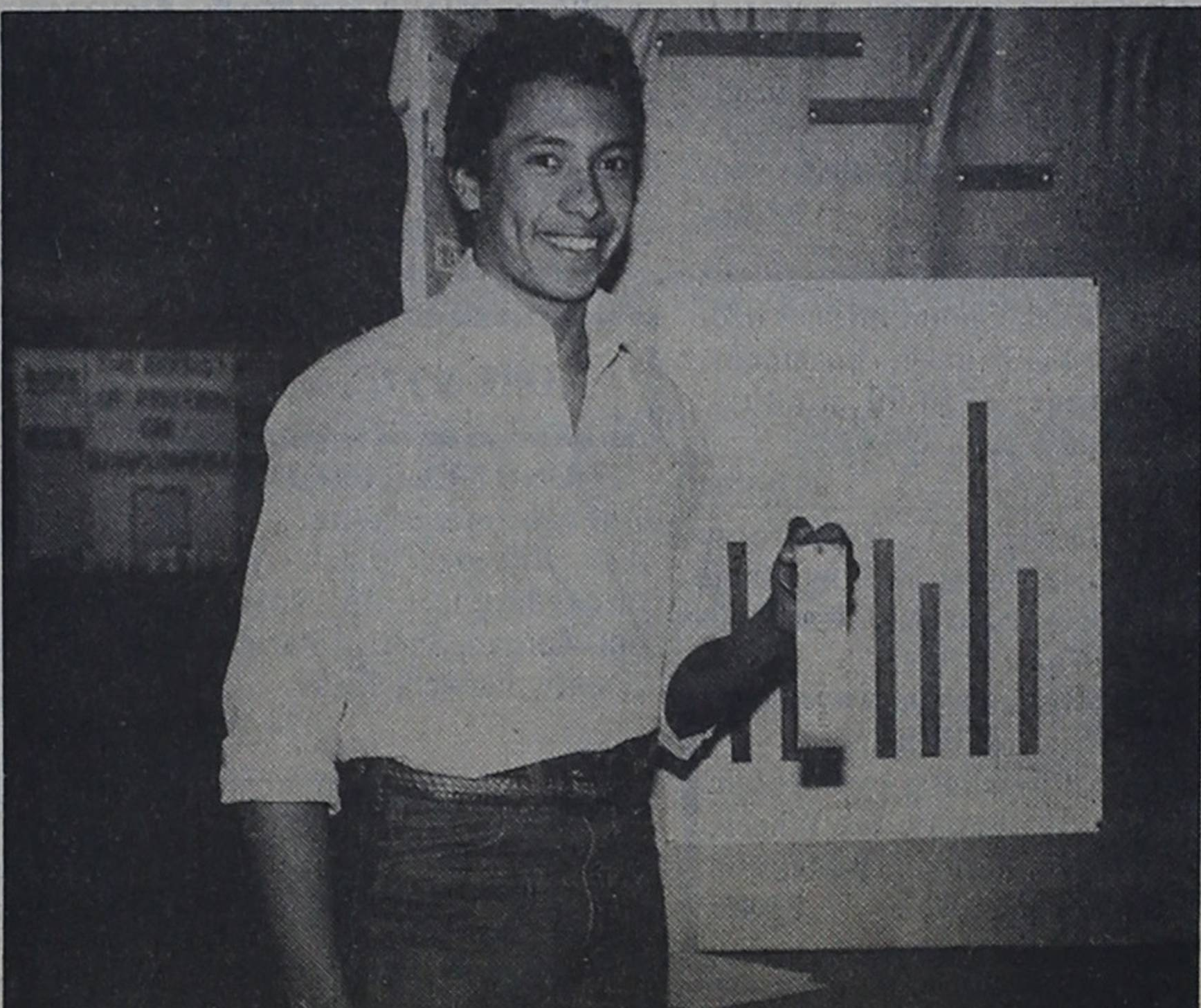

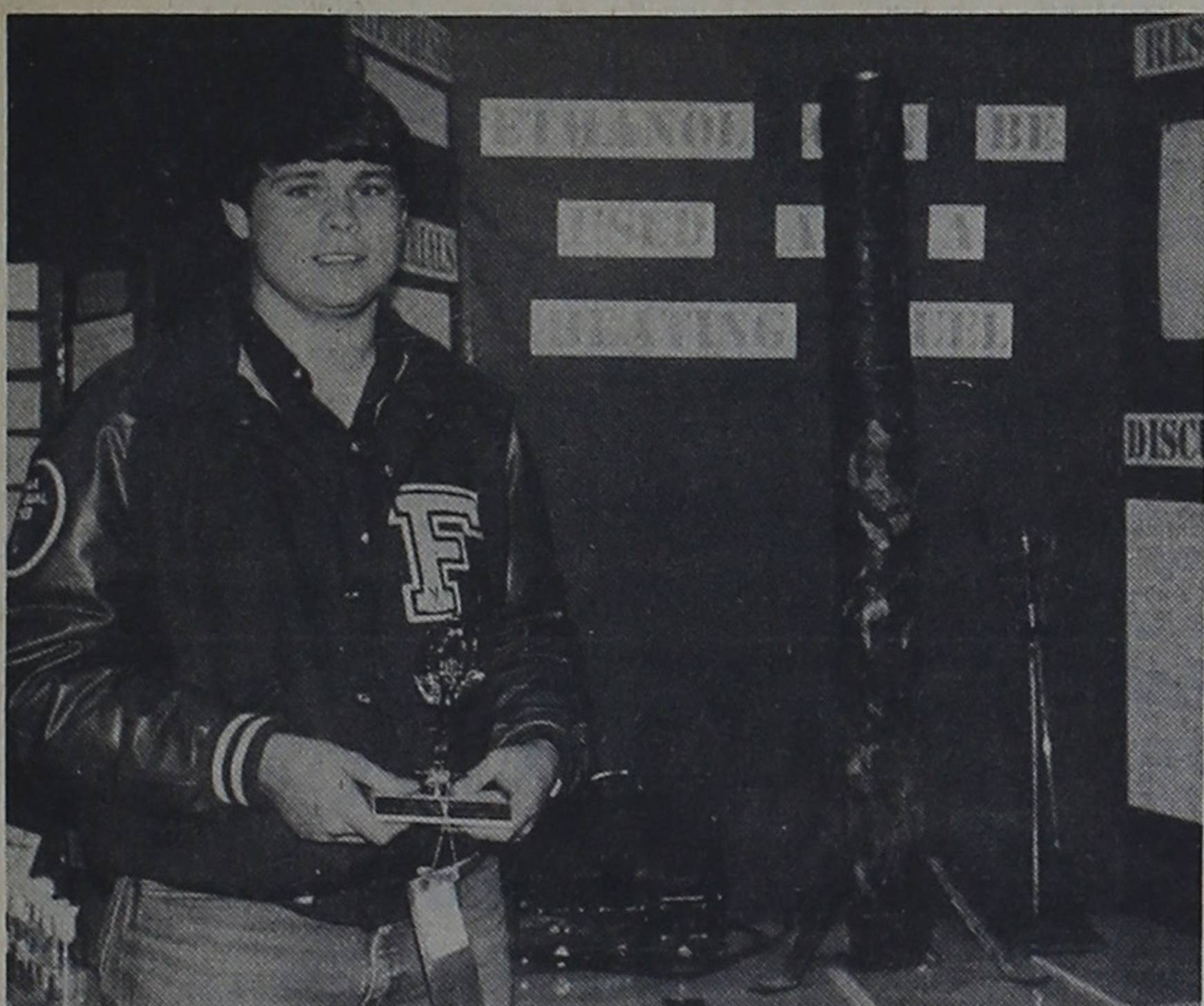
**KIP FRYE....**"Earth Science" was the category chosen by Kip Frye in the annual Science Fair last week. He took first place in this category.



