

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

Meanwhile, the cotton price continues to bob up and down. Thursday morning the cotton futures showed October at 65.50 per hundred, and December at 66.45. Carmichael pointed out that this was the "premium" price. Cotton in this area is sometimes

docked around 15° per pound. "It's beginning to look as though the price of cotton will be close to the loan price, and it needs to be higher," Carmichael concluded.





Six Point Plan for Fair and Effective Farm Policy

Part 2

When farm group representatives from six states met with Ag

Secretary Block last month, each of us told the Secretary of the concerns of our group or region. In my speech I presented six specific proposals based on my talks with farmers throughout the 19th Congressional District. Last week's column included the first three of these proposals; this week I'll discuss the remaining points.

The fourth point is that Federal Crop Insurance must provide fair yield coverage at a reasonable premium. Our farmers' extreme vulnerability to weather makes low coverage and high premiums impractical. The FCIC has begun to address this problem, but it must consider new procedures to lessen the penalty now placed on farmers when they can least afford it-after they have suffered several losses in a row caused by weather or

other factors outside their control.

> Fifth, the Maximum Payment Limitation should be increased. Much has changed since the \$50,000 limitation was introduced several years ago. The current limitation forces too many producers to go off the program. This not only deprives these farmers of the benefits of the program, it also encourages production undermining the purpose of the program.

The regulation allowing farmers to "get back" a percentage of the ACR acres over the limit is not a fair substitute for the dollars lost. The limitation should be raised to a level that protects the family farm concept and encourages greater program participation.

And sixth, increasing exports must be a top priority for future farm policy. To attain a market price necessary for a reasonable

Although each representative had specific concerns, there was a common goal expressed throughout the meeting with Secretary Block: We need a farm policy that realizes farmers must make a profit to survive, a policy that gives every farmer a fair shake on government programs. I believe that we must work together, in meetings like the one in Dallas, to achieve that goal with new farm legislation in 1985.

CATARACTS--What Are They?

A cataract is any opacity (clouding) of a crystalline lens sufficient to cause visual impairment. Cataracts have been known of since the beginning of medical history and are the leading cause of blindness throughout the world even to this day.

Contrary to popular belief, a cataract is NOT a growth over the outside of the eye nor is it a tumor. The lens inside the eye, located just behind the iris and pupil, is normally crystal clear; hence the name crystalline lens. When this lens, which is made up of layers like an onion, becomes opaque or cloudy, it is no longer called the crystalline lens, but it is called a "cataract."

Not all cataracts advance to a stage that require surgical removal. Many only develop to a certain stage and remain there for months or even years. More frequent eyeglass prescription changes, sometimes as often as every six months, are required in order to keep a patient seeing properly. Cataracts seldom get better; but, sometimes they do stop progressing. It is impossible to predict accurately how quickly or slowly a cataract will progress. Your optometrist, with his years of experience of watching cataracts, can make an educated guess regarding the expected progress of a cataract.

At this time there is no known method of preventing the development of cataracts. The only accepted treatment for cataracts is their surgical removal after reaching a certain stage. Research into new methods of cataract treatment or prevention and research into the underlying cause of cataracts has not given us any answers.
