

## **Enrollment** Total Tops 1982 Figure

Enrollment in Friona Schools showed a gain of 22 students over the same enrollment date a year earlier, it was announced by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The enrollment as of Thursday, August 25 stood at 1281 in the entire school system. This was up 22 students from the fourth day of the first week of school a year ago, when the enrollment came to 1259.

Biggest gain was shown in the high school totals, which are up by 14 students over 1982. Enrollment on Thursday stood at 341 students, compared to 327 the year earlier, a 4.3 per cent increase. Junior high enrollment (sixth through eighth grades) climbed by six students, from 298 in 1982 to 304 this year.

# Chieftains Eying Wildcat Rematch

The Friona Chieftains were to have their second scrimmage at Springlake-Earth Friday, and then will turn their attention to River Road, their season-opening opponent Friday, September 2 here in Friona at 8 p.m.

"River Road beat us twice last year, and that hurt. We felt like we could have beaten them, especially in the playoff game," said Chieftain coach Tommy Moss.

However, the Wildcats will be good once again, as they are rated either first or second in their district (2-AAA) once again. Last season, River Road edged Dalhart, 8-7, for the district title.

Moss said he felt the team had accomplished what it needed to do in the Bovina scrimmage, but felt the only bad thing was that the scrimmage was somewhat limited.

The varsity was only able to run 15 offensive plays and 15





Administrator Walters named







## **B.** Carrothers Makes Tour Through U.S.

The fourth annual Young Cattlemen's Traveling Leadership Conference, sponsored by the National Cattlemen's Association (NCA) and its affiliated state and national breed organizations, was completed recently. The program is designed to assist in the development of future leaders of the beef cattle industry.

The 24 young cattlemen, selected by their sponsoring state cattle and breed organizations, traveled across the nation, from San Francisco to Washington, D.C. They were exposed to various aspects of the livestock industry during the six-day tour.

Members of the group, all under age 40, began their tour in Denver, where they were given an overview of the role of NCA by NCA president W.J. (Dub) Waldrip and NCA executive vice president W.T. (Dub) Berry. They attended workshops on policy development, communications and membership development. The group was also introduced to Cattle-Fax, a cattle market analysis service associated with NCA.

Among the delegates to the conference was Bill Carrothers, a former Friona resident. Carrothers is the son of the late Jack Carrothers, an early force in developing the cattle industry in this area. To learn more about the retail meat business, the group next visited the corporate headquarters of Safeway Stores in Oakland, Calif. Safeway executives, including their president, Dale Lynch, explained Safeway's retail marketing approach, which includes a new nutrition awareness program for customers. While in the Bay area, the young cattlemen visited the headquarters of Syntex Corp., an international health care firm that also produces growth promotant products, vaccines and veterinary products for animals. The young cattlemen next traveled to Chicago, where they visited the Chicago Mercantile Exchange (CME). CME president Clayton

Yeutter commented on plans to move into a new building, to establish a certificate of delivery in December and to introduce a pilot program in agricultural options trading next year.

While in the Chicago area, the group visited nearby International Minerals and Chemical Corp. (IMC). IMC executives and technical experts introduced the group to marketing and research aspects of growth stimulants and anabolic agents in livestock production.

The final two days of the tour were spent in the nation's capitol. Following a special tour through the Capitol building, the cattlemen attended a Congressional briefing and luncheon in the historic Mansfield room of the Capitol.

They heard from top congressional leaders, including Cong. Tony Coelho, (Calif.), chairman of the Democratic Congressional Election Committee and member of the House committees on Agriculture, Interior and Insular Affairs; and Congresswoman Virginia Smith, (Neb), ranking minority member of the House Appropriations subcommittee on agriculture and related agencies.