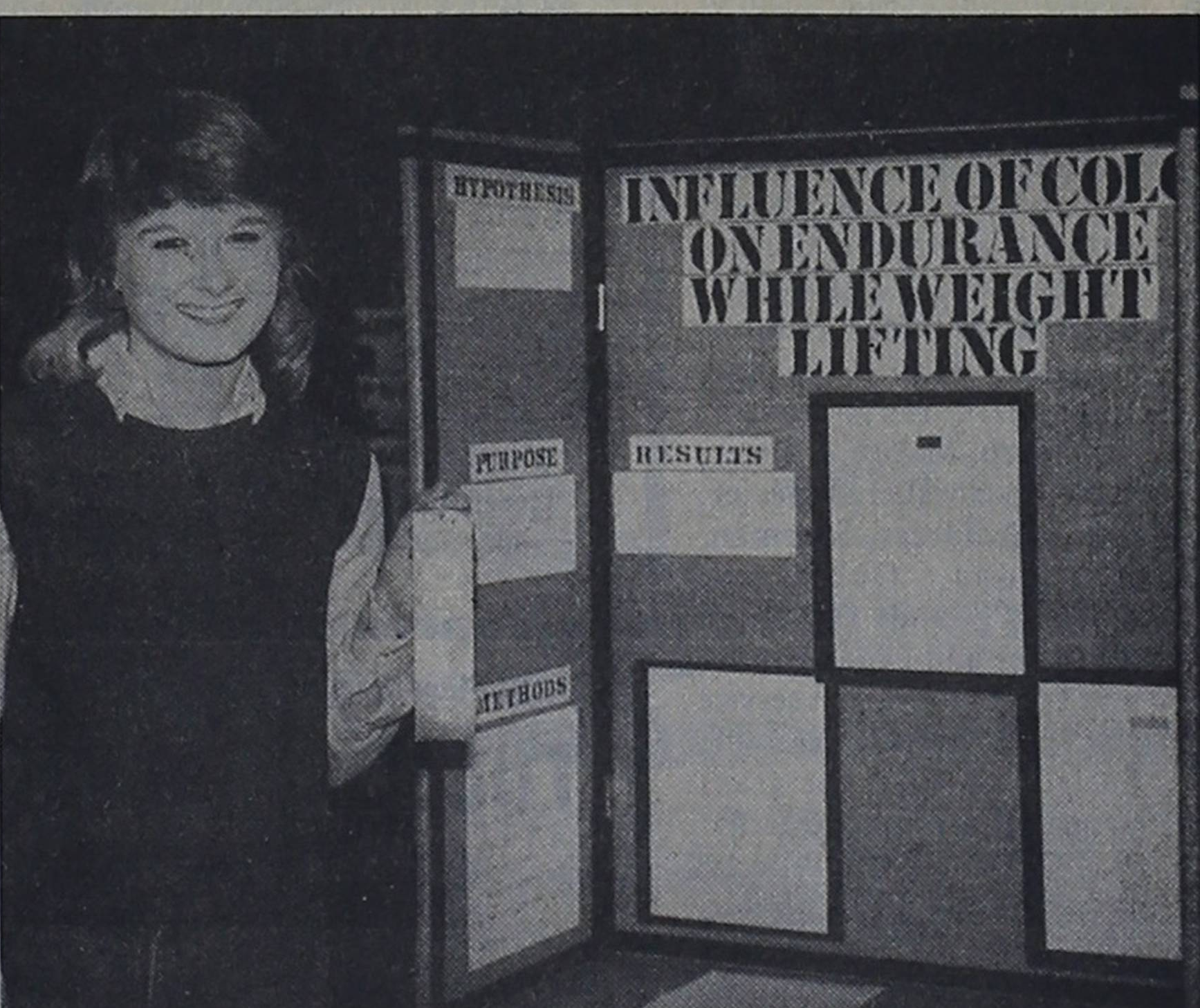
**JOHN AGUIRRE....**The "Microbiology" category winner in last week's annual High School Science Fair was John Aguirre.



