NEARLY EVERYBODY can find some reason to feel discriminated against, no matter what their skin color or economic status. There always will be some form of discrimination that cannot be blotted out by passing new laws.

When the affirmative action laws were passed in an attempt to end discrimination against blacks, there were cries of reverse discrimination as whites felt that they were being treated unfairly and discriminated against.

In earlier days, immigrants to the U.S. felt that they were victims of discrimination because their clothing was different and their language was different. In time this changed.

The womens liberation movement has campaigned vigorously for equal rights on the grounds that women have been discriminated against in many fields of endeavor. Yet when such things as unisex rates for car insurance were put into effect, many women claimed they were being discriminated against with higher rates even though their driving records were much better than males the same age.

There are various organizations formed to combat discrimination. There are clubs for tall people who claim that society discriminates against them with beds too short, chairs too low and cars that are hard to enter.

Short people have organized to fight discrimination of the same things only in reverse.

An outfit in Chicago organized into "The Committee Against Physical Prejudice" by claiming that our national obsession for physical attractiveness and youthfulness discriminates against ordinary looking people.

And a California club was formed to protest against a society that seems geared to ordinary people while discriminating against those with superior intellect that qualifies them

for membership in Mensa.

The National Association to Aid
Fat Americans has survived at least
11 years in its campaign against hiring
practices that favor thin people.

A society which is made up heavily of white people may discriminate against those of darker skins. A black society in Africa can also be accused of discriminating against a minority with white skins.

Discrimination will exist as long as people have a freedom of choice and there is no way to pass a law that will insure complete social equality among members of any society.

Area Gets 1.38" Rain

The Friona area received a good rain on Monday and Tuesday of this week.

The showers of those two evenings amounted to 1.38 inches in Friona.

Then on Wednesday, another cloud threatened the area, but only .02 inch of moisture was recorded locally, making a total for the week of 1.4 inches

The rainfall will be a big boost to all of the area's farm crops, which for the most part are at the height of their moisture needs.

This week's rain was lighter to the west, and heavier to the east of town, almost the exact opposite of the rains

Temperatures were on the mild side on Monday and Tuesday, and an all-time low temperature record of 59 degrees was registered at the Amarillo weather station on Wednesday morning.

Area Cotton Hurt By 2,4-D Drift

Crop Sustains Massive Damage

Cotton farmers in the Friona area have experienced massive damage from the herbicide, 2,4-D, it was reported this week.

The damage appears to cover an area from Farwell to Friona and Hereford, and south to Muleshoe.

Representatives from the Texas Department of Agriculture have been in the Friona area all week, inspecting the cotton and documenting the situation.

A large amount of the damage is thought to have occurred after farmers in the Deaf Smith County area, as well as Parmer County, sprayed their wheat fields with Butyl Ester, one formulation of 2,4-D which is more likely to drift, according to the experts.

"The ester formulation is more likely to drift, and can drift for miles. It is especially volatile in high temperatures and where there are high winds," said Al Hernandez, an administrator for the enforcement section of the Agricultural Environment of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Damage to the cotton in the area has varied from field to field, and also according to the variety. "The later cotton seems to be hurt worse than the earlier crops. And some varieties are hurt worse than others," said D.L. Carmichael, manager of the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin.

Carmichael had a sheet full of names of farmers who had experienced damage to their crops from one extreme to another.

The Friona ginner hosted a meeting on Wednesday, which was attended by four ginners and a large crowd of farmers, along with the Texas Department of Agriculture officials.

Hernandez explained that the use or non-use of the chemical 2,4-D is regulated by the county commissioner's court in each individual county.

For example, Parmer County is considered a "partially regulated" county. No permit is required from October 1 through March 1 each year. Otherwise, the chemical can be used during the summer months if the applicator secures a permit.

However, in neighboring Deaf Smith County, there are no restrictions whatever for the use of the chemical.

Making the situation even worse is the fact that the area's cotton crop was off to what one official called "its best start ever." With no PIK program, there are many times as many acres of cotton this year than in 1983.

Wheat farmers spray their wheat or wheat stubble with the 2,4-D to rid their fields of weeds. The Butyl Ester formulation is a less expensive form of 2,4-D. Agricultural observers say the spray can drift up to 30 or 40 miles under the right conditions.

One observer blamed the problem on a few farmers out to "save a nickel" on their spraying costs, and exhibiting virtually no concern at all for their neighbors' crops.