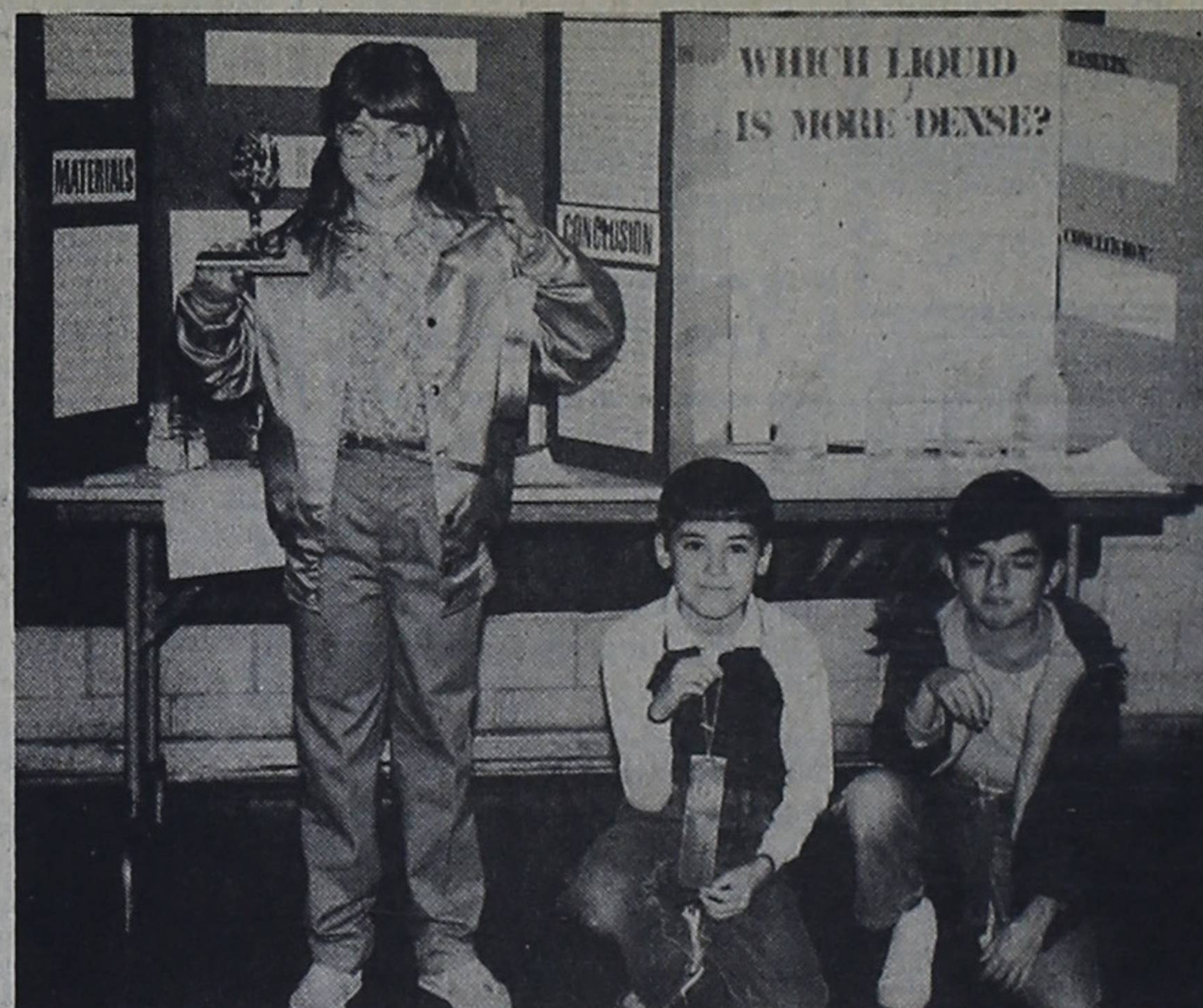

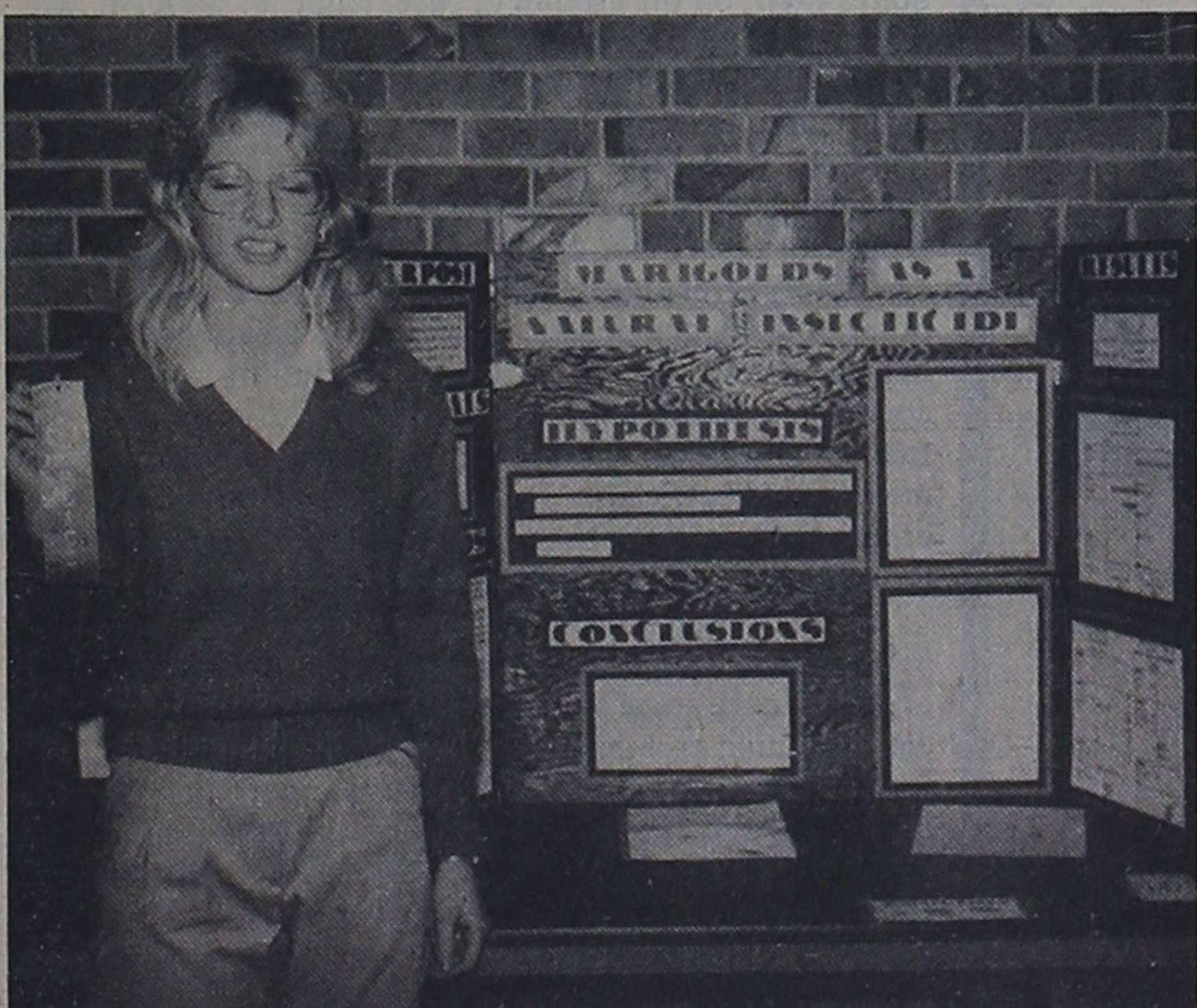

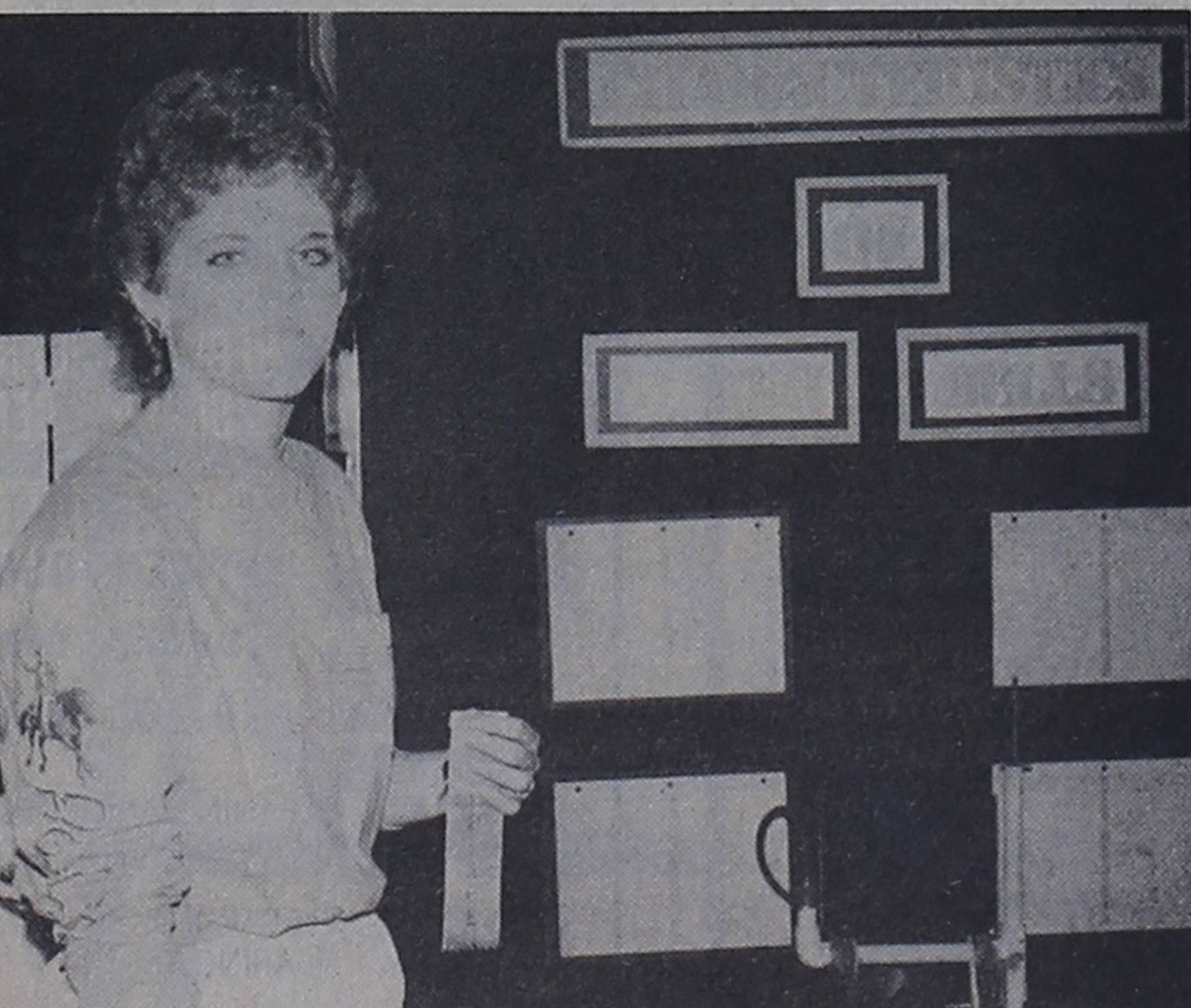

## Shawn Osborn In TCU Special Study Program

Students in Dr. William Ray's first-year level urban studies class at Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, Texas, join the decision-making electorate in a hurry.

People have been making decisions for these students all their lives, Dr. Ray believes, and by the time they're in college, students should be part of the process themselves.

Active participation in local government—ranging from registering to vote to writing letters to the editor—is mandatory for students of Dr. Ray, who directs TCU's Urban Studies Program.

A Friona resident, Shawn Osborn, is a participant in the program. She is

a freshman elementary education major.

Ray has found that some 60 to 70 per cent of his students each semester are not registered voters. Regarding voting as an obligation of citizenship, Ray warns that someone else will make the decisions if individuals as voters do not.

Class requirements also include attending at least one public meeting of the students' choice to familiarize them with municipal government. "If you look ahead five years or so, the students will be part of the leadership." Waking up to their responsibility then is later than necessary. "The sooner they learn it, the better for them and us," he said.

Ray also uses the campus as a local setting and stirs participation by requiring students to identify a campus concern and take their input to the responsible officials or elected student representatives.

"I was impressed," Ray said of the students' response. "It pushes them beyond themselves and on to the campus and to the city. It builds a sense of attachment to place; they see they've got a stake in it."

Although many students at first turn up their noses at the class requirements, they learn quickly that involvement is not as hard or unpleasant as it seems. "Once they've done it the first time," Ray said, "it's easy the second time." And fostering a positive attitude is important to him because he wants the students to continue their interest and participation after school.