"You can get a permit to carry a gun, but that doesn't give you the right to go around shooting people," was another comment.

Council Votes To Pay Buske Price

The Friona City Council, meeting in special session Tuesday evening, voted to pay the \$15,700 award to the G.B. Buske estate, as tendered by the three-member commission at its hearing on July 12.

The council was faced with three alternatives in its decision: (1) pay the judgement price, (2) appeal the award decision to a higher court, or (3) drop the condemnation proceedings.

It chose to pay the award price.

"We're needing the land, in order to accomplish several objectives, so the council felt that it might be foolish to choose either of the other alternatives," said City Manager Beelee Goodwin.

The City of Friona had filed condemnation proceedings against the 40x110-foot piece of property owned by the Buske estate, after it felt that it had exhausted all means of negotiating for the property.

The City had offered the Buske estate \$5,000 for the strip of land earlier in the year, but the offer was turned down. The estate offered to dedicate a 16-foot portion of the strip, south to Eighth Street, for street purposes, and to grant the city an easement to cross the remainder of the property with water and sewer lines.

But the city council had rejected this offer, as Mayor Clarence Monroe testified at the hearing that "We felt we didn't want to have to go through a hassle every time we needed to cross this property."

Hernandez, who arrived in Friona Tuesday morning to help check on the problem, said his office had had complaints from Swisher and Deaf Smith counties, and that he was aware that the problem existed in New Mexico, as well as in Parmer County.

Hernandez said he had a list of 40 farmers as of Thursday morning having herbicide damage to their cotton, and that the list was growing all the time.

"It appears to be a big area," he said, in answer to how much territory is affected by the problem.

There were six employees of the Texas Department of Agriculture in the Friona area on Thursday inspecting the damaged fields. Hernandez said he hoped to be able to get more men into the area, and expected to be here at least another week.

The herbicide kills the plants for which it is intended by causing them to "grow themselves to death." Its affect on cotton plants is to cause the leaves to wilt and change color. Also, the cotton squares are elongated, or blasted, which means that the bloom probably will not appear, meaning the loss of bolls of cotton.

Some farmers were comparing the situation to a bad hailstorm. The only difference is that with the herbicide damage, the loss may not be as evident right away.


"You can drive by a field, and maybe not be aware that it has been damaged. But if you walk out into the field and inspect the plants, you can see in a hurry that something bad has happened," one farmer said.

Danny Murphree, who has over 1,000 acres of cotton, told his ginner he was afraid his fields may have suffered 50 per cent damage from the herbicide drift.

Harry Hamilton, who has a 77-acre field of cotton on land he farms for Charles Russell, said that patch of cotton may be abandoned, or plowed under.

Ralph Baxter, whose cotton is just up the road from Hamilton's, also suffered extensive damage.

Some farmers said they had also noticed bad damage to trees on their places, and some gardens, especially the tomato plants,

across six states.





An Irrigation Field Day will be held August 1 beginning at 9 a.m. on Phillip Johnson's farm one mile west of the Hub intersection of Highway 86 and 214, one half mile south on the dirt road, then one quarter of a mile west on turn-row.

Methods of irrigation will be discussed.

Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) on sprinkler system will be demonstrated and discussed by Leon New, Agricultural Engineer with the Agricultural Extension Service.

Surge irrigation equipment will be demonstrated and discussed by Phillip Johnson, farmer and secretary of Parmer County S.W.C.D., and Jerry Walker, Agricultural Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service.

A natural gas pumping plant efficiency will be demonstrated with the use of a Torgue-cell used by the High Plains Underground Water

will be available and its use in the field will be discussed by Soil Conservation personnel.


Drip irrigation equipment will be discussed and its use on irrigating windbreak trees. Drip equipment is available through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The use of gypsum blocks will be demonstrated in field use along with the moisture meter's use. Meters and blocks will be available to irrigators through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Anyone interested in any of these methods of improving irrigations are encouraged to attend the field day on August 1.

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

He worked in Dimmitt four months before he was transferred to the Littlefield office where he remained before coming to Farwell to





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

Dark Of Moon Production Set

Curtain time for the 1984 Friona Fine Arts Council's 1984 Summer Drama Workshop (senior division) has been set for 8 p.m. this Saturday night, July 21, in the Friona High School Auditorium.

Advanced drama students from the area will be presenting Dark of the Moon by Howard Richardson and William Berney.

Since its first appearance on Broadway in March, 1945, this classic of rural Americana has become a perennial favorite of professional, community, university and high school theatres. Dark of the Moon has now played in most of the leading theatre capitals of the world, including Rome, Sydney, London, Johannesburg and even Leningrad; and such performers as Paul Newman, Betsy Palmer, Shelley Berman and Marge Champion have starred in it at one time or another.

Based upon the haunting Smoky Mountain version of The Ballad of Barbara Allen, the play recounts the story of a Witchboy (Chuck Ellis) who one day beholds the beautiful Barbara Allen (Tempa Woffard) and immediately falls in love with her.

He goes high up into the mountains to a Conjur Man (Brad Zimmerman) to plead to be changed into a human so that he might court Barbara. When the Conjur Man refuses to change the Witchboy, he appeals to the Conjur Woman (Amber Smith).

Despite the taunts and threats of the Dark Witch (Leslee Upton) and the Fair Witch (Amy Blankenship), a compact is made between the Witchboy and the Conjur Woman by which he will be granted human form to marry Barbara Allen upon the condition that she remain faithful to him for one year. If she remains true to him for just one year, he will be a human permanently, and have a soul.

Despite the misgivings of Barbara's parents Mr. Allen (Mark Blankenship) and Mrs. Allen (Sheila Deaton), John the Witchboy and Barbara are married by Preacher Haggler (Brent Hinkle).

Townspeople who witness the wedding with doubts and dire predictions include a rival suitor for Barbara's hand, Marvin Hudgins (Scot Straw); Uncle Smelicue (Rev. Gary Smith); Miss Metcalf (Lory Tannahill); Mrs. Bergen (Leigh Ann Neelley); Ella Bergin (Tammy Chapman); Mr. Atkins (Jay Widner); Barbara's brother, Floyd Allen (Michael Gibson); Mrs. Summey (Kellianne Coffey) and Edna Summey (Tiffany Osborn).

Barbara Allen later gives birth to a witch-child baby, whom the local midwives burn. In a frenzy of religious revival to "rid the valley of a witch," Barbara is led to betray her young husband in order to save her own soul, thus breaking the condition set by the Conjur Women.

The Fair and Dark Witches then bet the Conjur Man that Witchboy will return to the mountains to plead for a second chance. Barbara's life is the stake. John (Witchboy) does return to beg for more time because he still loves Barbara and knows she has been misled, but the Conjur Woman refuses to grant him any more time. The Dark and Fair Witches win their bet, Barbara's life is forfeited, and John Witchboy returns to the mountains with no memory of his love for or life with Barbara.

The title of the production also comes from a condition set down by the Conjur Woman: as long as the Witchboy lives as a human among mortals, he will never be able to see the moon. Interestingly enough, the local Friona production will be played during the Dark of the Moon.

Stage crew members are Traci Zoth, Stormi Upton and Mitchell Gibson and much assistance has been received from Gaye Tannahill and Joy Morton. The production is under the direction of Lou-Ida Marsh from Caldwell, Texas.



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
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
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Local Couple United In Church Ceremony

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
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



And there's times when it is dark out With my bouffant cap on my head I don't know if I am retiring Or just got out of bed.



1. Inexpensive frames of good quality are available for as little as \$15.00 to \$20.00. True, they may not be as stylish as the designer frames, but they are contemporary styles of good quality.

2. Designer frames seem to be the fad right now, but be prepared to pay more for these frames. Why? Because the world famous designer is paid a royalty for each frame sold in the United States.

3. Most foreign made frames are more expensive that American made frames because of the import tariffs imposed by our government on foreign products. The cost of shipping from overseas is also higher. These added expenses are passed along to the consumer.

4. Larger sized frames require larger blank lenses in order to fill the prescription properly. These larger lenses are more expensive than the regular sized blank lenses. Try to pick frames of moderate to small sizes in

order to avoid this added expense. 5. Rimless frames are more expensive than frames that have rims all the way around because it takes more time to hand fit the lenses to the frame. Also, because of the special handling required, the new faceted lenses cost more than regular lenses. Be prepared to pay extra for the newest fad.


6. Gradient tints and Photochromic (the lenses that change to sunglasses) tints are practical and serve a definite need, but they cost a

little more than standard tints. A word of caution, do not try to economize too much on your eyewear. You want the finest quality lenses and frames available at a fair price. Quality costs a little more to begin with, but costs a lot less in the long run because of greater durability and life. As our REGULAR patients are


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
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
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