His classes have had particular success at writing letters to the editor. The rate of publishing has been extremely high, Ray said, and seeing their name in print is a big kick for many students, if not for the journalist who has to sort through the volumes of letters that sometimes arrive all at once.

Although Ray's encouragement of student involvement in local affairs is not new, he has recently increased his own activity by throwing his hat into the political ring and running for an open spot on the school board for the Fort Worth Independent School District.



## Fr. Sherry Enjoys His Work In This Area

Father Brandon Sherry has been serving St. Teresa's Catholic Church as priest since August 1983. He replaced Father Ron McGovern, who had to leave Friona because of health problems.

Father Sherry was born in Monaghan, Ireland, but moved from there

when he was an infant to Belfast, Ireland, with his parents, brothers and sisters. He studied for the priesthood in Dublin, Ireland and left the same year, 1952, for New Zealand, where he served as city parishioner, country parishioner, and chaplain in the New Zealand Air Force. He was chaplain for three years, but served in New Zealand for 31 years before leaving.

Sherry told of the beauty of Ireland and how the rainfall in parts of Ireland was measured in yards instead of inches. He said the mountains, lakes, and all the greenness of Ireland were a beauty that was undecipherable. The climate there is always pleasant and the winters are short and not bad at all.

Sherry's family, his brothers and sisters still live in Ireland and he visited them two years ago.

When asked how he felt about working in Friona and Bovina, he replied, "It's people that make a town a desirable place to live and I thoroughly enjoy working with the friendly people here."

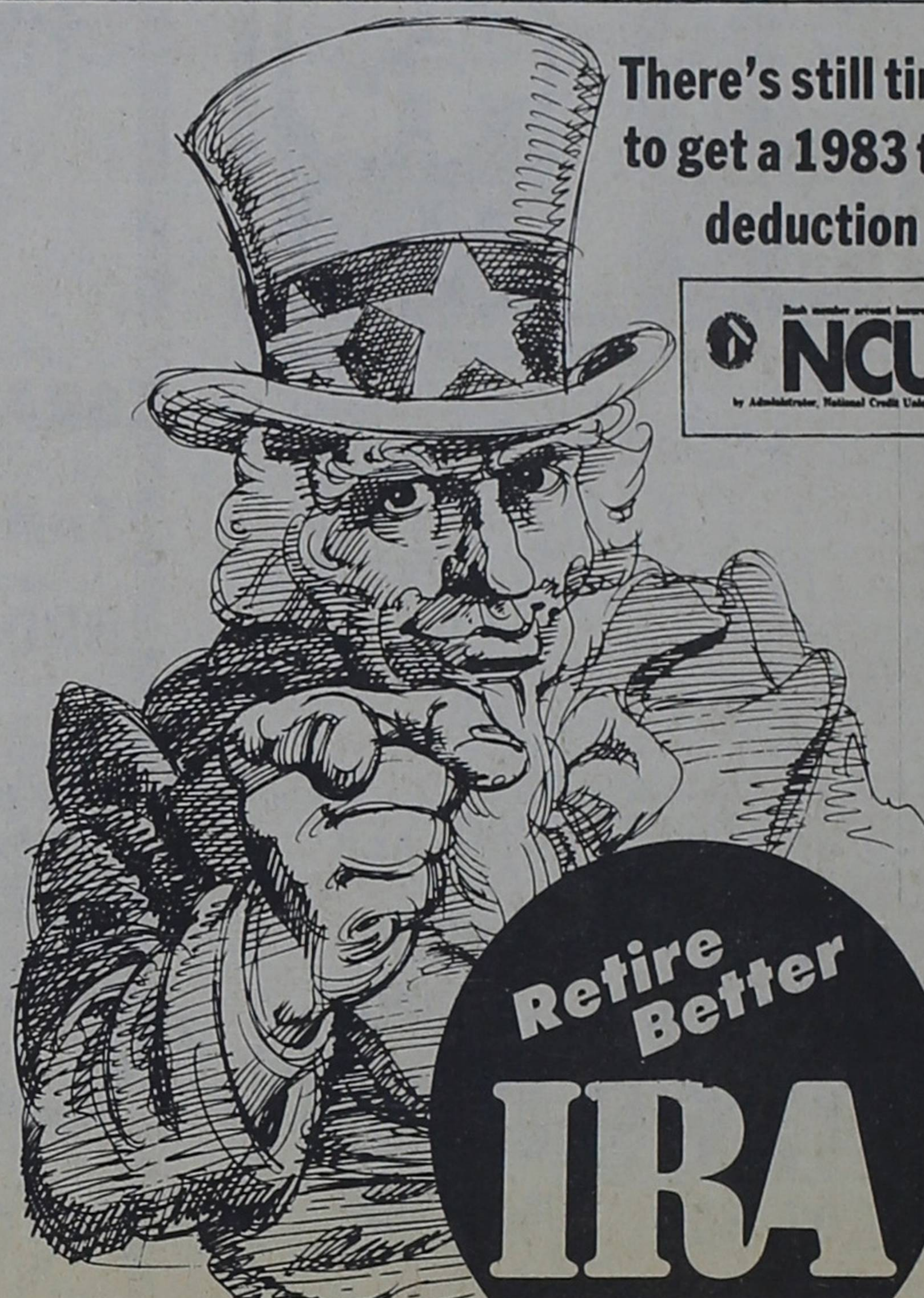

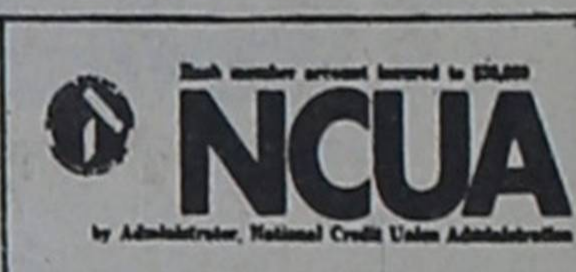

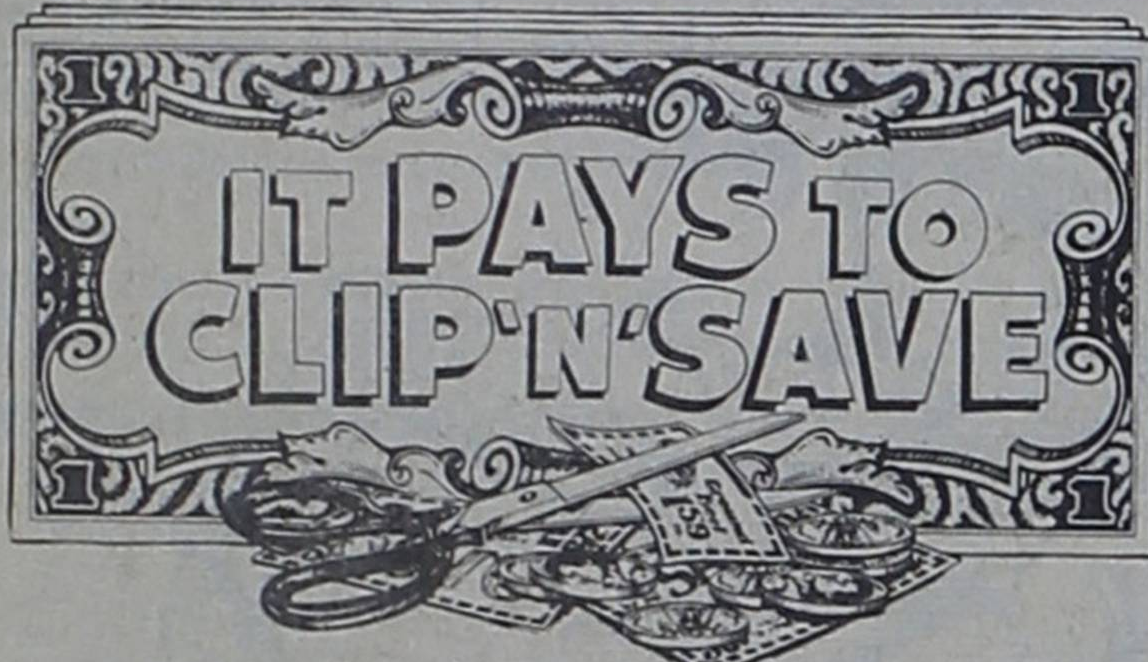
